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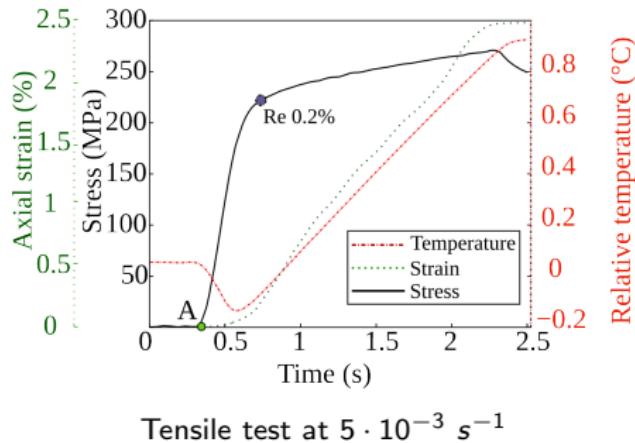
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Why metallic polycrystals?

- ▶ Long history on metals and thermomechanical couplings
 - ▶ Lord Kelvin on thermoelasticity [Kelvin, 1853-1878]
 - ▶ Taylor on thermoplasticity, latent heat and energy storage [Taylor et al., 1925-1937]
 - ▶ Chrysochoos on energy balance and infrared thermography [Chrysochoos et al., 1987-]
- ▶ Metals are (poly)crystals
 - ▶ Crystal elasticity and plasticity [Cottrell, Oxford press, 1953]
 - ▶ Grain boundaries, twins, ... [Kelly and Knowles, Wiley, 2012]
 - ▶ Local heterogeneities, strain localization, plasticity mechanisms [Jaoul, Dunod, 1965, new ed.: Presses des Mines, 2008]

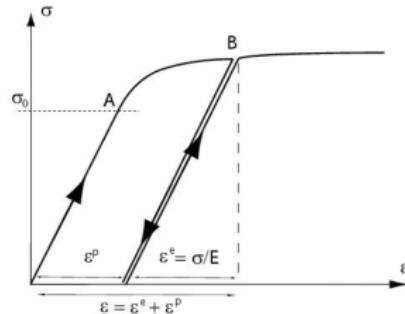
Few reminders on metal plasticity

Plasticity: some facts

Observations

- ▶ an initial domain: linear relation between stress and strain
- ▶ a threshold
- ▶ "hardening": deformation requires more effort
- ▶ residual strain after unloading: plastic strain

Tensile test



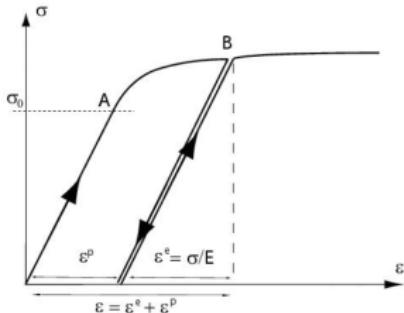
Plasticity: some equations

Elasticity and yield criterion

- ▶ $\varepsilon = \varepsilon^e + \varepsilon^p$
- ▶ $\sigma = \mathbb{C} : \varepsilon^e = \mathbb{C} : (\varepsilon - \varepsilon^p)$
- ▶ von Mises:

$$f(s_{ij}) = \sqrt{J_2} - \sigma_0 = \sqrt{\frac{3}{2}\mathbf{s} : \mathbf{s}} - \sigma_0$$
- ▶ with: $\mathbf{s} = \boldsymbol{\sigma} - \frac{1}{3}tr(\boldsymbol{\sigma})\mathbf{I}$
- ▶ yield criterion: $f \leq 0$
- ▶ uniaxial: $|\sigma| \leq \sigma_0$

Tensile test

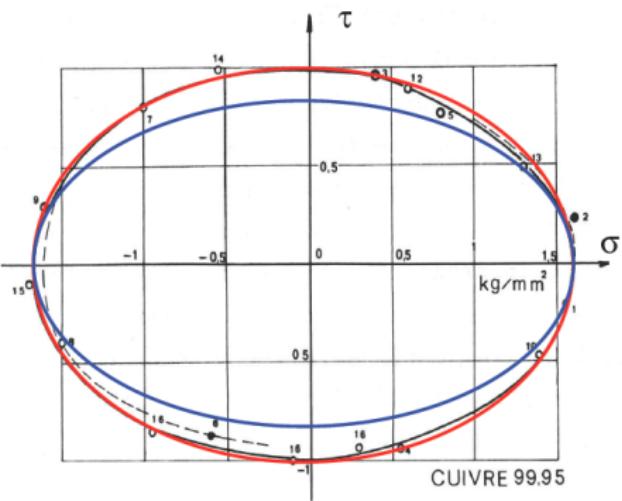


Initial yield surface

Tension-torsion test

- ▶ $f = \sqrt{\frac{3}{2} \mathbf{s} : \mathbf{s}} - \sigma_0$
- ▶ $\sqrt{\sigma^2 + 3\tau^2} = \sigma_0$ (in red)
- ▶ $\tau_0 = \frac{\sigma_0}{\sqrt{3}}$
- ▶ (Tresca:
 $\sqrt{\sigma^2 + 4\tau^2} = \sigma_0$, in blue)

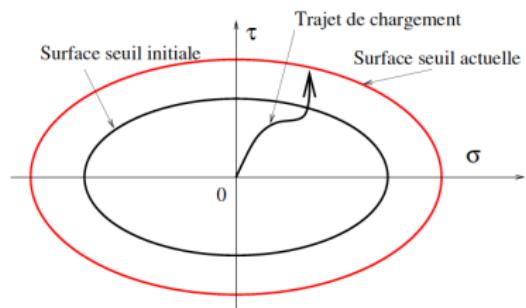

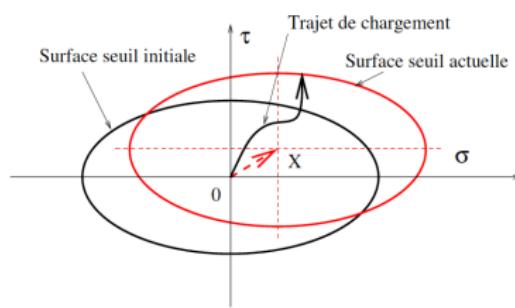

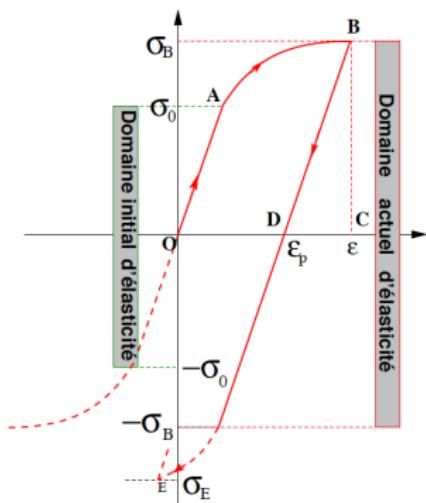

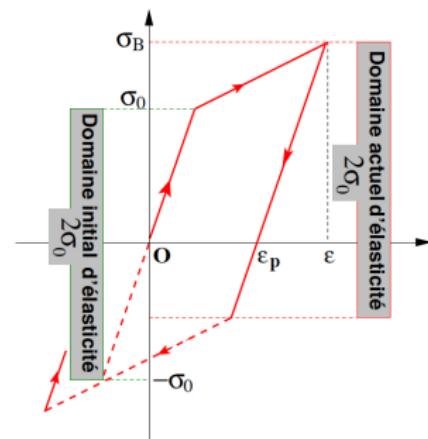

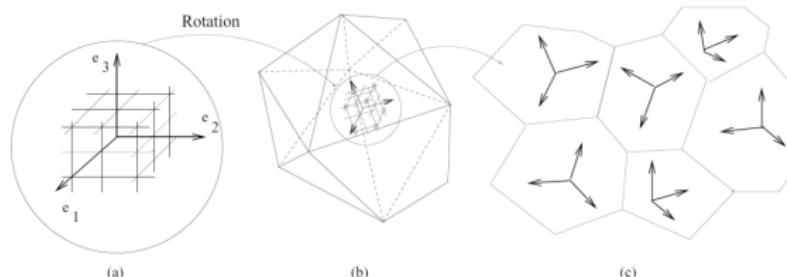

From atoms to test specimens

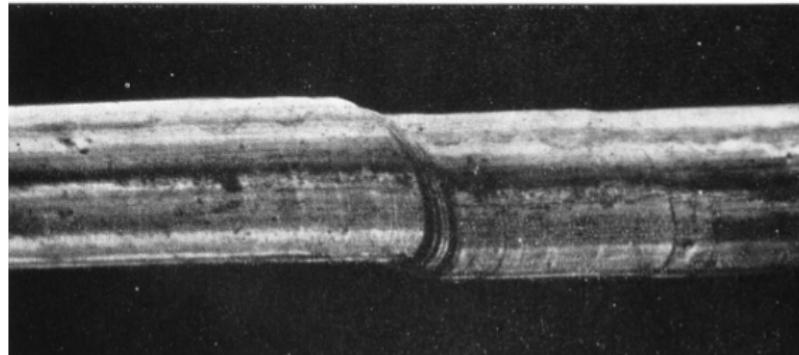
- ▶ Atomic nanometric scale: periodic array, **crystallographic structures** (face-centred cubic, body-centred cubic, hexagonal, . . .),
- ▶ Microscopic scale: **crystal**, fixed array orientation
- ▶ Mesoscopic scale (hundred of microns): **polycrystal**
- ▶ Macroscopic scale (centimetres): laboratory test specimen
- ▶ Engineering scale (centimetres to meters): structures

Plastic slip in crystals

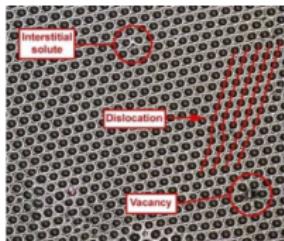
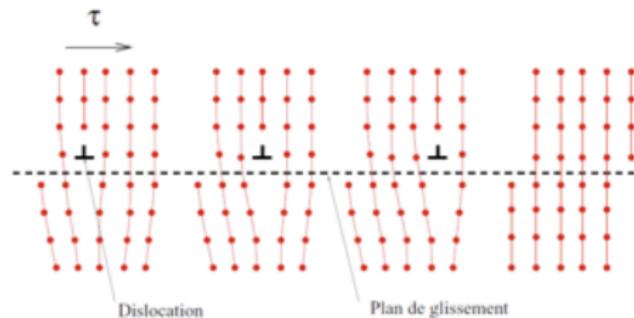
Plastic deformation in single crystals: slip planes, glide lamella

Plastic slip and dislocations

Dislocations: line defect in crystals (10^{13} cm^{-3})

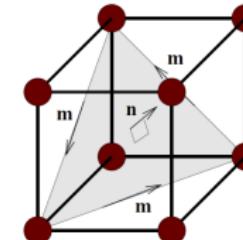


Slip planes

- ▶ dense planes (minimum energy)
- ▶ depend on the crystallographic structure (FCC, BCC, Hexagonal, ...)
- ▶ maximum shear stress

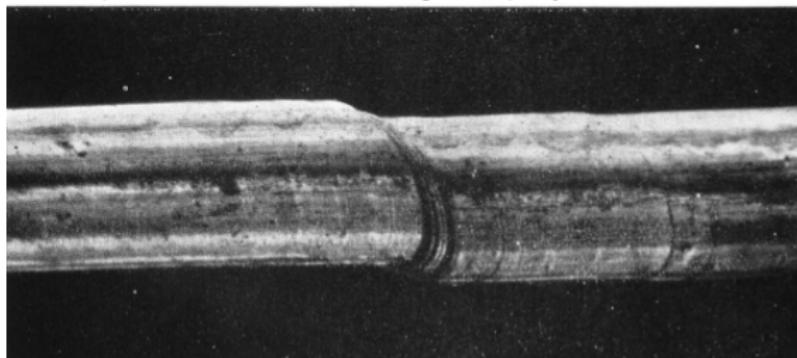
FCC particular case

- ▶ 4 dense planes (octahedral planes: normal \underline{n} [111])
- ▶ 3 invariant slip directions \underline{m}
- ▶ 12 possible slip planes

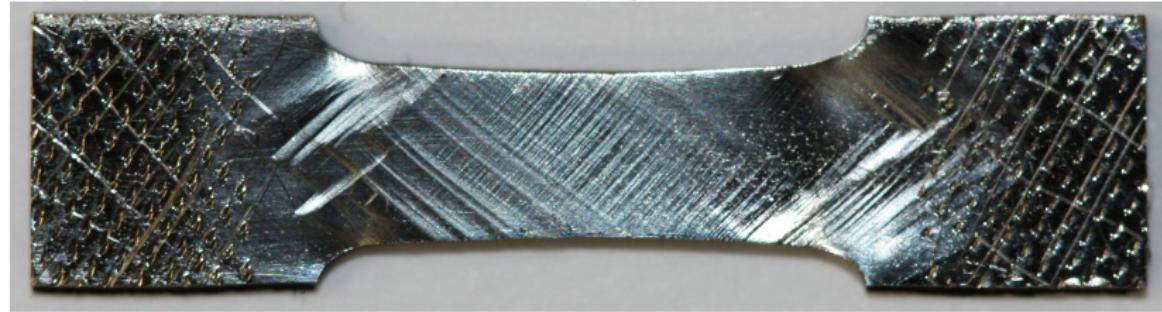
Slip plane and slip direction : one single slip system

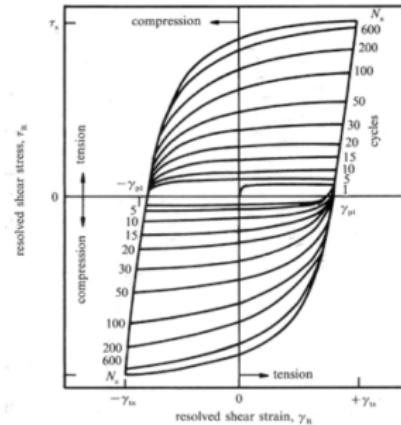

Single crystals

Plastic deformation

- ▶ single crystal: fixed orientation
- ▶ shear stress and strain on slip planes
- ▶ isotropic and/or kinematic hardening

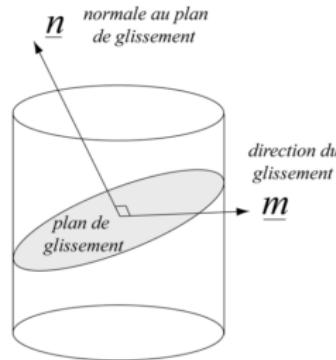

Crystal plasticity framework

$$\boldsymbol{\varepsilon} = \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^e + \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^p$$

$$\Delta = \underline{n} \otimes \underline{m} = \frac{1}{2}(\underline{n} \otimes \underline{m} + \underline{m} \otimes \underline{n})$$

$$\gamma^p = 2\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^p : \Delta$$

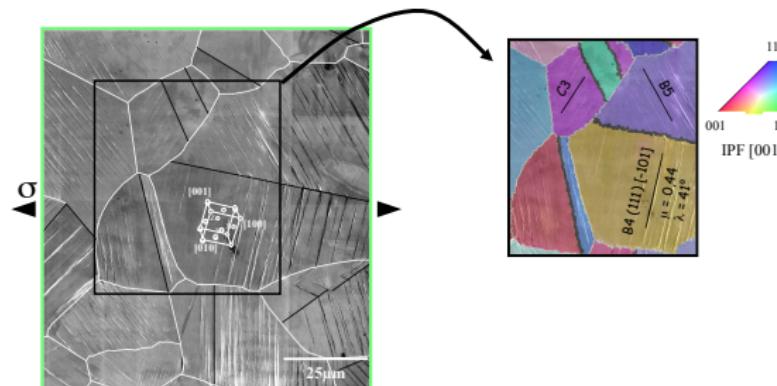
$$\tau = \boldsymbol{\sigma} : \Delta$$

$$\text{Schmid's law: } |\tau - X| - \tau_0 - R = 0$$

R and X : isotropic and kinematic hardening variables

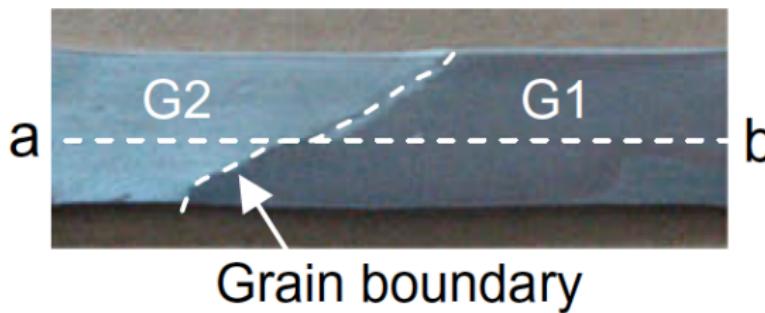
From single- to polycrystals

- ▶ Crystallographic orientations: Electron Back Scattered Diffraction (EBSD)
- ▶ Orientations distribution, crystallographic textures, ...
- ▶ Local heterogeneities from grains to grains



From single- to polycrystals

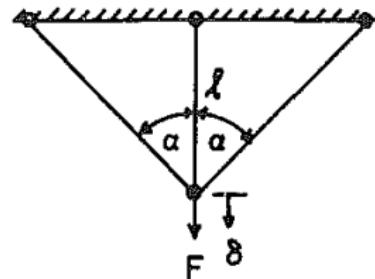
- ▶ Oligocrystals, submitted to homogenous stress boundary conditions
- ▶ Different crystallographic orientations

A simple model: the three-bar truss (1/4)

- ▶ Considering three glued crystals submitted to the same force at their boundaries,
- ▶ Two different orientations,
- ▶ Perfect plasticity: yield stress N_0

A simple model: the three-bar truss (2/4)

Solution

- ▶ bars only in tension-compression, section A ,
- ▶ $\sum_{i=1}^3 N_i \underline{t}_i = \underline{F}$,
- ▶ yield criterion: $|N_i| \leq N_0$

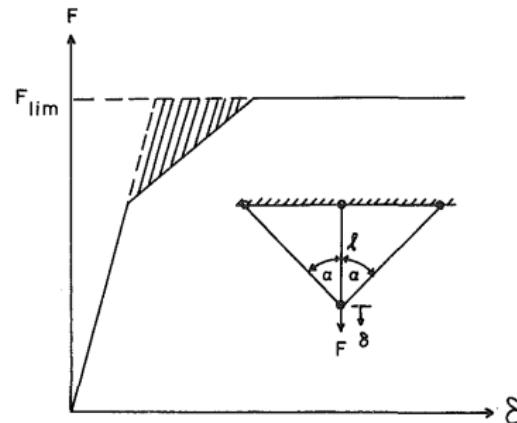
Elasticity

- ▶ $F = \frac{AE\delta}{I}(1 + 2 \cos^3 \alpha)$ for $\delta \leq \frac{N_0 I}{AE}$

A simple model: three-bar truss (3/4)

Plasticity and limit load

- ▶ $F = N_0 + \frac{2AE\delta}{l} \cos^3 \alpha$ for
 $\frac{N_0 l}{AE} \leq \delta \leq \frac{N_0 l}{AE \cos^2 \alpha}$
- ▶ $F = F_{lim} = N_0(1 + 2 \cos \alpha)$
 for $\delta \geq \frac{N_0 l}{AE \cos^2 \alpha}$

A simple model: three-bar truss (4/4)

Residual stresses

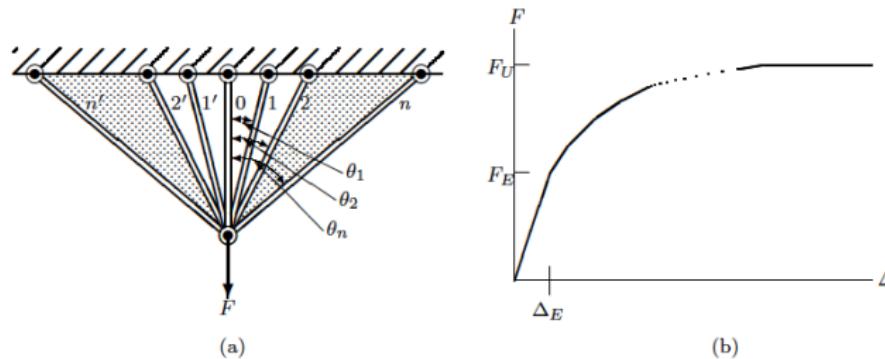
- ▶ $\sigma_v = -2 \frac{N_0}{A} \frac{\sin^2 \alpha \cos \alpha}{1 + 2 \cos^3 \alpha}$, for the vertical bar (compression),
- ▶ $\sigma_i = \frac{N_0}{A} \frac{\sin^2 \alpha}{1 + 2 \cos^3 \alpha}$, for the inclined bar (tension).

Structural hardening

- ▶ Residual stresses due to strain incompatibilities,
- ▶ Despite local perfect plasticity, **structural hardening**

Extension to polycrystals

Generalization for an infinite number of perfectly plastic bars

- ▶ structural kinematic hardening,
- ▶ residual stresses in polycrystals: $\sigma = \mathbb{A} : \Sigma + \sigma^{res}$, impact on energy balance (see later).

Energy storage and dissipation

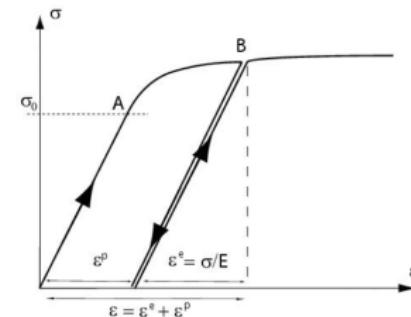
Thermomechanical description of the elastic-plastic behaviour of polycrystals

- ▶ elasticity, yield surface and intragranular hardening
- ▶ heterogeneous vs generalized plasticity : residual stresses
- ▶ temperature variations?
- ▶ associated dissipation and stored energy?

Some equations

State variables

- ▶ ε : observable state variable
- ▶ $\varepsilon^P(\alpha)$: internal kinematic variable depending on α
- ▶ T : observable state variable



Free energy potential and state equations

Free energy potential

- ▶ deformation ε is not a dissipative variable: irreversible evolutions characterized by $\varepsilon^P(\alpha)$
- ▶ $\varepsilon = \varepsilon^e(\sigma) + \varepsilon^P(\alpha)$
- ▶ $\Psi(\varepsilon, \alpha, T) = \Psi_e(\varepsilon - \varepsilon^P, T) + \Psi_\alpha(\alpha)$
- ▶ $\Psi_\alpha(\alpha)$, stored free energy or relaxed state free energy

State equations

- ▶ $\sigma^r = \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \varepsilon} ; s = - \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial T}$
- ▶ $\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P} = \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \varepsilon^P} ; \mathbf{A}_\alpha = \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \alpha}$

Free energy potential and state equations

Linear elasticity

- ▶ $\rho\Psi(\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}, \boldsymbol{\alpha}, T) = \frac{1}{2}(\boldsymbol{\varepsilon} - \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^p) : \mathbb{C} : (\boldsymbol{\varepsilon} - \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^p)$
- ▶ $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^r = \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}} = \mathbb{C} : (\boldsymbol{\varepsilon} - \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^p)$
- ▶ $\mathbf{A}_{\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^p} = \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^p} = -\mathbb{C} : (\boldsymbol{\varepsilon} - \boldsymbol{\varepsilon}^p) = -\boldsymbol{\sigma}^r$

Dissipation potential and evolution equations

Dissipation potential

- ▶ $\varphi(q, \dot{\varepsilon}, \dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha}; \varepsilon, \varepsilon^P, \alpha, T)$

Thermal dissipation

- ▶
$$-\frac{\nabla T}{T} = \frac{\partial \varphi(q, \dot{\varepsilon}, \dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha}; \varepsilon, \varepsilon^P, \alpha, T)}{\partial q}$$

Evolution equations: subdifferential

- ▶ $(\sigma^{ir}, \mathbf{X}_{\dot{\varepsilon}^P}, \mathbf{X}_{\dot{\alpha}}) \in \partial_{(\dot{\varepsilon}, \dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha})} \varphi(q, \dot{\varepsilon}, \dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha}; \varepsilon, \varepsilon^P, \alpha, T)$

Intrinsic dissipation (1/2)

Thermodynamics principles

- ▶ $d_1(\dot{\varepsilon}, \dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha}; \varepsilon, \varepsilon^P, \alpha) = \sigma : \dot{\varepsilon} - \rho \dot{\psi} - \rho s \dot{T}$
- ▶ $d_1 = \sigma : \dot{\varepsilon} - \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \varepsilon} \dot{\varepsilon} - \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \varepsilon^P} \dot{\varepsilon}^P - \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \alpha} \dot{\alpha} - \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial T} \dot{T} - \rho s \dot{T}$
- ▶ $d_1 = (\sigma - \sigma^r) : \dot{\varepsilon} - \mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P} : \dot{\varepsilon}^P - \mathbf{A}_\alpha : \dot{\alpha}$

Intrinsic dissipation

- ▶ $d_1 = \sigma^{ir} : \dot{\varepsilon} + \mathbf{X}_{\dot{\varepsilon}^P} : \dot{\varepsilon}^P + \mathbf{X}_{\dot{\alpha}} : \dot{\alpha}$
- ▶ $\sigma^{ir} = \sigma - \sigma^r ; \mathbf{X}_{\dot{\varepsilon}^P} = -\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P} = \sigma^r; \mathbf{X}_{\dot{\alpha}} = -\mathbf{A}_\alpha$

Intrinsic dissipation (2/2)

Irreversibilities: α

- ▶ deformation ε is not a dissipative variable: irreversible evolutions characterized by $\varepsilon^P(\alpha)$
- ▶ $\varphi(q, \dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha}; \varepsilon, \varepsilon^P, \alpha, T)$
- ▶ $\sigma^{ir} = 0$

Consequences

- ▶ $\sigma^r = \sigma$
- ▶ $d_1 = \sigma : \dot{\varepsilon}^P - \mathbf{A}_\alpha : \dot{\alpha} = \sigma : \dot{\varepsilon}^P - \dot{\Psi}_\alpha(\alpha)$

Dissipation potential and yield function

Some equivalences

- ▶ $(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}, \mathbf{A}_\alpha) \in \partial_{(\dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha})} \varphi(\dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha}; \varepsilon, \varepsilon^P, \alpha)$
- ▶ $(\dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha}) \in \partial_{(\mathbf{x}_{\varepsilon^P}, \mathbf{x}_{\dot{\alpha}})} \varphi^*(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}, \mathbf{A}_\alpha)$

with $\varphi^*(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}, \mathbf{A}_\alpha, T) = \sup_{\dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha}} \{-\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P} : \dot{\varepsilon}^P - \mathbf{A}_\alpha : \dot{\alpha} - \varphi(\dot{\varepsilon}^P, \dot{\alpha})\}$

$\varphi^*(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}, \mathbf{A}_\alpha, T)$ indicator function of a convex set:

$$\mathcal{C} = \{(-\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}, -\mathbf{A}_\alpha) \text{ such as } f(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}, \mathbf{A}_\alpha) \leq 0\}$$

$$\blacktriangleright \dot{\varepsilon}^P = -\lambda \frac{\partial f(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}, \mathbf{A}_\alpha)}{\partial \mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}} ; \dot{\alpha} = -\lambda \frac{\partial f(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}, \mathbf{A}_\alpha)}{\partial \mathbf{A}_\alpha}$$

with $\lambda \geq 0$, $f \leq 0$, $\lambda f = 0$

Illustration (1/2)

Perfect plasticity

- ▶ $\rho\Psi(\varepsilon, \alpha, T) = \frac{1}{2}(\varepsilon - \varepsilon^P) : \mathbb{C} : (\varepsilon - \varepsilon^P)$
- ▶ $\varphi(\dot{\varepsilon}^P) = \sigma_0 \|\dot{\varepsilon}^P\| = \sigma_0 \sqrt{\dot{\varepsilon}^P : \dot{\varepsilon}^P}$
- ▶ $\varphi^*(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P}) = \sup_{\dot{\varepsilon}^P} \{-\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^P} : \dot{\varepsilon}^P - \varphi(\dot{\varepsilon}^P)\} = \sup_{\dot{\varepsilon}^P} \{\boldsymbol{\sigma} : \dot{\varepsilon}^P - \varphi(\dot{\varepsilon}^P)\} = \sup_{\|\dot{\varepsilon}^P\|} \{\|\boldsymbol{\sigma}\| \cdot \|\dot{\varepsilon}^P\| - \sigma_0 \|\dot{\varepsilon}^P\|\} = \sup_{\|\dot{\varepsilon}^P\|} \{(\|\boldsymbol{\sigma}\| - \sigma_0) \cdot \|\dot{\varepsilon}^P\|\}$

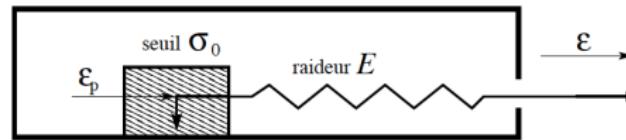


Illustration (2/2)

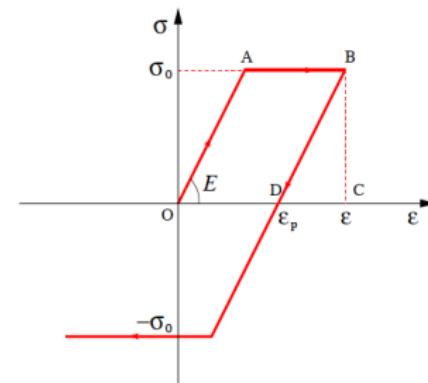
- ▶ $\sigma = \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \varepsilon} = \mathbb{C} : (\varepsilon - \varepsilon^p)$

- ▶ $\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^p} = \rho \frac{\partial \Psi}{\partial \dot{\varepsilon}^p} = -\sigma$

- ▶ $\sigma^{irr} = \frac{\partial \varphi(\dot{\varepsilon}^p)}{\partial \dot{\varepsilon}} = 0$

- ▶ if $\|\sigma\| - \sigma_0 < 0$ then $\dot{\varepsilon}^p = 0$

- ▶ if $\|\sigma\| - \sigma_0 = 0$ then
 $\dot{\varepsilon}^p = \lambda \frac{\sigma}{\|\sigma\|}, \lambda \geq 0$



Thermoplastic framework (1/2)

Internal energy rate:

- ▶ $\rho \dot{e} = \rho C \dot{T} + (\boldsymbol{\sigma} : \dot{\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}}^e + \mathbf{A}_\alpha : \dot{\boldsymbol{\alpha}}) - \left(T \frac{\partial \boldsymbol{\sigma}}{\partial T} : \dot{\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}}^e + T \frac{\partial \mathbf{A}_\alpha}{\partial T} : \dot{\boldsymbol{\alpha}} \right)$
- ▶ $\rho \dot{e} = \rho C \dot{T} + (\dot{w}_e + \dot{w}_s) - \dot{w}_{thc}$

Heat equation

$$\rho C \dot{T} + \operatorname{div}(q) = r_e + \boldsymbol{\sigma} : \dot{\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}}^p - \mathbf{A}_\alpha : \dot{\boldsymbol{\alpha}} + \left(T \frac{\partial \boldsymbol{\sigma}}{\partial T} : \dot{\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}}^e + T \frac{\partial \mathbf{A}_\alpha}{\partial T} : \dot{\boldsymbol{\alpha}} \right)$$

Thermoplastic framework (2/2)

Energy balance in "classical" thermoplasticity

- ▶ heat sources Φ determined from the heat equation (not detailed here)
- ▶
$$\Phi = \boldsymbol{\sigma} : \dot{\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}}^p - \mathbf{A}_\alpha : \dot{\boldsymbol{\alpha}} + T \frac{E\alpha}{1-2\nu} \text{tr}(\dot{\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}}^e)$$

Stored energy

- ▶
$$\dot{\psi}_\alpha(\alpha) = \boldsymbol{\sigma} : \dot{\boldsymbol{\varepsilon}}^p - d_1$$

Non uniqueness of models: stored energy (1/3)

- ▶ $\rho\Psi(\varepsilon, \varepsilon^p, \alpha) = \frac{1}{2}(\varepsilon - \varepsilon^p) : \mathbb{C} : (\varepsilon - \varepsilon^p) + \Psi_p(p)$ with
$$p = \sqrt{\frac{2}{3}\dot{\varepsilon}^p : \dot{\varepsilon}^p}$$
- ▶ $\sigma = \mathbb{C} : (\varepsilon - \varepsilon^p)$; $\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^p} = -\sigma$; $A_p = \frac{\partial \Psi_p(p)}{\partial p} = R(p)$
- ▶ $f(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^p}, A_p) = \|\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^p}\| - A_p - \sigma_0$

Non uniqueness of models: stored energy (2/3)

Example: isotropic hardening

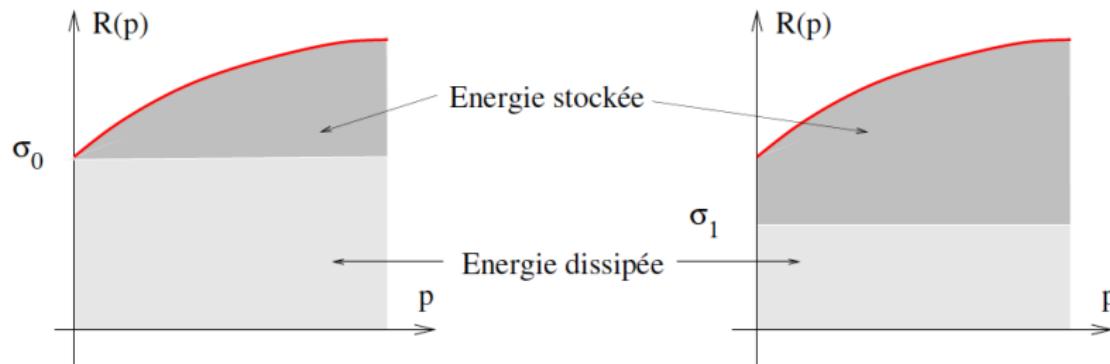
- ▶ $\dot{\varepsilon}^p = -\lambda \frac{\partial f(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^p}, A_p)}{\partial \mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^p}} = \lambda \sqrt{\frac{3}{2}} \frac{\mathbf{s}}{\|\mathbf{s}\|}$; $\dot{p} = -\lambda \frac{\partial f(\mathbf{A}_{\varepsilon^p}, A_p)}{\partial A_p} = \lambda$

- ▶ $d_1 = \boldsymbol{\sigma} : \dot{\varepsilon}^p - A_p \dot{p} = \sigma_0 \dot{p}$

Other model

- ▶ $R(p)$ and σ_1
- ▶ **only dissipation and stored energy are concerned:** no influence on the mechanical model

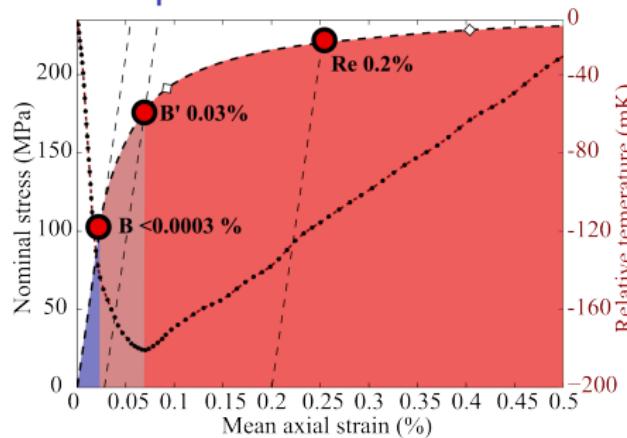
Some experimental thermomechanical evidences

A simple tensile test: temperature evolutions

3 thermal phases

1. linear drop: *elasticity*
2. inflection: *micro dissipation*
3. increase: *global dissipation* [Lee, J. Mat. Sci., 1991]

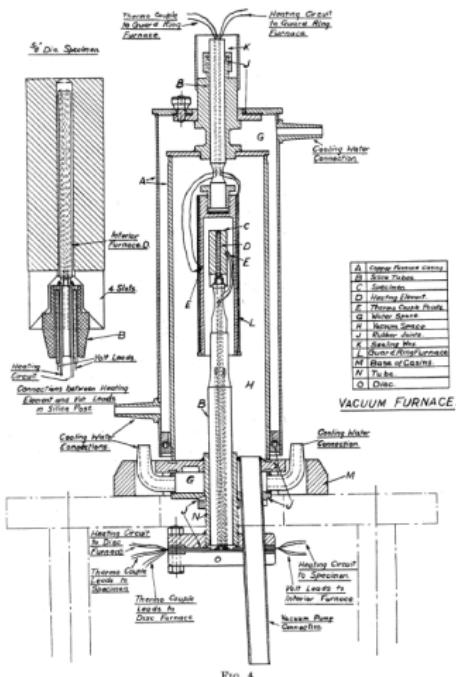
Macroscopic results



Identification of a macroscopic yield of dissipation $\rightarrow \varepsilon^P < 10^{-4}\%$ by means of Maximum Likelihood method and deviation from thermal linearity

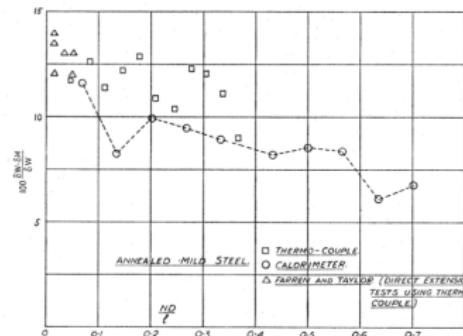
First energy balances: calorimetry



β ratio

$$\beta = \frac{\dot{\psi}_\alpha(\alpha)}{\sigma : \dot{\varepsilon}^p}$$

$$\beta = 1 - \frac{d_1}{\sigma : \varepsilon^p} \in [5, 20] \%$$

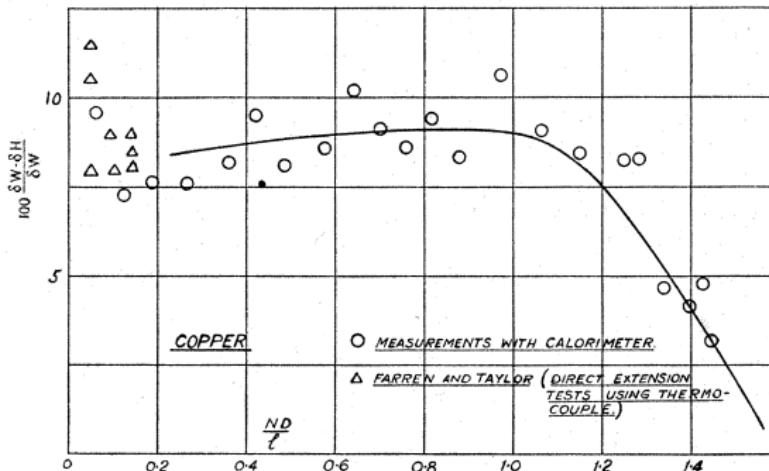
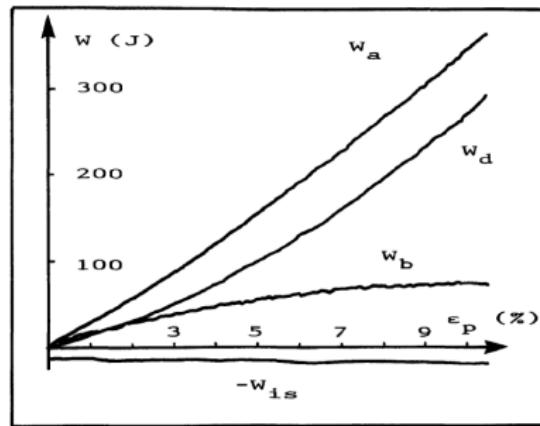


FIG. 6.—Percentage of work done which remains latent in specimen subjected to plastic twisting.

Tension test on Duralumin



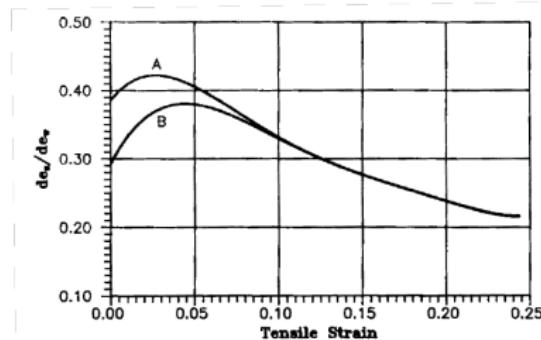
- ▶ Classical constitutive laws are not "thermomechanically admissible", i.e. respect energy balance

Fig. 7. Dependence of de_s/de_w vs. strain for the fine-grained (curve A) and coarse-grained (curve B) samples.

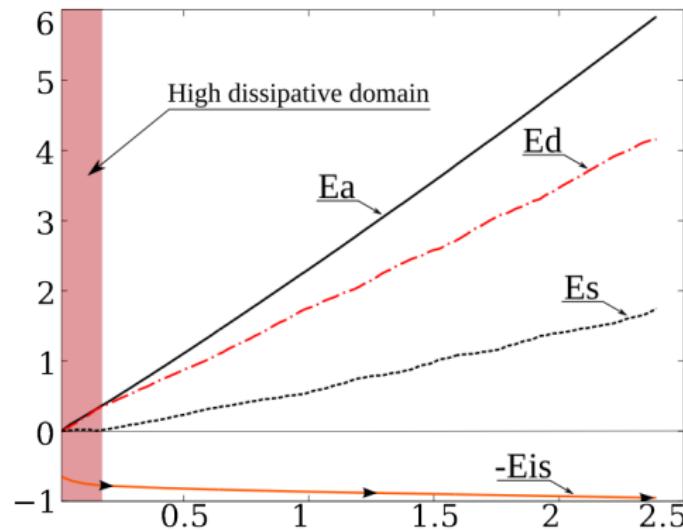

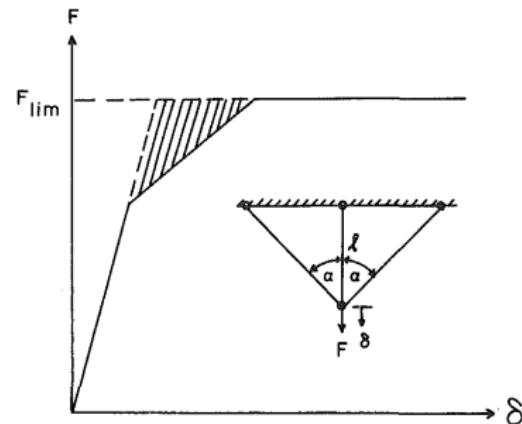

A simple model: the three-bar truss

Stored energy in residual stresses

- ▶ $W^r = \int_V \frac{1}{2} \boldsymbol{\sigma}^r : \mathbb{C}^{-1} : \boldsymbol{\sigma}^r dV$
- ▶ $W^r = \frac{Al\sigma_0^2}{E} \frac{\sin^2 \alpha \cos \alpha}{1 + 2 \cos^3 \alpha}$
- ▶ W^r equal to shaded area
- ▶ extension to polycrystals:
shaded area is an approximation



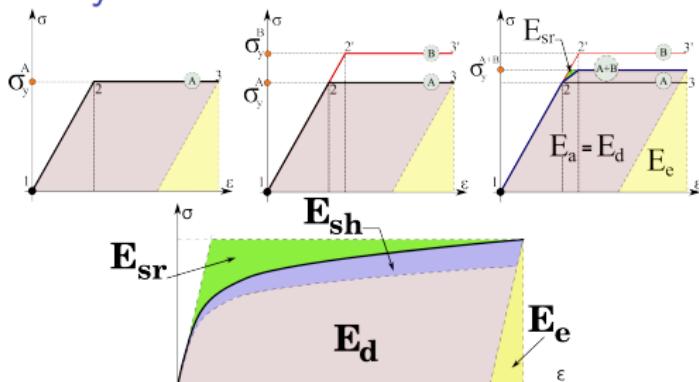

Extension to polycrystals

Stored energy in polycrystals

- $E_{sh} \rightarrow$ stored energy due to the hardening process
- $E_{sr} \rightarrow$ stored elastic energy due to internal stresses field

Principle: elastic perfectly plastic bi-crystal



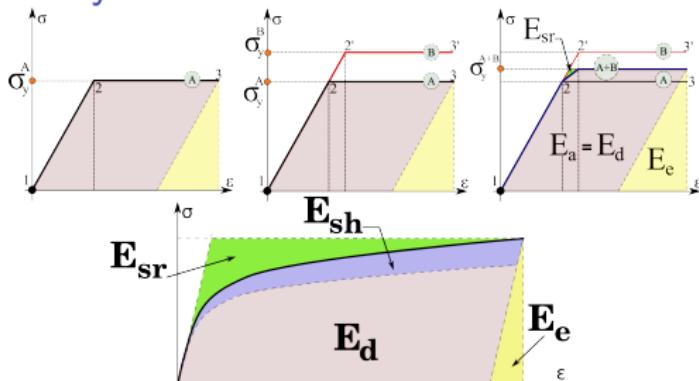
Polycrystals with local hardening

Extension to polycrystals

Macroscopic measurements

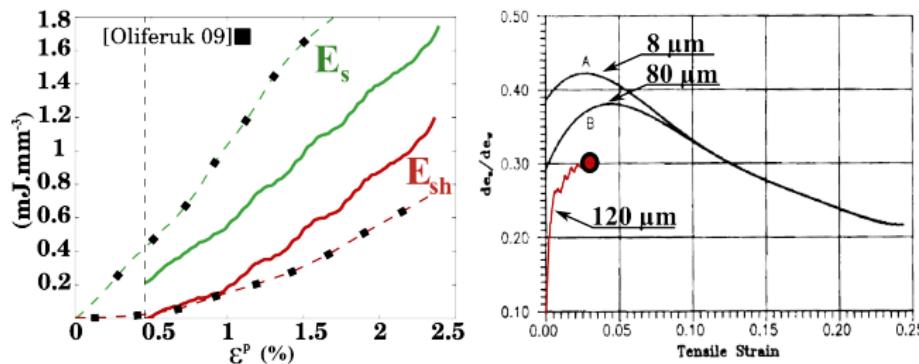
1. $E_d \rightarrow$ heat equation
2. $E_s = E_a - E_d$
3. $E_{sr} \rightarrow$ stress-strain curve
4. $E_{sh} = E_s - E_{sr}$

Principle: elastic perfectly plastic bi-crystal



Polycrystals with local hardening

Stored energies



[Oliferuk et al., Eur. J. Mech. A/sol., 2009] & [Oliferuk et al., Mat. Sci. Eng. A, 1994]

- confirmation: grain size $\nearrow \beta^* \searrow$ (early plasticity)

Grain size influence

- ▶ observation at 2.5% of plastic strain:
 - ▶ grain size ($\approx 20\mu m$): storage → "internal stresses" 77% → "hardening" 23%
 - ▶ grain size ($\approx 120\mu m$): storage → "internal stresses" 31% → "hardening" 69%

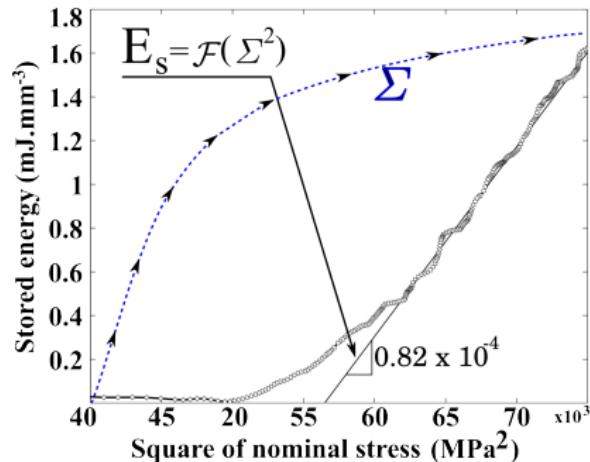
Stored energy and dislocations

$$E_s = \frac{m^2 \alpha_s}{\alpha^2 \mu} \Sigma^2 \approx 0.8 \times 10^{-4} \Sigma^2$$

[Schmid and Boas, 1950] [Bailey and Hirsch, 1960]

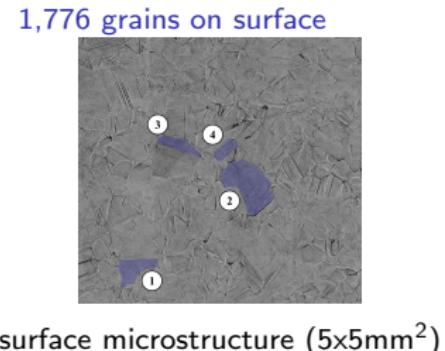
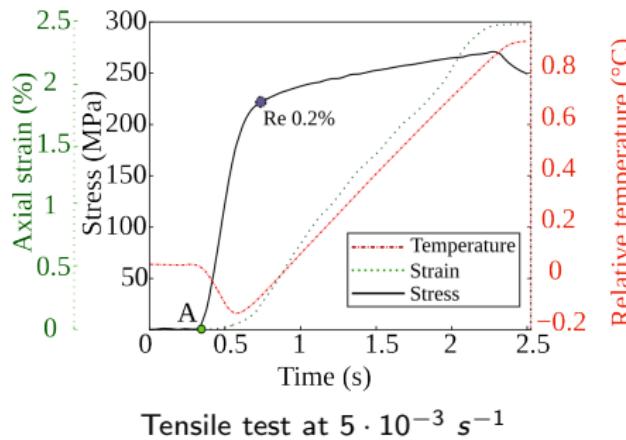
[Williams, 1964] [Bever et al., 1973]

- ▶ m : Schmid factor
- ▶ α : a constant ≈ 0.3
- ▶ α_s : a constant
 $\in [1.8 - 2.1]$
- ▶ μ : the shear modulus



Grains and/or crystals

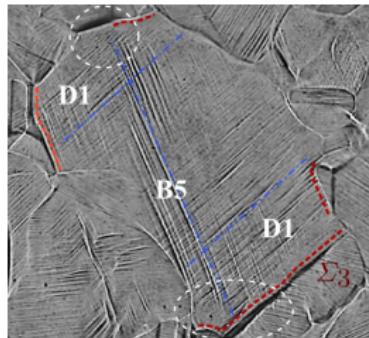
A simple monotonic tensile test



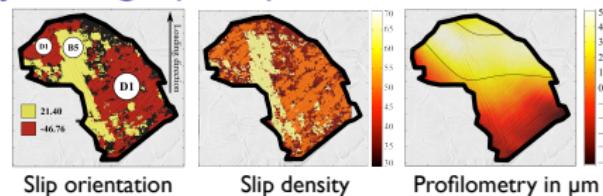
From polycrystal to grains

Observations

2 distinct activated slip systems



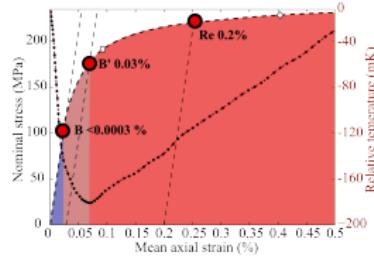
Crystallographic point of view



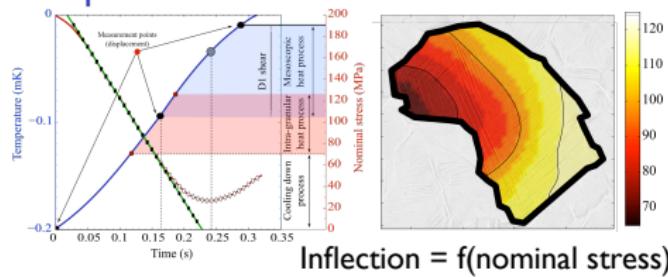
- ▶ maximum Schmid factor principle: system D_1 (0.339) and B_5 (0.296)
- ▶ deformation scenario: $D_1 \rightarrow B_5$

Deformation scenario

- ▶ kinematic
→ $\tau_c = 35 \text{ MPa}$
- ▶ D_1 dissipates early
- ▶ temperature
→ $\tau_c = 25 \text{ MPa}$



Thermal point of view: local temperature inflection

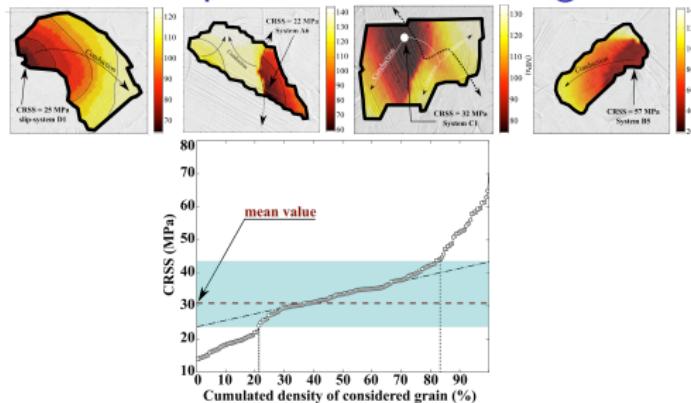


- ▶ intragranular thermal deviation from linearity at 78 MPa

Deformation scenario

- ▶ 2 distinct plastic domains $D_1 \rightarrow B_5$
- ▶ kinematic
 $\rightarrow \tau_c = 35 \text{ MPa}$
- ▶ temperature
 $\rightarrow \tau_c = 25 \text{ MPa}$
- ▶ generalization:
 - ▶ grain diameter
 $> 104 \mu\text{m}$
 - ▶ early inflection
(165 grains)

Statistical point of view: 165 grains



Conclusion

$\text{CRSS} = 31 \text{ MPa} \pm 7 \text{ MPa}$ within the polycrystal

in line with [Feaugas, Adv. Eng. Mater., 2009] within AISI 316L single crystal
