

# **Twistor Forms on Riemannian Products**

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### <span id="page-1-0"></span>TWISTOR FORMS ON RIEMANNIAN PRODUCTS

Abstract. We study twistor forms on products of compact Riemannian manifolds and show that they are defined by Killing forms on the factors. The main result of this note is a necessary step in the classification of compact Riemannian manifolds with non-generic holonomy carrying twistor forms.

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### 1. Twistor Forms on Riemannian Manifolds

A twistor p-form on a Riemannian manifold  $(M^n, g)$  is a smooth section  $\psi$  of  $\Lambda^pT^*M$ whose covariant derivative only depends on its differential  $d\psi$  and codifferential  $\delta\psi$ . More precisely,  $\psi$  satisfies the equation

$$
\nabla_X \psi = \frac{1}{p+1} X \lrcorner \, d\psi - \frac{1}{n-p+1} X \wedge \delta\psi,\tag{1}
$$

for all vector fields  $X$ . Note that here, and in the remaining part of this note, we identify vectors and 1-forms using the metric.

If the p-form  $\psi$  is in addition coclosed (*i.e.*  $\delta \psi = 0$ ), then it is called a Killing p-form. For a comprehensive introduction to twistor forms, see [\[4\]](#page-4-0).

A few years ago, a program of classification of twistor forms on compact manifolds was started. By the de Rham decomposition theorem, every simply connected Riemannian manifold is a Riemannian product of irreducible manifolds. Moreover, the Berger holonomy theorem implies that any simply connected irreducible Riemannian manifold is either symmetric or has holonomy  $SO_n$ ,  $U_m$ ,  $SU_m$ ,  $Sp_k$ ,  $Sp_k$ ,  $Sp_1$ ,  $G_2$  or  $Spin_7$ . Killing forms on symmetric spaces were studied in  $[1]$ . Twistor forms on Kähler manifolds (coveringthe holonomies  $U_m$ ,  $SU_m$ , and  $Sp_k$ ) were described in [[2\]](#page-4-0), and Killing forms on quaternion-Kähler manifolds (holonomy  $Sp_k(Sp_1)$  or Joyce manifolds (holonomies  $G_2$  or  $Spin_7$ ) were studied in [\[3](#page-4-0)] and [\[5](#page-4-0)] respectively. In Theorem [2.1](#page-2-0) below, we prove that the general case (twistor forms on a Riemannian product of compact manifolds) reduces to the study of Killing forms on the factors. By the discussion above, besides the case of generic holonomy  $(SO_n)$ , all other cases are fully understood.

#### 2. The Main Result

<span id="page-2-0"></span>Let  $M = M_1 \times M_2$  be the Riemannian product of two compact Riemannian manifolds  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  of dimensions m and n respectively. The aim of this note is to prove the following result:

**Theorem 2.1.** Every twistor form on  $M$  is a sum of forms of the following types: parallel forms, pull-backs of Killing forms on  $M_1$  or  $M_2$ , and Hodge duals of them.

Proof. We define the differential operators

$$
d_1 = \sum_{i=1}^m e_i \wedge \nabla_{e_i}, \qquad d_2 = \sum_{j=1}^n f_j \wedge \nabla_{f_j},
$$

where  $\{e_i\}$  and  $\{f_i\}$  denote local orthonormal basis of the tangent distributions to  $M_1$ and  $M_2$ . Using the Fubini theorem, we easily see that the adjoint operators to  $d_1$  and  $d_2$  are

$$
\delta_1 = -\sum_{i=1}^m e_i \Im_{e_i}, \qquad \qquad \delta_2 = -\sum_{j=1}^n f_j \Im_{f_j}.
$$

The following relations are straightforward:

$$
d = d_1 + d_2, \qquad \delta = \delta_1 + \delta_2, \qquad (d_1)^2 = (d_2)^2 = (\delta_1)^2 = (\delta_2)^2 = 0,
$$
  

$$
0 = d_1 d_2 + d_2 d_1 = \delta_1 \delta_2 + \delta_2 \delta_1, \qquad 0 = d_1 \delta_2 + \delta_2 d_1 = \delta_1 d_2 + d_2 \delta_1.
$$

The vector bundle  $\Lambda^p M$  decomposes naturally as

$$
\Lambda^p M \cong \oplus_{i=0}^p \Lambda^{i, p-i} M,
$$

where  $\Lambda^{i,p-i}M \cong \Lambda^i M_1 \otimes \Lambda^{p-i}M_2$ . Obviously,  $d_1$  and  $\delta_1$  map  $\Lambda^{i,p-i}M$  to  $\Lambda^{i+1,p-i}M$ and  $\Lambda^{i-1,p-i}M$  respectively, and  $d_2$  and  $\delta_2$  map  $\Lambda^{i,p-i}M$  to  $\Lambda^{i,p-i+1}M$  and  $\Lambda^{i,p-i-1}M$ respectively.

With respect to the above decomposition, every *p*-form can be written  $u = u_0 + \ldots + u_p$ , where  $u_i \in \Lambda^i M_1 \otimes \Lambda^{p-i} M_2$ . For the remaining of this paper, u will denote a twistor p-form on M, where  $1 \leq p \leq n+m-1$ . The twistor equation reads

$$
\nabla_X u = \frac{1}{p+1} X \lrcorner (d_1 u + d_2 u) - \frac{1}{m+n-p+1} X \wedge (\delta_1 u + \delta_2 u), \quad \forall X \in TM.
$$
 (2)

By projection onto the different irreducible components of  $\Lambda^p M$ , (2) can be translated into the following two systems of equations:

$$
\nabla_X u_k = \frac{1}{p+1} X \lrcorner (d_1 u_k + d_2 u_{k+1}) - \frac{1}{m+n-p+1} X \wedge (\delta_1 u_k + \delta_2 u_{k-1}), \quad \forall X \in TM_1, (3)
$$

and

$$
\nabla_X u_k = \frac{1}{p+1} X \lrcorner (d_1 u_{k-1} + d_2 u_k) - \frac{1}{m+n-p+1} X \wedge (\delta_1 u_{k+1} + \delta_2 u_k), \quad \forall X \in TM_2. \tag{4}
$$

Taking the wedge product with  $X$  in [\(3](#page-2-0)) and summing over an orthonormal basis of  $TM_1$  yields  $d_1u_k = \frac{k+1}{p+1}(d_1u_k + d_2u_{k+1}),$  so

$$
(p-k)d_1u_k = (k+1)d_2u_{k+1},
$$
\n(5)

and similarly, taking the interior product with  $X$  and summing over an orthonormal basis of  $TM_1$  yields  $\delta_1 u_k = \frac{m-k+1}{m+n-p+1}(\delta_1 u_k + \delta_2 u_{k-1}),$  thus

$$
(n + k - p)\delta_1 u_k = (m - k + 1)\delta_2 u_{k-1}.
$$
\n(6)

Suppose first that p is strictly smaller than m and n. For  $k < p$ , (5) and (6) imply

$$
\delta_1 d_1 u_k = \frac{k+1}{p-k} \delta_1 d_2 u_{k+1} = -\frac{k+1}{p-k} d_2 \delta_1 u_{k+1} = -\frac{(k+1)(m-k)}{(p-k)(n+k-p+1)} d_2 \delta_2 u_k. \tag{7}
$$

Integrating over M yields  $0 = d_1u_k = \delta_2u_k$ ,  $\forall k < p$ . Similarly one gets  $0 = d_2u_k$  $\delta_1 u_k$ ,  $\forall k > 0$ . Moreover, we have  $0 = \delta_2 u_p = \delta_1 u_0$  (tautologically), so in particular  $\delta_1 u_k = \delta_2 u_k = 0$ ,  $\forall k$ . From [\(3\)](#page-2-0) and [\(4](#page-2-0)) we see that  $u_1, \ldots, u_{p-1}$  are parallel forms on M, and  $u_0$  and  $u_p$  are pull-backs of Killing forms on  $M_2$  and  $M_1$  respectively. In other words, u can be written in the following form:

$$
u = u_{M_1} + u_{M_2} + \text{parallel form},
$$

where  $u_{M_1}$  and  $u_{M_2}$  are Killing forms on  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  respectively.

If p is strictly larger than m and n, then the argument above applied to the Hodge dual  $*u$  – which is again a twistor form on M by ([1\)](#page-1-0) – shows that u is equal to a sum

$$
u = u_{M_1} \wedge vol_{M_2} + u_{M_2} \wedge vol_{M_1} + \text{parallel form},
$$

where  $u_{M_1}$  and  $u_{M_2}$  are closed twistor forms on  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  and  $vol_{M_1}$  and  $vol_{M_2}$  denote the volume forms of  $M_1$  and  $M_2$  respectively.

It remains to treat the case where  $p$  is a number between  $m$  and  $n$ , and we suppose without loss of generality that  $m \leq p \leq n$ . Obviously  $u_{m+1} = \ldots = u_p = 0$ . Now, for every  $k \leq m-1$ , we obtain as before, using (7) and integrating over M, that  $0 = d_1u_k = \delta_2u_k, \ \forall k \leq m-1$  and similarly,  $0 = d_2u_k = \delta_1u_k, \ \ 1 \leq k \leq m$ . As before, [\(3](#page-2-0)) and ([4\)](#page-2-0) show that  $u_1, \ldots, u_{m-1}$  are parallel forms on M,  $u_0$  is the pull-back of a Killing form on  $M_2$ , and  $u_m$  can be written as  $vol_{M_1} \wedge u_{M_2}$ , where  $u_{M_2}$  is a closed twistor form on  $M_2$ . This proves the theorem.

As an application of this result, we have the following:

Corollary 2.2. Let  $(M^n, g)$  be a compact simply connected Riemannian manifold. If M carries a conformal vector field which is not Killing, then  $Hol(M) = SO_n$ .

*Proof.* Assume first that  $(M, g) = (M_1, g_1) \times (M_2, g_2)$  is a Riemannian product with  $\dim(M_1)$ ,  $\dim(M_2) > 1$ . Then, taking into account that the isomorphism between 1-forms and vector fields defined by the Riemannian metric maps twistor forms to <span id="page-4-0"></span>conformal vector fields and Killing forms to Killing vector fields, Theorem [2.1](#page-2-0) implies that every conformal vector field on  $M$  is a Killing vector field. Thus  $M$  is irreducible.

Assume next that  $Hol(M) \neq SO_n$ . From the Berger-Simons holonomy theorem, M is either an irreducible symmetric space (in particular Einstein), or its holonomy group is  $U_m$ ,  $SU_m$ ,  $Sp_k$ ,  $Sp_k$ ,  $Sp_1$ ,  $G_2$  or  $Spin_7$ . In the first 3 cases the manifold is Kähler and in the last 3 it is Einstein. Now, a classical result by Obata states that a conformal vector field on a compact manifold  $M$  is already a Killing vector field if  $M$  is Kähler or if  $M$ is Einstein and not isometric to the round sphere.

The only possibility left is therefore  $Hol(M) = SO_n$ .
