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# ASYMPTOTIC ESTIMATE FOR PERTURBED SCALAR CURVATURE EQUATION.

#### Abstract

We consider the equation $\Delta u_{\epsilon}=V_{\epsilon} u_{\epsilon}{ }^{(n+2) /(n-2)}+\epsilon W_{\epsilon} u_{\epsilon}{ }^{\alpha}$ with $\left.\alpha \in\right] \frac{n}{n-2}, \frac{n+2}{n-2}[$ and we give some minimal conditions on $\nabla V$ and $\nabla W$ to have an uniform estimate for their solutions when $\epsilon \rightarrow 0$.


## 1. INTRODUCTION AND RESULTS.

We denote $\Delta=-\sum_{i} \partial_{i i}$ the geometric Laplacian on $\mathbb{R}^{n}, n \geq 3$.
Let us consider on open set $\Omega$ of $\mathbb{R}^{n}, n \geq 3$, the following equation:

\Delta u_{\epsilon}=V_{\epsilon} u_{\epsilon}^{(n+2) /(n-2)}+\epsilon W_{\epsilon} u_{\epsilon}^{\alpha}
$$

where $V_{\epsilon}$ and $W_{\epsilon}$ are two regular functions and $\left.\alpha \in\right] \frac{n}{n-2}, \frac{n+2}{n-2}[$.
We assume:

$$
\begin{align*}
& 0<a \leq V_{\epsilon}(x) \leq b,\left\|\nabla V_{\epsilon}\right\|_{L^{\infty}} \leq A \\
& 0<c \leq W_{\epsilon}(x) \leq d,\left\|\nabla W_{\epsilon}\right\|_{L^{\infty}} \leq B \tag{2}
\end{align*}
$$

Problem: Can we have an sup $\times \inf$ estimate with the minimal conditions $\left(C_{1}\right)$ and $\left(C_{2}\right)$ ?
Note that for $W \equiv 0$, the equation $\left(E_{\epsilon}\right)$ is the wellknowen scalar curvature equation on open set of $\mathbb{R}^{n}, n \geq 3$. In this case, there is many results about this equation, see for example $[\mathrm{B}]$ and [C-L 1].

When $\Omega=\mathbb{S}_{n} \mathrm{YY}$. Li, give a flatness condition to have the boundedness of the energy and the existence of the simple blow-up points, see [L1] and [L2].

In [C-L 2], Chen and Lin gave a conterexample of solutions of the scalar curvature equation with unbounded energy. The conditions of Li are minimal in heigh dimension.

Note that, in [C-L 1] and [C-L 3], there is some results concerning Harnack inequalities of type sup $\times \inf$ with the "Li-flatness" conditions for the following equation:

\Delta u=V u^{(n+2) /(n-2)}+g(u)
$$

where $g$ is a regular function ( at least $C^{1}$ ) such that $g(t) /\left[t^{(n+2) /(n-2)}\right]$ is deacrising and tends to 0 when $t \rightarrow+\infty$. They extend Li result ([L1]) to any open set of the euclidian space.

We can find in [A], some existence results for the presribed scalar curvature equation.
In our work we have no assumption on the energy. We use the blow-up analysis and the moving-plane method, developped by Gidas-Ni-Nirenberg, see [G-N-N]. This method was used by different authors to have a priori estimates, look for example, $[\mathrm{B}],[\mathrm{B}-\mathrm{L}-\mathrm{S}]$ ( in dimension 2 ), [C-L 1], [C-L 3], [L 1] and [L 2].

We set $\delta=[(n+2)-\alpha(n-2)] / 2, \delta \in] 0,1[$. We have:

Theorem 1. For all $a, b, c, d, A, B>0$, for all $\alpha \in] \frac{n}{n-2}, \frac{n+2}{n-2}[$ and all compact set $K$ of $\Omega$, there is a positive constant $c=c(a, b, c, d, A, B, \alpha, K, \Omega, n)$ such that:

\epsilon^{(n-2) / 2(1-\delta)}\left(\sup _{K} u_{\epsilon}\right)^{1 / 3} \times \inf _{\Omega} u_{\epsilon} \leq c
$$

for all $u_{\epsilon}$ solution of $\left(E_{\epsilon}\right)$ with $V_{\epsilon}$ and $W_{\epsilon}$ satisfying the conditions $\left(C_{1}\right)$ and $\left(C_{2}\right)$.
Now, we suppose that $V_{\epsilon}$ satisfies:

0<a \leq V_{\epsilon}(x) \leq b \text { and }\left\|\nabla V_{\epsilon}\right\|_{L^{\infty}(\Omega)} \leq k \epsilon
$$

We have:
Theorem 2. For all $a, b, c, d, k, B>0$, for all $\alpha \in] \frac{n}{n-2}, \frac{n+2}{n-2}[$ and all compact set $K$ of $\Omega$, there is a positive constant $c=c(a, b, c, d, k, B, \alpha, K, \Omega, n)$ such that:

\sup _{K} u_{\epsilon} \times \inf _{\Omega} u_{\epsilon} \leq c
$$

for all $u_{\epsilon}$ solution of $\left(E_{\epsilon}\right)$ with $V_{\epsilon}$ and $W_{\epsilon}$ satisfying the conditions $\left(C_{3}\right)$ and $\left(C_{2}\right)$.
Note that in [B], we have some results as the previous but for prescribed scalar curvature equation with subcritical exponent tending to the critical. Here, we have a $\sup \times \inf$ inequality for the scalar curvature equation, with critical exponent, perturbed by a nonlinear term. We can see the influence of this non-linear term.

## 2. PROOFS OF THE THEOREMS.

## Proof of the theorem 1.

Without loss of generality, we suppose $\Omega=B_{1}$ the unit ball of $\mathbb{R}^{n}$. We want to prove an a priori estimate around 0 . We can also suppose $\epsilon \rightarrow 0$, the case $\epsilon \nrightarrow 0$ is solved in [B].

Let $\left(u_{i}\right)$ and $\left(V_{i}\right)$ be a sequences of functions on $\Omega$ such that:

\Delta u_{i}=V_{i} u_{i}^{(n+2) /(n-2)}+\epsilon_{i} W_{i} u_{i}^{\alpha}, u_{i}>0
$$

with $0<a \leq V_{i}(x) \leq b, 0<a \leq W_{i}(x) \leq d,\left\|V_{i}\right\|_{L^{\infty}} \leq A$ and $\left\|W_{i}\right\|_{L^{\infty}} \leq B$.
We argue by contradiction and we suppose that the $\sup \times$ inf is not bounded.
We have:
$\forall c, R>0 \exists u_{c, R}$ solution of $\left(E_{1}\right)$ such that:

\epsilon^{(n-2) / 2(1-\delta)} R^{n-2}\left(\sup _{B(0, R)} u_{\epsilon, c, R}\right)^{1 / 3} \times \inf _{\Omega} u_{\epsilon, c, R} \geq c \tag{H}
\end{equation*}

Proposition:(blow-up analysis)
There is a sequence of points $\left(y_{i}\right)_{i}, y_{i} \rightarrow 0$ and two sequences of positive real numbers $\left(l_{i}\right)_{i},\left(L_{i}\right)_{i}, l_{i} \rightarrow 0, L_{i} \rightarrow+\infty$, such that if we set $v_{i}(y)=\frac{u_{i}\left(y+y_{i}\right)}{u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)}$, we have:

0<v_{i}(y) \leq \beta_{i} \leq 2^{(n-2) / 2}, \beta_{i} \rightarrow 1 \\
v_{i}(y) \rightarrow\left(\frac{1}{1+|y|^{2}}\right)^{(n-2) / 2}, \text { uniformly on all compact set of } \mathbb{R}^{n} . \\
l_{i}^{(n-2) / 2} \epsilon_{i}^{(n-2) / 2(1-\delta)}\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{1 / 3} \times \inf _{B_{1}} u_{i} \rightarrow+\infty
\end{gathered}
$$

## Proof of the proposition:

We use the hypothesis $(H)$, we take two sequences $R_{i}>0, R_{i} \rightarrow 0$ and $c_{i} \rightarrow+\infty$, such that,

\epsilon_{i}^{(n-2) / 2(1-\delta)} R_{i}^{(n-2)}\left(\sup _{B\left(0, R_{i}\right)} u_{i}\right)^{1 / 3} \times \inf _{B_{1}} u_{i} \geq c_{i} \rightarrow+\infty
$$

Let $x_{i} \in B\left(x_{0}, R_{i}\right)$ be a point such that $\sup _{B\left(0, R_{i}\right)} u_{i}=u_{i}\left(x_{i}\right)$ and $s_{i}(x)=\left(R_{i}-\mid x-\right.$ $\left.x_{i} \mid\right)^{(n-2) / 2} u_{i}(x), x \in B\left(x_{i}, R_{i}\right)$. Then, $x_{i} \rightarrow 0$.

We have:

$$
\max _{B\left(x_{i}, R_{i}\right)} s_{i}(x)=s_{i}\left(y_{i}\right) \geq s_{i}\left(x_{i}\right)=R_{i}^{(n-2) / 2} u_{i}\left(x_{i}\right) \geq \sqrt{c_{i}} \rightarrow+\infty
$$

We set:

$$
l_{i}=R_{i}-\left|y_{i}-x_{i}\right|, \bar{u}_{i}(y)=u_{i}\left(y_{i}+y\right), v_{i}(z)=\frac{u_{i}\left[y_{i}+\left(z /\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{2 /(n-2)}\right)\right]}{u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)}
$$

Clearly we have, $y_{i} \rightarrow x_{0}$. We also obtain:

L_{i}=\frac{l_{i}}{\left(c_{i}\right)^{1 / 2(n-2)}}\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{2 /(n-2)}=\frac{\left[s_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{2 /(n-2)}}{c_{i}^{1 / 2(n-2)}} \geq \frac{c_{i}^{1 /(n-2)}}{c_{i}^{1 / 2(n-2)}}=c_{i}^{1 / 2(n-2)} \rightarrow+\infty
$$

If $|z| \leq L_{i}$, then $y=\left[y_{i}+z /\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{2 /(n-2)}\right] \in B\left(y_{i}, \delta_{i} l_{i}\right)$ with $\delta_{i}=\frac{1}{\left(c_{i}\right)^{1 / 2(n-2)}}$ and $\left|y-y_{i}\right|<R_{i}-\left|y_{i}-x_{i}\right|$, thus, $\left|y-x_{i}\right|<R_{i}$ and, $s_{i}(y) \leq s_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)$. We can write:

u_{i}(y)\left(R_{i}-\left|y-y_{i}\right|\right)^{(n-2) / 2} \leq u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\left(l_{i}\right)^{(n-2) / 2}
$$

But, $\left|y-y_{i}\right| \leq \delta_{i} l_{i}, R_{i}>l_{i}$ and $R_{i}-\left|y-y_{i}\right| \geq R_{i}-\delta_{i} l_{i}>l_{i}-\delta_{i} l_{i}=l_{i}\left(1-\delta_{i}\right)$. We obtain,

$$
0<v_{i}(z)=\frac{u_{i}(y)}{u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)} \leq\left[\frac{l_{i}}{l_{i}\left(1-\delta_{i}\right)}\right]^{(n-2) / 2} \leq 2^{(n-2) / 2}
$$

We set, $\beta_{i}=\left(\frac{1}{1-\delta_{i}}\right)^{(n-2) / 2}$, clearly, we have, $\beta_{i} \rightarrow 1$.
The function $v_{i}$ satisfies:

$$
\Delta v_{i}=\tilde{V}_{i} v_{i}^{(n+2) /(n-2)}+\epsilon_{i} \tilde{W}_{i} \frac{v_{i}^{n /(n-2)}}{\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{[(n+2) /(n-2)]-\alpha}}
$$

where, $\tilde{V}_{i}(y)=V_{i}\left[y+y /\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{2 /(n-2)}\right]$ and $\tilde{W}_{i}(y)=W_{i}\left[y+y /\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{2 /(n-2)}\right]$.
Without loss of generality, we can suppose that $\tilde{V}_{i} \rightarrow V(0)=n(n-2)$.
We use the elliptic estimates, Ascoli and Ladyzenskaya theorems to have the uniform convergence of $\left(v_{i}\right)$ to $v$ on compact set of $\mathbb{R}^{n}$. The function $v$ satisfies:

$$
\Delta v=n(n-2) v^{N-1}, v(0)=1,0 \leq v \leq 1 \leq 2^{(n-2) / 2}
$$

By the maximum principle, we have $v>0$ on $\mathbb{R}^{n}$. If we use Caffarelli-Gidas-Spruck result, ( see [C-G-S]), we obtain, $v(y)=\left(\frac{1}{1+|y|^{2}}\right)^{(n-2) / 2}$. We have the same properties that in [B].

## Polar Coordinates (Moving-Plane method)

Now, we must use the same method than in the Theorem 1 of [B]. We will use the movingplane method.

We must prove the lemma 2 of $[B]$.
We set $t \in]-\infty,-\log 2]$ and $\theta \in \mathbb{S}_{n-1}$ :
$w_{i}(t, \theta)=e^{(n-2) t / 2} u_{i}\left(y_{i}+e^{t} \theta\right), \bar{V}_{i}(t, \theta)=V_{i}\left(y_{i}+e^{t} \theta\right)$ and $\bar{W}_{i}(t, \theta)=W_{i}\left(y_{i}+e^{t} \theta\right)$.
We consider the following operator $L=\partial_{t t}-\Delta_{\sigma}-\frac{(n-2)^{2}}{4}$, with $\Delta_{\sigma}$ the Laplace-Baltrami operator on $\mathbb{S}_{n-1}$.

The function $w_{i}$ is solution of:

$$
-L w_{i}=\bar{V}_{i} w_{i}^{N-1}+\epsilon_{i} e^{[(n+2)-(n-2) \alpha] t / 2} \bar{W}_{i} w_{i}^{\alpha} .
$$

For $\lambda \leq 0$ we set :

$$
t^{\lambda}=2 \lambda-t w_{i}^{\lambda}(t, \theta)=w_{i}\left(t^{\lambda}, \theta\right), \bar{V}_{i}^{\lambda}(t, \theta)=\bar{V}_{i}\left(t^{\lambda}, \theta\right) \text { et } \bar{W}_{i}^{\lambda}(t, \theta)=\bar{W}_{i}\left(t^{\lambda}, \theta\right) .
$$

Remark: Here we work on $\left[\lambda, t_{i}\right] \times \mathbb{S}_{n-1}$, with $\lambda \leq-\frac{2}{n-2} \log u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)+2$ and $t_{i} \leq \log \sqrt{l_{i}}$, where $l_{i}$ is chooses as in the proposition.

First, like in [B], we have the following lemma:

## Lemma 1:

Let $A_{\lambda}$ be the following property:
$\left.\left.A_{\lambda}=\left\{\lambda \leq 0, \exists\left(t_{\lambda}, \theta_{\lambda}\right) \in\right] \lambda, t_{i}\right] \times \mathbb{S}_{n-1}, \bar{w}_{i}^{\lambda}\left(t_{\lambda}, \theta_{\lambda}\right)-\bar{w}_{i}\left(t_{\lambda}, \theta_{\lambda}\right) \geq 0\right\}$.
Then, there is $\nu \leq 0$, such that for $\lambda \leq \nu, A_{\lambda}$ is not true.
Like in the proof of the Theorem 1 of [B], we want to prove the following lemma:

## Lemma 2:

For $\lambda \leq 0$ we have :

w_{i}^{\lambda}-w_{i} \leq 0 \Rightarrow-L\left(w_{i}^{\lambda}-w_{i}\right) \leq 0,
$$

on $\left.] \lambda, t_{i}\right] \times \mathbb{S}_{n-1}$.
Like in [B], we have:

## A useful point:

$\xi_{i}=\sup \left\{\lambda \leq \bar{\lambda}_{i}=2+\log \eta_{i}, w_{i}^{\lambda}-w_{i}<0\right.$, on $\left.\left.] \lambda, t_{i}\right] \times \mathbb{S}_{n-1}\right\}$. The real $\xi_{i}$ exists.
First, we have:

$$
w_{i}\left(2 \xi_{i}-t, \theta\right)=w_{i}\left[\left(\xi_{i}-t+\xi_{i}-\log \eta_{i}-2\right)+\left(\log \eta_{i}+2\right)\right]
$$

the definition of $w_{i}$ and the fact that, $\xi_{i} \leq t$, we obtain:
$w_{i}\left(2 \xi_{i}-t, \theta\right)=e^{\left[(n-2)\left(\xi_{i}-t+\xi_{i}-\log \eta_{i}-2\right)\right] / 2} e^{n-2} v_{i}\left[\theta e^{2} e^{\left(\xi_{i}-t\right)+\left(\xi_{i}-\log \eta_{i}-2\right)}\right] \leq 2^{(n-2) / 2} e^{n-2}=\bar{c}$.

## Proof of the Lemma 2:

We know that:

-L\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-w_{i}\right)=\left[\bar{V}_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{N-1}-\bar{V}_{i} w_{i}^{N-1}\right]+\epsilon_{i}\left[e^{\delta t} t_{i}^{\xi_{i}} \bar{W}_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha}-e^{\delta t} \bar{W}_{i} w_{i}^{\alpha}\right]
$$

with $\delta=[(n+2)-(n-2) \alpha] / 2$.
We denote by $Z_{1}$ and $Z_{2}$ the following terms:

Z_{1}=\left(\bar{V}_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-\bar{V}_{i}\right)\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{N-1}+\bar{V}_{i}\left[\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{N-1}-w_{i}^{N-1}\right]
$$

and

$$
Z_{2}=\epsilon_{i}\left(\bar{W}_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-\bar{W}_{i}\right)\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha} e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}}+\epsilon_{i} e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}} \bar{W}_{i}\left[\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha}-w_{i}^{\alpha}\right]+\epsilon_{i} \bar{W}_{i} w_{i}^{\alpha}\left(e^{\delta t \xi_{i}}-e^{\delta t}\right) .
$$

But, using the same method as in the proof of the theorem 1 of [B], we have:

w_{i}^{\xi_{i}} \leq w_{i} \text { et } w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}(t, \theta) \leq \bar{c} \text { pour tout }(t, \theta) \in\left[\xi_{i}, \log 2\right] \times \mathbb{S}_{n-1},
$$

where $\bar{c}$ is a positive constantnot depending on $i$ for $\xi_{i} \leq \log \eta_{i}+2$;

$$
\left|\bar{V}_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-\bar{V}_{i}\right| \leq A\left(e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}\right) \text { et }\left|\bar{W}_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-\bar{W}_{i}\right| \leq B\left(e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}\right),
$$

Then,
$Z_{1} \leq A\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{N-1}\left(e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}\right)$ et $Z_{2} \leq \epsilon_{i} B\left(\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha}\left(e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}\right)+\epsilon_{i} c\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha} \times\left(e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}}-e^{\delta t}\right)\right.$.
and,
$-L\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-w_{i}\right) \leq\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha}\left[\left(A w_{i}^{\xi_{i} N-1-\alpha}+\epsilon_{i} B\right)\left(e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}\right)+\epsilon_{i} c\left(e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}}-e^{\delta t}\right)\right]$.
But, $w_{i}^{\xi_{i}} \leq \bar{c}$, we obtain:
$-L\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-w_{i}\right) \leq\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha}\left[\left(A \bar{c}^{N-1-\alpha}+\epsilon_{i} B\right)\left(e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}\right)+\epsilon_{i} c\left(e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}}-e^{\delta t}\right)\right]$.
We must see the sign of:
$\bar{Z}=\left[\left(A \bar{c}^{N-1-\alpha}+\epsilon_{i} B\right)\left(e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}\right)+\epsilon_{i} c\left(e^{\delta t} t^{\xi_{i}}-e^{\delta t}\right)\right]$.
But $\alpha \in] \frac{n}{n-2}, \frac{n+2}{n-2}\left[, \delta=\frac{n+2-(n-2) \alpha}{2} \in\right] 0,1[$.
For $t \leq t_{i}<0$, we have:

$$
e^{t} \leq e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}} e^{\delta t}, \text { for all } t \leq t_{i}
$$

and the fact that $t^{\xi_{i}} \leq t\left(\xi_{i} \leq t\right)$, by integration of the previous two members, we obtain:

$$
e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}} \leq \frac{e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}}}{\delta}\left(e^{\delta t}-e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}}\right), \text { for all } t \leq t_{i}
$$

We can write:

$$
\left(e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}}-e^{\delta t}\right) \leq \frac{\delta}{e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}}}\left(e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}-e^{t}\right)
$$

Then,

-L\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-w_{i}\right) \leq\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha}\left[-\frac{\epsilon_{i} \delta c}{e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}}}+A \bar{c}^{N-1-\alpha}+\epsilon_{i} B\right]\left(e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}\right)
$$

The term $\frac{\epsilon_{i} \delta c}{e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}}}-A \bar{c}^{N-1-\alpha}-\epsilon_{i} B$ is positive if:

\epsilon_{i} e^{-(1-\delta) t_{i}} \rightarrow+\infty
$$

then,

$$
\epsilon_{i}^{(n-2) / 2(1-\delta)} e^{-(n-2) / 2 t_{i}} \rightarrow+\infty .
$$

If we take, $t_{i}=-\frac{2}{3(n-2)} \log u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)$, we have:

$$
\epsilon_{i}^{(n-2) / 2(1-\delta)}\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{1 / 3} \rightarrow+\infty
$$

It is given by our Hypothesis in the proposition.
But the Hopf Maximum principle, gives:

\min _{\theta \in \mathbb{S}_{n-1}} w_{i}\left(t_{i}, \theta\right) \leq \max _{\theta \in \mathbb{S}_{n-1}} w_{i}\left(2 \xi_{i}-t_{i}, \theta\right)
$$

then,

e^{(n-2) t_{i}} u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right) \min _{B_{2}(0)} u_{i} \leq c,
$$

and,

$$
\left[u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)\right]^{1 / 3} \min _{B_{2}(0)} u_{i} \leq c,
$$

Contradiction.

## Proof of the Theorem 2.

The proof is similar than the proof of the theorem 1. Only the end of the proof is different.
Step 1: The blow-up analysis give:
There is a sequence of points $\left(y_{i}\right)_{i}, y_{i} \rightarrow 0$ and two sequences of positive real numbers $\left(l_{i}\right)_{i},\left(L_{i}\right)_{i}, l_{i} \rightarrow 0, L_{i} \rightarrow+\infty$, such that if we set $v_{i}(y)=\frac{u_{i}\left(y+y_{i}\right)}{u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right)}$, we have:

$$
\begin{gathered}
0<v_{i}(y) \leq \beta_{i} \leq 2^{(n-2) / 2}, \beta_{i} \rightarrow 1 \\
v_{i}(y) \rightarrow\left(\frac{1}{1+|y|^{2}}\right)^{(n-2) / 2}, \text { uniformly on all compact set of } \mathbb{R}^{n} . \\
l_{i}^{(n-2) / 2} u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right) \times \inf _{B_{1}} u_{i} \rightarrow+\infty
\end{gathered}
$$

Step 2: Application of the Hopf maximum principle.
We have the same notation that in the proof of the theorem 1. First, we take $t_{i}=\sqrt{l_{i}}$ as in the Step 1 and we look to the end of the proof of the theorem 1 . We replace $A$ by $k \epsilon_{i}$. We want to proof that:

$$
w_{i}^{\lambda}-w_{i} \leq 0 \Rightarrow-L\left(w_{i}^{\lambda}-w_{i}\right) \leq 0,
$$

on $\left.] \xi_{i}, t_{i}\right] \times \mathbb{S}_{n-1}$. We have the same defintion for $\xi_{i}$ ( as in the proof of the theorem 1 ).
For $t \leq t_{i}<0$, we have:

$$
e^{t} \leq e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}} e^{\delta t}, \text { for all } t \leq t_{i}
$$

and the fact that $t^{\xi_{i}} \leq t\left(\xi_{i} \leq t\right)$, by integration of the previous two members, we obtain:

$$
e^{t}-e^{t^{\xi_{i}}} \leq \frac{e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}}}{\delta}\left(e^{\delta t}-e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}}\right), \text { for all } t \leq t_{i}
$$

We can write:

$$
\left(e^{\delta t^{\xi_{i}}}-e^{\delta t}\right) \leq \frac{\delta}{e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}}}\left(e^{t^{\xi_{i}}}-e^{t}\right)
$$

Then,

$$
-L\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}-w_{i}\right) \leq\left(w_{i}^{\xi_{i}}\right)^{\alpha}\left[-\frac{\epsilon_{i} \delta c}{e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}}}+k \epsilon_{i} \bar{c}^{N-1-\alpha}+\epsilon_{i} B\right]\left(e^{t}-e^{t_{i}}\right)
$$

The term $\frac{\delta c}{e^{(1-\delta) t_{i}}}-k \bar{c}^{N-1-\alpha}-B$ is positive because $t_{i} \rightarrow-\infty$ and $\left.\delta \in\right] 0,1[$.
But the Hopf Maximum principle, gives:

$$
\min _{\theta \in \mathbb{S}_{n-1}} w_{i}\left(t_{i}, \theta\right) \leq \max _{\theta \in \mathbb{S}_{n-1}} w_{i}\left(2 \xi_{i}-t_{i}, \theta\right)
$$

then,

$$
e^{(n-2) t_{i}} u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right) \min _{B_{2}(0)} u_{i} \leq c,
$$

and,

$$
l_{i}^{(n-2) / 2} u_{i}\left(y_{i}\right) \min _{B_{2}(0)} u_{i} \leq c
$$

Contradiction with the step 1.

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
