# Remark on the Kato smoothing effect for Schrödinger equation with superquadratic potentials 

Luc Robbiano and Claude Zuily

## Résumé

The aim of this note is to extend recent results of Yajima-Zhang [Y-Z1, Y-Z2] on the $\frac{1}{2}$ - smoothing effect for Schrödinger equation with potential growing at infinity faster than quadratically.

## 1 Introduction

The aim of this note is to extend a recent result by Yajima-Zhang [Y-Z1, Y-Z2]. In this paper these authors considered the Hamiltonian $H=-\Delta+V(x)$ where $V$ is a real and $C^{\infty}$ potential on $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ satisfying for some $m>2$ and $\langle x\rangle=\left(1+|x|^{2}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}$,

\begin{align*}
& \left|\partial^{\alpha} V(x)\right| \leq C_{\alpha}\langle x\rangle^{m-|\alpha|}, \quad x \in \mathbb{R}^{n}, \quad \alpha \in \mathbb{N}^{n}  \tag{1.1}\\
& \text { for large }|x|, \quad V(x) \geq C_{1}|x|^{m}, \quad C_{1}>0 \tag{1.2}
\end{align*}
$$

and they proved the following. For any $T>0$ and $\chi \in C_{0}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ one can find $C>0$ such that for all $u_{0}$ in $L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$,

\begin{equation*}
\int_{0}^{T}\left\|\chi(I-\Delta)^{\frac{1}{2 m}} e^{-i t H} u_{0}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)}^{2} d t \leq C\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)}^{2} \tag{1.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\Delta$ is the flat Laplacian. In this note, using the ideas contained in Doï [D3] we shall show that one can handle variable coefficients Laplacian with time dependent potentials, one can remove the condition (1.2), one can replace the cut-off function $\chi$ in (1.3) by $\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1+\nu}{2}}$ with any $\nu>0$ and finally that the weight $\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1}{2}}$ is enough for the tangential derivatives. When $V=0$ the estimate (1.3) goes back to Constantin-Saut [C-S], Sjölin [S], Vega [V], Yajima $[\mathrm{Y}]$ who extended to the Schrödinger equation a phenomenon discovered by T. Kato $[\mathrm{K}]$ on the KdV equation. Later on their results where extended to the variable coefficients operators by Doï in a series of papers [D1, D2, D3, D4] which contained the case $m=2$ of Theorem 1.1 below.

Let us describe more precisely our result. It will be convenient to introduce the Hörmander's metric

\end{equation*}

to which we associate the usual class of symbols $S(M, g)$ if $M$ is a weight. Recall that $q \in S(M, g)$ iff $q \in C^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right)$ and

\forall \alpha, \beta \in \mathbb{N}^{n} \exists C_{\alpha \beta}>0,\left|\partial_{x}^{\beta} \partial_{\xi}^{\alpha} q(x, \xi)\right| \leqq C_{\alpha \beta} M(x, \xi)\langle x\rangle^{-|\beta|}\langle\xi\rangle^{-|\alpha|}, \forall(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)
$$

If $T>0$ we shall set

S_{T}(M, g)=L^{\infty}([0, T], S(M, g)) \tag{1.5}
\end{equation*}

We shall consider here an operator $P$ of the form

P=\sum_{j, k=1}^{n}\left(D_{j}-a_{j}(t, x)\right) g^{j k}(x)\left(D_{k}-a_{k}(t, x)\right)+V(t, x) \tag{1.6}
\end{equation*}

and we shall denote by $p$ the principal symbol of $P$, namely

\end{equation*}

We shall make the following structure and geometrical assumptions.
Structure assumptions. We shall assume the following,

\text { (i) the coefficients } a_{j}, g^{j k}, V \text { are real valued for } j, k=1, \ldots, n, \\
\text { (ii) } p \in S\left(\langle\xi\rangle^{2}, g\right) \text { and } \nabla g^{j k}(x)=o\left(|x|^{-1}\right),|x| \rightarrow+\infty 1 \leqq j, k \leqq, n  \tag{1.9}\\
(i i i) a_{j} \in S_{T}\left(\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}, g\right), 1 \leqq j \leqq n, V \in S_{T}\left(\langle x\rangle^{m}, g\right) m \geqq 2 \\
\exists \delta>0, p(x, \xi) \geqq \delta|\xi|^{2}, \quad \forall(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right) .
\end{array}\right.
$$

(1.10) For any fixed t in $[0, T]$ the operator $P$ is essentially self adjoint on $L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$

Geometrical assumptions. Let $\phi_{t}$ be the bicharacteristic flow of $p$. It is easy to see that under the conditions (1.8), (1.9) it is defined for all $t \in \mathbb{R}$. Let us set $S^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)=\left\{(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)\right.$ : $p(x, \xi)=1\}$. Then we shall assume that,
$\forall K$ compact $\subseteq S^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right) \exists t_{K}>0$ such that $\Phi_{t}(K) \cap K=\emptyset, \quad \forall t \geq t_{K}$.
This is the so-called "non trapping condition" which is equivalent to the fact that if $\Phi_{t}(x ; \xi)=$ $\left(x(t),(\xi(t))\right.$ then $\lim _{t \rightarrow+\infty}|x(t)|=+\infty$.

We shall consider $u \in C^{1}\left([0, T], \mathcal{S}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)\right)$ and we set

f(t)=\left(D_{t}+P\right) u(t) \tag{1.12}
\end{equation*}
$$

For $s \in \mathbb{R}$ let $e_{s}(x, \xi)=\left(1+|\xi|^{2}+|x|^{m}\right)^{\frac{s}{2}}$ and $E_{s}$ be the Weyl quantized pseudo-differential operator with symbol $e_{s}$.
Our first result is the following.

Theorem 1.1 Let $T>0$. Let $P$ be defined by (1.6) which satisfies (1.8), (1.9), (1.10),(1.11). Then for any $\nu>0$ one can find $C=C(\nu, T)>0$ such that for any $u \in C^{1}\left([0, T], \mathcal{S}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)\right)$ and all $t$ in $[0, T]$ we have,

\|u(t)\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+\int_{0}^{T}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1+\nu}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} u(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} d t \leqq C\left(\|u(0)\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+\int_{0}^{T}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{\frac{1+\nu}{2}} E_{-\frac{1}{m}} f(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} d t\right)
$$

Here $L^{2}=L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ and $f(t)$ is defined by (1.12).
Now even when $P$ is the flat Laplacian it is known that the estimate in the above Theorem does not hold with $\nu=0$. However we have the following result. Let us set

\ell_{j k}=\frac{x_{j} \xi_{k}-x_{k} \xi_{j}}{\langle x\rangle\langle\xi\rangle}, \quad 1 \leqq j, k \leqq n \tag{1.13}
\end{equation*}

and let us denote by $\ell_{j k}^{w}$ its Weyl quantization.
Theorem 1.2 Let $T>0$. Let $P$ be defined by (1.6) with real coefficients satisfying (1.9), (1.10),(1.11) and

\left\{\begin{array}{l}
(i) g_{j k}=\delta_{j k}+b_{j k}, b_{j k} \in S\left(\langle x\rangle^{-\sigma_{0}}, g\right), \text { for some } \sigma_{0}>0  \tag{1.14}\\
(i i) a_{j} \in S_{T}\left(\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}, g\right), V \in S_{T}\left(\langle x\rangle^{m}, g\right) .
\end{array}\right.
$$

Then for any $\nu>0$ one can find $C=C(\nu, T)$ such that for any $u \in C^{1}\left([0, T], \mathcal{S}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)\right)$ and $f(t)=\left(D_{t}+P\right) u(t)$ we have

$$
\sum_{j, k=1}^{n} \int_{0}^{T}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} \ell_{j k}^{w} u(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} d t \leqq C\left(\|u(0)\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+\int_{0}^{T}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{\frac{1+\nu}{2}} E_{-\frac{1}{m}} f(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} d t\right)
$$

Here are some remarks and examples.
Remark 1.3 1) We know that one can find $\psi \in C_{0}^{\infty}(|x|<1)$ and $\phi \in C_{0}^{\infty}\left(\frac{1}{2} \leqq|x| \leqq 2\right)$ positive such that $\psi(x)+\sum_{j=0}^{+\infty} \phi\left(2^{-j} x\right)=1$, for all $x$ in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$. Let $V=|x|^{m} \sum_{j \text { even }} \phi\left(2^{-j} x\right)-$ $|x|^{2} \sum_{j \text { odd }} \phi\left(2^{-j} x\right)$. Then $V \in S\left(\langle x\rangle^{m}, g\right)$ and since $V \geqq-|x|^{2}$ the operator $P=-\Delta+V$ is essentially self adjoint on $C_{0}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$. It follows that (1.9), (1.10), (1.11) and (1.14) are satisfied, therefore Theorem 1.1 and 1.2 apply. However the lower bound (1.2) assumed in [Y-Z2] is not satisfied.
2) Assume that $p(x, \xi)=|\xi|^{2}+\varepsilon \sum_{j, k=1}^{n} b_{j k}(x) \xi_{j} \xi_{k}$ with $b_{j k} \in S\left(\langle x\rangle^{-\sigma_{0}}, g\right)$ for some $\sigma_{0}>0$.

Then if $\varepsilon$ is small enough the non trapping condition (1.11) is satisfied.

## 2 Proofs of the results

Let us consider the symbol $a_{0}(x, \xi)=\frac{x \cdot \xi}{\langle\xi\rangle}$. A straightforward computation shows that under condition (1.8) (ii) one can find $C_{0}, C_{1}, R$ positive such that

H_{p} a_{0}(x, \xi) \geqq C_{0}|\xi|-C_{1}, \text { if }(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right) \text { and }|x| \geqq R . \tag{2.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $H_{p}$ denotes the Hamiltonian field of the symbol $p$.
Then we have the following result due to Doï [D3].
Lemma 2.1 Assume moreover that (1.11) is satisfied then there exist $a \in S(\langle x\rangle, g)$ and positive constants $C_{2}, C_{3}$ such that
(i) $H_{p} a(x, \xi) \geqq C_{2}|\xi|-C_{3}, \quad \forall(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$,
(ii) $a(x, \xi)=a_{0}(x, \xi)$, if $|x|$ is large enough.

The symbol $a$ is called a global escape function for $p$. Here is the form of this symbol. Let $\chi \in C_{0}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ be such that $\chi(x)=1$ if $|x| \leqq 1, \chi(x)=0$ if $|x| \geqq 2$ and $0 \leqq \chi \leqq 1$. With $R$ large enough and $M \geqq 2 R$ we have,

a(x, \xi)=a_{0}(x, \xi)+M^{\frac{1}{2}} \chi\left(\frac{x}{M}\right) a_{1}\left(x, \frac{\xi}{\sqrt{p(x, \xi)}}\right)(1-\theta(\sqrt{p(x, \xi)})
$$

where

$$
a_{1}(x, \xi)=-\int_{0}^{+\infty} \chi\left(\frac{1}{R} \pi\left(\Phi_{t}(x, \xi)\right) d t\right.
$$

and $\pi\left(\Phi_{t}(x, \xi)\right)=x(t ; x, \xi), \theta(t)=1$ if $0 \leqq t \leqq 1, \theta(t)=0$ if $t \geqq 2,0 \leqq \theta \leqq 1$. Details can be found in [D3].
Proof of Theorem 1.1
Let $\psi \in C^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ be such that $\operatorname{supp} \psi \in[\varepsilon,+\infty[, \psi(t)=1$ in $[2 \varepsilon,+\infty[$ (where $\varepsilon>0$ is a small constant chosen later on) and $\psi^{\prime}(t) \geqq 0$ for $t \in \mathbb{R}$. Following Doï [D3] we set,

\psi_{0}(t)=1-\psi(t)-\psi(-t)=1-\psi(|t|)  \tag{2.2}\\
\psi_{1}(t)=\psi(-t)-\psi(t)=-\operatorname{sgn} t \psi(|t|)
\end{array}\right.
$$

Then $\psi_{j} \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{R})$, for $j=0,1$ and we have

$$
\begin{equation*}
\psi_{0}^{\prime}(t)=-\operatorname{sgn} t \psi^{\prime}(|t|) \quad \text { and } \quad \psi_{1}^{\prime}(t)=-\psi^{\prime}(|t|) . \tag{2.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

Let $\chi \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{R})$ be such that $\chi(t)=1$ if $t \leqq \frac{1}{2}, \chi(t)=0$ if $t \geqq 1$ and $\chi(t) \in[0,1]$. With $a$ given by Lemma 2.1 we set

\theta(x, \xi)=\frac{a(x, \xi)}{\langle x\rangle}, \quad(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right),  \tag{2.4}\\
r(x, \xi)=\frac{\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}}{\sqrt{p(x, \xi)}}, \quad(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right) \backslash 0 .
\end{array}\right.
$$

Finally we set

-\lambda=\left(\frac{a}{\langle x\rangle} \psi_{0}(\theta)-\left(M_{0}-\langle a\rangle^{-\nu}\right) \psi_{1}(\theta)\right) p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}} \chi(r) \tag{2.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\nu>0$ is an arbitrary small constant and $M_{0}$ a large constant to be chosen.
The main step of the proof is the following Lemma.
Lemma 2.2 (i) One can find $M_{0}>0$ such that for any $\nu>0$ there exist positive constants $C, C^{\prime}$ such that

-H_{p} \lambda(x, \xi) \geqq C\langle x\rangle^{-1-\nu}\left(|\xi|^{2}+|x|^{m}\right)^{\frac{1}{m}}-C^{\prime}, \quad \forall(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right) \tag{2.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

(ii) $\lambda \in S(1, g)$,
(iii) $\left[P, \lambda^{w}\right]-\frac{1}{i}\left(H_{p} \lambda\right)^{w} \in O p^{w} S_{T}(1, g)$.

Proof
First of all on the support of $\chi(r)$ we have $\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}} \leqq \sqrt{p(x, \xi)} \leqq C|\xi|$. It follows that $|\xi| \sim\langle\xi\rangle$ and $|\xi| \leqq|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}} \leqq C^{\prime}|\xi|$. Now

-H_{p} \lambda=\sum_{j=1}^{6} A_{j} \tag{2.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

where the $A_{j}$ 's are defined below.

1) $A_{1}=\left(H_{p}\langle x\rangle^{-1}\right) p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}} a \psi_{0}(\theta) \chi(r)$. Since on the support of $\psi_{0}(\theta)$ we have $|a| \leqq 2 \varepsilon\langle x\rangle$, it is easy to see that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|A_{1}\right| \leqq C_{1} \varepsilon\langle x\rangle^{-1}|\xi|^{\frac{2}{m}}(1-\psi(|\theta|)) \chi(r) . \tag{2.8}
\end{equation*}
$$

2) $A_{2}=\langle x\rangle^{-1} p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}\left(H_{p} a\right) \psi_{0}(\theta) \chi(r)$. By Lemma 2.1 (i) we have

\begin{equation*}
A_{2} \geqq C_{2}\langle x\rangle^{-1}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}}(1-\psi(|\theta|)) \chi(r)-C_{2}^{\prime} \tag{2.9}
\end{equation*}
$$

3) $A_{3}=\langle x\rangle^{-1} p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}} a \psi_{0}^{\prime}(\theta)\left(H_{p} \theta\right) \chi(r)$. It follows from (2.3), (2.4) that

\begin{equation*}
A_{3}=-p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}|\theta|\left(H_{p} \theta\right) \psi^{\prime}(|\theta|) \chi(r) \tag{2.10}
\end{equation*}
$$

4) $A_{4}=p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}\left(H_{p}\langle a\rangle^{-\nu}\right) \psi_{1}(\theta) \chi(r)$. Here we have $H_{p}\langle a\rangle^{-\nu}=-\nu\langle a\rangle^{-2-\nu} a H_{p} a$. It follows from (2.2) that $A_{4}=\nu p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}|a|\langle a\rangle^{-2-\nu}\left(H_{p} a\right) \psi(|\theta|) \chi(r)$. Now on the support of $\psi(|\theta|)$ we have $\varepsilon\langle x\rangle \leq|a|$ and since $a \in S(\langle x\rangle, g)$ we have $|a| \leq C\langle x\rangle$. It follows from Lemma 2.1 (i) that

A_{4} \geq C_{3}\langle x\rangle^{-1-\nu}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}} \psi(|\theta|) \chi(r)-C_{3}^{\prime} \tag{2.11}
\end{equation*}
$$

5) $A_{5}=-p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}\left(M_{0}-\langle a\rangle^{-\nu}\right)\left(H_{p} \theta\right) \psi_{1}^{\prime}(\theta) \chi(r)$. It follows from (2.3) that

$$
\begin{equation*}
A_{5}=p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}\left(M_{0}-\langle a\rangle^{-\nu}\right)\left(H_{p} \theta\right) \psi^{\prime}(|\theta|) \chi(r) \tag{2.12}
\end{equation*}
$$

We deduce from (2.10) and (2.12) that

A_{3}+A_{5}=p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}\left(M_{0}-\langle a\rangle^{-\nu}-|\theta|\right)\left(H_{p} \theta\right) \psi^{\prime}(|\theta|) \chi(r)
$$

Now $H_{p} \theta=\langle x\rangle^{-1} H_{p} a+a H_{p}\langle x\rangle^{-1}$. Since $|a| \leq 2 \varepsilon|\theta|$ on the support of $\psi^{\prime}(|\theta|)$ we deduce that $H_{p} \theta \geq C_{4}\langle x\rangle^{-1}|\xi|-C_{5} \geq-C_{5}$. Taking $M_{0} \geq 2$ and using the facts that $\psi^{\prime} \geq 0, \chi \geq 0$ and $\varepsilon \leq|\theta| \leq 2 \varepsilon$ on the support of $\psi^{\prime}(|\theta|)$ we obtain

A_{3}+A_{5} \geq-C_{6} \tag{2.13}
\end{equation*}
$$

6) $A_{6}=\left(\langle x\rangle^{-1} a \psi_{0}(\theta)-\left(M_{0}-\langle a\rangle^{-\nu}\right) \psi_{1}(\theta)\right) p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}} H_{p}[\chi(r)]$. We have $H_{p}[\chi(r)]=\frac{1}{\sqrt{p}}\left(H_{p}\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right) \chi^{\prime}(r)$.

On the support of $\chi^{\prime}(r)$ we have $\langle x\rangle \sim|\xi|^{\frac{2}{m}}$; this implies that

p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}\left|H_{p}[\chi(r)]\right| \leq C|\xi|^{\frac{2}{m}-1} \frac{|\xi|\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}-1}}{|\xi|}\left|\chi^{\prime}(r)\right| \leq C_{7} .
$$

Therefore we obtain

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|A_{6}\right| \leq C_{8} . \tag{2.14}
\end{equation*}
$$

Gathering the estimates obtained in (2.8) to (2.14) we obtain

$$
\begin{equation*}
-H_{p} \lambda \geq C_{9}\langle x\rangle^{-1-\nu}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}} \chi(r)-C_{10} . \tag{2.15}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now on the support of $1-\chi(r)$ we have $|\xi| \leq C_{11}\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}$ so $\langle x\rangle^{-1-\nu}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}} \leq C_{12}$. Therefore writing $1=1-\chi+\chi$ and using (2.15) we obtain (2.6).
(ii) We use the symbolic calculus in the classes $S(M, g)$. We have $\langle x\rangle^{-1} \in S\left(\langle x\rangle^{-1}, g\right)$, $a \in S(\langle x\rangle, g), p \in S\left(\langle\xi\rangle^{2}, g\right)$ so $p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}} \in S\left(\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-1}, g\right)$ since $p \geq C>0$ on supp $\chi(r)$. Moreover $\chi(r) \in S(1, g)$ and on $\operatorname{supp} \chi(r)$ we have $\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}} \leq C|\xi|$. It follows that $\lambda \in S\left(\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-1}, g\right) \subset$ $S(1, g)$.
(iii) By the symbolic calculus $\{\lambda, V\} \in S_{T}\left(\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-1}\langle x\rangle^{m}\langle x\rangle^{-1}\langle\xi\rangle^{-1}, g\right)$. Since we have $\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}} \leq$ $C|\xi|$ on its support we will have $\langle x\rangle^{m-1}\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-2} \leq C|\xi|^{\frac{2}{m}(m-1)}\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-2} \leq C^{\prime}$. Therefore $\{\lambda, V\} \in$ $S_{T}(1, g)$. Now if $b \in S_{T}\left(\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}, g\right)$ we have $\left\{\lambda, b \xi_{j}\right\} \in S\left(\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-1}\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}|\xi|\langle x\rangle^{-1}\langle\xi\rangle^{-1}, g\right)$ and since $\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}} \leq C|\xi|$ we have $\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}-1}\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-1} \leq C|\xi|^{\frac{2}{m}\left(\frac{m}{2}-1\right)}\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-1} \leq C^{\prime}$ so $\left\{\lambda, b \xi_{j}\right\} \in S_{T}(1, g)$.

Finally $\left[\mathrm{Op}^{w}(p), \lambda^{w}\right]-\frac{1}{i}\left(H_{p} \lambda\right)^{w} \in S\left(\langle\xi\rangle^{2}\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-1}\langle x\rangle^{-2}\langle\xi\rangle^{-2}, g\right) \subset \mathrm{Op}^{w} S(1, g)$.
End of the proof of Theorem 1.1.
Since $\lambda \in S(1, g)$ we can set $M=1+\sup _{(x, \xi) \in \mathbb{R}^{2 n}}|\lambda(x, \xi)|$. Let us introduce $N(t)=((M+$ $\left.\left.\lambda^{w}\right) u(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)}$. Then there exist absolute constants $C_{1}>0, C_{2}>0$ such that $C_{1}\|u(t)\|_{L^{2}}^{2} \leq$ $N(u(t)) \leq C_{2}\|u(t)\|_{L^{2}}^{2}$. Now

$$
\frac{d}{d t} N(t)=\left(\left(M+\lambda^{w}\right) \frac{\partial u}{\partial t}(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}}+\left(\left(M+\lambda^{w}\right) u(t), \frac{\partial u}{\partial t}(t)\right)_{L^{2}}
$$

Since $\frac{\partial u}{\partial t}(t)=-i P u(t)+i f(t)$ and $P^{*}=P$ we obtain

$$
\begin{aligned}
\frac{d}{d t} N(t) & =i\left(\left[P, \lambda^{w}\right] u(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}}-2 \operatorname{Im}\left(\left(M+\lambda^{w}\right) f(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}} \\
& =-\left(\left(-H_{p} \lambda\right)^{w} u(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}}-2 \operatorname{Im}\left(\left(M+\lambda^{w}\right) f(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}}+O\left(\|u(t)\|_{L^{2}}^{2}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

By lemma 2.2 (iii).
Now by Lemma $2.2(i)$ and the sharp Gårding inequality, we obtain

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(\left(-H_{p} \lambda\right)^{w} u(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}} \geq C\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1+\nu}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} u(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}-C^{\prime}\|u(t)\|_{L^{2}}^{2} \tag{2.16}
\end{equation*}
$$

On the other hand we have for any $\varepsilon>0$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|\left(\left(M+\lambda^{w}\right) f(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}}\right| \leq \varepsilon\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1+\nu}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} u(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+C_{\varepsilon}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{\frac{1+\nu}{2}} E_{-\frac{1}{m}} f(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} \tag{2.17}
\end{equation*}
$$

Using (2.16) and (2.17) with $\varepsilon$ small enough, we obtain

$$
\frac{d}{d t} N(t) \leq-C_{1}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1+\nu}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} u(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+C_{2}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{\frac{1+\nu}{2}} E_{-\frac{1}{m}} f(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+C_{3} N(t)
$$

Integrating this inequality between 0 and $t$ (in $[0, T]$ ) and using Gronwall's inequality, we obtain the conclusion of Theorem 1.1.

Proof of theorem 1.2.
Let $\chi \in C_{0}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{+}\right), \chi(t)=1$ if $t \in[0,1], \chi(t)=0$ if $t \geq 2$. Recall that according to (1.14) we have $p=|\xi|^{2}+q(x, \xi)$ where $q(x, \xi)=\sum_{j, k=1}^{n} b^{j k}(x) \xi_{j} \xi_{k}$ and $b^{j k} \in S\left(\langle x\rangle^{-\sigma_{0}}, g\right)$. Let us set

$$
\begin{equation*}
A_{j k}=\frac{x_{j} \xi_{k}-x_{k} \xi_{j}}{\langle\xi\rangle}, 1 \leq j, k \leq n \tag{2.18}
\end{equation*}
$$

Then we have the following result.
Lemma 2.3 Let a be defined in Lemma 2.1. One can find positive constants $C_{0}, C_{1}$ and $C_{2}$ such that if we set

$$
\begin{equation*}
-\lambda=\frac{a}{\left(1+a^{2}+\sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}} p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}} \chi\left(\frac{\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}}{\sqrt{p(x, \xi)}}\right) \tag{2.19}
\end{equation*}
$$

then
(i) $-H_{p} \lambda \geq C_{0}\langle x\rangle^{-3}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}} \sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2}-C_{1}\langle x\rangle^{-1-\sigma_{0}}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}}-C_{2}$,
(ii) $\lambda \in S\left(\langle\xi\rangle^{\frac{2}{m}-1}, g\right)$,
(iii) $\left[P, \lambda^{w}\right]-\frac{1}{i}\left(H_{p} \lambda\right)^{w} \in \mathrm{Op}^{w} S_{T}(1, g)$.

Proof

First of all we have

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|H_{p} A_{j k}(x, \xi)\right| \leq C_{1} \frac{|\xi|}{\langle x\rangle^{\sigma_{0}}}, 1 \leq j, k \leq n,(x, \xi) \in T^{*}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right) \tag{2.20}
\end{equation*}
$$

Indeed we have $\left\{|\xi|^{2}, A_{j k}\right\}=0$ and $\left|\left\{q, A_{j k}\right\}\right| \leq C_{2} \frac{|\xi|}{\langle x\rangle^{\sigma_{0}}}$.
Let us set

$$
\begin{equation*}
D=1+a^{2}+\sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2} . \tag{2.21}
\end{equation*}
$$

We claim that on the support of $\chi\left(\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}} p^{-\frac{1}{2}}\right)$ we have

$$
\begin{equation*}
C_{3}\langle x\rangle^{2} \leq D \leq C_{4}\langle x\rangle^{2} \tag{2.22}
\end{equation*}
$$

for some positive constants $C_{3}$ and $C_{4}$.
Indeed a straightforward computation shows that

$$
(x . \xi)^{2}+\sum_{j, k=1}^{n}\left(x_{j} \xi_{k}-x_{k} \xi_{j}\right)^{2} \geq|x|^{2}|\xi|^{2}
$$

Since by Lemma 2.1 we have $a(x, \xi)=\frac{x . \xi}{\langle\xi\rangle}$ for $|x| \geq R_{0} \gg 1$ and $|\xi| \geq C_{5}>0$ on the support of $\chi$ we deduce that $D \geq C_{6}\langle x\rangle^{2}$ when $|x| \geq R_{0}$. When $|x| \leq R_{0}$ we have $D \geq 1 \geq \frac{1}{1+R_{0}^{2}}\langle x\rangle^{2}$.

Now we can write with $r(x, \xi)=\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}} p^{-\frac{1}{2}}$,

$$
\left\{\begin{array}{l}
-H_{p} \lambda=I_{1}+I_{2}  \tag{2.23}\\
I_{1}=D^{-\frac{3}{2}}\left(D\left(H_{p} a\right)-\frac{1}{2} a\left(H_{p} D\right)\right) p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}} \chi(r) \\
I_{2}=p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}} a D^{-\frac{1}{2}} H_{p}(\chi(r))
\end{array}\right.
$$

We have

$$
\begin{aligned}
D H_{p} a-\frac{1}{2} a\left(H_{p} D\right) & =\left(1+\sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2}\right) H_{p} a+a^{2} H_{p} a-\frac{1}{2} a\left(2 a H_{p} a+2 \sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k} H_{p} A_{j k}\right) \\
& =\left(1+\sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2}\right) H_{p} a-a \sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k} H_{p} A_{j k} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Using (2.18) and (2.20) we see that,

$$
\begin{equation*}
|a| \sum_{j, k=1}^{n}\left|A_{j k}\right|\left|H_{p} A_{j k}\right| \leq C_{7}|x|^{2} \frac{|\xi|}{\langle x\rangle^{\sigma_{0}}} . \tag{2.24}
\end{equation*}
$$

Morever by Lemma 2.1 we have on the support of $\chi(r)$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
p^{\frac{1}{m}-\frac{1}{2}}\left(1+\sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2}\right) H_{p} a \geq\left(1+\sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2}\right)\left(C_{8}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}}-C_{9}\right) . \tag{2.25}
\end{equation*}
$$

Therefore (2.21), (2.23), (2.24), (2.25) show that,

$$
I_{1} \geqq\left[C_{10}\langle x\rangle^{-3}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}} \sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2}-C_{11} \frac{|\xi|}{\langle x\rangle^{1+\sigma_{0}}}\right] \chi(r) .
$$

On the support of $1-\chi(r)$ we have $|\xi| \leq\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}$ so we obtain,

$$
\begin{equation*}
I_{1} \geq C_{12}\langle x\rangle^{-3}\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right)^{\frac{2}{m}} \sum_{j, k=1}^{n} A_{j k}^{2}-C_{13} \frac{\left(|\xi|+\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}} \frac{\frac{2}{m}}{m}\right.}{\langle x\rangle^{1+\sigma_{0}}}-C_{14} . \tag{2.26}
\end{equation*}
$$

On the other hand we have,

$$
\left\lvert\, H_{p}\left(\left.\chi(r)\left|=\left|p^{-\frac{1}{2}} \chi^{\prime}(r) H_{p}\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}}\right| \leq \frac{C_{15}}{|\xi|}\right| \chi^{\prime}(r)| | \xi \right\rvert\,\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}-1} .\right.\right.
$$

It follows from (2.22) and the estimate $|a| \leq C_{16}\langle x\rangle$ that,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|I_{2}\right| \leq C_{17}, \tag{2.27}
\end{equation*}
$$

since $\langle x\rangle^{\frac{m}{2}-1}|\xi|^{\frac{2}{m}-1} \leq C_{18}$.
Then $(i)$ in lemma 2.3 follows from (2.23), (2.26) and (2.27). The proofs of (ii) and (iii) are the same as those in the proof of lemma 2.2 .

End of the proof of Theorem 1.2.
We introduce as before, for $t$ in $(0, T)$.

$$
N(t)=\left(\left(M_{0}+\lambda^{w}\right) u(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}}
$$

Where $M_{0}$ is a large constant. Then $N(t) \sim\|u(t)\|_{L^{2}}^{2}$.
Now using the equation and Lemma 2.3 (iii) we can write,

$$
\frac{d}{d t} N(t)=-\left(\left(-H_{p} \lambda\right)^{w} u(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}}-2 \operatorname{Im}\left(\left(M_{0}+\lambda^{w}\right) f(t), u(t)\right)_{L^{2}}+O\left(\|u(t)\|_{L^{2}}^{2}\right)
$$

Since by (1.13) and (2.19) we have $\langle x\rangle^{-2} A_{j k}^{2}=\ell_{j k}^{2}$, Lemma 2.3 (i) and the sharp Gårding inequality ensure that

$$
\begin{aligned}
\frac{d}{d t} N(t) \leq & -C_{1} \sum_{j, k=1}^{n}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} \ell_{j k}^{w} u(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+C_{2}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1+\sigma_{0}}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} u(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} \\
& +\left\|\langle x\rangle^{\frac{1+\sigma_{0}}{2}} E_{-\frac{1}{m}} f(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+C_{3} N(t) .
\end{aligned}
$$

It follows that for $0<t<T$,

$$
\begin{align*}
N(t)+C_{1} \int_{0}^{t} \sum_{j, k=1}^{n}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} \ell_{j k}^{w} u(s)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} d s \leq & N(0)+C_{2} \int_{0}^{T}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{-\frac{1+\sigma_{0}}{2}} E_{\frac{1}{m}} u(s)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} d s  \tag{2.28}\\
& +\int_{0}^{T}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{\frac{1+\sigma_{0}}{2}} E_{-\frac{1}{m}} f(s)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} d s+C_{3} \int_{0}^{t} N(s) d s .
\end{align*}
$$

Using Theorem 1.1 to bound the second term in the right hand side and then using the Gronwall inequality we obtain

$$
N(t) \leq C(T)\left(\|u(0)\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+\int_{0}^{T}\left\|\langle x\rangle^{\frac{1+\sigma_{0}}{2}} E_{-\frac{1}{m}} f(t)\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} d t\right) .
$$

Using again the inequality (2.28) we obtain the conclusion of Theorem 1.2. The proof is complete.
