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# Ribbon tableaux, ribbon rigged configurations and Hall-Littlewood functions at roots of unity

#### Abstract

Hall-Littlewood functions indexed by rectangular partitions, specialized at primitive roots of unity, can be expressed as plethysms. We propose a combinatorial proof of this formula using A. Schilling's bijection between ribbon tableaux and ribbon rigged configurations.


## 1 Introduction

In (9, 10], Lascoux, Leclerc and Thibon proved several formulas for Hall-Littlewood functions $Q_{\lambda}^{\prime}(X ; q)$ with the parameter $q$ specialized at primitive roots of unity. This formula implies a combinatorial interpretation of the plethysms $l_{k}^{(j)}\left[h_{\lambda}\right]$ and $l_{k}^{(j)}\left[e_{\lambda}\right]$, where $h_{\lambda}$ and $e_{\lambda}$ are respectively products of complete and elementary symmetric functions, and $l_{k}^{(j)}$ the Frobenius characteristics of representations of the symmetric group $\mathfrak{S}_{k}$ induced by a transitive cyclic subgroup of $\mathfrak{S}_{k}$. However, the combinatorial interpretation of the plethysms of Schur functions $l_{k}^{(j)}\left[s_{\lambda}\right]$ would be far more interesting. This question led the same authors to introduce a new basis $H_{\lambda}^{(k)}(X ; q)$ of symmetric functions, depending on an integer $k \geq 1$ and a parameter $q$, which interpolate between Schur functions, for $k=1$, and Hall-Littlewood functions $Q_{\lambda}^{\prime}(X ; q)$, for $k \geq l(\lambda)$. These were conjectured to behave similarly under specialization at root of unity, and to provide a combinatorial expression of the expansion of the plethysm $l_{k}^{(j)}\left[s_{\lambda}\right]$ in the Schur basis for suitable values of the parameters. This conjecture has been proved only for the stable case $k=l(\lambda)$, which reduces to the previous result on Hall-Littlewood functions, and $k=2$, which gives the symmetric and antisymmetric squares $h_{2}\left[s_{\lambda}\right]$ and $e_{2}\left[s_{\lambda}\right]$. The proof given in [1] relies upon the study of diagonal classes of domino tableaux, i.e. sets of domino tableaux having the same diagonals. Carré and Leclerc proved that the cospin polynomial of such a class has the form $(1+q)^{a} q^{b}$, and from this obtained the specialization $H_{\lambda \cup \lambda}^{(2)}(X ;-1)$.
In [15], Schilling defines ribbon rigged configurations and gives a statistic preserving bijection between this kind of rigged configurations and ribbon tableaux given by product of row partitions. The aim of this note is to provide a similar proof for the stable case, that is, to show that the result on Hall-Littlewood functions at roots of unity follows from an explicit formula for the cospin polynomials of certain diagonal classes of ribbon tableaux, which turn
out to have a very simple characterization through Schilling's bijection.

## 2 Basic definitions

For a partition $\lambda=\left(\lambda_{1}, \ldots, \lambda_{p}\right)$, we denote by $l(\lambda)$ its length $p,|\lambda|$ its weight $\sum_{i} \lambda_{i}$, and $\lambda^{\prime}$ its conjugate. A $k$-ribbon is a connected skew diagram of weight $k$ which does not contain a $2 \times 2$ square. The first (northwest) cell of a $k$-ribbon is called the head and the last one (southeast) the tail. With $\lambda$ is associated a $k$-core $\lambda_{(k)}$ and a $k$-quotient $\lambda^{(k)}$. The $k$-core is the unique partition obtained by removing successively $k$-ribbons from $\lambda$, such that at each step the remaining shape still be a partition. The $k$-quotient is a sequence of $k$ partitions derived from $\lambda$ (see [0]). Let denote by $\mathcal{P}$ the set of all the partitions, $\mathcal{P}_{(k)}$ the set of all the $k$-cores (i.e all the partitions from which we can't remove any $k$-ribbon) and $\mathcal{P}^{(k)}$ the cartesian product $\mathcal{P} \times \ldots \times \mathcal{P}$ of length $k$. The quotient bijection $\Phi_{k}$ is defined by

\Phi_{k}: \mathcal{P} & \longrightarrow \mathcal{P}_{(k)} \times \mathcal{P}^{(k)} \\
\lambda & \longmapsto\left(\lambda_{(k)}, \lambda^{(k)}\right) .
\end{aligned}

## $2.1 k$-Ribbon tableaux

A $k$-ribbon tableau of shape $\lambda$ and weight $\mu$ is a tiling of the skew diagram $\lambda / \lambda_{(k)}$ by labelled $k$-ribbons such that the head of a ribbon labelled $i$ must not be on the right of a ribbon labelled $j>i$ and its tail must not be on the top of a ribbon labelled $j \geq i$. We denote by $T a b_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}$ the set of all $k$-ribbon tableaux of shape $\lambda$ and weight $\mu$ and by $T a b_{\lambda}^{(k)}$ the set of all the $k$-ribbon tableaux of shape $\lambda$ and evaluation any composition of $|\lambda|$.

Example 1 A 3-ribbon tableau of shape (87651) and weight (3321)


The spin of a $k$-ribbon $R$ is defined by $\operatorname{sp}(R)=\frac{h(R)-1}{2}$, where $h(R)$ is the height of $R$. The spin of a $k$-ribbon tableau $T$ is the sum of the spin of all its ribbons, and the cospin is the associated co-statistic into $T a b_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}$, i.e

$$
\operatorname{cosp}(T)=\max \left(s p\left(T^{\prime}\right), T^{\prime} \in T a b_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}\right)-s p(T) .
$$

We define the cospin polynomial $\tilde{G}_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}(q)$ as the generating polynomial of $T a b_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}$ with respect to the cospin statistic

$$
\tilde{G}_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}(q)=\sum_{T \in T a b_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}} q^{\operatorname{cosp}(T)} .
$$

Example 2 For Tab ${ }_{87651,3321}^{(3)}$, the cospin polynomial is

$$
\tilde{G}_{(87651),(3321)}^{(3)}(q)=3 q^{5}+17 q^{4}+33 q^{3}+31 q^{2}+18 q+5 .
$$

## $2.2 k$-tuples of Young tableaux

Let $T^{\circ}=\left(T^{\circ_{1}}, \ldots, T^{\circ_{k}}\right)$ be a $k$-tuple of semi-standard Young tableaux $T^{\circ_{i}}$ of shape $\lambda^{\circ_{i}}$ and evaluation $\mu^{\circ_{i}}$. We call shape of $T^{\circ}$, the sequence of shapes $\lambda^{\circ}=\left(\lambda^{\circ_{1}}, \ldots, \lambda^{\circ_{k}}\right)$ and evaluation of $T^{\circ}$, the vector $\mu=\left(\mu_{1}, \ldots, \mu_{p}\right)$ defined by $\mu_{i}=\sum_{j=1}^{k} \mu_{i}^{\circ{ }_{j}}$.

Definition 1 Let s be a given cell in $T^{\circ}$,
$-\operatorname{pos}(s)$ is the integer such that the cell $s$ is in the tableau $T^{\circ}{ }^{p o s(s)}$,

- $T^{\circ}(s)$ is the label of the cell $s$,
$-\operatorname{row}(s)$ and $\operatorname{col}(s)$ represent the row and the column of $s$ in $T^{\circ}{ }_{p o s(s)}$,
- and $\operatorname{diag}(s)$ is the content of $s$, i.e $\operatorname{diag}(s)=\operatorname{col}(s)-\operatorname{row}(s)$.

Let denote by $T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$ the set of all the $k$-tuple of Young tableaux $T^{\circ}$ of shape $\lambda^{\circ}=$ $\left(\lambda^{\circ_{1}}, \ldots, \lambda^{\circ_{k}}\right)$ and evaluation $\mu$. In [16], Stanton and White extend the bijection $\Phi_{k}$ to a correspondence $\Psi_{k}$ between the set of $k$-ribbon tableaux of shape $\lambda$ and evaluation $\mu$, and the set of $k$-tuples of semi-standard Young tableaux of shape $\lambda^{(k)}$ and evaluation $\mu$.

Example $3 \Psi_{3}$ send the 3-ribbon tableau of example $\mathbb{\square}$ to the 3-tuple of tableaux

Definition $2([14])$ Let $T^{\circ}=\left(T^{\circ_{1}}, \ldots, T^{{ }^{k}}\right)$ be a $k$-tuple of semi-standard Young tableaux and $t$ and $s$ two cells in $T^{\circ}$. The couple $(s, t)$ is an inversion if the following conditions hold

1- $\operatorname{diag}(s)=\operatorname{diag}(t)$ and $\operatorname{pos}(s)<\operatorname{pos}(t)$
or
$\operatorname{diag}(s)=\operatorname{diag}(t)-1$ and $\operatorname{pos}(s)>\operatorname{pos}(t)$,
2- $\operatorname{row}(s) \leq \operatorname{row}(t)$,
3- $T(t)<T(s)<T\left(t^{\uparrow}\right)$, where $t^{\uparrow}$ is the cell directly above $t$ and $T\left(t^{\uparrow}\right)=\infty$ if $t^{\uparrow} \notin \lambda^{\circ}$.

The statistic of inversions on $T^{\circ}$, written $\operatorname{inv}\left(T^{\circ}\right)$, is the number of couples which form an inversion in $T^{\circ}$. This statistic permits to extend the correspondence $\Psi_{k}$ to a bijection which preserve the statistic (see [14), i.e

$$
\forall T \in T a b_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}, \quad \operatorname{inv}\left(\Psi_{k}(T)\right)=\operatorname{cosp}(T)
$$

Let $\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q)$ be the generating polynomial of $T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$ with respect to the inversions statistic

$$
\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q)=\sum_{T^{\circ} \in T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}} q^{i n v\left(T^{\circ}\right)}
$$

Proposition 1 The bijection $\Psi_{k}$ implies the equality between the two generating polynomials

$$
\begin{equation*}
\widetilde{G}_{\lambda, \mu}(q)=\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{(k)}, \mu}(q) . \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

In [3], Haglund, Haiman, Loehr, Remmel and Ulyanov define an other notion of inversions on $k$-tuples of tableaux. This statistics is equal to $\operatorname{inv}\left(T^{\circ}\right)$ up to a constant and gives a combinatorial interpretation for the powers of $q$ of the Macdonald polynomials $\widetilde{H}_{\lambda}(X ; q, t)$ expanded on the monomials.

## 3 Hall-Littlewood functions at roots of unity

The Hall-Littlewood functions $Q_{\lambda}^{\prime}(X ; q)$ are the symmetric functions obtained by

$$
Q_{\lambda}^{\prime}(X ; q)=\prod_{i<j}\left(1-q R_{i j}\right)^{-1} s_{\lambda}(X)
$$

where $R_{i j}$ is the raising operator such that $R_{i j} \cdot s_{\lambda}=s_{R_{i j} \cdot \lambda}$, with

$$
R_{i j} \cdot \lambda=\left(\lambda_{1}, \ldots, \lambda_{i}+1, \ldots, \lambda_{j}-1, \ldots, \lambda_{p}\right) .
$$

We shall need the $\widetilde{Q}_{\lambda}^{\prime}$ version of the Hall-Littlewood functions defined by

$$
\widetilde{Q}_{\lambda}^{\prime}(X ; q)=q^{\eta(\lambda)} Q_{\lambda}^{\prime}\left(X ; q^{-1}\right),
$$

where $\eta(\lambda)=\sum_{i \geq 1}(i-1) \lambda_{i}$.
Let $\lambda=\left(\lambda_{1}, \ldots, \lambda_{k}\right)$ be a partition of length $k$, we denote by $k \lambda$ the partition $\left(k \lambda_{1}, \ldots, k \lambda_{k}\right)$. In [1], Lascoux, Leclerc and Thibon showed that Hall-Littlewood functions can be expressed in terms of ribbon tableaux

$$
\widetilde{Q}_{\lambda}^{\prime}(X ; q)=\sum_{T \in T a b_{k \lambda}^{(k)}} q^{\operatorname{cosp}(T)} X^{T}=\sum_{\mu \dashv|\lambda|} \widetilde{G}_{k \lambda, \mu}^{(k)}(q) m_{\mu}
$$

where $X^{T}$ is $X_{1}^{\mu_{1}} \ldots X_{p}^{\mu_{p}}$ with $\mu$ the evaluation of the ribbon tableau $T$.
We can remark that in the special case of a partition $\lambda$ of length $k$, the $k$-core of $k \lambda$ is empty and the $k$-quotient of $k \lambda$ is the product of single row partitions

$$
(k \lambda)^{(k)}=\left(\left(\lambda_{k}\right), \ldots,\left(\lambda_{1}\right)\right) .
$$

Proposition 2 By equation 团, the Hall-Litllewood functions can be expressed as

$$
\widetilde{Q}_{\lambda}^{\prime}(X ; q)=\sum_{\mu \dashv|\lambda|} \widetilde{I}_{(k \lambda)^{(k)}, \mu}(q) m_{\mu} .
$$

This proposition means that Hall-Littlewood functions can be expressed in terms of all the $k$-tuples of Young tableaux with shape a product of single row partitions.

Example 4 The Hall-Littlewood function $\widetilde{Q}_{222}^{\prime}$ on the Schur basis is given by
$\widetilde{Q}_{222}^{\prime}(X, q)=q^{6} s_{222}+\left(q^{5}+q^{4}\right) s_{321}+q^{3} s_{33}+q^{3} s_{411}+\left(q^{4}+q^{3}+q^{2}\right) s_{42}+\left(q^{2}+q\right) s_{51}+s_{6}$.
Let denote by $\Lambda_{q}$ the vector space of symmetric functions over the field $\mathbb{C}(q)$. Let $k$ be a positive integer and $\lambda$ a partition, the plethysm of the powersum $p_{\lambda}$ by the powersum $p_{k}$ is defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
p_{k} \circ p_{\lambda}=p_{k \lambda} \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

As the powersums form a basis of the vector space $\Lambda_{q}$, the plethysm by a powersum $p_{k}$ is defined on any symmetric function $f$.

Theorem 1 ([9]) Let $n$ and $k$ be two positive integers and $\zeta$ a primitive $k$-th root of unity. The specialization of the parameter $q$ at $\zeta$ in the Hall-Littlewood function indexed by the rectangular partition $n^{k}$, gives the following formulas

$$
\begin{align*}
Q_{n^{k}}^{\prime}(X ; \zeta) & =(-1)^{(k-1) n} p_{k} \circ h_{n}(X)  \tag{3}\\
\widetilde{Q}_{n^{k}}^{\prime}(X ; \zeta) & =p_{k} \circ h_{n}(X) \tag{4}
\end{align*}
$$

In [9], Lascoux, Leclerc and Thibon only give an algebraic proof of this theorem. We shall give a combinatorial proof of this formula using the bijection between ribbon tableaux and ribbon rigged configurations given in [15].
Example 5 The Hall-Littlewood function $\widetilde{Q}_{222}^{\prime}(X ; q)$ with $q$ specialized at $j=e^{\frac{2 i \pi}{3}}$ is

$$
\begin{align*}
\widetilde{Q}_{222}^{\prime}(X ; j) & =s_{222}-s_{321}+s_{33}+s_{411}-s_{51}+s_{6}  \tag{5}\\
& =\frac{1}{2}\left(p_{33}+p_{6}\right)=p_{3} \circ\left(\frac{1}{2} p_{11}+\frac{1}{2} p_{2}\right)  \tag{6}\\
& =p_{3} \circ h_{2}(X) \tag{7}
\end{align*}
$$

## 4 Ribbon rigged configurations and diagonal classes

Let first recall some basic definitions about $q$-analogues of factorials and binomial coefficients. Let $n$ be a positive integer, we define the $q$-factorial $(q)_{n}$ by

(q)_{n}=\prod_{i=1}^{n}\left(1+q+\ldots+q^{i-1}\right) \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

Let $a$ and $b$ be two positive integers. A $q$-analogue of the binomial coefficient $\binom{a+b}{a, b}$ can be given by

$$

\end{array}\right]=\frac{(q)_{a+b}}{(q)_{a}(q)_{b}} .
$$

### 4.1 Ribbon rigged configurations

In this subsection, we briefly recall some basic statements on ribbon rigged configurations introduced by Schilling in [15]. Let $\nu=\left(\nu^{(1)}, \ldots, \nu^{(p)}\right)$ be an increasing $p$-tuple of partitions, i.e the diagram of $\nu^{(i)}$ is included in the diagram of $\nu^{(i+1)}$. Let $J$ be a sequence of sequences of partitions such that

1- for all $a$ in $\{1, \ldots, p-1\}, J^{(a)}$ is a $l\left(\nu^{(a)}\right)$-tuple of partitions $J^{(a)}=\left(J_{1}^{(a)}, \ldots, J_{l\left(\nu^{(a)}\right)}^{(a)}\right)$,
2- for all $a$ in $\{1, \ldots, p-1\}$ and for all $i \leq l\left(\nu^{(a)}\right)$, we have $0 \leq l\left(J_{i}^{(a)}\right) \leq \nu_{i}^{(a)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)}$,
3- and each part of $J_{i}^{(a)}$ (called quantum number) satisfy

$$
0 \leq J_{i, j}^{(a)} \leq \nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i}^{(a)} \quad(\text { called vacancy number }) .
$$

Definition 3 A ribbon rigged configuration of shape $\nu$ and evaluation $J$, written $(\nu, J)$, is the filling of the top cells of each column of the partition $\nu^{(a)}$ which are in the $i$-th line with the parts of the partition $J_{i}^{(a)}$.

The graphical representation of a ribbon rigged configuration corresponds to the filling of the top cells of each column of each partition with the numbers of the partition $J_{i}^{(a)}$ and the filling of the $i$-th row of the frontier of $\nu^{(a)}$ with the vacancy numbers $\nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i}^{(a)}$.

Example 6 This is the graphical representation of the ribbon rigged configuration corresponding to the shape $((21),(31),(32),(331))$ and the evaluation $(((1),()),((),(1)),((1),(2,1)))$.

For two partitions $\delta$ and $\mu=\left(\mu_{1}, \ldots, \mu_{p}\right)$, we denote by $R C(\mu, \delta)$, the set of all the ribbon rigged configurations $(\nu, J)$ such that

1- the last partition of the sequence $\nu=\left(\nu_{1}, \ldots, \nu_{p}\right)$ satisfy $\nu^{(p)}=\delta^{\prime}$,
2 - and for all $a$ in $\{1, \ldots, p\}$, we have $\left|\nu^{(a)}\right|=\mu_{1}+\ldots+\mu_{a}$.
Let denote by $\Gamma_{\mu, \delta}(\nu)$ the set of all rigged configurations in $R C(\mu, \delta)$ with shape $\nu$ and by $\Gamma_{\mu, \delta}$ the set of all the $\Gamma_{\mu, \delta}(\nu)$.

There exists a cocharge statistic on the ribbon rigged configurations defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\widetilde{c}(\nu, J)=\alpha(\nu)+\sum_{\substack{1 \leq a \leq n-1 \\ 1 \leq i \leq \mu_{1}}}\left|J_{i}^{(a)}\right|, \tag{10}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\alpha(\nu)$ is a constant associated to each form of ribbon rigged configurations given by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\alpha(\nu)=\sum_{\substack{1 \leq a \leq n-1 \\ 1 \leq i \leq \mu_{1}}} \nu_{i+1}^{(a)}\left(\nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i}^{(a)}\right) . \tag{11}
\end{equation*}
$$

By enumerating all the elements in $R C(\mu, \delta)$, we can express the generating polynomial of ribbon rigged configurations $\widetilde{S}_{\mu, \delta}(q)$ with respect to the cocharge using $q$-binomial coefficients

\begin{align*}
\widetilde{S}_{\mu, \delta}(q) & =\sum_{(\nu, J) \in R C(\mu, \delta)} q^{\widetilde{c}(\nu, J)}  \tag{12}\\
& =\sum_{\nu} q^{\alpha(\nu)} \prod_{\substack{1 \leq \leq \leq n-1 \\
1 \leq i \leq \mu_{1}}}\left[\begin{array}{c}
\nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)} \\
\nu_{i}^{(a)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)}, \nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i}^{(a)}
\end{array}\right], \tag{13}
\end{align*}
$$

where $\nu$ describe the set of all the shape which appear in $R C(\mu, \delta)$.
Let denote by $\widetilde{S}_{\mu, \delta}(q, \nu)$ the cocharge polynomial $\widetilde{S}_{\mu, \delta}(q)$ restricted to the subset of ribbon rigged configurations in $R C(\mu, \delta)$ with shape $\nu$

$$
\widetilde{S}_{\mu, \delta}(q, \nu)=q^{\alpha(\nu)} \prod_{\substack{1 \leq a \leq n-1 \\
1 \leq i \leq \mu_{1}}}\left[\begin{array}{c}
\nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)} \\
\nu_{i}^{(a)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)}, \nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i}^{(a)}
\end{array}\right]
$$

Theorem 2 (15) Let $\lambda$ be a partition with an empty $k$-core and a $k$-quotient $\lambda^{(k)}=$ $\left(\lambda^{\circ_{1}}, \ldots, \lambda^{\circ_{k}}\right)$, a sequence of single row partitions. Let $\delta$ be a partition such that $\delta_{i}=\left|\lambda^{\circ_{i}}\right|$ and $\mu$ a partition of weight $|\lambda| / k$. In this special case, there exists a bijection $\Theta_{k}$, between $T a b_{\lambda^{(k)}, \mu}$ and $R C(\mu, \delta)$ which preserves the statistics, i.e

$$
\begin{equation*}
\forall T^{\circ} \in T a b_{\lambda^{(k)}, \mu}, \tilde{c}\left(\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ}\right)\right)=\operatorname{inv}\left(T^{\circ}\right) \tag{14}
\end{equation*}
$$

Let us just recall the steps of the algorithm which permits to compute $\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ}\right)$.

## Algorithm 1 (15)

Input: $T^{\circ}=\left(T^{0_{1}}, \ldots, T^{o_{k}}\right)$ a $k$-tuple of Young tableaux of shape the sequence of single row partitions $\lambda^{\circ}=\left(\lambda^{0^{1}}, \ldots, \lambda^{\circ_{k}}\right)$ and evaluation $\mu=\left(\mu_{1}, \ldots, \mu_{p}\right)$.

Initialization: $\quad \nu \longleftarrow$ a sequence of p empty partitions.

For i from k down to 1 do
For $j$ from 1 to $l\left(\lambda^{o_{i}}\right)$ do 1- For k from $T_{j}^{0_{i}}$ to p do

Add a box in the j-th row in the partition $\nu^{(k)}$
EndFor
2- Recompute all the vacancy numbers,
3- Fill the new cells coming from step 1
with the vacancy number of their row,

of the partitions which have a new box from step 1 in the j-th row.

This algorithm is implemented in the MuPAD package MuPAD-Combinat.
Proposition 3 Let $k$ be a positive integer and $\lambda$ and $\mu$ two partitions such that $k|\mu|=$ $|\lambda|$. Let $\lambda^{(k)}=\left(\lambda^{\circ_{1}}, \ldots, \lambda^{\circ_{k}}\right)$ be the $k$-quotient of $\lambda$ and $\delta$ the partition $\left(\left|\lambda^{\circ_{1}}\right|, \ldots,\left|\lambda^{\circ_{k}}\right|\right)$. Combining the bijection $\Theta_{k}$ and $\Psi_{k}$, we have

$$
\tilde{G}_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}(q)=\widetilde{I}_{\lambda(k), \mu}(q)=\widetilde{S}_{\mu, \delta}(q)=\sum_{\nu} q^{\alpha(\nu)} \prod_{\substack{1 \leq a \leq n-1  \tag{15}\\
1 \leq i \leq \mu_{1}}}\left[\begin{array}{c}
\nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)} \\
\nu_{i}^{(a)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)}, \nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i}^{(a)}
\end{array}\right] .
$$

Using this theorem, we have an explicit formula for the coefficients of the transition matrix between the Hall-Littlewood functions and the monomials.

Corollary 1 Let $\lambda$ be a partition. Let $\widetilde{\lambda}^{l(\lambda)}=\left(\widetilde{\lambda}^{\rho_{1}}, \ldots, \widetilde{\lambda}^{{ }_{l}^{l}(\lambda)}\right)$ be the $l(\lambda)$-quotient of the partition $l(\lambda) \lambda$ and $\delta=\left(\delta_{1}, \ldots, \delta_{l(\lambda)}\right)$ be the partition defined by $\delta_{i}=\left|\widetilde{\lambda}^{0^{i}}\right|$. Then, the HallLittlewood function can be expressed as

$$
\begin{equation*}
\widetilde{Q}_{\lambda}^{\prime}(X ; q)=\sum_{\mu-|\lambda|} \tilde{S}_{\mu, \delta}(q) m_{\mu} . \tag{16}
\end{equation*}
$$

The ribbon rigged configurations we considered are different from the rigged configurations defined in [6, 7, 8] which give the expansion of the Hall-Littlewood functions on the Schur basis and correspond to highest weights in crystals of type $A_{n}^{(1)}$.

### 4.2 Diagonal classes of ribbon tableaux

Let $T^{\circ}=\left(T^{\circ_{1}}, \ldots, T^{\circ_{k}}\right)$ be a sequence of Young tableaux with shape $\lambda^{\circ}$ a sequence of single row partitions. Let define two constants $m_{1}$ and $m_{2}$ by

$$
m_{1}=\max \left(l\left(\lambda^{\circ_{i}}\right), i=1 \ldots k\right) \quad \text { and } \quad m_{2}=\max \left(\lambda_{1}^{\circ_{i}}, i=1 \ldots k\right) .
$$

For all $i \in\left\{-m_{1}+1, \ldots, m_{2}\right\}$, we call $d_{i}$ the $i$-th diagonal of $T^{\circ}$ defined by

$$
d_{i}=\left\{T^{\circ}(s) \text { such that } \operatorname{diag}(\mathrm{s})=i\right\}
$$

and we call diagonal vector of $T^{\circ}$ the vector $d_{T^{\circ}}=\left(d_{-m_{1}+1}, \ldots, d_{m_{2}}\right)$.
Two $k$-tuples of Young tableaux $T^{\circ}$ and $T^{\circ^{\prime}}$ in $T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$ are equivalent if and only if for all $i$ in $\left\{-m_{1}+1, \ldots, m_{2}\right\}$, the $i$-th set in $d_{T^{\circ}}$ and $d_{T^{\circ}}$ are the same. A diagonal class in $T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$ is a set $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$ of all equivalent $k$-tuples of tableaux with a diagonal vector $d$. The set of all diagonal classes is denoted by $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$. We also define $\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q, d)$ as the inversion polynomial $\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q)$ restricted to the diagonal class $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$

$$
\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q, d)=\sum_{T^{\circ} \in D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)} q^{i n v\left(T^{\circ}\right)} .
$$

Similarly, the same diagonal classes can be defined on $k$-ribbon tableaux throught the bijection $\Psi_{k}^{-1}$. In [1], Carre and Leclerc give a combinatorial construction of diagonal classes using a notion of labyrinths in the case of domino tableaux (i.e $k=2$ ) and proved that cospin polynomials of diagonal classes are of the form $q^{a}(1+q)^{b}$ with $a$ and $b$ two positive integers. The combinatorial construction of diagonal classes for $k>2$ still an open problem.

### 4.3 A matricial recoding of the bijection

In the following, we shall therefore propose a simpler but similar algorithm for finding the shape of ribbon rigged configurations.

Let $p$ and $q$ be two integers and $\mathcal{M}_{p, q}$ the set of all $(p \times q)$-matrices with integer coefficients. We define the operator $A_{E}$ on $\mathcal{M}_{p, q}$ by

A_{E}: \quad \mathcal{M}_{p, q} & \longrightarrow \mathcal{M}_{p, q} \\
M=\left(m_{i, j}\right)_{i, j} & \longmapsto N= \begin{cases}n_{i, 1}= \\
n_{i, j}=\sum_{1 \leq k \leq j} m_{i, k}, & \text { for } 2 \leq j \leq q\end{cases} \tag{17}
\end{align*}
$$

Let $T^{\circ}$ be a $k$-tuple of Young tableaux of shape $\lambda^{\circ}$, evaluation $\mu$ and diagonal class $d$. Let $\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ}\right)=\left(\nu_{T^{\circ}}, J_{T^{\circ}}\right)$ be the ribbon rigged configuration corresponding to $T^{\circ}$ by $\Theta_{k}$. We construct a $\left(m_{2} \times l(\mu)\right)$-matrix $M^{T^{\circ}}$ using the following rule

$$
M_{i, j}^{T^{\circ}}=\text { number of cells labelled } j \text { in } d_{i+1} .
$$

Proposition 4 The $j$-th column of the matrice $A_{E}\left(M^{T^{\circ}}\right)$ is equal to the $j$-th partition of $\nu_{T^{\circ}}$.

Proof: Let $T^{\circ}$ be a $k$-tuple of single row tableaux and $\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ}\right)=\left(\nu_{T^{\circ}}, J_{T^{\circ}}\right)$. In the algorithm 11. we observe that boxes which appear in the $i$-th line of a partition $\nu_{T^{\circ}}^{(j)}$ only come from elements of the $i$-th diagonal of $T^{\circ}$ which are smaller than $j$. And by definition of the operator $A_{E}$, the entry $(i, j)$ of the matrix $A_{E}\left(M^{T^{\circ}}\right)$ corresponds to the number of cells less than $j$ in the $i$-th diagonal.

Example 7 Let consider the following 3-tuple of single row tableaux $T^{\circ}$

In this case, the matrices $M^{T^{\circ}}$ and $A_{E}\left(M^{T^{\circ}}\right)$ are

$$
M^{T^{\circ}}=\left(\begin{array}{cccc}
3 & 0 & 0 & 0 \\
0 & 2 & 0 & 1 \\
0 & 0 & 1 & 0 \\
0 & 0 & 1 & 0
\end{array}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad A_{E}\left(M^{T^{\circ}}\right)=\left(\begin{array}{cccc}
3 & 3 & 3 & 3 \\
0 & 2 & 2 & 3 \\
0 & 0 & 1 & 1 \\
0 & 0 & 1 & 1
\end{array}\right)
$$

The shape of the rigged configuration $\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ}\right)$ is


as can be read from $A_{E}\left(M^{T^{\circ}}\right)$.

### 4.4 A combinatorial proof of the specialization

Proposition 5 Let $\lambda^{\circ}$ be a given sequence of single row partitions $\left(\lambda^{0_{1}}, \ldots, \lambda^{\circ_{k}}\right)$, $\mu$ a partition of weight $\sum_{i}\left|\lambda^{\circ^{i}}\right|$ and $\delta$ the partition $\left(\left|\lambda^{0_{1}}\right|, \ldots,\left|\lambda^{0^{k}}\right|\right)$. For all diagonal vectors $d$ which appears in $T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$, there exists a sequence of partitions $\nu$, such that

$$
\Theta_{k}\left(D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)\right)=\Gamma_{\mu, \delta}(\nu) .
$$

Hence, the explicit expression for the inversion polynomial of a diagonal class $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$ is

$$
\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q, d)=\widetilde{S}_{\mu, \delta}(q, \nu)=q^{\alpha(\nu)} \prod_{\substack{1 \leq a \leq n-1  \tag{18}\\
1 \leq i \leq \mu_{1}}}\left[\begin{array}{c}
\nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)} \\
\nu_{i}^{(a)}-\nu_{i+1}^{(a)}, \nu_{i}^{(a+1)}-\nu_{i}^{(a)}
\end{array}\right],
$$

where $\nu$ is the shape corresponding to the diagonal vector $d$.
Proof: Let $d$ be a diagonal vector and $T^{\circ}, T^{\circ^{\prime}}$ two elements in the diagonal class $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$. These two $k$-tuples of tableaux differ only from a permutation of cells which are in a same diagonal $d_{i}$. By construction, this property implies $M^{T^{\circ}}=M^{T^{o^{\prime}}}$ and by proposition 4 , $\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ}\right)$ has the same shape $\nu$ than $\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ^{\prime}}\right)$. Consequently, as $\Theta_{k}$ is a bijection, $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$ is embedded into $\Gamma_{\mu, \delta}(\nu)$. Conversely, let $T^{\circ}$ and $T^{\circ}$ be two $k$-tuples of tableaux in $T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$ which are not in the same diagonal class. This implies that $M^{T^{\circ}} \neq M^{T^{0^{\prime}}}$ and consequently the shape of their corresponding ribbon rigged configurations are not the same. Finally, we conclude that

$$
\Theta_{k}\left(D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu},(d)\right)=\Gamma_{\mu, \delta}(\nu) .
$$

The expression of inversion polynomials of diagonal classes in terms of $q$-supernomial coefficients follows immediately from the invariance of the statistics under $\Theta_{k}$.

In the following, we consider $k$-tuples of tableaux of shape $\lambda^{\circ}=((n), \ldots,(n))$ for some $n \geq 1$ and the next corollary characterize in this special case diagonal classes with only one element.

Corollary 2 Let $\lambda^{\circ}=\left(\lambda^{0^{1}}, \ldots, \lambda^{0_{k}}\right)$ be a sequence of single rows partitions and $\mu$ a partition of weight $\sum_{i=1}^{k}\left|\lambda^{\circ}\right|$. Let us describe the diagonal classes with only one element depending on the evaluation $\mu$.

- If each part of $\mu$ is divisible by $k$,

1- there is an unique diagonal class $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$ with only one element $T^{\circ}=\left(T^{0_{1}}, \ldots, T^{{ }^{\circ}}\right)$,
2- the $i$-th position of each tableau $T^{\circ{ }_{j}}$ is filled with the same value,
$3-\operatorname{inv}\left(T^{\circ}\right)=0$, i.e $\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q, d)=1$.

- if one part of $\mu$ is not divisible by $k$, there is no diagonal classes with only one element.

Proof: A diagonal class $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$ has an unique element if and only if there is an unique way to fill $\lambda^{\circ}$ according to the vector $d$. This implies that, for all $i$ in $\{1, \ldots, n\}$, all letters of $d_{i-1}$ are the same. For filling identically each position in $d_{i}$, the weight $\mu$ must be of the form $\mu=\left(k s_{1}, \ldots, k s_{p}\right)$. On the other hand, if one part of $\mu$ is not divisible by $k$, this implies that for any filling $T^{\circ}$ of $\lambda^{\circ}$, there exist two tableaux $T^{\circ}{ }^{a}$ and $T^{{ }^{\circ}}$ in $T^{\circ}$ which have two different values in one position. By transposition of these two cells, we obtain an other filling $T^{0^{\prime}}$ which is in the same diagonal class than $T^{\circ}$. Consequently, for this kind of evaluation, all
diagonal classes have more than 2 elements.
Let $d$ be a diagonal vector such that the diagonal class $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$ contains only one element $T^{\circ}$ and $\lambda$ be the partition such that $\lambda^{(k)}=\lambda^{\circ}$. The inverse image of $T^{\circ}$ by $\Psi_{k}$ is a $k$-ribbon tableaux in $T a b_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}$, which only contains $(k \times k)$-blocks of the form


Such $k$-ribbon tableaux have maximal spin in $T a b_{\lambda, \mu}^{(k)}$. Consequently, cospins of such $k$ ribbon tableaux are equal to zero. Finally, as $\Psi_{k}$ preserve the statistics, this implies that the inversions of the corresponding $k$-tuple of tableaux are also equal to zero. By definition of the bijection $\Psi_{k}$, the length of the partition $\lambda$ is $k$ because $\lambda^{\circ}$ is a $k$-tuple of single row partitions. Consequently, due to the increasing condition in the definition of a $k$-ribbon tableau, there is an unique way to build a $k$-ribbon tableau of shape $\lambda$ with the previous blocks. This implies the uniqueness of the diagonal classes with only one element for a given evaluation.

Corollary 3 Let $\lambda^{\circ}$ a $k$-tuple of partitions and $\mu$ a partition of weight $\sum_{i=1}^{k}\left|\lambda^{\circ_{i}}\right|$ and satisfying the condition $\mu=\left(k s_{1}, \ldots, k s_{p}\right)$ for some positive integers $s_{1}, \ldots, s_{p}$. Let $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$ be a diagonal class with only one element $T^{\circ}$ and $\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ}\right)=\left(\nu_{T^{\circ}}, J_{T^{\circ}}\right)$ the corresponding ribbon rigged configuration. The $i$-th partition of the shape $\nu_{T^{\circ}}$ is the rectangular shape $\left(k^{s_{1}+\ldots+s_{i}}\right)$.

Proof: Let $T^{\circ}$ ba a $k$-tuple of tableaux with the same values at the same positions of each tableau. The corresponding matrix $M^{T^{\circ}}$ is

$$
M^{T^{\circ}}=\left(\begin{array}{cccccc}
k & 0 & \ldots & \ldots & \ldots & 0 \\
\vdots & \vdots & & & & \vdots \\
k & 0 & \ldots & \ldots & \ldots & 0 \\
0 & k & 0 & \ldots & \ldots & 0 \\
\vdots & \vdots & \vdots & & & \vdots \\
0 & k & 0 & \ldots & \ldots & 0 \\
\vdots & & & & & \vdots \\
0 & \ldots & \ldots & \ldots & 0 & k \\
\vdots & & & & \vdots & \vdots \\
0 & \ldots & \ldots & \ldots & 0 & k
\end{array}\right),
$$

where $k$ occurs $s_{i}$ times in the $i$-th column. This implies that the shape is given by the
matrix

$$
A_{E}\left(M^{T^{\circ}}\right)=\left(\begin{array}{cccccc}
k & k & \ldots & \ldots & \ldots & k \\
\vdots & \vdots & & & & \vdots \\
k & k & \ldots & \ldots & \ldots & k \\
0 & k & k & \ldots & \ldots & k \\
\vdots & \vdots & \vdots & & & \vdots \\
0 & k & k & \ldots & \ldots & k \\
\vdots & & & & & \vdots \\
0 & \ldots & \ldots & \ldots & 0 & k \\
\vdots & & & & \vdots & \vdots \\
0 & \ldots & \ldots & \ldots & 0 & k
\end{array}\right) .
$$

Then, the $i$-th partition in the shape $\nu_{T^{\circ}}$ is the rectangular partition $\left(k^{s_{1}+\ldots+s_{i}}\right)$.
Proposition 6 All k-th primitive roots of unity are roots of the inversions polynomials of diagonal classes with strictly more than one element.

Proof: Let $T^{\circ}$ be a $k$-tuple of tableaux in a diagonal class $D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)$ with strictly more than one element and let $\nu=\left(\nu^{(1)}, \ldots, \nu^{(p)}\right)$ be the shape of the ribbon rigged configuration $\Theta_{k}\left(T^{\circ}\right)$, which is the same for all the $k$-tuples of tableaux in this diagonal class (see proposition 因). Let $h$ be the last position such that the $h$-th diagonal $d_{h}$ has at least two different elements. Then, the $(h+1)$-th partition in $\nu_{T^{\circ}}$ is a rectangular partition of width $k$ and height $s \leq r$. As the last part of $\nu^{(h)}=\left(\nu_{1}^{(h)}, \ldots, \nu_{l}^{(h)}\right)$ is equal to $a$ with $a<h$, the following coefficient appears in the inversions polynomial $\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q, d)$

$$
\left[\begin{array}{c}
\substack{\nu_{l}^{(h+1)}-\nu_{l+1}^{(h)} \\
\nu_{l}^{(h)}-\nu_{l+1}^{(h)}, \nu_{l}^{(h+1)}} \\
\nu_{l}^{(h)}
\end{array}\right]=\left[\begin{array}{c}
k \\
a-0, k-a
\end{array}\right] .
$$

By definition, all $k$-th primitive roots of unity are roots of the $q$-binomial coefficient $\left[\begin{array}{c}k \\ a, k-a\end{array}\right]$. Finally for all $\zeta, k$-th primitive root of unity,

$$
\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(\zeta, d)=0
$$

Corollary 4 Let $\lambda^{\circ}=\left(\lambda^{\circ_{1}}, \ldots, \lambda^{\circ_{k}}\right)$ be a $k$-tuple of single row partitions and $\mu$ a partition of weight $\sum_{i=1}^{k}\left|\lambda^{\circ}\right|$ and $\zeta$ a $k$-th primitive root of unity. We have the following specializations for the inversions polynomials

- if all the parts of $\mu$ are divisible by $k$,

$$
\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(\zeta)=1
$$

- if there exists a part of $\mu$ which is not divisible by $k$,

$$
\tilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(\zeta)=0
$$

Proof: Using the partition of $T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$ into diagonal classes, the inversions polynomial $\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q)$ can be expressed as

$$
\widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q)=\sum_{d} \widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q, d),
$$

where $d$ describe the set of all the diagonal vectors which appears in $T a b_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}$. By splitting the index set with respect to the cardinality of the diagonal classes and specializing $q$ at $\zeta$, we obtain

$$
\begin{align*}
& \widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q)=\sum_{d / \# D_{\lambda^{0}, \mu}(d)=1} \widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q, d)+\sum_{d / \# D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)>1} \widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(q, d),  \tag{19}\\
& \widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(\zeta)=\sum_{d / \# D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)=1} \widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(\zeta, d)+\sum_{d / \# D_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(d)>1} \widetilde{I}_{\lambda^{\circ}, \mu}(\zeta, d) . \tag{20}
\end{align*}
$$

Using the result of corollary 2, we conclude that the first factor of the equation 20 gives 1 if all the parts of $\mu$ are dvisible by $k$ and 0 otherwise. By proposition 6 , the second factor always gives 0 and we obtain the result.

Now, we are able to give a combinatorial proof of the specialization of Hall-Littlewood functions given in theorem 1 . Let $n$ and $k$ be two positive integers. Let denote by $\Lambda_{p}^{k}$ the set of all partitions of weight $p$ with all parts divisible by $k$. Using results of corollary 7 ,

$$
\begin{align*}
\widetilde{Q}_{n^{k}}^{\prime}(X ; \zeta) & =\sum_{\mu \dashv n k} \widetilde{I}_{((n), \ldots,(n)), \mu}(\zeta) m_{\mu}  \tag{21}\\
& =\sum_{\mu \in \Lambda_{n k}^{k}} m_{\mu}=\sum_{\mu \in \Lambda_{n k}^{k}} p_{k} \circ m_{\mu / k}, \tag{22}
\end{align*}
$$

where $\mu / k$ denote the partition $\left(\frac{\mu_{1}}{k}, \ldots, \frac{\mu_{p}}{k}\right)$. By the linearity of the plethysm, we obtain

$$
\begin{equation*}
\widetilde{Q}_{n^{k}}^{\prime}(X ; \zeta)=p_{k} \circ\left(\sum_{\mu \in \Lambda_{n k}^{k}} m_{\mu / k}\right) \tag{23}
\end{equation*}
$$

and by definition of the complete function, we conclude that

$$
\widetilde{Q}_{n^{k}}^{\prime}(X ; \zeta)=p_{k} \circ h_{n}(X) .
$$

In the rectangular case, the constant $\eta\left(n^{k}\right)$ is equal to

$$
\eta\left(n^{k}\right)=n \sum_{i=1}^{k}(i-1)=\frac{n k(k-1)}{2} .
$$

This implies that $\zeta^{\eta\left(n^{k}\right)}=(-1)^{(k-1) n}$ and the specialization for $Q_{n^{k}}^{\prime}(X ; \zeta)$.
Remark In the case where $\lambda^{\circ}$ is a $k$-tuple of single column partitions $\left(\left(1^{n}\right), \ldots,\left(1^{n}\right)\right)$, there is a similar bijection between $k$-tuples of Young tableaux of shape $\lambda^{\circ}$ and ribbon rigged configurations (see [15]). That permits to prove, with the same method, the following specialisation

$$
Q_{k^{n k}}^{\prime}(X ; \zeta)=(-1)^{(k-1) n} p_{k} \circ e_{n}(X) .
$$

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
