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# Para-tt*-bundles on the tangent bundle of an almost para-complex manifold 

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#### Abstract

In this paper we study para-tt*-bundles $(T M, D, S)$ on the tangent bundle of an almost para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$. We characterise those para- $t t^{*}$-bundles with $\nabla=D+S$ induced by the one-parameter family of connections given by $\nabla^{\theta}=$ $\exp (\theta \tau) \circ \nabla \circ \exp (-\theta \tau)$ and prove a uniqueness result for solutions with a paracomplex connection $D$. Flat nearly para-Kähler manifolds and special para-complex manifolds are shown to be such solutions. We analyse which of these solutions admit metric or symplectic para- $t t^{*}$-bundles. Moreover, we give a generalisation of the notion of a para-pluriharmonic map to maps from almost para-complex manifolds ( $M, \tau$ ) into pseudo-Riemannian manifolds and associate to the above metric and symplectic para- $t t^{*}$-bundles generalised para-pluriharmonic maps into $\operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$, respectively into $S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$, where $U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ is the paracomplex analogue of the unitary group.

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## 1 Introduction

The subject of this work are para- $t t^{*}$-bundles $(T M, D, S)$ on the tangent bundle an almost para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$ as base. We generalise the results of the complex geometric setting which can be found in [S3]. In previous work we always supposed a para-complex base manifold. Motivated by the study of the complex case we admit non-integrable para-complex structures, since Levi-Civita flat nearly para-Kähler manifolds arise in this way as solutions of para- $t t^{*}$-bundles. Nearly para-Kähler manifolds as analogue of nearly Kähler manifolds were introduced in a recent paper of Ivanov and Zamkovoy [IZ]. A further class of solutions is given by special para-Kähler manifolds which were studied in [S2]. These geometries arise as one of the special geometries of Euclidean supersymmetry in [CMMS]. This means that para- $t t^{*}$-bundles can be seen as a common generalisation of these two geometries and give a kind of duality between them.
Now we discuss the structure of the paper. First we introduce the notion of (metric, symplectic) para- $t t^{*}$-bundles and describe these in terms of explicit geometric data. Part of this data is a family of flat connections $D^{\theta}$ on a vector bundle $E$ with $\theta \in \mathbb{R}$ which is defined with help of a second connection $D$ and a field $S \in \Gamma\left(T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(E)\right)$. Given an almost para-complex manifold endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$ we can consider a natural family of flat connections defined by

\nabla^{\theta}=\exp (\theta \tau) \circ \nabla \circ \exp (-\theta \tau) \text { for } \theta \in \mathbb{R}
$$

We analyse para- $t t^{*}$-bundles, such that $D^{\theta}=\nabla^{\alpha \theta}$ for some $\alpha \in \mathbb{R}$. This choice is motivated by the study of solutions coming from special para-Kähler geometry.

If we restrict to para- $t t^{*}$-bundles carrying connections $D$ which are para-complex, i.e. which satisfy $D \tau=0$, then these para- $t t^{*}$-bundles can be recovered uniquely from the pair $(\nabla, \tau)$. Moreover, we give compatibility conditions on the pair $(\nabla, \tau)$. These conditions hold for special para-complex and nearly para-Kähler manifolds. We discuss two classes of solutions: The first corresponds to special para-complex manifolds with torsion and the second to almost para-complex manifolds endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$ such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ satisfies the nearly para-Kähler condition (with torsion). Further we study whether these para- $t t^{*}$-bundles provide metric or symplectic para- $t t^{*}$-bundles. Examples of solutions of the first type are given by special para-Kähler manifolds and solutions of the second type arise on Levi-Civita flat nearly para-Kähler manifolds. In addition we show that neither the special para-Kähler condition is compatible with symplectic para$t t^{*}$-bundles nor the nearly para-Kähler condition is compatible with solutions of metric para- $t t^{*}$-bundles.
There exists a relation between para-pluriharmonic maps and para- $t t^{*}$-geometry which was studied in [S2]. In this work we generalise the notion of a para-pluriharmonic map to maps from almost para-complex manifolds into pseudo-Riemannian manifolds. Then we introduce $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic maps which generalise $\mathbb{S}^{1}$-pluriharmonic maps (cf. [S3]) to para-complex geometry. This is a generalisation of the notion of associated families (see for example $[\mathrm{ET}]$ ). We relate these $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic maps to the generalisation of parapluriharmonic maps and prove a result, which relates generalised para-pluriharmonic maps to harmonic maps. With these preparations we are able to associate para-pluriharmonic maps into $\operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$, respectively into $S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$, to the above metric and symplectic para- $t t^{*}$-bundles. Here $U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ is the para-complex analogue of the unitary group.
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## 2 Para-complex differential geometry

In this section we recall facts of para-complex differential geometry, which are needed in the later work. For more information we refer to [CMMS, IZ].

Definition 1 A para-complex structure on a real finite dimensional vector space $V$ is a non-trivial involution $\tau \in \operatorname{End}(V)$ such that the two eigenspaces $V^{ \pm}:=\operatorname{ker}(I d \mp \tau)$ to the eigenvalues $\pm 1$ of $\tau$ have the same dimension. We call the pair $(V, \tau)$ a para-complex vector-space.
An almost para-complex structure on a smooth manifold $M$ is an endomorphism field $\tau \in \Gamma(\operatorname{End}(T M))$ such that, for all $p \in M, \tau_{p}$ is a para-complex structure on $T_{p} M$. It is called integrable if the distributions $T^{ \pm} M=\operatorname{ker}(I d \mp \tau)$ are integrable. An integrable almost para-complex structure on $M$ is called a para-complex structure on M and a manifold $M$ endowed with a para-complex structure is called a para-complex manifold.

The integrability of a para-complex structure is obstructed (cf. [CMMS]) by the vanishing of a tensor, also called Nijenhuis tensor, which is defined as

N_{\tau}(X, Y):=[X, Y]+[\tau X, \tau Y]-\tau[X, \tau Y]-\tau[\tau X, Y] .
$$

The decomposition of the tangent bundle of an (almost) para-complex manifold M into the eigenspaces $T^{ \pm} M$ extends to a bi-grading on the exterior algebra:

$$
\begin{equation*}
\Lambda^{k} T^{*} M=\bigoplus_{k=p+q} \Lambda^{p+, q-} T^{*} M \tag{2.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

and induces an obvious bi-grading on exterior forms with values in a vector bundle $E$.
The para-complex numbers are the real algebra, which is generated by 1 and by the paracomplex unit $e$ with $e^{2}=1$. We denote the para-complex numbers by the symbol $C$.
For all $z=x+e y \in C$ with $x, y \in \mathbb{R}$ we define the para-complex conjugation ${ }^{-}: C \rightarrow$ $C, x+e y \mapsto x-e y$ and the real and imaginary parts of $z$ by

$$
\Re(z):=\frac{z+\bar{z}}{2}=x, \Im(z):=\frac{e(z-\bar{z})}{2}=y .
$$

The free $C$-module $C^{n}$ is a para-complex vector space where its para-complex structure is the multiplication with e and the para-complex conjugation of $C$ extends to ${ }^{-}: C^{n} \rightarrow C^{n}$, $v \mapsto \bar{v}$.
Note the identity $z \bar{z}=x^{2}-y^{2}$. Therefore the algebra $C$ is sometimes called the hypercomplex numbers. The circle $\mathbb{S}^{1}=\left\{z=x+i y \in \mathbb{C} \mid x^{2}+y^{2}=1\right\}$ is replaced by the four hyperbolas $\left\{z=x+e y \in C \mid x^{2}-y^{2}= \pm 1\right\}$. $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$ is defined to be the hyperbola given by the one parameter group $\{z(\theta)=\cosh (\theta)+e \sinh (\theta) \mid \theta \in \mathbb{R}\}$.
The para-complex dimension of a para-complex manifold M is the integer $n=\operatorname{dim}_{C} M:=$ $\frac{1}{2} \operatorname{dim}_{\mathbb{R}} M$.
Now we consider the para-complexification $T M^{C}=T M \otimes_{\mathbb{R}} C$ of the tangent bundle $T M$ of an almost para-complex manifold ( $M, \tau$ ) and extend $\tau: T M \rightarrow T M C$-linearly to $\tau: T M^{C} \rightarrow T M^{C}$. Then for all $p \in M$ the free $C$-module $T_{p} M^{C}$ decomposes as $C$-module into the direct sum of two free $C$-modules

$$
\begin{equation*}
T_{p} M^{C}=T_{p}^{1,0} M \oplus T_{p}^{0,1} M \tag{2.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $T_{p}^{1,0} M:=\left\{X+e \tau X \mid X \in T_{p} M\right\}$ and $T_{p}^{0,1} M:=\left\{X-e \tau X \mid X \in T_{p} M\right\}$. The subbundles $T_{p}^{1,0} M$ and $T_{p}^{0,1} M$ can be characterised as the $\pm e$-eigenbundles of the map $\tau: T M^{C} \rightarrow T M^{C}$, i.e. $\tau=e$ on $T^{1,0} M$ and $\tau=-e$ on $T^{0,1} M$.
In the same manner we decompose $T^{*} M^{C}=\Lambda^{1,0} T^{*} M \oplus \Lambda^{0,1} T^{*} M$ into the $\pm e$-eigenbundles of the dual para-complex structure $\tau^{*}: T^{*} M^{C} \rightarrow T^{*} M^{C}$. This decomposition induces a bi-grading on the $C$-valued exterior forms

$$
\Lambda^{k} T^{*} M^{C}=\bigoplus_{k=p+q} \Lambda^{p, q} T^{*} M
$$

and finally on the $C$-valued differential forms on $M$

$$
\Omega_{C}^{k}(M)=\bigoplus_{k=p+q} \Omega^{p, q}(M)
$$

We remark, that for the case $(1,1)$ and $(1+, 1-)$ the two gradings induced by $\tau$ coincide in following sense: $\Lambda^{1,1} T^{*} M=\left(\Lambda^{1+, 1-} T^{*} M\right) \otimes C$.
We need to introduce some additional notions.

Definition 2 Let $(V, \tau)$ be a para-complex vector space. A para-hermitian scalar product $g$ on $V$ is a pseudo-Euclidean scalar product for which $\tau$ is an anti-isometry, i.e.

$$
\tau^{*} g=g(\tau \cdot, \tau \cdot)=-g(\cdot, \cdot)
$$

A para-hermitian vector space $(V, \tau, g)$ is a para-complex vector space $(V, \tau)$ endowed with a para-hermitian scalar product $g$. The pair $(\tau, g)$ is called para-hermitian structure on the vector space $V$.

Definition 3 Let $(V, \tau, g)$ be a para-hermitian vector space. The para-unitary group of $V$ is the automorphism group

$$
U^{\pi}(V):=\operatorname{Aut}(V, \tau, g)=\left\{L \in G L(V) \mid[L, \tau]=0 \text { and } L^{*} g=g\right\} .
$$

Definition $4 \quad A n$ almost para-hermitian manifold $(M, \tau, g)$ is an almost para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$ endowed with a pseudo-Riemannian metric $g$ such that $\tau^{*} g=-g$. If $\tau$ is integrable, we call $(M, \tau, g)$ a para-hermitian manifold. The two-form $\omega:=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot)$ is called the fundamental two-form of the almost para-hermitian manifold $(M, \tau, g)$.

## 3 Para- $t t^{*}$-bundles

We generalise the notion of a para- $t t^{*}$-bundle which was introduced in [S2], by admitting a base manifold $(M, \tau)$ with a non-integrable para-complex structure $\tau$. In this way nearly para-Kähler manifolds appear as solutions of para- $t t^{*}$-geometry on the tangent bundle $T M$. Further we introduce symplectic para- $t t^{*}$-bundles.

Definition $5 \quad A$ para- $t t^{*}$-bundle or $p t t^{*}$-bundle $(E, D, S)$ over an almost para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$ is a real vector bundle $E \rightarrow M$ endowed with a connection $D$ and a section $S \in \Gamma\left(T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End} E\right)$ which satisfy the $p t t^{*}$-equation

$$
\begin{equation*}
R^{\theta}=0 \quad \text { for all } \quad \theta \in \mathbb{R}, \tag{3.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $R^{\theta}$ is the curvature tensor of the connection $D^{\theta}$ defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
D_{X}^{\theta}:=D_{X}+\cosh (\theta) S_{X}+\sinh (\theta) S_{\tau X} \quad \text { for all } \quad X \in T M \tag{3.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

$A$ metric $p t t^{*}$-bundle $(E, D, S, g)$ is a $p t t^{*}$-bundle $(E, D, S)$ endowed with a possibly indefinite $D$-parallel fiber metric $g$ such that for all $p \in M$

$$
\begin{equation*}
g\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)=g\left(Y, S_{X} Z\right) \quad \text { for all } \quad X, Y, Z \in T_{p} M \tag{3.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

A symplectic $p t t^{*}$-bundle $(E, D, S, \omega)$ is a ptt*-bundle $(E, D, S)$ endowed with the structure of a symplectic vector bundle ${ }^{1}(E, \omega)$, such that $\omega$ is $D$-parallel and $S$ is $\omega$-symmetric, i.e. for all $p \in M$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\omega\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)=\omega\left(Y, S_{X} Z\right) \quad \text { for all } \quad X, Y, Z \in T_{p} M \tag{3.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

## Remark 1

If $(E, D, S)$ is a ptt*-bundle then $\left(E, D, S^{\theta}\right)$ is a ptt*-bundle for all $\theta \in \mathbb{R}$, where

$$
\begin{equation*}
S^{\theta}:=D^{\theta}-D=\cosh (\theta) S+\sinh (\theta) S_{\tau} \tag{3.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

The same remark applies to metric ptt*-bundles and symplectic ptt*-bundles.
Like for $p t t^{*}$-bundles $(E, D, S)$ over a para-complex manifold we find explicit equations for $D$ and $S$.

Proposition 1 Let $E$ be a real vector bundle over an almost para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$ endowed with a connection $D$ and a section $S \in \Gamma\left(T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End} E\right)$.
Then $(E, D, S)$ is a ptt*-bundle if and only if $D$ and $S$ satisfy the following equations:

$$
\begin{align*}
& R^{D}+S \wedge S=0,  \tag{3.6}\\
& S \wedge S \text { is of type }(1,1),  \tag{3.7}\\
& {\left[D_{X}, S_{Y}\right]-\left[D_{Y}, S_{X}\right]-S_{[X, Y]}=0, \quad \forall X, Y \in \Gamma(T M),}  \tag{3.8}\\
& {\left[D_{X}, S_{\tau Y}\right]-\left[D_{Y}, S_{\tau X}\right]-S_{\tau[X, Y]}=0, \quad \forall X, Y \in \Gamma(T M)} \tag{3.9}
\end{align*}
$$

Fixing a torsion-free connection on $(M, \tau)$ the last two equations are equivalent to

$$
\begin{equation*}
d^{D} S=0 \quad \text { and } \quad d^{D} S_{\tau}=0 \tag{3.10}
\end{equation*}
$$

Proof: (compare [S2]) As for $p t t^{*}$-bundles over para-complex manifolds ( $M, \tau$ ) one calculates using the theorems of addition $2 \cosh (\theta) \sinh (\theta)=\sinh (2 \theta), 2 \cosh ^{2}(\theta)=1+\cosh (2 \theta)$ and $2 \sinh ^{2}(\theta)=\cosh (2 \theta)-1$, the (finite) decomposition of $R^{\theta}$ in $1, \cosh (n \theta)$ and $\sinh (n \theta)$, for $n=1,2$. The $p t t^{*}$-equation $R^{\theta}=0$ is equivalent to the vanishing of all components. This yields the claimed equations.

## 4 Solutions on the tangent bundle of an almost paracomplex manifold

In this section we consider para-complex manifolds $(M, \tau)$ endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$. It is natural to regard the one-parameter family of connections $\nabla^{\theta}$, which is defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\nabla_{X}^{\theta} Y=\exp (\theta \tau) \nabla_{X}(\exp (-\theta \tau) Y) \text { for } X, Y \in \Gamma(T M) \tag{4.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\exp (\theta \tau)=\cosh (\theta) I d+\sinh (\theta) \tau$. The connection $\nabla$ is flat if and only if $\nabla^{\theta}$ is flat.
Definition 6 Two one-parameter families of connections $\nabla^{\theta}$ and $D^{\theta}$, with $\theta \in \mathbb{R}$, on some vector bundle $E$ are called (linear) equivalent with factor $\alpha \in \mathbb{R}$ if they satisfy the equation $\nabla^{\theta}=D^{\alpha \theta}$.

In the sequel we study $p t t^{*}$-bundles $(T M, D, S)$ such that the connection $D^{\theta}$ defined in equation (3.2) is linear equivalent to the connection $\nabla^{\theta}$ defined in equation (4.1). This ansatz is motivated by our previous study of $p t t^{*}$-bundles coming from special paracomplex and special para-Kähler manifolds (see [S2]).

Proposition 2 Given an almost para-complex manifold ( $M, \tau$ ) with a flat connection $\nabla$. Then a decomposition of $\nabla=D+S$ in a connection $D$ and a section $S$ in $T^{*} M \otimes$ End (TM) defines a ptt*-bundle ( $T M, D, S$ ), such that the family of connections $D^{\theta}$ is linear equivalent to the family of connections $\nabla^{\theta}$ with factor $\alpha= \pm 2$ if and only if $S$ and D satisfy

$$
S_{\tau X}= \pm \tau S_{X} Y
$$

and

$$
-\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y=\tau S_{X} Y+S_{X} \tau Y=:\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\} Y
$$

for all $X, Y \in \Gamma(T M)$.
Proof: One has to compute $\nabla^{\theta}$ for $X, Y \in \Gamma(T M)$ :

$$
\begin{aligned}
\nabla_{X}^{\theta} Y & \left.=\exp (\theta \tau)\left(D_{X}+S_{X}\right)(\cosh (\theta) I d-\sinh (\theta) \tau) Y\right) \\
& =D_{X} Y-\exp (\theta \tau) \sinh (\theta)\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y \\
& +(\cosh (\theta) I d+\sinh (\theta) \tau) S_{X}(\cosh (\theta) I d-\sinh (\theta) \tau) Y \\
& =D_{X} Y-\left(\cosh (\theta) \sinh (\theta)+\sinh ^{2}(\theta) \tau\right)\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y+\cosh ^{2}(\theta) S_{X} Y \\
& -\sinh ^{2}(\theta) \tau S_{X} \tau Y-\cosh (\theta) \sinh (\theta)\left[S_{X}, \tau\right] Y .
\end{aligned}
$$

This yields with the theorems of addition, i.e.
$2 \sinh (\theta) \cosh (\theta)=\sinh (2 \theta), \quad 2 \cosh ^{2}(\theta)=1+\cosh (2 \theta) \quad$ and $\quad 2 \sinh ^{2}(\theta)=\cosh (2 \theta)-1$, the identity

$$
\begin{aligned}
\nabla_{X}^{\theta} Y & =D_{X} Y-\frac{1}{2} \sinh (2 \theta)\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y-\frac{1}{2}(\cosh (2 \theta)-1) \tau\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y \\
& +\frac{1}{2}(1+\cosh (2 \theta)) S_{X} Y-\frac{1}{2}(\cosh (2 \theta)-1) \tau S_{X} \tau Y-\frac{1}{2} \sinh (2 \theta)\left[S_{X}, \tau\right] Y \\
& =D_{X} Y+\frac{1}{2}\left[S_{X}+\tau S_{X} \tau+\tau D_{X} \tau\right] Y \\
& +\frac{1}{2} \sinh (2 \theta)\left[\left[\tau, S_{X}\right]-D_{X} \tau\right] Y \\
& +\frac{1}{2} \cosh (2 \theta)\left[S_{X}-\tau S_{X} \tau-\tau D_{X} \tau\right] Y \\
& \stackrel{!}{=} D_{X} Y+\cosh (\vartheta) T_{X} Y+\sinh (\vartheta) T_{\tau X} Y \text { with } \vartheta= \pm 2 \theta
\end{aligned}
$$

where we have to determine $T \in \Gamma\left(T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)\right)$.
Comparing coefficients of $1, \cosh (2 \theta), \sinh (2 \theta)$ gives

$$
\begin{align*}
-\tau\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y & =S_{X} Y+\tau S_{X} \tau Y, \text { or equivalentely }  \tag{4.2}\\
-\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y & =\tau S_{X} Y+S_{X} \tau Y=\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\} Y, \\
T_{X} Y & =\frac{1}{2}\left(S_{X} Y-\tau S_{X} \tau Y-\tau\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y\right) \stackrel{(4.2)}{=} S_{X} Y,  \tag{4.3}\\
T_{\tau X} Y & = \pm \frac{1}{2}\left(\left[\tau, S_{X}\right] Y-\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y\right) \\
& \stackrel{(4.2)}{=} \pm \frac{1}{2}\left(\tau S_{X} Y-S_{X} \tau Y+\tau S_{X} Y+S_{X} \tau Y\right)= \pm \tau S_{X} Y . \tag{4.4}
\end{align*}
$$

The constraint on $S$ follows from the last two equations, i.e.

$$
S_{\tau X}= \pm \tau S_{X} Y
$$

and the one on $D$ and $S$ from the first equation.

We further specialise to para-complex connections $D$, i.e. connections $D$ satisfying the identity $D \tau=0$. The existence of such connections was provided by Theorem 1 of [S2].

Corollary 1 Let $(M, \tau)$ be an almost para-complex manifold endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$ and let $\nabla=D+S$ be a given decomposition in a connection $D$ and a section $S$ in $T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)$, such that $\tau$ is $D$-parallel. Then $(T M, D, S)$ defines a ptt*-bundle, such that the family of connections $D^{\theta}$ is linear equivalent to the family of connections $\nabla^{\theta}$ with factor $\alpha= \pm 2$ if and only if $S$ satisfies

$$
S_{\tau X}= \pm \tau S_{X} \text { and }\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\}=0
$$

Proof: The second condition in proposition 2 yields using $D \tau=0$ the equation $\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\}=$ 0. The first constraint of proposition 2 remains $S_{\tau X}= \pm \tau S_{X} \stackrel{\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\}=0}{=} \mp S_{X} \tau$.

To establish a uniqueness result we need the next lemma.
Lemma 1 Let $(M, \tau)$ be an almost para-complex manifold. Let a connection $\nabla$ on $M$ be given. Then the connection $D$ and the section $S$ of $T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)$ defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S_{X} Y=-\frac{1}{2} \tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y \text { and } D_{X} Y=\nabla_{X} Y-S_{X} Y \text { for } X, Y \in \Gamma(T M) \tag{4.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

satisfy $D \tau=0$ and $\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\}=0$.
Otherwise, suppose that $\nabla$ decomposes as $\nabla=D+S$, where $D$ is a connection on $M$ and $S$ is a section in $T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)$, such that $\tau$ is $D$-parallel, i.e. $D \tau=0$ and $S$ anti-commutes with $\tau$, i.e. $\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\}=0$ for all $X \in \Gamma(T M)$. Then $D$ and $S$ are uniquely given by equation (4.5).

Proof: We check $\nabla=D+S$ and $S_{X} \tau Y=-\frac{1}{2} \tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) \tau Y=\frac{1}{2} \tau^{2}\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y=-\tau S_{X} Y$, where the second equality follows from deriving $\tau^{2}=I d$. In addition it is

$$
\left(D_{X} \tau\right) Y=\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y-\left[S_{X}, \tau\right] \stackrel{\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\}=0}{=}\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y+2 \tau S_{X}=0
$$

It rests to show the uniqueness: One starts with $D^{\prime}$ and $S^{\prime}$ having same properties and computes

$$
0=\left(D_{X}^{\prime} \tau\right) Y=\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y-\left[S_{X}^{\prime}, \tau\right] Y=\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y+2 \tau S_{X}^{\prime} Y
$$

This further implies

$$
S_{X}^{\prime} Y=-\frac{1}{2} \tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y=S_{X} Y \text { and } D_{X}^{\prime} Y=\nabla_{X} Y-S_{X}^{\prime} Y=\nabla_{X} Y-S_{X} Y=D_{X} Y
$$

Corollary 1 and lemma 1 imply the following uniqueness result:

Theorem 1 Let $(M, \tau)$ be an almost para-complex manifold endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$. If a decomposition of $\nabla=D+S$ in a connection $D$ and a section $S$ in $T^{*} M \otimes$ End (TM), such that $\tau$ is $D$-parallel, i.e. $D \tau=0$, defines a ptt*-bundle $(T M, D, S)$, such that the family of connections $D^{\theta}$ is linear equivalent to the the family of connections $\nabla^{\theta}$ with factor $\alpha= \pm 2$, then $D$ and $S$ are uniquely determined by the equations $S=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau)$ and $D=\nabla-S$.
Moreover, $(T M, D, S)$ as above defines a ptt*-bundle, such that the family of connections $D^{\theta}$ is linear equivalent to the family of connections $\nabla^{\theta}$ with factor $\alpha= \pm 2$, if and only if $\tau$ satisfies $\left(\nabla_{\tau X} \tau\right)= \pm \tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right)$ and $D$ and $S$ are given by equation (4.5).

Some classes of examples which satisfy the condition $S_{\tau X}= \pm \tau S_{X}$ are given in the following propositions.

Proposition 3 Let an almost para-complex manifold ( $M, \tau$ ) endowed with a connection $\nabla$ be given and let $S$ be the section in $T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)$ defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S:=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau) \tag{4.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

If the pair $(\nabla, \tau)$ satisfies one of the following conditions
(i) $(\nabla, \tau)$ is special, i.e. $\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y=\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) X$ for all $X, Y \in \Gamma(T M)$,
(ii) $(\nabla, \tau)$ satisfies the nearly para-Kähler condition, i.e. $\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y=-\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) X$ for all $X, Y \in \Gamma(T M)$,
then it holds $S_{\tau X} Y=-\tau S_{X} Y$.
Proof: We prove (i) and (ii) in the same calculation:

$$
\left(\nabla_{\tau X} \tau\right) Y= \pm\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) \tau X=\mp \tau\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) X=-\tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y
$$

This implies $S_{\tau X} Y=-\frac{1}{2} \tau\left(\nabla_{\tau X} \tau\right) Y=\frac{1}{2} \tau^{2}\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y=-\tau S_{X} Y$.

Proposition 4 Let a para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$ endowed with a connection $\nabla$ be given and let $S$ be the section in $T^{*} M \otimes$ End (TM) defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S:=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau) . \tag{4.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

If $\nabla$ is (anti-)adapted, i.e. $\nabla_{\tau X}= \pm \tau \nabla_{X} Y$ for all para-holomorphic vector-fields $X, Y$, then it holds $S_{\tau X} Y= \pm \tau S_{X} Y$.

Proof: Since the connection $\nabla$ is (anti-)adapted, we obtain for all para-holomorphic vector-fields $X, Y$ :

$$
\left(\nabla_{\tau X} \tau\right) Y= \pm \tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y
$$

The following computation finishes the proof

$$
S_{\tau X} Y=-\frac{1}{2} \tau\left(\nabla_{\tau X} \tau\right) Y=\mp \frac{1}{2} \tau^{2}\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y= \pm \tau S_{X} Y .
$$

Remark 2 One observes that in proposition 3 the condition (i) is the symmetry of $S_{X} Y$ and condition (ii) is its anti-symmetry. We recall that if the connection $\nabla$ is torsion-free, flat and special then $(M, \tau, \nabla)$ is a special para-complex manifold, see [CMMS, S2]. Ptt*bundles coming from special para-complex manifolds and special para-Kähler manifolds were studied in [S2].
Moreover we remark, that the second condition arises in nearly para-Kählerian geometry (compare [IZ]) and therefore is quite natural. These geometries as solutions of ptt*geometry are discussed later in this work.
Finally, the notion of adapted connections appeared in the study of decompositions on (para-holomorphic) para-complex vector bundles, compare [LS].

## 5 Solutions on almost para-hermitian manifolds

In this section we study the question under which assumptions almost para-complex manifolds $(M, \tau)$ endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$ such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ is special or satisfies the nearly para-Kähler condition define symplectic or metric $p t t^{*}$-bundles.

First we recall a lemma from tensor-algebra:
Lemma 2 Let $V$ be a vector-space and $\alpha \in T^{3}\left(V^{*}\right)$ an element in the third tensorial power of $V^{*}$, the dual space of $V$. Suppose that $\alpha(X, Y, Z)$ is symmetric (resp. antisymmetric) in $X, Y$ and $Y, Z$ and $\alpha(X, Y, Z)$ is anti-symmetric (resp. symmetric) in $X, Z$ then $\alpha=0$.

Proof: It is $\alpha(X, Y, Z)=\epsilon \alpha(Y, X, Z)=\epsilon \alpha(X, Z, Y)$ with $\epsilon \in\{ \pm 1\}$ which implies $\alpha(X, Y, Z)=\epsilon \alpha(Y, X, Z)=\epsilon^{2} \alpha(Y, Z, X)=\epsilon^{3} \alpha(Z, Y, X)$. But further it holds $\alpha(X, Y, Z)=$ $-\epsilon \alpha(Z, Y, X)$ and consequently $-\alpha(Z, Y, X)=\epsilon^{2} \alpha(Z, Y, X)=\alpha(Z, Y, X)$. This shows $\alpha=0$.

Proposition 5 Let $(M, \tau)$ be an almost para-complex manifold endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$, such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ is special. Define $S$, a section in $T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)$, by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S:=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau) \tag{5.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

then $(T M, D=\nabla-S, S)$ defines a $p t t^{*}$-bundle. If in addition $(T M, D, S, \omega)$ is a symplectic ptt*-bundle, then it is trivial, i.e. $S=0$.

Proof: Due to theorem 1 and proposition $3(T M, D, S)$ is a $p t t^{*}$-bundle.
Suppose, that $(T M, D, S, \omega)$ is a symplectic $p t t^{*}$-bundle. In order to prove the second part of the proposition, we define the tensor

$$
\alpha(X, Y, Z):=\omega\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)=g\left(\tau S_{X} Y, Z\right)
$$

$\alpha(X, Y, Z)$ is symmetric in $X, Y$, since $(\nabla, \tau)$ is special, i.e. $\nabla \tau$ is symmetric in $X, Y$. Moreover, it holds

$$
\begin{aligned}
\alpha(X, Y, Z) & =\omega\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)=-\omega\left(Z, S_{X} Y\right) \\
& =-\omega\left(Z, S_{Y} X\right)=-\omega\left(S_{Y} Z, X\right)=-\omega\left(S_{Z} Y, X\right)=-\alpha(Z, Y, X) .
\end{aligned}
$$

This is the anti-symmetry of $\alpha(X, Y, Z)$ in $X, Z$. Finally we compute

$$
\begin{aligned}
\alpha(X, Y, Z) & =\omega\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)=\omega\left(Y, S_{X} Z\right) \\
& =\omega\left(Y, S_{Z} X\right)=-\omega\left(S_{Z} X, Y\right)=-\alpha(Z, X, Y)=-\alpha(X, Z, Y),
\end{aligned}
$$

i.e. the anti-symmetry of $\alpha(X, Y, Z)$ in $Y, Z$.

Hence $\alpha$ vanishes and consequently $S$ is zero.
Proposition 6 Let an almost para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$ endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$, such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ satisfies the nearly para-Kähler condition be given. Define $S$, a section $S$ in $T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)$, by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S:=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau), \tag{5.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

then $(T M, D=\nabla-S, S)$ defines a ptt*-bundle. Suppose, that $(T M, D, S, g)$ is a metric ptt*-bundle, then it is trivial, i.e. $S=0$.

Proof: Due to theorem 1 and proposition $3(T M, D, S)$ is a $p t t^{*}$-bundle.
Suppose, that it is a metric $p t t^{*}$-bundle. The proof is obtained by analysing the symmetries of the tensor

$$
\alpha(X, Y, Z):=g\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)
$$

$\alpha(X, Y, Z)$ is anti-symmetric in $X, Y$, since by the nearly para-Kähler condition $\nabla \tau$ is anti-symmetric in $X, Y$. In addition it holds

$$
\begin{aligned}
\alpha(X, Y, Z) & =g\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)=g\left(Z, S_{X} Y\right) \\
& =-g\left(Z, S_{Y} X\right)=-g\left(S_{Y} Z, X\right)=g\left(S_{Z} Y, X\right)=\alpha(Z, Y, X)
\end{aligned}
$$

which is the symmetry of $\alpha(X, Y, Z)$ in $X, Z$. Finally one has

$$
\begin{aligned}
\alpha(X, Y, Z) & =g\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)=g\left(Y, S_{X} Z\right) \\
& =-g\left(Y, S_{Z} X\right)=-g\left(S_{Z} X, Y\right)=-\alpha(Z, X, Y)=\alpha(X, Z, Y)
\end{aligned}
$$

i.e. the symmetry of $\alpha(X, Y, Z)$ in $Y, Z$.

Hence $\alpha$ vanishes by the above lemma and so does $S$.

The following theorem gives solutions of symplectic para- $t t^{*}$-bundles on the tangent bundle, which are more general then the later discussed nearly para-Kähler manifolds in the sense, that we admit the connection $\nabla$ to have torsion, but more special in the sense, that our connection $\nabla$ has to be flat.

Theorem 2 Let $(M, \tau, g)$ be an almost para-hermitian manifold endowed with a flat metric connection $\nabla$, such that the pair $(\nabla, \tau)$ satisfies the nearly para-Kähler condition. Define $S$, a section in $T^{*} M \otimes$ End (TM), by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S:=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau) \tag{5.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

then $(T M, D=\nabla-S, S, \omega=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot))$ defines a symplectic ptt*-bundle.
The torsion $T^{\nabla}$ of the connection $\nabla$ and $T^{D}$ of the connection $D$ are related by

$$
T^{\nabla}-T^{D}=2 S
$$

and it holds $D \tau=0$.

Proof: Due to theorem 1 and proposition $3(T M, D, S)$ is a $p t t^{*}$-bundle.
It remains to check $D \omega=0$ and that $S$ is $\omega$-symmetric.
We observe, that, as $g$ is para-hermitian and $\nabla g=0, \nabla_{X} \tau$ is skew-symmetric with respect to $g$. This yields by the following calculation, that $S$ is skew-symmetric with respect to $g$ :

$$
\begin{aligned}
-2 g\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right) & =g\left(\tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y, Z\right)=-g\left(\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y, \tau Z\right) \\
& =g\left(Y,\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) \tau Z\right)=-g\left(Z, \tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y\right)=2 g\left(Y, S_{X} Z\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

The definition of $\omega=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot)$ and $\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\}=0$ yield the $\omega$-symmetry of $S_{X}$.
Further it holds $D=\nabla+\frac{1}{2} \tau \nabla \tau$, which implies

$$
D \tau=\nabla \tau+\frac{1}{2}[\tau \nabla \tau, \tau]=0
$$

This shows $D \omega=0$ if and only if $D g=0$. But $\nabla g=0$ and $S$ is skew-symmetric with respect to $g$, so $g$ is parallel for $D=\nabla-S$.
This shows that ( $T M, D=\nabla-S, S, \omega$ ) is a symplectic $p t t^{*}$-bundle.
From $\nabla=D+S$ we obtain for the torsions

$$
T^{\nabla}(X, Y)=T^{D}(X, Y)+S_{X} Y-S_{Y} X=T^{D}(X, Y)+2 S_{X} Y
$$

We recall the definition of special para-complex and special para-Kähler manifolds (see [CMMS, S2]):

Definition 7 A special para-Kähler manifold consists of the data $(M, \tau, g, \nabla)$ where $(M, \tau, g)$ is a para-Kähler manifold with $\nabla$-parallel para-Kähler form and $(M, \tau, \nabla)$ is a special para-complex manifold, i.e. $(M, \tau)$ is a para-complex manifold endowed with a flat and torsion-free connection $\nabla$ such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ is special.

The next theorem gives solutions of metric para- $t t^{*}$-bundles on the tangent bundle, which are more general then special para-Kähler manifolds in the sense, that we admit connections $\nabla$ with torsion.

Theorem 3 Let an almost para-hermitian manifold ( $M, \tau, g$ ) endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$ be given. Suppose that $(\nabla, \tau)$ is special and the two-form $\omega=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot)$ is $\nabla$ parallel. Define $S$, a section in $T^{*} M \otimes$ End (TM), by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S:=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau), \tag{5.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

then $(T M, D=\nabla-S, S, g)$ defines a metric ptt*-bundle. Moreover, the connections $D$ and $\nabla$ have the same torsion and we have $D \tau=0$.
If in addition $\nabla$ is torsion-free, then $D$ is the Levi-Civita connection of $g,(M, \tau, g)$ is a para-Kähler manifold and $(M, \tau, g, \nabla)$ is a special para-Kähler manifold.

Proof: Due to theorem 1 and proposition $3(T M, D, S)$ defines a $p t t^{*}$-bundle.
It remains to prove $D g=0$ and that $S$ is $g$-symmetric.
First we remark that $\omega(\tau X, Y)=-\omega(X, \tau Y)$ as $g$ is para-hermitian. This implies by $\nabla \omega=0$ the $\omega$-skew-symmetry of $\nabla_{X} \tau$, which yields that $S_{X}=-\frac{1}{2} \tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right)$ is $\omega$-skewsymmetric, since $\tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right)=-\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) \tau$. Finally $\left\{S_{X}, \tau\right\}=0$ shows the $g$-symmetry of $S_{X}$. Moreover, we compute

$$
D \tau=\nabla \tau+\frac{1}{2}[\tau \nabla \tau, \tau]=0
$$

and consequently $D g=0$ is equivalent to $D \omega=0$.
From $\nabla \omega=0$ and the $\omega$-skew-symmetry of $S$ it follows $D \omega=(\nabla-S) \omega=0$.
From the symmetry of $\nabla \tau$, i.e. $\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y=\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) X$ for all $X, Y \in T M$ we obtain $S_{X} Y=S_{Y} X$. This shows, that the torsions of the connections $\nabla$ and $D$ coincide.
Suppose now that $\nabla$ is torsion-free. This implies, that $D=\nabla-S$ is torsion-free and consequently the Levi-Civita-connection of $g$. Further the equation $\nabla \omega=0$ implies $d \omega=0$, since $\nabla$ is torsion-free. As $D \tau=0$ and $D$ is torsion-free, $\tau$ is integrable. Hence ( $M, \tau, g$ ) is para-Kähler. In addition $(M, \tau, \nabla)$ is special para-complex by the conditions on $\nabla$ and $\tau$. Summarising ( $M, \tau, g, \nabla$ ) is a special para-Kähler manifold.
In [S2] we treated special para-Kähler solutions of $p t t^{*}$-geometry in more details.

Now we are going to apply the above results to nearly para-Kähler manifolds. In order to do this we recall the notion of a nearly para-Kähler manifold which was recently introduced by Ivanov and Zamkovoy [IZ].

Definition 8 An almost para-hermitian manifold $(M, \tau, g)$ is called nearly para-Kähler manifold, if its Levi-Civita connection $\nabla=\nabla^{g}$ satisfies the equation

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y=-\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) X, \quad \forall X, Y \in \Gamma(T M) \tag{5.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

A nearly para-Kähler manifold is called strict, if $\nabla \tau \neq 0$.
We recall that the tensor $\nabla \tau$ defines two tensors $A$ and $B$

$$
A(X, Y, Z):=g\left(\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y, Z\right) \text { and } B(X, Y, Z):=g\left(\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y, \tau Z\right) \text { with } X, Y, Z \in T M,
$$

which are both (real) three-forms of type $(3,0)+(0,3)$.
A connection of particular importance in nearly para-Kähler geometry is the connection $\bar{\nabla}$ defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
\bar{\nabla}_{X} Y:=\nabla_{X} Y-\frac{1}{2}\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) \tau Y, \text { for all } X, Y \in \Gamma(T M) . \tag{5.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

We remark, that $\bar{\nabla}$ is the unique connection with totally skew-symmetric torsion satisfying $\bar{\nabla} g=0$ and $\bar{\nabla} \tau=0$ (compare [IZ]).
The torsion of the connection $\bar{\nabla}$ is given by

$$
\begin{equation*}
T^{\bar{\nabla}}(X, Y)=-\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) \tau Y, \text { for all } X, Y \in \Gamma(T M) \tag{5.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

and it vanishes if and only if $(M, \tau, g)$ is a para-Kähler manifold.

Corollary 2 Let $(M, \tau, g)$ be a nearly para-Kähler manifold, such that its Levi-Civita connection $\nabla$ is flat and let $S$ be the section in $T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)$ defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S:=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau) \tag{5.8}
\end{equation*}
$$

then $(T M, \bar{\nabla}, S)$ defines a ptt*-bundle. Suppose, that $(T M, \bar{\nabla}, S, g)$ is a metric ptt*bundle, then it is trivial, i.e. $S=0$ and consequently $(M, \tau, g)$ is para-Kähler.

Proof: If one puts $D=\bar{\nabla}$ we are in the situation of proposition 6 .

Remark 3 In common work with V. Cortés [CS2] we gave a constructive classification of flat nearly pseudo-Kähler manifolds. The application of the methods of [CS2] to nearly para-Kähler manifolds is work in progress [CS3].

Theorem 4 Let $(M, \tau, g)$ be a nearly para-Kähler manifold, such that its Levi-Civita connection $\nabla$ is flat. Let $S$ be the section in $T^{*} M \otimes \operatorname{End}(T M)$ defined by

$$
\begin{equation*}
S:=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau) \tag{5.9}
\end{equation*}
$$

then $(T M, \bar{\nabla}, S, \omega:=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot))$ is a symplectic ptt*-bundle. Further it holds

$$
\begin{equation*}
B(X, Y, Z)=2 g\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right) \text { and } \bar{\nabla} \tau=0 \tag{5.10}
\end{equation*}
$$

Proof: By setting $D=\bar{\nabla}$ we are in the situation of theorem 2. In addition it holds

$$
2 g\left(S_{X} Y, Z\right)=-g\left(\tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y, Z\right)=g\left(\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y, \tau Z\right)=B(X, Y, Z)
$$

## 6 Para-pluriharmonic maps from almost para-complex manifolds into pseudo-Riemannian manifolds

In this section we generalise the notion of a para-pluriharmonic map to maps from almost para-complex manifolds to pseudo-Riemannian manifolds and we introduce the para-complex analogue of an associated family (compare [ET] for the complex setting). Afterwards we show that maps admitting the para-complex analogue of an associated family give rise to a para-pluriharmonic map and we give conditions under which a parapluriharmonic map is harmonic.
Let $(M, \tau)$ be an almost para-complex manifold of real dimension $2 n$. In complex geometry it is well-known (compare $[\mathrm{KN}]$ ) that on every almost complex manifold $(M, J)$ there exists a connection with torsion $T=\frac{1}{4} N_{J}$ where $N_{J}$ is the Nijenhuis tensor of the complex struture $J$. This result was generalised to para-complex geometry in Theorem 1 of [S2], which states that on an almost para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$ there exists a para-complex connection with torsion $T=-\frac{1}{4} N_{\tau}$ where $N_{\tau}$ is the Nijenhuis tensor of the para-complex struture $\tau$.

Definition 9 Let $(M, \tau)$ be an almost para-complex manifold. A connection $D$ on the tangent bundle of $M$ is called nice if it is para-complex and its torsion $T$ satisfies $T=\lambda N_{\tau}$ with a smooth function $\lambda$ on $M$.

We introduce the notion of a para-pluriharmonic map from an almost para-complex manifold:

Definition 10 Let $(M, \tau, D)$ be an almost para-complex manifold endowed with a nice connection $D$ on $T M$ and $N$ be a smooth manifold endowed with a connection $\nabla^{N}$. Denote by $\nabla$ the connection on $T^{*} M \otimes f^{*} T N$ which is induced by $D$ and $\nabla^{N}$.
A smooth map $f: M \rightarrow N$ is called para-pluriharmonic if and only if it satisfies the equation

$$
\begin{equation*}
(\nabla d f)^{1,1}=0 . \tag{6.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

Remark 4 First we remark, that for a para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$ and a pseudoRiemannian target manifold ( $N, h$ ) with its Levi-Civita connection $\nabla^{h}$ the para-pluriharmonic equation (6.1) does not depend on the connection $D$ if $D$ is chosen in an appropriate class (compare [S2]). In fact nice connections on para-complex manifolds belong to this class. A famous case are para-Kähler manifolds $(M, \tau, g)$, where $D$ is taken to be the Levi-Civita connection.

To deal with associated families of para-pluriharmonic maps we need to recall an integrability condition satisfied by the differential of a smooth map. Denote by $N$ a smooth manifold with a connection $\nabla^{N}$ on its tangent bundle having torsion tensor $T^{N}$. Let a second smooth manifold $M$ and a smooth map $f: M \rightarrow N$ be given. The differential $F:=d f: T M \rightarrow f^{*} T N=E$ of the map $f$ induces a vector bundle homomorphism
between the tangent bundle $T M$ of $M$ and the pull-back of $T N$ via $f$. The bundle homomorphism $T^{E}: \Lambda^{2} E \rightarrow E$ induced by the torsion $T^{N}$ of $N$ satisfies the identity

$$
\begin{equation*}
\nabla_{V}^{E} F(W)-\nabla_{W}^{E} F(V)-F([V, W])=T^{E}(F(V), F(W)) \tag{6.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\nabla^{E}=f^{*} \nabla^{N}$ denotes the pull-back connection, i.e. the connection which is induced on $E$ by $\nabla^{N}$ and where $V, W \in \Gamma(T M)$.
In the rest of this section we denote by $D$ a nice connection on the almost para-complex manifold $(M, \tau)$. Under this assumption we restate the condition (6.2):

$$
\begin{align*}
T^{E}(F(V), F(W)) & =\nabla_{V}^{E} F(W)-\nabla_{W}^{E} F(V)-F([V, W])  \tag{6.3}\\
& =\nabla_{V}^{E} F(W)-\nabla_{W}^{E} F(V) \\
& -F\left(D_{V} W\right)+F\left(D_{W} V\right)+F(T(V, W)) \\
& =\nabla_{V}^{E} F(W)-\nabla_{W}^{E} F(V) \\
& -F\left(D_{V} W\right)+F\left(D_{W} V\right)+\lambda F\left(N_{\tau}(V, W)\right) \\
& =\left(\nabla_{V} F\right) W-\left(\nabla_{W} F\right) V+\lambda F\left(N_{\tau}(V, W)\right),
\end{align*}
$$

where $\nabla$ is the connection induced on $T^{*} M \otimes E$ by $D$ and $\nabla^{E}$.
Later in this work we consider the case where $N$ is a pseudo-Riemannian symmetric space with its Levi-Civita connection $\nabla^{N}$.
Let $\alpha \in \mathbb{R}$ and define $\mathcal{R}_{\alpha}: T M \rightarrow T M$ as

$$
\mathcal{R}_{\alpha}(X)=\cosh (\alpha) X+\sinh (\alpha) \tau X
$$

This is a parallel endomorphism field on the tangent bundle $T M$ of $M$. The eigenvalues of which are seen to be $e^{e \alpha}$ on $T^{1,0} M$ and $e^{-e \alpha}$ on $T^{0,1} M$.
An associated family for $f$ is a family of maps $f_{\alpha}: M \rightarrow N$ with $\alpha \in \mathbb{R}$ and $f_{0}=f$, such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\Phi_{\alpha} \circ d f_{\alpha}=d f \circ \mathcal{R}_{\alpha}, \quad \forall \alpha \in \mathbb{R} \tag{6.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

for some bundle isomorphism $\Phi_{\alpha}: f_{\alpha}^{*} T N \rightarrow f^{*} T N, \alpha \in \mathbb{R}$, which is parallel with respect to $\nabla^{N}$, i.e. $\Phi_{\alpha}$ satisfies

$$
\Phi_{\alpha} \circ\left(f_{\alpha}^{*} \nabla^{N}\right)=\left(f^{*} \nabla^{N}\right) \circ \Phi_{\alpha} .
$$

One can check, that each map $f_{\alpha}$ of an associated family itself admits an associated family.
Theorem 5 Let $(M, \tau)$ be an almost para-complex manifold endowed with a nice connection $D, N$ be a smooth manifold endowed with a torsion-free connection $\nabla^{N}$ and $f:(M, D, \tau) \rightarrow\left(N, \nabla^{N}\right)$ be a smooth map admitting an associated family $f_{\alpha}$, then $f$ is para-pluriharmonic. More precisely, each map of the associated family $f_{\alpha}$ is parapluriharmonic.

Proof: Since $\Phi_{\alpha}$ is parallel with respect to $\nabla^{N}, \nabla^{N}$ is torsion-free and $D$ is nice, we are able to apply equation (6.3) to the family $d f_{\alpha}=F_{\alpha}=\Phi_{\alpha}^{-1} \circ d f \circ \mathcal{R}_{\alpha}$ and find

$$
\left(\nabla_{V} F_{\alpha}\right) W-\left(\nabla_{W} F_{\alpha}\right) V+\lambda F_{\alpha}\left(N_{\tau}(V, W)\right)=0
$$

As $\mathcal{R}_{\alpha}$ is $D$-parallel we obtain

$$
\left(\nabla_{X} F_{\alpha}\right)=\Phi_{\alpha}^{-1} \circ\left(\nabla_{X} F\right) \circ \mathcal{R}_{\alpha}
$$

If $Z=X-e \tau X$ and $W=Y+e \tau Y$ have different type it holds $N_{\tau}(Z, W)=0$, where we extended the Nijenhuis tensor para-complex linearly. This yields

$$
\left(\nabla_{V} F_{\alpha}\right) W=\left(\nabla_{W} F_{\alpha}\right) V, \forall \alpha \in \mathbb{R}
$$

and further we get

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left(\nabla_{Z} F_{\alpha}\right) W & =e^{e \alpha} \Phi_{\alpha}^{-1}\left(\nabla_{Z} F\right) W \\
\left(\nabla_{W} F_{\alpha}\right) Z & =e^{-e \alpha} \Phi_{\alpha}^{-1}\left(\nabla_{W} F\right) Z=e^{-e \alpha} \Phi_{\alpha}^{-1}\left(\nabla_{Z} F\right) W
\end{aligned}
$$

for all $\alpha \in \mathbb{R}$. Since this should coincide, it follows $(\nabla d f)^{(1,1)}=0$, i.e. $f:(M, D, \tau) \rightarrow$ $\left(N, \nabla^{N}\right)$ is para-pluriharmonic. The rest follows, since each map of the associated family $f_{\alpha}$ admits an associated family $g_{\beta}=f_{(\alpha+\beta)}$.

This is the motivation of the following definition:
Definition 11 Let $(M, \tau)$ be an almost para-complex manifold endowed with a nice connection $D, N$ be a smooth manifold endowed with a torsion-free connection $\nabla^{N}$. A smooth map $f:(M, D, \tau) \rightarrow\left(N, \nabla^{N}\right)$ is said to be $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic if and only if it admits an associated family.

Given a para-hermitian metric $g$ on $M$ then in general a nice connection $D$ is not the Levi-Civita connection $\nabla^{g}$ of $g$. Therefore the para-pluriharmonic equation (6.1) does not imply the harmonicity of $f$. If in addition the tensor $D-\nabla^{g}$ is trace-free the parapluriharmonic equation implies the harmonic equation. This is true in the case of a special para-Kähler manifold $(M, \tau, g, \nabla)$ and for a nearly para-Kähler manifold, where $D=\bar{\nabla}$ and $\bar{\nabla}-\nabla^{g}$ is skew-symmetric.

Proposition 7 Let $(M, \tau, g)$ be an almost para-hermitian manifold endowed with a nice connection $D, N$ be a pseudo-Riemannian manifold with its Levi-Civita connection $\nabla^{N}$. Suppose, that the tensor $S=\nabla^{g}-D$ is trace-free. Then a para-pluriharmonic map $f: M \rightarrow N$ is harmonic.

Proof: We calculate the expression

$$
\begin{aligned}
\operatorname{tr}_{g}(\nabla d f) & =\sum_{i} g\left(e_{i}, e_{i}\right)\left[\nabla_{e_{i}}^{E} d f\left(e_{i}\right)-d f\left(D_{e_{i}} e_{i}\right)\right] \\
& =\sum_{i} g\left(e_{i}, e_{i}\right)\left[\nabla_{e_{i}}^{E} d f\left(e_{i}\right)-d f\left(\left(\nabla^{g}-S\right)_{e_{i}} e_{i}\right)\right] \\
& =\sum_{i} g\left(e_{i}, e_{i}\right)\left[\nabla_{e_{i}}^{E} d f\left(e_{i}\right)-d f\left(\nabla_{e_{i}}^{g} e_{i}\right)\right] \\
& =\operatorname{tr}_{g}\left(\tilde{\nabla}^{g} d f\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\tilde{\nabla}^{g}$ is the connection induced on $T^{*} M \otimes E$ by $\nabla^{g}$ and $\nabla^{E}$ and $e_{i}$ is an orthogonal basis for $g$ on $T M$. Since $g$ is para-hermitian, we obtain from the para-pluriharmonic equation

$$
\operatorname{tr}_{g}(\nabla d f)=\operatorname{tr}_{g}\left(\nabla d f^{(1,1)}\right)=0
$$

## 7 Related para-pluriharmonic and harmonic maps

### 7.1 The classifying map of a flat nearly para-Kähler manifold

In this section we consider simply connected almost para-hermitian manifolds ( $M, \tau, g$ ) endowed with a flat metric connection $\nabla$ such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ satisfies the nearly para-Kähler condition.
In particular, simply connected flat nearly para-Kähler manifolds $\left(M^{2 n}, \tau, g\right)$, i.e. nearly para-Kähler manifolds $(M, \tau, g)$ with flat Levi-Civita connection $\nabla^{g}$ are of this type.
Since $(M, g, \nabla)$ is simply connected and flat, we may identify by fixing a $\nabla$-parallel frame $s_{0}$ its tangent bundle $T M$ with $(M \times V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)$, where $V=C^{n}=\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}, j_{0}\right)$ is endowed with the standard scalar product $\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle$ of signature $(n, n)$ on $V=\mathbb{R}^{2 n}$.
The compatible para-complex structure $\tau$ defines via this identification a map

$$
\tau: M \rightarrow \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)
$$

where $\mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)$ is the set of para-complex structures on $V$ which are compatible with $\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle$ and the orientation.

One can consider $\mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)$ as a subset in the vector space $\mathfrak{s o}(n, n)=\mathfrak{s o}(V) \subset \operatorname{Mat}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right)$ characterised by the equation

$$
\begin{equation*}
f(j)=\mathbb{1}_{2 n}, \tag{7.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $f: \operatorname{Mat}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) \rightarrow \operatorname{Mat}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right)$ is given by $f: A \mapsto A^{2}$. The differential of this map is $d f_{A}(H)=\{A, H\}$ for $A, H \in \operatorname{Mat}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right)$. We remark, that elements satisfying the equation (7.1) define automatically para-complex structures, since they are trace-free and hence their eigenspaces to the eigenvalues $\pm 1$ have the same dimension. The differential $d f$ has constant rank in points $j$ satisfying the equation (7.1), since one sees

$$
\begin{aligned}
\operatorname{ker} d f_{j} & =\{A \in \mathfrak{s o}(V) \mid\{j, A\}=0\} \\
\operatorname{im} d f_{j} & \cong\{A \in \mathfrak{s o}(V) \mid[j, A]=0\} \cong \mathfrak{u}^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Applying the regular value theorem $\mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)$ is shown to be a submanifold of $\mathfrak{s o}(V)$. Its tangent space at $j \in \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)$ is

$$
\begin{equation*}
T_{j} \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)=\operatorname{ker} d f_{j}=\{A \in \mathfrak{s o}(V) \mid\{j, A\}=0\} . \tag{7.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

Moreover, $\mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)$ can be identified with the pseudo-Riemannian symmetric space $S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$, where $S O_{0}(n, n)$ is the identity component of the special pseudoorthogonal group $S O(n, n)$ and $U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ is the para-unitary group, by the map

$$
\begin{aligned}
\Phi: & S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right) \rightarrow \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle), \\
& g K \mapsto g j_{0} g^{-1},
\end{aligned}
$$

which maps the canonical base point $o=e K$ to $j_{0}$.
An element $j \in \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)$ defines a symmetric decomposition of $\mathfrak{s o}(V)$ by

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathfrak{p}(j) & =\{A \in \mathfrak{s o}(V) \mid\{j, A\}=0\}, \\
\mathfrak{k}(j) & =\{A \in \mathfrak{s o}(V) \mid[j, A]=0\} \cong \mathfrak{u}^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

In particular we note $\mathfrak{k}\left(j_{0}\right)=\mathfrak{u}^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$. Moreover, one observes $T_{j} \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)=\mathfrak{p}(j)$.
Let $\tilde{j} \in S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ and $j=\Phi(\tilde{j})$, then $T_{\tilde{j}} S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ is canonically identified with $\mathfrak{p}(j)$. We determine now the differential of the above identification:

Proposition 8 Let $\Psi=\Phi^{-1}: \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle) \rightarrow S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$. Then it holds at $j \in \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle)$

$$
\begin{equation*}
d \Psi: T_{j} \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle) \ni X \mapsto-\frac{1}{2} j^{-1} X \in \mathfrak{p}(j) . \tag{7.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

The next theorem constructs the desired para-pluriharmonic map.
Theorem 6 Let $(M, \tau, g)$ be a simply connected almost para-hermitian manifold endowed with a flat metric connection $\nabla$ such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ satisfies the nearly para-Kähler condition, then $\left(T M, D=\nabla-S, S=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau), \omega=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot)\right)$ defines a symplectic ptt*bundle and the matrix of $\tau$ in a $D^{\theta}$-flat frame $s^{\theta}=\left(s_{i}^{\theta}\right)$ defines an $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}: M \rightarrow \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle) \rightarrow S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$.
In particular, given a nice connection $D$ on $M$ the map

$$
\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}:(M, \tau, D) \rightarrow S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)
$$

is para-pluriharmonic.
Proof: One observes $D^{\theta} g=0$, as one has $\nabla g=0$ and $S_{X}^{\theta}:=\cosh (\theta) S_{X}+\sinh (\theta) S_{\tau X}$ takes values in $\mathfrak{s o}(V)$. This means we can choose for each $\theta$ the $D^{\theta}$-flat frame $s^{\theta}$ orthonormal, such that $s^{\theta=0}=s_{0}$. Using $D \tau=0$ (compare theorem 1 and lemma 1) we obtain

$$
X g\left(\tau s_{i}^{\theta}, s_{j}^{\theta}\right)=g\left(D_{X}^{\theta}\left(\tau s_{i}^{\theta}\right), s_{j}^{\theta}\right)=g\left(\left(D_{X}^{\theta} \tau\right) s_{i}^{\theta}, s_{j}^{\theta}\right)=g\left(\left[S_{X}^{\theta}, \tau\right] s_{i}^{\theta}, s_{j}^{\theta}\right)=-2 g\left(\tau S_{X}^{\theta} s_{i}^{\theta}, s_{j}^{\theta}\right) .
$$

Let $S^{s^{\theta}}$ and $\tau^{s^{\theta}}$ be the representation of $S$ and $\tau$ in the frame $s^{\theta}$, then we have

$$
\left(\tau^{s^{\theta}}\right)^{-1} X\left(\tau^{s^{\theta}}\right)=-2 S^{s^{\theta}}
$$

or

$$
d \tilde{\tau}^{\theta}=\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} \circ S^{\theta} \circ s^{\theta} .
$$

Here the frame $s^{\theta}$ is seen as a map $s^{\theta}: M \times V \rightarrow T M$. For $X \in \Gamma(T M)$ we obtain

$$
\begin{aligned}
d \tilde{\tau}^{\theta}(X) & =\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} \circ S_{X}^{\theta} \circ\left(s^{\theta}\right)=\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} \circ S_{\mathcal{R}_{\theta} X} \circ\left(s^{\theta}\right) \\
& =\left(\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} s^{0}\right) \circ d \tilde{\tau}\left(\mathcal{R}_{\theta} X\right) \circ\left(\left(s^{0}\right)^{-1} s^{\theta}\right) \\
& =A d_{\alpha_{\theta}}^{-1} \circ d \tilde{\tau}\left(\mathcal{R}_{\theta} X\right)=\Phi_{\theta}^{-1} \circ d \tilde{\tau}\left(\mathcal{R}_{\theta} X\right),
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\alpha_{\theta}=\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} s^{0}$ is the frame change from $s_{0}$ to $s_{\theta}$ and $\Phi_{\theta}=A d_{\alpha_{\theta}}$. $\Phi_{\theta}$ is parallel with respect to the Levi-Civita connection on $S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ and hence $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic. Given a nice connection $D$ on $M$ theorem 5 shows that $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is parapluriharmonic.

The next corollary emphasises the nearly para-Kähler setting:

Corollary 3 Let $(M, \tau, g)$ be a simply connected flat nearly para-Kähler manifold and $\left(T M, \bar{\nabla}=\nabla^{g}-S, S=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau), \omega(\cdot, \cdot)=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot)\right)$ the associated symplectic ptt*-bundle, then the matrix of $\tau$ in a $D^{\theta}$-flat frame $s^{\theta}=\left(s_{i}^{\theta}\right)$ defines an $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ : $M \rightarrow \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle) \rightarrow S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$.

For nearly para-Kähler manifolds one can get more precise information about the map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ :

Theorem 7 Let $(M, \tau, g)$ be a simply connected flat nearly para-Kähler manifold and $\left(T M, \bar{\nabla}=\nabla^{g}-S, S=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau), \omega(\cdot, \cdot)=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot)\right)$ the associated symplectic $p t t^{*}$-bundle. Then the connection $\bar{\nabla}$ is nice and the matrix of $\tau$ in a $D^{\theta}$-flat frame $s^{\theta}=\left(s_{i}^{\theta}\right)$ defines a para-pluriharmonic map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}:(M, \tau, \bar{\nabla}) \rightarrow \mathcal{P}(V,\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle) \rightarrow S O_{0}(n, n) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$. Moreover, the map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is harmonic.

Proof: We have to prove, that $\bar{\nabla}$ is nice. Therefore we rewrite the Nijenhuis tensor

$$
\begin{aligned}
N_{\tau}(X, Y) & =\left(\nabla_{\tau X} \tau\right) Y-\left(\nabla_{\tau Y} \tau\right) X-\tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y+\tau\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) X \\
& =-4 \tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y,
\end{aligned}
$$

where the second equality follows from the nearly para-Kähler condition and by

$$
\left(\nabla_{\tau X} \tau\right) Y=-\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) \tau X=\tau\left(\nabla_{Y} \tau\right) X=-\tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y
$$

On the other hand the torsion of $\bar{\nabla}$ was given in equation (5.7) by

$$
T^{\bar{\nabla}}(X, Y)=\tau\left(\nabla_{X} \tau\right) Y
$$

and consequently $\bar{\nabla}$ is nice.
Due to corollary 3 the map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic. Since $\bar{\nabla}$ is nice, theorem 5 implies that $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is para-pluriharmonic. From the skew-symmetry of $S$ and proposition 7 we obtain that $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is harmonic.

### 7.2 The dual Gauß map of a special para-Kähler manifold with torsion

In this subsection we consider a simply connected almost para-hermitian manifold ( $M, \tau, g$ ) with a flat connection $\nabla$, such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ is special and the two-form $\omega=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot)$ is $\nabla$ parallel.
Using the flat connection $\nabla$ we identify by fixing a $\nabla$-parallel symplectic frame $s_{0}$ the tangent bundle $(T M, \omega)$ with $\left(M \times V, \omega_{0}\right)$ where $V=\mathbb{R}^{2 n}$ and $\omega_{0}$ is its standard symplectic form.
The compatible para-complex structure $\tau$ is seen as a map

$$
\tau: M \rightarrow \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)
$$

where $\mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)$ is the set of para-complex structures on $V$ which are compatible with $\omega_{0}$. Now we discuss the differential geometry of $\mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)$, where $\omega_{0}$ is the standard symplectic
form on $V=C^{n}=\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}, j_{0}\right)$.
First, we consider $\mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)$ as a subset of the vector space $\mathfrak{s p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) \subset \operatorname{Mat}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right)$ characterised by the set of equations

$$
\begin{equation*}
f(j)=\mathbb{1}_{2 n} \tag{7.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $f: \operatorname{Mat}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) \rightarrow \operatorname{Mat}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right)$ is given as in the last section. Again, $d f$ has constant rank in points $j$ satisfying the equation (7.4), since one sees

$$
\begin{aligned}
\operatorname{ker} d f_{j} & =\left\{A \in \mathfrak{s p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) \mid\{j, A\}=0\right\} \\
\operatorname{im} d f_{j} & \cong\left\{A \in \mathfrak{s p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) \mid[j, A]=0\right\} \cong \mathfrak{u}^{\pi}\left(C^{r}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Applying the regular value theorem we obtain that $\mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)$ is a submanifold of $\mathfrak{s p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right)$. Its tangent space at $j \in \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)$ is

$$
\begin{equation*}
T_{j} \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)=\operatorname{ker} d f_{j}=\left\{A \in \mathfrak{s p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) \mid\{j, A\}=0\right\} . \tag{7.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

In addition the manifold $\mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)$ can be identified with the pseudo-Riemannian symmetric space $\operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ by the map

$$
\begin{aligned}
\Phi: \operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right) & \rightarrow \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right), \\
g K & \mapsto g j_{0} g^{-1}
\end{aligned}
$$

which maps the canonical base point $o=e K$ to $j_{0}$.
Any $j \in \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)$ defines a symmetric decomposition of $\mathfrak{s p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right)$ by

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathfrak{p}(j) & =\left\{A \in \mathfrak{s p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) \mid\{j, A\}=0\right\}, \\
\mathfrak{k}(j) & =\left\{A \in \mathfrak{s p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) \mid[j, A]=0\right\} \cong \mathfrak{u}^{\pi}\left(C^{r}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

In particular it is $\mathfrak{k}\left(j_{0}\right)=\mathfrak{u}^{\pi}\left(C^{r}\right)$. Moreover, one observes $T_{j} \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)=\mathfrak{p}(j)$.
Let $\tilde{j} \in \operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ and $j=\Phi(\tilde{j})$, then $T_{\tilde{j}} \operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ is canonically identified with $\mathfrak{p}(j)$ and for the differential of the identification we have:

Proposition 9 Let $\Psi=\Phi^{-1}: \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right) \rightarrow \operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$. Then it holds at $j \in$ $\mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right)$

$$
\begin{equation*}
d \Psi: T_{j} \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right) \ni X \mapsto-\frac{1}{2} j^{-1} X \in \mathfrak{p}(j) \tag{7.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

Recall, that under the above assumptions ( $\left.T M, D=\nabla-S, S=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau), g\right)$ defines a metric $p t t^{*}$-bundle. Analogue to the last section we obtain:

Theorem 8 Let $(M, \tau, g)$ be a simply connected almost para-hermitian manifold endowed with a flat connection $\nabla$, such that $(\nabla, \tau)$ is special and the two-form $\omega=g(\tau \cdot, \cdot)$ is $\nabla$-parallel and let ( $\left.T M, D=\nabla-S, S=-\frac{1}{2} \tau(\nabla \tau), g\right)$ be the associated metric ptt*bundle. Then the matrix of $\tau$ in a $D^{\theta}$-flat frame $s^{\theta}=\left(s_{i}^{\theta}\right)$ defines an $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}: M \rightarrow \mathcal{P}\left(V, \omega_{0}\right) \rightarrow \operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$.
In particular, given a nice connection $D$ on $(M, \tau)$ then the map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}:(M, \tau, D) \rightarrow$ $\operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$ is para-pluriharmonic.

Proof: Since we have $D^{0} \omega=\nabla \omega=(D+S) \omega=0$ and $S_{X}^{\theta}:=\cosh (\theta) S_{X}+\sinh (\theta) S_{\tau X}$ is skew-symmetric with respect to $\omega$, we obtain $D \omega=0$ and $D^{\theta} \omega=0$. Hence one can choose for each $\theta$ the $D^{\theta}$-parallel frame $s^{\theta}$ as a symplectic frame, such that $s^{\theta=0}=s_{0}$. This yields using $D \tau=0$ (cf. theorem 1 and lemma 1)

$$
X \cdot \omega\left(\tau s_{i}^{\theta}, s_{j}^{\theta}\right)=\omega\left(D_{X}^{\theta}\left(\tau s_{i}^{\theta}\right), s_{j}^{\theta}\right)=\omega\left(\left(D_{X}^{\theta} \tau\right) s_{i}^{\theta}, s_{j}^{\theta}\right)=\omega\left(\left[S_{X}^{\theta}, \tau\right] s_{i}^{\theta}, s_{j}^{\theta}\right)=-2 \omega\left(\tau S_{X}^{\theta} s_{i}^{\theta}, s_{j}^{\theta}\right) .
$$

Denote by $S^{s^{\theta}}, \tau^{s^{\theta}}$ the representation of $S$ and $\tau$ in the frame $s^{\theta}$, then we get

$$
\left(\tau^{s^{\theta}}\right)^{-1} X\left(\tau^{s^{\theta}}\right)=-2 S^{s^{\theta}}
$$

or

$$
d \tilde{\tau}^{\theta}=\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} \circ S^{\theta} \circ s^{\theta},
$$

where the frame $s^{\theta}$ is seen as a map $s^{\theta}: M \times V \rightarrow T M$. This shows for $X \in \Gamma(T M)$

$$
\begin{aligned}
d \tilde{\tau}^{\theta}(X) & =\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} \circ S_{X}^{\theta} \circ\left(s^{\theta}\right)=\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} \circ S_{\mathcal{R}_{\theta} X} \circ\left(s^{\theta}\right) \\
& =\left(\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} s^{0}\right) \circ d \tilde{\tau}\left(\mathcal{R}_{\theta} X\right) \circ\left(\left(s^{0}\right)^{-1} s^{\theta}\right) \\
& =A d_{\alpha_{\theta}}^{-1} \circ d \tilde{\tau}\left(\mathcal{R}_{\theta} X\right)=\Phi_{\theta}^{-1} \circ d \tilde{\tau}\left(\mathcal{R}_{\theta} X\right),
\end{aligned}
$$

where $\alpha_{\theta}=\left(s^{\theta}\right)^{-1} s^{0}$ denotes the frame change from $s_{0}$ to $s_{\theta}$ and $\Phi_{\theta}=A d_{\alpha_{\theta}}$ which is parallel with respect to the Levi-Civita connection on $\operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$. In other words we have found an associated family. Given a nice connection $D$ on $(M, \tau)$ theorem 5 shows that $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is para-pluriharmonic.

In the case where the above $p t t^{*}$-bundle comes from a special para-Kähler manifold we have the theorem:

Theorem 9 Let $(M, \tau, g, \nabla)$ be a simply connected special para-Kähler manifold and (TM, D $\left.=\nabla-S, S=-\frac{1}{2} \tau \nabla \tau, g\right)$ be the associated metric ptt*-bundle, then the matrix of $\tau$ in a $D^{\theta}$-flat frame $s^{\theta}=\left(s_{i}^{\theta}\right)$ defines a para-pluriharmonic map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}:(M, \tau, D) \rightarrow$ $\operatorname{Sp}\left(\mathbb{R}^{2 n}\right) / U^{\pi}\left(C^{n}\right)$. Further $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is harmonic.

Proof: Using theorem 8 the map $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is $\tilde{\mathbb{S}}^{1}$-pluriharmonic. In the special para-Kähler case we know that $D$ is the Levi-Civita connection and hence it is torsion-free. The paracomplex structure $\tau$ is integrable and hence it holds $N_{\tau}=0$. This means, that $D$ is nice and theorem 5 shows that $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is para-pluriharmonic. Since $S$ is trace-free we get from proposition 7 that $\tilde{\tau}^{\theta}$ is harmonic.
