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Elaboration and Characterisation of two new Iron Titanium Phosphates Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO₄) and Fe_{0.5}Ti₂(PO₄)₃

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Abstract

Two new phosphates $Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO_4)$ and $Fe_{0.5}Ti_2(PO_4)_3$ have been prepared and characterised by X-ray diffraction, Mössbauer spectroscopy and magnetic measurements. $Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO_4)$ is isostructural to the oxyphosphate $Ni_{0.5}TiO(PO_4)$ while $Fe_{0.5}Ti_2(PO_4)_3$ belongs to the Nasicon family. Their structures are formed by a 3 D framework of TiO_6 octahedra and PO_4 tetrahedra linked by corners. Fe^{2+} ions occupy isolated octahedral cavities situated between two TiO_6 octahedra. The magnetic and Mössbauer parameters are typical of Fe^{2+} ions in octahedral sites with high spin configuration $t_{2g}^4 e_g^2$.

INTRODUCTION

The study of phosphates with octahedral $[TiO_6]$ and tetrahedral $[PO_4]$ groups has been intensive since the discovery of the Nasicon¹ (Na super ionic conductor) and the KTP² (KTiOPO₄) materials. In the course of our investigation on these phosphate families we discovered two new phases: $Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO_4)$ and $Fe_{0.5}Ti_2(PO_4)_3$. The present paper describes their preparation and characterisation by X-ray diffraction, Mössbauer spectroscopy and magnetic measurements.

EXPERIMENTAL

The powders of $Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO_4)$ and $Fe_{0.5}Ti_2(PO_4)_3$ were prepared by conventional solid state reaction techniques in silica tubes sealed under vacuum. Stoichiometric proportions of Fe_2O_3 , TiO_2 , TiP_2O_7 and Fe have been mixed, ground and heated progressively up to 800°C for $Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO_4)$ and 950°C for $Fe_{0.5}Ti_2(PO_4)_3$. These phosphates can also be obtained by exchange reaction.

The X-ray diffraction data were collected at room temperature with Philips PW 3040 (θ - θ) diffractometer using a graphite monochromator. The magnetic susceptibility determination was performed from 4.2 to 300 K in an applied magnetic field (0 < H < 3T), using a SQUID magnetometer (MPMS-S2, Quantum Design). Mössbauer measurements were performed using a constant acceleration HALDER-type spectrometer, with a ⁵⁷Co(Rh) source in transmission geometry. Isomer shift values refer to α -Fe at 293 K. The spectra at 4.2 K and 293 K were recorded using a variable temperature cryostat.

RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

The structure of Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO₄) and Fe_{0.5}Ti₂(PO₄)₃ have been determined from powder X-ray diffraction data, by Rietveld refinement using Fullprof program³. Here we give a summary of this study, details of which will be published elsewhere. Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO₄) is isostructural to Ni_{0.5}TiO(PO₄)⁴. It crystallizes in the monoclinic system, space group P2₁/c (No.14), with a = 7.4039(3) Å, b = 7.3838(3) Å, c = 7.4083(3) Å, β = 120.366(1), Z= 4. Fe_{0.5}Ti₂(PO₄)₃ is isostructural to Co_{0.5}Ti₂(PO₄)₃⁵. At room temperature its XRD pattern can be indexed assuming a hexagonal cell with the following parameters: a_h = 8.509 ± 0.003Å and c_h = 21.015 ± 0.004Å.

The structures of these phosphates (Figures 1, 2) are formed by a tridimensional framework of TiO_6 octahedra and PO₄ tetrahedra linked by corners. The TiO₆ octahedra are rather regular and isolated from each other in Fe_{0.5}Ti₂(PO₄)₃, while in Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO₄) they are linked together by corners and form -Ti-O-Ti-O- infinite chains with alternating short and long Ti-O bonds. In both phases, Fe²⁺ ions occupy isolated octahedral sites located between two TiO₆ octahedra and sharing with them two faces.

The thermal variation of the reciprocal magnetic susceptibility (Figure 3) between 4 and 300 K is linear. This paramagnetic behaviour shows that there is no magnetic interactions between divalent iron ions as expected from the structural study. Indeed the FeO₆ octahedra are isolated from each other and the Fe²⁺-Fe²⁺ distances are longer than 5Å. The effective magnetic moment $\mu_{eff} = 5.13 \ \mu\text{B}$ confirms the oxidation state (+II) of iron in octahedral sites with high spin configuration (Fe²⁺: t_{2g}⁴e_g²).

Figure 4 shows the Mössbauer spectra of $Fe_{0.5}TiO(PO_4)$ and $Fe_{0.5}Ti_2(PO_4)_3$ measured at 4.2 K and 293 K. The values of isomer shift (δ), quadruple splitting (Δ) and width at half maximum (Γ) (Table I) are in agreement with the structural and magnetic results.
