## Optimization of nanopores generated by chemical etching of swiftion irradiated LiNbO<sub>3</sub>.

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The procedure to etch latent ion tracks in lithium niobate has been systematically investigated and optimized. The influence of some key parameters, etching acid, processing time, temperature, ion type, and stopping power, in the range from 3 to 33 keV/nm, has been monitored and elucidated. Several assisting techniques to improve the etching perfomance, such as ultrasonics, electric field and sample annealing have been examined. The morphology of the irradiated surface has been investigated by AFM, TEM and profilometry. The used fluences were in the range from 10<sup>8</sup> cm<sup>-2</sup> to 10<sup>10</sup> cm<sup>-2</sup>. Pore depths up to 100 nm and aspect ratios (depth/ diameter) up to 0.4 have been achieved. The occurrence of two etching regimes, fast and slow, having different morphologies (circular or ellipsoidal) has been identified and related to the core-halo structure for the latent tracks. Moreover, the role of pre-irradiation damage on the etching perfomance and pore morphology has been substantiated and discussed in terms of existing models of damage.
