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# ON THETA FUNCTIONS OF ORDER FOUR 

YAACOV KOPELIOVICH, CHRISTIAN PAULY, AND OLIVIER SERMAN


#### Abstract

We prove that the fourth powers of theta functions with even characteristics form a basis of the space $H^{0}\left(A, \mathcal{O}_{A}(4 \vartheta)\right)_{+}$of even theta functions of order four on a principally polarized Abelian variety $(A, \vartheta)$ without vanishing theta-null.


## 1. Introduction

Let $(A, \vartheta)$ be a principally polarized Abelian variety of dimension $g$ defined over an algebraically closed field $k$ of characteristic different from 2. By Mumford's algebraic theory of theta functions [M1] (see also the appendix of [B]) there is a canonical bijection between the set of symmetric effective divisors $\Theta_{\kappa} \subset A$ representing the principal polarization and the set $\mathcal{K}$ of theta-characteristics $\kappa$ of $A$. We denote by $L$ the unique symmetric line bundle over $A$ representing $2 \vartheta$ and such that the linear system $|L|$ contains the divisors $2 \Theta_{\kappa}$ for all $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}$. The space $H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)$ of theta functions of order four decomposes under the natural involution of $A$ into $\pm$-eigenspaces $H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}$and $H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{-}$of dimensions

$$
d_{+}=2^{g-1}\left(2^{g}+1\right) \quad \text { and } \quad d_{-}=2^{g-1}\left(2^{g}-1\right) .
$$

We note that $d_{+}$and $d_{-}$are equal to the number of even and odd theta-characteristics of $A$. Moreover any even theta-characteristic $\kappa_{0} \in \mathcal{K}_{+}$decomposes according to the values $\pm 1$ taken by $\kappa_{0}$ the set of 2 -torsion points $A[2]$ into a union of two subsets $A[2]_{+}$and $A[2]_{-}$of cardinality $d_{+}$and $d_{-}$. Note that $0 \in A[2]_{+}$. We denote by

$$
\varphi: A \longrightarrow\left|L^{2}\right|_{+}^{*}=\mathbb{P}^{d_{+}-1}
$$

the morphism induced by the linear system $\left|L^{2}\right|_{+}$. Then our main result is the following
Theorem 1.1. For any even theta-characteristic $\kappa_{0} \in \mathcal{K}_{+}$, the $d_{+}$points

$$
\varphi(a) \in\left|L^{2}\right|_{+}^{*}=\mathbb{P}^{d_{+}-1} \quad \text { with } \quad a \in A[2]_{+}
$$

form a projective basis if and only if A has no vanishing theta-null.
There is also a "dual" version of this result.
Theorem 1.2. The $d_{+}$divisors

$$
4 \Theta_{\kappa} \in\left|L^{2}\right|_{+} \quad \text { with } \quad \kappa \in \mathcal{K}_{+}
$$

form a projective basis (or, in other words, the fourth powers of theta functions with even characteristics form a basis of $\left.H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}\right)$if and only if $A$ has no vanishing theta-null.

These questions were formulated and discussed in the last author's PhD thesis [S].
We would like to thank A. Beauville and S. Grushevsky for their interest in these questions.

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## 2. Review of algebraic theory of theta functions

In this section we recall the results on theta functions of order four, which we need in the proof of the two main theorems. We refer to (M1] and [B] for details and proofs.

We recall that a theta-characteristic is a map $\kappa: A[2] \rightarrow\{ \pm 1\}$ such that $\kappa(a+b)=$ $\kappa(a) \kappa(b)\langle a, b\rangle$, where $\langle$,$\rangle is the symplectic Weil form on A[2]$. The group $A[2]$ acts transitively on the set $\mathcal{K}$ of theta-characteristics by the formula

$$
\begin{equation*}
(a \cdot \kappa)(b)=\langle a, b\rangle \kappa(b) . \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

We say that $\kappa$ is even if $\kappa$ takes $d_{ \pm}$times the value $\pm 1$. The set of even theta-characteristics is denoted by $\mathcal{K}_{+}$.

The Heisenberg group $H$ associated to the line bundle $L$ consists of all pairs $\alpha=(a, \varphi)$ with $a \in A[2]$ and $\varphi: T_{a}^{*} L \xrightarrow{\sim} L$ an isomorphism (where $T_{a}: A \rightarrow A$ is the translation by $a$ ), and fits into an exact sequence

$$
0 \longrightarrow k^{*} \longrightarrow H \xrightarrow{p} A[2] \longrightarrow 0, \quad \text { with } p(\alpha)=a .
$$

For any $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}$ we consider the character $\chi_{\kappa}: H \rightarrow k^{*}$ of weight 2 defined by $\chi_{\kappa}(\alpha)=\|\alpha\| \kappa(a)$, with $\|\alpha\|=\alpha^{2} \in k^{*}$. The main result we need in this note is
Proposition 2.1 ( $\mathbb{B}]$ Proposition A.8). The vector space $H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}$decomposes as an $H$ module into a direct sum $\bigoplus_{\kappa \in \mathcal{K}_{+}} W_{\kappa}$ with $\operatorname{dim} W_{\kappa}=1$ and $W_{\kappa}$ is the character space associated to the character $\chi_{\kappa}$. The zero divisor of any nonzero section $s_{\kappa} \in W_{\kappa}$ equals $2_{A}^{*} \Theta_{\kappa}$, where $2_{A}$ is the duplication map of $A$.

## 3. The matrix $M$

We say that a pair $\left(a_{1}, a_{2}\right) \in(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g} \times(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g}$ is even if $a_{1} \cdot a_{2}=0$. Let $M$ denote the $d_{+} \times d_{+}$matrix with lines and columns indexed by even pairs $\left(a_{1}, a_{2}\right)$ and $\left(b_{1}, b_{2}\right)$ and with entries

$$
(-1)^{a_{1} \cdot b_{2}+a_{2} \cdot b_{1}} .
$$

Lemma 3.1. For fixed $\left(a_{1}, a_{2}\right) \in(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g} \times(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g}$, we have the equality

$$
\sum_{\substack{b_{1}, b_{2} \in(Z / 2 z) \cdot g \\ b_{1} \cdot b_{2}=0}}(-1)^{a_{1} \cdot b_{2}+a_{2} \cdot b_{1}}= \begin{cases}d_{+} & \text {if } a_{1}=a_{2}=0, \\ (-1)^{a_{1} \cdot a_{2}} 2^{g-1} & \text { else. } .\end{cases}
$$

Proof. If $a_{1}=a_{2}=0$ there is nothing to prove. Otherwise we may assume that $a_{1} \neq 0$, and the result follows from the easy equality

$$
\sum_{\substack{b_{1} \in(Z / 2 z), g \\ b_{1}, b_{2}=0}}(-1)^{a_{1} \cdot b_{1}}= \begin{cases}2^{g-1} & \text { if } b_{2}=a_{1} \\ 0 & \text { else. }\end{cases}
$$

Proposition 3.2. The matrix $M$ is invertible.
Proof. Using Lemma 3.1, we easily check that the inverse of $M$ is given by

$$
M^{-1}=\frac{1}{2^{2 g-1}}\left(M-2^{g-1} I\right)
$$

## 4. Proof of Theorem 1.1

Consider the linear map given by evaluating the $d_{+}$theta functions $s_{\kappa} \in H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}$at the $d_{+}$points $a \in A[2]_{+}$

$$
\text { ev : } H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+} \longrightarrow \bigoplus_{a \in A[2]_{+}} L_{a}^{2} .
$$

It is clear that the assertion of Theorem 1.1 is equivalent to ev being an isomorphism. First note that saying that $A$ has a vanishing theta-null means that there exists a section $s_{\kappa}$, with $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}_{+}$, which vanishes at every point $a \in A[2]$, i.e. $s_{\kappa} \in \operatorname{ker} \mathrm{ev}$. On the other hand we will show that, if $A$ has no vanishing theta-null, ev is given after suitable normalization by the matrix $M$. The theorem then follows from Proposition 3.2.

We consider for each $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}_{+}$a nonzero section $s_{\kappa} \in H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}$in the one-dimensional $\chi_{\kappa}$-character space $W_{\kappa}$, and for each $a \in A[2]$ an isomorphism $\phi_{a}: L_{a}^{2} \xrightarrow{\sim} k$. Since we assume that $A$ has no vanishing theta-null, we have $\phi_{a}\left(s_{\kappa}(a)\right) \neq 0$ for all $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}_{+}$and all $a \in A[2]$. The quotient

$$
\mu\left(a, \kappa, \kappa^{\prime}\right)=\frac{\phi_{0}\left(s_{\kappa}(0)\right) \cdot \phi_{a}\left(s_{\kappa^{\prime}}(a)\right)}{\phi_{a}\left(s_{\kappa}(a)\right) \cdot \phi_{0}\left(s_{\kappa^{\prime}}(0)\right)}, \quad a \in A[2], \kappa, \kappa^{\prime} \in \mathcal{K}_{+}
$$

does not depend on the choice of the sections $s_{\kappa}, s_{\kappa^{\prime}}$ and the isomorphisms $\phi_{a}$. Given $a \in A[2]$ we choose an $\alpha=(a, \varphi) \in H$ such that $\varphi: T_{a}^{*} L \xrightarrow{\sim} L$ preserves the isomorphisms $\phi_{0}$ and $\phi_{a}$, which is equivalent to the equality $\phi_{0}\left(\left(\alpha . s_{\kappa}\right)(0)\right)=\phi_{a}\left(s_{\kappa}(a)\right)$ for all $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}_{+}$. On the other hand $\alpha . s_{\kappa}=\chi_{\kappa}(\alpha) s_{\kappa}=\|\alpha\| \kappa(a) s_{\kappa}$, hence $\frac{\phi_{a}\left(s_{\kappa}(a)\right)}{\phi_{0}\left(s_{\kappa}(0)\right)}=\|\alpha\| \kappa(a)$. Therefore we obtain the formula

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mu\left(a, \kappa, \kappa^{\prime}\right)=\kappa(a) \kappa^{\prime}(a) \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

In order to obtain the matrix $M$ we normalize as follows: consider a section $s_{\kappa 0}$ corresponding to the fixed even theta-characteristic $\kappa_{0}$, and choose the isomorphisms $\phi_{a}$ such that $\phi_{a}\left(s_{\kappa_{0}}(a)\right)=1$ for all $a \in A[2]_{+}$. Then we choose the sections $s_{\kappa}$ such that $\phi_{0}\left(s_{\kappa}(0)\right)=1$. Any $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}$ can be written $\kappa=b \cdot \kappa_{0}$ for a unique $b \in A[2]$, and $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}_{+}$if and only if $b \in A[2]_{+}$by Brmula (1) page 279. Using formulae (22) and (1) we obtain the equalities

$$
\phi_{a}\left(s_{b \cdot \kappa_{0}}(a)\right)=\mu\left(a, \kappa_{0}, b \cdot \kappa_{0}\right)=\kappa_{0}(a)\left(b \cdot \kappa_{0}\right)(a)=\langle a, b\rangle .
$$

We now choose a level-2 structure $\lambda: A[2] \xrightarrow{\sim}(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g} \times(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g}$ which maps the set $A[2]_{+}$ bijectively onto the set of even pairs - this is possible, since $\operatorname{Sp}(2 g, \mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})$ acts transitively on the set of even theta-characteristics. Then we can write $\langle a, b\rangle=(-1)^{a_{1} \cdot b_{2}+a_{2} \cdot b_{1}}$ with $\lambda(a)=$ $\left(a_{1}, a_{2}\right)$ and $\lambda(b)=\left(b_{1}, b_{2}\right)$. This finishes the proof.

## 5. Proof of Theorem 1.2

Let $\kappa_{0}$ be a theta-characteristic of $A$. Recall from [B] that the morphism $\delta_{\kappa_{0}}: A \longrightarrow|L|$ which sends $a \in A$ to the divisor $T_{a}^{*} \Theta_{\kappa_{0}}+T_{-a}^{*} \Theta_{\kappa_{0}}$ fits into the commutative diagram

where $\varphi_{L}$ is the morphism defined by the complete linear system $|L|$. The isomorphism between $|L|^{*}$ and $|L|$ is given by any nonzero element in the one-dimensional character space in $H^{0}(A, L) \otimes H^{0}(A, L)$ associated to $\chi_{\kappa_{0}}$. Now, if $A$ has no vanishing theta-null, we know from [B] Proposition A. 9 that the multiplication map

$$
\operatorname{Sym}^{2} H^{0}(A, L) \longrightarrow H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}
$$

is bijective. It follows that the duplication morphism $|L| \longrightarrow\left|L^{2}\right|_{+}, D \longmapsto 2 D$ is identified, through the isomorphism $|L|^{*} \xrightarrow{\sim}|L|$, with the 2-uple embedding of $|L|^{*}$, and that the morphism $\varphi: A \longrightarrow\left|L^{2}\right|_{+}^{*}$ is the composite of $\varphi_{L}$ with this 2-uple embedding.

But we know from Theorem 1.1 that the images $\varphi(a)$ of the $d_{+}$points $a \in A[2]_{+}$form a projective basis of $\left|L^{2}\right|_{+}^{*}$. This implies that the points $2 \delta_{\kappa_{0}}(a)=4 \Theta_{a \cdot \kappa_{0}}$ form a projective basis of $\left|L^{2}\right|_{+}$, which finishes the proof.

Remark 5.1. The previous considerations show that our result is also equivalent to the following one: if $A$ has no vanishing theta-null, there is no quadric hypersurface in $|L|$ containing the $d_{+}$ points defined by $2 \Theta_{\kappa}$, with $\kappa \in \mathcal{K}_{+}$.

## 6. The case $k=\mathbb{C}$

When $k=\mathbb{C}$, we can give a direct proof of Theorem 1.2 by using Riemann's quartic addition theorem to express the fourth powers of the theta functions $\theta_{\kappa}$ in terms of the functions $2_{A}^{*} \theta_{\kappa}$.

In this case, the Abelian variety $A$ is a quotient $\mathbb{C}^{g} / \Gamma_{\tau}$ of a $g$-dimensional vector space by a lattice $\Gamma_{\tau}=\mathbb{Z}^{g} \oplus \tau \mathbb{Z}^{g}$ for some $\tau$ in the Siegel upper half-plane. Let us choose a level-2 structure to identify the set of theta-characteristics with $(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g} \times(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g}$, in such a way that even theta-characteristics $\kappa$ correspond to even pairs $\left(a_{1}, a_{2}\right)$ (see B] A.6). We want to prove that the space $H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}$of even theta functions of order four is spanned by the fourth powers of the theta functions with even characteristics $a_{1}, a_{2} \in(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g}$

$$
\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
a_{1} \\
a_{2}
\end{array}\right](z)=\sum_{m \in \mathbb{Z}^{g}} \exp \pi i\left({ }^{t}\left(m+\frac{1}{2} \tilde{a_{1}}\right) \tau\left(m+\frac{1}{2} \tilde{a_{1}}\right)+2^{t}\left(m+\frac{1}{2} \tilde{a_{1}}\right)\left(z+\frac{1}{2} \tilde{a_{2}}\right)\right),
$$

where $\tilde{a_{1}}$ and $\tilde{a_{2}}$ denote some representatives in $\mathbb{Z}^{g}$ of $a_{1}$ and $a_{2}$ respectively.
Riemann's quartic addition theorem (see M2] II. 6 formula $\left(\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{ch}}\right)$ ) implies that, for any pair $\left(a_{1}, a_{2}\right)$,

$$
\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
a_{1} \\
a_{2}
\end{array}\right](z)\right)^{4}=2^{-g} \sum_{b_{1}, b_{2} \in(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g}}(-1)^{a_{1} \cdot b_{2}+a_{2} \cdot b_{1}}\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
b_{1} \\
b_{2}
\end{array}\right](0)\right)^{3} \theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
b_{1} \\
b_{2}
\end{array}\right](2 z) .
$$

We now invert this formula as follows. Let us sum over all even pairs ( $a_{1}, a_{2}$ ) the previous relations multiplied by the factor $(-1)^{a_{1} \cdot c_{2}+a_{2} \cdot c_{1}}$, where $\left(c_{1}, c_{2}\right)$ is a fixed even pair. Using Lemma 3.1, we obtain

$$
\begin{aligned}
& 2 \sum_{\substack{a_{1}, a_{2} \in(Z / 2 Z) g \\
a_{1} \cdot a_{2}=0}}(-1)^{a_{1} \cdot c_{2}+a_{2} \cdot c_{1}}\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
a_{1} \\
a_{2}
\end{array}\right](z)\right)^{4}= \\
& 2^{g}\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
c_{1} \\
c_{2}
\end{array}\right](0)\right)^{3} \theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
c_{1} \\
c_{2}
\end{array}\right](2 z)+\sum_{b_{1}, b_{2} \in(\mathbb{Z} / 2 \mathbb{Z})^{g}}(-1)^{\left(b_{2}+c_{2}\right) \cdot\left(b_{1}+c_{1}\right)}\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
b_{1} \\
b_{2}
\end{array}\right](0)\right)^{3} \theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
b_{1} \\
b_{2}
\end{array}\right](2 z) .
\end{aligned}
$$

In the last sum, the terms corresponding to odd pairs $\left(b_{1}, b_{2}\right)$ vanish, because $\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}b_{1} \\ b_{2}\end{array}\right](0)=0$. Since $\left(c_{1}, c_{2}\right)$ is an even pair, this sum is equal to $2^{g}\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}c_{1} \\ c_{2}\end{array}\right](z)\right)^{4}$, again by Riemann's quartic relation. We finally get, for every even pair $\left(c_{1}, c_{2}\right)$,

$$
2^{g}\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
c_{1} \\
c_{2}
\end{array}\right](0)\right)^{3} \theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
c_{1} \\
c_{2}
\end{array}\right](2 z)=-2^{g}\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
c_{1} \\
c_{2}
\end{array}\right](z)\right)^{4}+2 \sum_{\substack{a_{1}, a_{2} \in(\mathbb{Z} / 2 z) g, a_{1} \cdot a_{2}=0}}(-1)^{a_{1} \cdot c_{2}+a_{2} \cdot c_{1}}\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}
a_{1} \\
a_{2}
\end{array}\right](z)\right)^{4} .
$$

But we have already recalled in Proposition 2.1 that the functions $z \mapsto \theta\left[\begin{array}{l}c_{1} \\ c_{2}\end{array}\right](2 z)$ with $c_{1} \cdot c_{2}=0$ span $H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}$. This shows that the functions $\left(\theta\left[\begin{array}{l}a_{1} \\ a_{2}\end{array}\right](z)\right)^{4}$ with $a_{1} \cdot a_{2}=0$ span this vector space if and only if $A$ does not have any vanishing theta-null.

Remark 6.1. The method of the proof given in this section can be adapted to any algebraically closed field $k$ of characteristic different from 2 using Mumford's algebraic theory of theta functions.

Remark 6.2. It easily follows from the previous proofs that the codimension of the linear span of the fourth powers of even theta functions in $H^{0}\left(A, L^{2}\right)_{+}$equals the number of vanishing theta-nulls of $A$.
