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# Outline

Objective: provide a real-time controller for processes modeled by Partial Differential Equations:

- in order to solve any **optimization task** (i.e. : optimize productivity, decrease processing time, ...) ,
- while including any **process limitations** (i.e. : actuators saturation, safety conditions, limiting operating conditions, ...).

Solution: a model based predictive control (MBPC) approach.

 $\hookrightarrow$  Necessary to reduce the time required by the on-line controller since we have to:

- solve an on-line constrained optimization problem,
- handle a nonlinear dynamic PDE model,
- estimate unavailable measurements with a software sensor.

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#### Thermal flows



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Energy balance [Blanc et al., 1997]

$$(\rho_p C_p(\bar{\chi}, T) e_p + \rho_s C_s e_s) \frac{\partial T}{\partial t} = -\sum_{i=1}^5 P_i + P_{abs}, \ t > 0$$
  
$$T(0) = T_0$$

with the losses  $P_i$ :

and the absorbed **infrared flow**:

$$P_{abs} = \alpha_{ir}(\bar{\chi})\varphi_{ir}(t)$$

with the boundary conditions :

with the initial condition:

 $\chi(z,0) = x_i(z) \text{ for } 0 \le z \le e_{sec}$ 



the state vector is  $x_m(z,t) = (T(t), \chi(z,t))^T$ , the manipulated variable u(t) is the infrared flow  $\varphi_{ir}(t)$ . The output variable vector is  $y_m(t)$ .

## Key issue for the drying process:

Software estimation of unmeasured state variables

- Definition: Observers are algorithms used to estimate variables which are not measured or can not be measured.
- 1. Observer design: two informations about the process are needed:
  - its theoretical behaviour: a **model**,
  - its experimental behaviour: the **on-line available measurements**.
- 2. Experimental validation of the observer: real dynamic measurements are first needed. Here, which new additional devices can we use to get the humidity profile inside the low thickness painting sample ?
- 3. Use of the observer: the estimated process humidity profile  $\hat{\chi}_p$  is then used by the controller.

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### MPC framework: main features

- Key idea: forecast future process behavior: a model is needed.
  - \* Historically, models obtained from **experimental step response** were used: simple but local,
  - \* Now, use of **first principle models**: complex but more global.
- On-line decision level: need to solve an on-line constrained optimization problem over the future window, based on the model:
  - \* Need to reduce the on-line computational burden,
  - **\*** Need to **handle constraints**.
- In the closed loop structure, proof of stability are needed.

 $\implies$  Our approach: explicitly handle a nonlinear dynamic PDE model in a MPC strategy, and reduce the on-line computational burden.



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# Initial constrained optimization problem

$$\begin{split} \min_{\Delta \tilde{u}} J(\Delta \tilde{u}) &= \frac{1}{N_p} \sum_{\substack{j=k+1 \\ j=k+1}}^{j=k+N_p} g(y_{ref}(j), \ x_{ref}(j), \Delta y_m(j), \Delta x_m(j), \ e_y(k), \hat{e}_x(k)) \\ \Delta \tilde{u} &= [\Delta u(k) \ \dots \ \Delta u(k+N_c-1)]^T \\ \begin{cases} \frac{\partial \Delta x_m}{\partial t} &= \frac{\partial F_d}{\partial x_m} \Delta x_m \ \text{for } 0 < z < e_{sec}, \ t > 0 \\ \frac{\partial F_b}{\partial x_m} \Delta x_m + \frac{\partial F_b}{\partial u_{|(S_0)}} \Delta u = 0 \ \text{for } z \in \{0, \ e_{sec}\}, \ t > 0 \\ \Delta y_m = C \Delta x_m \ \text{for } 0 \le z \le e_{sec} \end{cases} \\ \Delta u_{min} \le \Delta u(j) \le \Delta u_{max} \\ \Delta (\Delta u_{min}) \le \Delta u(j) - \Delta u(j-1) \le \Delta (\Delta u_{max}) \\ c_i(y_{ref}(j), \ x_{ref}(j), \Delta y_m(j), \Delta x_m(j), \ e_y(k), \hat{e}_x(k)) \le 0 \quad (i \in \mathcal{I}) \end{split}$$

a transformation method [Fletcher, 1987]

From the **constrainted variable**  $\theta$ :

$$\theta_{\min} \le \theta \le \theta_{\max} \tag{7}$$

an **unconstrained variable** p is defined such that:

$$\theta = f(p) = \frac{1}{2}(\theta_{\max} + \theta_{\min}) + \frac{1}{2}(\theta_{\max} - \theta_{\min})\tanh(p)$$

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$$\min_{\Delta \tilde{p}} J_{tot}(\Delta \tilde{p}) = \frac{1}{N_p} \sum_{j=k+1}^{j=k+N_p} g(y_{ref}(j), x_{ref}(j), \Delta y_m(j), \Delta x_m(j), e_y(k), \hat{e}_x(k))$$

based on the transformation method:  $u \rightleftharpoons p, \ \Delta u \rightleftharpoons \Delta p$ 

 $\Delta \tilde{p} = |\Delta p(k) \dots \Delta p(k + N_c - 1)|^T$ 

 $\implies$  Optimization problem solved by the Levenberg-Marquardt's algorithm.

# Simulation results:

optimization problem tackled for the drying process

Minimize the drying time, hence maximize the drying rate  $\dot{m}(\bar{\chi}, T)$ :  $\max_{\varphi_{ir}} J(\varphi_{ir}) = \frac{1}{N_p} \sum_{\substack{j=k+1 \ j=k+1}}^{j=k+N_p} [\dot{m}(\bar{\chi}(j), T(j))]^2$ 

Accounting for the infrared flow limitations:

magnitude: 0  $W.m^{-2} \le \varphi_{ir}(j) \le 12000 \ W.m^{-2}$ 

velocity:  $-500 \ W.m^{-2} \le \varphi_{ir}(j) - \varphi_{ir}(j-1) \le +500 \ W.m^{-2}$ 

Accounting for a state constraint:

 $\chi(0.8e_{sec}, j) - \chi(0.9e_{sec}, j) \le 0.014 \ kg.kg^{-1}$ 

Stop the procedure when the sample is dry:  $\chi(z,j) \leq 0.01 \ \forall z$

Minimization of the drying time without (red)/with (blue) the state constraint.

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# Conclusions

- A real-time model based predictive control for processes modeled by PDE has been shown:
  - to solve any **optimization task**,
  - while including any **process limitations**.
- For the drying process:
  - influence of the estimated difference of humidity over drying time optimization has been shown,
  - any specified constraints based on input, measured outputs and estimated unmeasured variables may be explicitly accounted for.

**Perspectives: Experimental observer validation** 

Which new additional devices can we use to measure the humidity profile inside the low thickness painting sample ?

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#### **Real time aspect: variation model**

A model linearization about  $(\mathcal{S}_0)$   $(u_0, x_0, y_0)$ , with variations s.t. :

$$u(k) = u_0(k) + \Delta u(k)$$
  

$$x_m(k) = x_0(k) + \Delta x_m(k)$$
  

$$y_m(k) = y_0(k) + \Delta y_m(k)$$

leads to  $(\mathcal{S}_{TVL})$ :

$$\frac{\partial \Delta x_m}{\partial t} = \frac{\partial F_d}{\partial x_m} \Delta x_m \text{ for } 0 < z < e_{sec}, \ t > 0$$

$$\frac{\partial F_b}{\partial x_m} \Delta x_m + \frac{\partial F_b}{\partial u} \Delta u = 0 \text{ for } z \in \{0, \ e_{sec}\}, \ t > 0$$

$$\Delta y_m = C \Delta x_m \text{ for } 0 \le z \le e_{sec}, \ t > 0$$

$$\Delta x_m(z, 0) = 0 \text{ for } 0 \le z \le e_{sec}$$
