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# Physical Properties of New, Lead Free BaTi<sub>1</sub> <sub>x</sub>(Nb<sub>0.5</sub>Yb<sub>0.5</sub>)<sub>x</sub>O<sub>3</sub> Ceramics

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New lead free ceramics derived from the ferroelectric material  $BaTiO_3$  by substituting  $Ti^{4+}$  by  $Nb^{5+}$  and  $Yb^{3+}$ . The dielectric and ferroelectric properties were studied. The compositions  $BaTi_{1-x}(Nb_0.5Yb_0.5)_xO_3$  display a classical ferroelectric  $(0 \le x < 0.1)$  and relaxor ferroelectric behaviour  $(0.1 \le x \le 0.2)$ .  $BaTi_{0.9}(Nb_0.5Yb_0.5)_{0.1}O_3$  specimen present a relaxor behaviour at a temperature close to room with high permittivity  $(\varepsilon'_i = 9500 \text{ at } 1 \text{ kHz})$ , which opens the way for possible use of it for capacitor applications. The polarisation hysteresis loops were observed of relaxor  $BaTi_{0.875}(Nb_0.5Yb_0.5)_{0.125}O_3$  specimen. The ceramic  $BaTi_{0.9}(Yb_{0.5}Nb_{0.5})_{0.1}O_3$  provides a piezoelectric constant  $d_{31}$  of about 11.17 pC/N near room temperature.

#### 1. Introduction

Ferroelectric materials with perovskite structure can be divided into two different classes according to their behaviour: depending on whether they are classical ferroelectrics or relaxor [1]. The relaxor behaviour in perovskites was studied predominantly in Pb containing ternary compounds (PMN, PZN, PST) and solid solutions (PLZT, PMN PT) [2]. Various models, such as the inhomogeous microregion [3], the superparaelectric [4], the dipolar glass, the oder disoder [5] and the local electric field [6] models have been proposed to explain the relaxor behaviour. During the past years, some lead free BaTiO<sub>3</sub> derived from solid solution compositions attracted much attention as environmentally benign relaxor materials [7–11]. However, up to now the obtained values of the dielectric permittivity maximum temperature,  $T_m$ , in the BaTiO<sub>3</sub>-based relaxors were too low for potential applications [12]. The aim of the present paper is to study the ferroelectrics properties of BaTi<sub>1-x</sub>(Nb<sub>0.5</sub>Yb<sub>0.5</sub>)<sub>x</sub>O<sub>3</sub> solid solution forming a new family of lead free materials.

#### 2. Experiment

The various compositions of  $BaTi_{1-x}(Nb_{0.5}Yb_{0.5})_xO_3$  were obtained from  $BaCO_3$ ,  $TiO_2$ ,  $Nb_2O_5$  and  $Yb_2O_3$  after calcinations at  $1100^{\circ}C$  for 15 hunder oxygen. Disk shaped ceramics

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were sintered at 1300°C-1400°C, depending on the composition, for 4 h under oxygen atmosphere.

Room temperature powder X-ray diffraction (XRD) was performed on a Philips diffractometer using Cu- $K_{\alpha}$  radiation ( $\lambda=1.5418$  Å). The diameter shrinkage was systematically determined as  $\Delta\Phi/\Phi=(\Phi_{init}-\Phi_{final}/\Phi_{init})$  of the ceramics are in the range 14–17%. The densities of the sintered samples were 93–95% of the theoretical values. From room temperature X-ray scattering, we checked that the purity phase of the ceramics was limited to x=0.2 composition.

Dielectric measurements were performed on ceramic discs after deposition of gold electrodes on the circular faces by dc sputtering. The real and imaginary parts of the permittivity  $\varepsilon_1'$  and  $\varepsilon_1''$  were measured under helium as a function of both temperature (85–500 K) and frequency ( $10^2 2 \times 10^5 \text{ Hz}$ ) using a Wayne-Kerr 6425 component analyzer.

The ferroelectric hysteresis loop parameters such as remanent polarization ( $P_r$ ) and coercive field ( $E_c$ ) were estimated from the hysteresis loop observed on the screen of a 515A JEKT Ronicks oscilloscope with the aid of a homebuilt 'Sawyer-Tower' circuit.

Piezoelectric resonance measurements were undertaken with an HP4194A impedance analyzer of the samples prepared in disc shapes. The sample was poled using a DC electric field of 1.6 kVmm<sup>-1</sup> at 270 K for some minutes and then short circuited for 10 min in order to eliminate any residual space charge. Piezoelectric measurements were performed at 280 K.

#### 3. Results and Discussion

#### 3.1. Phase Identification

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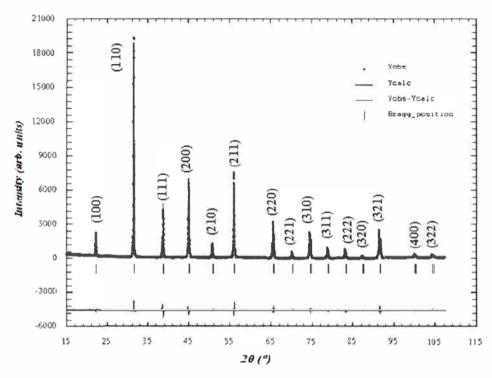


Figure 1. X ray diffraction pattern of a cubic sample with composition BaTi<sub>0.9</sub>(Nb<sub>0.5</sub>Yb<sub>0.5</sub>)<sub>0.1</sub>O<sub>3</sub>.

The structural type was kept as a perovskite. When  $0 \le x < 0.1$ , room temperature XRD patterns were fully indexed on the tetragonal symmetry, while for  $0.1 \le x \le 0.2$ , they were fully indexed in cubic symmetry. The observed, calculated and the difference of the X-ray diffraction patterns for ceramics with compositions x = 0.1 is given as an example in Figure 1.

#### 3.2. Dielectric Properties

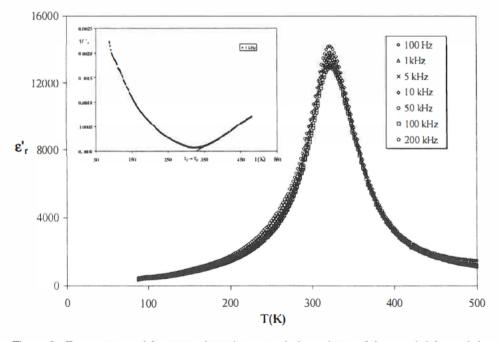


Figure 2. Temperature and frequency dependence on  $\varepsilon_t'$ , the real part of the permittivity, and the temperature dependence of  $1/\varepsilon_t'$  at  $10^3$  Hz, for a ceramic with composition BaTi<sub>0.925</sub>(Nb<sub>0.5</sub>Yb<sub>0.5</sub>)<sub>0.075</sub>O<sub>3</sub>.

For x varying from 0 to 0.075, the ceramics showed classical ferroelectric behaviour with a slightly peak of  $\varepsilon_r'$  characteristic of ferroelectric-paraelectric transition (see Figure 2 as an example) and the value of  $T_C$  was not dependent on frequency. For these compositions, the temperature dependence of  $1/\varepsilon_r'$  at  $10^3$ Hz showed that the Curie Weiss law  $\varepsilon_r' = C/(T-T_0)$  is followed for  $T > T_C$  (inset in Figure 2). The transition which was of first order for BaTiO<sub>3</sub> moved to second order for  $0 < x \le 0.075$ .

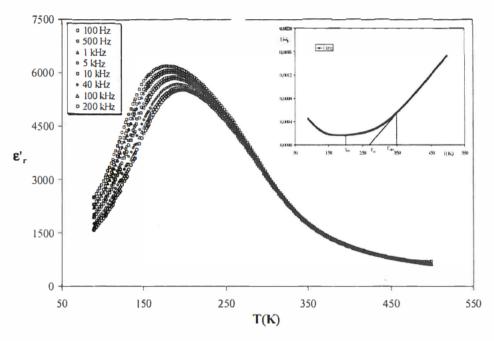


Figure 3. Temperature and frequency dependence on  $\varepsilon'_1$ , the real part of the permittivity, and the temperature dependence on  $1/\varepsilon'_1$  at  $10^3$  Hz, for a ceramic with composition BaTi<sub>0.85</sub>(Nb<sub>0.5</sub>Yb<sub>0.5</sub>)<sub>0.15</sub>O<sub>3</sub>.

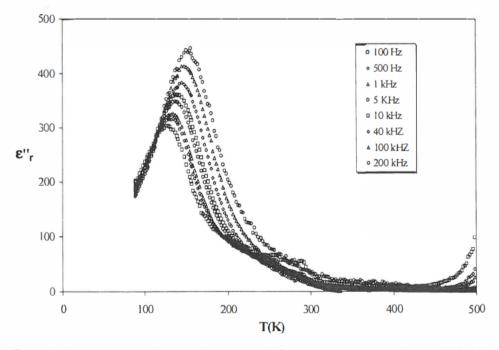


Figure 4. Temperature and frequency dependence of  $\varepsilon''_r$ , the imaginary part of the permittivity, for a ceramic with composition BaTi<sub>0.85</sub>(Nb<sub>0.5</sub>Yb<sub>0.5</sub>)<sub>0.15</sub>O<sub>3</sub>.

In composition range  $0.1 \le x \le 0.2$ , the peak of  $\varepsilon_r'$  becomes very broad with strong frequency dispersion of  $\varepsilon_r'$  and  $\varepsilon_r''$  and shift of  $T_m$ . Figure 3 shows, for example, the dielectric behaviour for x=0.15. The maximum value of  $\varepsilon_1'$  decreased and the temperature  $T_m$  associated to  $\varepsilon_{rmax}'$  shifted to higher values as the frequencies increased. The temperature  $T_m$  of  $\varepsilon_r''$  was shifted to higher values at greater frequencies, but opposite to the evolution of  $\varepsilon_r'$ ,  $\varepsilon_r''$  increased when the frequency increased (Figure 4). Moreover, there was a deviation from the Curie Weiss law (inset in Figure 3). The value of the Curie Weiss temperature  $T_0$  was greater that of  $T_m$ . As x increased, the value of  $T_{dev}$   $T_m$  increased. A strong dielectric dispersion is evidenced leading to Vogel Fulcher behaviour. The latter was computed using the equation  $f = f_0 \exp(E_a/k_B(T_m - T_{VF}))$  where  $f_0$  is the high temperature extrapolation

of the attempt frequency,  $E_a$  the activation energy,  $k_B$  the Boltzmann constant and  $T_{VF}$  the static freezing temperature [13]. For example, for x = 0.15 the parameters of Vogel-Fulcher relation were  $E_a = 0.042$  eV,  $f_0 = 7 \times 10^9$  Hz and  $T_{VF} = 151$  K. All these characteristics are typical of relaxor behaviour.

All dielectric data for  $BaTi_{1-x}(Nb_{0.5}Yb_{0.5})_xO_3$  ceramics are summarised in Table 1. We noted that the temperature  $T_C$  (or  $T_m$ ) decreases with the increase of  $Nb^{5+}$  and  $Yb^{3+}$  were substituted for  $Ti^{4+}$ . This variation is related to the sizes of  $Nb^{5+}$  and  $Yb^{3+}$  which are larger than that of  $Ti^{4+}$  ( $r_{Nb5+}=0.64$  Å,  $r_{Yb3+}=0.868$  Å and  $r_{Ti4+}=0.605$  Å for six coordinations [14]). This limits the shift ( $\Delta z$ ) of the tetravalent cation from the octahedron centre, leading to a decrease of  $T_C$ , according to the empirical relation [15], where  $T_C$  and ( $\Delta z$ )<sup>2</sup> are directly correlated. In addition, we remark that in classical ferroelectric phase, substituting of  $Ti^{4+}$  by  $Nb^{5+}$  and  $Yb^{3+}$  induces not only a decrease in  $T_C$  but also an increase of  $\varepsilon'_{rmax}$ , which reaches 13800 at 324 K for x=0.075 composition.

For a Nb<sup>5+</sup> and Yb<sup>3+</sup> for Ti<sup>4+</sup> substitution rate ( $x \ge 0.1$ ) the relaxor phase appears. The main dielectric relaxor characteristics ( $\Delta T_m$  and  $\Delta \varepsilon_r'$ , Table 1) increases as x increases. This is due of course to the strong composition heterogeneity that exacerbates the relaxor effect. This was typically the case in the lead perovskite relaxor Pb(Mg<sub>1/3</sub>Nb<sub>2/3</sub>)O<sub>3</sub> where a local 1:1 order between niobium and magnesium atoms generated ordered regions surrounded by rich niobium polar regions. The heterogeneity thus created induced the relaxor effect commonly correlated with nanoscale spontaneous [2]. The present result is of great interest for obtained relaxor compositions at temperature close to 295 K for use as lead capacitor dielectrics or actuators. As an example, the composition x = 0.1, presents a relaxor behaviour at  $T_m = 284$  K with an important value of  $\varepsilon_r'$  of about 9500 at 1 kHz (Table 1). The room temperature values of  $\varepsilon_r'$  and  $\tan \delta$  are 8990 and 0.01 respectively.

#### 3.3. Ferroelectric Behaviour

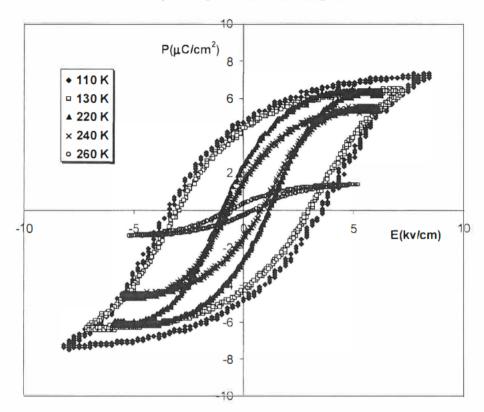
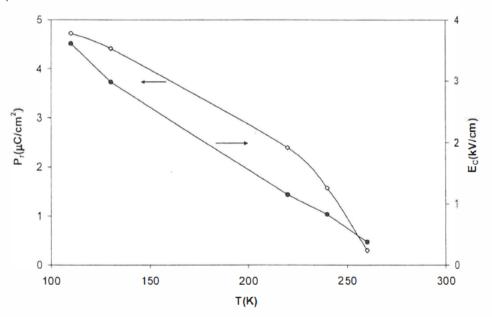


Figure 5. P E hysteresis loops of  $BaTi_{0.875}(Nb_{0.5}Yb_{0.5})_{0.125}O_3$  ceramic recorded at different tem perature.

The polarisation hysteresis loops of BaTi<sub>0.875</sub>(Nb<sub>0.5</sub> Yb<sub>0.5</sub>)<sub>0.125</sub>O<sub>3</sub> measured at different temperatures are shown in Figure 5. At temperature far below  $T_{F'rm}$  near-square P-E loops are observed, with remanent polarization ( $P_r$ ) of 4.725  $\mu$ C/cm<sup>2</sup> and coercive field ( $E_C$ ) of 3.61 kV/cm at 110 K. With increasing temperature,  $P_r$  and  $E_C$  decrease simultaneously (Figure 6). However, at  $T_{E'rm}$  and above,  $P_r$  is not zero, a nonlinear P-E behaviour is present, typical ferroelectric relaxor characteristic [4].
