## Riesz transforms associated to Schrödinger operators with negative potentials

Abstract The goal of this paper is to study the Riesz transforms $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ where $A$ is the Schrödinger operator $-\Delta-V, V \geq 0$, under different conditions on the potential $V$. We prove that if $V$ is strongly subcritical, $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right), N \geq 3$, for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ where $p_{0}^{\prime}$ is the dual exponent of $p_{0}$ where $2<\frac{2 N}{N-2}<p_{0}<\infty$; and we give a counterexample to the boundedness on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for $p \in\left(1 ; p_{0}^{\prime}\right) \cup\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$ where $p_{0 *}:=\frac{p_{0} N}{N+p_{0}}$ is the reverse Sobolev exponent of $p_{0}$. In addition, if the potential is in $L^{N / 2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$. If the potential is strongly subcritical in the Kato subclass $K_{N}^{\infty}$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in(1 ; 2]$, moreover if it is in $L^{N / 2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in(1 ; N)$. We prove also boundedness of $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ with the same conditions on the same spaces.

## 1 Introduction and definitions

Let $A$ be a Schrödinger operator $-\Delta+V$ where $-\Delta$ is the nonnegative Laplace operator and the potential $V: \mathbb{R}^{N} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ such that $V=V^{+}-V^{-}$(where $V^{+}$ and $V^{-}$are the positive and negative parts of $V$, respectively). The operator is defined via the sesquilinear form method. We define
$\mathfrak{a}(u, v)=\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} \nabla u(x) \nabla v(x) d x+\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} V^{+}(x) u(x) v(x) d x-\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} V^{-}(x) u(x) v(x) d x$

D(\mathfrak{a})=\left\{u \in W^{1,2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right), \int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} V^{+}(x) u^{2}(x) d x<\infty\right\}
$$

Here we assume $V^{+} \in L_{l o c}^{1}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ and $V^{-}$satisfies (for all $\left.u \in D(\mathfrak{a})\right)$ :

$$
\begin{align*}
\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} & V^{-}(x) u^{2}(x) d x \leq \\
& \alpha\left[\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}}|\nabla u|^{2}(x) d x+\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} V^{+}(x) u^{2}(x) d x\right]+\beta \int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} u^{2}(x) d x \tag{1}
\end{align*}
$$

where $\alpha \in(0,1)$ and $\beta \in \mathbb{R}$. By the well-known KLMN theorem (see for example [14] Chapter VI), the form $\mathfrak{a}$ is closed (and bounded from below). Its associated operator is $A$. If in addition $\beta \leq 0$, then $A$ is nonnegative.

We can define the Riesz transforms associated to $A$ by

$$
\nabla A^{-1 / 2}:=\frac{1}{\Gamma\left(\frac{1}{2}\right)} \int_{0}^{\infty} \sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A} \frac{d t}{t}
$$

The boundedness of Riesz transforms on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ implies that the domain of $A^{1 / 2}$ is included in the Sobolev space $W^{1, p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$. Thus the solution of the corresponding evolution equation will be in the Sobolev space $W^{1, p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for initial data in $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$.

It is our aim to study the boundedness on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ of the Riesz transforms $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$. We are also interested in the boundedness of the operator $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$. If $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ and $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$, we obtain for some positive constant $C$

$$
\|\nabla u\|_{p}+\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{p} \leq C\left\|(-\Delta+V)^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{p}
$$

By a duality argument, we obtain

$$
\left\|(-\Delta+V)^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{p^{\prime}} \leq C\left(\|\nabla u\|_{p^{\prime}}+\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{p^{\prime}}\right)
$$

where $p^{\prime}$ is the dual exponent of $p$.
Riesz transforms associated to Schrödinger operators with nonnegative potentials were studied by Ouhabaz [16], Shen [17], and Auscher and Ben Ali [2]. Ouhabaz proved that Riesz transforms are bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in(1 ; 2]$, for all potential $V$ locally integrable. Shen and Auscher and Ben Ali proved that if the potential $V$ is in the reverse Hölder class $B_{q}$, then the Riesz transforms are bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in\left(1, p_{1}\right)$ where $2<p_{1} \leq \infty$ depends on $q$. The result of Auscher and Ben Ali generalize that of Shen because Shen has restrictions on the dimension $N$ and on the class $B_{q}$.

With negative potentials new difficulties appear. If we take $V \in L^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$, and apply the method in [16] to the operator $A+\|V\|_{\infty}$, we obtain boundedness of $\nabla\left(A+\|V\|_{\infty}\right)^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in(1 ; 2]$. This is weaker than the boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ on the same spaces. Guillarmou and Hassell 12 studied Riesz transforms $\nabla\left(A \circ P_{+}\right)^{-1 / 2}$ where $A$ is the Schrödinger operator with negative potential and $P_{+}$is the spectral projection on the positive spectrum.

They prove that, on asymptotically conic manifolds $M$ of dimension $N \geq 3$, if $V$ is smooth and satisfies decay conditions, and the Schrödinger operator has no zero-modes nor zero-resonances, then Riesz transforms $\nabla\left(A \circ P_{+}\right)^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}(M)$ for all $p \in(1, N)$. They also prove (see 13]) that when zero-modes are present, Riesz transforms $\nabla\left(A \circ P_{+}\right)^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}(M)$ for all $p \in\left(\frac{N}{N-2}, \frac{N}{3}\right)$, with bigger range possible if the zero modes have extra decay at infinity.

In this paper we consider only negative potentials. From now on, we denote by $A$ the Schrödinger operator with negative potential,

$$
A:=-\Delta-V, \quad V \geq 0
$$

Our purpose is to find optimal conditions on $V$ allowing the boundedness of Riesz transforms $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ and that of $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$.
Let us take the following definition
Definition 11 We say that the potential $V$ is strongly subcritical if for some $\varepsilon>0, A \geq \varepsilon V$. This means that for all $u \in W^{1,2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$

$$
\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} V u^{2} \leq \frac{1}{1+\varepsilon} \int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}}|\nabla u|^{2}
$$

For more information on strongly subcritical potentials see 10 and 21.
With this condition, $V$ satisfies assumption (11) where $\beta=0$ and $\alpha=\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}$. Thus $A$ is well defined, nonnegative and $-A$ generates an analytic contraction semigroup $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t \geq 0}$ on $L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$.

Since $-\Delta-V \geq \varepsilon V$ we have $(1+\varepsilon)(-\Delta-V) \geq \varepsilon(-\Delta)$. Therefore

$$
\begin{equation*}
\|\nabla u\|_{2}^{2} \leq\left(1+\frac{1}{\varepsilon}\right)\left\|A^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2} \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

Thus, $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$. Conversely, it is clear that if $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ then $V$ is strongly subcritical.

We observe also that $-\Delta-V \geq \varepsilon V$ is equivalent to

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2} \leq \frac{1}{\varepsilon}\left\|A^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2} \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

Thus, $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ if and only if $V$ is strongly subcritical.
So we can conclude that

$$
\|\nabla u\|_{2}+\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2} \leq C\left\|(-\Delta-V)^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}
$$

if and only if $V$ is strongly subcritical. Then by duality argument we have

$$
\|\nabla u\|_{2}+\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2} \approx\left\|(-\Delta-V)^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}
$$

if and only if $V$ is strongly subcritical.
To study Riesz transforms on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for $1 \leq p \leq \infty$ with $p \neq 2$ we use the results on the uniform boundedness of the semigroup on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$. Taking central potentials which are equivalent to $c /|x|^{2}$ as $|x|$ tends to infinity where $0<c<\left(\frac{N-2}{2}\right)^{2}, N \geq 3$, Davies and Simon 10 proved that for all $t>0$ and all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)$,

$$
\left\|e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C
$$

where $2<\frac{2 N}{N-2}<p_{0}<\infty$ and $p_{0}^{\prime}$ its dual exponent. Next Liskevich, Sobol, and Vogt 15) proved the uniform boundedness on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)$ where $2<\frac{2 N}{N-2}<p_{0}=\frac{2 N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}$, for general strongly subcritical potentials. They also proved that the range $\left(p_{0}^{\prime}, p_{0}\right)$ is optimal and the semigroup does not even act on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for $p \notin\left(p_{0}^{\prime}, p_{0}\right)$. Under additional condition on $V$, Takeda [20] used stochastic methods to prove a Gaussian estimate of the associated heat kernel. Thus the semigroup acts boundedly on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in[1, \infty]$.

In this paper we prove that when $V$ is strongly subcritical and $N \geq 3$, Riesz transforms are bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$. We also give a counterexample to the boundedness of Riesz transforms on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ when $p \in\left(1 ; p_{0}^{\prime}\right) \cup\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$ where $2<p_{0 *}:=\frac{p_{0} N}{N+p_{0}}<p_{0}<\infty$. This example is a counterexample to the boundedness of $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ when $p \in$ $\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$. If, in addition, $V \in L^{N / 2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ then Riesz transforms are bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime}, p_{0 *}\right)$. If $V$ is strongly subcritical in the Kato subclass $K_{N}^{\infty}, N \geq 3$ (see Section 5), then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in$ $(1,2]$. If, in addition, $V \in L^{N / 2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ then it is bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for all $p \in(1, N)$. With the same conditions, we prove similar results for the operator $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$. Hence if $V$ is strongly subcritical and $V \in L^{N / 2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right), N \geq 3$, then

$$
\begin{equation*}
\|\nabla u\|_{p}+\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{p} \approx\left\|(-\Delta-V)^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{p} \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $p \in\left(\left(p_{0 *}\right)^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$. If in addition $V \in K_{N}^{\infty}$, then (4) holds for all $p \in$ $\left(N^{\prime} ; N\right)$.

For the proof of the boundedness of Riesz transforms we use the off-diagonal estimates (for properties and more details see [4]). These estimates are a generalization of the Gaussian estimates used by Coulhon and Duong in [9] to study the Riesz transforms associated to the Laplace-Beltrami operator on Riemannian manifolds, and by Duong, Ouhabaz and Yan in [11] to study the magnetic Schrödinger operator on $\mathbb{R}^{N}$. We also use the approach of Blunck and Kunstmann in [6] to weak type ( $p, p$ )-estimates. In [1], Auscher used these tools to divergence-form operators with complex coefficients. We study also the Berry-Esseen estimate. Coulhon and Dungey [8] used these estimates to study the Riesz transforms associated to the divergence-form operators with real coefficients. In contrast to (12] and [13], we do not assume decay nor
smoothness conditions on $V$.
In the following sections, we denote by $L^{p}$ the Lebesgue space $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ with the Lebesgue measure $d x,\|.\|_{p}$ its usual norm, (.,.) the inner product of $L^{2},\|.\|_{p-q}$ the norm of operators acting from $L^{p}$ to $L^{q}$. We denote by $C, c$ the positive constants even if their values change at each occurrence. Through this paper, $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ denotes one of the partial derivative $\frac{\partial}{\partial x_{k}} A^{-1 / 2}$ for any fixed $k \in\{1, \ldots, N\}$.

## 2 Off-diagonal estimates

In this section, we show that $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0},\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ and $\left(\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ satisfy $L^{p}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimates provided that $V$ is strongly subcritical.

Definition 21 Let $\left(T_{t}\right)_{t>0}$ be a family of uniformly bounded operators on $L^{2}$. We say that $\left(T_{t}\right)_{t>0}$ satisfies $L^{p}-L^{q}$ off-diagonal estimates for $p, q \in[1 ; \infty]$ with $p \leq q$ if there exist positive constants $C$ and $c$ such that for all closed sets $E$ and $F$ of $\mathbb{R}^{N}$ and all $h \in L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right) \cap L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ with support in $E$, we have for all $t>0$ :

$$
\left\|T_{t} h\right\|_{L^{q}(F)} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p q}} e^{-\frac{c d(E, F)^{2}}{t}}\|h\|_{p}
$$

where $d$ is the Euclidean distance and $\gamma_{p q}:=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{q}\right)$.
Proposition 21 Let $A=-\Delta-V$ where $V \geq 0$ and $V$ is strongly subcritical. Then $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0},\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$, and $\left(\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ satisfy $L^{2}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimates, and we have for all $t>0$ and all $f \in L^{2}$ supported in E:
(i) $\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq e^{-d^{2}(E, F) / 4 t}\|f\|_{2}$,
(ii) $\left\|\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq C e^{-d^{2}(E, F) / 16 t}\|f\|_{2}$,
(iii) $\left\|\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq C e^{-d^{2}(E, F) / 8 t}\|f\|_{2}$.

Proof The ideas are classical and rely on the well known Davies perturbation technique. Let $A_{\rho}:=e^{\rho \phi} A e^{-\rho \phi}$ where $\rho>0$ and $\phi$ is a Lipschitz function with $|\nabla \phi| \leq 1$ a.e.. Here $A_{\rho}$ is the associated operator to the sesquilinear form $\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}$ defined by

$$
\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, v):=\mathfrak{a}\left(e^{-\rho \phi} u, e^{\rho \phi} v\right)
$$

for all $u, v \in D(\mathfrak{a})$.
By the strong subcriticality property of $V$ we have for all $u \in W^{1,2}$

$$
\begin{align*}
\left(\left(A_{\rho}+\rho^{2}\right) u, u\right) & =-\int \rho^{2}|\nabla \phi|^{2} u^{2}+\int|\nabla u|^{2}-\int V u^{2}+\rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2} \\
& \geq \varepsilon\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2} \tag{5}
\end{align*}
$$

Using (2), we obtain

$$
\begin{align*}
\left(\left(A_{\rho}+\rho^{2}\right) u, u\right) & =-\int \rho^{2}|\nabla \phi|^{2} u^{2}+\int|\nabla u|^{2}-\int V u^{2}+\rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2} \\
& \geq \frac{\varepsilon}{\varepsilon+1}\|\nabla u\|_{2}^{2} \tag{6}
\end{align*}
$$

In particular $\left(A_{\rho}+\rho^{2}\right)$ is a maximal accretive operator on $L^{2}$, and this implies

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|e^{-t A_{\rho}} u\right\|_{2} \leq e^{t \rho^{2}}\|u\|_{2} \tag{7}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now we want to estimate

$$
\left\|\left(A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}\right) e^{-t\left(A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}\right)}\right\|_{2-2} .
$$

First, let us prove that $A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}$ is a sectorial operator.
For $u$ complex-valued,

$$
\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u):=\mathfrak{a}(u, u)+\rho \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u}-\rho \int \bar{u} \nabla \phi \nabla u-\rho^{2} \int|\nabla \phi|^{2}|u|^{2}
$$

Then

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u)+2 \rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2} & \geq \mathfrak{a}(u, u)+\rho \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u}-\rho \int \bar{u} \nabla \phi \nabla u+\rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2} \\
& =\mathfrak{a}(u, u)+2 i \rho \mathfrak{I m} \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u}+\rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2} .
\end{aligned}
$$

This implies that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathfrak{R e}\left(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u)+2 \rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2}\right) \geq \mathfrak{a}(u, u) \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathfrak{R e}\left(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u)+2 \rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2}\right) \geq \rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2} \tag{9}
\end{equation*}
$$

On the other hand,

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u) & =\mathfrak{a}(u, u)+\rho \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u}-\rho \int \bar{u} \nabla \phi \nabla u-\rho^{2} \int|\nabla \phi|^{2}|u|^{2} \\
& =\mathfrak{a}(u, u)+2 i \rho \mathfrak{I m} \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u}-\rho^{2} \int|\nabla \phi|^{2}|u|^{2} .
\end{aligned}
$$

So

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left|\mathfrak{I m}\left(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u)+2 \rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2}\right)\right| & =2|\rho| \int|u||\nabla \phi||\overline{\nabla u}| \\
& \leq 2|\rho|\|u\|_{2}\|\nabla u\|_{2} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Using (2) we obtain that

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left|\mathfrak{I m}\left(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u)+2 \rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2}\right)\right| & \leq 2|\rho|\|u\|_{2} c_{\varepsilon} \mathfrak{a}^{\frac{1}{2}}(u, u) \\
& \leq c_{\varepsilon}^{2} \mathfrak{a}(u, u)+\rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

where $c_{\varepsilon}=\left(1+\frac{1}{\varepsilon}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}$. Now using estimates (8) and (9), we deduce that there exists a constant $C>0$ depending only on $\varepsilon$ such that

\left|\mathfrak{I m}\left(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u)+2 \rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2}\right)\right| \leq C \mathfrak{R e}\left(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u)+2 \rho^{2}\|u\|_{2}^{2}\right) .
$$

We conclude that (see 14 or 16)

\left\|e^{-z\left(A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}\right)}\right\|_{2-2} \leq 1
$$

for all $z$ in the open sector of angle $\arctan (1 / C)$. Hence by the Cauchy formula

\left\|\left(A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}\right) e^{-t\left(A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}\right)}\right\|_{2-2} \leq \frac{C}{t} \tag{10}
\end{equation*}
$$

The constant $C$ is independent of $\rho$.
By estimate (5) and (6) we have

\left(\left(A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}\right) u, u\right) \geq\left(\left(A_{\rho}+\rho^{2}\right) u, u\right) \geq \varepsilon\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2}

\left(\left(A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}\right) u, u\right) \geq\left(\left(A_{\rho}+\rho^{2}\right) u, u\right) \geq \frac{\varepsilon}{\varepsilon+1}\|\nabla u\|_{2}^{2}

Setting $u=e^{-t\left(A_{\rho}+2 \rho^{2}\right)} f$ and using (10) and (7)
we obtain

Let E and F be two closed subsets of $\mathbb{R}^{N}, f \in L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ supported in E , and let $\phi(x):=d(x, E)$ where $d$ is the Euclidean distance. Since $e^{\rho \phi} f=f$, we have the following relation

Now taking the norm on $L^{2}(F)$, we obtain from (7), (11) and (12)

\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq e^{-\rho d(E, F)} e^{\rho^{2} t}\|f\|_{2}  \tag{13}\\
\left\|\nabla e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq \rho e^{-\rho d(E, F)} e^{\rho^{2} t}\|f\|_{2}+\frac{C}{\sqrt{t}} e^{-\rho d(E, F)} e^{2 t \rho^{2}}\|f\|_{2} \tag{14}
\end{gather*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq \frac{C}{\sqrt{t}} e^{-\rho d(E, F)} e^{2 \rho^{2} t}\|f\|_{2} . \tag{15}
\end{equation*}
$$

We set $\rho=d(E, F) / 2 t$ in (13) and $\rho=d(E, F) / 4 t$ in (15), then we get the $L^{2}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimates $(i)$ and (iii).
We set $\rho=d(E, F) / 4 t$ in (14), we get

\left\|\nabla e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq \frac{C}{\sqrt{t}}\left(1+\frac{d(E, F)}{4 \sqrt{t}}\right) e^{-d^{2}(E, F) / 8 t}\|f\|_{2}

This gives estimate (ii).
Now, we study the $L^{p}-L^{2}$ boundedness of the semigroup, of its gradient, and of $\left(V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$.

Proposition 22 Suppose that $A \geq \varepsilon V$, then $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0},\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ and $\left(\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ are $L^{p}-L^{2}$ bounded for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$. Here $p_{0}^{\prime}$ is the dual exponent of $p_{0}$ where $p_{0}=\frac{2 N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}$, and the dimension $N \geq 3$. More precisely we have for all $t>0$ :
i) $\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{2} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}}\|f\|_{p}$,
ii) $\left\|\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A} f\right\|_{2} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}}\|f\|_{p}$,
iii) $\left\|\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A} f\right\|_{2} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}}\|f\|_{p}$,
where $\gamma_{p}=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{2}\right)$.
Proof i) We apply the Gagliardo-Nirenberg inequality

\|u\|_{2}^{2} \leq C_{a, b}\|\nabla u\|_{2}^{2 a}\|u\|_{p}^{2 b}

where $a+b=1$ and $\left(1+2 \gamma_{p}\right) a=2 \gamma_{p}$, to $u=e^{-t A} f$ for all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}$, all $t>0$, and all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$. We obtain

$$
\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{2}^{2} \leq C_{a, b}\left\|\nabla e^{-t A} f\right\|_{2}^{2 a}\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{p}^{2 b}
$$

At present we use the boundedness of the semigroup on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ proved in [15], and the fact that $\|\nabla u\|_{2}^{2} \leq(1+1 / \varepsilon)(A u, u)$ from the strong subcriticality condition, then we obtain that

\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{2}^{2 / a} \leq-C \psi^{\prime}(t)\|f\|_{p}^{2 b / a}
$$

where $\psi(t)=\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{2}^{2}$. This implies

\|f\|_{p}^{-2 b / a} \leq C\left(\psi(t)^{\frac{a-1}{a}}\right)^{\prime}
$$

Since $\frac{2 b}{a}=\frac{1}{\gamma_{p}}$ and $\frac{a-1}{a}=-\frac{1}{2 \gamma_{p}}$, integration between 0 and $t$ yields

t\|f\|_{p}^{-1 / \gamma_{p}} \leq C\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{2}^{-1 / \gamma_{p}}
$$

which gives i).
We obtain ii) by using the following decomposition:

\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}=\sqrt{t} \nabla A^{-1 / 2} A^{1 / 2} e^{-t A / 2} e^{-t A / 2}
$$

the boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ and of $\left(\sqrt{t} A^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ on $L^{2}$, and the fact that $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is $L^{p}-L^{2}$ bounded for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ proved in i).
We prove iii) by using the following decomposition:

\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}=\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2} A^{1 / 2} e^{-t A / 2} e^{-t A / 2}
$$

the boundedness of $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$
and of $\left(\sqrt{t} A^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ on $L^{2}$, and the fact that $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is $L^{p}-L^{2}$ bounded for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ proved in i).

We invest the previous results to obtain :
Theorem 21 Assume that $A \geq \varepsilon V$ then $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}, \quad\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0} \quad$ and $\left(\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ satisfy $L^{p}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimates for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$. Here $p_{0}^{\prime}$ is the dual exponent of $p_{0}$ where $p_{0}=\frac{2 N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}$, and the dimension $N \geq 3$. Then we have for all $t>0$, all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$, and all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}$ with $\operatorname{supp} f \subseteq E$
i)

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}} e^{-\frac{c d^{2}(E, F)}{t}}\|f\|_{p} \tag{16}
\end{equation*}
$$

ii)

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}} e^{-\frac{c d^{2}(E, F)}{t}}\|f\|_{p} \tag{17}
\end{equation*}
$$

iii)

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{2}(F)} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}} e^{-\frac{c d^{2}(E, F)}{t}}\|f\|_{p} \tag{18}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\gamma_{p}=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{2}\right)$ and $C, c$ are positive constants.
Remark: By duality, we deduce from (16) a $L^{2}-L^{p}$ off-diagonal estimate of the norm of the semigroup for all $p \in\left[2 ; p_{0}\right.$ ), but we cannot deduce from (17) and (18) the same estimate of the norm of $\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A} f$ and of $\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A} f$ because they are not selfadjoint. This affect the boundedness of Riesz transforms and of $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{p}$ for $p>2$.

Proof i) In the previous proposition we have proved that

for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$. This implies that for all $t>0$

$$

where $\chi_{M}$ is the characteristic function of $M$. The $L^{2}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate proved in the Proposition 21 implies that

\left\|\chi_{F} e^{-t A} \chi_{E} f\right\|_{2} \leq e^{-d^{2}(E, F) / 4 t}\|f\|_{2}
$$

Hence we can apply the Riesz-Thorin interpolation theorem and we obtain the off-diagonal estimate (16).
Assertions ii) and iii) are proved in a similar way. We use $L^{2}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimates of Proposition 21 and assertions ii) and iii) of Proposition 22.

## 3 Boundedness of $\boldsymbol{\nabla} \boldsymbol{A}^{-\mathbf{1 / 2}}$ and $\boldsymbol{V}^{\mathbf{1 / 2}} \boldsymbol{A}^{\mathbf{- 1 / 2}}$ on $\boldsymbol{L}^{\boldsymbol{p}}$ for $\boldsymbol{p}<\mathbf{2}$

This section is devoted to the study of the boundedness of $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ and Riesz transforms associated to Schrödinger operators with negative and strongly subcritical potentials. We prove that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ and $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right), N \geq 3$, for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$, where $p_{0}^{\prime}$ is the exponent mentioned in Theorem 21.

Theorem 31 Assume that $A \geq \varepsilon V$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for $N \geq 3$, for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ where $p_{0}^{\prime}=\left(\frac{2 N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}\right)^{\prime}$.

Remark: In the proof of this theorem, we do not use the expression of $A$ explicitly, we use the boundedness of Riesz transforms associated to $A$ on $L^{2}$, the $L^{p}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimates of $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ and of $\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$. Hence $\nabla H^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(r ; 2]$, where $r \in[1 ; 2)$, if $\nabla H^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{2}$ where $H$ is an operator such that $\left(e^{-t H}\right)_{t>0}$ and $\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t H}\right)_{t>0}$ satisfy $L^{r}-L^{2}$ (or $L^{p}-L^{2}$ for all $\left.p \in(r ; 2]\right)$ off-diagonal estimates.

To prove Theorem 31, we prove that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is of weak type $(p, p)$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right)$ by using the following theorem of Blunck and Kunstmann [6]. Then by the boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{2}$, and the Marcinkiewicz interpolation theorem, we obtain boundedness on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$.

Theorem 32 Let $p \in[1 ; 2)$. Suppose that $T$ is sublinear operator of strong type $(2,2)$, and let $\left(A_{r}\right)_{r>0}$ be a family of linear operators acting on $L^{2}$.

Assume that for $j \geq 2$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(\frac{1}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|} \int_{C_{j}(B)}\left|T\left(I-A_{r(B)}\right) f\right|^{2}\right)^{1 / 2} \leq g(j)\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}|f|^{p}\right)^{1 / p} \tag{19}
\end{equation*}
$$

and for $j \geq 1$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(\frac{1}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|} \int_{C_{j}(B)}\left|A_{r(B)} f\right|^{2}\right)^{1 / 2} \leq g(j)\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}|f|^{p}\right)^{1 / p} \tag{20}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all ball $B$ with radius $r(B)$ and all $f$ supported in $B$. If $\Sigma:=\sum g(j) 2^{N j}<$ $\infty$, then $T$ is of weak type $(p, p)$, with a bound depending only on the strong type $(2,2)$ bound of $T, \mathrm{p}$, and $\Sigma$.
Here $C_{1}=4 B$ and $C_{j}(B)=2^{j+1} B \backslash 2^{j} B$ for $j \geq 2$, where $\lambda B$ is the ball of radius $\lambda r(B)$ with the same center as $B$, and $|\lambda B|$ its Lebesgue measure.

Proof (of Theorem 31) Let $T=\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$. We prove assumptions (19) and (20) with $A_{r}=I-\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m}$ for some $m>N / 4-\gamma_{p}$, using arguments similar to Auscher [1] Theorem 4.2.
Let us prove (20). For $f$ supported in a ball $B$ (with radius $r$ ),

\begin{aligned}
\frac{1}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{1 / 2}}\left\|A_{r} f\right\|_{L^{2}\left(C_{j}(B)\right)} & =\frac{1}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{1 / 2}}\left\|\sum_{k=1}^{m}\binom{m}{k}(-1)^{k+1} e^{-k r^{2} A} f\right\|_{L^{2}\left(C_{j}(B)\right)} \\
& \leq \frac{1}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{1 / 2}} \sum_{k=1}^{m}\binom{m}{k} C\left(k r^{2}\right)^{-\gamma_{p}} e^{\frac{-c d^{2}\left(B, C_{j}(B)\right)}{k r^{2}}}\|f\|_{p} .
\end{aligned}
$$

for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right)$ and all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}$ supported in $B$. Here we use the $L^{p}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimates (16) for $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$. Since $\gamma_{p}=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{2}\right)$ we obtain

\begin{aligned}
\left(\frac{1}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|} \int_{C_{j}(B)}\left|A_{r} f\right|^{2}\right)^{1 / 2} & \leq \frac{C r^{-2 \gamma_{p}}}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{1 / 2}} e^{\frac{-c d^{2}\left(B, C_{j}(B)\right)}{m r^{2}}}\|f\|_{p} \\
& \leq C 2^{-j N / 2} e^{\frac{-c d^{2}\left(B, C_{j}(B)\right)}{r^{2}}}\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}|f|^{p}\right)^{1 / p}
\end{aligned}
$$

This yields, for $j=1$,

\left(\frac{1}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|} \int_{C_{j}(B)}\left|A_{r} f\right|^{2}\right)^{1 / 2} \leq C 2^{-j N / 2} e^{-c 4^{j}}\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}|f|^{p}\right)^{1 / p}
$$

Thus assumption (20) of Theorem 32 holds with $\sum_{j \geq 1} g(j) 2^{j N}<\infty$.
It remains to check the assumption (19):
We know that

then, using the Newton binomial, we get

\end{aligned}

Hence, using the $L^{p}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate (17), we obtain for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right)$, all $j \geq 2$, and all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}$ supported in $B$

\left\|\nabla A^{-1 / 2}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f\right\|_{L^{2}\left(C_{j}(B)\right)} \leq C \int_{0}^{\infty}\left|g_{r^{2}}(t)\right| t^{-\gamma_{p}-1 / 2} e^{-c 4^{j} r^{2} / t} d t\|f\|_{p}
$$

We observe that (see p. 27)

\left|g_{r^{2}}(t)\right| \leq \frac{C}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} \quad \text { if } \quad k r^{2}<t \leq(k+1) r^{2} \leq(m+1) r^{2}
$$

and

\left|g_{r^{2}}(t)\right| \leq C r^{2 m} t^{-m-1 / 2} \quad \text { if } \quad t>(m+1) r^{2}

& +C \int_{(m+1) r^{2}}^{\infty} r^{2 m} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1-m} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t\|f\|_{p} \\
& \leq I_{1}+I_{2} \tag{21}
\end{align*}
$$

We have

I_{2}:=C \int_{(m+1) r^{2}}^{\infty} r^{2 m} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1-m} e^{-\frac{c 4}{} j^{2} t^{2}} d t\|f\|_{p} \leq C r^{-2 \gamma_{p}} 2^{-2 j\left(m+\gamma_{p}\right)}\|f\|_{p}
$$

by the Laplace transform formula, and

\begin{aligned}
I_{1} & :=C\|f\|_{p} \sum_{k=0}^{m} \int_{k r^{2}}^{(k+1) r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\gamma_{p}-1 / 2}}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t \\
& =C\|f\|_{p}\left(\sum_{k=1}^{m} \int_{k r^{2}}^{(k+1) r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\gamma_{p}-1 / 2}}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t+\int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t\right) \\
& =J_{1}+J_{2} .
\end{aligned}
$$

In the preceding equation

\begin{aligned}
J_{1} & :=C\|f\|_{p} \sum_{k=1}^{m} \int_{k r^{2}}^{(k+1) r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\gamma_{p}-1 / 2}}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t \\
& \leq C\|f\|_{p} e^{-\frac{c 4 j}{m+1}} \sum_{k=1}^{m}\left(k r^{2}\right)^{-\gamma_{p}-1 / 2} \int_{k r^{2}}^{(k+1) r^{2}}\left(t-k r^{2}\right)^{-1 / 2} d t \\
& \leq C r^{-2 \gamma_{p}} 2^{-2 j\left(m+\gamma_{p}\right)}\|f\|_{p}
\end{aligned}

and

J_{2} & :=C \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1} e^{-\frac{c 4 j^{2}}{t}} d t\|f\|_{p} \\
& \leq C\|f\|_{p} e^{-\frac{c \cdot d}{2(m+1)}} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1} e^{-\frac{c j^{j} r^{2}}{2 t}} d t \\
& \leq C\|f\|_{p} 2^{-2 j m} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1-\gamma_{p}} C\left(2^{-2 j} r^{-2} t\right)^{\gamma_{p}} e^{-\frac{c 4 j r^{2}}{4 t}} d t \\
& \leq C\|f\|_{p^{2}} 2^{-2 j\left(m+\gamma_{p}\right)} r^{-2 \gamma_{p}} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c 4 j^{2} r^{2}}{4 t}} d t \\
& \leq C r^{-2 \gamma_{p}} 2^{-2 j\left(m+\gamma_{p}\right)}\|f\|_{p} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Here, for the last inequality, we use the fact that $j \geq 2$ to obtain the convergence of the integral without dependence on $r$ nor on $j$.
We can therefore employ these estimates in (21) to conclude that

$\left(\frac{1}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|} \int_{C_{j}(B)}\left|\nabla A^{-\frac{1}{2}}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f\right|^{2}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}} \leq C 2^{-2 j\left(m+\gamma_{p}+\frac{N}{4}\right)}\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}|f|^{p}\right)^{\frac{1}{p}}$
where $\sum g(j) 2^{j N}<\infty$ because we set $m>N / 4-\gamma_{p}$.
Proposition 31 Assume that $A \geq \varepsilon V$, then $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)$ for $N \geq 3$, for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ where $p_{0}^{\prime}$ is the dual exponent of $p_{0}$ with $p_{0}=$ $\frac{2 N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}$.
Proof We have seen in (3) that the operator $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{2}$. To prove its boundedness on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ we prove that it is of weak type $(p, p)$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right)$ by checking assumptions (19) and (29) of Theorem 32, where $T=V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$. Then, using the Marcinkiewicz interpolation theorem, we deduce boundedness on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$.
We check assumptions of Theorem 32 similarly as we did in the proof of Theorem 31, using the $L^{p}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate (18) instead of (17).

Let us now move on, setting $V=c|x|^{-2}$ where $0<c<\left(\frac{N-2}{2}\right)^{2}$, which is strongly subcritical thanks to the Hardy inequality, we prove that the associated Riesz transforms are not bounded on $L^{p}$ for $p \in\left(1 ; p_{0}^{\prime}\right)$ neither for $p \in\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$. We also prove that $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is not bounded on $L^{p}$ for $p \in\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$. Here $p_{0 *}=\frac{p_{0} N}{N+p_{0}}$ is the reverse Sobolev exponent of $p_{0}$.

Proposition 32 Set $V$ strongly subcritical and $N \geq 3$. Assume that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for some $p \in\left(1 ; p_{0}^{\prime}\right)$. Then there exists an exponent $q_{1} \in\left[p ; p_{0}^{\prime}\right)$ such that $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is bounded on $L^{r}$ for all $r \in\left(q_{1} ; 2\right)$.

Consider now $V=c|x|^{-2}$ where $0<c<\left(\frac{N-2}{2}\right)^{2}$. It is proved in 15] that the semigroup does not act on $L^{p}$ for $p \notin\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)$. Therefore we obtain from this proposition that the Riesz transform $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is not bounded on $L^{p}$ for $p \in\left(1 ; p_{0}^{\prime}\right)$.

Proof Assume that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for some $p \in\left(1 ; p_{0}^{\prime}\right)$. By the boundedness on $L^{2}$ and the Riesz-Thorin interpolation theorem, we get the boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{q}$ for all $q \in[p ; 2]$. Now we apply the Sobolev inequality

where $q^{*}=\frac{N q}{N-q}$ if $q<N$ to $f:=A^{-1 / 2} u$, so we get

$$

for all $q \in[p ; 2]$. In particular, $\left\|A^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{q_{1}-q_{1}^{*}} \leq C$ where $p \leq q_{1}<p_{0}^{\prime}$ such that $q_{1}^{*}>p_{0}^{\prime}$.
Decomposing the semigroup as follows

e^{-t A}=A^{1 / 2} e^{-t A / 2} e^{-t A / 2} A^{-1 / 2} \tag{23}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $A^{-1 / 2}$ is $L^{q_{1}}-L^{q_{1}^{*}}$ bounded, $e^{-t A / 2}$ has $L^{q_{1}^{*}}-L^{2}$ norm bounded by $C t^{-\gamma_{q_{1}^{*}}}$ (Proposition 22) and $A^{1 / 2} e^{-t A / 2}$ is $L^{2}-L^{2}$ bounded by $C t^{-1 / 2}$ because of the analyticity of the semigroup on $L^{2}$. Therefore, we obtain

$$
\left\|e^{-t A}\right\|_{q_{1}-2} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{q_{1}^{*}}-1 / 2}=C t^{-\gamma_{q_{1}}}
$$

We now interpolate this norm with the $L^{2}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate of the norm of $e^{-t A}$, as we did in the proof of Theorem 21, so we get a $L^{r}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate for all $r \in\left(q_{1} ; 2\right)$. Then Lemma 3.3 of [1] yields that $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is bounded on $L^{r}$ for all $r \in\left(q_{1} ; 2\right)$ for some $q_{1} \in\left[p ; p_{0}^{\prime}\right)$.

Proposition 33 Set $V$ strongly subcritical and $N \geq 3$. Assume that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for some $p \in\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$. Then there exists an exponent $q_{2}>p_{0 *}$ such that the semigroup $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is bounded on $L^{s}$ for all $s \in\left(2 ; q_{2}^{*}\right)$. Here $q_{2}^{*}>p_{0}$.

Consider now $V=c|x|^{-2}$ where $0<c<\left(\frac{N-2}{2}\right)^{2}$. It is proved in 15 that the semigroup does not act on $L^{p}$ for $p \notin\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)$. Therefore we obtain from this proposition that the Riesz transforms $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ are not bounded on $L^{p}$ for $p \in\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$.

Proof Assume that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for some $p \in\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$. Then by interpolation we obtain the boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{q}$ for all $q \in[2 ; p]$. In particular,

$$
\left\|\nabla A^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{q_{2}-q_{2}} \leq C
$$

where $p_{0 *}<q_{2}<p_{0}, q_{2} \leq p, q_{2}<N$. Using the Sobolev inequality (22), we obtain that $A^{-1 / 2}$ is $L^{q_{2}}-L^{q_{2}^{*}}$ bounded where $q_{2}^{*}>p_{0}$.
Now we decompose the semigroup as follows

e^{-t A}=A^{-1 / 2} e^{-t A / 2} A^{1 / 2} e^{-t A / 2} \tag{24}
\end{equation*}
$$

Thus we remark that it is $L^{2}-L^{q_{2}^{*}}$ bounded where $q_{2}^{*}>p_{0}$.
Then, using similar arguments as in the previous proof, we conclude that $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is bounded on $L^{s}$ for all $s \in\left(2 ; q_{2}^{*}\right)$ for some $q_{2}>p_{0 *}$.

Proposition 34 Set $V$ strongly subcritical and $N \geq 3$. Assume that $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for some $p \in\left[2 ; p_{0}\right)$. Then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{r}$ for all $r \in[2 ; p)$.

We prove this result after the proof of Theorem 43 .
Consider now $p>p_{0 *}$ and $V=c|x|^{-2}$ where $0<c<\left(\frac{N-2}{2}\right)^{2}$. It is proved in [15] that the semigroup does not act on $L^{p}$ for $p \notin\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)$. Therefore we obtain from this proposition and Proposition 33 that $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is not bounded on $L^{p}$ when $p \in\left(p_{0 *} ; p_{0}\right)$. Now if $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{q}$ for some $q \geq p_{0}$, then, by interpolation with its boundedness on $L^{2}, V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ will be bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(2 ; q)$, in particular for $p \in\left(p_{0 *} ; p_{0}\right)$. Therefore we conclude that $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is not bounded on $L^{p}$ when $p \in\left(p_{0 *} ; \infty\right)$.

## 4 The case $\boldsymbol{p} \in \mathbf{( 2 ;} \boldsymbol{\boldsymbol { p } _ { \mathbf { 0 } * }} \mathbf{)}$

In this section we prove that if the strongly subcritical potential is, in addition, in $L^{N / 2}, N \geq 3$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ and $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$. In the previous section we have proved the boundedness on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ when the potential is strongly subcritical, so it remains to study the case of $L^{p}$ when $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$.

First we prove the following result:
Theorem 41 If $\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is bounded on $L^{p_{1}}$ for some $p_{1} \in\left[2 ; p_{0}\right)$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{1}\right)$ provided that $V$ is strongly subcritical, and $N \geq 3$.

Let us prove that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ satisfies the two estimates of the following theorem proved in (3] (Theorem 2.1).
Theorem 42 Let $q \in(2 ; \infty]$. Suppose that $T$ is a sublinear operator bounded on $L^{2}$, and let $\left(A_{r}\right)_{r>0}$ be a family of linear operators on $L^{2}$. Assume that

\begin{align*}
& \left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|T\left(I-A_{r(B)}\right) f\right|^{2}\right)^{1 / 2} \leq C\left(M\left(|f|^{2}\right)\right)^{1 / 2}(x)  \tag{25}\\
& \quad\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|T A_{r(B)} f\right|^{q}\right)^{1 / q} \leq C\left(M\left(|T f|^{2}\right)\right)^{1 / 2}(x) \tag{26}
\end{align*}
$$

for all $f \in L^{2}$, all ball $B$ and all $x \in B$ where $r(B)$ is the radius of $B$. Here $M$ is the Hardy-Littlewood maximal operator

M f(x)=\sup _{B \ni x} \frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}|f| .
$$

If $2<p<q$ and $T f \in L^{p}$ when $f \in L^{p}$, then $T$ is of strong type $(p, p)$. More precisely, for all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p},\|T f\|_{p} \leq c\|f\|_{p}$ where $c$ depends only on the dimension $N, p, q$ and $C$.

Proof (of Theorem 41) Set $T=\nabla A^{-1 / 2}, A_{r}=I-\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m}$ where $m>$ $N / 4$, and take $f \in L^{2}$. We use similar arguments as Auscher [1] Theorem 4.6. Decompose $f=\sum_{j} f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}$ where $C_{1}=4 B$ and $C_{j}(B)=2^{j+1} B \backslash 2^{j} B$ for $j \geq 2$, where $B$ is the ball of radius $r$.
Let us verify (25): By the Minkowski inequality, we have

\left\|\nabla A^{-1 / 2}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f\right\|_{L^{2}(B)} \leq \sum_{j \geq 1}\left\|\nabla A^{-1 / 2}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{L^{2}(B)}(27)
$$

We study $\left\|\nabla A^{-1 / 2}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{L^{2}(B)}$ for $j \geq 1$. We have

$$
\begin{aligned}
\nabla A^{-1 / 2}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f \chi_{C_{j}(B)} & =C \int_{0}^{\infty} \nabla e^{-t A}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f \chi_{C_{j}(B)} \frac{d t}{\sqrt{t}} \\
& =C \int_{0}^{\infty} g_{r^{2}}(t) \nabla e^{-t A} f \chi_{C_{j}(B)} d t
\end{aligned}
$$

where

$$
g_{r^{2}}(t)=\sum_{k=0}^{m}\binom{m}{k}(-1)^{k} \frac{\chi\left(t-k r^{2}>0\right)}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} .
$$

Hence, by the $L^{2}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate of the gradient of the semigroup proved in Proposition 21, we obtain for $j \geq 2$
$\left\|\nabla A^{-1 / 2}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{L^{2}(B)} \leq C \int_{0}^{\infty}\left|g_{r^{2}}(t)\right| t^{-1 / 2} e^{-c 4^{j} r^{2} / t} d t\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2}$.
As we have mentioned in the previous section

$$
\left|g_{r^{2}}(t)\right| \leq \frac{C}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} \quad \text { if } \quad k r^{2}<t \leq(k+1) r^{2} \leq(m+1) r^{2}
$$

and

$$
\left|g_{r^{2}}(t)\right| \leq C r^{2 m} t^{-m-1 / 2} \quad \text { if } \quad t>(m+1) r^{2}
$$

This yields

& \left\|\nabla A^{-\frac{1}{2}}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{L^{2}(B)} \\
& \quad \leq C \sum_{k=0}^{m} \int_{k r^{2}}^{(k+1) r^{2}} \frac{t^{-1 / 2}}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} \\
& \\
& \quad+C r^{2 m} \int_{(m+1) r^{2}}^{\infty} t^{-1-m} e^{-\frac{-4^{j} j^{2}}{t}} d t\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} \\
& \\
& \leq \quad I_{1}+I_{2} .
\end{aligned}
$$

by the Laplace transform formula, and

\begin{equation*}
\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} \leq\|f\|_{L^{2}\left(2^{j+1} B\right)} \leq\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{1 / 2}\left(M\left(|f|^{2}\right)\right)^{1 / 2}(x) \tag{29}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $x \in B$ and $j \geq 1$. So

At present, we can turn to $I_{1}$ :

& =C\left(\sum_{k=1}^{m} \int_{k r^{2}}^{(k+1) r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\frac{1}{2}}}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t+\int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t\right)\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} \\
& =J_{1}+J_{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

where

\begin{aligned}
J_{1} & :=C \sum_{k=1}^{m} \int_{k r^{2}}^{(k+1) r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\frac{1}{2}}}{\sqrt{t-k r^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{t}} d t\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} \\
& \leq C\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j}}{m+1}} \sum_{k=1}^{m}\left(k r^{2}\right)^{-1 / 2} \int_{k r^{2}}^{(k+1) r^{2}}\left(t-k r^{2}\right)^{-1 / 2} d t \\
& \leq C 4^{-j m}\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} \\
& \leq C 4^{-j m}\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{1 / 2}\left(M\left(|f|^{2}\right)\right)^{1 / 2}(x)
\end{aligned}
$$

where we use estimate (29). For the second term

& \leq C\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j}}{2(m+1)}} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{2 t}} d t \\
& \leq C\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} 4^{-j m} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j} r^{2}}{2 t}} d t \\
& \leq C 4^{-j m}\left\|f \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} \\
& \leq C 4^{-j m}\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{1 / 2}\left(M\left(|f|^{2}\right)\right)^{1 / 2}(x) .
\end{aligned}
$$

Here we use the fact that $j \geq 2$ to obtain the convergence of the integral without dependence on $r$ nor on $j$, and for the last inequality we use (29). Inserting these estimates in (28) we find

$$

for all $j \geq 2$. Now for $j=1$ we show that

\left\|\nabla A^{-1 / 2}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f \chi_{C_{1}(B)}\right\|_{L^{2}(B)} & \leq \sum_{k=0}^{m}\binom{m}{k}\left\|\nabla A^{-1 / 2} e^{-k r^{2} A} f \chi_{4 B}\right\|_{L^{2}(B)} \\
& \leq C \sum_{k=0}^{m}\binom{m}{k}\left\|e^{-k r^{2} A} f \chi_{4 B}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)} \\
& \leq C \sum_{k=0}^{m}\binom{m}{k}\left\|f \chi_{4 B}\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{N}\right)} \\
& \leq C|4 B|^{1 / 2}\left(M\left(|f|^{2}\right)\right)^{1 / 2}(x)
\end{aligned}
$$

where we use the boundedness of Riesz transforms on $L^{2}$ from estimate (2), and that of the semigroup on $L^{2}$.
Using these estimates in the inequality (27) we obtain

\left\|\nabla A^{-\frac{1}{2}}\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A}\right)^{m} f\right\|_{L^{2}(B)} & \leq C\left(|4 B|^{\frac{1}{2}}+\sum_{j \geq 2} 4^{-j m}\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{\frac{1}{2}}\right)\left(M\left(|f|^{2}\right)\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) \\
& \leq C|B|^{\frac{1}{2}}\left(2^{N / 2}+\sum_{j \geq 2} 2^{-j(2 m-N / 2)}\right)\left(M\left(|f|^{2}\right)\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) \\
& \leq C|B|^{1 / 2}\left(M\left(|f|^{2}\right)\right)^{1 / 2}(x)
\end{aligned}
$$

because we set $m>N / 4$. Finally, this implies that

for all $f \in L^{2}$ and all $x$ in $B$, which is assumption (25).
Let us now prove (26):

So to check (26) it suffices to prove that for $q \in\left(2 ; p_{1}\right)$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\sum_{k=1}^{m}\binom{m}{k}\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|\nabla e^{-k r^{2}(B) A} g\right|^{q}\right)^{1 / q} \leq C\left(M\left(|\nabla g|^{2}\right)\right)^{1 / 2}(x) \tag{30}
\end{equation*}
$$

This applied to $g=A^{-1 / 2} f$, gives us (26). Decompose $g=\sum_{j} g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}$ where $C_{1}=4 B$ and $C_{j}(B)=2^{j+1} B \backslash 2^{j} B$ for $j \geq 2$. Here $B$ is the ball of radius $r$. By the Minkowski inequality, we have

\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|\nabla e^{-k r^{2} A} g\right|^{q}\right)^{1 / q} \leq \sum_{j \geq 1}\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|\nabla e^{-k r^{2} A} g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right|^{q}\right)^{1 / q} \tag{31}
\end{equation*}
$$

By duality of the $L^{p}-L^{2}$ boundedness of the semigroup proved in Proposition 22 we have

\begin{equation*}
\left\|e^{-t A}\right\|_{2-p} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}} \tag{32}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\gamma_{p}:=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{p}\right)$ for all $p \in\left[2 ; p_{0}\right)$. We have assumed that for all $t>0$, $\left\|\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right\|_{p_{1}-p_{1}} \leq C$ for some $p_{1} \in\left[2 ; p_{0}\right)$. Thus we obtain for all $t>0$

$$
\left\|\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right\|_{2-p_{1}} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p_{1}}}
$$

where $\gamma_{p_{1}}=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{p_{1}}\right)$. After interpolation of this boundedness with the $L^{2}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate (Proposition 21 (ii)), as we did in the proof of Theorem 21, we obtain the following $L^{2}-L^{q}$ off-diagonal estimate

\left\|\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{q}(F)} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{q}} e^{-c \frac{d^{2}(E ; F)}{t}}\|f\|_{2}
$$

for all $q \in\left(2 ; p_{1}\right)$, all $t>0$, and for all $f \in L^{2}$ supported in E , where $\gamma_{q}=$ $\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{q}\right)$. Hence

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|\nabla e^{-k r^{2} A} g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right|^{q}\right)^{\frac{1}{q}} \leq \frac{C}{|B|^{\frac{1}{q}}}\left(k r^{2}\right)^{-\gamma_{q}-\frac{1}{2}} e^{-c \frac{d^{2}\left(B ; C_{j}(B)\right)}{k r^{2}}}\left\|g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2} \tag{33}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now, applying the Hardy inequality, we find the following upper bound for $\left\|g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2}:$

\begin{aligned}
\left(\frac{1}{16 r^{2}} \int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}}\left|g(x) \chi_{4 B}\right|^{2} d x\right)^{1 / 2} & \leq\left(\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} \frac{\left|g(x) \chi_{4 B}\right|^{2}}{|x|^{2}} d x\right)^{1 / 2} \\
& \leq\left(\frac{4}{(N-2)^{2}} \int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}}\left|\nabla g(x) \chi_{4 B}\right|^{2} d x\right)^{1 / 2}
\end{aligned}
$$

for $j=1$, and

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left(\frac{1}{4^{j+1} r^{2}} \int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}}\left|g(x) \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right|^{2} d x\right)^{1 / 2} & \leq\left(\int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}} \frac{\left|g(x) \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right|^{2}}{|x|^{2}} d x\right)^{1 / 2} \\
& \leq\left(\frac{4}{(N-2)^{2}} \int_{\mathbb{R}^{N}}\left|\nabla g(x) \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right|^{2} d x\right)^{1 / 2}
\end{aligned}
$$

for $j \geq 2$. Employing these estimates of $\left\|g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right\|_{2}$ in (33) we conclude that, for $j=1$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|\nabla e^{-r^{2} k A} g \chi_{4 B}\right|^{q}\right)^{\frac{1}{q}} & \leq \frac{C}{|B|^{\frac{1}{q}}} k^{-\left(\gamma_{q}+\frac{1}{2}\right)} r^{-2 \gamma_{q}}| | \nabla g \chi_{4 B} \|_{2} \\
& \leq \frac{C}{|4 B|^{\frac{1}{2}}} k^{-\left(\gamma_{q}+\frac{1}{2}\right)} r^{-2 \gamma_{q}}|B|^{\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{q}}| | \nabla g \|_{L^{2}(4 B)} \\
& \leq C k^{-\left(\gamma_{q}+\frac{1}{2}\right)}\left(M\left(|\nabla g|^{2}\right)\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}(x),
\end{aligned}
$$

and for $j \geq 2$,

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B}\left|\nabla e^{-r^{2} k A} g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}\right|^{q}\right)^{\frac{1}{q}} & \leq \frac{C 2^{j(N / 2+1)}}{\left|2^{j+1} B\right|^{\frac{1}{2}}} k^{-\left(\gamma_{q}+\frac{1}{2}\right)} e^{-\frac{c 4^{j}}{k}}\|\nabla g\|_{L^{2}\left(C_{j}(B)\right)} \\
& \leq C k^{-\left(\gamma_{q}+\frac{1}{2}\right)} 2^{j\left(\frac{N}{2}+1\right)} e^{-\frac{c 4 j}{m}}\left(M\left(|\nabla g|^{2}\right)\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) .
\end{aligned}
$$

At this stage, we insert these two estimates in the sum on $j$, in (31), then in the sum on $k$ in (30), to obtain the upper bound desired in (30). This gives us estimate (26) of Theorem 42 .
Hence by Theorem 42, we obtain that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in$ $\left(2 ; p_{1}\right)$, if $\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is bounded on $L^{p_{1}}$ for some $p_{1} \in\left[2 ; p_{0}\right)$.

Next we will prove the following result. It can be seen also as a consequence of 18] Theorem 5. This is useful to prove the boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$.

Proposition 41 If $V$ is strongly subcritical, then $\left\|V^{1 / 2}(-\Delta)^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C$ for all $p \in(1 ; 2]$.

Proof We set $A_{0}=-\Delta$, and we assume that $V$ is strongly subcritical. This implies that

\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2} \leq \frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}\|\nabla u\|_{2}^{2} \leq C\left\|A_{0}^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2}
$$

which is

\left\|V^{1 / 2} A_{0}^{-1 / 2} u\right\|_{2} \leq C\|u\|_{2} \tag{34}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now we prove that $V^{1 / 2} A_{0}^{-1 / 2}$ is of weak type $(1,1)$ to deduce by the Marcinkiewicz interpolation theorem that it is bounded on $L^{p}$ on all $p \in(1 ; 2]$.

First, we search for a $L^{1}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate of $\left(\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A_{0}}\right)_{t>0}$.
We write for all $f \in L^{1}$

\begin{aligned}
\chi_{F} V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-t A_{0}} \chi_{E} f(x) & =\chi_{F}(x) V^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) \frac{1}{(4 \pi t)^{\frac{N}{2}}} \int e^{-\frac{|x-y|^{2}}{4 t}} \chi_{E}(y) f(y) d y \\
& \leq C e^{-\frac{d^{2}(E, F)}{8 t}} V^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) \frac{1}{(4 \pi t)^{\frac{N}{2}}} \int e^{-\frac{|x-y|^{2}}{8 t}} \chi_{E}(y)|f(y)| d y \\
& \leq C e^{-\frac{d^{2}(E, F)}{8 t}} V^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) e^{-2 t A_{0}} \chi_{E}|f|(x)
\end{aligned}
$$

Hence

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left\|\chi_{F} V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-t A_{0}} \chi_{E} f\right\|_{2} & \leq C e^{\frac{-d^{2}(E, F)}{8 t}}\left\|\left.V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-2 t A_{0}} \chi_{E} \right\rvert\, f\right\|_{2} \\
& \leq C e^{\frac{-d^{2}(E, F)}{8 t}}\left\|\left.V^{\frac{1}{2}} A_{0}^{-\frac{1}{2}} A_{0}^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-t A_{0}} e^{-t A_{0}} \chi_{E} \right\rvert\, f\right\|_{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

Now using (34) and the analyticity of the semigroup we get

\left\|\chi_{F} V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-t A_{0}} \chi_{E} f\right\|_{2} \leq \frac{C}{t^{\frac{1}{2}}} e^{\frac{-d^{2}(E, F)}{8 t}}\left\|e^{-t A_{0}} \chi_{E} \mid f\right\| \|_{2}
$$

Thus we obtain

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\chi_{F} \sqrt{t} V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-t A_{0}} \chi_{E} f\right\|_{2} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{1}} e^{\frac{-d^{2}(E, F)}{8 t}}\|f\|_{1} \tag{35}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $t>0$, where $\gamma_{1}=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{1}-\frac{1}{2}\right)=\frac{N}{4}$. Now we use same arguments as in the previous section. We check estimates (19) and (20) of Theorem 32, by setting $T=V^{1 / 2} A_{0}^{-1 / 2}$ and $A_{r}=I-\left(I-e^{-r^{2} A_{0}}\right)^{m}$.
Then we deduce that $V^{1 / 2} A_{0}^{-1 / 2}$ is of weak type $(1,1)$.
By interpolation with (34), we obtain

\left\|V^{1 / 2} A_{0}^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C
$$

for all $p \in(1 ; 2]$.
Next we prove the boundedness of Riesz transforms when $V \in L^{N / 2}$.
Theorem 43 Let $A=-\Delta-V$ where $0 \leq V \in L^{N / 2}, N \geq 3$. Assume that $A \geq \varepsilon V$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$ where $p_{0}:=$ $\frac{2 N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}, p_{0}^{\prime}$ its dual exponent, and $2<p_{0 *}=\frac{p_{0} N}{N+p_{0}}$ its reverse Sobolev exponent.

Proof In the previous section, we have proved the boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right]$ when $V$ is strongly subcritical and when the dimension $N \geq 3$. Let us now prove the boundedness on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$.
Take $\Lambda_{0}$ and $\Lambda$ two operators such that

$$
\mathfrak{a}_{0}(u, v):=<\Lambda_{0} u, v>\quad \text { and } \quad \mathfrak{a}(u, v):=<\Lambda u, v>
$$

where $<,>$ is the pairing $<,>_{W^{-1,2}, W^{1,2} .} D\left(\Lambda_{0}\right):=D\left(\mathfrak{a}_{0}\right)=W^{1,2}$ and $D(\Lambda):=$ $D(\mathfrak{a})=W^{1,2}$. Here $\mathfrak{a}_{0}$ and $\mathfrak{a}$ are the sesquilinear forms associated to $A_{0}:=-\Delta$ and $A:=-\Delta-V$, respectively. The operator $\Lambda_{0}$ restricted to $D\left(A_{0}\right)$ is $A_{0}$, and $\Lambda$ restricted to $D(A)$ is $A$. It is known that $\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1}$ restricted to $L^{2}$ coincides with $\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1}$, and $(I+t \Lambda)^{-1}$ restricted to $L^{2}$ coincides with $(I+t A)^{-1}$. (see 166 Chapter I).

Set $G(t)$ the following difference:

$$
G(t)=\nabla\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1}-\nabla(I+t \Lambda)^{-1} \quad \text { for } t>0
$$

The proof is divided into three steps:
Step 1: We prove that for all $t>0$, all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}$, all $\phi \in C_{0}^{\infty}$, and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$

$$
|<G(t) f, \phi>| \leq C t^{-1 / 2}\|f\|_{p}\|\phi\|_{p^{\prime}}
$$

Step 2: We prove that for all $t>0$ and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$

$$
\left\|\nabla(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2}
$$

Step 3: We prove that for all $t>0$ and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$

$$
\left\|\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C .
$$

Then, we apply Theorem 41 and conclude the result of this one.
Step 1:

$$
\begin{aligned}
G(t) & =\nabla\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1}-\nabla(I+t \Lambda)^{-1} \\
& =\nabla\left(\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1}-(I+t \Lambda)^{-1}\right) \\
& =t \nabla\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1}\left(\Lambda-\Lambda_{0}\right)(I+t \Lambda)^{-1} \\
& =-t \nabla\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1} V(I+t \Lambda)^{-1} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Since $D\left(\Lambda_{0}\right)=D(\Lambda), G(t)$ is well defined. For $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}, p>2$, and $\phi \in C_{0}^{\infty}$ we have

$$
\left|<G(t) f, \phi>|\leq t|\left\|\nabla\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1} V(I+t \Lambda)^{-1} f\right\|_{p}\|\phi\|_{p^{\prime}} .\right.
$$

Thus

$$
\nabla\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1} V^{1 / 2}=\nabla\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2} V^{1 / 2}
$$

Let us study each of the following operators: $\nabla\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2},\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2} V^{1 / 2}$, and $V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}$.
We begin with the first one: we know that Riesz transforms associated to $A_{0}$ are bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; \infty)$. We use the boundedness of the operator $\left(t A_{0}\right)^{1 / 2}\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}$ on all $L^{p}$, proved by the study of the functional calculus theory, to estimate for all $p \in(1 ; \infty)$, and all $t>0$

$$
\begin{align*}
\left\|\nabla\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} & \leq\left\|\nabla A_{0}^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} \cdot\left\|A_{0}^{1 / 2}\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} \\
& \leq C t^{-1 / 2} \tag{36}
\end{align*}
$$

Let us now estimate the norm of the second operator, $\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2} V^{1 / 2}$. We remark that this operator is the dual of $V^{1 / 2}\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}$, so we study the dual. We consider the following decomposition

\left\|V^{1 / 2}\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} \leq\left\|V^{1 / 2} A_{0}^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p}\left\|A_{0}^{1 / 2}\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p}
$$

By the previous proposition, we have $\left\|V^{1 / 2} A_{0}^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C$ for all $p \in(1 ; 2]$. Hence, once again, using the boundedness of $\left(t A_{0}\right)^{1 / 2}\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}$ on all $L^{p}$, we conclude that for all $t>0$ and all $p \in(1 ; 2]$

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2}\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2}
$$

By duality this yields, for all $t>0$ and all $p \in[2 ; \infty)$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1 / 2} V^{1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2} \tag{37}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now it remains to study the third operator, $V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}$. With the assumption $V \in L^{N / 2}$, we obtain for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$ and all $t>0$

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2}
$$

In fact, by Hölder's inequality, we have

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1} f\right\|_{p} \leq\left\|V^{1 / 2}\right\|_{N} \cdot\left\|(I+t A)^{-1} f\right\|_{q}
$$

where $p_{0}^{\prime}<p<q<p_{0}$ such that $\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{q}=\frac{1}{N}$. Interpolation of the uniform boundedness of the semigroup generated by $A$ with its $L^{p}-L^{2}$ boundedness (Proposition 22) yields

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-q} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p q}} \tag{38}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $p, q \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)$ such that $p \leq q$, where $\gamma_{p q}=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{q}\right)=\frac{1}{2}$. Hence

$$
\left\|(I+t A)^{-1} f\right\|_{q} \leq \int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-s}\left\|e^{-s t A} f\right\|_{q} d s \leq C t^{-1 / 2}\|f\|_{p} \int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-s} s^{-1 / 2} d s
$$

where $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$ (to keep $q$ in $\left.\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)\right)$. This yields, for all $t>0$,

$$
\left\|(I+t A)^{-1} f\right\|_{q} \leq C t^{-\frac{1}{2}}\|f\|_{p}
$$

Hence

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1} f\right\|_{p} \leq C\|V\|_{\frac{N}{2}} t^{-\frac{1}{2}}\|f\|_{p}
$$

for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$, which is

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2} \tag{39}
\end{equation*}
$$

Going back to $G(t)$ : employing estimates (36), (37) and (39), we deduce that for all $t>0$, all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}$, all $\phi \in C_{0}^{\infty}$ and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
|<G(t) f, \phi>| \leq C t^{-1 / 2}\|f\|_{p}\|\phi\|_{p^{\prime}} \tag{40}
\end{equation*}
$$

Step 2: Now for all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}$

$$
\begin{aligned}
G(t) f & :=\nabla\left(I+t \Lambda_{0}\right)^{-1} f-\nabla(I+t \Lambda)^{-1} f \\
& =\nabla\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1} f-\nabla(I+t A)^{-1} f
\end{aligned}
$$

Then for all $\phi \in C_{0}^{\infty}$ we get

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|<\nabla(I+t A)^{-1} f, \phi>\left|=\left|<G(t) f-\nabla\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1} f, \phi>\right| .\right.\right. \tag{41}
\end{equation*}
$$

We use the boundedness of Riesz transforms associated to $A_{0}$, and the analyticity of the semigroup associated to $A_{0}$, on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; \infty)$, to come to

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left\|\nabla\left(I+t A_{0}\right)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} & \leq \int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-s}\left\|\nabla A_{0}^{-1 / 2} A_{0}^{1 / 2} e^{-s t A_{0}}\right\|_{p-p} d s \\
& \leq C t^{-1 / 2} \int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-s} s^{-1 / 2} d s \\
& \leq C t^{-1 / 2}
\end{aligned}
$$

for all $t>0$ and all $p \in(1 ; \infty)$. Then, from (41) and (40) we obtain, for all $t>0$, all $f \in L^{2} \cap L^{p}$, all $\phi \in C_{0}^{\infty}$ and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$,

$$
\left|<\nabla(I+t A)^{-1} f, \phi>\right| \leq C t^{-1 / 2}\|f\|_{p}\|\phi\|_{p^{\prime}}
$$

Thus we obtain

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\nabla(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2} \tag{42}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $t>0$ and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$.
Step 3: We write

$$
\left\|\nabla e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-p} \leq\left\|\nabla(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p}\left\|(I+t A) e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-p}
$$

We use (42) and the analyticity of the semigroup associated to $A=-\Delta-V$ on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)$ (see [5] Theorem 1.6 or [15), to obtain that for all $t>0$ and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$

$$
\left\|\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C
$$

Now we apply Theorem 41 and we conclude that the Riesz transforms associated to $A$ are bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$.

Proof (of Proposition 34) Let $V$ strongly subcritical and $N \geq 3$. Assume that $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for some $p \in\left[2 ; p_{0}\right)$. Then, in the previous proof, the third operator of the decomposition of $G(t), V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}$, can be studied as follows:

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} \leq\left\|V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}\right\|_{p-p}\left\|A^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2}
$$

Here we use the fact that $A$ has a bounded $H^{\infty}$-functional calculus on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0}\right)$ (see [6] Theorem 2.2) to get

$$
\left\|A^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2}
$$

for all $t>0$. Employing this estimate in the previous proof, we obtain the result.

Proposition 42 Let $A=-\Delta-V$ where $0 \leq V \in L^{N / 2}, N \geq 3, V$ is strongly subcritical. Then $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$ where $p_{0}^{\prime}$ is the dual exponent of $p_{0}$, and $2<p_{0 *}=\frac{p_{0} N}{N+p_{0}}$ is the reverse Sobolev exponent of $p_{0}$.

Proof We have proved in Proposition 31 that $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; 2\right.$ ], it remains to prove boundedness on $L^{p}$ for $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$.
Let us first prove that, if $V$ is in $L^{N / 2},\left(\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$. By the Hölder inequality we can estimate for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$ and all $t>0$

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left\|\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A} f\right\|_{p} & \leq \sqrt{t}\left\|V^{1 / 2}\right\|_{N}\left\|e^{-t A} f\right\|_{q} \\
& \leq \sqrt{t}\|V\|_{\frac{N}{2}} C t^{-\gamma_{p q}}\|f\|_{p}
\end{aligned}
$$

This is for all $p_{0}^{\prime}<p<q<p_{0}$ such that $\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{q}=\frac{1}{N}$. So $\gamma_{p q}=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{q}\right)=\frac{1}{2}$. This yields that for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C \tag{43}
\end{equation*}
$$

Now we take the following decomposition

$$
\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}=\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A / 2} e^{-t A / 2}
$$

and we use estimates (32) and (43). Thus, we obtain, for all $t>0$ and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$,

$$
\left\|\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}\right\|_{2-p} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}}
$$

At present, we interpolate this estimate with the $L^{2}-L^{2}$ off-diagonal estimate of the norm of $\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A}$ proved in Proposition 21, as we did in the proof of Theorem 21. Then we get the following $L^{2}-L^{p}$ off-diagonal estimate

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\sqrt{t} V^{1 / 2} e^{-t A} f\right\|_{L^{p}(F)} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p}} e^{-\frac{c d^{2}(E, F)}{t}}\|f\|_{2} \tag{44}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $t>0$ and all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$.
At this step, we check assumptions (25) and (26) of Theorem 42 where $T=$ $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ as we did in the proof of Theorem 41. We use the $L^{2}-L^{2}$ offdiagonal estimate proved in Proposition 21 (iii), and the estimate (44). Thus we deduce the boundedness of $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{0 *}\right)$.

The following is an example of potentials satisfying conditions of Theorem 43 and Proposition 42 . With these potentials, $\nabla(-\Delta-V)^{-1 / 2}$ and $V^{1 / 2}(-\Delta-V)^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(p_{0}^{\prime} ; p_{0 *}\right)$.

Example: Set $N \geq 3$, and let us take $V \in L^{N / 2}$ such that $V \sim c|x|^{-\alpha}$ when $|x|$ tends to infinity, where $c>0$ and $\alpha>2$. Assume that $\|V\|_{\frac{N}{2}}$ is small enough and let us prove that these potentials are strongly subcritical, so we should prove that

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2} \leq C\|\nabla u\|_{2}^{2}
$$

where $C<1$. By the Hölder inequality, we have

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2} \leq\|V\|_{p^{\prime}}\left\|u^{2}\right\|_{p}
$$

where we set $p^{\prime}=\frac{N}{2}$ so $p$ will be $\frac{N}{N-2}$. Now using the Sobolev inequality we obtain

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2} u\right\|_{2}^{2} \leq\|V\|_{p^{\prime}}\left\|u^{2}\right\|_{p}=\|V\|_{\frac{N}{2}}\|u\|_{2^{*}}^{2} \leq C\|\nabla u\|_{2}^{2},
$$

where $2^{*}:=\frac{2 N}{N-2}$ is the Sobolev exponent of 2 , and $C<1$ for $\|V\|_{\frac{N}{2}}$ is small enough.

5 Boundedness of $\boldsymbol{\nabla} \boldsymbol{A}^{-\mathbf{1 / 2}}$ and $\boldsymbol{V}^{\mathbf{1 / 2}} \boldsymbol{A}^{-\mathbf{1 / 2}}$ on $\boldsymbol{L}^{p}$ for all $p \in(\mathbf{1} ; N)$
In this section we assume that $V$ is strongly subcritical in the Kato subclass $K_{N}^{\infty}, N \geq 3$. Following Zhao [21], we define

$$
K_{N}^{\infty}:=\left\{V \in K_{N}^{l o c} ; \lim _{B \uparrow \infty}\left[\sup _{x \in \mathbb{R}^{N}} \int_{|y| \geq B} \frac{|V(y)|}{|y-x|^{N-2}} d y\right]=0\right\}
$$

where $K_{N}^{\text {loc }}$ is the class of potentials that are locally in the Kato class $K_{N}$. For necessary background of the Kato class see 19] and references therein.

We use results proved by stochastic methods to deduce a $L^{1}-L^{\infty}$ offdiagonal estimate of the norm of the semigroup which leads to the boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ and $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; N)$.

Theorem 51 Let $A$ be the Schrödinger operator $-\Delta-V, V \geq 0$. Assume that $V$ is strongly subcritical in the class $K_{N}^{\infty},(N \geq 3)$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ and $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; 2]$. If in addition $V \in L^{N / 2}$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ and $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; N)$.

Proof We assume that $V$ is strongly subcritical in the class $K_{N}^{\infty}$. Therefore $V$ satisfies assumptions of Theorem 2 of 20 (The classes $K_{\infty}$ and $S_{\infty}$ mentioned in 20 are equivalent to the class $K_{N}^{\infty}$ (see Chen [7] Theorem 2.1 and Section 3.1)). Thus the heat kernel associated to $\left(e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ satisfies a Gaussian estimate. Now we apply Theorem 5 of 18 and we conclude that $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$
and $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ are of weak type $(1,1)$ and they are bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; 2]$.

We have seen that when the potential is strongly subcritical in the class $K_{N}^{\infty}$, we obtain a Gaussian estimate of the heat kernel associated to the semigroup. This implies that the semigroup is bounded from $L^{1}$ to $L^{\infty}$ by $C t^{-N / 2}$. Thus, by interpolation,

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-q} \leq C t^{-\gamma_{p q}} \tag{45}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $t>0$, all $p, q \in[1 ; \infty], p \leq q$, where $\gamma_{p q}=\frac{N}{2}\left(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{q}\right)$. Moreover the semigroup is bounded analytic on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; \infty)$ (see [5] Theorem 1.6). Now (32) holds for all $p \in(2 ; \infty)$. Using the same proof as for Theorem 41 we deduce that

- if $\left(\sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-t A}\right)_{t>0}$ is bounded on $L^{p_{1}}$ for some $p_{1} \in[2 ; \infty)$, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in\left(2 ; p_{1}\right)$.

We use (45) in the proof of Theorem 43: in the proof of the boundedness of the operator $V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}$ in Step 1:

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1} f\right\|_{p} \leq\left\|V^{1 / 2}\right\|_{N} \cdot\left\|(I+t A)^{-1} f\right\|_{q}
$$

where $1 \leq p<q \leq \infty$ such that $\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{q}=\frac{1}{N}$. Thus, if $p<N$ then $q=p^{*}$, if $p=N$ then $q=\infty, p$ cannot be more than $N$.

$$
\left\|(I+t A)^{-1} f\right\|_{q} \leq \int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-s}\left\|e^{-s t A} f\right\|_{q} d s \leq C t^{-1 / 2}\|f\|_{p} \int_{0}^{\infty} e^{-s} s^{-1 / 2} d s
$$

where $p \in[1 ; N]$ and $q \in[1 ; \infty]$. This yields for all $t>0$ and all $p \in[1 ; N]$

$$
\left\|V^{1 / 2}(I+t A)^{-1}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C t^{-1 / 2}
$$

In the same proof, we use the fact that

$$
\left\|t A e^{-t A}\right\|_{p-p} \leq C
$$

for all $p \in(1 ; \infty)$ in Step 3, because of the analyticity of the semigroup on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; \infty)$. Then we deduce

- if $V \in L^{N / 2} \cap K_{N}^{\infty}(N \geq 3), V$ strongly subcritical, then $\nabla A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; N)$.

We use the $L^{p}-L^{q}$ bound of the semigroup for $1 \leq p \leq q \leq \infty$ in the proof of Proposition 42 to deduce that

- If $V \in L^{N / 2} \cap K_{N}^{\infty}(N \geq 3), V$ strongly subcritical, then $V^{1 / 2} A^{-1 / 2}$ is bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; N)$.

Example: Set $N \geq 3$, and let us take potentials $V$ in the Kato subclass $K_{N} \cap L^{N / 2}$ such that $V \sim c|x|^{-\alpha}$ when $x$ tends to infinity, where $\alpha>2$. Suppose that $\|V\|_{\frac{N}{2}}$ is small enough. As we have seen in the previous example, these potentials are strongly subcritical. Z.Zhao [21] proved that they are in the subclass $K_{N}^{\infty}$. Hence they satisfy the assumptions of Theorem 51 . Then $\nabla(-\Delta-V)^{-1 / 2}$ and $V^{1 / 2}(-\Delta-V)^{-1 / 2}$ are bounded on $L^{p}$ for all $p \in(1 ; N)$.
