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Riesz transforms associated to Schrödinger operators with negative potentials

Abstract The goal of this paper is to study the Riesz transforms  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  where A is the Schrödinger operator  $-\Delta - V, \quad V \geq 0$ , under different conditions on the potential V. We prove that if V is strongly subcritical,  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$ ,  $N \geq 3$ , for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$  where  $p_0'$  is the dual exponent of  $p_0$  where  $2 < \frac{2N}{N-2} < p_0 < \infty$ ; and we give a counterexample to the boundedness on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for  $p \in (1; p_0') \cup (p_{0*}; \infty)$  where  $p_{0*} := \frac{p_0 N}{N+p_0}$  is the reverse Sobolev exponent of  $p_0$ . In addition, if the potential is in  $L^{N/2}(\mathbb{R}^N)$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (p_0'; p_{0*})$ . If the potential is strongly subcritical in the Kato subclass  $K_N^\infty$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (1; 2]$ , moreover if it is in  $L^{N/2}(\mathbb{R}^N)$  then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (1; N)$ . We prove also boundedness of  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  with the same conditions on the same spaces.

Keywords Riesz transforms  $\cdot$  Shrödinger operators  $\cdot$  off-diagonal estimates  $\cdot$  singular operators.

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#### 1 Introduction and definitions

Let A be a Schrödinger operator  $-\Delta+V$  where  $-\Delta$  is the nonnegative Laplace operator and the potential  $V:\mathbb{R}^N\to\mathbb{R}$  such that  $V=V^+-V^-$  (where  $V^+$  and  $V^-$  are the positive and negative parts of V, respectively). The operator is defined via the sesquilinear form method. We define

$$\mathfrak{a}(u,v) = \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} \nabla u(x) \nabla v(x) dx + \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} V^+(x) u(x) v(x) dx - \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} V^-(x) u(x) v(x) dx$$

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$$D(\mathfrak{a}) = \left\{ u \in W^{1,2}(\mathbb{R}^N), \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} V^+(x) u^2(x) dx < \infty \right\}.$$

Here we assume  $V^+ \in L^1_{loc}(\mathbb{R}^N)$  and  $V^-$  satisfies (for all  $u \in D(\mathfrak{a})$ ):

$$\int_{\mathbb{R}^N} V^-(x)u^2(x)dx \le \alpha \left[ \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} |\nabla u|^2(x)dx + \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} V^+(x)u^2(x)dx \right] + \beta \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} u^2(x)dx \tag{1}$$

where  $\alpha \in (0,1)$  and  $\beta \in \mathbb{R}$ . By the well-known KLMN theorem (see for example [14] Chapter VI), the form  $\mathfrak{a}$  is closed (and bounded from below). Its associated operator is A. If in addition  $\beta \leq 0$ , then A is nonnegative.

We can define the Riesz transforms associated to A by

$$\nabla A^{-1/2} := \frac{1}{\Gamma(\frac{1}{2})} \int_0^\infty \sqrt{t} \nabla e^{-tA} \frac{dt}{t}.$$

The boundedness of Riesz transforms on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  implies that the domain of  $A^{1/2}$  is included in the Sobolev space  $W^{1,p}(\mathbb{R}^N)$ . Thus the solution of the corresponding evolution equation will be in the Sobolev space  $W^{1,p}(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for initial data in  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$ .

It is our aim to study the boundedness on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  of the Riesz transforms  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$ . We are also interested in the boundedness of the operator  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$ . If  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$ , we obtain for some positive constant C

$$\|\nabla u\|_p + \|V^{1/2}u\|_p \le C\|(-\Delta + V)^{1/2}u\|_p.$$

By a duality argument, we obtain

$$\|(-\Delta+V)^{1/2}u\|_{p'} \le C(\|\nabla u\|_{p'} + \|V^{1/2}u\|_{p'})$$

where p' is the dual exponent of p.

Riesz transforms associated to Schrödinger operators with nonnegative potentials were studied by Ouhabaz [16], Shen [17], and Auscher and Ben Ali [2]. Ouhabaz proved that Riesz transforms are bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (1;2]$ , for all potential V locally integrable. Shen and Auscher and Ben Ali proved that if the potential V is in the reverse Hölder class  $B_q$ , then the Riesz transforms are bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (1, p_1)$  where  $2 < p_1 \le \infty$  depends on q. The result of Auscher and Ben Ali generalize that of Shen because Shen has restrictions on the dimension N and on the class  $B_q$ .

With negative potentials new difficulties appear. If we take  $V \in L^{\infty}(\mathbb{R}^N)$ , and apply the method in [16] to the operator  $A + \|V\|_{\infty}$ , we obtain boundedness of  $\nabla (A + \|V\|_{\infty})^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (1; 2]$ . This is weaker than the boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  on the same spaces. Guillarmou and Hassell [12] studied Riesz transforms  $\nabla (A \circ P_+)^{-1/2}$  where A is the Schrödinger operator with negative potential and  $P_+$  is the spectral projection on the positive spectrum.

They prove that, on asymptotically conic manifolds M of dimension  $N \geq 3$ , if V is smooth and satisfies decay conditions, and the Schrödinger operator has no zero-modes nor zero-resonances, then Riesz transforms  $\nabla (A \circ P_+)^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p(M)$  for all  $p \in (1,N)$ . They also prove (see [13]) that when zero-modes are present, Riesz transforms  $\nabla (A \circ P_+)^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p(M)$  for all  $p \in (\frac{N}{N-2}, \frac{N}{3})$ , with bigger range possible if the zero modes have extra decay at infinity.

In this paper we consider only negative potentials. From now on, we denote by A the Schrödinger operator with negative potential,

$$A := -\Delta - V, \quad V > 0.$$

Our purpose is to find optimal conditions on V allowing the boundedness of Riesz transforms  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and that of  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$ . Let us take the following definition

Definition 11 We say that the potential V is strongly subcritical if for some  $\varepsilon > 0$ ,  $A \ge \varepsilon V$ . This means that for all  $u \in W^{1,2}(\mathbb{R}^N)$ 

$$\int_{\mathbb{R}^N} V u^2 \le \frac{1}{1+\varepsilon} \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} |\nabla u|^2.$$

For more information on strongly subcritical potentials see [10] and [21]. With this condition, V satisfies assumption (1) where  $\beta=0$  and  $\alpha=\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}$ . Thus A is well defined, nonnegative and -A generates an analytic contraction semigroup  $(e^{-tA})_{t\geq 0}$  on  $L^2(\mathbb{R}^N)$ .

Since  $-\Delta - V \ge \varepsilon V$  we have  $(1+\varepsilon)(-\Delta - V) \ge \varepsilon(-\Delta)$ . Therefore

$$||\nabla u||_2^2 \le (1 + \frac{1}{\varepsilon})||A^{1/2}u||_2^2.$$
 (2)

Thus,  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^2(\mathbb{R}^N)$ . Conversely, it is clear that if  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^2(\mathbb{R}^N)$  then V is strongly subcritical.

We observe also that  $-\Delta - V \ge \varepsilon V$  is equivalent to

$$||V^{1/2}u||_2^2 \le \frac{1}{\varepsilon}||A^{1/2}u||_2^2. \tag{3}$$

Thus,  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^2(\mathbb{R}^N)$  if and only if V is strongly subcritical.

So we can conclude that

$$\|\nabla u\|_2 + \|V^{1/2}u\|_2 \le C\|(-\Delta - V)^{1/2}u\|_2$$

if and only if V is strongly subcritical. Then by duality argument we have

$$\|\nabla u\|_2 + \|V^{1/2}u\|_2 \approx \|(-\Delta - V)^{1/2}u\|_2$$

if and only if V is strongly subcritical.

To study Riesz transforms on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for  $1 \leq p \leq \infty$  with  $p \neq 2$  we use the results on the uniform boundedness of the semigroup on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$ . Taking central potentials which are equivalent to  $c/|x|^2$  as |x| tends to infinity where  $0 < c < (\frac{N-2}{2})^2, N \geq 3$ , Davies and Simon [10] proved that for all t > 0 and all  $p \in (p'_0; p_0)$ ,

 $||e^{-tA}||_{p-p} \leq C$ 

where  $2 < \frac{2N}{N-2} < p_0 < \infty$  and  $p_0'$  its dual exponent. Next Liskevich, Sobol, and Vogt [15] proved the uniform boundedness on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (p_0'; p_0)$  where  $2 < \frac{2N}{N-2} < p_0 = \frac{2N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\epsilon}}\right)}$ , for general strongly subcritical potentials . They also proved that the range  $(p_0', p_0)$  is optimal and the semigroup does not even act on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for  $p \notin (p_0', p_0)$ . Under additional condition on V, Takeda [20] used stochastic methods to prove a Gaussian estimate of the associated heat kernel. Thus the semigroup acts boundedly on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in [1, \infty]$ .

In this paper we prove that when V is strongly subcritical and  $N \geq 3$ , Riesz transforms are bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$ . We also give a counterexample to the boundedness of Riesz transforms on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  when  $p \in (1; p_0') \cup (p_{0*}; \infty)$  where  $2 < p_{0*} := \frac{p_0 N}{N+p_0} < p_0 < \infty$ . This example is a counterexample to the boundedness of  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  when  $p \in (p_{0*}; \infty)$ . If, in addition,  $V \in L^{N/2}(\mathbb{R}^N)$  then Riesz transforms are bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (p_0', p_{0*})$ . If V is strongly subcritical in the Kato subclass  $K_N^\infty, N \geq 3$  (see Section 5), then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (1, 2]$ . If, in addition,  $V \in L^{N/2}(\mathbb{R}^N)$  then it is bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for all  $p \in (1, N)$ . With the same conditions, we prove similar results for the operator  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$ . Hence if V is strongly subcritical and  $V \in L^{N/2}(\mathbb{R}^N)$ ,  $N \geq 3$ , then

$$\|\nabla u\|_p + \|V^{1/2}u\|_p \approx \|(-\Delta - V)^{1/2}u\|_p \tag{4}$$

for all  $p \in ((p_{0*})'; p_{0*})$ . If in addition  $V \in K_N^{\infty}$ , then (4) holds for all  $p \in (N'; N)$ .

For the proof of the boundedness of Riesz transforms we use the off-diagonal estimates (for properties and more details see [4]). These estimates are a generalization of the Gaussian estimates used by Coulhon and Duong in [9] to study the Riesz transforms associated to the Laplace-Beltrami operator on Riemannian manifolds, and by Duong, Ouhabaz and Yan in [11] to study the magnetic Schrödinger operator on  $\mathbb{R}^N$ . We also use the approach of Blunck and Kunstmann in [6] to weak type (p,p)-estimates. In [1], Auscher used these tools to divergence-form operators with complex coefficients. We study also the Berry-Esseen estimate. Coulhon and Dungey [8] used these estimates to study the Riesz transforms associated to the divergence-form operators with real coefficients. In contrast to [12] and [13], we do not assume decay nor

smoothness conditions on V.

In the following sections, we denote by  $L^p$  the Lebesgue space  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$ with the Lebesgue measure dx,  $||.||_p$  its usual norm, (.,.) the inner product of  $L^2$ ,  $||.||_{p-q}$  the norm of operators acting from  $L^p$  to  $L^q$ . We denote by C, c the positive constants even if their values change at each occurrence. Through this paper,  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  denotes one of the partial derivative  $\frac{\partial}{\partial x_h} A^{-1/2}$  for any fixed  $k \in \{1, ..., N\}.$ 

#### 2 Off-diagonal estimates

In this section, we show that  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$ ,  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  and  $(\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA})_{t>0}$ satisfy  $L^p - L^2$  off-diagonal estimates provided that V is strongly subcritical.

Definition 21 Let  $(T_t)_{t>0}$  be a family of uniformly bounded operators on  $L^2$ . We say that  $(T_t)_{t>0}$  satisfies  $L^p - L^q$  off-diagonal estimates for  $p, q \in [1, \infty]$ with  $p \leq q$  if there exist positive constants C and c such that for all closed sets E and F of  $\mathbb{R}^N$  and all  $h \in L^p(\mathbb{R}^N) \cap L^2(\mathbb{R}^N)$  with support in E, we have for all t > 0:

$$||T_t h||_{L^q(F)} \le C t^{-\gamma_{pq}} e^{-\frac{cd(E,F)^2}{t}} ||h||_p$$

where d is the Euclidean distance and  $\gamma_{pq} := \frac{N}{2} \left( \frac{1}{p} - \frac{1}{q} \right)$ .

Proposition 21 Let  $A = -\Delta - V$  where  $V \geq 0$  and V is strongly subcritical. Then  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$ ,  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA})_{t>0}$ , and  $(\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  satisfy  $L^2-L^2$ off-diagonal estimates, and we have for all t>0 and all  $f\in L^2$  supported in E:

- $$\begin{split} \text{(i)} & ||e^{-tA}f||_{L^2(F)} \leq e^{-d^2(E,F)/4t}||f||_2, \\ \text{(ii)} & ||\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}f||_{L^2(F)} \leq Ce^{-d^2(E,F)/16t}||f||_2, \end{split}$$
- (iii)  $||\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}f||_{L^2(F)} \le Ce^{-d^2(E,F)/8t}||f||_2.$

Proof The ideas are classical and rely on the well known Davies perturbation technique. Let  $A_{\rho} := e^{\rho\phi}Ae^{-\rho\phi}$  where  $\rho > 0$  and  $\phi$  is a Lipschitz function with  $|\nabla \phi| \leq 1$  a.e.. Here  $A_{\rho}$  is the associated operator to the sesquilinear form  $\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}$ defined by

$$\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u,v) := \mathfrak{a}(e^{-\rho\phi}u,e^{\rho\phi}v)$$

for all  $u, v \in D(\mathfrak{a})$ .

By the strong subcriticality property of V we have for all  $u \in W^{1,2}$ 

$$((A_{\rho} + \rho^{2})u, u) = -\int \rho^{2} |\nabla \phi|^{2} u^{2} + \int |\nabla u|^{2} - \int V u^{2} + \rho^{2} ||u||_{2}^{2}$$

$$\geq \varepsilon ||V^{1/2}u||_{2}^{2}.$$
(5)

Using (2), we obtain

$$((A_{\rho} + \rho^{2})u, u) = -\int \rho^{2} |\nabla \phi|^{2} u^{2} + \int |\nabla u|^{2} - \int V u^{2} + \rho^{2} ||u||_{2}^{2}$$

$$\geq \frac{\varepsilon}{\varepsilon + 1} ||\nabla u||_{2}^{2}.$$
(6)

In particular  $(A_{\rho} + \rho^2)$  is a maximal accretive operator on  $L^2$ , and this implies

$$||e^{-tA_{\rho}}u||_2 \le e^{t\rho^2}||u||_2.$$
 (7)

Now we want to estimate

$$\|(A_{\rho}+2\rho^2)e^{-t(A_{\rho}+2\rho^2)}\|_{2-2}.$$

First, let us prove that  $A_{\rho} + 2\rho^2$  is a sectorial operator. For u complex-valued,

$$\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u,u) := \mathfrak{a}(u,u) + \rho \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u} - \rho \int \overline{u} \nabla \phi \nabla u - \rho^2 \int |\nabla \phi|^2 |u|^2.$$

Then

$$\begin{split} \mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u,u) + 2\rho^{2} \|u\|_{2}^{2} &\geq \mathfrak{a}(u,u) + \rho \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u} - \rho \int \overline{u} \nabla \phi \nabla u + \rho^{2} \|u\|_{2}^{2} \\ &= \mathfrak{a}(u,u) + 2i\rho \mathfrak{Im} \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u} + \rho^{2} \|u\|_{2}^{2}. \end{split}$$

This implies that

$$\mathfrak{Re}(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u,u) + 2\rho^2 ||u||_2^2) \ge \mathfrak{a}(u,u), \tag{8}$$

and

$$\mathfrak{Re}(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u) + 2\rho^{2} ||u||_{2}^{2}) \ge \rho^{2} ||u||_{2}^{2}. \tag{9}$$

On the other hand,

$$\begin{split} \mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u,u) &= \mathfrak{a}(u,u) + \rho \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u} - \rho \int \overline{u} \nabla \phi \nabla u - \rho^2 \int |\nabla \phi|^2 |u|^2 \\ &= \mathfrak{a}(u,u) + 2i\rho \mathfrak{Im} \int u \nabla \phi \overline{\nabla u} - \rho^2 \int |\nabla \phi|^2 |u|^2. \end{split}$$

So

$$|\mathfrak{Im}(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u) + 2\rho^{2} ||u||_{2}^{2})| = 2|\rho| \int |u||\nabla \phi|| \overline{\nabla u}|$$

$$\leq 2|\rho| ||u||_{2} ||\nabla u||_{2}.$$

Using (2) we obtain that

$$|\mathfrak{Im}(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u, u) + 2\rho^{2} ||u||_{2}^{2})| \leq 2|\rho| ||u||_{2} c_{\varepsilon} \mathfrak{a}^{\frac{1}{2}}(u, u)$$
$$\leq c_{\varepsilon}^{2} \mathfrak{a}(u, u) + \rho^{2} ||u||_{2}^{2}$$

where  $c_{\varepsilon} = (1 + \frac{1}{\varepsilon})^{\frac{1}{2}}$ . Now using estimates (8) and (9), we deduce that there exists a constant C > 0 depending only on  $\varepsilon$  such that

$$|\mathfrak{Im}(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u,u) + 2\rho^2 ||u||_2^2)| \le C \mathfrak{Re}(\mathfrak{a}_{\rho}(u,u) + 2\rho^2 ||u||_2^2).$$

We conclude that (see [14] or [16])

$$||e^{-z(A_{\rho}+2\rho^2)}||_{2-2} \le 1$$

for all z in the open sector of angle  $\arctan(1/C)$ . Hence by the Cauchy formula

$$\|(A_{\rho} + 2\rho^{2})e^{-t(A_{\rho} + 2\rho^{2})}\|_{2-2} \le \frac{C}{t}.$$
 (10)

The constant C is independent of  $\rho$ .

By estimate (5) and (6) we have

$$((A_{\rho} + 2\rho^2)u, u) \ge ((A_{\rho} + \rho^2)u, u) \ge \varepsilon ||V^{1/2}u||_2^2,$$

and

$$((A_{\rho} + 2\rho^2)u, u) \ge ((A_{\rho} + \rho^2)u, u) \ge \frac{\varepsilon}{\varepsilon + 1} \|\nabla u\|_2^2.$$

Setting  $u = e^{-t(A_{\rho} + 2\rho^2)} f$  and using (10) and (7) we obtain

$$||\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA_{\rho}}f||_{2} \le Ce^{2t\rho^{2}}||f||_{2}.$$
 (11)

and

$$||\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA_{\rho}}f||_{2} \le Ce^{2t\rho^{2}}||f||_{2}.$$
(12)

Let E and F be two closed subsets of  $\mathbb{R}^N$ ,  $f \in L^2(\mathbb{R}^N)$  supported in E, and let  $\phi(x) := d(x, E)$  where d is the Euclidean distance. Since  $e^{\rho \phi} f = f$ , we have the following relation

$$e^{-tA}f = e^{-\rho\phi}e^{-tA_{\rho}}f.$$

Then

$$\nabla e^{-tA} f = -\rho \nabla \phi e^{-\rho \phi} e^{-tA_{\rho}} f + e^{-\rho \phi} \nabla e^{-tA_{\rho}} f,$$

and

$$V^{1/2}e^{-tA}f = e^{-\rho\phi}V^{1/2}e^{-tA_{\rho}}f.$$

Now taking the norm on  $L^2(F)$ , we obtain from (7), (11) and (12)

$$||e^{-tA}f||_{L^2(F)} \le e^{-\rho d(E,F)}e^{\rho^2 t}||f||_2,$$
 (13)

$$||\nabla e^{-tA}f||_{L^{2}(F)} \leq \rho e^{-\rho d(E,F)} e^{\rho^{2}t} ||f||_{2} + \frac{C}{\sqrt{t}} e^{-\rho d(E,F)} e^{2t\rho^{2}} ||f||_{2}, \quad (14)$$

and

$$||V^{1/2}e^{-tA}f||_{L^{2}(F)} \le \frac{C}{\sqrt{t}}e^{-\rho d(E,F)}e^{2\rho^{2}t}||f||_{2}.$$
 (15)

We set  $\rho = d(E, F)/2t$  in (13) and  $\rho = d(E, F)/4t$  in (15), then we get the  $L^2 - L^2$  off-diagonal estimates (i) and (iii).

We set  $\rho = d(E, F)/4t$  in (14), we get

$$||\nabla e^{-tA}f||_{L^2(F)} \le \frac{C}{\sqrt{t}} \left(1 + \frac{d(E,F)}{4\sqrt{t}}\right) e^{-d^2(E,F)/8t} ||f||_2.$$

This gives estimate (ii).

Now, we study the  $L^p - L^2$  boundedness of the semigroup, of its gradient,

Proposition 22 Suppose that  $A \geq \varepsilon V$ , then  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$ ,  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  and  $(\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  are  $L^p - L^2$  bounded for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$ . Here  $p_0'$  is the dual exponent of  $p_0$  where  $p_0 = \frac{2N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}$ , and the dimension  $N \geq 3$ . More precisely we have for all t > 0:

- $\begin{array}{l} \text{i)} \ \|e^{-tA}f\|_2 \leq Ct^{-\gamma_p}\|f\|_p, \\ \text{ii)} \ \|\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}f\|_2 \leq Ct^{-\gamma_p}\|f\|_p, \\ \text{iii)} \ \|\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}f\|_2 \leq Ct^{-\gamma_p}\|f\|_p, \end{array}$

where  $\gamma_p = \frac{N}{2} \left( \frac{1}{n} - \frac{1}{2} \right)$ .

Proof i) We apply the Gagliardo-Nirenberg inequality

$$||u||_2^2 \le C_{a,b}||\nabla u||_2^{2a}||u||_p^{2b},$$

where a+b=1 and  $(1+2\gamma_p)a=2\gamma_p$ , to  $u=e^{-tA}f$  for all  $f\in L^2\cap L^p$ , all t>0, and all  $p\in(p'_0;2]$ . We obtain

$$||e^{-tA}f||_2^2 \le C_{a,b}||\nabla e^{-tA}f||_2^{2a}||e^{-tA}f||_p^{2b}$$

At present we use the boundedness of the semigroup on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2]$ proved in [15], and the fact that  $||\nabla u||_2^2 \leq (1+1/\varepsilon)(Au,u)$  from the strong subcriticality condition, then we obtain that

$$||e^{-tA}f||_2^{2/a} \le -C\psi'(t)||f||_p^{2b/a}$$

where  $\psi(t) = ||e^{-tA}f||_2^2$ . This implies

$$||f||_p^{-2b/a} \le C(\psi(t)^{\frac{a-1}{a}})'.$$

Since  $\frac{2b}{a} = \frac{1}{\gamma_p}$  and  $\frac{a-1}{a} = -\frac{1}{2\gamma_p}$ , integration between 0 and t yields

$$t||f||_p^{-1/\gamma_p} \le C||e^{-tA}f||_2^{-1/\gamma_p}$$

which gives i).

We obtain ii) by using the following decomposition:

$$\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA} = \sqrt{t}\nabla A^{-1/2}A^{1/2}e^{-tA/2}e^{-tA/2}$$

the boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and of  $(\sqrt{t}A^{1/2}e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  on  $L^2$ , and the fact that  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is  $L^p - L^2$  bounded for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2]$  proved in i). We prove iii) by using the following decomposition:

$$\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA} = \sqrt{t}V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}A^{1/2}e^{-tA/2}e^{-tA/2}$$

the boundedness of  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$ 

and of  $(\sqrt{t}A^{1/2}e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  on  $L^2$ , and the fact that  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is  $L^p - L^2$  bounded for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2]$  proved in i).

We invest the previous results to obtain:

Theorem 21 Assume that  $A \geq \varepsilon V$  then  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$ ,  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  and  $(\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  satisfy  $L^p - L^2$  off-diagonal estimates for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$ . Here  $p_0'$  is the dual exponent of  $p_0$  where  $p_0 = \frac{2N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}$ , and the dimension  $N \geq 3$ . Then we have for all t>0, all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$ , and all  $f \in L^2 \cap L^p$  with supp  $f \subseteq E$ 

i)

$$||e^{-tA}f||_{L^2(F)} \le Ct^{-\gamma_p} e^{-\frac{cd^2(E,F)}{t}} ||f||_p,$$
 (16)

ii)

$$\|\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}f\|_{L^{2}(F)} \le Ct^{-\gamma_{p}}e^{-\frac{cd^{2}(E,F)}{t}}\|f\|_{p},$$
 (17)

iii)

$$\|\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}f\|_{L^{2}(F)} \le Ct^{-\gamma_{p}}e^{-\frac{cd^{2}(E,F)}{t}}\|f\|_{p},\tag{18}$$

where  $\gamma_p = \frac{N}{2} \left( \frac{1}{p} - \frac{1}{2} \right)$  and C, c are positive constants.

Remark: By duality, we deduce from (16) a  $L^2-L^p$  off-diagonal estimate of the norm of the semigroup for all  $p\in[2;p_0)$ , but we cannot deduce from (17) and (18) the same estimate of the norm of  $\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}f$  and of  $\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}f$  because they are not selfadjoint. This affect the boundedness of Riesz transforms and of  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p$  for p>2.

Proof i) In the previous proposition we have proved that

$$||e^{-tA}f||_2 \le Ct^{-\gamma_p}||f||_p$$

for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2]$ . This implies that for all t > 0

$$\|\chi_F e^{-tA} \chi_E f\|_2 \le C t^{-\gamma_p} \|f\|_p$$

where  $\chi_M$  is the characteristic function of M. The  $L^2-L^2$  off-diagonal estimate proved in the Proposition 21 implies that

$$\|\chi_F e^{-tA} \chi_E f\|_2 \le e^{-d^2(E,F)/4t} \|f\|_2.$$

Hence we can apply the Riesz-Thorin interpolation theorem and we obtain the off-diagonal estimate (16).

Assertions ii) and iii) are proved in a similar way. We use  $L^2 - L^2$  off-diagonal estimates of Proposition 21 and assertions ii) and iii) of Proposition 22.

### 3 Boundedness of $\nabla A^{-1/2}$ and $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$ on $L^p$ for p < 2

This section is devoted to the study of the boundedness of  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  and Riesz transforms associated to Schrödinger operators with negative and strongly subcritical potentials. We prove that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N), N \geq 3$ , for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$ , where  $p_0'$  is the exponent mentioned in Theorem 21.

Theorem 31 Assume that  $A \geq \varepsilon V$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for  $N \geq 3$ , for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$  where  $p_0' = \left(\frac{2N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}\right)'$ .

Remark: In the proof of this theorem, we do not use the expression of A explicitly, we use the boundedness of Riesz transforms associated to A on  $L^2$ , the  $L^p-L^2$  off-diagonal estimates of  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  and of  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA})_{t>0}$ . Hence  $\nabla H^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p\in (r;2]$ , where  $r\in [1;2)$ , if  $\nabla H^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^2$  where H is an operator such that  $(e^{-tH})_{t>0}$  and  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tH})_{t>0}$  satisfy  $L^r-L^2$  (or  $L^p-L^2$  for all  $p\in (r;2]$ ) off-diagonal estimates.

To prove Theorem 31, we prove that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is of weak type (p, p) for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2)$  by using the following theorem of Blunck and Kunstmann [6]. Then by the boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^2$ , and the Marcinkiewicz interpolation theorem, we obtain boundedness on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2]$ .

Theorem 32 Let  $p \in [1; 2)$ . Suppose that T is sublinear operator of strong type (2, 2), and let  $(A_r)_{r>0}$  be a family of linear operators acting on  $L^2$ .

Assume that for  $j \geq 2$ 

$$\left(\frac{1}{|2^{j+1}B|} \int_{C_j(B)} |T(I - A_{r(B)})f|^2\right)^{1/2} \le g(j) \left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_B |f|^p\right)^{1/p}, \quad (19)$$

and for  $j \geq 1$ 

$$\left(\frac{1}{|2^{j+1}B|} \int_{C_j(B)} |A_{r(B)}f|^2\right)^{1/2} \le g(j) \left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_B |f|^p\right)^{1/p}, \tag{20}$$

for all ball B with radius r(B) and all f supported in B. If  $\Sigma := \sum g(j)2^{Nj} < \infty$ , then T is of weak type (p,p), with a bound depending only on the strong type (2,2) bound of T, p, and  $\Sigma$ .

Here  $C_1 = 4B$  and  $C_j(B) = 2^{j+1}B \setminus 2^jB$  for  $j \geq 2$ , where  $\lambda B$  is the ball of radius  $\lambda r(B)$  with the same center as B, and  $|\lambda B|$  its Lebesgue measure.

Proof (of Theorem 31) Let  $T = \nabla A^{-1/2}$ . We prove assumptions (19) and (20) with  $A_r = I - (I - e^{-r^2 A})^m$  for some  $m > N/4 - \gamma_p$ , using arguments similar to Auscher [1] Theorem 4.2.

Let us prove (20). For f supported in a ball B (with radius r),

$$\frac{1}{|2^{j+1}B|^{1/2}} ||A_r f||_{L^2(C_j(B))} = \frac{1}{|2^{j+1}B|^{1/2}} \left\| \sum_{k=1}^m \binom{m}{k} (-1)^{k+1} e^{-kr^2 A} f \right\|_{L^2(C_j(B))} \\
\leq \frac{1}{|2^{j+1}B|^{1/2}} \sum_{k=1}^m \binom{m}{k} C(kr^2)^{-\gamma_p} e^{\frac{-cd^2(B,C_j(B))}{kr^2}} ||f||_p.$$

for all  $p\in (p_0';2)$  and all  $f\in L^2\cap L^p$  supported in B. Here we use the  $L^p-L^2$  off-diagonal estimates (16) for  $p\in (p_0';2]$ . Since  $\gamma_p=\frac{N}{2}(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{2})$  we obtain

$$\left(\frac{1}{|2^{j+1}B|} \int_{C_j(B)} |A_r f|^2\right)^{1/2} \le \frac{Cr^{-2\gamma_p}}{|2^{j+1}B|^{1/2}} e^{\frac{-cd^2(B,C_j(B))}{mr^2}} \|f\|_p$$

$$\le C2^{-jN/2} e^{\frac{-cd^2(B,C_j(B))}{r^2}} \left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_B |f|^p\right)^{1/p}.$$

This yields, for j = 1,

$$\left(\frac{1}{|4B|}\int_{4B}|A_rf|^2\right)^{1/2} \le C2^{-N/2}\left(\frac{1}{|B|}\int_{B}|f|^p\right)^{1/p},$$

and for  $j \geq 2$ 

$$\left(\frac{1}{|2^{j+1}B|}\int_{C_j(B)}|A_rf|^2\right)^{1/2} \le C2^{-jN/2}e^{-c4^j}\left(\frac{1}{|B|}\int_B|f|^p\right)^{1/p}.$$

Thus assumption (20) of Theorem 32 holds with  $\sum_{j\geq 1} g(j)2^{jN} < \infty$ . It remains to check the assumption (19):

We know that

$$\nabla A^{-1/2} f = C \int_0^\infty \nabla e^{-tA} f \frac{dt}{\sqrt{t}}$$

then, using the Newton binomial, we get

$$\nabla A^{-1/2} (I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f = C \int_0^\infty \nabla e^{-tA} (I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f \frac{dt}{\sqrt{t}}$$
$$= C \int_0^\infty g_{r^2}(t) \nabla e^{-tA} f dt$$

where

$$g_{r^2}(t) = \sum_{k=0}^{m} {m \choose k} (-1)^k \frac{\chi_{(t-kr^2>0)}}{\sqrt{t-kr^2}}.$$

Hence, using the  $L^p - L^2$  off-diagonal estimate (17), we obtain for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2)$ , all  $j \geq 2$ , and all  $f \in L^2 \cap L^p$  supported in B

$$\|\nabla A^{-1/2}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f\|_{L^2(C_j(B))} \le C \int_0^\infty |g_{r^2}(t)| t^{-\gamma_p - 1/2} e^{-c4^j r^2/t} dt \|f\|_p.$$

We observe that (see [1] p. 27)

$$|g_{r^2}(t)| \le \frac{C}{\sqrt{t - kr^2}}$$
 if  $kr^2 < t \le (k+1)r^2 \le (m+1)r^2$ 

and

$$|g_{r^2}(t)| \le Cr^{2m}t^{-m-1/2}$$
 if  $t > (m+1)r^2$ .

This yields

$$\|\nabla A^{-\frac{1}{2}}(I - e^{-r^{2}A})^{m} f\|_{L^{2}(C_{j}(B))} \leq C \sum_{k=0}^{m} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\gamma_{p}-1/2}}{\sqrt{t - kr^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \|f\|_{p}$$

$$+ C \int_{(m+1)r^{2}}^{\infty} r^{2m} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1-m} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \|f\|_{p}$$

$$\leq I_{1} + I_{2}. \tag{21}$$

We have

$$I_2 := C \int_{(m+1)r^2}^{\infty} r^{2m} t^{-\gamma_p - 1 - m} e^{-\frac{c4^j r^2}{t}} dt \|f\|_p \le C r^{-2\gamma_p} 2^{-2j(m+\gamma_p)} \|f\|_p,$$

by the Laplace transform formula, and

$$I_{1} := C \|f\|_{p} \sum_{k=0}^{m} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\gamma_{p}-1/2}}{\sqrt{t-kr^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt$$

$$= C \|f\|_{p} \left( \sum_{k=1}^{m} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\gamma_{p}-1/2}}{\sqrt{t-kr^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt + \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \right)$$

$$= J_{1} + J_{2}.$$

In the preceding equation

$$J_{1} := C \|f\|_{p} \sum_{k=1}^{m} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\gamma_{p}-1/2}}{\sqrt{t-kr^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt$$

$$\leq C \|f\|_{p} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}}{m+1}} \sum_{k=1}^{m} (kr^{2})^{-\gamma_{p}-1/2} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} (t-kr^{2})^{-1/2} dt$$

$$\leq C r^{-2\gamma_{p}} 2^{-2j(m+\gamma_{p})} \|f\|_{p},$$

and

$$J_{2} := C \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \|f\|_{p}$$

$$\leq C \|f\|_{p} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}}{2(m+1)}} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-\gamma_{p}-1} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{2t}} dt$$

$$\leq C \|f\|_{p} 2^{-2jm} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1-\gamma_{p}} C(2^{-2j}r^{-2}t)^{\gamma_{p}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{4t}} dt$$

$$\leq C \|f\|_{p} 2^{-2j(m+\gamma_{p})} r^{-2\gamma_{p}} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{4t}} dt$$

$$\leq C r^{-2\gamma_{p}} 2^{-2j(m+\gamma_{p})} \|f\|_{p}.$$

Here, for the last inequality, we use the fact that  $j \geq 2$  to obtain the convergence of the integral without dependence on r nor on j.

We can therefore employ these estimates in (21) to conclude that

$$\|\nabla A^{-1/2}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f\|_{L^2(C_j(B))} \le Cr^{-2\gamma_p} 2^{-2j(m+\gamma_p)} \|f\|_{p,p}$$

which implies

$$\left(\frac{1}{|2^{j+1}B|}\int_{C_{j}(B)}|\nabla A^{-\frac{1}{2}}(I-e^{-r^{2}A})^{m}f|^{2}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}\leq C2^{-2j(m+\gamma_{p}+\frac{N}{4})}\left(\frac{1}{|B|}\int_{B}|f|^{p}\right)^{\frac{1}{p}}$$

where 
$$\sum g(j)2^{jN} < \infty$$
 because we set  $m > N/4 - \gamma_p$ .

Proposition 31 Assume that  $A \geq \varepsilon V$ , then  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p(\mathbb{R}^N)$  for  $N \geq 3$ , for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$  where  $p_0'$  is the dual exponent of  $p_0$  with  $p_0 = \frac{2N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}$ .

Proof We have seen in (3) that the operator  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^2$ . To prove its boundedness on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2]$  we prove that it is of weak type (p, p) for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2)$  by checking assumptions (19) and (20) of Theorem 32, where  $T = V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$ . Then, using the Marcinkiewicz interpolation theorem, we deduce boundedness on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2]$ .

We check assumptions of Theorem 32 similarly as we did in the proof of Theorem 31, using the  $L^p - L^2$  off-diagonal estimate (18) instead of (17).

Let us now move on, setting  $V=c|x|^{-2}$  where  $0< c<(\frac{N-2}{2})^2$ , which is strongly subcritical thanks to the Hardy inequality, we prove that the associated Riesz transforms are not bounded on  $L^p$  for  $p\in(1;p'_0)$  neither for  $p\in(p_{0*};\infty)$ . We also prove that  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is not bounded on  $L^p$  for  $p\in(p_{0*};\infty)$ . Here  $p_{0*}=\frac{p_0N}{N+p_0}$  is the reverse Sobolev exponent of  $p_0$ .

Proposition 32 Set V strongly subcritical and  $N \geq 3$ . Assume that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for some  $p \in (1; p'_0)$ . Then there exists an exponent  $q_1 \in [p; p'_0)$  such that  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is bounded on  $L^r$  for all  $r \in (q_1; 2)$ .

Consider now  $V = c|x|^{-2}$  where  $0 < c < (\frac{N-2}{2})^2$ . It is proved in [15] that the semigroup does not act on  $L^p$  for  $p \notin (p_0'; p_0)$ . Therefore we obtain from this proposition that the Riesz transform  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is not bounded on  $L^p$  for  $p \in (1; p_0')$ .

Proof Assume that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for some  $p \in (1; p'_0)$ . By the boundedness on  $L^2$  and the Riesz-Thorin interpolation theorem, we get the boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^q$  for all  $q \in [p; 2]$ . Now we apply the Sobolev inequality

$$||f||_{q^*} \le C||\nabla f||_q \tag{22}$$

where  $q^* = \frac{Nq}{N-q}$  if q < N to  $f := A^{-1/2}u$ , so we get

$$||A^{-1/2}u||_{q^*} \le C||\nabla A^{-1/2}u||_q \le C||u||_q$$

for all  $q \in [p; 2]$ . In particular,  $||A^{-1/2}||_{q_1 - q_1^*} \le C$  where  $p \le q_1 < p_0'$  such that  $q_1^* > p_0'$ .

Decomposing the semigroup as follows

$$e^{-tA} = A^{1/2}e^{-tA/2}e^{-tA/2}A^{-1/2}$$
(23)

where  $A^{-1/2}$  is  $L^{q_1}-L^{q_1^*}$  bounded ,  $e^{-tA/2}$  has  $L^{q_1^*}-L^2$  norm bounded by  $Ct^{-\gamma_{q_1^*}}$  (Proposition 22) and  $A^{1/2}e^{-tA/2}$  is  $L^2-L^2$  bounded by  $Ct^{-1/2}$  because of the analyticity of the semigroup on  $L^2$ . Therefore, we obtain

$$||e^{-tA}||_{q_1-2} \le Ct^{-\gamma_{q_1^*}-1/2} = Ct^{-\gamma_{q_1}}.$$

We now interpolate this norm with the  $L^2 - L^2$  off-diagonal estimate of the norm of  $e^{-tA}$ , as we did in the proof of Theorem 21, so we get a  $L^r - L^2$  off-diagonal estimate for all  $r \in (q_1; 2)$ . Then Lemma 3.3 of [1] yields that  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is bounded on  $L^r$  for all  $r \in (q_1; 2)$  for some  $q_1 \in [p; p'_0)$ .

Proposition 33 Set V strongly subcritical and  $N \geq 3$ . Assume that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for some  $p \in (p_{0*}, \infty)$ . Then there exists an exponent  $q_2 > p_{0*}$  such that the semigroup  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is bounded on  $L^s$  for all  $s \in (2; q_2^*)$ . Here  $q_2^* > p_0$ .

Consider now  $V = c|x|^{-2}$  where  $0 < c < (\frac{N-2}{2})^2$ . It is proved in [15] that the semigroup does not act on  $L^p$  for  $p \notin (p'_0; p_0)$ . Therefore we obtain from this proposition that the Riesz transforms  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  are not bounded on  $L^p$  for  $p \in (p_{0*}; \infty)$ .

Proof Assume that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for some  $p \in (p_{0*}; \infty)$ . Then by interpolation we obtain the boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^q$  for all  $q \in [2; p]$ . In particular,

$$||\nabla A^{-1/2}||_{q_2-q_2} \le C$$

where  $p_{0*} < q_2 < p_0$ ,  $q_2 \le p$ ,  $q_2 < N$ . Using the Sobolev inequality (22), we obtain that  $A^{-1/2}$  is  $L^{q_2} - L^{q_2^*}$  bounded where  $q_2^* > p_0$ .

Now we decompose the semigroup as follows

$$e^{-tA} = A^{-1/2}e^{-tA/2}A^{1/2}e^{-tA/2}. (24)$$

Thus we remark that it is  $L^2 - L^{q_2^*}$  bounded where  $q_2^* > p_0$ .

Then, using similar arguments as in the previous proof, we conclude that  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is bounded on  $L^s$  for all  $s \in (2; q_2^*)$  for some  $q_2 > p_{0*}$ .

Proposition 34 Set V strongly subcritical and  $N \geq 3$ . Assume that  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for some  $p \in [2; p_0)$ . Then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^r$  for all  $r \in [2; p)$ .

We prove this result after the proof of Theorem 43.

Consider now  $p > p_{0*}$  and  $V = c|x|^{-2}$  where  $0 < c < (\frac{N-2}{2})^2$ . It is proved in [15] that the semigroup does not act on  $L^p$  for  $p \notin (p'_0; p_0)$ . Therefore we obtain from this proposition and Proposition 33 that  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is not bounded on  $L^p$  when  $p \in (p_{0*}; p_0)$ . Now if  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^q$  for some  $q \ge p_0$ , then, by interpolation with its boundedness on  $L^2$ ,  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  will be bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2; q)$ , in particular for  $p \in (p_{0*}; p_0)$ . Therefore we conclude that  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is not bounded on  $L^p$  when  $p \in (p_{0*}; \infty)$ .

#### 4 The case $p \in (2; p_{0*})$

In this section we prove that if the strongly subcritical potential is, in addition, in  $L^{N/2}$ ,  $N \geq 3$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; p_{0*})$ . In the previous section we have proved the boundedness on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; 2]$  when the potential is strongly subcritical, so it remains to study the case of  $L^p$  when  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ .

First we prove the following result:

Theorem 41 If  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is bounded on  $L^{p_1}$  for some  $p_1 \in [2; p_0)$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2; p_1)$  provided that V is strongly subcritical, and N > 3.

Let us prove that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  satisfies the two estimates of the following theorem proved in [3] (Theorem 2.1).

Theorem 42 Let  $q \in (2, \infty]$ . Suppose that T is a sublinear operator bounded on  $L^2$ , and let  $(A_r)_{r>0}$  be a family of linear operators on  $L^2$ . Assume that

$$\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |T(I - A_{r(B)})f|^{2}\right)^{1/2} \le C(M(|f|^{2}))^{1/2}(x) \tag{25}$$

$$\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |TA_{r(B)}f|^{q}\right)^{1/q} \le C(M(|Tf|^{2}))^{1/2}(x) \tag{26}$$

for all  $f \in L^2$ , all ball B and all  $x \in B$  where r(B) is the radius of B. Here M is the Hardy-Littlewood maximal operator

$$Mf(x) = \sup_{B \ni x} \frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |f|.$$

If  $2 and <math>Tf \in L^p$  when  $f \in L^p$ , then T is of strong type (p,p). More precisely, for all  $f \in L^2 \cap L^p$ ,  $\|Tf\|_p \le c\|f\|_p$  where c depends only on the dimension N, p, q and C.

Proof (of Theorem 41) Set  $T = \nabla A^{-1/2}$ ,  $A_r = I - (I - e^{-r^2 A})^m$  where m > N/4, and take  $f \in L^2$ . We use similar arguments as Auscher [1] Theorem 4.6. Decompose  $f = \sum_j f\chi_{C_j(B)}$  where  $C_1 = 4B$  and  $C_j(B) = 2^{j+1}B \setminus 2^j B$  for  $j \geq 2$ , where B is the ball of radius r.

Let us verify (25): By the Minkowski inequality, we have

$$\|\nabla A^{-1/2}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f\|_{L^2(B)} \le \sum_{j>1} \|\nabla A^{-1/2}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f \chi_{C_j(B)}\|_{L^2(B)} (27)$$

We study  $\|\nabla A^{-1/2}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f \chi_{C_j(B)}\|_{L^2(B)}$  for  $j \geq 1$ . We have

$$\nabla A^{-1/2} (I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f \chi_{C_j(B)} = C \int_0^\infty \nabla e^{-tA} (I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f \chi_{C_j(B)} \frac{dt}{\sqrt{t}}$$
$$= C \int_0^\infty g_{r^2}(t) \nabla e^{-tA} f \chi_{C_j(B)} dt$$

where

$$g_{r^2}(t) = \sum_{k=0}^{m} {m \choose k} (-1)^k \frac{\chi_{(t-kr^2>0)}}{\sqrt{t-kr^2}}.$$

Hence, by the  $L^2-L^2$  off-diagonal estimate of the gradient of the semigroup proved in Proposition 21, we obtain for  $j\geq 2$ 

$$\|\nabla A^{-1/2}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f \chi_{C_j(B)}\|_{L^2(B)} \le C \int_0^\infty |g_{r^2}(t)| t^{-1/2} e^{-c4^j r^2/t} dt \|f \chi_{C_j(B)}\|_2.$$

As we have mentioned in the previous section

$$|g_{r^2}(t)| \le \frac{C}{\sqrt{t - kr^2}}$$
 if  $kr^2 < t \le (k+1)r^2 \le (m+1)r^2$ ,

and

$$|g_{r^2}(t)| \le Cr^{2m}t^{-m-1/2}$$
 if  $t > (m+1)r^2$ .

This yields

$$\|\nabla A^{-\frac{1}{2}}(I - e^{-r^{2}A})^{m} f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{L^{2}(B)}$$

$$\leq C \sum_{k=0}^{m} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} \frac{t^{-1/2}}{\sqrt{t - kr^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2}$$

$$+ Cr^{2m} \int_{(m+1)r^{2}}^{\infty} t^{-1-m} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2}$$

$$\leq I_{1} + I_{2}. \tag{28}$$

$$I_2 := Cr^{2m} \int_{(m+1)r^2}^{\infty} t^{-1-m} e^{-\frac{c4^j r^2}{t}} dt \|f\chi_{C_j(B)}\|_2 \le C4^{-jm} \|f\chi_{C_j(B)}\|_2$$

by the Laplace transform formula, and

$$||f\chi_{C_j(B)}||_2 \le ||f||_{L^2(2^{j+1}B)} \le |2^{j+1}B|^{1/2} (M(|f|^2))^{1/2} (x)$$
 (29)

for all  $x \in B$  and  $j \ge 1$ . So

$$I_2 \le C4^{-jm} |2^{j+1}B|^{1/2} (M(|f|^2))^{1/2} (x).$$

At present, we can turn to  $I_1$ :

$$I_{1} := C \sum_{k=0}^{m} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\frac{1}{2}}}{\sqrt{t - kr^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2}$$

$$= C \left(\sum_{k=1}^{m} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\frac{1}{2}}}{\sqrt{t - kr^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt + \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt\right) \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2}$$

$$= J_{1} + J_{2}$$

where

$$J_{1} := C \sum_{k=1}^{m} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} \frac{t^{-\frac{1}{2}}}{\sqrt{t - kr^{2}}} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2}$$

$$\leq C \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}}{m+1}} \sum_{k=1}^{m} (kr^{2})^{-1/2} \int_{kr^{2}}^{(k+1)r^{2}} (t - kr^{2})^{-1/2} dt$$

$$\leq C 4^{-jm} \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2}$$

$$\leq C 4^{-jm} \|2^{j+1}B^{1/2}(M(|f|^{2}))^{1/2}(x)$$

where we use estimate (29). For the second term

$$J_{2} := \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{t}} dt \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2}$$

$$\leq C \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}}{2(m+1)}} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{2t}} dt$$

$$\leq C \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2} 4^{-jm} \int_{0}^{r^{2}} t^{-1} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}r^{2}}{2t}} dt$$

$$\leq C 4^{-jm} \|f\chi_{C_{j}(B)}\|_{2}$$

$$\leq C 4^{-jm} \|2^{j+1}B\|^{1/2} (M(|f|^{2}))^{1/2}(x).$$

Here we use the fact that  $j \geq 2$  to obtain the convergence of the integral without dependence on r nor on j, and for the last inequality we use (29). Inserting these estimates in (28) we find

$$\|\nabla A^{-1/2}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f \chi_{C_i(B)}\|_{L^2(B)} \le C4^{-jm} |2^{j+1}B|^{1/2} (M(|f|^2))^{1/2} (x)$$

for all  $j \geq 2$ . Now for j = 1 we show that

$$\|\nabla A^{-1/2}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f \chi_{C_1(B)}\|_{L^2(B)} \leq \sum_{k=0}^m \binom{m}{k} \|\nabla A^{-1/2} e^{-kr^2 A} f \chi_{4B}\|_{L^2(B)}$$

$$\leq C \sum_{k=0}^m \binom{m}{k} \|e^{-kr^2 A} f \chi_{4B}\|_{L^2(\mathbb{R}^N)}$$

$$\leq C \sum_{k=0}^m \binom{m}{k} \|f \chi_{4B}\|_{L^2(\mathbb{R}^N)}$$

$$\leq C |4B|^{1/2} (M(|f|^2))^{1/2}(x),$$

where we use the boundedness of Riesz transforms on  $L^2$  from estimate (2), and that of the semigroup on  $L^2$ .

Using these estimates in the inequality (27) we obtain

$$\begin{split} \|\nabla A^{-\frac{1}{2}}(I - e^{-r^2 A})^m f\|_{L^2(B)} &\leq C\Big(|4B|^{\frac{1}{2}} + \sum_{j \geq 2} 4^{-jm} |2^{j+1}B|^{\frac{1}{2}}\Big) (M(|f|^2))^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) \\ &\leq C|B|^{\frac{1}{2}} \Big(2^{N/2} + \sum_{j \geq 2} 2^{-j(2m-N/2)}\Big) (M(|f|^2))^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) \\ &\leq C|B|^{1/2} (M(|f|^2))^{1/2}(x) \end{split}$$

because we set m > N/4. Finally, this implies that

$$\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |\nabla A^{-1/2} (I - e^{-r^2(B)A})^m f|^2\right)^{1/2} \le C(M(|f|^2))^{1/2}(x)$$

for all  $f \in L^2$  and all x in B, which is assumption (25). Let us now prove (26):

$$\nabla A^{-1/2} (I - (I - e^{-r^2 A})^m) f = \sum_{k=1}^m \binom{m}{k} (-1)^{k+1} \nabla e^{-kr^2 A} A^{-1/2} f.$$

So to check (26) it suffices to prove that for  $q \in (2; p_1)$ 

$$\sum_{k=1}^{m} {m \choose k} \left( \frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |\nabla e^{-kr^{2}(B)A} g|^{q} \right)^{1/q} \le C(M(|\nabla g|^{2}))^{1/2}(x). \tag{30}$$

This applied to  $g = A^{-1/2}f$ , gives us (26). Decompose  $g = \sum_j g\chi_{C_j(B)}$  where  $C_1 = 4B$  and  $C_j(B) = 2^{j+1}B \setminus 2^jB$  for  $j \geq 2$ . Here B is the ball of radius r. By the Minkowski inequality, we have

$$\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |\nabla e^{-kr^{2}A} g|^{q}\right)^{1/q} \leq \sum_{j \geq 1} \left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |\nabla e^{-kr^{2}A} g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}|^{q}\right)^{1/q}.$$
(31)

By duality of the  $L^p - L^2$  boundedness of the semigroup proved in Proposition 22 we have

$$||e^{-tA}||_{2-p} \le Ct^{-\gamma_p} \tag{32}$$

where  $\gamma_p := \frac{N}{2}(\frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{p})$  for all  $p \in [2; p_0)$ . We have assumed that for all t > 0,  $\|\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}\|_{p_1-p_1} \le C$  for some  $p_1 \in [2; p_0)$ . Thus we obtain for all t > 0

$$\|\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}\|_{2-p_1} \le Ct^{-\gamma_{p_1}}$$

where  $\gamma_{p_1} = \frac{N}{2}(\frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{p_1})$ . After interpolation of this boundedness with the  $L^2 - L^2$  off-diagonal estimate (Proposition 21 (ii)), as we did in the proof of Theorem 21, we obtain the following  $L^2 - L^q$  off-diagonal estimate

$$||\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}f||_{L^q(F)} \le Ct^{-\gamma_q}e^{-c\frac{d^2(E;F)}{t}}||f||_2,$$

for all  $q \in (2; p_1)$ , all t > 0, and for all  $f \in L^2$  supported in E, where  $\gamma_q = \frac{N}{2}(\frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{q})$ . Hence

$$\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |\nabla e^{-kr^{2}A} g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}|^{q}\right)^{\frac{1}{q}} \leq \frac{C}{|B|^{\frac{1}{q}}} (kr^{2})^{-\gamma_{q}-\frac{1}{2}} e^{-c\frac{d^{2}(B;C_{j}(B))}{kr^{2}}} ||g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}||_{2}.$$
(33)

Now, applying the Hardy inequality, we find the following upper bound for  $||g\chi_{C_i(B)}||_2$ :

$$\left(\frac{1}{16r^2} \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} |g(x)\chi_{4B}|^2 dx\right)^{1/2} \le \left(\int_{\mathbb{R}^N} \frac{|g(x)\chi_{4B}|^2}{|x|^2} dx\right)^{1/2} 
\le \left(\frac{4}{(N-2)^2} \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} |\nabla g(x)\chi_{4B}|^2 dx\right)^{1/2}$$

for j = 1, and

$$\left(\frac{1}{4^{j+1}r^2} \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} |g(x)\chi_{C_j(B)}|^2 dx\right)^{1/2} \le \left(\int_{\mathbb{R}^N} \frac{|g(x)\chi_{C_j(B)}|^2}{|x|^2} dx\right)^{1/2} \\
\le \left(\frac{4}{(N-2)^2} \int_{\mathbb{R}^N} |\nabla g(x)\chi_{C_j(B)}|^2 dx\right)^{1/2}$$

for  $j \geq 2$ . Employing these estimates of  $||g\chi_{C_j(B)}||_2$  in (33) we conclude that, for j = 1,

$$\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |\nabla e^{-r^{2}kA} g \chi_{4B}|^{q}\right)^{\frac{1}{q}} \leq \frac{C}{|B|^{\frac{1}{q}}} k^{-(\gamma_{q} + \frac{1}{2})} r^{-2\gamma_{q}} ||\nabla g \chi_{4B}||_{2}$$

$$\leq \frac{C}{|4B|^{\frac{1}{2}}} k^{-(\gamma_{q} + \frac{1}{2})} r^{-2\gamma_{q}} |B|^{\frac{1}{2} - \frac{1}{q}} ||\nabla g||_{L^{2}(4B)}$$

$$\leq C k^{-(\gamma_{q} + \frac{1}{2})} (M(|\nabla g|^{2}))^{\frac{1}{2}}(x),$$

and for  $j \geq 2$ ,

$$\left(\frac{1}{|B|} \int_{B} |\nabla e^{-r^{2}kA} g \chi_{C_{j}(B)}|^{q}\right)^{\frac{1}{q}} \leq \frac{C2^{j(N/2+1)}}{|2^{j+1}B|^{\frac{1}{2}}} k^{-(\gamma_{q}+\frac{1}{2})} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}}{k}} ||\nabla g||_{L^{2}(C_{j}(B))} \\
\leq Ck^{-(\gamma_{q}+\frac{1}{2})} 2^{j(\frac{N}{2}+1)} e^{-\frac{c4^{j}}{m}} (M(|\nabla g|^{2}))^{\frac{1}{2}}(x).$$

At this stage, we insert these two estimates in the sum on j, in (31), then in the sum on k in (30), to obtain the upper bound desired in (30). This gives us estimate (26) of Theorem 42.

Hence by Theorem 42, we obtain that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2; p_1)$ , if  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is bounded on  $L^{p_1}$  for some  $p_1 \in [2; p_0)$ .

Next we will prove the following result. It can be seen also as a consequence of [18] Theorem 5. This is useful to prove the boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ .

Proposition 41 If V is strongly subcritical, then  $||V^{1/2}(-\Delta)^{-1/2}||_{p-p} \leq C$  for all  $p \in (1, 2]$ .

Proof We set  $A_0 = -\Delta$ , and we assume that V is strongly subcritical. This implies that

$$||V^{1/2}u||_2^2 \le \frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}||\nabla u||_2^2 \le C||A_0^{1/2}u||_2^2,$$

which is

$$||V^{1/2}A_0^{-1/2}u||_2 \le C||u||_2. (34)$$

Now we prove that  $V^{1/2}A_0^{-1/2}$  is of weak type (1,1) to deduce by the Marcinkiewicz interpolation theorem that it is bounded on  $L^p$  on all  $p \in (1,2]$ .

First, we search for a  $L^1-L^2$  off-diagonal estimate of  $(\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA_0})_{t>0}$ . We write for all  $f\in L^1$ 

$$\chi_F V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-tA_0} \chi_E f(x) = \chi_F(x) V^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) \frac{1}{(4\pi t)^{\frac{N}{2}}} \int e^{-\frac{|x-y|^2}{4t}} \chi_E(y) f(y) dy$$

$$\leq C e^{-\frac{d^2(E,F)}{8t}} V^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) \frac{1}{(4\pi t)^{\frac{N}{2}}} \int e^{-\frac{|x-y|^2}{8t}} \chi_E(y) |f(y)| dy$$

$$\leq C e^{-\frac{d^2(E,F)}{8t}} V^{\frac{1}{2}}(x) e^{-2tA_0} \chi_E |f|(x).$$

Hence

$$||\chi_F V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-tA_0} \chi_E f||_2 \le C e^{\frac{-d^2(E,F)}{8t}} ||V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-2tA_0} \chi_E |f|||_2$$

$$\le C e^{\frac{-d^2(E,F)}{8t}} ||V^{\frac{1}{2}} A_0^{-\frac{1}{2}} A_0^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-tA_0} e^{-tA_0} \chi_E |f|||_2.$$

Now using (34) and the analyticity of the semigroup we get

$$||\chi_F V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-tA_0} \chi_E f||_2 \leq \frac{C}{t^{\frac{1}{2}}} e^{\frac{-d^2(E,F)}{8t}} ||e^{-tA_0} \chi_E |f|||_2.$$

Thus we obtain

$$||\chi_F \sqrt{t} V^{\frac{1}{2}} e^{-tA_0} \chi_E f||_2 \le C t^{-\gamma_1} e^{\frac{-d^2(E,F)}{8t}} ||f||_1$$
 (35)

for all t>0, where  $\gamma_1=\frac{N}{2}(\frac{1}{1}-\frac{1}{2})=\frac{N}{4}$ . Now we use same arguments as in the previous section. We check estimates (19) and (20) of Theorem 32, by setting  $T=V^{1/2}A_0^{-1/2}$  and  $A_r=I-(I-e^{-r^2A_0})^m$ .

Then we deduce that  $V^{1/2}A_0^{-1/2}$  is of weak type (1,1).

By interpolation with (34), we obtain

$$||V^{1/2}A_0^{-1/2}||_{p-p} \le C$$

for all  $p \in (1, 2]$ .

Next we prove the boundedness of Riesz transforms when  $V \in L^{N/2}$ .

Theorem 43 Let  $A = -\Delta - V$  where  $0 \le V \in L^{N/2}, N \ge 3$ . Assume that  $A \ge \varepsilon V$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p_0'; p_{0*})$  where  $p_0 := \frac{2N}{(N-2)\left(1-\sqrt{1-\frac{1}{1+\varepsilon}}\right)}$ ,  $p_0'$  its dual exponent, and  $2 < p_{0*} = \frac{p_0N}{N+p_0}$  its reverse Sobolev exponent.

Proof In the previous section, we have proved the boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$  when V is strongly subcritical and when the dimension  $N \geq 3$ . Let us now prove the boundedness on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ . Take  $\Lambda_0$  and  $\Lambda$  two operators such that

$$\mathfrak{a}_0(u,v) := <\Lambda_0 u, v>$$
 and  $\mathfrak{a}(u,v) := <\Lambda u, v>$ 

where <, > is the pairing <,  $>_{W^{-1,2},W^{1,2}}$ .  $D(\Lambda_0) := D(\mathfrak{a}_0) = W^{1,2}$  and  $D(\Lambda) := D(\mathfrak{a}) = W^{1,2}$ . Here  $\mathfrak{a}_0$  and  $\mathfrak{a}$  are the sesquilinear forms associated to  $A_0 := -\Delta$  and  $A := -\Delta - V$ , respectively. The operator  $\Lambda_0$  restricted to  $D(A_0)$  is  $A_0$ , and  $\Lambda$  restricted to D(A) is A. It is known that  $(I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1}$  restricted to  $L^2$  coincides with  $(I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1}$ , and  $(I + t\Lambda)^{-1}$  restricted to  $L^2$  coincides with  $(I + t\Lambda)^{-1}$ . (see [16] Chapter I).

Set G(t) the following difference:

$$G(t) = \nabla (I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1} - \nabla (I + t\Lambda)^{-1} \quad \text{for } t > 0.$$

The proof is divided into three steps:

Step 1: We prove that for all t > 0, all  $f \in L^2 \cap L^p$ , all  $\phi \in C_0^{\infty}$ , and all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ 

$$|\langle G(t)f, \phi \rangle| \leq Ct^{-1/2}||f||_p||\phi||_{p'}$$
.

Step 2: We prove that for all t > 0 and all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ 

$$||\nabla (I + tA)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2}.$$

Step 3: We prove that for all t > 0 and all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ 

$$||\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}||_{p-p} \le C.$$

Then, we apply Theorem 41 and conclude the result of this one.

Step 1:

$$G(t) = \nabla (I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1} - \nabla (I + t\Lambda)^{-1}$$

$$= \nabla \Big( (I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1} - (I + t\Lambda)^{-1} \Big)$$

$$= t\nabla (I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1} (\Lambda - \Lambda_0) (I + t\Lambda)^{-1}$$

$$= -t\nabla (I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1} V (I + t\Lambda)^{-1}.$$

Since  $D(\Lambda_0) = D(\Lambda)$ , G(t) is well defined. For  $f \in L^2 \cap L^p$ , p > 2, and  $\phi \in C_0^{\infty}$  we have

$$|\langle G(t)f, \phi \rangle| \leq t||\nabla (I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1}V(I + t\Lambda)^{-1}f||_p||\phi||_{p'}$$

Thus

$$\nabla (I + tA_0)^{-1} V^{1/2} = \nabla (I + tA_0)^{-1/2} (I + tA_0)^{-1/2} V^{1/2}.$$

Let us study each of the following operators:  $\nabla(I+tA_0)^{-1/2}$ ,  $(I+tA_0)^{-1/2}V^{1/2}$ , and  $V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}$ .

We begin with the first one: we know that Riesz transforms associated to  $A_0$  are bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; \infty)$ . We use the boundedness of the operator  $(tA_0)^{1/2}(I+tA_0)^{-1/2}$  on all  $L^p$ , proved by the study of the functional calculus theory, to estimate for all  $p \in (1; \infty)$ , and all t > 0

$$||\nabla (I + tA_0)^{-1/2}||_{p-p} \le ||\nabla A_0^{-1/2}||_{p-p}.||A_0^{1/2}(I + tA_0)^{-1/2}||_{p-p}$$

$$\le Ct^{-1/2}.$$
(36)

Let us now estimate the norm of the second operator,  $(I + tA_0)^{-1/2}V^{1/2}$ . We remark that this operator is the dual of  $V^{1/2}(I + tA_0)^{-1/2}$ , so we study the dual. We consider the following decomposition

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA_0)^{-1/2}||_{p-p} \le ||V^{1/2}A_0^{-1/2}||_{p-p}||A_0^{1/2}(I+tA_0)^{-1/2}||_{p-p}.$$

By the previous proposition, we have  $||V^{1/2}A_0^{-1/2}||_{p-p} \leq C$  for all  $p \in (1;2]$ . Hence, once again, using the boundedness of  $(tA_0)^{1/2}(I+tA_0)^{-1/2}$  on all  $L^p$ , we conclude that for all t>0 and all  $p \in (1;2]$ 

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA_0)^{-1/2}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2}.$$

By duality this yields, for all t > 0 and all  $p \in [2, \infty)$ ,

$$||(I + tA_0)^{-1/2}V^{1/2}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2}$$
(37)

Now it remains to study the third operator,  $V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}$ . With the assumption  $V \in L^{N/2}$ , we obtain for all  $p \in (p'_0; p_{0*})$  and all t > 0

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2}.$$

In fact, by Hölder's inequality, we have

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}f||_p \le ||V^{1/2}||_N.||(I+tA)^{-1}f||_q$$

where  $p'_0 such that <math>\frac{1}{p} - \frac{1}{q} = \frac{1}{N}$ . Interpolation of the uniform boundedness of the semigroup generated by A with its  $L^p - L^2$  boundedness (Proposition 22) yields

$$||e^{-tA}||_{p-q} \le Ct^{-\gamma_{pq}} \tag{38}$$

for all  $p, q \in (p'_0; p_0)$  such that  $p \leq q$ , where  $\gamma_{pq} = \frac{N}{2}(\frac{1}{p} - \frac{1}{q}) = \frac{1}{2}$ . Hence

$$||(I+tA)^{-1}f||_q \le \int_0^\infty e^{-s}||e^{-stA}f||_q ds \le Ct^{-1/2}||f||_p \int_0^\infty e^{-s}s^{-1/2} ds$$

where  $p \in (p'_0; p_{0*})$  (to keep q in  $(p'_0; p_0)$ ). This yields, for all t > 0,

$$||(I+tA)^{-1}f||_q \le Ct^{-\frac{1}{2}}||f||_p.$$

Hence

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}f||_p \le C||V||_{\frac{N}{2}}t^{-\frac{1}{2}}||f||_p,$$

for all  $p \in (p'_0; p_{0*})$ , which is

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2}.$$
 (39)

Going back to G(t): employing estimates (36), (37) and (39), we deduce that for all t > 0, all  $f \in L^2 \cap L^p$ , all  $\phi \in C_0^{\infty}$  and all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ ,

$$|\langle G(t)f, \phi \rangle| \le Ct^{-1/2}||f||_p||\phi||_{p'}.$$
 (40)

Step 2: Now for all  $f \in L^2 \cap L^p$ 

$$G(t)f := \nabla (I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1} f - \nabla (I + t\Lambda)^{-1} f$$
  
=  $\nabla (I + t\Lambda_0)^{-1} f - \nabla (I + t\Lambda)^{-1} f$ .

Then for all  $\phi \in C_0^{\infty}$  we get

$$|\langle \nabla (I + tA)^{-1} f, \phi \rangle| = |\langle G(t) f - \nabla (I + tA_0)^{-1} f, \phi \rangle|.$$
 (41)

We use the boundedness of Riesz transforms associated to  $A_0$ , and the analyticity of the semigroup associated to  $A_0$ , on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; \infty)$ , to come to

$$||\nabla (I + tA_0)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le \int_0^\infty e^{-s} ||\nabla A_0^{-1/2} A_0^{1/2} e^{-stA_0}||_{p-p} ds$$

$$\le Ct^{-1/2} \int_0^\infty e^{-s} s^{-1/2} ds$$

$$\le Ct^{-1/2}$$

for all t > 0 and all  $p \in (1, \infty)$ . Then, from (41) and (40) we obtain, for all t > 0, all  $f \in L^2 \cap L^p$ , all  $\phi \in C_0^\infty$  and all  $p \in (2, p_{0*})$ ,

$$|\langle \nabla (I+tA)^{-1}f, \phi \rangle| \le Ct^{-1/2}||f||_p||\phi||_{p'}.$$

Thus we obtain

$$||\nabla (I + tA)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2} \tag{42}$$

for all t > 0 and all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ .

Step 3: We write

$$||\nabla e^{-tA}||_{p-p} \le ||\nabla (I+tA)^{-1}||_{p-p}||(I+tA)e^{-tA}||_{p-p}.$$

We use (42) and the analyticity of the semigroup associated to  $A = -\Delta - V$  on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; p_0)$  (see [5] Theorem 1.6 or [15]), to obtain that for all t > 0 and all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ 

$$||\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA}||_{p-p} \le C.$$

Now we apply Theorem 41 and we conclude that the Riesz transforms associated to A are bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ .

Proof (of Proposition 34) Let V strongly subcritical and  $N \geq 3$ . Assume that  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for some  $p \in [2; p_0)$ . Then, in the previous proof, the third operator of the decomposition of G(t),  $V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}$ , can be studied as follows:

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le ||V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}||_{p-p}||A^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2}.$$

Here we use the fact that A has a bounded  $H^{\infty}$ -functional calculus on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; p_0)$  (see [6] Theorem 2.2) to get

$$||A^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2}$$

for all t > 0. Employing this estimate in the previous proof, we obtain the result.

Proposition 42 Let  $A = -\Delta - V$  where  $0 \le V \in L^{N/2}, N \ge 3, V$  is strongly subcritical. Then  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; p_{0*})$  where  $p'_0$  is the dual exponent of  $p_0$ , and  $2 < p_{0*} = \frac{p_0 N}{N + p_0}$  is the reverse Sobolev exponent of  $p_0$ .

Proof We have proved in Proposition 31 that  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p_0'; 2]$ , it remains to prove boundedness on  $L^p$  for  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ . Let us first prove that, if V is in  $L^{N/2}$ ,  $(\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ . By the Hölder inequality we can estimate for all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$  and all t > 0

$$\|\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}f\|_{p} \leq \sqrt{t}\|V^{1/2}\|_{N}\|e^{-tA}f\|_{q}$$
$$\leq \sqrt{t}\|V\|_{\frac{N}{2}}Ct^{-\gamma_{pq}}\|f\|_{p}.$$

This is for all  $p'_0 such that <math>\frac{1}{p} - \frac{1}{q} = \frac{1}{N}$ . So  $\gamma_{pq} = \frac{N}{2}(\frac{1}{p} - \frac{1}{q}) = \frac{1}{2}$ . This yields that for all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ 

$$\|\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}\|_{p-p} \le C. \tag{43}$$

Now we take the following decomposition

$$\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA} = \sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA/2}e^{-tA/2}$$

and we use estimates (32) and (43). Thus, we obtain, for all t > 0 and all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ ,

$$\|\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}\|_{2-p} \le Ct^{-\gamma_p}.$$

At present, we interpolate this estimate with the  $L^2-L^2$  off-diagonal estimate of the norm of  $\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}$  proved in Proposition 21, as we did in the proof of Theorem 21. Then we get the following  $L^2-L^p$  off-diagonal estimate

$$\|\sqrt{t}V^{1/2}e^{-tA}f\|_{L^p(F)} \le Ct^{-\gamma_p}e^{-\frac{cd^2(E,F)}{t}}\|f\|_2,\tag{44}$$

for all t > 0 and all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ .

At this step, we check assumptions (25) and (26) of Theorem 42 where  $T = V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  as we did in the proof of Theorem 41. We use the  $L^2 - L^2$  off-diagonal estimate proved in Proposition 21 (iii), and the estimate (44). Thus we deduce the boundedness of  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2; p_{0*})$ .

The following is an example of potentials satisfying conditions of Theorem 43 and Proposition 42. With these potentials,  $\nabla(-\Delta - V)^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}(-\Delta - V)^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (p'_0; p_{0*})$ .

Example: Set  $N \geq 3$ , and let us take  $V \in L^{N/2}$  such that  $V \sim c|x|^{-\alpha}$  when |x| tends to infinity, where c > 0 and  $\alpha > 2$ . Assume that  $||V||_{\frac{N}{2}}$  is small enough and let us prove that these potentials are strongly subcritical, so we should prove that

$$||V^{1/2}u||_2^2 \le C||\nabla u||_2^2$$

where C < 1. By the Hölder inequality, we have

$$||V^{1/2}u||_2^2 \le ||V||_{p'}||u^2||_p$$

where we set  $p' = \frac{N}{2}$  so p will be  $\frac{N}{N-2}$ . Now using the Sobolev inequality we obtain

$$||V^{1/2}u||_2^2 \leq ||V||_{p'}||u^2||_p = ||V||_{\frac{N}{2}}||u||_{2^*}^2 \leq C||\nabla u||_2^2,$$

where  $2^* := \frac{2N}{N-2}$  is the Sobolev exponent of 2, and C < 1 for  $||V||_{\frac{N}{2}}$  is small enough.

5 Boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; N)$ 

In this section we assume that V is strongly subcritical in the Kato subclass  $K_N^{\infty}$ ,  $N \geq 3$ . Following Zhao [21], we define

$$K_N^{\infty} := \left\{ V \in K_N^{loc}; \lim_{B \uparrow \infty} \left[ \sup_{x \in \mathbb{R}^N} \int_{|y| \geq B} \frac{|V(y)|}{|y-x|^{N-2}} dy \right] = 0 \right\},$$

where  $K_N^{loc}$  is the class of potentials that are locally in the Kato class  $K_N$ . For necessary background of the Kato class see [19] and references therein.

We use results proved by stochastic methods to deduce a  $L^1 - L^{\infty}$  off-diagonal estimate of the norm of the semigroup which leads to the boundedness of  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; N)$ .

Theorem 51 Let A be the Schrödinger operator  $-\Delta - V, V \geq 0$ . Assume that V is strongly subcritical in the class  $K_N^{\infty}, (N \geq 3)$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; 2]$ . If in addition  $V \in L^{N/2}$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; N)$ .

Proof We assume that V is strongly subcritical in the class  $K_N^{\infty}$ . Therefore V satisfies assumptions of Theorem 2 of [20] (The classes  $K_{\infty}$  and  $S_{\infty}$  mentioned in [20] are equivalent to the class  $K_N^{\infty}$  (see Chen [7] Theorem 2.1 and Section 3.1)). Thus the heat kernel associated to  $(e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  satisfies a Gaussian estimate. Now we apply Theorem 5 of [18] and we conclude that  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$ 

and  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  are of weak type (1,1) and they are bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1,2]$ .

We have seen that when the potential is strongly subcritical in the class  $K_N^{\infty}$ , we obtain a Gaussian estimate of the heat kernel associated to the semi-group. This implies that the semigroup is bounded from  $L^1$  to  $L^{\infty}$  by  $Ct^{-N/2}$ . Thus, by interpolation,

$$||e^{-tA}||_{p-q} \le Ct^{-\gamma_{pq}} \tag{45}$$

for all t>0, all  $p,q\in[1;\infty], p\leq q$ , where  $\gamma_{pq}=\frac{N}{2}(\frac{1}{p}-\frac{1}{q})$ . Moreover the semigroup is bounded analytic on  $L^p$  for all  $p\in(1;\infty)$  (see [5] Theorem 1.6). Now (32) holds for all  $p\in(2;\infty)$ . Using the same proof as for Theorem 41 we deduce that

- if  $(\sqrt{t}\nabla e^{-tA})_{t>0}$  is bounded on  $L^{p_1}$  for some  $p_1 \in [2, \infty)$ , then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (2, p_1)$ .

We use (45) in the proof of Theorem 43: in the proof of the boundedness of the operator  $V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}$  in Step~1:

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}f||_p \le ||V^{1/2}||_N \cdot ||(I+tA)^{-1}f||_q$$

where  $1 \le p < q \le \infty$  such that  $\frac{1}{p} - \frac{1}{q} = \frac{1}{N}$ . Thus, if p < N then  $q = p^*$ , if p = N then  $q = \infty$ , p cannot be more than N.

$$||(I+tA)^{-1}f||_q \le \int_0^\infty e^{-s}||e^{-stA}f||_q ds \le Ct^{-1/2}||f||_p \int_0^\infty e^{-s}s^{-1/2} ds$$

where  $p \in [1; N]$  and  $q \in [1; \infty]$ . This yields for all t > 0 and all  $p \in [1; N]$ 

$$||V^{1/2}(I+tA)^{-1}||_{p-p} \le Ct^{-1/2}.$$

In the same proof, we use the fact that

$$||tAe^{-tA}||_{p-p} \le C$$

for all  $p \in (1, \infty)$  in Step~3, because of the analyticity of the semigroup on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1, \infty)$ . Then we deduce

- if  $V \in L^{N/2} \cap K_N^{\infty}(N \geq 3)$ , V strongly subcritical, then  $\nabla A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; N)$ .

We use the  $L^p - L^q$  bound of the semigroup for  $1 \le p \le q \le \infty$  in the proof of Proposition 42 to deduce that

– If  $V \in L^{N/2} \cap K_N^{\infty}(N \geq 3)$ , V strongly subcritical, then  $V^{1/2}A^{-1/2}$  is bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; N)$ .

Example: Set  $N \geq 3$ , and let us take potentials V in the Kato subclass  $K_N \cap L^{N/2}$  such that  $V \sim c|x|^{-\alpha}$  when x tends to infinity, where  $\alpha > 2$ . Suppose that  $||V||_{\frac{N}{2}}$  is small enough. As we have seen in the previous example, these potentials are strongly subcritical. Z.Zhao [21] proved that they are in the subclass  $K_N^\infty$ . Hence they satisfy the assumptions of Theorem 51 . Then  $\nabla (-\Delta - V)^{-1/2}$  and  $V^{1/2}(-\Delta - V)^{-1/2}$  are bounded on  $L^p$  for all  $p \in (1; N)$ .

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
