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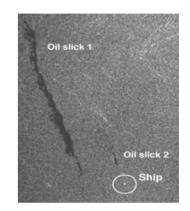


General context of the study:

Remote sensing of oil slicks on sea surfaces

Better oil slick detection, characterization, and estimation of thickness

 \Rightarrow More effective direction of oil spill countermeasures





Modeling of the EM waves emitted by oil slicks on sea surfaces at infrared (IR) wavelengths

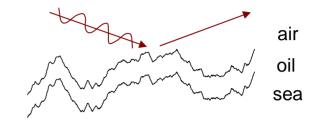
• EM emission → thermal IR emissivity

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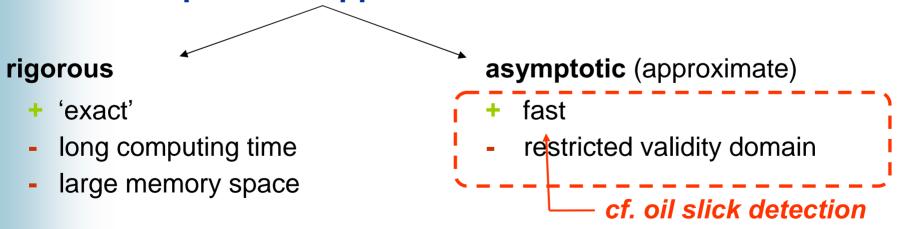




• EM emission → thermal IR emissivity



- one single interface → air/sea interface: relatively well-known
- two rough interfaces \rightarrow air/oil and oil/sea interfaces: research in progress

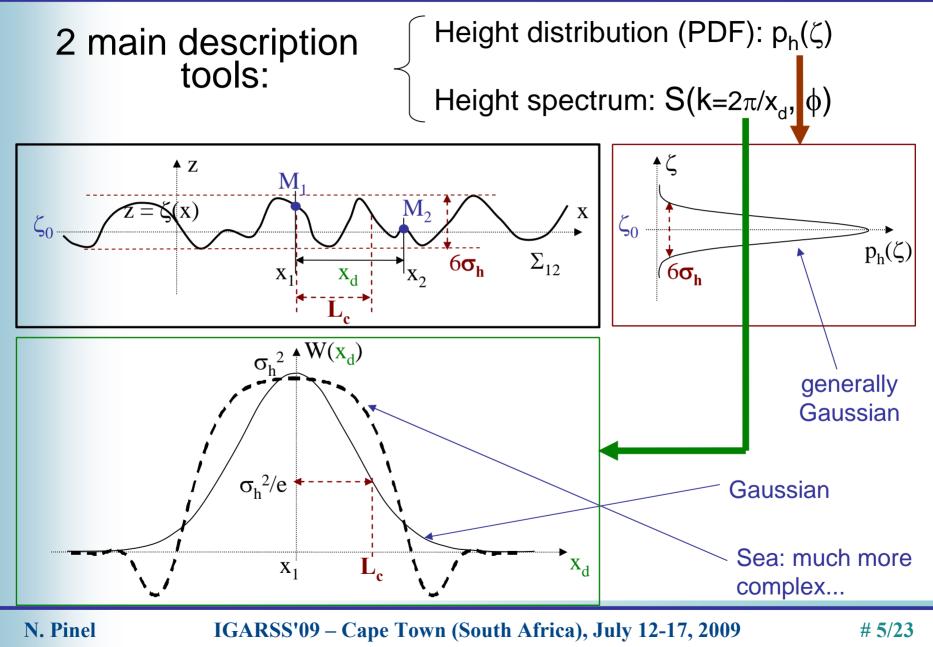

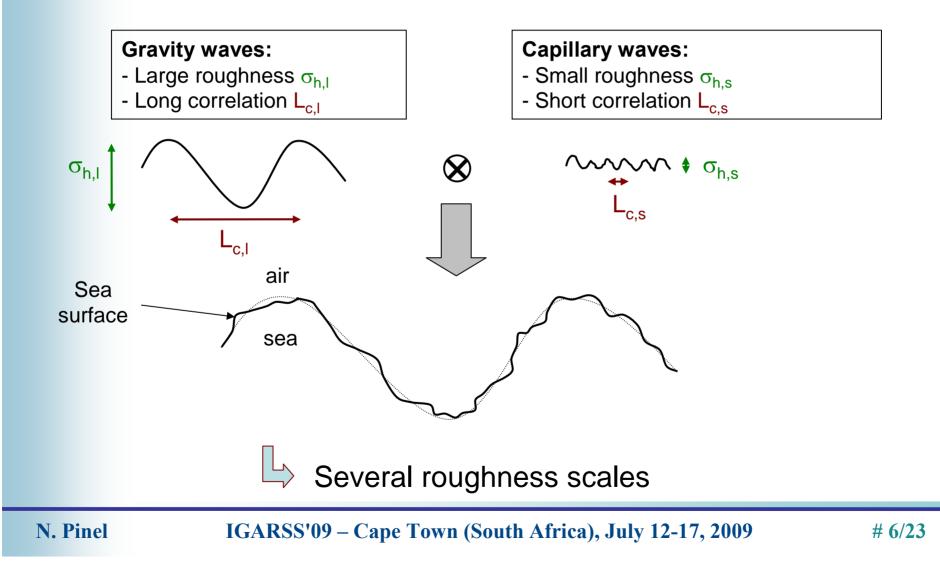








 Clean sea → Qualitative description: Gravity and capillary waves:

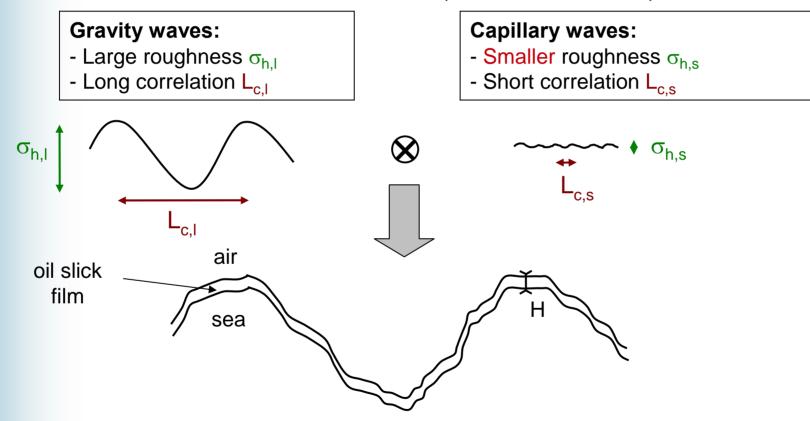






• Contaminated sea \rightarrow Qualitative description:

Damping of capillary waves of both surfaces (air/oil and oil/sea)



Yet damping dependent on various parameters (hydrodynamics)



- Height spectrum $S(k=2\pi/x_d, \phi) \rightarrow Modeling$:
 - Clean sea surface: *Elfouhaily et al. surface spectrum* model [*Elfouhaily et al., JGR, 1997*]:
 - Semi-empirical model
 - Consistent with Cox & Munk experimental model
 [Cox and Munk, JOSA, 1954]

 \rightarrow RMS slope σ_{s}

- Contaminated sea (air/oil and oil/sea) surfaces: few results:
 Lombardini et al. damping model [1] (Marangoni damping coefficient):
 - Independent of the oil film thickness H
 - Simple to use: 2 hydrodynamic parameters (oil)

Jenkins et al. damping model [2]:

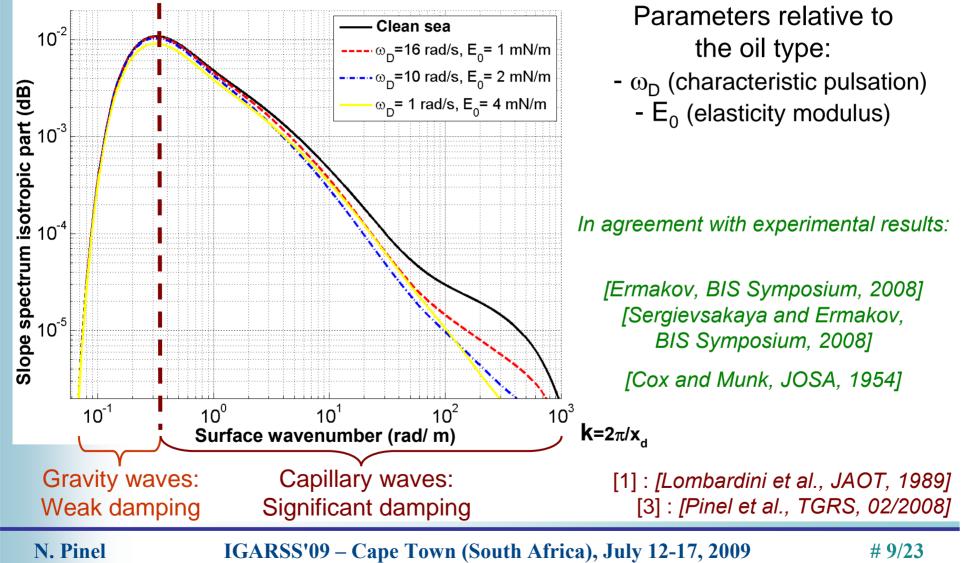
- Dependent on the oil film thickness H
- Harder to use: 8 hydrodynamic parameters (oil)

Lombardini et al. spectrum [1,3]: Independent of the oil film thickness H:
 k² S(k)





At thermal IR wavelengths:

Values of relative permittivities ($\varepsilon_r^{\text{sea}}, \varepsilon_r^{\text{oil}}$):

- Sea relative permittivity ϵ_r^{sea} : assez bien connu
- Oil relative permittivity ϵ_r^{oil} : only a few results of the literature, but... at IR wavelenghts λ : ϵ_r^{oil} can significantly vary with f and with the oil type
- \Rightarrow Interesting for oil type characterization
- Homogeneous oil slicks (not emulsions):

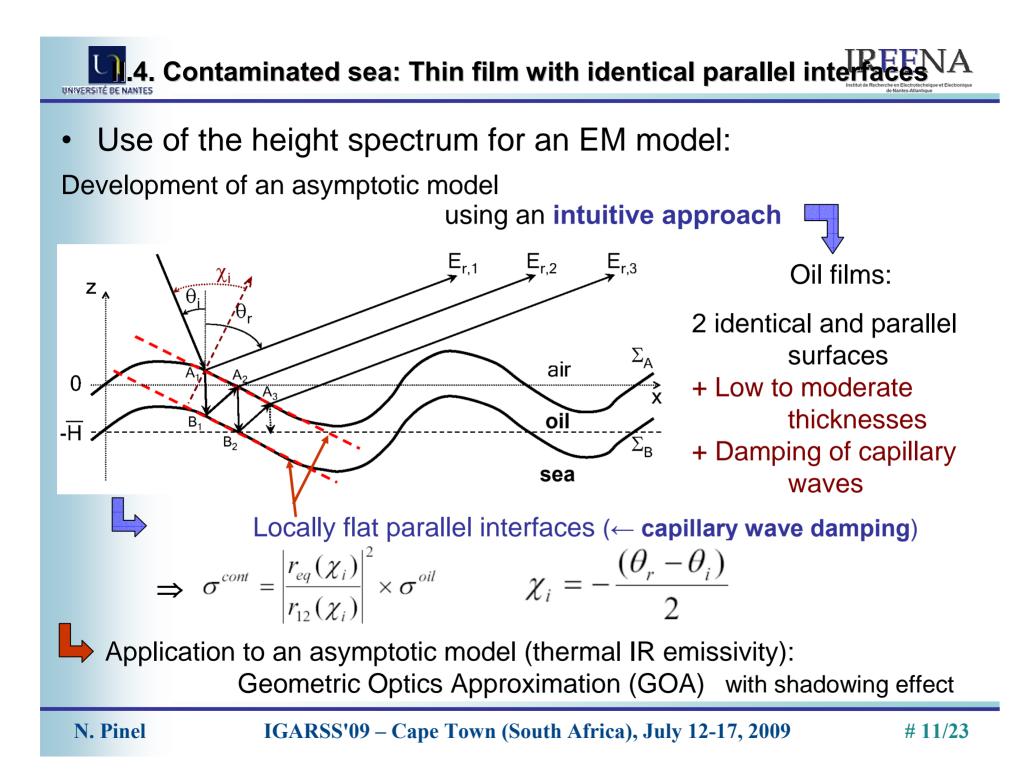
Applicable to wind speeds $u_{10} < 8-10$ m/s

• Use of the Lombardini *et al.* damping model:

Surfaces assumed to be identical and parallel:

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Emissivity ε(θ,φ) under the GOA:

$$\epsilon(\theta,\phi) = \frac{1}{1+\Lambda(\theta,\phi)} \int_{-\infty}^{+\mu} d\gamma_X \int_{-\infty}^{+\infty} [1-\mathcal{R}(\chi)] p_s(\gamma_x,\gamma_y) \left(1-\frac{\gamma_X}{\mu}\right) d\gamma_Y$$

with

- p_s : slope probability density function (PDF): \approx Gaussian
- *R*: unpolarized power reflection coefficient
- χ : local emission angle

shadowing terms:

- Λ : *angular* shadowing effect
- $\gamma_X < \mu$: *propagation* shadowing effect

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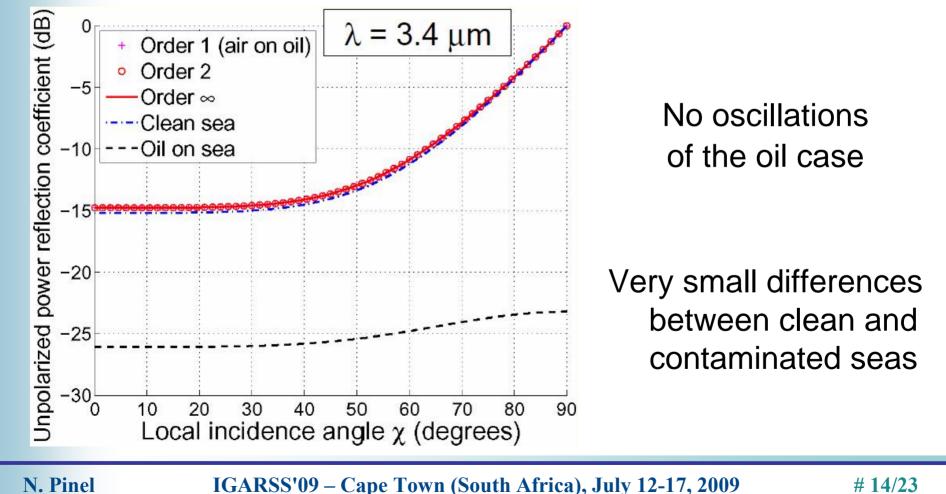




• Local emissivity ε of perfectly flat surfaces:

 $\varepsilon(\theta = \chi) = 1 - \Re(\chi)$

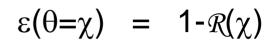
 \Rightarrow Computation of the unpolarized power reflection coef. $\Re(\chi)$:



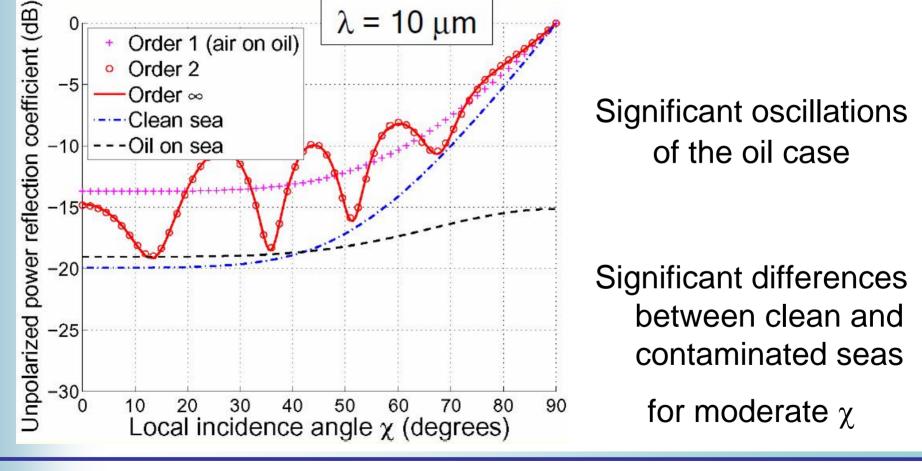




Local emissivity ε of perfectly flat surfaces:

- Simulation parameters:
- $\begin{array}{ll} \text{ Thermal IR wavelengths } \lambda: \\ \lambda = 3.4 \ \mu\text{m} \ \Rightarrow \ \begin{cases} \epsilon_r^{sea} = 75 + 250 j \\ \epsilon_r^{oil} = 2.25 + 0.01 j \end{cases} \quad \lambda = 10 \ \mu\text{m} \ \Rightarrow \ \begin{cases} \epsilon_r^{sea} = 70 + 41 j \\ \epsilon_r^{oil} = 2.25 + 0.01 j \end{cases}$
 - Wind speed (at 10 meters above the sea surface) u_{10} : $u_{10} = 7 \text{ m/s}$ (Beaufort scale 4) - Wind direction ϕ : $\phi = 0^{\circ}$
 - Oil film thickness H: $H = 50 \ \mu m$ OR $H = \{0, 10, 50, 100\} \ \mu m$ - Hydrodynamic parameters of the oil slick:

 $\omega_D = 11 \text{ rad/s}, E_0 = 1 \text{ mN/m}$

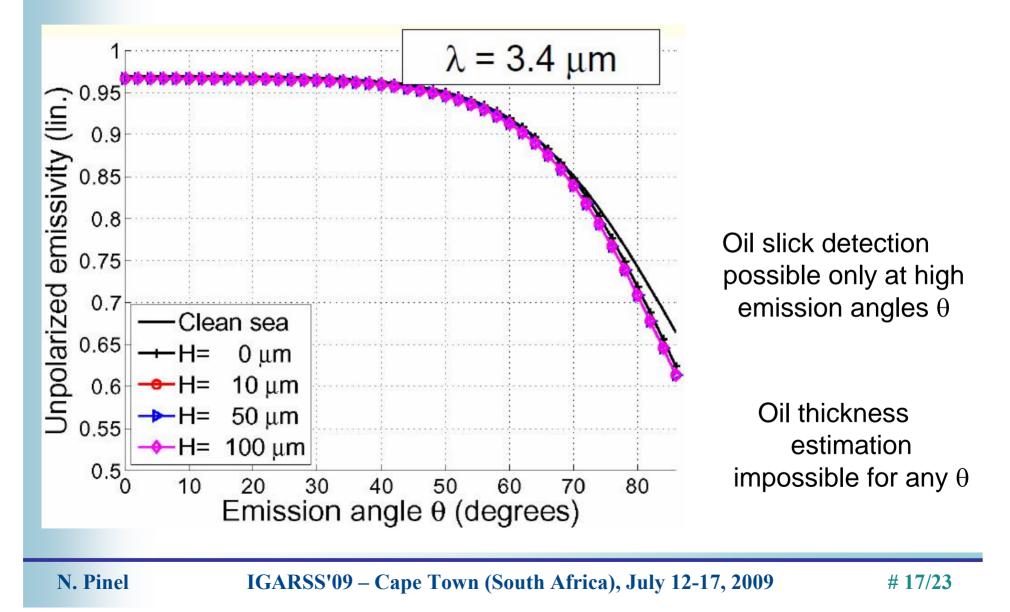
 \Rightarrow Unpolarized emissivity $\varepsilon(\theta,\phi)$ vs. emission angle θ (degrees)

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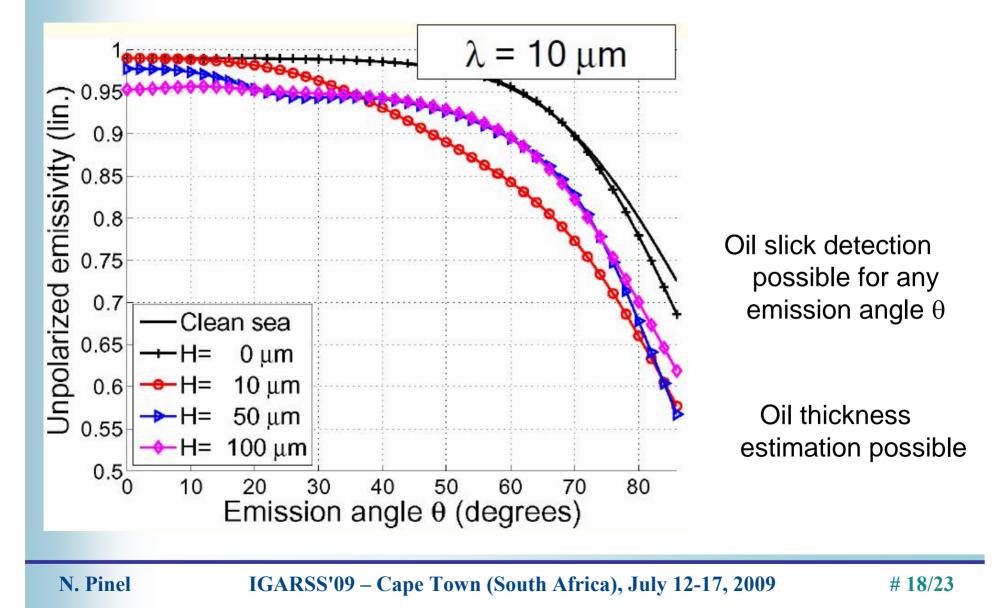
Influence of different oil film thicknesses H = {0, 10, 50, 100} μ m







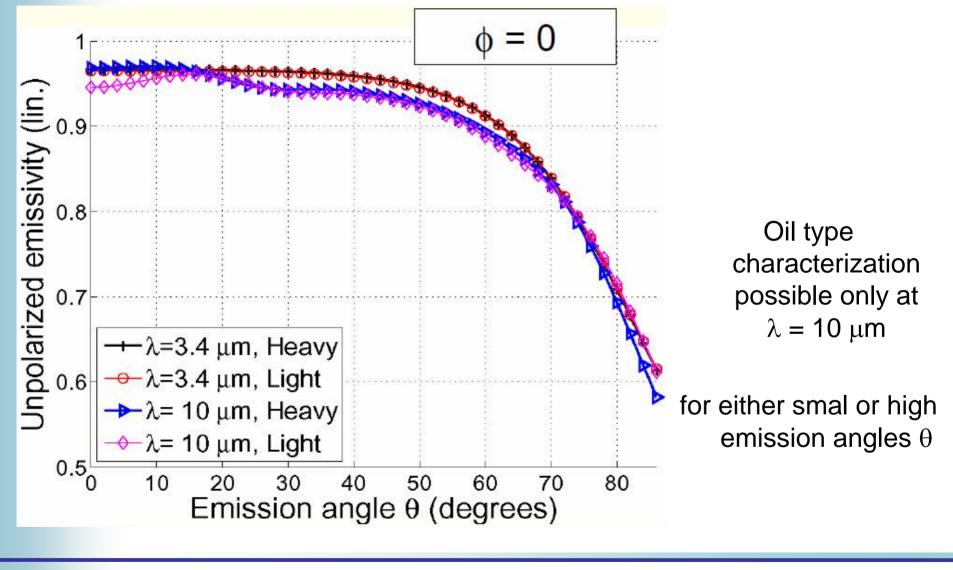
Influence of different oil film thicknesses H = {0, 10, 50, 100} μ m







Oil type characterization (heavy or light oil) for λ = {3.4, 10} μ m



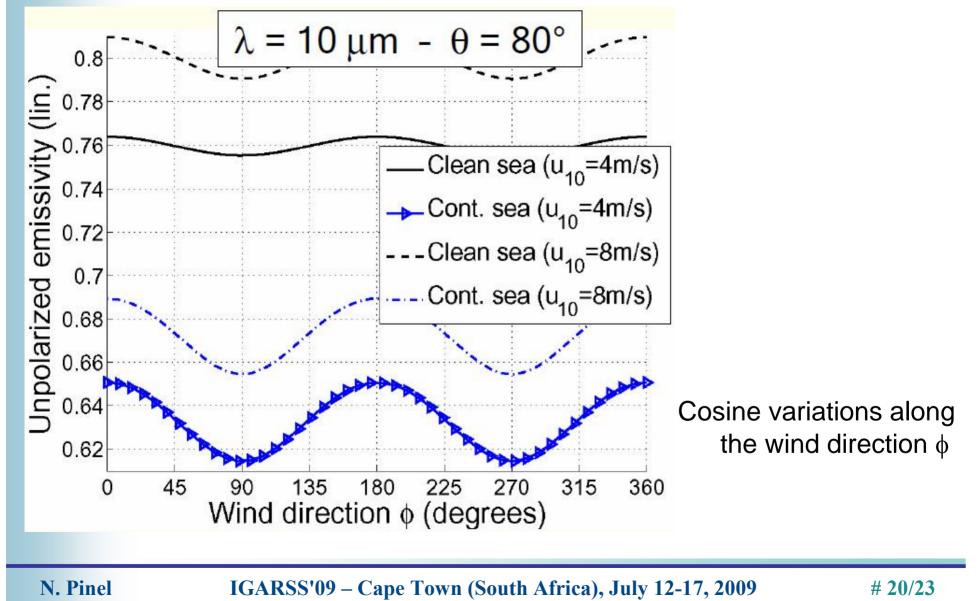
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Variations along the wind direction ϕ







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- Hydrodynamic modeling → Statistical description:
 - Use of a simple damping model (Lombardini *et al.*)
 - Surfaces of the contaminated sea assumed to be identical and parallel
- Electromagnetic modeling:
 - ✓ Simple intuitive approach (\rightarrow Fabry-Pérot interferometer)
 - \checkmark Thermal IR emissivity: Application of this approach \rightarrow GOA
 - \checkmark Oil slick detection, characterization, and thickness estimation much easier at λ = 10 μm

Future work:

- Numerical validation of the asymptotic method
- More sophisticated damping model
- Non Gaussian sea surface with higher orders of emissivity





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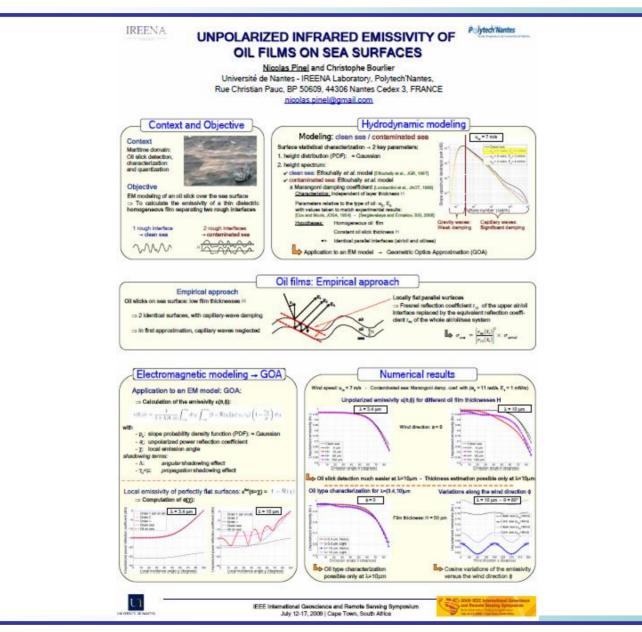
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
