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Spectro-interferom etric observations of interacting massive stars with VEGA/CHARA

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A bstract. We obtained spectro-interferom etric observations in the visible of Lyrae and Sgr using the instrument VEGA of the CHARA interferometric array. For Lyrae, the dispersed fringe visibilities and dierential phases were obtained in spectral regions containing the H and HeI 6678 lines and the H and HeI 4921 lines. Whereas the source is unresolved in the continuum, the source of the emission lines is resolved and the photocenter of the bulk of the H emission exhibits o sets correlated with the orbital phase. For Sgr, both the continuum and H sources are resolved, but no clear binary signal is detected. The dierential phase shift across the line reveals that the bulk of the H emission is clearly o set from the primary.

1 Presentation of the CHARA array and the VEGA instrument

High angular resolution observations by optical long baseline interferom etry, com bined with classical techniques like photom etry and spectroscopy provide deep insight on the morphology of the massive interacting binaries and new constraints for their modeling. Here we present the rst spectro-interferom etric observations of the interacting massive binaries Lyr and Sgr carried out with the instrument VEGA on the CHARA interferometric array. The CHARA 1 interferom etric array was constructed by the C enter for H igh Angular R esolution (Georgia State University, Atlanta) (Brummelaar et al. 2005). Located at the Mount Wilson observatory (California), it is formed by six 1m telescopes placed by pairs on an Y shaped baseline. Base lengths of 34 m to 330 m allow to reach an angular resolution =B up to 1:0 m as at near infrared wavelengths or 03 m as in the visible. The V isible spEctroGraph and polArim eter (VEGA) of the Côte d'Azur Observatory is a beam combiner operating in the visible range $[0.45 \quad 0.85 \text{ m}]$ and o ers three spectral resolutions (R = 30000;5000;1700). It is designed to record simultaneously the spectrally dispersed interference fringes with two photon counting detectors looking at two di erent spectral bands. A polarim etric device can be inserted to record the polarized fringes. VEGA currently recom bines 2 beam s but 3 and 4 beam s recom bination is foreseen. The data reduction process allows to measure the squared visibility modulus V^2 or the complex dierential visibility $V e^{i'}$ as a function of the wavelength. Spectrointerferom etric observations with the VEGA instrument are dedicated to stellar physic program s for the determ ination of fundam ental stellar param eters or the

study of stellar activity and circum stellar environm ent. A detailed description of the VEGA instrum ent is given by Mourard et al. (2008).

2 Lyrae

Lyr (HD 174638) is a 12.9 d spectroscopic and eclipsing binary with evidence of circum stellar matter within and around the system. First interferom etric observations have been carried out in 1994 with the GI2T interferom eter during the multi-technique campaign devoted to the study of this system (Hammanec et al. 1996). The combined analysis of the spectro-interferom etric, spectroscopic and photom etric observations lead to the conclusion that the source of the Hand HeI emission lines can be associated with materials outside the orbital plane (jet like structure) of the binary. In 2005, the rst reconstructed images of the Hamission at low spectral resolution were obtained by dierential phase referencing with the NPOI interferom eter (Schmidtt et al. 2009). The rst resolved images of the core of the system, the eclipsing binary, were obtained in 2007 from near infrared observations (Hand) with the MIRC beam combiner, thanks to the use of the longest baselines of the CHARA array. The elements of the relative orbit of Lyr have been derived from these interferom etric observations (Zhao et al. 2008).

The observations of Lyr was dedicated to study of the morphology and the kinematic of the H region. They were carried out during four nights in 2008 (orbital phases 0.5, 0.8, 0.9 & 0.2) with the medium spectral resolution. For the observing dates the expected behavior of Lyr can be predicted using the ephemeris from A k et al. (2007) and the elements of the relative orbit (Zhao et al. 2008). The observations of Lyr were bracketed by these of the calibrator Lyr. W ith the 34 m S1S2 baseline, the angular resolution was 4.0 or 3.0 m as around H and H , respectively. The direction of the baseline projected onto the sky were nearly perpendicular to the orbital plane. The data analysis have been done using the measurements of squared visibility modulus in continuum spectral bands and dierential visibility measurements around the spectral lines H and HeI6678 (R = 1650) or H and HeI4921 (R = 1225).

In the spectral continuum, the binary Lyr is unresolved as expected from the short baseline used and the orientation of the orbit. In the H line, at any orbital phase, the dip of the visibility modulus shows that the source is signi-cantly resolved. The differential phase exhibits a signal in the line indicating a shift of the source photocenter correlated with the orbital phase. In HeI6678 line, the source is marginally resolved at any orbital phases but no clear photocenter shift is detected. For the H line, the source is resolved at some orbital phases and there is some suspicions of a photocenter shift. For the HeI4921 line, there is no signal above the noise.

Work is in progress to determ ine the true extension of the H emitting source and its location in the system. These results will be compared with those of the observations of Lyrwith NPOI (Schmitt et al. 2009), taking into account their low spectral resolution (R 40).

3 Sagittarii

Sgr (H D 181615) is the brightest of the extrem ely hydrogen-de cient binaries stars (H dB stars), known as a 137.9 d spectroscopic binary. A new orbital solution and a better understanding of the the characteristics of this system were obtained from spectroscopic monitoring (K oubsky et al. 2006). The presence of circum stellar matter in the Sgr system is evidenced by the complex H absorption/em ission pro les and by a strong infrared excess. The rst mid-IR interferom etric observations of Sgr were carried out using the M ID I/V LT I instrument (N etolicky et al. 2009). The dusty circum binary disk is resolved in the N band with a typical size of 20 x 14 m as, an inclination i '50 and a position angle PA' 80. U sing these values to constraint the orbital parameters clearly con rm that Sgr is a massive binary with a total mass > 15 M.

The observations of Sgr were carried out during three nights in 2008 (orbital phase 0.06-0.09) with the medium spectral resolution in spectral band centered on 660 nm . The appearance of Sgr (relative position of the components, location of the H emission) at the observing dates can be predicted with some accuracy using the orbital elements (K oubsky et al. 2006 and N etolicky et al. 2009). With a luminosity ratio > 100 the companion is expected to be almost unseen (Dudley & Je ery 1990). A 23 m S1S2 baseline (=B ' 5.9 mas) close to the N-S direction was mainly used and some data were also recorded with the E-W 100 m W 1W 2 baseline (=B ' 1.4 mas). The observations of Sgr were bracketed by these of the calibrators Sgr and C ap. For the S1S2 baseline, the data analysis can been done using the dierential spectral interferom etric analysis (binned R = 660) around the H line. Modulus visibility measurements were also done in the continuum (= 13 nm at = 641;656 & 666 nm) for the two baselines.

In the spectrum of Sgr, the H line exhibits a P C ygni'pro leas expected at this orbital phase from K oubsky et al. (2006). For the two baselines, the source appears almost resolved in the continuum. For the S1S2 baseline, a dip of the visibility associated with a shift of the di erential phase of '25 in the H line shows that the emitting source is well resolved and displaced from the continuum source. Preliminary conclusions can be drawn from these rst results. A bout 10-20% of the total ux may come from an over-resolved source and 90-80% from a compact source. The extended source could be related to the diuse light from the inner rim of the dusty circum binary disk. The compact source is probably dominated by the ux of the bright component. The source associated with the H emission is resolved and its photocenter seems to be located between the two components as expected by K oubsky et al. (2006). No sign of binarity is evidenced probably because of the dierence of ux between components.

W orks are in progress to estimate the true H extension and to convert the phase shift into photocenter position of the H bulk emission.

4 Conclusion

These rstVEGA/CHARA observations of Lyr and Sgr show the potential of this instrument and the spectro-interferometry technique for the study of hot

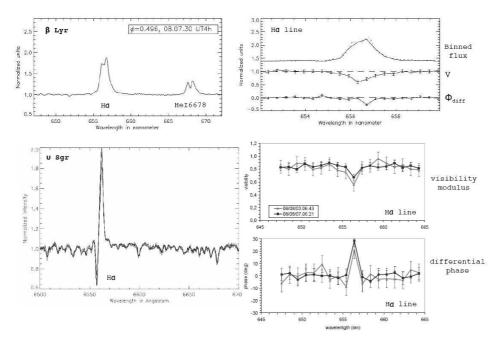


Figure 1. Example of interferom etric observations around H line. Top: Lyr. Bottom: Sgr Left: spectrum recorded by VEGA.Right: result of the di erential visibility analysis. Note that the line intensity can be biased due to a local saturation e ect of the photon counting camera.

com pact sources in general, and massive interacting binaries. To go further in the study of these complex systems, the next step will be to carry out observations at longer baselines to resolve the binary system and also multi-baselines observations to more stongly constrain the morphology of these sources.
