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# Eigenvalues of Laplacian with constant magnetic field on noncompact hyperbolic surfaces with finite area 

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#### Abstract

We consider a magnetic Laplacian $-\Delta_{A}=(i d+A)^{\star}(i d+A)$ on a noncompact hyperbolic surface M with finite area. $A$ is a real one-form and the magnetic field $d A$ is constant in each cusp. When the harmonic component of $A$ satifies some quantified condition, the spectrum of $-\Delta_{A}$ is discrete. In this case we prove that the counting function of the eigenvalues of $-\Delta_{A}$ satisfies the classical Weyl formula, even when $d A=0$. 円


## 1 Introduction

We consider a smooth, connected, complete and oriented Riemannian surface ( $\mathbf{M}, g$ ) and a smooth, real one-form $A$ on $\mathbf{M}$. We define the magnetic Laplacian, the Bochner Laplacian

-\Delta_{A}=(i d+A)^{\star}(i d+A)  \tag{1.1}\\
\left((i d+A) u=i d u+u A, \forall u \in C_{0}^{\infty}(\mathbf{M} ; \mathbb{C}) .\right.
\end{gather*}
$$

The magnetic field is the exact two-form $\rho_{B}=d A$. If $d m$ is the Riemannian measure on $\mathbf{M}$, then

\rho_{B}=\widetilde{\mathbf{b}} d m, \quad \text { with } \quad \widetilde{\mathbf{b}} \in C^{\infty}(\mathbf{M} ; \mathbb{R}) \tag{1.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

[^0]The magnetic intensity is $\mathbf{b}=|\widetilde{\mathbf{b}}|$.
It is well known, (see [Shu]), that $-\Delta_{A}$ has a unique self-adjoint extension on $L^{2}(\mathbf{M})$, containing in its domain $C_{0}^{\infty}(\mathbf{M} ; \mathbb{C})$, the space of smooth and compactly supported functions. The spectrum of $-\Delta_{A}$ is gauge invariant : for any $f \in C^{1}(\mathbf{M} ; \mathbb{R}),-\Delta_{A}$ and $-\Delta_{A+d f}$ are unitarily equivalent, hence they have the same spectrum.

We are interested in constant magnetic fields on $\mathbf{M}$ in the case when $(\mathrm{M}, g)$ is a non-compact geometrically finite hyperbolic surface of finite area; (see [Pen] or [Bor] for the definition and the related references). More precisely

\mathbf{M}=\bigcup_{j=0}^{J} M_{j} \tag{1.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

where the $M_{j}$ are open sets of $\mathbf{M}$, such that the closure of $M_{0}$ is compact, and (when $J \geq 1$ ) the other $M_{j}$ are cuspidal ends of $\mathbf{M}$.

This means that, for any $j, 1 \leq j \leq J$, there exist strictly positive constants $a_{j}$ and $L_{j}$ such that $M_{j}$ is isometric to $\left.\mathbb{S} \times\right] a_{j}^{2},+\infty[$, equipped with the metric

d s_{j}^{2}=y^{-2}\left(L_{j}^{2} d \theta^{2}+d y^{2}\right) \tag{1.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

$\left(\mathbb{S}=\mathbb{S}^{1}\right.$ is the unit circle and $M_{j} \cap M_{k}=\emptyset$ if $\left.j \neq k\right)$.
Let us choose some $z_{0} \in M_{0}$ and let us define

$$
\begin{equation*}
d: \mathbf{M} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}_{+} ; \quad d(z)=d_{g}\left(z, z_{0}\right) ; \tag{1.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

$d_{g}(.,$.$) denotes the distance with respect to the metric g$.
For any $b \in \mathbb{R}^{J}$, there exists a one-form $A$, such that the corresponding magnetic field $d A$ satisfies

$$
\begin{equation*}
d A=\widetilde{\mathbf{b}}(z) d m \quad \text { with } \quad \widetilde{\mathbf{b}}(z)=b_{j} \forall z \in M_{j} \tag{1.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

The following statement on the essential spectrum is proven in Mo-Tr1] :

Theorem 1.1 Assume (1.3) and (1.6). Then for any $j, 1 \leq j \leq J$ and for any $z \in M_{j}$ there exists a unique closed curve through $z, \mathcal{C}_{j, z}$ in $\left(M_{j}, g\right)$, not contractible and with zero $g$-curvature. ( $\mathcal{C}_{j, z}$ is called an horocycle of $\left.M_{j}\right)$. The following limit exists and is finite:

[A]_{M_{j}}=\lim _{d(z) \rightarrow+\infty} \int_{\mathcal{C}_{j, z}} A \tag{1.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

If $J^{A}=\left\{j \in \mathbb{N}, 1 \leq j \leq J\right.$ s.t. $\left.[A]_{M_{j}} \in 2 \pi \mathbb{Z}\right\} \neq \emptyset$, then

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathrm{sp}_{e s s}\left(-\Delta_{A}\right)=\left[\frac{1}{4}+\min _{j \in J^{A}} b_{j}^{2},+\infty[\right. \tag{1.8}
\end{equation*}
$$

If $J^{A}=\emptyset$, then $\mathrm{sp}_{\text {ess }}\left(-\Delta_{A}\right)=\emptyset:$
$-\Delta_{A}$ has purely discrete spectrum, (its resolvent is compact).
When the magnetic Laplacian $-\Delta_{A}$ has purely discrete spectrum, it is called a magnetic bottle, (see [Col2]).

If $A=d f+A^{H}+A^{\delta}$ is the Hodge decomposition of $A$ with $A^{H}$ harmonic, $\left(d A^{H}=0\right.$ and $\left.d^{\star} A^{H}=0\right)$, then $\forall j,[A]_{M_{j}}=\left[A^{H}\right]_{M_{j}}$, so the discreteness of the spectrum of $-\Delta_{A}$ depends only on the harmonic component of $A$. So one can see the case $J^{A}=\emptyset$ as an Aharonov-Bohm phenomenon Ah-B0, a situation where the magnetic field $d A$ is not sufficicient to describe $-\Delta_{A}$ and the use of the magnetic potential $A$ is essential : we can have magnetic bottle with null intensity.

## 2 The Weyl formula in the case of finite area with a non-integer class one-form

Here we are interested in the pure point part of the spectrum. We assume that $J^{A}=\emptyset$, then the spectrum of $-\Delta_{A}$ is discrete. In this case, we denote by $\left(\lambda_{j}\right)_{j}$ the increasing sequence of eigenvalues of $-\Delta_{A}$, (each eigenvalue is repeated according to its multiplicity). Let

$$
\begin{equation*}
N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}\right)=\sum_{\lambda_{j}<\lambda} 1 \tag{2.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

We will show that the asymptotic behavior of $N(\lambda)$ is given by the Weyl formula :

Theorem 2.1 Consider a geometrically finite hyperbolic surface ( $\mathbf{M}, g$ ) of finite area, and assume (1.6) with $J^{A}=\emptyset$, (see (1.7 for the definition).

Then

$$
\begin{equation*}
N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}\right)=\lambda \frac{|\mathbf{M}|}{4 \pi}+\mathbf{O}(\sqrt{\lambda} \ln \lambda) \tag{2.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

Remark 2.2 As $J^{A}$ depends only on the harmonic component of $A, J^{A}$ is not empty when $\mathbf{M}$ is simply connected. In Go-MD there are some results close to Theorem 2.1, but for simply connected manifolds.

The cases where the magnetic field prevails were studied in [Mo-Tr1] and in Mo-Tra].

Proof of Theorem 2.1. Any constant depending only on the $b_{j}$ and on $\min _{1 \leq j \leq J} \inf _{k \in \mathbb{Z}}\left|[A]_{M_{j}}-2 k \pi\right|$ will be denoted invariably $C$.

Consider a cusp $\left.M=M_{j}=\mathbb{S} \times\right] \alpha^{2},+\infty[$ equipped with the metric $d s^{2}=L^{2} e^{-2 t} d \theta^{2}+d t^{2}$ for some $\alpha>0$ and $L>0$.
Let us denote by $-\Delta_{A}^{M}$ the Dirichlet operator on $M$, associated to $-\Delta_{A}$. The first step will be to prove that

$$
\begin{equation*}
N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}^{M}\right)=\lambda \frac{|M|}{4 \pi}+\mathbf{O}(\sqrt{\lambda} \ln \lambda) \tag{2.3}
\end{equation*}
$$

Since $-\Delta_{A}^{M}$ and $-\Delta_{A+d \varphi+k d \theta}^{M}$ are gauge equivalent for any $\varphi \in C^{\infty}(\overline{\mathbf{M}} ; \mathbb{R})$ and any $k \in \mathbb{Z}$, we can assume that
$-\Delta_{A}^{M}=L^{-2} e^{2 t}\left(D_{\theta}-A_{1}\right)^{2}+D_{t}^{2}+\frac{1}{4}, \quad$ with $\left.\quad A_{1}=-\xi \pm b L e^{-t}, \xi \in\right] 0,1[$,
$\left(b=b_{j}, 2 \pi \xi-[A]_{M} \in 2 \pi \mathbb{Z}\right)$. Then we get that

$$
\operatorname{sp}\left(-\Delta_{A}^{M}\right)=\bigcup_{\ell \in \mathbb{Z}} \operatorname{sp}\left(P_{\ell}\right) ; P_{\ell}=D_{t}^{2}+\frac{1}{4}+\left(e^{t} \frac{(\ell+\xi)}{L} \pm b\right)^{2}
$$

for the Dirichlet condition on $\left.L^{2}(I ; d t) ; I=\right] \alpha^{2},+\infty[$. This implies that

$$
\begin{equation*}
N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}^{M}\right)=\sum_{\ell \in \mathbb{Z}} N\left(\lambda, P_{\ell}\right)=\sum_{\ell \in X_{\lambda}} N\left(\lambda, P_{\ell}\right) \tag{2.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

with $X_{\lambda}=\left\{\ell / e^{\alpha^{2}} \frac{|\ell+\xi|}{L}<\sqrt{\lambda-1 / 4}-b\right\}$.
Denoting by $Q_{\ell}$ the Dirichlet operator on $I$ associated to

$$
Q_{\ell}=D_{t}^{2}+\frac{1}{4}+\frac{(\ell+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2}} e^{2 t}
$$

we easily get that

$$
\begin{equation*}
Q_{\ell}-C \sqrt{Q_{\ell}} \leq P_{\ell} \leq Q_{\ell}+C \sqrt{Q_{\ell}} . \tag{2.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

Therefore one can find a constant $C(b)$, depending only on $b$, such that, for any $\lambda \gg 1+C(b)$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
N\left(\lambda-\sqrt{\lambda} C(b), Q_{\ell}\right) \leq N\left(\lambda, P_{\ell}\right) \leq N\left(\lambda+\sqrt{\lambda} C(b), Q_{\ell}\right) \tag{2.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

Following Titchmarsh's method ( Tit], Theorem 7.4) we establish the following bounds

Lemma 2.3 There exists $C>1$ so that for any $\mu \gg 1$ and any $\ell \in X_{\mu}$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
w_{\ell}(\mu)-\pi \leq \pi N\left(\mu-\frac{1}{4}, Q_{\ell}\right) \leq w_{\ell}(\mu)+\frac{1}{12} \ln \mu+C \tag{2.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

with

$$
\begin{align*}
& w_{\ell}(\mu)=\int_{\alpha^{2}}^{+\infty}\left[\mu-\frac{(\ell+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2}} e^{2 t}\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d t  \tag{2.8}\\
& =\int_{\alpha^{2}}^{T_{\mu, L}}\left[\mu-\frac{(\ell+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2}} e^{2 t}\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d t \\
& \left(e^{T_{\mu, L}}=L \sqrt{\mu} /\left(\inf _{k \in \mathbb{Z}}|\xi-k|\right)\right) .
\end{align*}
$$

## Proof of Lemma 2.3

The lower bound is easily obtained (see [Tit], Formula 7.1 .2 p 143) so we focus on the upper bound.

Let us define $V_{\ell}=\frac{(\ell+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2}} e^{2 t}$ and denote by $\phi_{\mu}^{\ell}$ a solution of $Q_{\ell} \phi=\left(\mu-\frac{1}{4}\right) \phi$. Consider $x_{\ell}$ and $y_{\ell}$ so that $V_{\ell}\left(x_{\ell}\right)=\mu$ and $V_{\ell}\left(y_{\ell}\right)=\nu$, for a given $0<\nu<\mu$ to be determined later. We denote by $m$ the number of zeros of $\phi_{\mu}^{\ell}$ on $] \alpha^{2}, y_{\ell}[$. Recall that the number $n$ of zeros of $\phi_{\mu}^{\ell}$ on $] \alpha^{2}, x_{\ell}\left[\right.$ is equal to $N\left(\mu-\frac{1}{4}, Q_{\ell}\right)$. Applying Lemma 7.3 p 146 in [Tit] we deduce that

$$
m \pi=\int_{\alpha^{2}}^{y_{\ell}}\left[\mu-V_{\ell}\right]^{1 / 2} d t+R_{\ell}
$$

with $R_{\ell}=\frac{1}{4} \ln \left(\mu-V_{\ell}\left(\alpha^{2}\right)\right)-\frac{1}{4} \ln \left(\mu-V_{\ell}\left(y_{\ell}\right)\right)+\pi$, hence

$$
\left|n \pi-\int_{\alpha^{2}}^{x_{\ell}}\left[\mu-V_{\ell}\right]^{1 / 2} d t\right| \leq\left(x_{\ell}-y_{\ell}\right)(\mu-\nu)^{1 / 2}+R_{\ell}+(n-m) \pi
$$

According to the Sturm comparison theorem ( Tit], p 107-108), we have

$$
(n-m) \pi \leq\left(x_{\ell}-y_{\ell}\right)(\mu-\nu)^{1 / 2}
$$

and

$$
\left|n \pi-\int_{\alpha^{2}}^{x_{\ell}}\left[\mu-V_{\ell}\right]^{1 / 2} d t\right| \leq \ln \left(\frac{\mu}{\nu}\right)(\mu-\nu)^{1 / 2}+\frac{1}{4} \ln \mu-\frac{1}{4} \ln (\mu-\nu)+2 \pi
$$

Now taking $\nu=\mu-\mu^{2 / 3}$ we get the desired estimate.
In view of (2.4) we now compute $\sum_{\ell \in \mathbb{Z}} w_{\ell}(\mu)$. We first get the following
Lemma 2.4 There exists $C>1$ such that, for any $\mu \gg 1$ and any $t \in\left[\alpha^{2}, T_{\mu, L}\right]$,

$$
\left|\int_{\mathbb{R}}\left[\mu-\frac{(x+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2}} e^{2 t}\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d x-\sum_{\ell \in \mathbb{Z}}\left[\mu-\frac{(\ell+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2}} e^{2 t}\right]_{+}^{1 / 2}\right| \leq C\left(\sqrt{\mu}+\frac{e^{t}}{L}\right)
$$

This leads to
Lemma 2.5 There exists $C>1$ such that, for any $\mu \gg 1$,

$$
\left|\int_{\alpha^{2}}^{T_{\mu, L}} \int_{\mathbb{R}}\left[\mu-\frac{(x+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2}} e^{2 t}\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d x d t-\sum_{\ell \in \mathbb{Z}} w_{\ell}(\mu)\right| \leq C \sqrt{\mu} \ln \mu .
$$

We now compute the integral in the left-hand side.
Making the change of variables $y^{2}=\frac{(x+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2} \mu} e^{2 t}$ we obtain that it is equal to $\mu L \int_{\alpha^{2}}^{T_{\mu, L}} e^{-t} d t \int_{\mathbb{R}}\left[1-x^{2}\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d x$, so we get

Lemma 2.6 There exists $C>1$ such that, for any $\mu \gg 1$,

$$
\left|\int_{\alpha^{2}}^{T_{\mu, L}} \int_{\mathbb{R}}\left[\mu-\frac{(x+\xi)^{2}}{L^{2}} e^{2 t}\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d x d t-\mu L e^{-\alpha^{2}} \int_{\mathbb{R}}\left[1-x^{2}\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d x\right| \leq C \sqrt{\mu} .
$$

Noticing that $|M|=2 \pi L e^{-\alpha^{2}}$ and using Lemmas 2.5 and 2.6 we have

## Lemma 2.7

$$
\frac{1}{\pi} \sum_{\ell} \in w_{\ell}(\mu)=\frac{|M|}{4 \pi} \mu+\mathbf{O}(\sqrt{\mu} \ln \mu), \quad \text { as } \quad \mu \rightarrow+\infty .
$$

In view of (2.4), (2.6) and (2.7) Lemma 2.7 ends the proof of formula (2.3). Now it remains to consider the whole surface M.
We have: $\mathbf{M}=\left(\bigcup_{j=0}^{J} M_{j}\right)$
where the $M_{j}$ are open sets of $\mathbf{M}$, such that the closure of $M_{0}$ is compact, and the other $M_{j}$ are cuspidal ends of $\mathbf{M}$ and $M_{j} \cap M_{k}=\emptyset$, if $j \neq k$. We denote $M_{0}^{0}=\mathbf{M} \backslash\left(\bigcup_{j=1}^{J} \overline{M_{j}}\right)$, then

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathbf{M}=\overline{M_{0}^{0}} \bigcup\left(\bigcup_{j=1}^{J} \overline{M_{j}}\right) \tag{2.9}
\end{equation*}
$$

Let us denote respectively by $-\Delta_{A, D}^{\Omega}$ and by $-\Delta_{A, N}^{\Omega}$ the Dirichlet operator and the Neumann-like operator on an open set $\Omega$ of $\mathbf{M}$ associated to $-\Delta_{A}$. The minimax principle and (2.9) imply that

$$
\begin{gather*}
N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A, D}^{M_{0}^{0}}\right)+\sum_{1 \leq j \leq J} N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A, D}^{M_{j}}\right) \leq N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}\right)  \tag{2.10}\\
\quad \leq N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A, N}^{M_{0}^{0}}\right)+\sum_{1 \leq j \leq J} N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A, N}^{M_{j}}\right)
\end{gather*}
$$

The Weyl formula with remainder, (see Hor for Dirichlet boundary condition and Sa-Va] p. 9 for Neumann-like boundary condition), gives that

$$
\left\{\begin{array}{l}
N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A, D}^{M_{0}^{0}}\right)=(4 \pi)^{-1}\left|M_{0}^{0}\right| \lambda+\mathbf{O}(\sqrt{\lambda})  \tag{2.11}\\
N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A, N}^{M_{0}^{0}}\right)=(4 \pi)^{-1}\left|M_{0}^{0}\right| \lambda+\mathbf{O}(\sqrt{\lambda})
\end{array}\right\} .
$$

The asymptotic formula for $N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A, N}^{M_{j}}\right)$,

$$
\begin{equation*}
N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A, N}^{M_{j}}\right)=\lambda \frac{\left|M_{j}\right|}{4 \pi}+\mathbf{O}(\sqrt{\lambda} \ln \lambda) \tag{2.12}
\end{equation*}
$$

is obtained as for the Dirichlet case (2.3) (with $M=M_{j}$ ), by noticing that $N\left(\lambda, P_{\ell, D}\right) \leq N\left(\lambda, P_{\ell, N}\right) \leq N\left(\lambda, P_{\ell, D}\right)+1$, where $P_{\ell, D}$ and $P_{\ell, N}$ are Dirichlet and Neumann operators on a half-line $I=] \alpha^{2},+\infty[$, associated to the same differential Schödinger operator $P_{\ell}=D_{t}^{2}+\frac{1}{4}+\left(e^{t} \frac{(\ell+\xi)}{L} \pm b\right)^{2}$.

We get (2.2) from (2.3) with $M=M_{j}$, (2.12), (for any $\left.j=1, \ldots, J\right)$, (2.10) and (2.11).

Remark 2.8 Theorem 2.1 still holds if the metric of $\mathbf{M}$ is modified in a compact set.

When $A=0,-\Delta=-\Delta_{0}$ has embedded eigenvalues in its essential spectrum, $\left(s p_{\text {ess }}(-\Delta)=\left[\frac{1}{4},+\infty[)\right.\right.$. If $N_{\text {ess }}(\lambda,-\Delta)$ denotes the number of these eigenvalues in $\left[\frac{1}{4}, \lambda[\right.$, then it is well known that one has an upper bound $N_{\text {ess }}(\lambda,-\Delta) \leq \lambda \frac{|\mathbf{M}|}{4 \pi}$; see Coll and He才] for the history and related improvement of the upper bound.
Recently Mul] established a sharp asymptotic formula, similar to our case,

$$
N_{e s s}(\lambda,-\Delta)=\lambda \frac{|\mathbf{M}|}{4 \pi}+\mathbf{O}(\sqrt{\lambda} \ln \lambda)
$$

for some particular $\mathbf{M}$.
