## SOME NEW SULFATO AND HYDROGENOSULFATO ADDUCTS: SYNTHESIS, INFRARED AND MÖSSBAUER STUDIES

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**Abstract:** Eight organotin (IV) (mainly sulfato) adducts have been synthesized and studied by spectroscopic methods. While considering the anionic component, the suggested structures are discrete; supramolecular architectures are obtained with secondary interactions through NH----Cl and NH----O hydrogen bonds while considering the cations, the anions behaving as monochelating, bridging or monocoordinating ligands, the environment around the tin (IV) centre being octahedral. Tetrahedral SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> has been characterized spectroscopically.

**Keywords:** organotin (IV) adducts, infrared, Mossbauer, ionic structures, hydrogen bonds, supramolecular architectures, tetrahedral SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub>.

#### **INTRODUCTION**

The various applications of organotin (IV) compounds in many fields: agriculture, medicine, antifouling paints, wood preservatives, ...[1 - 3], are mainly the reasons for many research groups to be involved in the synthesis of compounds of this family. Structures of some sulfato derivatives:  $(SnMe_3)_2SO_4\cdot 2H_2O$  and  $(SnPh_3)_2SO_4\cdot H_2O$ , and adducts:  $Bu_4NHSO_4\cdot SnMe_3Cl$ , have been reported by Molloy *et al.* [4] and us [5, 6]. Our group has yet reported many papers dealing with the coordinating behavior of oxoanions [7 - 9]. We have initiated here, the study of the interactions between:

- Bu<sub>4</sub>NHSO<sub>4</sub> and SnBu<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub>
- $Cy_2NH_2HSO_4$  and  $SnR_2Cl_2$  (R = Me, Bu),  $SnMe_3Cl$
- NH<sub>2</sub>SO<sub>3</sub>H, Et<sub>2</sub>NH and SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub>,
- isoBu<sub>2</sub>NH, H<sub>2</sub>SO<sub>4</sub> and SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub>

which have yielded eight new  $SnR_2$  and  $SnMe_3$  residues containing adducts. Infrared and Mössbauer studies of these adducts have been carried out and structures were suggested on the basis of spectroscopic data.

#### EXPERIMENTAL

When  $Bu_4NHSO_4$  in ethanol or  $Cy_2NH_2HSO_4$  in methanol is mixed with  $SnBu_2Cl_2$  in ethanol in 2 : 1 ratio (**A**), in ether in 1 : 1 ratio (**B**) or  $SnMe_2Cl_2$  in ether in 1 : 1 (**C**) or 1 : 2 (**D**), white powders are obtained after a slow solvent evaporation.

Mixing  $H_2NSO_3H$  in water,  $Et_2NH$  in water with  $SnMe_2Cl_2$  in ethanol in 1 : 1 : 2 ratio gives a white powder after a slow solvent evaporation (E).

On mixing  $(Cy_2NH_2)_2SO_4 \cdot 2H_2O$  (obtained on mixing in water  $H_2SO_4$  and  $Cy_2NH$  in 1 : 2 ratio and allowing water evaporation) in MeOH with  $SnBu_2Cl_2$  in MeOH in 1 : 2 ratio, a white powder is obtained after a slow solvent evaporation (**F**).

Mixing  $Cy_2NH_2HSO_4 \cdot 2H_2O$  (obtained on mixing in water  $H_2SO_4$  and  $Cy_2NH$  in 1 : 1 ratio and allowing water evaporation) in MeOH with SnMe<sub>3</sub>Cl in MeOH in 1 : 1 ratio, a white powder is obtained after a slow solvent evaporation (**G**).

The mixture of  $isoBu_2NH$  in water,  $H_2SO_4$  in water with  $SnMe_2Cl_2$  in ethanol in 1 : 1 : 1 ratio gives a white powder after a slow solvent evaporation (**H**).

The analytical data reported below allows suggesting the following formulae, presented in Table 1.

The suggested equations for (E) and (H) are:

In the first reaction, the hydrolysis of  $NH_2SO_3H$  in basic media has leaded to the sulphate.

 $isoBu_2NH_2SO_4SnMe_2Cl$ , the homologue of  $Et_2NH_2SO_4SnMe_2Cl\cdot 2H_2O$  in the second reaction has not been isolated but  $(isoBu_2)_2NH_2SnMe_2Cl_3$ .

The elemental analyses have been performed by the CNRS "Service Central d'Analyses" Vernaison-France or the Centre of Microanalyses, University of Bath, UK. The IR spectra were recorded at the University of Cheikh Anta Diop (Dakar, Sénégal) and at the University College of Saint-Boniface (Winnipeg, Canada) by means of a Bruker FT-IR spectrometer, at the University of Padova (Italy) using a PE 580 or a Bruker FTIR spectrometer, the sample being as Nujol mulls, the windows being CsI or polyethylene. Mössbauer spectra were obtained as described previously [9, 10]. Infrared data are given in cm<sup>-1</sup> [abbreviations: (vs) very strong, (s) strong, (m) medium, (w) weak, (sh) shoulder]. Mössbauer parameters are given in mm·s<sup>-1</sup> (abbreviations: Q.S = quadrupole splitting, I.S = isomer shift,  $\Gamma$  = full width at half-height, A = Area).

All the chemicals are from Aldrich Company and were used without any further purification.

#### **RESULTS AND DISCUSSION**

Let us consider the more relevant IR bands of the studied compounds:

(A): vas  $SnC_2 = 691m$ ; vs  $SnC_2 = 625 w$ ; v  $SO_4 = (1060 vs, 1150 sh, 1224 vs)$ ;  $\delta SO_4 = 589 s$ ; v SnCl = 254 m;

**(B):** vs SnC<sub>2</sub> = 557 w; v SO<sub>4</sub> = (979 m, 1080 s, 1111 vs);  $\delta$  SO<sub>4</sub> = (427 vs, 592 m, 619 m); v SnCl = 302 s; vs SnO = 212 w; v NH<sub>2</sub> = 3434 s;  $\delta$  NH<sub>2</sub> = 1646 s;

(C): vas  $SnC_2 = 549$  m; v SnCl = 253 m; vs SnO = 202 s; v  $SO_4 = (964$  w, 1095 s, 1184 vs);  $\delta SO_4 = (445 \text{ w}, 592 \text{ vs}); v \text{ NH}_2 = 3434$  s;  $\delta \text{ NH}_2 = 1646$  s;

(D): vs SnC<sub>2</sub> = 520 w; vas SnC<sub>2</sub> = 547 m; v SO<sub>4</sub> = (964 m, 1057 sh, 1095 s, 1140 sh);  $\delta$  SO<sub>4</sub> = (445 w, 592 m); v SnCl = 254 vs; vs SnO = 202 w; v NH<sub>2</sub> = 3434 s;  $\delta$  NH<sub>2</sub> = 1646 s;

(E): vs SnC<sub>2</sub> = 519 m; v SnCl = 353 m; vs SnO = 212 s; v SO<sub>4</sub> = (1050 vs, 1195 vs);  $\delta$  SO<sub>4</sub> = (427 vs, 584 vs); v NH<sub>2</sub> = 3434 s;  $\delta$  NH<sub>2</sub> = 1646 s;

(F): vas  $SnC_2 = 546$  s; vs  $SnC_2 = 520$  m; v SnCl = 254 vs; vs SnO = 202 w; v  $NH_2 = (3100 \text{ s}, 3530 \text{ s})$ ;  $\delta NH_2 = (1594 \text{ s}, 1610 \text{ s})$ ; (G): vas  $SnC_2 = 622$  s; vs  $SnC_2 = 595$  m; v  $SO_4 = (1040 \text{ s}, 1174 \text{ s})$ ; v  $NH_2 = 3430$  s;  $\delta NH_2 = 1566$  m; (H): vs  $SnC_2 = 557$  m; v  $SO_4 = (871 \text{ vs}, 1035 \text{ vs}, 1120 \text{ vs})$ ;  $\delta SO_4 = (452 \text{ m}, 480 \text{ m}, 580 \text{ m}, 616)$ ; v  $NH_2 = (2856 \text{ vs}, 2937 \text{ vs}, 3047 \text{ vs})$ ;  $\delta NH_2 = 1594$  s;

and their Mossbauer data:

(A): IS = 1.68, QS = 4.18,  $\Gamma = 1.00$ ; (B): IS = 1.52, QS = 3.72,  $\Gamma = 1.02$ ; (C): n/a (D): IS = 1.58, QS = 4.85,  $\Gamma = 1.01$ ; (E): IS<sub>1</sub> = 1.41, QS<sub>1</sub> = 2.83,  $\Gamma_1 = 0.97$ , A<sub>1</sub> = 50, IS<sub>2</sub> = 0.94, QS<sub>2</sub> = 2.24,  $\Gamma_2 = 0.87$ , A<sub>2</sub> = 50; (F): IS = 1.05, QS = 2.01,  $\Gamma = 0.98$ ; (G): QS = 3.67, IS<sub>1</sub> = 1.04,  $\Gamma = 0.98$ ; (H): IS = 0.80, QS = 3.19,  $\Gamma = 0.90$ .

#### Bu<sub>4</sub>NHSO<sub>4</sub>·SnBu<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> (A), Cy<sub>2</sub>NH<sub>2</sub>HSO<sub>4</sub>·SnBu<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> (B), Cy<sub>2</sub>NH<sub>2</sub>HSO<sub>4</sub>·SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> (C)

The values of the quadrupole splitting of (**A**) and (**B**) (4.18 and 3.72 mm·s<sup>-1</sup>) are consistent with trans coordinated  $\text{SnBu}_2$  residue according to Platt *et al.* [12, 13]. The absence of vsSnMe<sub>2</sub> on the IR spectrum of (**C**) is an indication of the presence of a *trans* coordinated SnR<sub>2</sub> residue according to Group Theory [14].

The Mössbauer and infrared data allow to suggest while considering the complex-anion  $[HSO_4 \cdot SnR_2Cl_2]^-$  (R = Me, Bu), the structure reported on Figure 1, the hydrogenosulfate behaving as a monochelating ligand. The monomers are linked by OH----O hydrogen bonds leading to a dimeric structure.

In the case of (B) and (C) when the cations, involved through hydrogen bonds (NH----O or NH----Cl) are considered, supramolecular architechture are obtained.

#### 3Cy<sub>2</sub>NH<sub>2</sub>HSO<sub>4</sub>·2SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> (D)

While considering the complex-anion  $[(H-OSO_3)_3(SnMe_2Cl_2)_2]^{3-}$ , the value of the quadrupole splitting (4.85 mm·s<sup>-1</sup>) indicates a SnMe<sub>2</sub> residue in a *trans* octahedral environment according to Platt *et al.* [12, 13] allowing to suggest the dimeric structure reported on Figure 2 (the very high value of the QS indicates planar SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> molecules belonging to D<sub>2</sub>h point group). When the cations are involved through NH----O or NH----Cl hydrogen bonds create supramolecular architectures.

#### Et<sub>2</sub>NH<sub>2</sub>SO<sub>4</sub>SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl·2H<sub>2</sub>O (E)

The Mössbauer data show the presence of two types of tin centre in (**E**) consistent with the presence of the complex-anion  $[SnMe_2(SO_4)_2]^{2-}$  (in *cis* conformation (QS = 2.24 mm·s<sup>-1</sup>) with monochelating sulfate anions, the tin centre being octahedral and tetrahedral lattice  $SnMe_2Cl_2$  molecules (QS = 2.83 mm·s<sup>-1</sup>) according to Platt *et al.* [12, 13] – in  $SnPh_2Cl_2$ , QS = 2.88 mm·s<sup>-1</sup>. The complex anions are hold together by cations through hydrogen bonds giving a supramolecular structure, a piece of which is reported in Figure 3 (a structure containing lattice  $SnMe_2Br_2$  molecules has yet been reported from an X ray study) [15]). The anion  $[SnMe_2(SO_4)_2]^{2-}$  is structurally similar to  $[SnMe_2(C_2O_4)_2]^{2-}$  yet reported [16, 17]. To the best of our knowledge a tetrahedral  $SnMe_2Cl_2$  has never been characterized by Mössbauer spectroscopy. The water molecules can be lattice ones or involved in the hydrogen bonds network of the supramolecular architecture.

#### (Cy<sub>2</sub>NH<sub>2</sub>)<sub>2</sub>SO<sub>4</sub>·SnBu<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub>·2H<sub>2</sub>O (F)

The value of the quadrupole splitting (QS = 2.01) is consistent with a SnBu<sub>2</sub> residue *cis* octahedrally coordinated according to Platt *et al.* [12, 13] allowing to suggest while considering the complex-anion  $[SO_4 \cdot SnBu_2Cl_2]^{2-}$  the discrete structure reported on Figure 4). When the cations, through NH---O or NH---Cl hydrogen bonds are involved, supramolecular architecture are obtained (we report arbitrary the dimeric structure involving the cations in Figure 5).

#### Cy<sub>2</sub>NH<sub>2</sub>HSO<sub>4</sub>·SnMe<sub>3</sub>Cl (G)

In recent papers we have reported the X ray structure of  $Bu_4NHSO_4 \cdot SnMe_3Cl$  [5, 6]. The value of the quadrupole splitting (QS = 3.67 mm·s<sup>-1</sup>) of this compound is consistent with a trans coordinated SnMe<sub>3</sub> residue [12, 13] allowing to suggest while considering the complex-anion [HO-SO<sub>3</sub>.SnMe<sub>3</sub>Cl]<sup>-</sup> a dimeric structure similar to the one reported for Bu<sub>4</sub>NHSO<sub>4</sub>·SnMe<sub>3</sub>Cl (Figure 6).

When the cation, through NH---O or NH---Cl hydrogen bonds is involved, supramolecular architectures are obtained.

#### (*iso*Bu<sub>2</sub>)<sub>2</sub>NH<sub>2</sub>SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>3</sub> (H)

The quadrupole splitting of (F)  $(3.19 \text{ mm} \cdot \text{s}^{-1})$  is consistent with a trigonal bipyramidal environment around the tin (IV) centre as yet reported in [18, 19] and allows to suggest a supramolecular architecture, when cations are involved through NH---Cl hydrogen bonds (infinite chains or oligomers). We have arbitrary reported the dimer and the infinite chain (Figures 7 and 8).



The wide absorption on the infrared spectra of all compounds containing a nonsymmetrical cation around 2900 cm<sup>-1</sup> is due to hydrogen bonds involving the cation or  $HSO_4^-$ .

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#### CONCLUSION

The structure of the studied adducts are discrete mainly or polymeric while considering the complex-anion. When the cations are involved, supramolecular structures are obtained. The anions are chelating, monocoordinating or bidentate ligands. Tetrahedral SnMe<sub>2</sub>Cl<sub>2</sub> has been characterized spectroscopically.

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
