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Motivic decompositions of projective homogeneous varieties and change of coefficients

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Abstract

We prove that under some assumptions on an algebraic group G, indecomposable direct summands of the motive of a projective G-homogeneous variety with coefficients in \mathbb{F}_p remain indecomposable if the ring of coefficients is any field of characteristic p. In particular for any projective G-homogeneous variety X, the decomposition of the motive of X in a direct sum of indecomposable motives with coefficients in any finite field of characteristic p corresponds to the decomposition of the motive of X with coefficients in \mathbb{F}_p . We also construct a counterexample to this result in the case where G is arbitrary.

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Résumé

Décompositions motiviques des variétés projectives homogènes et changement des coefficients. Nous prouvons que sous certaines hypothèses sur un groupe algébrique G, tout sommant direct indécomposable du motif associé à une variété projective G-homogène à coefficients dans \mathbb{F}_p demeure indécomposable si l'anneau des coefficients est un corps de caractéristique p. En particulier pour toute variété projective G-homogène X, la décomposition du motif de X comme somme directe de motifs indécomposables à coefficients dans tout corps fini de caractéristique p correspond à la décomposition du motif de X à coefficients dans \mathbb{F}_p . Nous exhibons de plus un contre-exemple à ce résultat dans le cas où le groupe G est quelconque.

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Introduction

Let F be a field, Λ be a commutative ring, $CM(F;\Lambda)$ be the category of *Grothendieck Chow motives* with coefficients in Λ , G a semi-simple affine algebraic group and X a projective G-homogeneous F-

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variety. The purpose of this note is to study the behaviour of the complete motivic decomposition (in a direct sum indecomposable motives) of $X \in CM(F; \Lambda)$ when changing the ring of coefficients. In the first part we prove some very elementary results in non-commutative algebra and find sufficient conditions for the tensor product of two connected rings to be connected. In the second part we show that under some assumptions on G, indecomposable direct summands of X in $CM(F; \mathbb{F}_p)$ remain indecomposable if the ring of coefficients is any field of characteristic p (Theorem 2.2), since these conditions hold for the reduced endomorphism ring of indecomposable direct summands of X. In particular theorem 2.2 implies that the complete decomposition of the motive of X with coefficients in any finite field of characteristic p corresponds to the complete decomposition of the motive of X with coefficients in \mathbb{F}_p . Finally we show that theorem 2.2 doesn't hold for arbitrary G by producing a counterexample.

Let Λ be a commutative ring. Given a field F, an F-variety will be understood as a separated scheme of finite type over F. Given such Λ and an F-variety X, we can consider $CH_i(X;\Lambda)$, the Chow group of i-dimensional cycles on X modulo rational equivalence with coefficients in Λ , defined as $CH_i(X) \otimes_{\mathbb{Z}} \Lambda$. These groups are the first step in the construction of the category $CM(F;\Lambda)$ of Grothendieck Ghow motives with coefficients in G. 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1. On the tensor product of connected rings

Throughtout this section F is a field. Recall that a ring A is connected if there are no idempotents in A besides 0 and 1.

Lemma 1.1 Let A be a finite ring. Then an appropriate power of any element a of A is idempotent. Proof. For any $a \in A$, the set $\{a^n, n \in \mathbb{N}\}$ is finite, hence there is a couple $(p,k) \in \mathbb{N}^2$ such that $a^p = a^{p+k}$. The sequence $(a^n)_{n \geq p}$ is k-periodic and for example $(a^{pk})^2 = a^{pk+pk} = a^{pk}$.

Definition 1.2 A ring A is local if the sum of any two non-invertible elements is not equal to 1. **Proposition 1.3** Any finite connected ring A is local.

Proof. Indeed by lemma 1.1 an appropriate power of any $a \in A$ is idempotent, hence any element of A is either nilpotent or invertible. The result holds since the sum of two nilpotent elements cannot be 1. **Definition** 1.4 A ring A is of type \mathcal{N} if the product of two nilpotents remains nilpotent.

A finite connected ring is clearly of type \mathcal{N} , since the product of two nilpotent elements is not invertible. **Lemma 1.5** Let A be a finite ring of type \mathcal{N} . Let \mathcal{N}_A be the set of nilpotents in A and $\nu = Card(\mathcal{N}_A)$. Then for any $(a_1, ..., a_{\nu+1}) \in \mathcal{N}_A^{\nu+1}$, $a_1...a_{\nu+1} = 0$. Proof. The finite sequence $\Pi_1 = a_1$, $\Pi_2 = a_1a_2$, \cdots , $\Pi_{\nu+1} = a_1a_2...a_{\nu+1}$ consists of nilpotents since

Proof. The finite sequence $\Pi_1 = a_1$, $\Pi_2 = a_1 a_2$, \cdots , $\Pi_{\nu+1} = a_1 a_2 ... a_{\nu+1}$ consists of nilpotents since A is of type \mathcal{N} . By the pigeon-hole principle $\Pi_k = \Pi_s$, for some k and s satisfying $1 \le k < s \le \nu + 1$ therefore $\Pi_s = \Pi_k a_{k+1} ... a_s = \Pi_k$. Consequently $\Pi_k (1 - a_{k+1} ... a_s) = 0$, which implies that $\Pi_k = 0$ since $1 - a_{k+1} ... a_s$ is invertible.

Corollary 1.6 Let A and E be two F-algebras, with A finite and connected. Then for any sequence of nilpotents $(a_1,...,a_n) \in A^n$ and for any $(b_1,...,b_n) \in E^n$, $\sum_{i=1}^n a_i \otimes b_i$ is nilpotent in $A \otimes_F E$. Proof. By lemma 1.5 $(\sum_{i=1}^n a_i \otimes b_i)^{\nu+1} = 0$, where ν is the number of nilpotents in A.

Theorem 1.7 Let A and \bar{E} be two connected F-algebras, with A finite. Suppose that A is endowed with a morphism of algebras $\phi: A \longrightarrow F$. Then $A \otimes_F E$ is connected.

Proof. Consider the morphism $\varphi:A\otimes E\stackrel{\phi\otimes id}{\longrightarrow} F\otimes E\stackrel{\simeq}{\longrightarrow} E$ and an idempotent P in $A\otimes_F E$. Since φ is a morphism of algebras and E is connected, $\varphi(P)=0$ or $\varphi(P)=1$. Let $\{1,(e_i)_{i\in I}\}$ be an F-basis of E containing 1 and $P=p\otimes 1+\sum_{k=1}^n p_{i_k}\otimes e_{i_k}$. If $\varphi(P)=\varphi(p).1+\sum_{k=1}^n \varphi(p_{i_k}).e_{i_k}=0$, then $\varphi(p)=0$ and for any $k\leq n$, $\varphi(p_{i_k})=0$. By lemma 1.1, an appropriate power of p and each p_{i_k} is an idempotent of A which belongs to the kernel of φ , hence p and each p_{i_k} are nilpotent since A is connected. By corollary 1.6, the idempotent P is nilpotent, hence P=0. Now if $\varphi(P)=\varphi(p).1+\sum_{k=1}^n \varphi(p_{i_k}).e_{i_k}=1$, then by lemma 1.1 an appropriate power of p is an idempotent q in A satisfying $\varphi(q)=1$, hence q=1 and p is invertible. At the same time each p_{i_k} is nilpotent since an appropriate power of each p_{i_k} is an idempotent in A lying in the kernel of φ . It follows that $P=(p\otimes 1)$ $(1\otimes 1+\sum_{k=1}^n p^{-1}p_{i_k}\otimes e_{i_k})$, hence P is invertible because $\sum_{k=1}^n p^{-1}p_{i_k}\otimes e_{i_k}$ is nilpotent (using corollary 1.6 again). In this case $P=P\cdot 1=P\cdot P\cdot P^{-1}=P\cdot P^{-1}=1$, consequently any idempotent in $A\otimes_F E$ is either 0 or 1 and $A\otimes_F E$ is connected.

2. Application to motivic decompositions of projective homogeneous varieties

For any semi-simple affine algebraic group G, the full subcategory of $CM(F;\Lambda)$ whose objects are finite direct sums of twists of direct summands of projective G-homogeneous F-varieties will be denoted $CM_G(F;\Lambda)$. We now use theorem 1.7 to study how motivic decompositions in $CM_G(F;\Lambda)$ behave when extending the ring of coefficients. We will say that a pseudo-abelian category $\mathcal C$ satisfies the Krull-Schmidt principle if any object of $\mathcal C$ decomposes in a unique way as a direct sum of indecomposable objects (up to permutation of these indecomposable summands).

In the sequel Λ will be a connected ring and X an F-variety. A field extension E/F is a splitting field of X if the E-motive X_E is isomorphic to a finite direct sum of twists of Tate motives. The F-variety X is geometrically split if X splits over an extension of F, and X satisfies the nilpotence principle, if for any field extension E/F the kernel of the morphism $res_{E/F}: End(M(X)) \longrightarrow End(M(X_E))$ consists of nilpotents.

Any projective variety (under the action of a semi-simple affine algebraic group) is geometrically split and satisfies the nilpotence principle (see [1]), therefore if Λ is finite the Krull-Schmidt principle holds for $CM_G(F;\Lambda)$ by [5, Corollary 3.6], and we can serenely deal with motivic decompositions in $CM_G(F;\Lambda)$. If X is geometrically split the image of any correspondence $\alpha \in CH_{\dim(X)}(X \times X;\Lambda)$ by the change of base field functor $res_{E/F}$ to a splitting field E/F of X will be denoted $\overline{\alpha}$. The reduced endomorphism ring of any direct summand (X,π) , defined as $res_{E/F}(End_{CM(F;\Lambda)}((X,\pi)))$ and denoted by $\overline{End}((X,\pi))$, will be one of the key-ingredients in the proof of theorem 2.2.

Let X be a smooth, complete and irreducible F-variety. The pull-back of the natural morphism $Spec(F(X)) \times X \longrightarrow X \times X$ gives rise to $mult: CH_{dim(X)}(X \times X; \Lambda) \longrightarrow CH_0(X_{F(X)}; \Lambda) \longrightarrow \Lambda$ (where the second map is the usual degree morphism). For any correspondence $\alpha \in CH_{\dim(X)}(X \times X; \Lambda)$, $mult(\alpha)$ is called the multiplicity of α and we say that a direct summand (X, π) given by a projector $\pi \in CH_{\dim(X)}(X \times X; \Lambda)$ is upper if $mult(\pi) = 1$. If X is a smooth complete and irreducible F-variety, the multiplicity $mult: End_{CM(F;\Lambda)}(X) \longrightarrow \Lambda$ is a morphism of rings by [4, Corollary 1.7]. We now state the needed restriction on the algebraic group G to prove theorem 2.2.

Definition 2.1 Let p be a prime. A semi-simple affine algebraic group G is p-inner if the degree of the minimal extension E/F such that G_E is of inner type is a power of p.

Using properties of the reduced endomorphism ring of indecomposable motives in $CM_G(F; \Lambda)$ (where G is a semi-simple affine p-inner algebraic group) and theorem 1.7, we can prove the following result.

Theorem 2.2 Let G be a semi-simple affine p-inner algebraic group and $M \in CM_G(F; \mathbb{F}_p)$. Then for any field L of characteristic p, M is indecomposable if and only if $\operatorname{coef} f_{L/\mathbb{F}_p}(M)$ is indecomposable.

Proof. Since the change of coefficients functor is additive and maps any non-zero projector to a non-zero projector, it is clear that if $coeff_{L/\mathbb{F}_p}(M)$ is indecomposable, M is also indecomposable.

Let M be an indecomposable direct summand of the motive of a projective G-homogeneous F-variety X in $CM(F; \mathbb{F}_p)$. By [6, Theorem 1.1], M is a twist of the upper summand of an irreducible projective G-homogeneous F-variety Y (say, $M = (Y, \pi)[k]$ where π is a projector in $CH_{dim(Y)}(Y \times Y; \mathbb{F}_p)$ and $k \in \mathbb{Z}$). Considering a splitting field E of X, the reduced endormophism ring $\overline{End}(M) := \overline{\pi} \circ \overline{End}(Y) \circ \overline{\pi}$ is connected since M is indecomposable and finite.

Theorem 1.7, with A = End(M), E = L, $F = \mathbb{F}_p$ and $\phi = mult$ implies that $End(M) \otimes L = \overline{End}(coeff_{L/\mathbb{F}_p}(M))$ is connected, therefore by the nilpotence principle $End(coeff_{L/\mathbb{F}_p}(M))$ is also connected, that is to say $coeff_{L/\mathbb{F}_p}(M)$ is indecomposable.

Corollary 2.3 Let G be a semi-simple affine p-inner algebraic group and X a projective G-homogeneous F-variety. The complete motivic decomposition of $X \in CM(F; \mathbb{F}_p)$ remain complete when the coefficients are extended to any finite field of characteristic p.

Remark: If Λ is a finite and connected ring, complete motivic decompositions in $CM(F;\Lambda)$ remain complete when the coefficients are extended to the residue field of Λ by [7, Corollary 2.6], hence the study of motivic decompositions in $CM_G(F;\Lambda)$, where Λ is any finite connected ring whose residue field is of characteristic p, is reduced to the study motivic decompositions in $CM_G(F;\mathbb{F}_p)$.

We now produce a counterexample to theorem 2.2 in the case where the algebraic group G doesn't satisfy the needed assumptions. Let L/F be a Galois extension of degree 3. By [1, Section 7], the endomorphism ring End(M(Spec(L))) of the motive associated with the F-variety Spec(L) with coefficients in \mathbb{F}_2 is the \mathbb{F}_2 -algebra of Gal(L/F), i.e. $\frac{\mathbb{F}_2[X]}{(X^3-1)} \simeq \mathbb{F}_2 \times \mathbb{F}_4$, hence $M(Spec(L)) = M \oplus N$, with $End(N) = \mathbb{F}_4$ and both M and N are indecomposable. Now $End(res_{\mathbb{F}_4/\mathbb{F}_2}(N)) = \mathbb{F}_4 \otimes \mathbb{F}_4$ is not connected since $1 \otimes \alpha + \alpha \otimes 1$ is a non-trivial idempotent for any $\alpha \in \mathbb{F}_4 \setminus \mathbb{F}_2$, hence $res_{\mathbb{F}_4/\mathbb{F}_2}(N)$ is decomposable.

Consider the $(PGL_2)_L$ -homogeneous L-variety \mathbb{P}^1_L . The Weil restriction $\mathcal{R}(\mathbb{P}^1_L)$ is a projective homogeneous F-variety under the action of the Weil restriction of $(PGL_2)_L$, and the minimal extension such that $\mathcal{R}((PGL_2)_L)$ is of inner type is L. By [3, Example 4.8], the motive with coefficients in \mathbb{F}_2 of $\mathcal{R}(\mathbb{P}^1_L)$ contains two twists of Spec(L) as direct summands, therefore at least two indecomposable direct summands of $\mathcal{R}(\mathbb{P}^1_L)$ split off over \mathbb{F}_4 .

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
