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# Berry-Esseen's central limit theorem for non-causal linear processes in Hilbert space 

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#### Abstract

Let $H$ be a real separable Hilbert space and $\left(a_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ a sequence of bounded linear operators from $H$ to $H$. We consider the linear process $X$ defined for any $k$ in $\mathbb{Z}$ by $X_{k}=\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}} a_{j}\left(\varepsilon_{k-j}\right)$ where $\left(\varepsilon_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ is a sequence of i.i.d. centered $H$-valued random variables. We investigate the rate of convergence in the CLT for $X$ and in particular we obtain the usual Berry-Esseen's bound provided that $\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}}|j|\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}<+\infty$ and $\varepsilon_{0}$ belongs to $L_{H}^{\infty}$.

## 1 Introduction and notations

Let $\left(H,\|.\|_{H}\right)$ be a separable real Hilbert space and $\left(\mathcal{L},\|\cdot\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}\right)$ be the class of bounded linear operators from $H$ to $H$ with its usual uniform norm. Consider a sequence $\left(\varepsilon_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ of i.i.d. centered random variables, defined on a probability space $(\Omega, \mathcal{A}, \mathbb{P})$, with values in $H$. If $\left(a_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ is a sequence in $\mathcal{L}$, we define the (non-causal) linear process $X=\left(X_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ in $H$ by

$$
\begin{equation*}
X_{k}=\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}} a_{j}\left(\varepsilon_{k-j}\right), \quad k \in \mathbb{Z} \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

If $\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}}\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}<\infty$ and $E\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{H}<+\infty$ then the series in (1) converges almost surely and in $L_{H}^{1}(\Omega, \mathcal{A}, \mathbb{P})$ (see Bosq [2]). The condition $\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}}\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}<\infty$ is know to be sharp
for the $\sqrt{n}$-normalized partial sums of $X$ to satisfies a CLT provided that $\left(\varepsilon_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ are i.i.d. centered having finite second moments (see Merlevede et al. [6]). In this work, we investigate the rate of convergence in the CLT for $X$ under the condition

\begin{equation*}
\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}}|j|^{\tau}\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}<\infty \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

with $\tau=1$ when $\left(\varepsilon_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ are assumed to be i.i.d. centered and such that $\varepsilon_{0}$ belongs to $L_{H}^{\infty}$ and $\tau=1 / 2$ when $\left(\varepsilon_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ are i.i.d. centered and such that $\varepsilon_{0}$ belongs to some Orlicz space $L_{H, \psi}$ (see section 2). This problem was previously studied (with $\tau=1$ in Condition (2)) by Bosq [3] for (causal) Hilbert linear processes but a mistake in his proof was pointed out by V. Paulauskas [7]. However, in the particular case of Hilbertian autoregressive processes of order 1, Bosq [4] obtained the usual Berry-Esseen inequality provided that $\left(\varepsilon_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ are i.i.d. centered with $\varepsilon_{0}$ in $L_{H}^{\infty}$.

## 2 Main result

In the sequel, $C_{\varepsilon_{0}}$ is the autocovariance operator of $\varepsilon_{0}, A:=\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}} a_{j}$ and $A^{*}$ is the adjoint of $A$. For any sequence $Z=\left(Z_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ of random variables with values in $H$ we denote

\Delta_{n}(Z)=\sup _{t \in \mathbb{R}}\left|\mathbb{P}\left(\left\|\frac{1}{\sqrt{n}} \sum_{k=1}^{n} Z_{k}\right\|_{H} \leq t\right)-\mathbb{P}\left(\|N\|_{H} \leq t\right)\right|
$$

where $N \sim \mathcal{N}\left(0, A C_{\varepsilon_{0}} A^{*}\right)$.

For any $j \in \mathbb{Z}$, denote $c_{j, n}=\sum_{i=1}^{n} b_{i-j}$ where $b_{i}=a_{i}$ for any $i \neq 0$ and $b_{0}=a_{0}-A$.
Lemma 1 For any positive integer $n$,

$$
\sum_{k=1}^{n} X_{k}=A\left(\sum_{k=1}^{n} \varepsilon_{k}\right)+Q_{n}+R_{n}
$$

where $Q_{n}=\sum_{k=1}^{n} \sum_{|j|>n} a_{k-j}\left(\varepsilon_{j}\right)$ and $R_{n}=\sum_{|j| \leq n} c_{j, n}\left(\varepsilon_{j}\right)$.
Recall that a Young function $\psi$ is a real convex nondecreasing function defined on $\mathbb{R}^{+}$ which satisfies $\lim _{t \rightarrow+\infty} \psi(t)=+\infty$ and $\psi(0)=0$. We define the Orlicz space $L_{H, \psi}$ as the space of $H$-valued random variables $Z$ defined on the probability space $(\Omega, \mathcal{F}, \mathbb{P})$ such
that $E\left[\psi\left(\|Z\|_{H} / c\right)\right]<+\infty$ for some $c>0$. The Orlicz space $L_{H, \psi}$ equipped with the so-called Luxemburg norm $\|.\|_{\psi}$ defined for any $H$-valued random variable $Z$ by

\|Z\|_{\psi}=\inf \left\{c>0 ; E\left[\psi\left(\|Z\|_{H} / c\right)\right] \leq 1\right\}
$$

is a Banach space. In the sequel, $c(N)$ denotes a bound of the density of $\mathcal{N}\left(0, A C_{\varepsilon_{0}} A^{*}\right)$ (see Davydov et al. [5]). Our main result is the following.

Theorem 1 Let $\left(\varepsilon_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ be a sequence of i.i.d. centered $H$-valued random variables and let $X$ be the Hilbertian linear process defined by (1).
i) If $\varepsilon_{0}$ belongs to $L_{H}^{\infty}$ and $\sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}}|j|\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}<\infty$ then

$$
\begin{equation*}
\Delta_{n}(X) \leq \frac{c_{1}}{\sqrt{n}} \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $c_{1}=c_{2}+14 c(N)\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{\infty} \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}}|j|\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}$ and $c_{2}$ is a positive constant which depend only on the distribution of $\varepsilon_{0}$.
ii) If $\psi$ is a Young function then

$$
\begin{equation*}
\Delta_{n}(X) \leq \Delta_{n}(A(\varepsilon))+\varphi\left(\frac{c(N)\left\|Q_{n}+R_{n}\right\|_{\psi}}{\sqrt{n}}\right) \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\varphi(x)=x h^{-1}(1 / x)$ and $h(x)=x \psi(x)$ for any real $x>0$.

The inequality (4) ensures a rate of convergence to zero for $\Delta_{n}(X)$ as $n$ goes to infinity provided that $\Delta_{n}\left(A\left(\varepsilon_{0}\right)\right)$ goes to zero as $n$ goes to infinity and a bound for $\left\|Q_{n}+R_{n}\right\|_{\psi}$ exists. As just an illustration, we have the following corollary.

Corollary 1 Assume that $\left(\varepsilon_{k}\right)_{k \in \mathbb{Z}}$ are i.i.d. centered $H$-valued random variables and that the condition (2) holds with $\tau=1 / 2$.
i) If $\varepsilon_{0}$ belongs to $L_{H, \psi_{1}}$ then $\Delta_{n}(X)=O\left(\frac{\log n}{\sqrt{n}}\right)$ where $\psi_{1}$ is the Young function defined by $\psi_{1}(x)=\exp (x)-1$.
ii) If $\varepsilon_{0}$ belongs to $L_{H}^{r}$ for $r \geq 3$ then $\Delta_{n}(X)=O\left(n^{-\frac{r}{2(r+1)}}\right)$.

## 3 Proofs

Proof of Lemma 1. For any positive integer $n$, we have

$$
\begin{aligned}
R_{n} & =\sum_{j=-n}^{n} c_{j, n}\left(\varepsilon_{j}\right)=\sum_{k=1}^{n} \sum_{j=-n}^{n} b_{k-j}\left(\varepsilon_{j}\right) \\
& =\sum_{k=1}^{n} \sum_{j \in[-n, n] \backslash\{k\}} a_{k-j}\left(\varepsilon_{j}\right)+\left(a_{0}-A\right)\left(\sum_{k=1}^{n} \varepsilon_{k}\right) \\
& =\sum_{k=1}^{n} \sum_{j=-n}^{n} a_{k-j}\left(\varepsilon_{j}\right)-A\left(\sum_{k=1}^{n} \varepsilon_{k}\right) \\
& =-Q_{n}+\sum_{k=1}^{n} X_{k}-A\left(\sum_{k=1}^{n} \varepsilon_{k}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

The proof of Lemma 1 is complete.

Proof of Theorem 1. Let $\lambda>0$ and $t>0$ be fixed and denote $U=A\left(\sum_{k=1}^{n} \varepsilon_{k} / \sqrt{n}\right)$ and $V=\left(Q_{n}+R_{n}\right) / \sqrt{n}$. So $U+V=\sum_{k=1}^{n} X_{k} / \sqrt{n}$ and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathbb{P}\left(\|U+V\|_{H} \leq t\right) \leq \mathbb{P}\left(\|U\|_{H} \leq t+\lambda\right)+\mathbb{P}\left(\|V\|_{H} \geq \lambda\right) \tag{5}
\end{equation*}
$$

For $\lambda_{0}=2\|V\|_{\infty}$, we obtain

$$
\mathbb{P}\left(\|U+V\|_{H} \leq t\right)-\mathbb{P}\left(\|N\|_{H} \leq t\right) \leq \mathbb{P}\left(\|U\|_{H} \leq t+\lambda_{0}\right)-\mathbb{P}\left(\|N\|_{H} \leq t\right) .
$$

If $c(N)$ denotes a bound for the density of $\|N\|_{H}$ (see Davydov et al. [5]) then

$$
\Delta_{n}(X) \leq \Delta_{n}(A(\varepsilon))+\frac{2 c(N)\left\|Q_{n}+R_{n}\right\|_{\infty}}{\sqrt{n}} .
$$

Noting that

$$
\begin{equation*}
Q_{n}=\sum_{j \geq n+2} a_{j}\left(\sum_{k=1-j}^{-n-1} \varepsilon_{k}\right)+\sum_{j<0} a_{j}\left(\sum_{k=n+1}^{n-j} \varepsilon_{k}\right) \tag{6}
\end{equation*}
$$

and

$$
\begin{equation*}
R_{n}=R_{n}^{\prime}+R_{n}^{\prime \prime} \tag{7}
\end{equation*}
$$

where

$$
R_{n}^{\prime}=-\sum_{j=-n}^{-1} a_{j}\left(\sum_{k=1}^{-j} \varepsilon_{k}\right)-\sum_{j<-n} a_{j}\left(\sum_{k=1}^{n} \varepsilon_{k}\right)-\sum_{j>0} a_{j}\left(\sum_{k=n-j+1}^{n} \varepsilon_{k}\right)
$$

and

$$
R_{n}^{\prime \prime}=\sum_{j=1}^{n} a_{j}\left(\sum_{k=-j+1}^{0} \varepsilon_{k}\right)+\sum_{j=n+1}^{2 n} a_{j}\left(\sum_{k=-n}^{n-j} \varepsilon_{k}\right),
$$

we derive that $\left\|Q_{n}+R_{n}\right\|_{\infty} \leq 7\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{\infty} \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}}|j|\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}$ and consequently

$$
\Delta_{n}(X) \leq \Delta_{n}(A(\varepsilon))+\frac{14 c(N)\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{\infty} \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}}|j|\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}}{\sqrt{n}}
$$

Combining the last inequality with the Berry-Esseen inequality for i.i.d. centered H valued random variables (see Yurinski [9] or Bosq [2], Theorem 2.9) we obtain (3).

In the other part, if $\psi$ is a Young function we have $\mathbb{P}\left(\|V\|_{H} \geq \lambda\right) \leq \frac{1}{\psi\left(\lambda /\|V\|_{\psi}\right)}$ and keeping in mind inequality (5), we derive

$$
\Delta_{n}(X) \leq \Delta_{n}(A(\varepsilon))+c(N) \lambda+\frac{1}{\psi\left(\lambda /\|V\|_{\psi}\right)}
$$

Noting that $c(N) \lambda=\frac{1}{\psi\left(\lambda /\|V\|_{\psi}\right)}$ if and only if $\lambda=\frac{\varphi\left(c(N)\|V\|_{\psi}\right)}{c(N)}$ where $\varphi$ is defined by $\varphi(x)=x h^{-1}(1 / x)$ and $h$ by $h(x)=x \psi(x)$, we conclude

$$
\Delta_{n}(X) \leq \Delta_{n}(A(\varepsilon))+\varphi\left(\frac{c(N)\left\|Q_{n}+R_{n}\right\|_{\psi}}{\sqrt{n}}\right)
$$

The proof of Theorem 1 is complete.

Proof of Corollary 1. Assume that $\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{\psi_{1}}<\infty$ where $\psi_{1}$ is the Young function defined by $\psi_{1}(x)=\exp (x)-1$. There exists $a>0$ such that $E\left(\exp \left(a\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{H}\right)\right) \leq 2$. So, there exist (see Arak and Zaizsev [1]) constants $B$ and $L$ such that

$$
E\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{H}^{m} \leq \frac{m!}{2} B^{2} L^{m-2}, \quad m=2,3,4, \ldots
$$

Applying Pinelis-Sakhanenko inequality (see Pinelis and Sakhanenko [?] or Bosq [2]), we obtain

$$
\mathbb{P}\left(\left\|\sum_{k=p}^{q} \varepsilon_{k}\right\|_{H} \geq x\right) \leq \exp \left(-\frac{x^{2}}{2(q-p+1) B^{2}+2 x L}\right), \quad x>0
$$

and using Lemma 2.2.10 in Van Der Vaart and Wellner [?], there exists a universal constant $K$ such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\sum_{k=p}^{q} \varepsilon_{k}\right\|_{\psi_{1}} \leq K(L+B \sqrt{q-p+1}) \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

Combining (6), (7) and (8), we derive $\left\|Q_{n}+R_{n}\right\|_{\psi_{1}} \leq C \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}} \sqrt{|j|} \mid a_{j} \|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}$ where the constant $C$ does not depend on $n$. Keeping in mind the Berry-Esseen's central limit theorem for i.i.d. centered $H$-valued random variables (see Yurinski [9] or Bosq [2], Theorem 2.9), we apply Theorem 1 with the Young function $\psi_{1}$. Since the function $\varphi$ defined by $\varphi(x)=x h^{-1}(1 / x)$ with $h(x)=x \psi_{1}(x)$ satisfies

$$
\lim _{x \rightarrow 0} \frac{\varphi(x)}{x \log \left(1+\frac{1}{x}\right)}=0
$$

we derive $\Delta_{n}(X)=O\left(\frac{\log n}{\sqrt{n}}\right)$.
Now, assume that $\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{r}<\infty$ for some $r \geq 3$. Applying Pinelis inequality (see Pinelis [8]), there exists a universal constant $K$ such that

$$
\left\|\sum_{k=p}^{q} \varepsilon_{k}\right\|_{r} \leq K\left(r\left(\sum_{k=p}^{q} E\left\|\varepsilon_{k}\right\|_{H}^{r}\right)^{1 / r}+\sqrt{r}\left(\sum_{k=p}^{q} E\left\|\varepsilon_{k}\right\|_{H}^{2}\right)^{1 / 2}\right)
$$

and consequently

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left\|\sum_{k=p}^{q} \varepsilon_{k}\right\|_{r} \leq 2 K r\left\|\varepsilon_{0}\right\|_{r} \sqrt{q-p+1} \tag{9}
\end{equation*}
$$

Combining (6), (7) and (9), we derive $\left\|Q_{n}+R_{n}\right\|_{r} \leq C \sum_{j \in \mathbb{Z}} \sqrt{|j|}\left\|a_{j}\right\|_{\mathcal{L}(H)}$ where the constant $C$ does not depend on $n$. Again, applying Berry-Esseen's CLT (see Yurinski [9] or Bosq [2], Theorem 2.9) and Theorem 1 with the Young function $\psi(x)=x^{r}$ and the function $\varphi$ given by $\varphi(x)=x^{r /(r+1)}$, we obtain $\Delta_{n}(X)=O\left(n^{-\frac{r}{2(r+1)}}\right)$. The proof of Corollary 1 is complete.

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
