Synthesis, crystal structure and vibrational spectrum of 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium hexachloroniobate(V) and oxotetrachloroniobate(V) acetonitrile, [TPT] [NbCl₆] and [TPT] [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)]

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Abstract. Single crystals of 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium hexachloroniobate(V), [TPT] [NbCl₆], (1) and of 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium oxotetrachloroniobate(V), [TPT] [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)], (2) could be obtained and their crystal structures determined. The yellow compound **1** crystallizes in the monoclinic space group $P2_1/c$ (C_{2h}^5 , no. 14) with $a = 1321.6(3), b = 1080.7(2), c = 1740.2(4) \text{ pm}, \beta = 111.54(2)^{\circ}, \text{ and } Z = 4$. Its structure is isotypic to that of the recently characterized [TPT] [SbCl₆] and built up by [TPT]⁺ cations and octahedral [NbCl₆]⁻ anions. The light yellow compound **2** crystallizes in the orthorhombic space group *Pbcm* (D_{2h}^{11} , no. 57) with a = 1574.4(1), b = 1047.7(1), c = 1047.7(1)1723.4(1) pm, and Z = 4. The ionic compound contains [TPT]⁺ cations and [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)]⁻ anions. The nitrogen atom of the acetonitrile solvate molecule is coordinated to the niobium ion in the trans-position to the oxo ligand. The Nb-O bond length of 169.6 pm corresponds to a double bond. The [TPT] [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)] formation proceeds with the hydrate [TPT]Cl · H₂O obvious via NbOCl₃. The FT-Raman and FT-IR/FIR spectra of both compounds have been recorded and interpreted, especially with respect to the inorganic structure parts. The melting temperatures of 1 and 2 are given.

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Introduction

Crystalline niobium pentachloride, consisting of dimeric Nb₂Cl₁₀ units, forms with the heavier alkali chlorides MCl (M = K, Rb and Cs) M[NbCl₆] compounds with octahedral [NbCl₆]⁻ units [1-3]. In case of Na[NbCl₆] and of the low temperature K[NbCl₆] phase [2], another still unknown crystal structure is formed according to X-ray Guinier and Raman spectroscopic investigations [2, 3]. This is in accordance to the respective phase diagrams of the NbCl₅ – MCl systems [3, 4]. Secondly, the existence of from [NbCl₆]⁻ deviating species as e.g. [Nb₂Cl₁₁]⁻ in dependency of the NbCl₅ : Cl stoichiometry is still open [5]. The formation of such "acidic" [Nb₂Cl₁₁]⁻ species out of Nb₂Cl₁₀ + Cl⁻ would be analogous to the formation of well known [Al₂Cl₇]⁻ ions [6, 7]. The large [TPT]⁺ ion could influence the kind of the chloroniobate(V) species in the reaction of NbCl₅ with [TPT]⁺ [Cl]⁻.

Moreover, [TPT]Cl is hygroscopic and reacts with moisture to a triphenyltetrazolium chloride hydrate, ([TPT]Cl \cdot H₂O) [8]. Besides its chloride ion donor properties this hydrate can form oxohalide compounds with water sensitive halides. In such a reaction fortunately and more fortuitously single crystals of [TPT] [NbOCl₄ (CH₃CN)] could be obtained. Obviously, the formation reaction proceeds via NbOCl₃. The crystalline triphenylmethylphosphonium oxotetrachloroniobate(V), [Ph₃MeP]⁺ [NbOCl₄ (CH_3CN)], characterized until now only, was synthesized by an intricate route via NbCl₅ with CCl₃NO₂ [9]. Another way to oxotetra-chloroniobates(V) runs via a synproportionation of niob(V)oxides with NbCl₅ in the presence of CsCl in molten salt state [10]. The all together rare oxotetrachloroniobate(V) unit is found furthermore in the uncommon compounds $[(\eta^5-C_5H_5)Nb(CNCMe_3)_4Cl]$ [NbOCl₄(THF)] · (THF)] [11] and in $Te_6(NbOCl_4)_2$ [12]. With the obtaining of single crystals of the title compounds the opportunity is used to investigate and characterize the new compounds in more detail.

Results and Discussion

Crystal Structure of [TPT][NbCl₆] (1)

Treatment of niobium pentachloride, NbCl₅, with one equivalent of anhydrous 2,3,5triphenyltetrazolium chloride in acetonitrile afforded [TPT] [NbCl₆] (1) as yellow crystals. The product shows rapid decomposition on the slightest exposure to the atmosphere, but the crystals were manipulated under argon.

The complex salt **1** crystallizes in the monoclinic space group $P2_1/c$ (no. 14) with four formula units per unit cell. The asymmetric unit contains isolated [TPT]⁺ cations and [NbCl₆]⁻ anions and its structure is isotypic with [TPT] [SbCl₆] [13] (Fig. 1 and Tab. 1).

The packing diagram of **1** shows the face-to-face stacked orientation between the phenyl rings of the two neighboring molecules, which is caused by intermolecular $\pi \cdots \pi$ interactions. The closest contact between the neighboring phenyl rings is 369 pm, and it is similar to that found in [TPT] [SbCl₆] [13].

In the cationic unit the five atoms in the tetrazolium ring (N(1), N(2), N(3), C(4) and N(5)) are coplanar. N(1) – N(5) and N(2) – N(3) are equivalent (131 pm). The N(1) – N(2) bond is much longer than the formers two bonds (2.0 pm). The elongation of this bond may be ascribed to the repulsion between the relevant phenyl groups. The deviations of C(6), C(12) and C(18) atoms from the tetrazolium plane are 5.4, –35.4 and 19.9 pm, respectively. The torsion angles of C(6), C(12) and C(18) phenyl rings are 94.31, –36.81 and 22.05°, respectively. These values agree well with those reported for [TPT] [SbCl₆] [13].

The hexachloroniobate anion is approximately octahedral coordinated by six chlorine atoms. The metal-chlorine bond distances range from 232.1(2) to 239.4(2) pm (mean

value of 235.0 pm). The *cis*-Cl – Nb – Cl angles range from 89.7 to 92.4°, and *trans*-Cl – Nb – Cl angles of 176.9 and 179.4° in the equatorial positions, and 177.9° in the axial positions (Tab. 2). These values agree with those of reported hexachloroniobate(V) salts [14-17].

Crystal Structure of [TPT] [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)] (2)

Reaction of 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium chloride monohydrate with NbCl₅ in 1:1 ratio led to precipitation of yellow crystals of title compound **2**. [TPT] [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)] crystallizes in the orthorhombic space group *Pbcm* (no. 57) with four formula units per unit cell. The crystal structure of **2** consists of discrete [TPT] cations and [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)] anions (Fig. 2).

The [NbOC1₄(CH₃CN)]⁻ ion has C_{4v} symmetry long known for oxotetrahalometallate anions of the early transition metals [18, 19]. The niobium atom is displaced by 33 pm toward the oxo ligand from the best mean plane through the four chlorine atoms. The short Nb–O bond of 169.6 pm is comparable to those found for [(η^5 -C₅H₅)Nb(CNCMe₃)₄Cl][NbOCl₄(THF)] · THF [11] and Tl[NbOCl₄] [20] and indicates multiple bond character while in the *trans*-position the long Nb–N(3) bond of 245.8 pm indicates only weak bonding (Fig. 3 and Tab. 2). The coordination of the acetonitrile molecule is linear with Nb–N(3)–C(14) of 178.9 and N(3)–C(14)–C(15) of 179.1°. The Nb–Cl bond lengths range from 239.1 to 239.8 pm. The *cis*-Cl – Nb – Cl angles range from 86.7(1) to 90.8°, and the *trans*-Cl – Nb – Cl angle is 164.2° in the equatorial positions and they compare well with those of known hexachloro-niobate(V) salts [9, 21].

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The contacts between anions and cations $[C(12)-H(12)\cdots Cl(2) 376.0(1) \text{ pm}, C(9)-H(9)\cdots Cl(1) 376.7(1) \text{ pm}]$ exist as weak C – H … Cl interactions involving four $[TPT]^+$ cations and one one $[NbOCl_4(CH_3CN)]^-$ anion [22]. The whole structure can also be seen as being from alternating layers along *b* axes, in which the $[TPT]^+$ cations and the $[NbOCl_4(CH_3CN)]^-$ anions are linked by hydrogen bonds (Fig. 3).

Vibrational spectra and assignment

2,3,5-Triphenyltetrazolium hexachloroniobate(V), [TPT] [NbCl₆], (1)

According to the crystal structure determination the title compound **1** is built up by $[TPT]^+$ cations and $[NbCl_6]^-$ anions. These units can be clearly detected in the vibrational spectra of **1** (Fig. S1 / Supporting information).

The relevant vibrational modes of $[NbCl_6]^-$ are summarized in Table 3 along with the proposed assignment and in comparison to literature data [2, 23].

The [TPT] cation exhibits approximately C_2 symmetry, therefore all its vibrations are Raman active and infrared allowed, what is also verified by its whole vibrational spectrum. The [TPT]⁺ vibrations result in their characteristic modes for the aromatic -C–H stretchings and bendings as well as for the phenyl ring and the tetrazolium heterocyclus modes. The corresponding Raman as well as IR bands are very similar to those of [TPT]⁺ [Cl]⁻ [24] and [TPT] [SbCl₆] [13]. The relevant [TPT]⁺ Raman and IR modes may be taken from footnote 1.

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Octahedral $[NbCl_6]^-$ units (O_h symmetry) are here the more interesting inorganic components of the crystal structure of **1**. A vibrational analysis for such a unit results in [25]:

 $\Gamma_{\text{vib}} ([\text{NbCl}_6]^{-} / O_h) = A_{1g} (\text{RE}) + E_g (\text{RE}) + 2 F_{1u} (\text{IR}) + F_{2g} (\text{RE}) + F_{2u} (\text{i.a.}),$

with RE = Raman, IR = Infrared and i.a. = inactive, and with $A_{1g} + E_g + F_{1u}$ as stretchings and $F_{1u} + F_{2g}$ as bendings.

The Raman as well as the IR/FIR spectra of **1** do not exhibit the expected pattern of a $[MCl_6]$ octahedron, but they show much more vibrational modes. It is also noteworthy that the selection rules and the rule of mutual exclusion do not have an effect, so that the $[NbCl_6]^-$ fundamentals appear in the Raman as well as FIR spectrum. According to the crystal structure determination, the $[NbCl_6]^-$ ion is built up octahedrally, so that the sketched peculiarities are caused by symmetry lowering of the anion by the crystal lattice of **1** (removal of degeneracy). (In the monoclinic [TPT] $[NbCl_6]$: $P2_1/c$ (C_{2h}^5), Nb is on the general position of 4*e*, what means site symmetry C_1 for Nb *respective* $[NbCl_6]^-$).

In detail, the very strong Raman mode at 370 cm⁻¹ and the medium FIR band at 372 cm⁻¹ can be assigned to v_1 in A_{1g} (Table 3). The very strong and remarkable broad FIR bands at 341/331 cm⁻¹ show a Raman counterpart at 339 cm⁻¹ and they belong to v_3 / F_{1u} . v_2 / E_g is split and existent not only in Raman but also in FIR spectrum. The bending mode v_5 / F_{2g} , in Raman at 173 cm⁻¹, is present in FIR spectrum and it is split. Only v_4 / F_{1u} appears in the FIR spectrum at 161 cm⁻¹ as a very strong band. Altogether, our presented vibrational data are in agreement with these given in [2, 23], as well as with those of [Et₄N]⁺ [NbCl₆]⁻ [26]. Further details may be obtained from Tab. 3.

2,3,5-Triphenyltetrazolium oxotetrachloroniobate(V) acetonitrile adduct,[TPT] [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)], (2)

Title compound **2** is built up by [TPT] cations, [NbOCl₄ (CH₃CN)] anions. Additional acetonitrile solvate molecules are included in the crystals, likely as fluid inclusions. In the vibrational spectra of **2** the mentioned building components can be clearly recognized. The acetonitrile is weakly coordinated to Nb in the complex anion confirmed by the Nb–N distance 245.8 pm. The two different acetonitrile components can be clearly distinguished by their CN- stretchings in the range 2320-2250 cm⁻¹. Raman and IR bands in this region are split due to Fermi resonance [27] and shifted by about 20 cm⁻¹ to higher wave numbers in comparison to these ones of liquid acetonitrile [28-30] and in accordance to other weak bounded acetonitrile adducts [19, 31].

The Raman and IR/FIR spectra of crystalline compound **2** are shown in Fig. S2 / Supporting information. In this contribution, the main interest is directed on the inorganic $[NbOCl_4]^-$ respective $[NbOCl_4(CH_3CN)]^-$ group. Therefore, the relevant $[NbOCl_4]^-$ vibrational modes of crystalline **2** in the spectral region below 1000 cm⁻¹ are presented in Table 4 along with their estimated intensities and the proposed assignment. All the vibrational frequencies of compound **2** with marked peculiarities (in parenthesis) are given as footnote 2 below Table 4 as well as the values of acetonitrile for completeness reasons.

As in title compound 1, the $[TPT]^+$ vibrations of 2 are Raman active and infrared allowed and they are found in the characteristic group frequency ranges. The $[TPT]^+$ Raman as well as IR bands are very similar to those in [TPT] [NbCl₆] (c.f. footnote 1), $[TPT]^+$ [Cl]⁻ [24] and in [TPT][SbCl₆] [13]. All the relevant $[TPT]^+$ Raman and IR modes are summarized in footnote 2.

Due to the weak acetonitrile coordination the anionic spectral parts are best interpreted by $[NbOCl_4]^-$ units rather than by $[NbOCl_4(CH_3CN)]^-$ ions as in the first structurally characterized saltlike complex triphenylmethylphosphonium oxotetrachloroniobate(V) acetonitrile, $[Ph_3MeP]^+$ $[NbOCl_4(CH_3CN)]^-$ [9]. The square pyramidal $[NbOCl_4]^-$ group exhibits C_{4v} symmetry. A vibrational analysis for this unit results in [32]:

 Γ_{vib} ([ONbCl₄]⁻/C_{4v}) = 3 A₁ (IR, RE) + 2 B₁ (RE) + B₂ (RE) + 3 E (IR, RE), with IR = Infrared and RE = Raman, and with 2 A₁ + B₁ + E as stretchings and the remaining A₁ + B₁ + B₂ + 2 E as bendings.

The Raman and IR/FIR frequencies for [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)]⁻ in crystalline [Ph₃MeP] [NbOCl₄ (CH₃CN)] are given and assigned in part only [9]. Furthermore, NbOCl₃-NbCl₅-CsCl melts have been investigated by Raman spectroscopy [10] and the characteristic [NbOCl₄]⁻ frequencies were determined therefrom. The given interpretation of the Raman data has been assisted by quantum mechanical *ab initio* SCF (Self Consistent Field) calculations. The included calculations of the [NbOCl₄]⁻ frequencies and their PED (Potential Energy distribution) values were done with help of the programs GAMFORCE [33] and MOLVIB [34].

In the Table 4 our $[NbOCl_4]^-$ vibrational modes of crystalline **2** are presented along their proposed assignment based on the mentioned PED data and in comparison to the vibrational frequencies of $[NbOCl_4]^-$ given in [10]. According to that (Fig. S2 and Table 4) v(Nb=O) is proved by the strong band at 945 and 955 cm⁻¹, respectively. The bands at 341/330 and 244/243 cm⁻¹ belong to NbCl₄ stretchings whereas these ones at 168/175 cm⁻¹ are NbCl₄ bendings. The Raman band at 140 cm⁻¹ is attributed to a ONbCl₄ bending. Bands below 100 cm⁻¹ may be ascribed to so-called lattice vibrations. Herewith our proposed assignment of the anionic unit differs considerable from this one of the [Ph₃MeP]⁺ salt [9] especially due to the differences in the FIR spectra.

Concluding remarks

Two new niobate compounds, 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium hexachloroniobate(V) (1) and oxo-tetrachloroniobate(V) acetonitrile (2), have been synthesized. The identity and purity of the synthesized compounds were confirmed by elemental analysis, infrared and Raman spectroscopy, and single X-ray diffraction.

In compound 1, no hydrogen bonds are found between the octahedral $[NbCl_6]^-$ anions and 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium cations.

Title compound 2 could be obtained by the reaction of $[TPT]Cl \cdot H_2O$ with niobpentachloride in acetonitrile according to

 $[TPT]Cl \cdot H_2O + NbCl_5 (in CH_3CN) \rightarrow [TPT]^+ [NbOCl_4(CH_3CN)]^- + 2 HCl$

As expected, $[NbOCl_4(CH_3CN)]^-$ exhibits C_{4v} symmetry and Nb^{5+} is coordinated by one oxygen, four chloride ions and one acetonitrile molecule. The niobium is displaced by 33 pm toward the oxo ligand from the best mean plane through the four chlorine atoms. The short Nb–O bond of 169.6 pm indicates multiple bond character while in the *trans*-position the long Nb–N bond of 245.8 pm indicates only weak bonding. The [NbOCl₄(CH₃CN)]⁻ anion is hydrogen bonded to four 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium cations.

Experimental Section

Materials and Methods: All manipulations and chemical reactions were carried out in a dry argon atmosphere using standard Schlenk, vacuum-line and glove-box techniques. NbCl₅ was sublimated for purification, and 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium chloride monohydrate (Fluka) was used without additional purification. CH₃CN was distilled and dried by P_4O_{10} . Obviously, the commercial anhydrous [TPT]Cl contained water, therefore the "anhydrous" 2,3,5-triphenyltetrazolium chloride was dried under reduced pressure in Schlenk tubes (120-130 °C, 2 h). The melting points of **1** and **2** were measured on a BÜCHI 520 apparatus and they are uncorrected values.

2,3,5-Triphenyltetrazolium hexachloroniobate(V) (1): 352.8 mg (1 mmol) [TPT]Cl \cdot H₂O and 270.4 mg (1 mmol) NbCl₅ were mixed in a Schlenk tube. The mixture was kept for at 140 °C for 3 h. Upon cooling 15 mL CH₃CN was added forming a yellow clear solution. After some days the yellow, block-shaped crystals were formed. C₁₉H₁₅Cl₆N₄Nb: calc. C 37.72, H 2.50, N 9.26; found C 37.32, H 2.53, N 9.10. The melting temperature was found to be 128 °C.

2,3,5-Triphenyltetrazolium oxotetrachloroniobate(V) acetonitrile (2): Compound **2** was synthesized by using the same method as that for compound 1, except for the replacement of [TPT]Cl \cdot H₂O by dried [TPT]Cl. Upon cooling to room temperature, yellow, block-shaped crystals formed. C₂₁H₁₈Cl₄N₅NbO: calc. C 42.67, H 3.07, N 11.85; found C 41.99, H 3.11, N 11.21. The melting temperature was found to be 154 °C.

X-Ray diffraction analysis

Since both compounds are sensitive towards hydrolysis by moist air and the selection of crystals was performed in an argon filled glove box. Crystals were transferred into glass capillaries which were sealed. The crystals selected had the size $0.28 \cdot 0.25 \cdot 0.20 \text{ mm}^3$ for [TPT] [NbCl₆] and $0.30 \cdot 0.26 \cdot 0.25 \text{ mm}^3$ for [TPT] [NbCCl₄(CH₃CN)]. All data were collected on a Stoe IPDS-II single-crystal X-ray diffractometer with graphite monochromated Mo K_{α} radiation ($\lambda = 0.71073$ Å) at 223 K. Crystal structure solution by direct methods using SHELXS-97 [35] yielded in all cases heavy atom positions. Subsequent difference Fourier analyses and least squares refinements with SHELXL-97 [35] allowed localization of the remaining atom positions. The H positions of [TPT]⁺ were determined by a final difference Fourier Synthesis. In compound **2** the H atoms of acetonitrile molecule couldn't be located. Crystal data and structure refinement parameters of structures are summarized in Table 1. For the preparation of the structure drawings, programs Diamond [36] and POV-Ray [37] were applied.

 Further details on the crystal structure investigations may be obtained from Cambridge Crystallographic Data CCDC 723597 for compound **1** and CCDC 723596 for compound **2**.

FT- Raman and FT-FIR/IR spectra

FT-Raman spectra were recorded from crystalline samples of the title compounds in sealed silica tubes with a Raman module FRA 106 (Nd:YAG laser, 1064 nm, 200 mW) attached to a Bruker IFS 66v interferometer. The FT-IR/FIR spectra were obtained with the mentioned interferometer from solid sample material of **1** and **2** "sandwiched" between CsI and PE pellets, respectively
