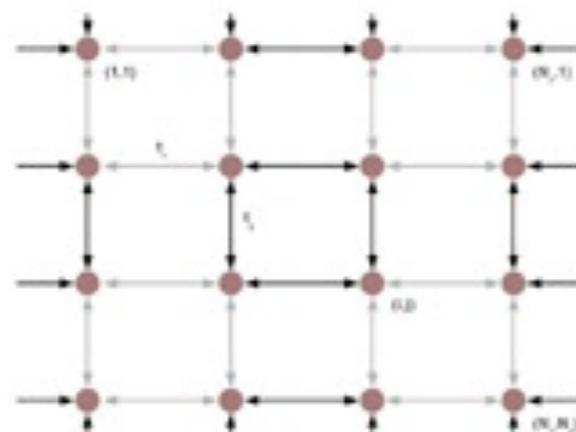
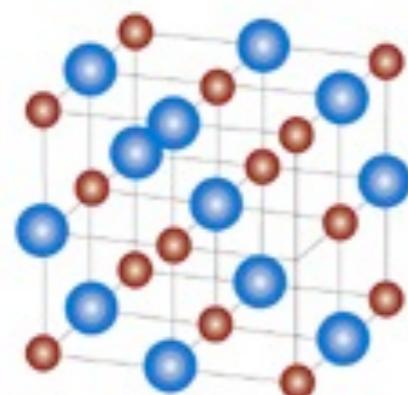

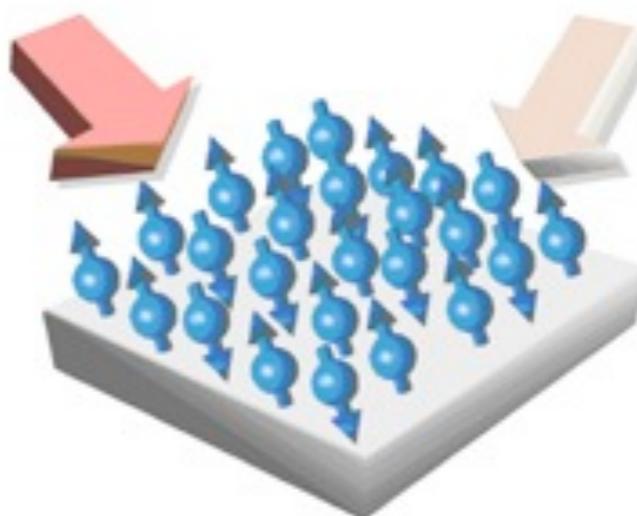

Simplified model

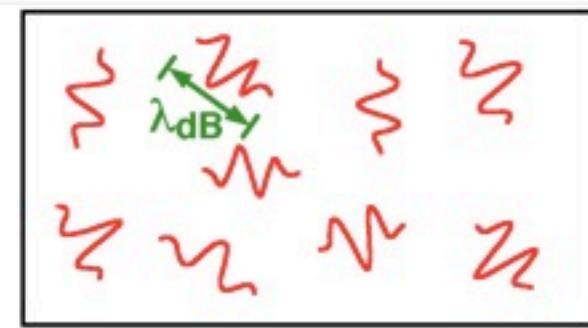
toy-model of the magnified lattice

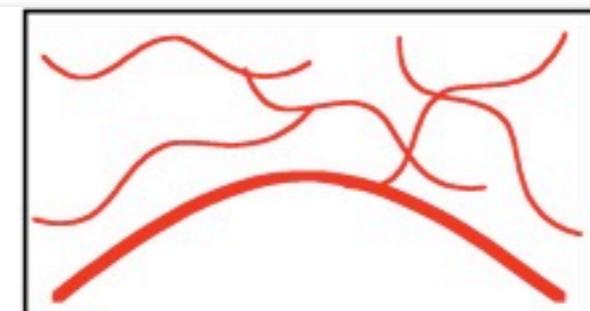
USING COLD ATOMS AND LIGHT FIELDS

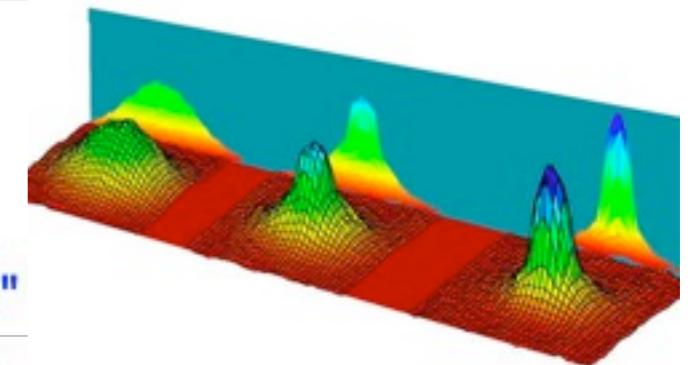


Atoms cooled below 1 μK

Distribution on matter waves with de Broglie wavelength $\approx 1 \mu\text{m}$

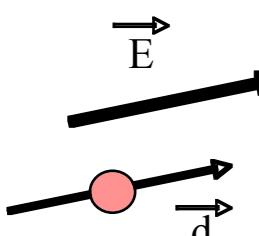

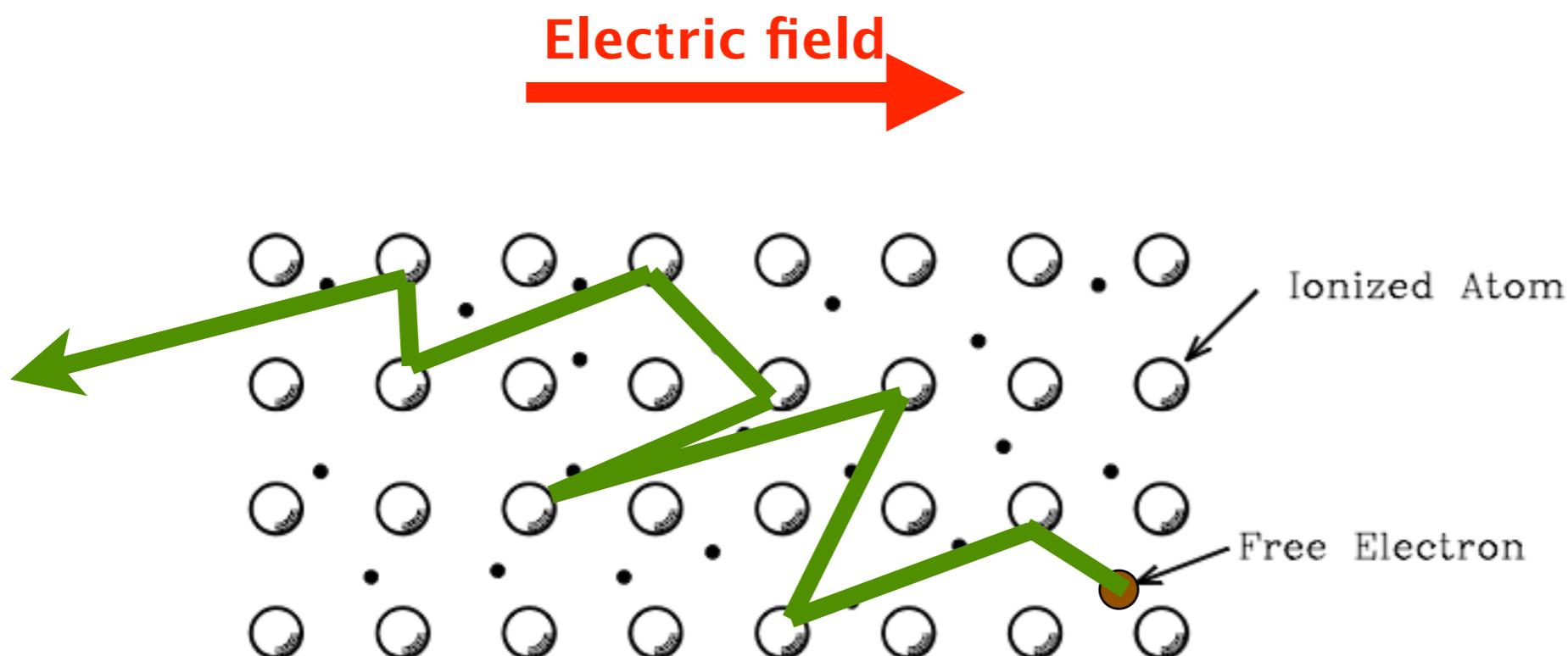
ELECTRONIC CONDUCTION

In a perfectly ordered metal



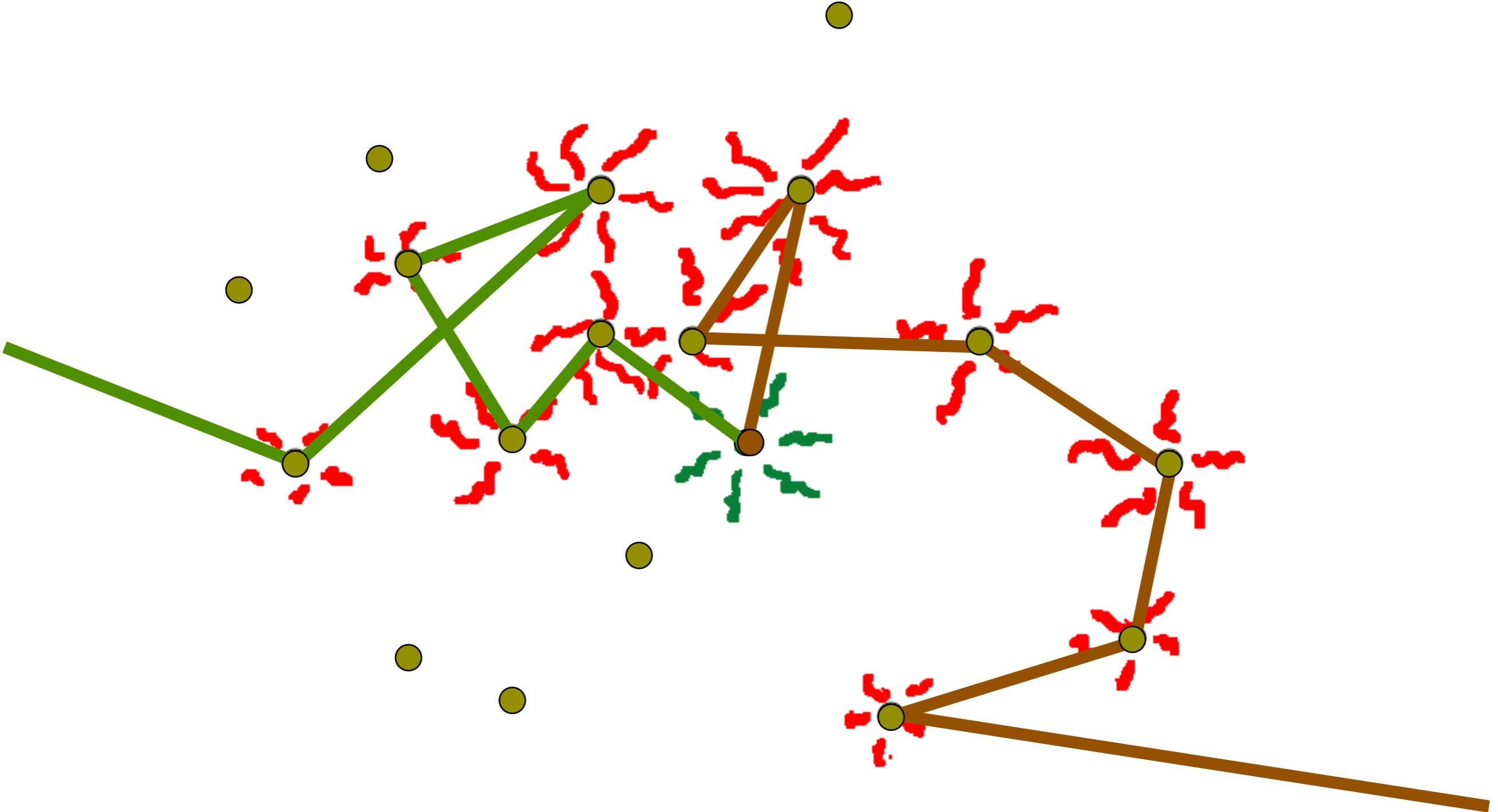
Diffusive transport caused by scattering on lattice defects (Drude model)

Thermal excitation increases diffusion = reduced conductivity

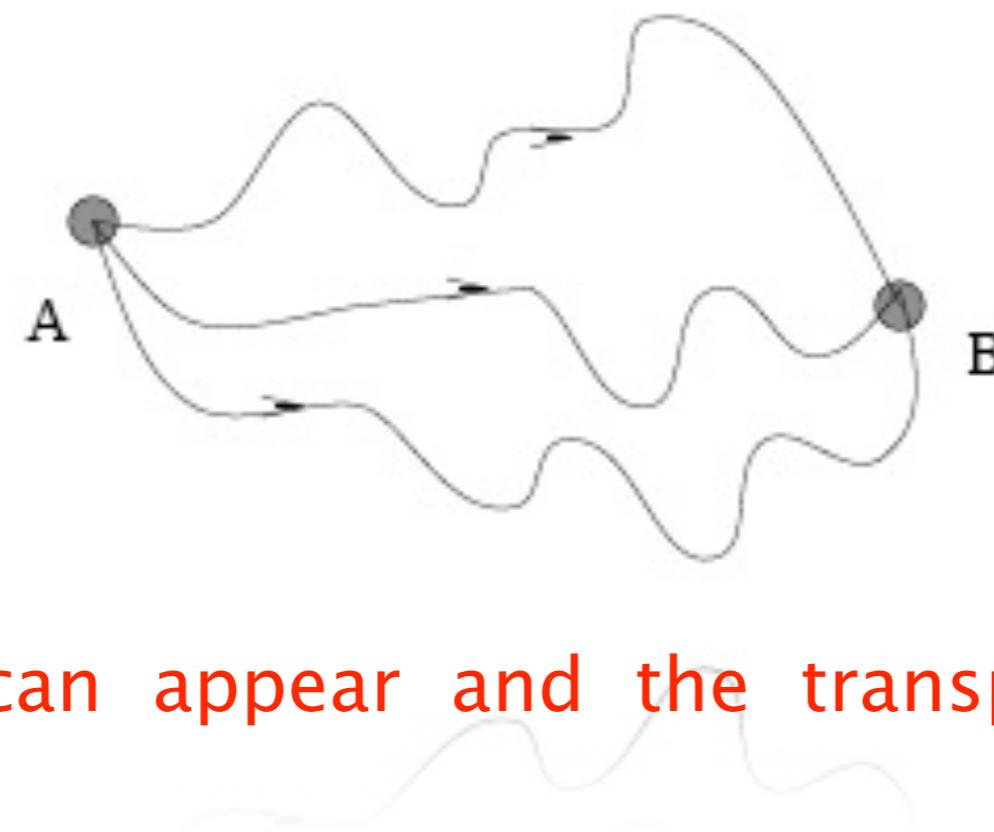
CLASSICAL TRANSPORT THROUGH IMPURITIES



Waves but no coherence bouncing on impurities = diffusion

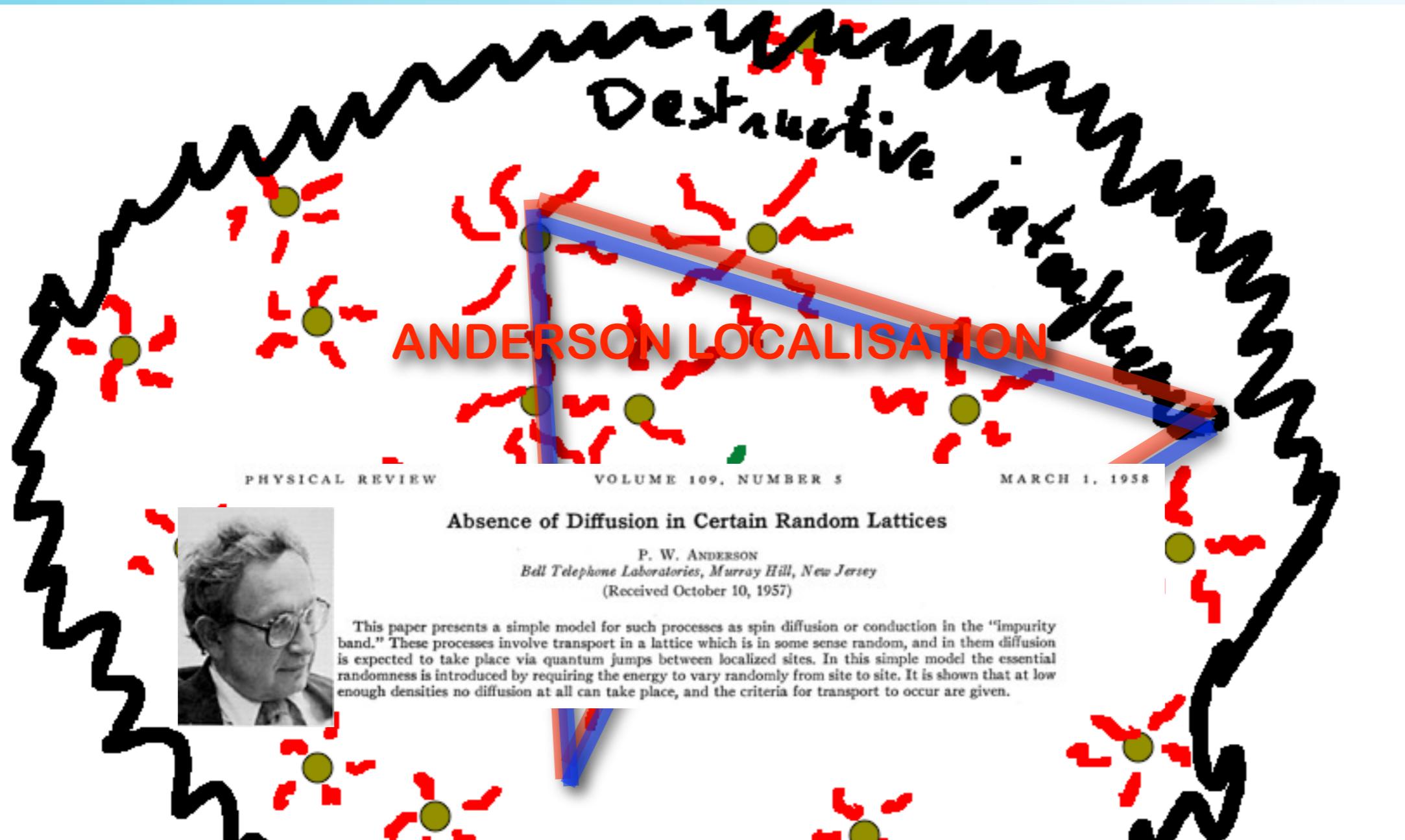
If the length scales become small compare to the de Broglie wavelength and/or the phase coherence length, then quantum mechanics will rule the transport properties.

The probability for a particle to go from point A to point B is the sum of the amplitudes of all possible trajectories.



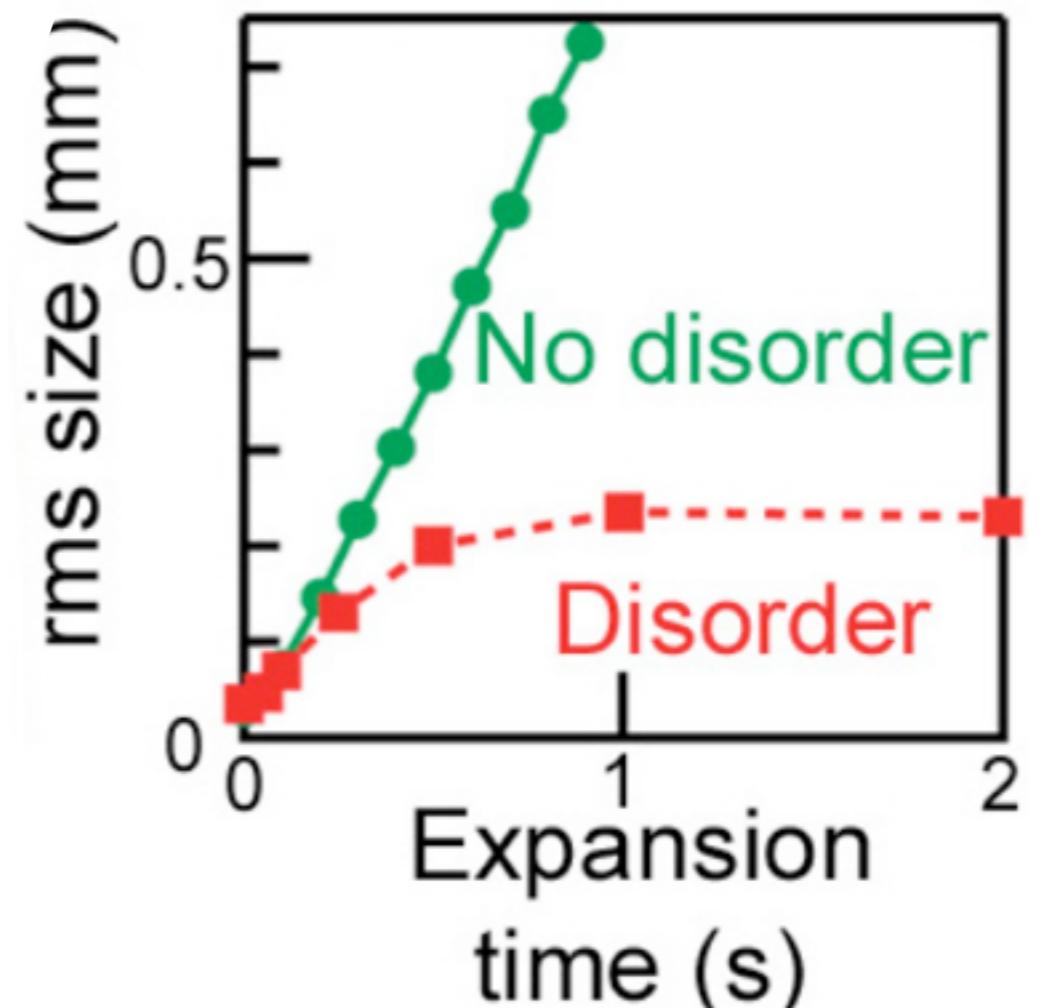
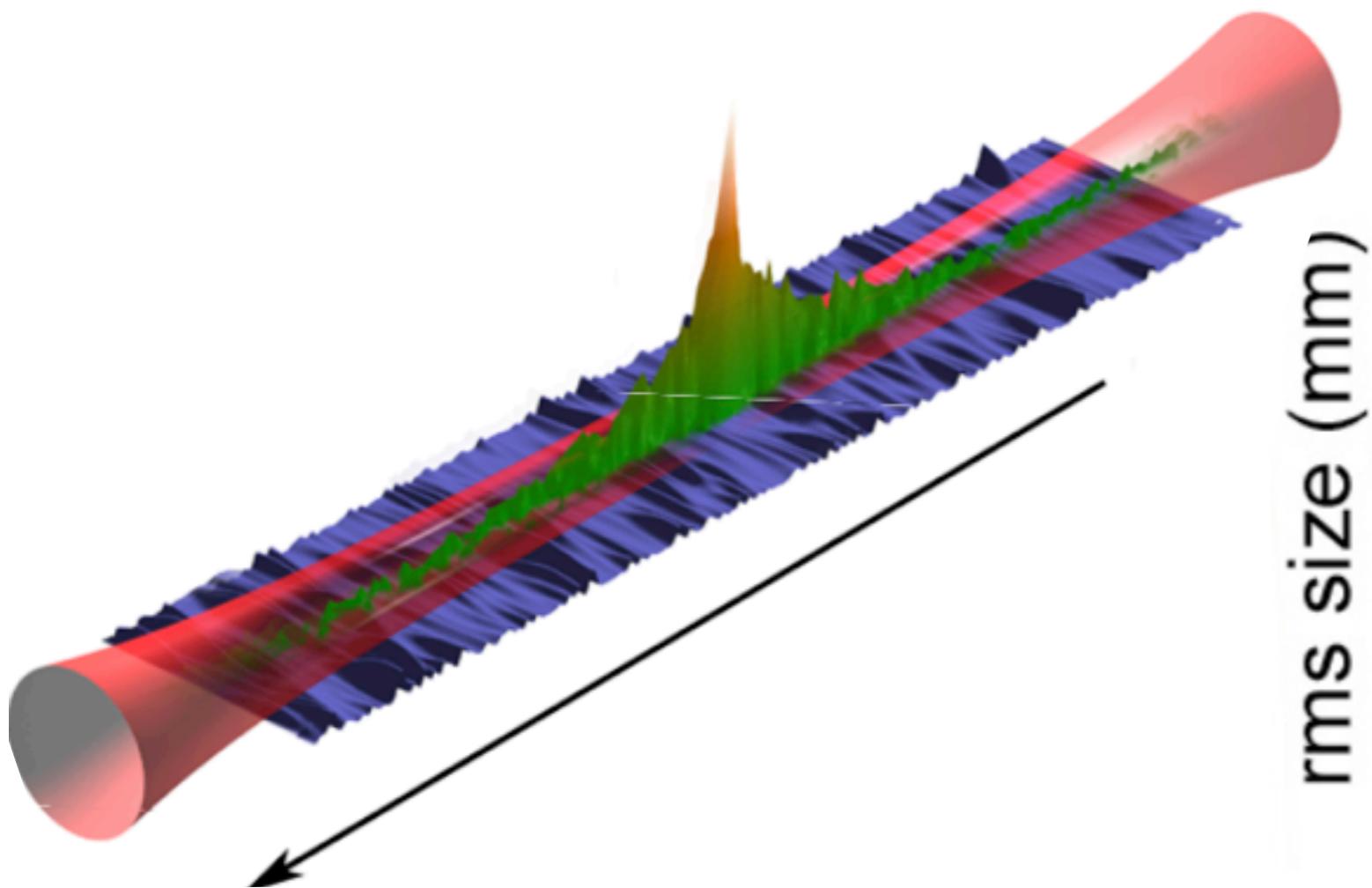
Interference terms can appear and the transport properties can be modified

QUANTUM TRANSPORT THROUGH IMPURITIES



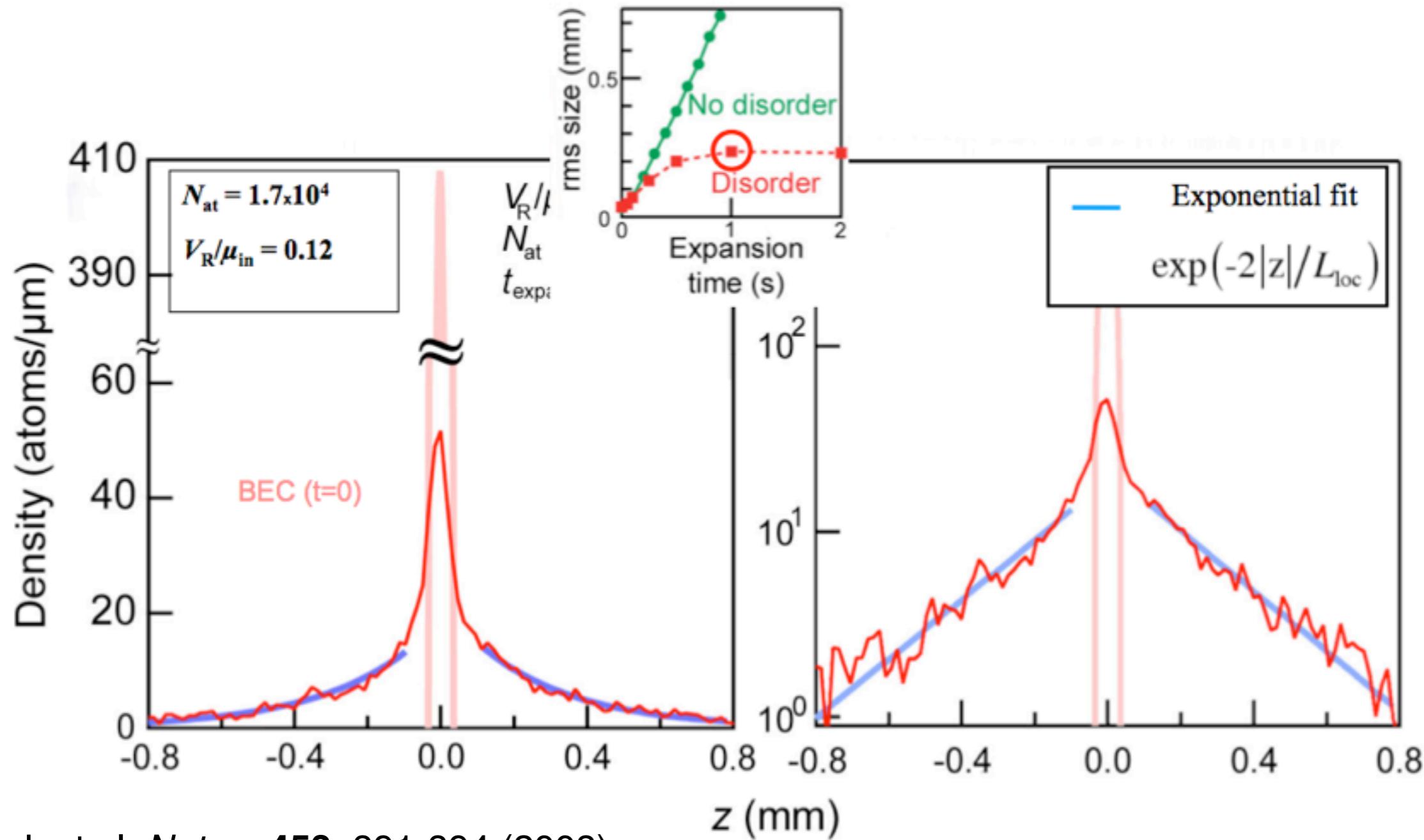
If mean free path smaller than de Broglie wavelength:
constructive interference of trajectories returning to origin: **localized states**: insulator

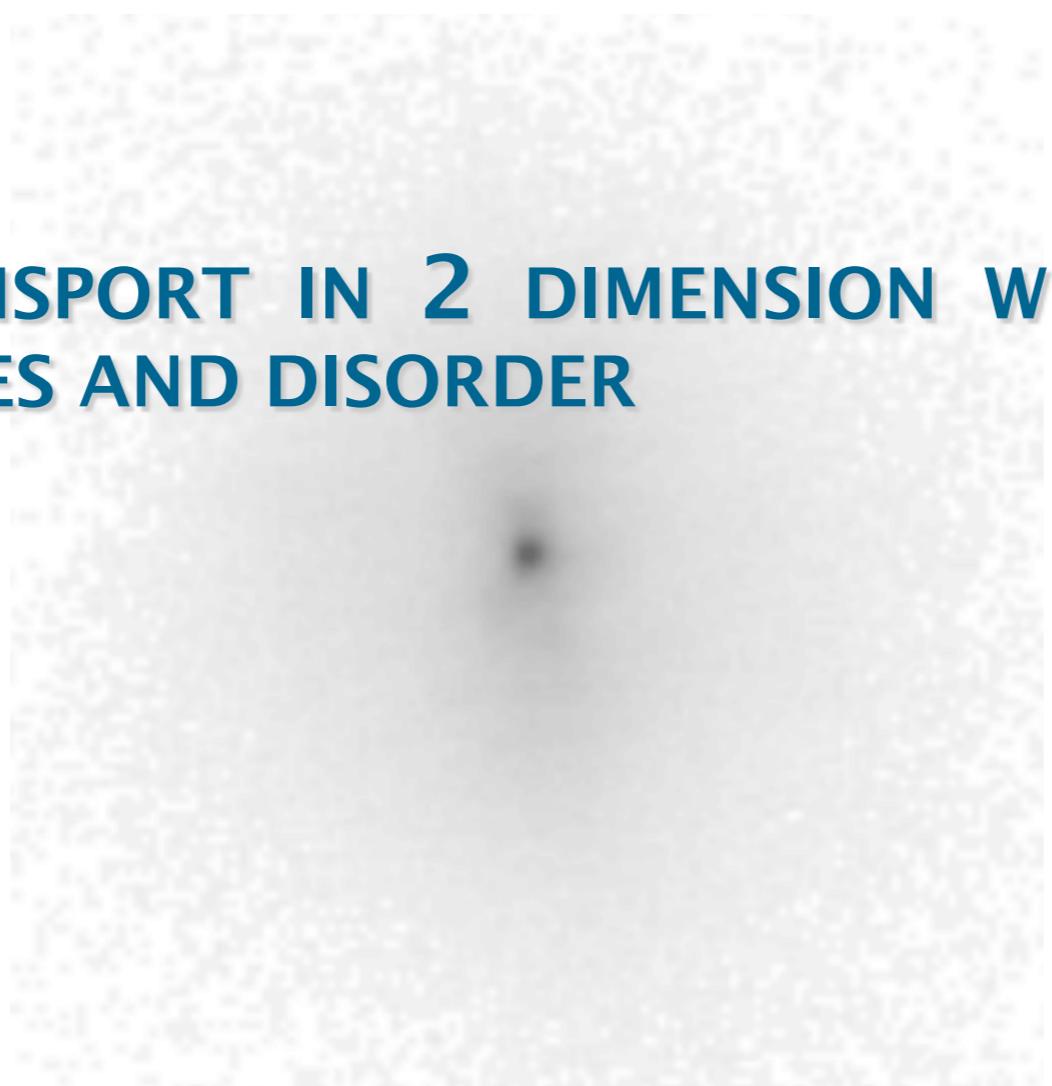
OBSERVATION OF LOCALISED WAVEFUNCTION

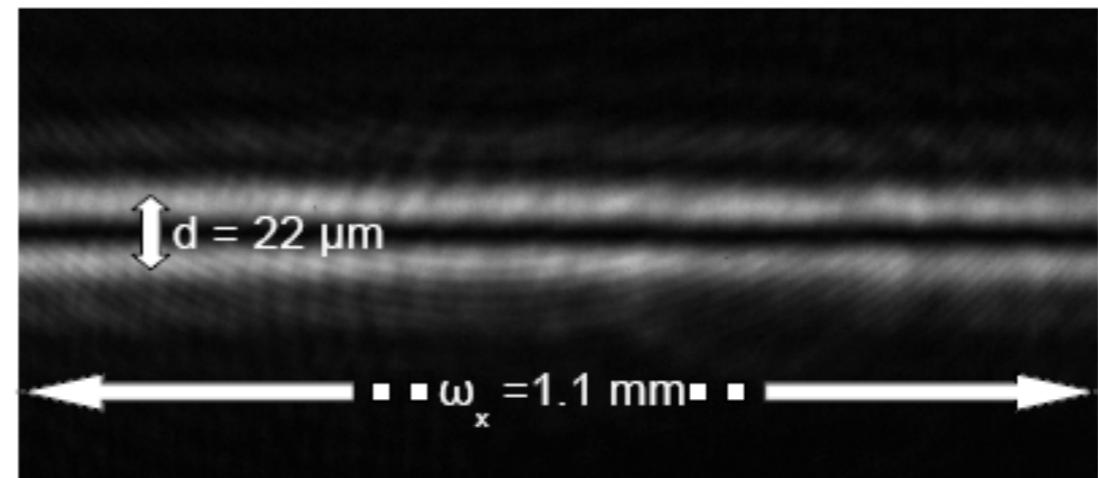
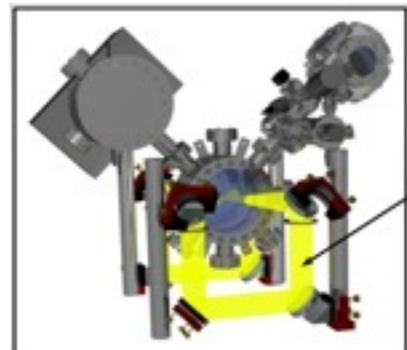
FAST ALL OPTICAL BEC



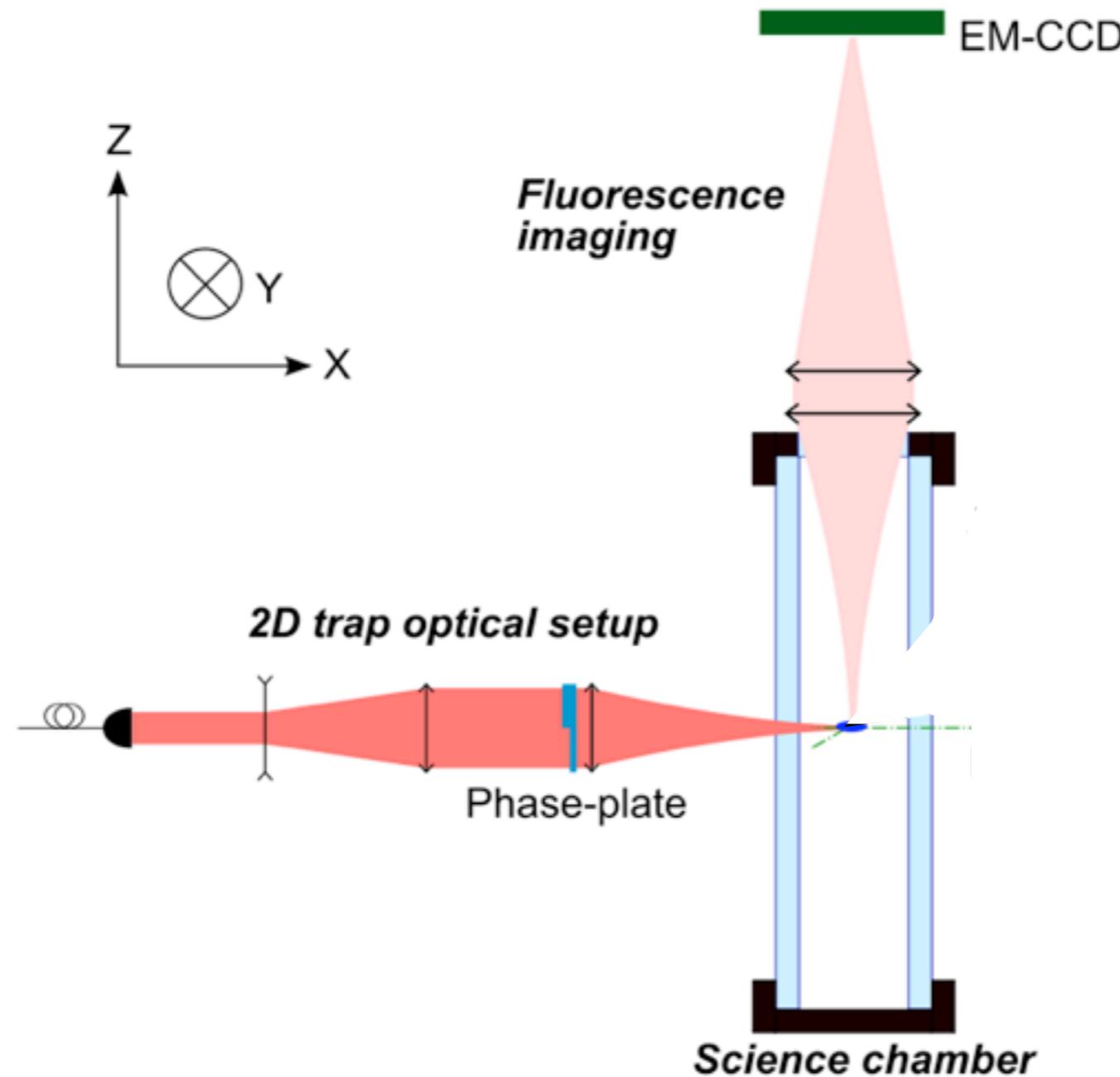
Tc with 10^6 atoms

 BEC achieved in 650 ms



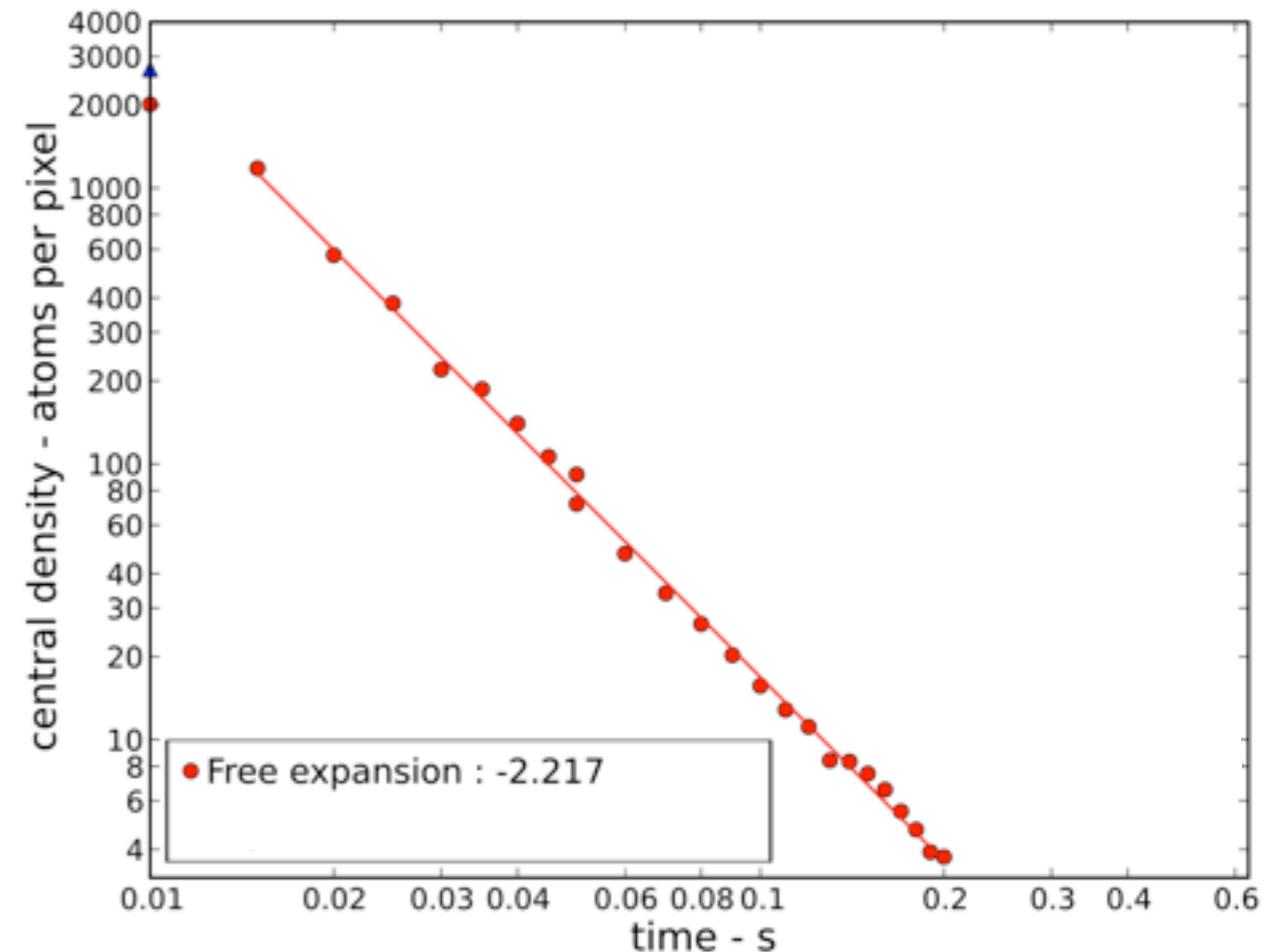
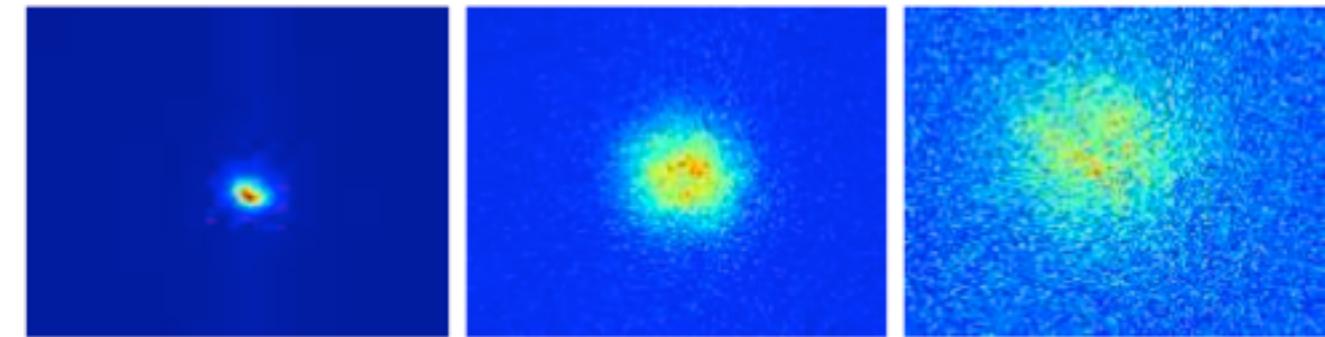

Depth of the optical wells

Indirect (CCD) and direct (using HF spectroscopy) measurements

Statistical properties verified $\sigma_I \sim \langle I \rangle$

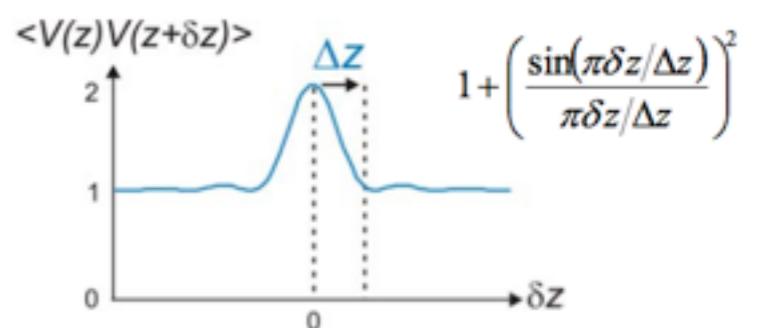
Potential depth σ_V calculated from σ_I

$$\sigma_V = \frac{2}{3} \frac{\Gamma^2}{2\delta} \frac{\sigma_I}{I_S}$$

Good agreement with HF measurements (calibration)

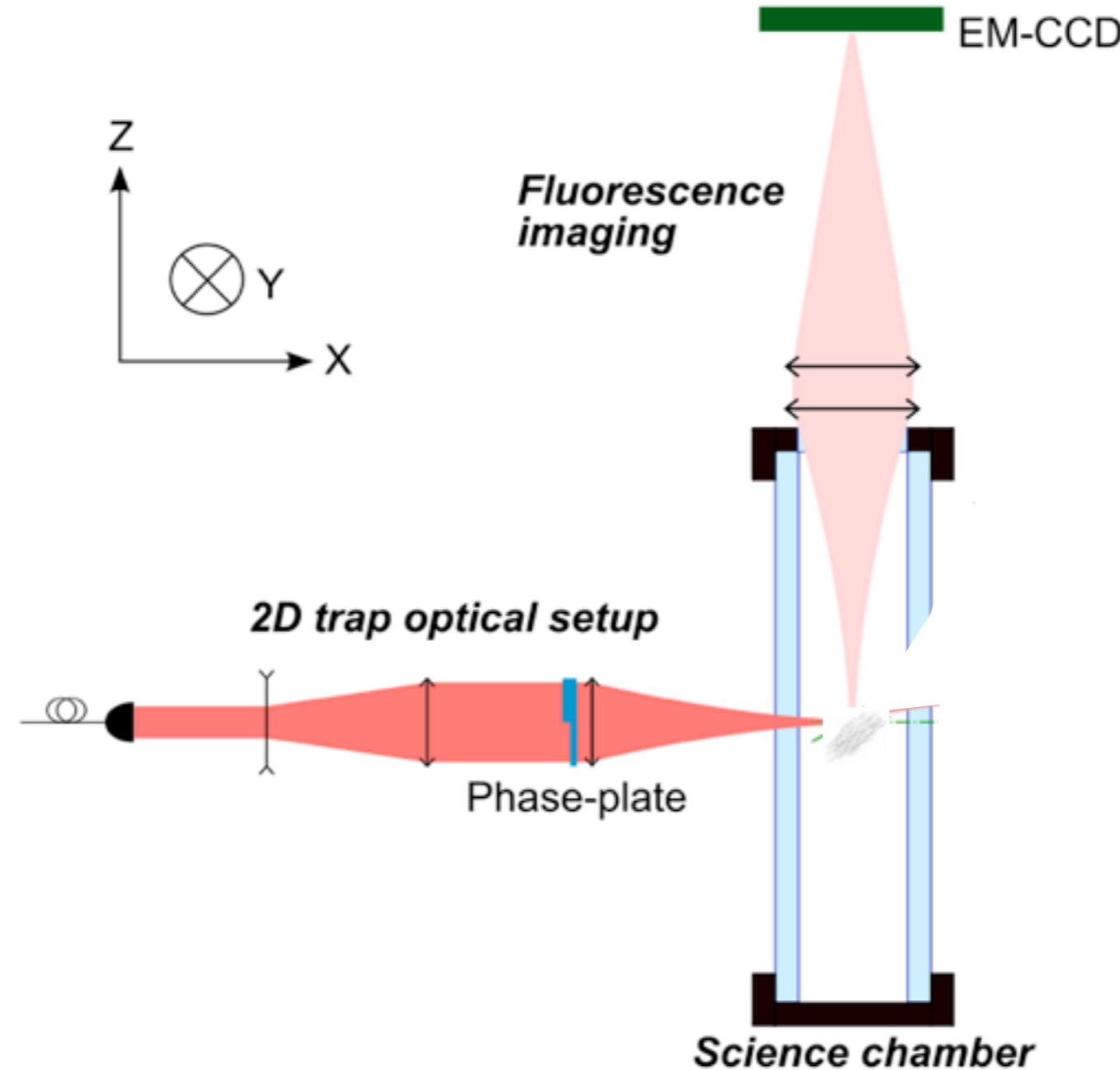
Disorder amplitude definition γ : $\gamma = \sigma_V / \mu$

Spatial autocorrelation : $C(\delta z) = \langle V(z)V(z+\delta z) \rangle$

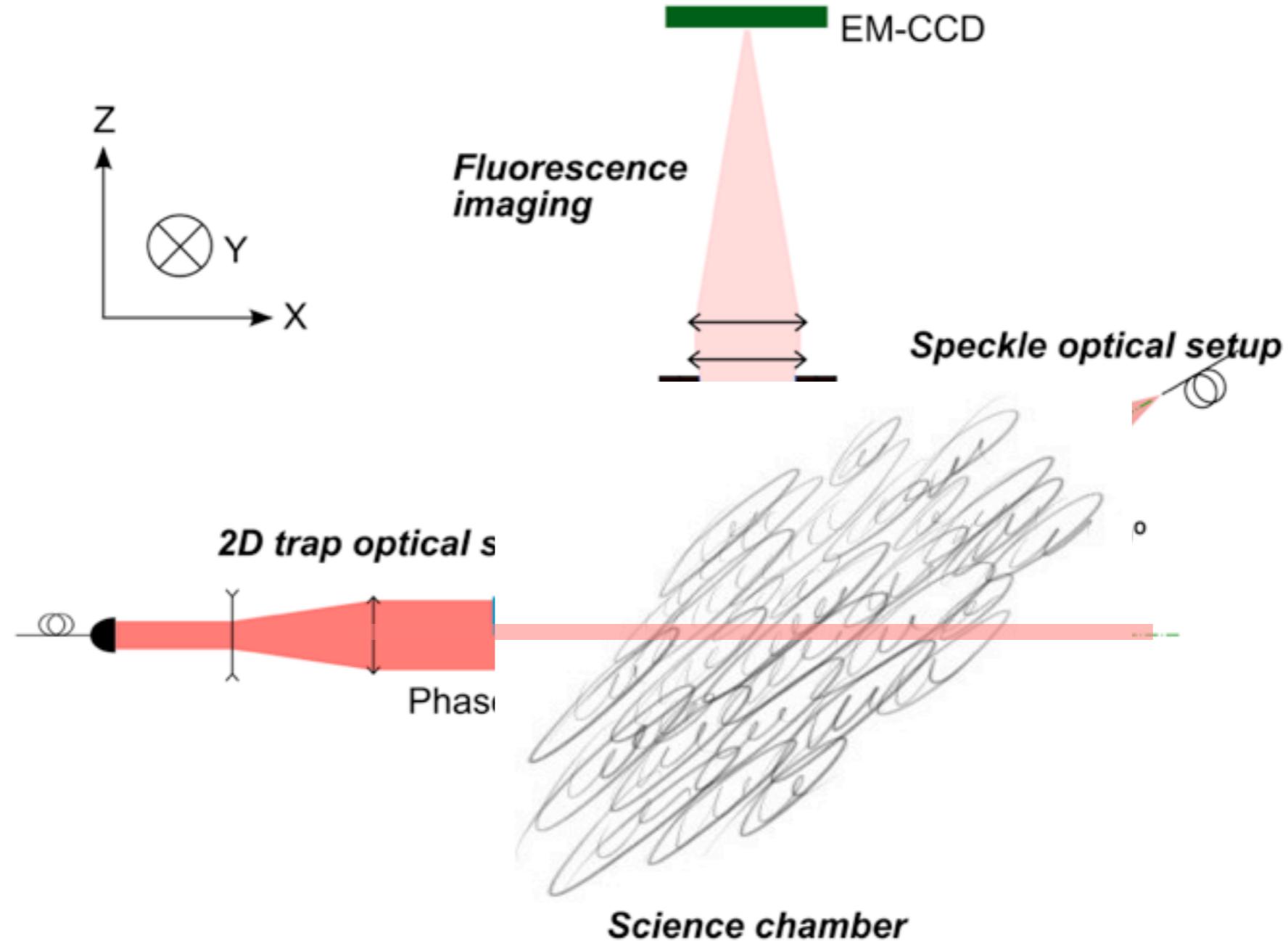

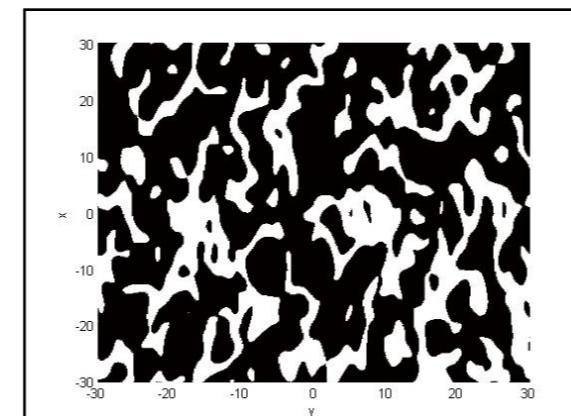

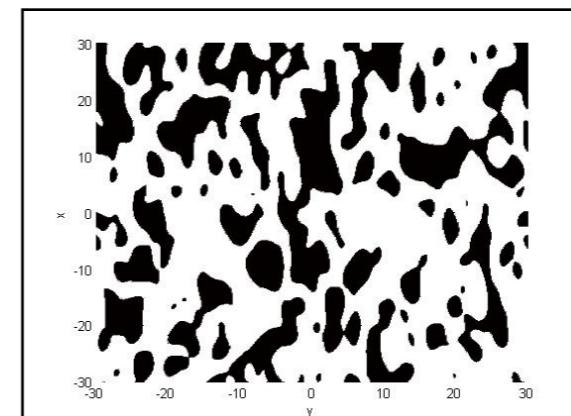
Below percolation threshold ($E \approx 0.5$ V) : trapping

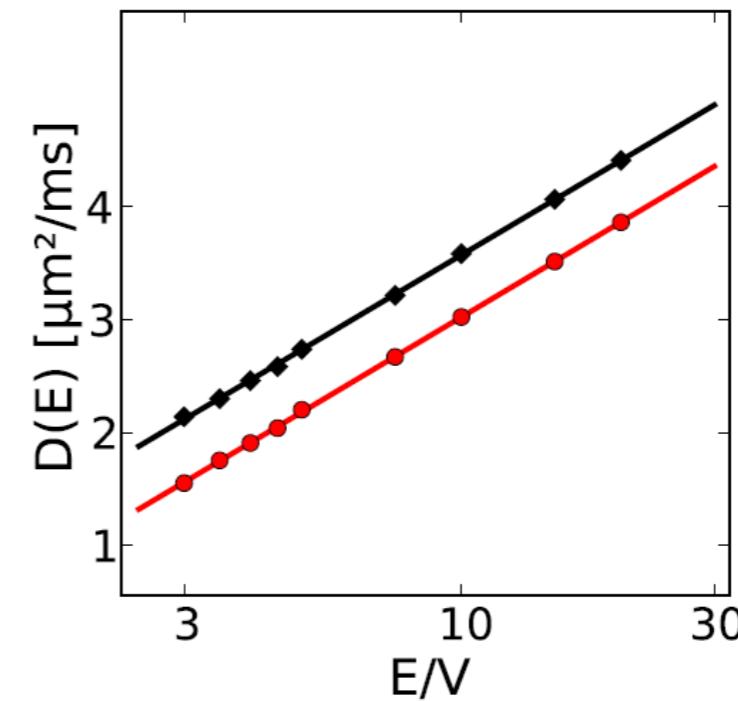
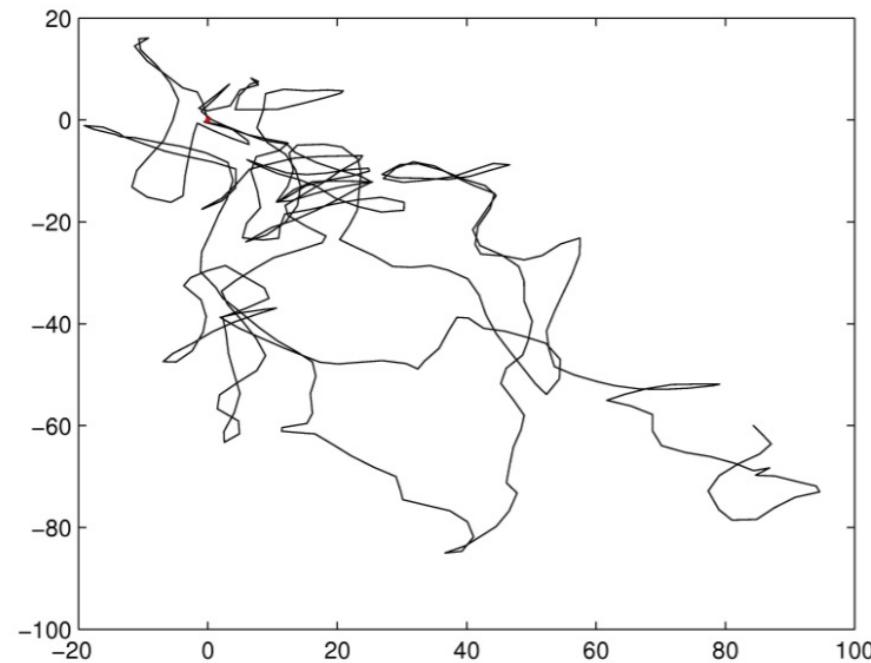
Below diffusion threshold ($E \approx 2$ V) : sub-diffusion

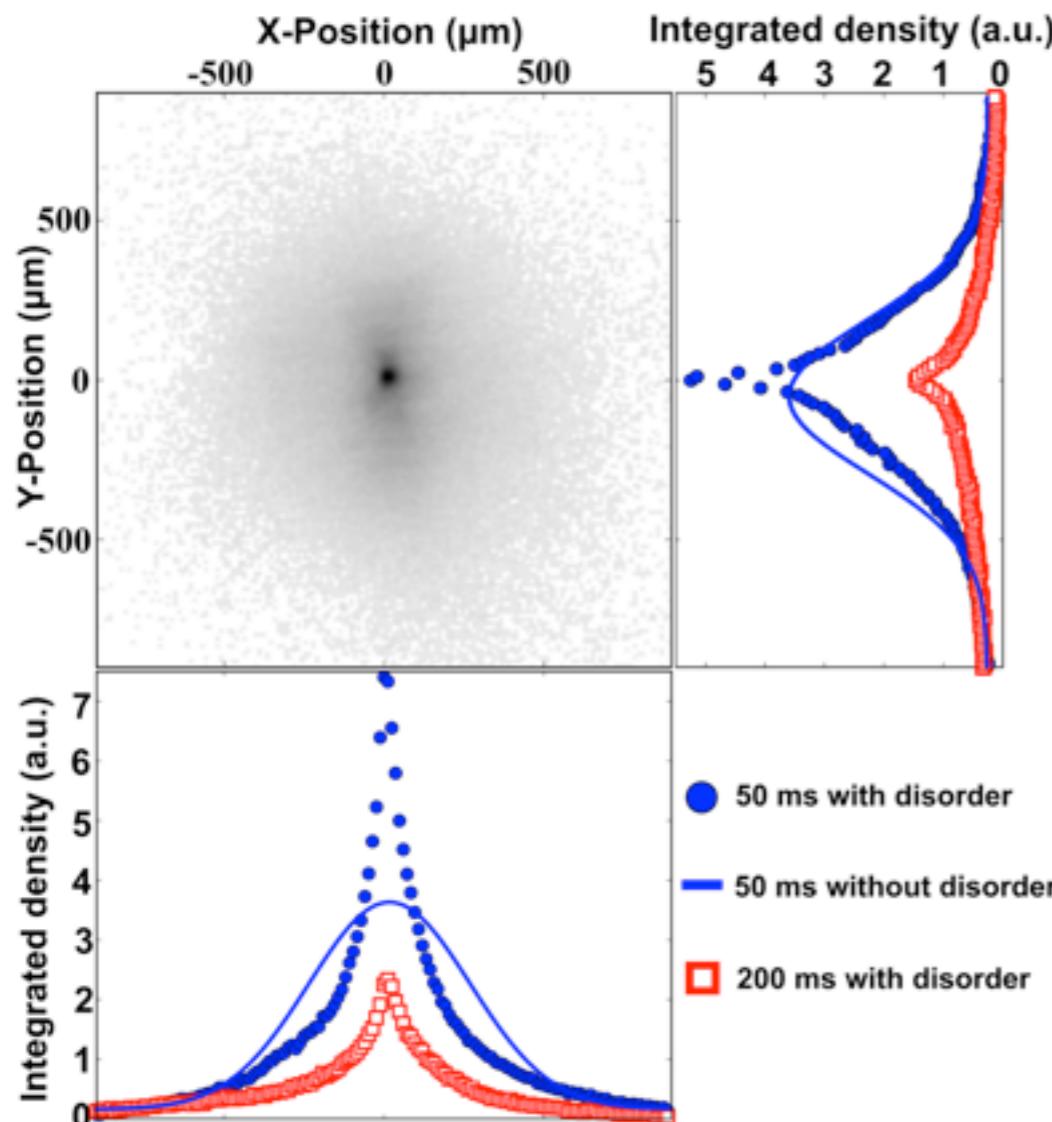

Profiles contain ballistic wings
+ diffusive central part

Diffusion coefficients : $D_{x,y}(E)$
Profile = $\sum_E \left(e^{\frac{-r^2}{D(E)t}} \right)$

Pb : what is $D(E)$?
weak scattering : $D(E) \sim D_0 E^\alpha$

$$D_0 \sim 0.13 \text{ mm}^2 \text{s}^{-1}; \alpha \sim 3$$

Understanding the rôle of disorder is fundamental in many field :

- **Optics (wave propagation, random lasers ...), electrons, ...** Storzer et al. Phys. Rev. Lett. 96, 063904 (2006), Schwartz et al. Nature 446, 52 (2007), Lahini, Y. et al. Phys. Rev. Lett. 100, 013906 (2008) ...
- **On cold atoms, many experiment using the “mapping” from quantum chaos (dynamical localisation) has been used :** Moore et al. PRL (1994), Chabé et al. (2007) ...
- **There are now many experiments studying BEC and disorder, addressing various aspects (propagation, lattice ...)** : Billy et al. Nature 453, 891(2008), Roati et al., Nature 453, 896 (2008), Chen et al. Physical Review A 77, 033632 (2008), Schulte et al., PRL 95, 170411(2005), White et al arxiv:0807.0446 (2008)

With atoms and disorder we can simulate transport in various configurations:

- Possibility to control all matter-wave parameter (velocity, density, interactions ...)
- Very good control and understanding on the disorder model (Speckle pattern well characterized ...)

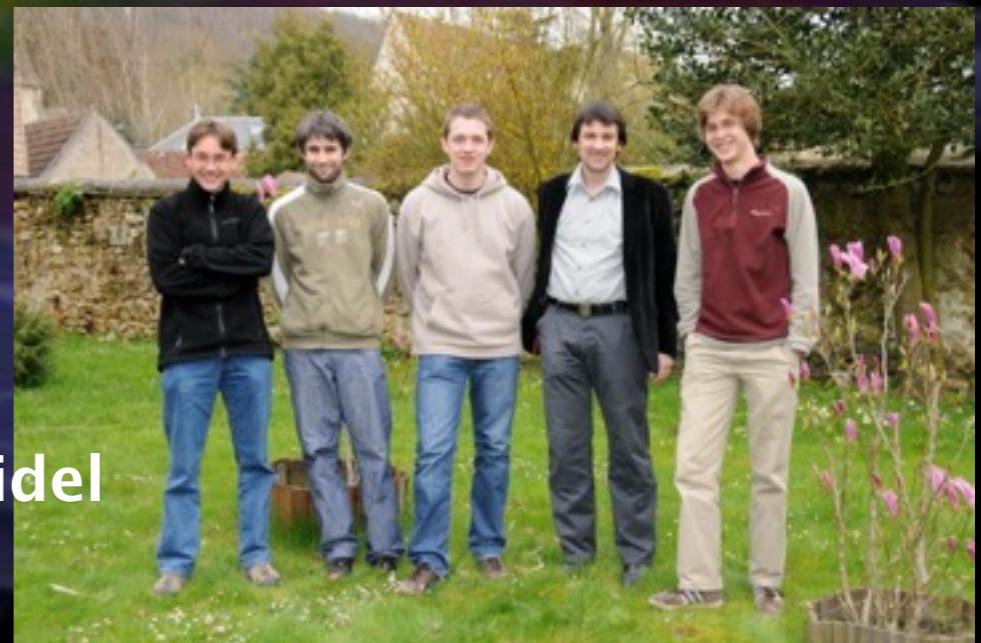
