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High-resolution infrared spectroscopy of $H^{12}C^{13}CD$ and $H^{13}C^{12}CD$ in the 470-5200 cm⁻¹ spectral region

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Abstract

The fundamental ro-vibrational bands and the $2v_4 \leftarrow GS$, $2v_5 \leftarrow GS$, $2v_3 \leftarrow GS$, $v_4 + v_5 \leftarrow GS$, $v_3 + v_4 \leftarrow GS$, $v_3 + v_4 \leftarrow v_4$, $v_3 + v_5 \leftarrow v_5$, overtone, combination and hot bands of the two rare isotopologues of acetylene $H^{12}C^{13}CD$ and $H^{13}C^{12}CD$ have been detected by Fourier transform infrared spectroscopy (FTIR). The analysis of the data has provided very accurate rotational and vibrational parameters for the ground and for the vibrationally excited states.

Introduction

Acetylene is a spectroscopically well known molecule. Its main isotopologues have been studied thoroughly and a large number of ro-vibrational parameters have been determined from very extensive sets of infrared data (see for example [1]).

For the two rare isotopomers, $H^{12}C^{13}CD$ and $H^{13}C^{12}CD$, only one experimental work [2], published in 1975, was found in the literature. In this paper, the authors analyzed the rotational structure of some infrared bands, namely $v_5 \leftarrow GS$ $v_3 \leftarrow GS$, $v_3 + v_4 \leftarrow v_4$, and $v_3 + v_5 \leftarrow v_5$. However, because of the low resolution, the spectroscopic parameters were determined with poor precision.

Very recently, Hardwick and coworkers [3] recorded a diode laser spectrum of these two species around 6500 cm⁻¹. They detected the $2v_1$ overtone band and fitted their data together with the v_3 and v_5 bands of Ref. [2] to improve the values of the ground state parameters B_0 and D_0 . In addition, precise values of the v_0 band origin and of the rotational and centrifugal distortion constants for the $v_1=2$ states were determined for both isotopomers.

Here, we present a high-resolution study of all the fundamental bands and of some overtone, combination and hot

bands of $\mathrm{H}^{12}\mathrm{C}^{13}\mathrm{CD}$ and $\mathrm{H}^{13}\mathrm{C}^{12}\mathrm{CD}$ in the spectral region up to 5200 $\mathrm{cm}^{-1}.$

Experimental details

The spectra of $H^{12}C^{13}CD$ and $H^{13}C^{12}CD$ were accidentally observed while recording the FTIR spectra of C₂HD and $H^{13}C^{12}CH$. In the former case the sample contained the ¹³C isotope in natural abundance, while in the latter case the studied isotopomers were due to accidental deuterium exchange with the wall of the cell. Details about the experiments, including the calibration procedure, can be found in Refs. [4-6].

The bands are generally weak or very weak and can be seen thanks to the excellent S/N ratio of the spectra. The worst case is shown in figure 1, containing the v_4 Q-branch of both isotopomers in the region of 500 cm⁻¹, where the HgCdTe detector has a very poor response. One of the best recordings is shown in figure 2. It displays the Q branch of the v_5 band of H¹³C¹²CD, at 674.2 cm⁻¹, which is probably the strongest feature in the whole spectrum. The v_5 Q branch of

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the other isotopomer at 677.9 cm⁻¹ falls among the very strong lines of the Q branch of the same band of ${}^{12}C_2HD$.

Results and discussion

Table 1 lists all the bands that we have identified for both isotopomers, the upper state G_c^0 term values, the range of Jvalues assigned in the *P*, *Q* and *R* sub-branches, the number of fitted transitions, and the standard deviation of the least-squares fits. Information about the $2v_1$ bands reported recently [3] are also included for completeness.

Most of the fundamental infrared bands of $H^{13}C^{12}CD$ are slightly more intense than the bands of the other species by a factor from 5 to 10%. However, it is difficult to make accurate considerations about the intensity of the bands, because the transitions observed are very weak and the S/N ratio generally is smaller than 10. A probable explanation could be a small difference between the transition moments of the two molecules. To confirm this hypothesis it would be necessary to perform very accurate intensity calculations at an anharmonic level.

As observed in the spectra of ${}^{12}C_{2}HD$ [4,5] and ${}^{13}C_{2}HD$ [7], the fundamental bands of the studied molecules do not show evident anomalies, due to systematic or accidental resonances (see figures 1 and 2). Therefore, all the data could be fitted using the basic Hamiltonian of a linear molecule with centrifugal distortion corrections up to the quartic term. In fact, the strong anharmonic resonances present in other isotopologues (i.e. 3/245 in ${}^{12}C_{2}H_{2}$ [8,9] and 1/255 in ${}^{13}C_{2}H_{2}$ [10]) are not effective here because of the large energy difference between the interacting states. For the bending modes, the ℓ -doubling parameters q_{ν} and q'_{ν} were included. The ro-vibrational energy term values are given by

with the - and + signs related to the e and f levels, respectively and $G_c^0 = G_v^0 - B_v k^2 - D_v k^4$, with G_v^0 the pure vibrational term value and $k = \ell_4 + \ell_5$.

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For most of the other bands, the fits improved considerably if higher-order centrifugal distortion terms were added in the model. In general, the sextic coefficient H could always be fitted; in some cases even the octic constant L could be determined. Usually, if the set of data includes transitions with J lower than 40, as in all the studied bands, only D is necessary to obtain good quality fits. This is confirmed by the fits of the fundamental bands. When higher-order terms are required, it might be the symptom of a resonance affecting the vibrational levels of the band considered. Since the discrepancies between observed and calculated values increase for increasing J's, it is reasonable to that the resonance terms include a rotational assume dependence. Although we believe that the determined H and Lare not effective distortion constants, we chose to fit them where necessary, in order to have comparable standard deviation of the fit for all bands. This way, the sets of parameters obtained from the analysis can be used to predict with good precision ro-vibrational transitions not observed in our spectra.

An example of a ro-vibrational resonance is evident in the pattern of the $v_3+v_4 \leftarrow v_4$ band of $H^{12}C^{13}CD$. The upper state (Π symmetry) is perturbed by a Coriolis interaction with the $v_2+v_4+v_5$ state (Σ^+ symmetry). By using x_{24} and x_{25} from ${}^{12}C_2HD$

[5], we calculated a vibrational term value of 3024 $\rm cm^{-1}$ for the Σ^+ state of H^{12}C^{13}CD and 3014 cm^{-1} for the Σ^+ state of $H^{13}C^{12}CD$. The energy separation between Π and Σ^+ states is 25 cm^{-1} for $H^{12}C^{13}CD$ and 67 for $H^{13}C^{12}CD$, calculated using the term values in table 1 for the Π states. The different energy gap would explain why a rotational perturbation is evident for the H¹²C¹³CD species only. It has to be pointed out that for the vibrational levels involving a double excitation of the bending modes, $2v_4 \leftarrow GS$, $2v_5 \leftarrow GS$, $v_4 + v_5 \leftarrow GS$, we detected only the Σ^+ states. Transitions involving the other Δ component of the manifold, and also the Σ^- state in the case of v_4+v_5 , were too weak to be observed from either $v_4=1$ or $v_5=1$ and are not allowed from the ground state. Therefore, l-type rotational and vibrational interactions between different levels of a manifold are not considered. This can account for the

anomalous values of the centrifugal distortion constants for these vibrational states.

Initially, the wavenumbers for each band were fitted to upper and lower state ro-vibrational parameters, in order to check the correctness of the assignments and to extend the data set. Identical unitary weights were assigned to all the

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transitions, except for the overlapped or very weak lines, which were given zero weight.

Once the single fits were satisfactory, all the data of each isotopomer were fitted together to provide a unique determination of the ground state parameters. The analysis consisted of the following steps. i) The combination differences (GSCD) from all the bands in table 1 starting from the ground state were fitted simultaneously to the best values of B_0 and D_0 . A total of 231 and 210 GSCD were fitted with a standard deviation of 35×10^{-5} and 39×10^{-5} cm⁻¹ for $H^{12}C^{13}CD$ and $H^{13}C^{12}CD$, respectively. ii) The single band fits (excluding the hot bands) were performed again constraining the ground state parameters to the values determined in step i). iii) For the hot bands, B_4 , D_4 , B_5 and D_5 were fixed to the values obtained in step ii). In each fit all the transition wavenumbers that differed from their calculated values by more than 0.001 cm^{-1} were excluded from the data set in the final cycle of the least-squares procedure. The spectroscopic parameters obtained in the final fits are listed in table 2.

The quality of the fits is very satisfactory, and the parameters show a remarkable improvement with respect to the previous work. They allow the calculation of the harmonic wavenumbers and the anharmonic constants listed in table 3 for both molecules. These values are consistent with the corresponding ones calculated from the parameters reported for ${}^{12}C_2HD$ [11] and ${}^{13}C_2HD$ [7].

The assigned transitions for all the analyzed bands, together with the corresponding observed-calculated values obtained using the parameters in table 2, are available from the authors.

Conclusions

The infrared spectrum of $H^{12}C^{13}CD$ and $H^{13}C^{12}CD$ has been detected in the 470-5200 cm⁻¹ spectral region. All the fundamental bands and some overtone, combination and hot bands have been analyzed. The spectroscopic parameters were determined with great accuracy from single band fits.

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The transitions of the $2v_1$ bands reported recently [3] were fitted using our new ground state constants for completeness. The values of the determined parameters for the $v_1=2$ states (see table 2) are, as expected, very close to those given in table 2 of [3].
