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Spectral triples for finitely generated groups.

Abstract

Using Cayley graphs and Clifford algebras, we are able to give spectral triples for a large class of finitely generated groups (perhaps all), such that the phase of the Dirac operator is generically non-trivial.

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1 Basic definitions

Definition 1.1. A spectral triple (A, H, D) is given by a unital \star -algebra A *representated on the Hilbert space* H*, and an unbounded operator* D*, called the Dirac operator, such that:*

- *1.* D *is self-adjoint.*
- 2. $(D^2 + I)^{-1}$ *is compact.*
- *3.* { $a \in \mathcal{A}$ | [D, a] ∈ $B(H)$ } *is dense in* \mathcal{A} *.*

See the article [\[2\]](#page-5-1) of G. Skandalis, dedicated to A. Connes and spectral triple.

Definition 1.2. *A group* Γ *is finitely generated if it exists a finite generating* set $S \subset \Gamma$. We always take S equals to S^{-1} and the identity element $e \notin S$. *We can also defined a group by generators and relations:* $\Gamma = \langle S | R \rangle$ *.*

2 Geometric construction

Definition 2.1. Let $\ell : \Gamma \to \mathbb{N}$ be the word length related to S. Let G be the *Cayley graph with the distance* $d(g, h) = \ell(gh^{-1})$, see [\[1\]](#page-5-2)*.*

Definition 2.2. Let $p : \Gamma \to \mathbb{N}$ with $p(q)$ the number of geodesic paths from g *to the identity element* e*, on the Cayley graph* G*.*

Definition 2.3. *Let* $p_s : \Gamma \to \mathbb{N}$ *with* $p_s(q)$ *the number of geodesic paths from* g to e, starting by $s \in S$. Then $\sum_{s \in S} p_s = p$.

Remark 2.4. *If* $p_s(g) \neq 0$ *then* $p_s(g) = p(gs)$ *.*

Definition 2.5. Let $\ell^2(\Gamma)$ be the canonical Hilbert space of base $(e_g)_{g \in \Gamma}$ and *let* ∂_s ($s \in S$) be the unbounded operator definited by:

$$
\partial_s.e_g = \frac{p_s(g)}{p(g)} \ell(g)e_g.
$$

 ∂_s *is a diagonal positive operator, so* $\partial_s^* = \partial_s$ *and* $\partial_s \partial_{s'} = \partial_{s'} \partial_s$.

Example 2.6. *Let* $\Gamma = \mathbb{Z}^2$, $S = \{a, a^{-1}, b, b^{-1}\}, R = \{aba^{-1}b^{-1}\}.$ Let $g = a^n b^m = (n, m)$ with $n, m \in \mathbb{N}$, then $\ell(g) = n + m$, $p(g) = C_{n+m}^n$, $p_{a^{-1}}(g) = C_{n+m-1}^{n-1}$, $p_{b^{-1}}(g) = C_{n+m-1}^{m-1}$, and so $\frac{C_{n+m-1}^{n-1}}{C_{n+m}^{n}}(n+m) = n$. Let $\partial_1 = \partial_{a^{-1}}$ *and* $\partial_2 = \partial_{b^{-1}}$ *, then:*

 $\partial_1 e_{(n,m)} = n e_{(n,m)}$ *and* $\partial_2 e_{(n,m)} = m e_{(n,m)}$,

as for the canonical derivations !

Example 2.7. *Let* $\Gamma = \mathbb{F}_2$, $S = \{a, a^{-1}, b, b^{-1}\}$, $R = \emptyset$. *Let* $g \in \mathbb{F}_2$, $g \neq e$, *then* $p(g) = 1$ *, let* $s \in S$ *with* $p_s(g) = 1$ *, then* $\partial_s e_g = \ell(g) e_g$ *.*

3 Clifford algebra

We quickly recall here the notion of Clifford algebra, for a more detailed exposition, see the course of A. Wassermann [\[3\]](#page-5-3).

Definition 3.1. Let $\Lambda(\mathbb{R}^S)$ be the exterior algebra equals to $\bigoplus_{k=0}^{2d} \Lambda^k(\mathbb{R}^d)$, with $2d = card(S)$ and $\Lambda^0(\mathbb{R}^d) = \mathbb{R}\Omega$. We called Ω the vacuum vector. *Recall that* $v_1 \wedge v_2 = -v_2 \wedge v_1$ *so that* $v \wedge v = 0$ *.*

Definition 3.2. Let a_v be the creation operator on $\Lambda(\mathbb{R}^S)$ defined by:

 $a_v(v_1 \wedge ... \wedge v_r) = v \wedge v_1 \wedge ... \wedge v_r$ and $a_v(\Omega) = v$

Reminder 3.3. The dual a_v^* is called the annihilation operator, then:

 $a_v^{\star}(v_1 \wedge ... \wedge v_r) = \sum_{i=0}^r (-1)^{i+1}(v, v_i)v_1 \wedge ... v_{i-1} \wedge v_{i+1} \wedge ... \wedge v_r$ and $a_v^{\star}(\Omega) = 0$

Reminder 3.4. Let $c_v = a_v + a_v^*$, then $c_v = c_v^*$ and $c_vc_w + c_wc_v = 2(v, w)I$.

Definition 3.5. The operators c_v generate the Clifford algebra Cliff(\mathbb{R}^S). *Note that the operators* c_v *are bounded and that Cliff*(\mathbb{R}^S). $\Omega = \Lambda(\mathbb{R}^S)$.

Remark 3.6. \mathbb{R}^S *admits the orthonormal basis* $(v_s)_{s \in S}$ *. We will write* c_s *instead of* c_{v_s} *, so that* $[c_s, c_{s'}]_+ = 2\delta_{s,s'}I$ *.*

4 Dirac operator and class C

Definition 4.1. Let H be the Hibert space $\Lambda(\mathbb{R}^S) \overline{\otimes} \ell^2(\Gamma)$, we define a self*adjoint operator* D *on a dense domain of* H *by:*

$$
D=\sum_{s\in S}c_s\otimes \partial_s.
$$

Lemma 4.2. $D^2 = I \otimes (\sum_{s \in S} \partial_s^2)$. *Proof.* $D^2 = \sum_{s,s'\in S} c_s c_{s'} \otimes \partial_s \partial_{s'} = \frac{1}{2}$ $\frac{1}{2}\sum(c_s c_{s'} + c_{s'} c_s) \otimes \partial_s \partial_{s'} = I \otimes (\sum \partial_s^2)$ \Box **Lemma 4.3.** $(D^2 + I)^{-1}$ *is compact.*

Proof. First of all $\dim(\Lambda(\mathbb{R}^S)) = 2^{2d} < \infty$. Next $\sum_{s \in S}$ $\frac{p_s(g)}{p(g)} = 1$, then it exists $s_o \in S$ such that $\frac{p_{s_o}(g)}{p(g)} \geq \frac{1}{2a}$ $\frac{1}{2d}$. Now $\sum_{s\in S} [\ell(g)\frac{p_s(g)}{p(q)}]$ $\frac{p_s(g)}{p(g)}]^2 \geq [\ell(g) \frac{p_{s_o}(g)}{p(g)}]$ $\frac{\log_2(g)}{p(g)}]^2 \geq \left[\frac{\ell(g)}{2d}\right]$ $\frac{(g)}{2d}]^2.$ \Box

Definition 4.4. *Let* C *be the class of finitely generated group* Γ *such that it exists a finite generating set* $S \subset \Gamma$ *(with* $S = S^{-1}$ *and* $e \notin S$ *) such that* $\forall s \in S \text{ and } \forall q, h \in \Gamma \text{ (with } h \neq e$:

$$
\left|\frac{p_s(gh)}{p(gh)} - \frac{p_s(h)}{p(h)}\right| \le \frac{K_g}{\ell(h)}
$$

with $K_g \in \mathbb{R}_+$ *depending only on g.*

Examples 4.5. *The class* C *is stable by direct or free product, it contains* \mathbb{Z}^n , \mathbb{F}_n , the finite groups, and probably every amenable or hyperbolic groups.

Question 4.6. *Does* C *contains every finitely generated groups ?*

From now, the group Γ is in the class \mathcal{C} .

Definition 4.7. *Let* $\mathcal{A} = C_r^* \Gamma$, *acting on* H *by* $I \otimes u_g$, $g \in \Gamma$ *.*

Proposition 4.8. $\{a \in \mathcal{A} \mid [D, a] \in B(H)\}\$ is dense in A.

Proof. $[D, u_g](\Omega \otimes e_h) = ... = (\sum_{s \in S} [\ell(gh) \frac{p_s(gh)}{p(gh)} - \ell(h) \frac{p_s(h)}{p(h)}])$ $\frac{\rho_s(h)}{p(h)}\big]v_s\big)\otimes e_{gh}.$ $\text{Now}\;|\ell(gh)\frac{p_s(gh)}{p(gh)}-\ell(h)\frac{p_s(h)}{p(h)}$ $\frac{p_s(h)}{p(h)} \vert \leq \ell(gh) \vert \frac{p_s(gh)}{p(gh)} - \frac{p_s(h)}{p(h)}$ $\frac{\rho_s(h)}{p(h)}|+|\ell(gh)-\ell(h)|\frac{p_s(h)}{p(h)}$ $p(h)$ $\leq K_g \frac{\ell(gh)}{\ell(h)} + \ell(g) \leq K_g(\ell(g) + 1) + \ell(g)$. It's bounded in h.

 \Box

Theorem 4.9. (A, H, D) *is a spectral triple. The phase of* D *is generically non-trivial.*

5 The class $\widetilde{\mathcal{C}}$

Definition 5.1. Let $\alpha \geq 1$, let $p(g, \alpha)$ be the number of paths of lenght $\leq \alpha \ell(g)$ *, from g to e, and let* $p_s(g, \alpha)$ *be the number of such paths starting by* $s \in S$ *.*

Definition 5.2. Let \widetilde{C} be the class of finitely generated group Γ such that it *exists a finite generating set* $S \subset \Gamma$ *(with* $S = S^{-1}$ *and* $e \notin S$ *)*, $\exists \alpha \geq 1$ *, such that* $\forall s \in S$ *and* $\forall q, h \in \Gamma$ *(with* $h \neq e$ *):*

$$
|\frac{p_s(gh, \alpha)}{p(gh, \alpha)} - \frac{p_s(h, \alpha)}{p(h, \alpha)}| \le \frac{K_g}{\ell(h)}
$$

with $K_q \in \mathbb{R}_+$ *depending only on g.*

Theorem 5.3. *Let* Γ *be a group on the class* \widetilde{C} *for a fixed* $\alpha \geq 1$ *, and let* D_{α} *defined as previously using* $\partial_{s,\alpha} e_g := \frac{p_s(g,\alpha)}{p(g,\alpha)}$ $\frac{\partial s(g,\alpha)}{\partial p(g,\alpha)}\ell(g)e_g,$ then (\mathcal{A},H,D_α) *is a spectral triple and the phase of* D_{α} *is generically non-trivial.*

Remark 5.4. *The class* \widetilde{C} *contains the class* C *, but it's not clear that it contains anything else. The same question is asked: does* C *contains the amenable groups, the hyperbolic groups or every finitely generated groups ?*
