Decreased Susceptibility to Doxycycline Associated with a 16S rRNA Gene Mutation in *Brachyspira hyodysenteriae* 

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1	Abstract
2	The objective of this study was to assess whether nucleotide substitutions in the 16S rDNA
3	sequence of selected Brachyspira hyodysenteriae isolates could explain differences in
4	doxycycline minimal inhibitory concentrations (MICs). The main part of the 16S rRNA gene was
5	sequenced and compared for 19 isolates with different doxycycline MICs. A mutation in the 16S
6	rRNA gene at the position corresponding to 1058 in Escherichia coli has been shown to cause
7	tetracycline resistance in other bacteria. In the <i>B. hyodysenteriae</i> sequences a G1058C mutation
8	was found for all isolates with increased doxycycline MICs whereas all susceptible isolates had
9	the wild type sequence.

15	1. Introduction
16	
17	The anaerobic spirochete <i>Brachyspira hyodysenteriae</i> is the causative agent of swine dysentery
18	(Taylor and Alexander, 1971), a major disease of pigs world-wide. Doxycycline susceptibility
19	tests of B. hyodysenteriae isolates reveal two groups with different minimal inhibitory
20	concentrations (MICs), one highly susceptible (MIC 0.125-0.25 $\mu g/ml$ ) and one with decreased
21	susceptibility (MIC 1-4µg/ml) (Karlsson et al., 2004). Tetracyclines bind to the 30S ribosomal
22	subunit and thereby inhibit the elongation step during the protein synthesis. Recently, when
23	complexes of tetracycline and the 30S subunit from <i>Thermus thermophilus</i> were analysed by X-
24	ray crystallography, multiple binding sites were identified (Brodersen et al., 2000; Pioletti et al.,

2001). At the binding site with the highest degree of tetracycline occupancy, designated Tet-1,
the attachment of aa-tRNA to the A-site is blocked (Pioletti et al., 2001). A G→C mutation in the
16S rRNA gene corresponding to the position 1058 in Escherichia coli has been shown to cause
tetracycline resistance in cutaneous propionibacteria (Ross et al., 1998). This nucleotide position
is close to Tet-1, but does not affect the binding site directly. It has been suggested that this
mutation could hinder the base pairing of G1058 with U1199, thus altering conformation and
impede binding of tetracycline (Pioletti et al., 2001). An eightfold increase in MIC of tetracycline
has been shown for an E. coli G1058C mutant constructed by site-directed mutagenesis and the
binding of the drug to the ribosome was decreased to less than half compared to the wild type
(Nonaka et al., 2005). Besides altering or protecting the ribosomal target structures other
mechanisms conferring tetracycline resistance include efflux pumps and enzymatic inactivation
of the drug.
No genetic background for decreased susceptibility to tetracyclines has previously been described
for Brachyspira spp. To assess whether any nucleotide changes could explain the doxycycline
MIC differences, 16S rDNA sequences were analysed for B. hyodysenteriae isolates with
different doxycycline MICs.

2. Materials and methods  The main part of the 16S rDNA sequence (1434 positions) was determined for 19 B.

samples taken at different sampling occasions from herds throughout Sweden. Isolates with				
increased doxycycline MICs are uncommon in Sweden and therefore German field isolates were				
also included. The DNA sequencing and the antimicrobial susceptibility tests were performed as				
described previously (Johansson et al., 2004; Karlsson et al., 2003).				
3. Results and discussion				
The doxycycline MICs and the sequence adjacent to position 1058 (E. coli numbering) for the 19				
isolates of <i>B. hyodysenteriae</i> are presented in Table 1. All isolates with elevated doxycycline				
MICs had a G1058C mutation whereas all susceptible isolates had the wild type sequence. An				
alignment of the 19 sequences showed a total of 10 other nucleotide differences, not within the				
described tetracycline binding sites. However, three German isolates (T23, A 5677/96 and A				
4974/96) with decreased doxycycline susceptibility also had a C1200A mutation, next to U1199,				
the pairing nucleotide to G1058. Despite the closeness to position G1058 there was no difference				
between the doxycycline MICs for these isolates compared to the other G1058C mutated isolates.				
No difference in vigour when grown on agar plates was observed between the wild type and				
mutated isolates. The sequences were deposited in GenBank (accession nos. see Table 1).				
In Helicobacter pylori and laboratory derived mutants of E. coli, mutations in position 965-967				
cause tetracycline resistance (Dailidiene et al., 2002; Gerrits et al., 2002; Nonaka et al., 2005;				
Trieber and Taylor, 2002). No nucleotides differences were found at, or nearby, these positions in				
the Brachyspira sequences.				

73	There is only one copy each of the ribosomal RNA genes in <i>B. hyodysenteriae</i> (Zuerner and
74	Stanton, 1994), and single step mutations in 16S rRNA consequently dominate. To our
75	knowledge, the only bacterial genus in which the mutation in position 1058 has been described
76	before is <i>Propionibacterium</i> (Ross et al., 1998). Other common features for propionibacteria and
77	Brachyspira spp. are the low number of ribosomal RNA (rrn) operons and their mechanism for
78	resistance to macrolides and lincosamides. In both genera, this resistance is caused by mutations
79	in 23S rDNA (Karlsson et al., 1999; Ross et al., 1997). Conversely bacteria with a high copy
80	number of <i>rrn</i> operons are more likely to have transferable genes causing resistance to antibiotics
81	that bind to the ribosome. The relationship between the number of <i>rrn</i> operon and macrolide
82	resistance mechanisms has been reviewed by Vester and Douthwaite (Vester and Douthwaite,
83	2001). Thus the mutation described herein could well be found in other bacteria with a low
84	number of <i>rrn</i> operons, such as other spirochetes or <i>Mycoplasma</i> spp.

86	In conclusion a G1058C mutation in the 16S rRNA gene is associated with low level resistance in
87	B. hyodysenteriae and spread of this resistance determinant will depend on the mutation rate and
88	the ability of mutant clones to multiply (vertical transmission) with no risk for co-transfer of, and
89	selection for, other resistance mechanisms.
