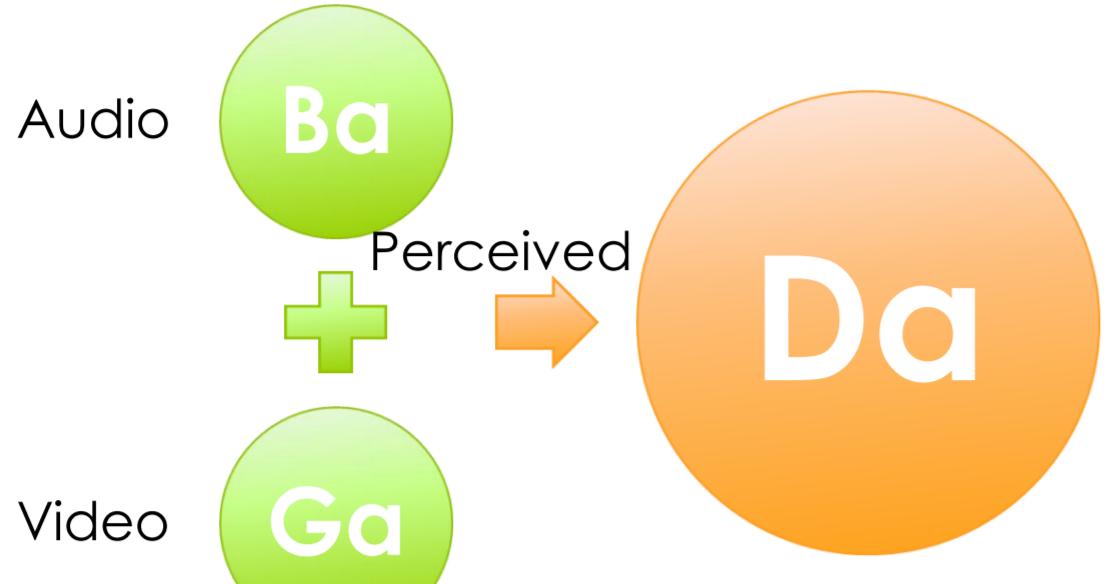
Removing the McGurk effect by an incoherent preceding audiovisual context

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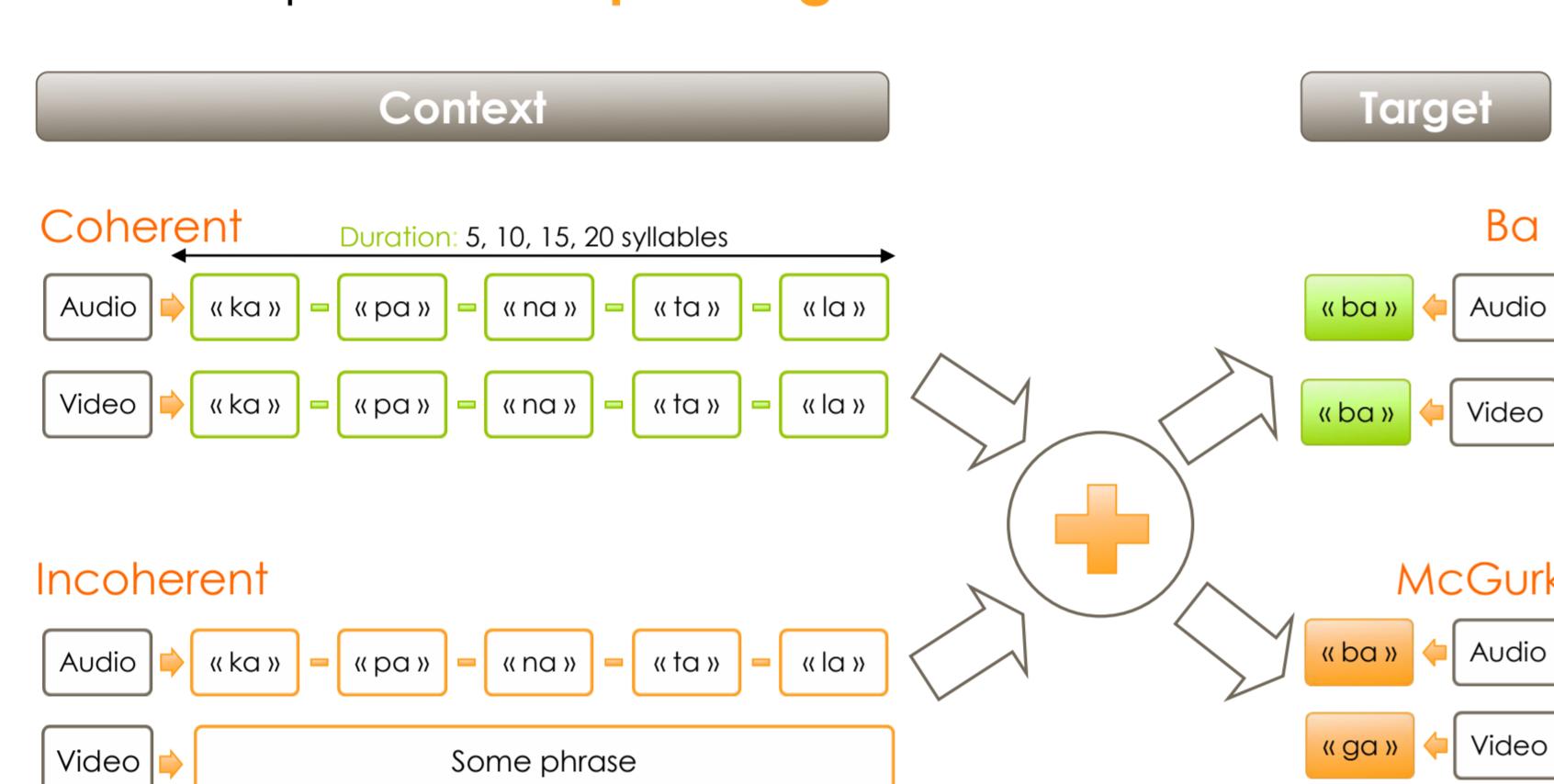
McGurk effect

- Is an indicator of audiovisual fusion



Experiment 1

- Aim:** Attempting to «disrupt» fusion. The McGurk effect is taken as an indicator of fusion. A « McGurk » target is preceded by 2 types of contexts: coherent vs. incoherent
 - Coherent context is generated by sequences of 5 to 20 French CV syllables within: « pa », « ta », « va », « fa », « za », « sa », « ka », « ra », « la », « ja », « cha », « ma », « na »
 - Incoherent context: same audio content, video content is replaced by random sentences
- Experimental paradigm**



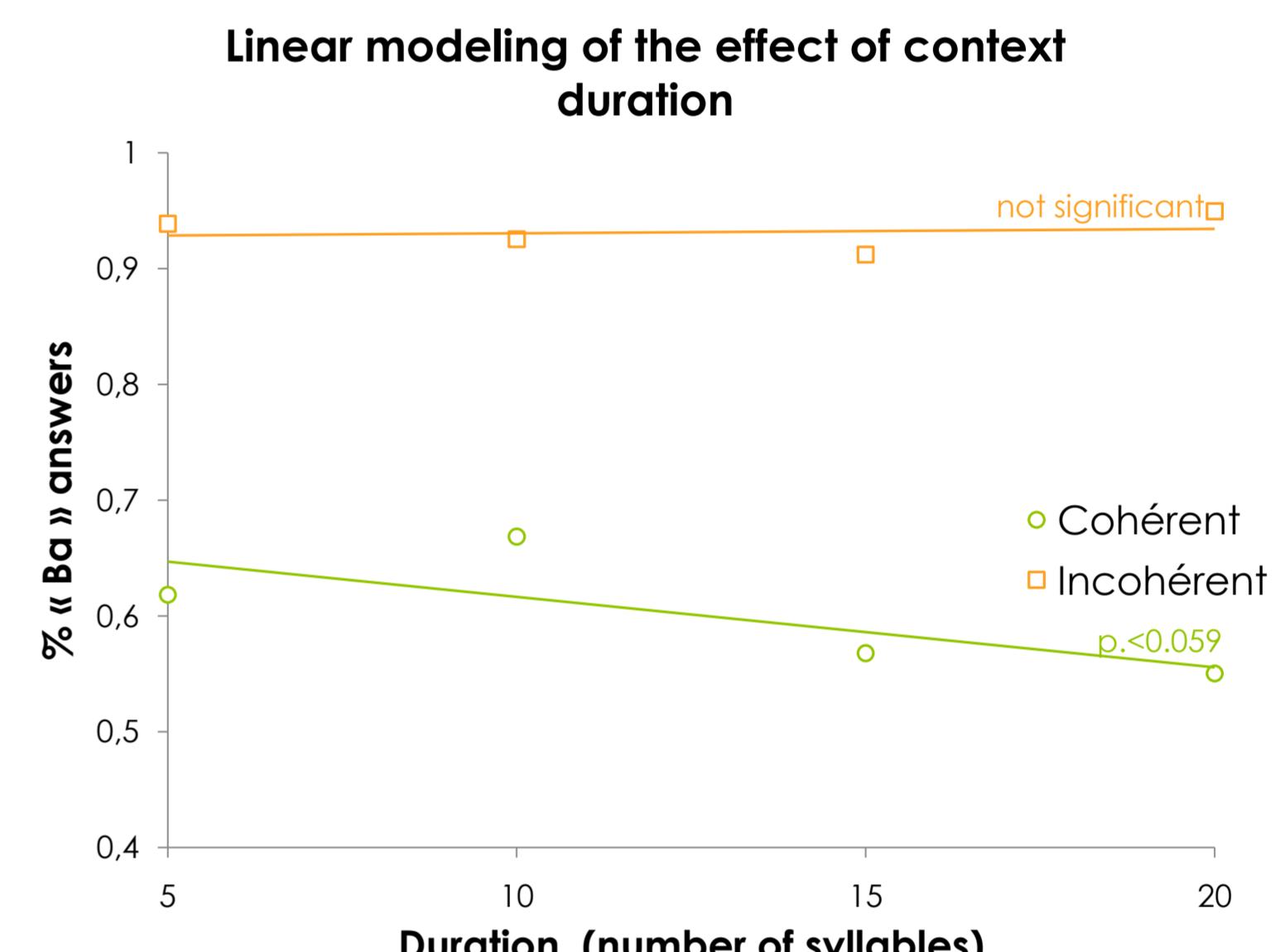
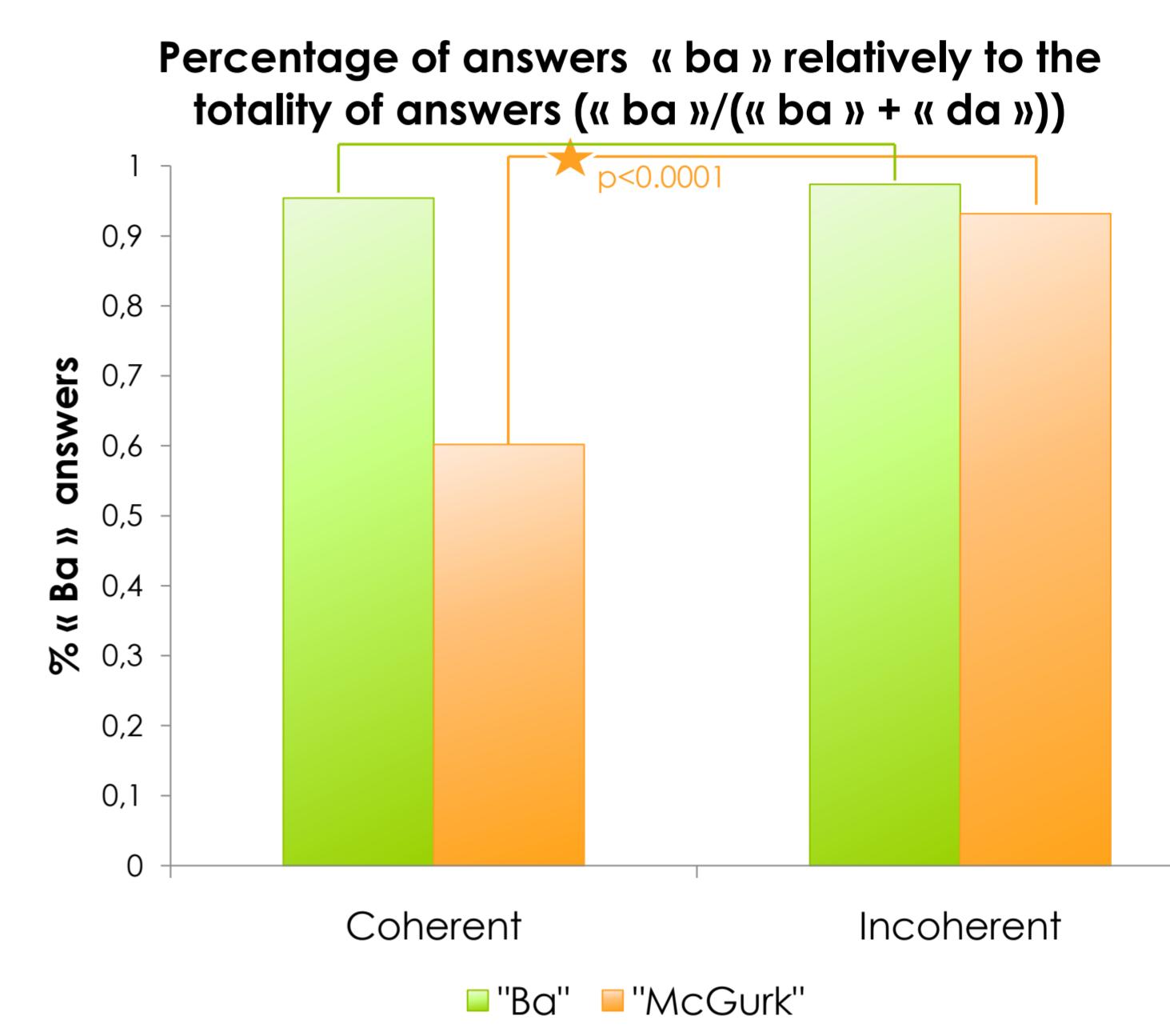
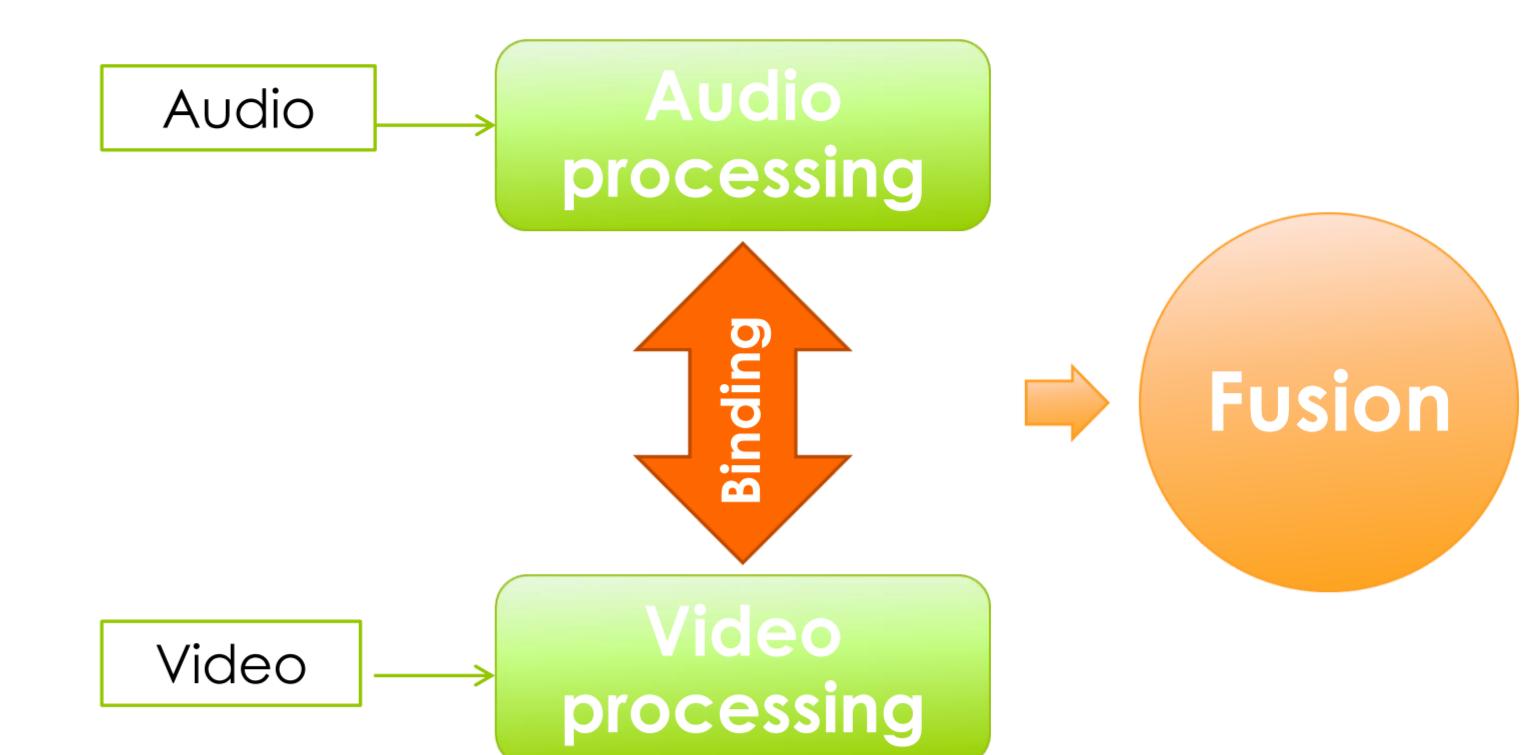
- Dubbing:** Audio-visual synchrony is ensured at the beginning of the consonant (acoustic burst)

Is fusion automatic?

- In the literature it is considered to be automatic

We suppose it is NOT

- We try to show that it is modulated by the preceding context
- This would suggest the existence of a binding process preceding fusion



Experiment 2

- Aim:** Studying the influence of attention on the audiovisual « binding » process
- The experimental **paradigm** is the same, but the target is preceded by an audiovisual alert

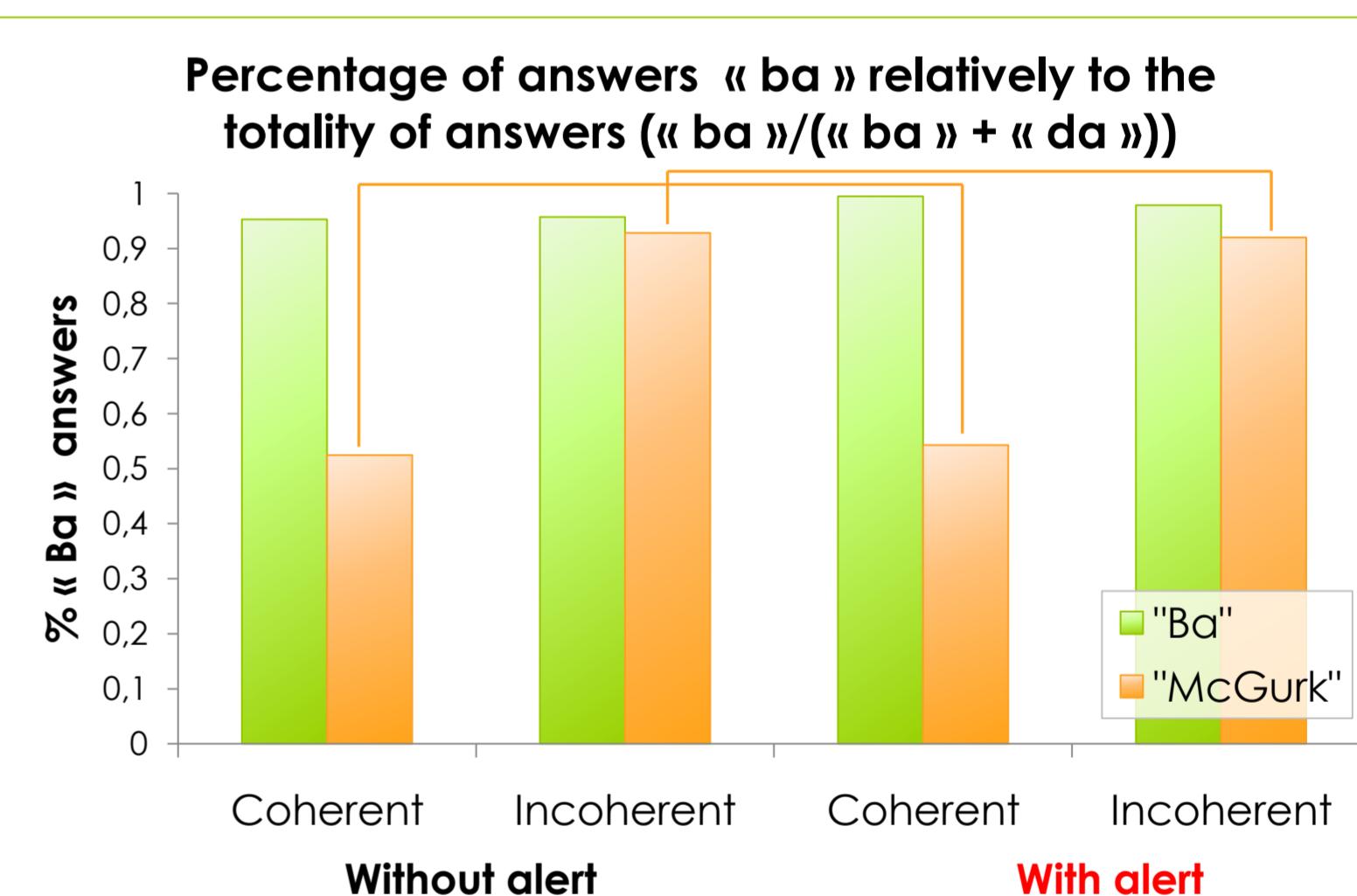


- 20 French **subjects** with normal or corrected audition and vision

- Results :** Almost exactly the same results: the alert signal does not change anything

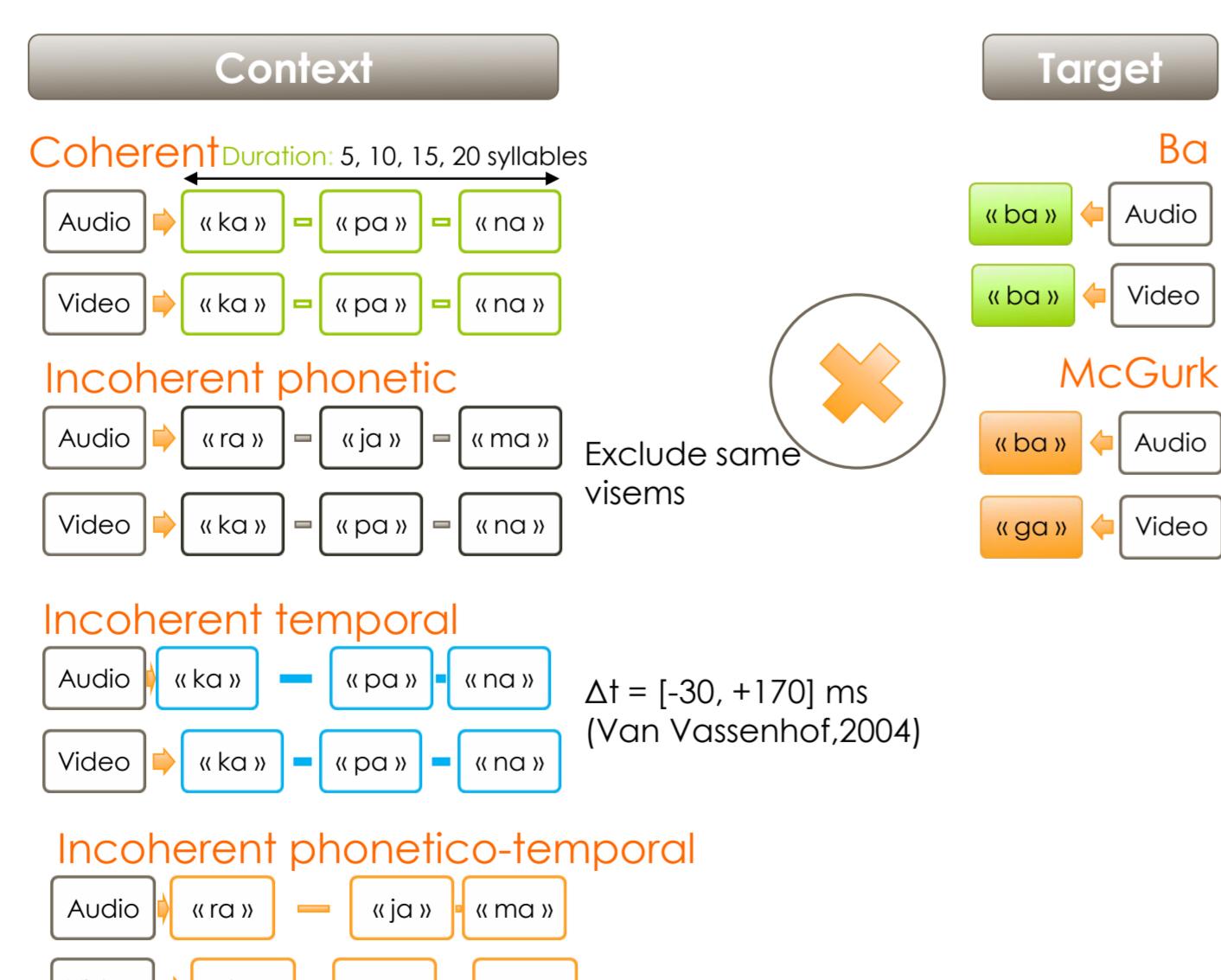
Conclusion

- There is no role of the alert signal



Experiment 3

- Aim:** Attempting to decompose the mechanisms of « binding »/« unbinding » on the phonetic and temporal factors
- The experimental **paradigm** is the same as in experiment 1, but the strong incoherent context (sentences) is replaced by finely controlled phonetic or temporal mismatches



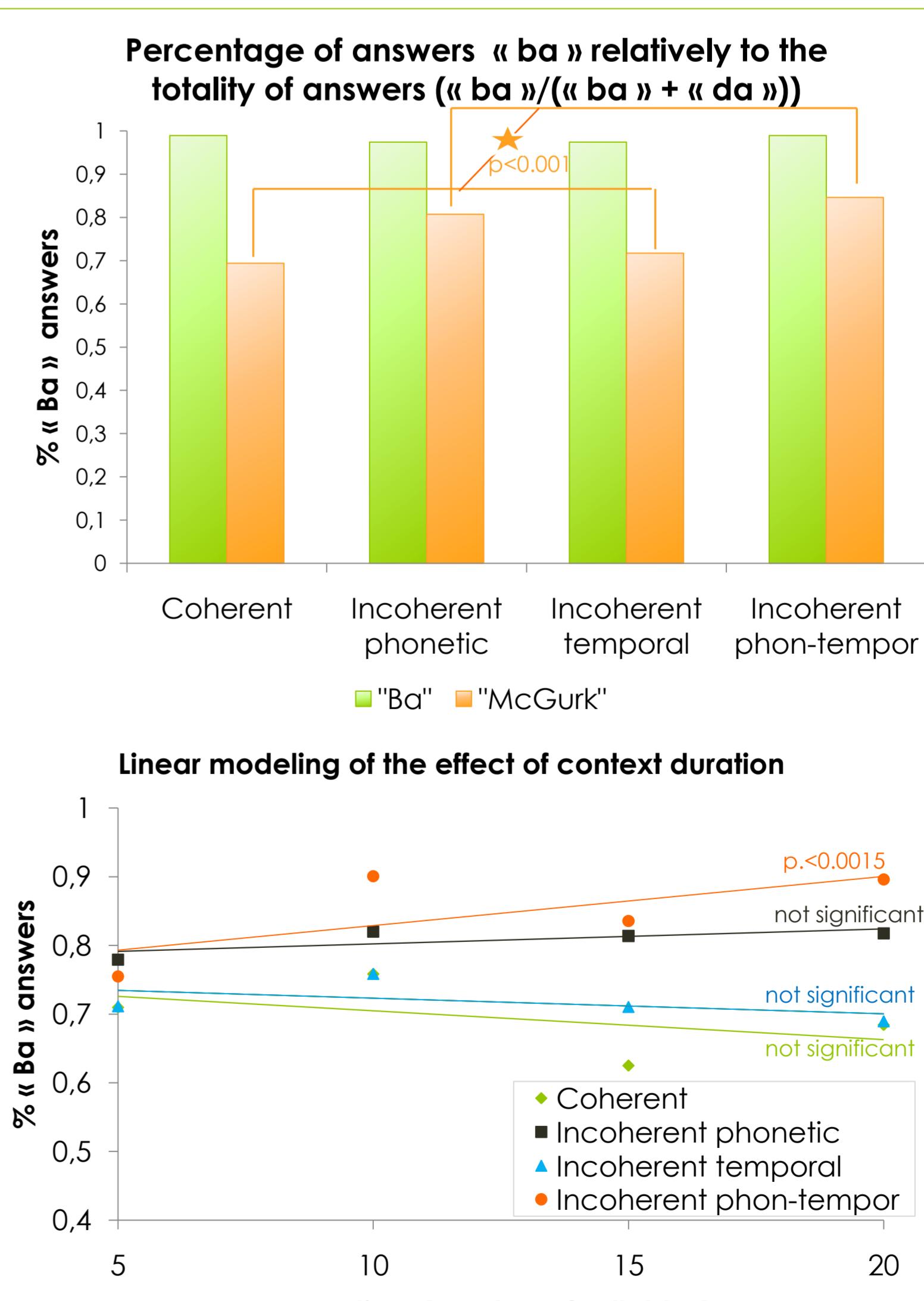
- 20 french **subjects** with normal or corrected audition and vision

Results :

- Pure phonetic incoherence products an effect
- No significant effect of pure temporal incoherence [-30, +170 ms]
- Duration plays a significant role for the phonetic-temporal incoherent context

Conclusion

- Better knowledge of the role of phonetic and temporal factors in unbinding
- « Unbinding » can also be progressive



General conclusions

- The McGurk effect is modulated by the preceding context (conditional binding). It is not automatic
- The alert signal is not sufficient to re-establish binding, even partially
- The binding process is slow and gradual, but the unbinding process can be fast and complete in the case of strong incoherence. It can also be slow and gradual in the case of pure phonetic incoherence
- There is no effect of pure temporal incoherence in the [-30, +170] ms window.
