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#### Glass formation in the As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub>-As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>-Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> system

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#### Abstract

Chalcogenide glasses from the As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub>-As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>-Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> system were synthesized for the first time. The glass-forming region was determined by X-ray diffraction and electron microscopic analyses.

The basic physicochemical parameters such as density (d), microhardness (HV) and temperatures of phase transformations (glass transition  $T_g$ , crystallization  $T_{cr}$  and melting  $T_m$ ) were measured. Compactness and some thermomechanical characteristics such as volume (V<sub>h</sub>) and formation energy (E<sub>h</sub>) of micro-voids in the glassy network as well as the elasticity module (E) were calculated. The glass-forming ability was evaluated according to Hruby's criteria (K<sub>G</sub>). The correlation between composition and properties of the (As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub>)<sub>x</sub>(As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>)<sub>y</sub>(Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>)<sub>z</sub> glasses was established and comprehensively discussed.

#### Introduction

The chalcogenide glasses can be obtained by joined melting of elements from the chalcogenides group (S, Se and Te) with other elements, most often from the V<sup>th</sup> (As, Sb) and 4<sup>th</sup> (Ge, Si) group of the Periodic table of elements. These glasses are unique due to their property to transmit light in the near and middle infra red parts of the spectra (from ~ 1 to > 18  $\mu$ m [1]) and by to this reason they are convenient for construction of IR-sensors, CO<sub>2</sub> lasers with application in the microsurgery, as well as for optical transport and storage media. These glasses are semiconductors with band gap values from 1 to 3 eV [1,2].

The As and the Te form glasses in a narrow concentration area, which is in the range from 42 to 52 at. % Te (when cooled on air) and 54 at. % Te (when quenched in cold water) [3].

The addition of third component to the As-Te system leads to enlargement of the glass forming region [4-12].

The glasses from the As-Te-Sb system are perspective material for the integral microelectronics, but the glass forming region in this system is very narrow [12], since there is no element in this system, which is a typical glass formator.

The introduction of Se will improve the glass formation in the As-Te-Sb system by widening the glass forming region and at the same time will not decrease significantly the mean molecule mass of the system. On the other hand the introduction of As and Sb in the form of their stable tellurides  $As_2Te_3$  and  $Sb_2Te_3$ , respectively, and of Se – in the form of  $As_2Se_3$  will keep this tendency. The transformation of the As-Te-Sb system, after substitution of a part of the tellurium with Se, into the  $As_2Se_3-As_2Te_3$ - $Sb_2Te_3$  system presumes wider glass forming region (higher solubility of components

with near chemical and structural composition), higher crystallization stability, keeping to a certain degree the properties of the glasses from the elemental system, etc.

The aim of the present work is the outlining of the glass forming region of the As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub>-As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>-Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> system and the determination of the basic characteristics of the glasses in it.

#### **Experimental procedures**

The glass forming region in the  $As_2Se_3-As_2Te_3-Sb_2Te_3$  system was outlined by the help of 27 compositions – Table 1.

Table 1. Compositions used for outlining the glass forming region in the As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub>-As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>-Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> system (m=y/(x+y))

The starting compounds  $Me_nCh_m$  (Me=As and Sb; Ch=Se and Te) and the glasses (4g) from the  $(As_2Se_3)_x(As_2Te_3)_y(Sb_2Te_3)_z$  system were synthesized by direct mono-temperature synthesis in sealed under residual pressure of  $1.10^{-3}$  Pa quartz ampoules. The initial materials used for the synthesis of the  $Me_nCh_m$  compounds were Se and Te with purity 5N (Fluka) and As and Sb – 3N5 (Merck). The synthesis characteristics (temperatures and duration of the isothermal steps, as well as heating rate between them) were in conformity to the physical and chemical features of the starting components, the intermediate and the final phases. At the maximum synthesis temperature of the glasses (700±10 °C) a vibration stirring of the smelter with duration 2 hours was performed. The last was tempered at temperature of 650±10 °C and quenched in ice+water mixture with cooling rate 10-15 °C s<sup>-1</sup>.

The obtained bulk samples were investigated through XRD (diffractometer TUR-M16 with  $CuK_{\alpha}$ -radiation and Ni-filter) and EMA (electronic microscope TEM Philips-3003).

The characteristic temperatures of the glasses were defined by differential thermal analysis (DTA) using apparatus from the F.Paulic-J.Paulic-L.Erdey system of the company MOM-Hungary at heating rate of 10 °C min<sup>-1</sup>, standard substance –  $\alpha$ -Al<sub>2</sub>O<sub>3</sub> and accuracy of ± 5 °C.

The density (d) of the samples was measured with accuracy  $\pm 5$  % at air temperature of 25-30 °C by the hydrostatic method using toluene as immersion fluid. The density of toluene is defined from the equation: d = 0.879 - 0.001T, where T is the temperature [°C], at which the measurement was made.

The microhardness (HV) was measured by the Vickers' method (a metallographic microscope MIM-7 with built in microhardnessmeter PMT-3 has been used at load of 10 g). The working values of HV are an average value of 20 measurements per sample; accuracy  $-\pm 5$  %.

The elasticity module (E), the minimal volume of the micro-voids ( $V_h$ ), the energy for their formation ( $E_h$ ) and the Hruby's criteria ( $K_G$ ) [13] were calculated by the Eqs. (1) and (2) [14]:

where  $T_g$ ,  $T_{cr}$  and  $T_m$  are the temperatures of glass transition, crystallization and melting.

#### **Results and discussion**

The observations with non-armed eye and binocular magnifier  $(4^x)$  show that the synthesized samples from the As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub>-As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>-Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> system were dark colored, with strong luster and shell-like surface.

The results from the XRD show that some of the compositions (group a) are amorphous, without peaks on the diffractograms and with the characteristic X-ray amorphous plateau – these compositions form the glass forming region (Fig. 1). Other compositions (group b, Fig. 1b) show diffraction peaks with small intensity (compositions on the region's boundary). The diffractograms of the samples from group c show well expressed peaks. These samples are crystalline and get outside the region of glass formation (Fig. 1c).

The EMA investigations show smooth and homogenous surface for the samples from group a and for the compositions of group b small crystalline objects (microcrystals) appear. The surface of the samples from group c is rough, without the characteristic for the glassy phase regions.

The region of glass formation in the  $As_2Se_3-As_2Te_3-Sb_2Te_3$  system (Fig. 2), outlined on the basis of the results from the XRD and EMA analyses, is drawn to the  $As_2Se_3$ -rich region, lies fully on the  $As_2Se_3-As_2Te_3$  side (from 0 to 100 mol %  $As_2Se_3$ ) and partially on the  $As_2Se_3-Sb_2Te_3$  side (from 0 to 38 mol %  $Sb_2Te_3$ ). Glasses have not been obtained in the  $As_2Te_3-Sb_2Te_3$  system.

The investigated thermal characteristics  $T_g$ ,  $T_{cr}$  and  $T_m$  of the samples, defined by DTA, are shown in Table 2. Some samples typical derivatograms are presented at figure 3. The different effects could be seen on the thermograms. The first is connected to the glass transition temperature (change of the angle coefficient of the  $T(\tau)$ dependence); the second is exothermal with well expressed maximum and is related to the crystallization process; the last effect is endothermal and is obtained as result of the melting of already crystallized phase or solid solution.

The temperature of glass transition  $T_g$  varies in the range 125-165 °C (Table 2).

It decreases slightly with the increment of the  $As_2Te_3$  content and relatively more strongly with the addition of  $Sb_2Te_3$ . This course of the  $T_g(m)$  and  $T_g(z)$  dependencies is logical, since the glass forming ability decreases in the row  $As_2S_3 \rightarrow As_2Se_3 \rightarrow As_2Te_3$ , while the  $Sb_2Te_3$  is a crystalline substance and has never been obtained in glassy state.

In dependence of the composition, the crystallization temperature  $T_{cr}$  varies in the range 177-229 °C (Table 2). On the thermogram of glass with composition  $(As_2Se_3)_{81}(As_2Te_3)_9(Sb_2Te_3)_{10}$  were not registered crystallization and melting effects which shows that this glass is stable and most probably  $As_2Te_3$  and  $Sb_2Te_3$  are built in the structure of the glass formator  $As_2Se_3$  in a way, which prevents the structural reorganizations leading to the amorphous-crystalline state transition. The lack of crystalline phase expels the existence of clearly presented endothermal melting effect. The stability of the glass determines the presence of "diluted" protuberance in a direction corresponding to the endoeffect.

For the compositions, corresponding to points 27, 7 and 12 (Table 1), situated near the glass formation border, two crystallization and melting temperatures were registered – Table 2. The presence of two exoeffects, corresponding to  $T_{cr}$ , is logical since the probability of crystallization of more than one phase (solid solutions based on As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> and Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>) is fairly larger.

 $T_{cr}$  depends slightly of the As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> concentration, since the As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub> and As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> are isomorphous, and much strongly from the concentration of Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>, as the addition of this component to As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub> requires more complicated changes in the structure of the glass: partial substitution of As- with Sb- and of Se- with Te-atoms.

The melting temperature  $T_m$  is in the range 320-377 °C (Table 2). The abovesaid for  $T_{cr}$  is valid also for the  $T_m$ , since  $T_m(Sb_2Te_3) > T_m(As_2Se_3) \cong T_m(As_2Te_3)$ 

The Hruby's criteria  $K_G$  gives qualitative idea for the glass forming ability of the alloys.  $K_G$  changes in narrow limits (Table 2), as with the increment of the content of  $As_2Te_3$  (z=const) and  $Sb_2Te_3$  (m=const) slightly decreases, which as it has been mentioned above, is due to the characteristics of the  $As_2Te_3$  and  $Sb_2Te_3$ .

The microhardness is in the range of 40-85 kgf/mm<sup>2</sup> and logically decreases with the increase of the Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> content, since  $HV_{Sb_2Te_3} \ll HV_{As_2Se_3} \cong HV_{As_2Te_3}$ , respectively18 [15], 150 [2] and 160 kgf/mm<sup>2</sup> [16] - Table 3. Due to the same reasons the HV depends slightly of the As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> concentration.

The density of the glasses varies in the range 4.80-5.35 g/cm<sup>3</sup> and logically increases with the increase of the As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> and Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> content ( $d_{As_2Se_3} = 4.75$  g/cm<sup>3</sup> [17];  $d_{As_2Te_3} = 6.5$  g/cm<sup>3</sup> [17];  $d_{Sb_2Te_3} = 6.57$  g/cm<sup>3</sup> [18]) - Table 3.

The compactness of the investigated glasses (Table 3) depends weakly of the Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> content (expressed by z at m=const), as well as of the As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>/As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub> proportion (expressed by m=y/(x+y) at z=const). From the analysis of the compactness equation [14]

and rendering an account to the fact that  $M_{As_2Se_3} < M_{As_2Te_3} < M_{Sb_2Te_3}$  and  $d_{As_2Se_3} < d_{As_2Te_3} \cong d_{Sb_2Te_3}$ , a conclusion can be made, that the function  $F_i$  is decreasing. From this follows that if  $d.F_i \cong const$ , than  $C_{m=const}(z)$  depends slightly from the composition and  $C_{z=const}(m)$  practically does not depend.

The elasticity modulus follows the path of HV and changes within the limits  $594-1270 \text{ kgf/mm}^2$  - Table 3.

The volumes of the micro-voids is in the range  $8.0 \times 10^{-3}$ - $17.7 \times 10^{-3}$  Å<sup>3</sup> (Table 3). V<sub>h</sub> decreases when increasing the As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub> content (z=const) and increases with the increase of the Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> content (m=const). This way of V<sub>h</sub> change from the composition is expected, since the exchange of As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub> with As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub> is connected to an exchange of Se- with Te-atoms, which ionic radii are  $r_{Se^{2-}} < r_{Te^{2-}}$  (1.91 Å<2.11 Å). The alternation of V<sub>h</sub> when switching the As<sub>2</sub>Se<sub>3</sub> (As<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>) with Sb<sub>2</sub>Te<sub>3</sub>, since  $r_{As^{3+}} < r_{Sb^{3+}}$  (0.69 Å<0.90 Å).

The energy for formation of micro-voids follows the path of  $T_g$  and varies from 3840 to 5000 kJ mol<sup>-1</sup> (Table 3).

## Conclusions

New chalcogenide glasses were synthesized and their glass forming region was outlined.

A number of thermal (temperatures of glass transition, crystallization and melting, Hruby's criteria), physicochemical (density, microhardness, compactness) and thermomechanical (elasticity module, micro-voids volume and energy for their formation) properties of the glassy phases were studied. A correlation between these properties and the composition of the glasses from the investigated system was established and a method for its explanation has been proposed.
