- Reservoirs usages
 - Flood control
 - Power generation
 - Drinking, Irrigation, etc.



- Toxic cyanobacteria (*Microcystis aeruginosa*)
- Need for a simple tool for early warning of phytoplankton proliferations

Microcystis aeruginosa

- Cyanobacteria (blue-green algae)
- Phycocyanin and chlorophyll a
- Mid to late summer
- Warm, fresh, nutrient enriched water

- Problems caused:
 - Hypoxia
 - Odor and taste
 - Health problems (microcystin)

Study sites

- Energy production, drinking and irrigation, nautical activities, etc....
- Grangent reservoir (France)
 - 57.4 million m³
 - maximum depth 50 m
 - 415 m elevation
- Karaoun reservoir (Lebanon)
 - 220 million m³
 - maximum depth 45 m
 - 860 m elevation





PROLIPHYC PROJECT

- A measurement buoy
 - Continuous measurements
 - Remote and high-frequency data (30 min)

Measurement methods for Grangent

• **PROLIPHYC**, monitoring and warning system

- Autonomous
- Profiler with underwater sensors
- Meteorological measurements
- Teletransmission to data base and model
- Automatic antibiofouling treatment
- Cyanobacterial concentrations







DYRESM-CAEDYM model

- Centre for Water Research (CWR), Australia
- DYRESM, Dynamic Reservoir Simulation Model
 - simulates temperature, salinity and density
 - one dimensionality, no role for horizontal variation
- CAEDYM, Computational Aquatic Ecosystem DYnamics Model
 - Aquatic ecological model
 - linked to a hydrodynamic model
 - Simulate phytoplankton dynamics.

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Field observations



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Simulation results

- 2 months (from 28th of June till 28th of August) 2010
- Inflow and outflow were neglected (not available)
- Ability to follow the trend
- Low average mean squared error



Conclusions and perspectives

- Grangent
 - Capability to simulate cyanobacteria dynamics
 - Increase the number of simulated groups
 - More precise simulation (short duration)
- Karaoun
 - Build a reliable database
 - Verify the ability of DYCD to simulate cyanobacteria dynamics
 - Influence of different weather and hydrological conditions, withdrawal, etc.....
 - Propose and analyze management scenarios
