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# On the counting function of the embedded eigenvalues for some manifold with cusps, and magnetic Laplacian 

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#### Abstract

We consider a non compact, complete manifold $\mathbf{M}$ of finite area with cuspidal ends. The generic cusp is isomorphic to $\mathbf{X} \times] 1,+\infty[$ with metric $d s^{2}=\left(h+d y^{2}\right) / y^{2 \delta}$. $\mathbf{X}$ is a compact manifold with nonzero first Betti number equipped with the metric $h$. For a one-form $A$ on $\mathbf{M}$ such that in each cusp $A$ is a non exact one-form on the boundary at infinity, we prove that the magnetic Laplacian $-\Delta_{A}=(i d+A)^{\star}(i d+A)$ satisfies the Weyl asymptotic formula with sharp remainder. We deduce an upper bound for the counting function of the embedded eigenvalues of the Laplace-Beltrami operator $-\Delta=-\Delta_{0} .{ }^{1}$


## 1 Introduction

We consider a smooth, connected $n$-dimensional Riemannian manifold ( $\mathbf{M}, \mathbf{g}$ ), ( $n \geq 2$ ), such that

\mathbf{M}=\bigcup_{j=0}^{J} \mathbf{M}_{j} \quad(J \geq 1) \tag{1.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where the $\mathbf{M}_{j}$ are open sets of $\mathbf{M}$. We assume that the closure of $\mathbf{M}_{0}$ is compact and that the other $\mathbf{M}_{j}$ are cuspidal ends of $\mathbf{M}$.

[^0]This means that $\mathbf{M}_{j} \cap \mathbf{M}_{k}=\emptyset$, if $1 \leq j<k$, and that there exists, for any $j, 1 \leq j \leq J$, a closed compact ( $n-1$ )-dimensional Riemannian manifold $\left(\mathbf{X}_{j}, \mathbf{h}_{j}\right)$ such that $\mathbf{M}_{j}$ is isometric to $\left.\mathbf{X}_{j} \times\right] a_{j}^{2},+\infty\left[,\left(a_{j}>0\right)\right.$ equipped with the metric

d s_{j}^{2}=y^{-2 \delta_{j}}\left(\mathbf{h}_{j}+d y^{2}\right) ; \quad\left(1 / n<\delta_{j} \leq 1\right) . \tag{1.2}
\end{equation*}

So there exists a smooth real one-form $A_{j} \in T^{\star}\left(\mathbf{X}_{j}\right)$, non exact, such that

\text { or } \\
\text { ii) } d A_{j}=0 \text { and }\left[A_{j}\right] \text { is not integer. }
\end{array}\right.
$$

In $i i$ ) we mean that there exists a smooth closed curve $\gamma$ in $\mathbf{X}_{j}$ such that

\int_{\gamma} A_{j} \notin 2 \pi \mathbb{Z}
$$

Then one can always find a smooth real one-form $A \in T^{\star}(\mathbf{M})$ such that

\forall j, 1 \leq j \leq J, \quad A=A_{j} \quad \text { on } \quad \mathbf{M}_{j} . \tag{1.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

We define the magnetic Laplacian, the Bochner Laplacian

-\Delta_{A}=(i d+A)^{\star}(i d+A), \tag{1.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

$\left(i=\sqrt{-1},(i d+A) u=i d u+u A, \forall u \in C_{0}^{\infty}(\mathbf{M} ; \mathbb{C})\right.$, the upper star, ${ }^{\star}$, stands for the adjoint in $\left.L^{2}(\mathbf{M})\right)$.

As $\mathbf{M}$ is a complete metric space, by Hopf-Rinow theorem $\mathbf{M}$ is geodesically complete, so it is well known, (see [Shu] ), that $-\Delta_{A}$ has a unique self-adjoint extension on $L^{2}(\mathbf{M})$, containing in its domain $C_{0}^{\infty}(\mathbf{M} ; \mathbb{C})$, the space of smooth and compactly supported functions. The spectrum of $-\Delta_{A}$ is gauge invariant : for any $f \in C^{1}(\mathbf{M} ; \mathbb{R}),-\Delta_{A}$ and $-\Delta_{A+d f}$ are unitary equivalent, hence they have the same spectrum.

For a self-adjoint operator $P$ on a Hilbert space $H, \operatorname{sp}(P), \mathrm{sp}_{\text {ess }}(P), \mathrm{sp}_{p}(P)$ and $\operatorname{sp}_{d}(P)$ will denote respectively the spectrum, the essential spectrum, the point spectrum and the discrete spectrum of $P$. We recall that $\operatorname{sp}(P)=$ $\mathrm{sp}_{\text {ess }}(P) \cup \operatorname{sp}_{d}(P), \operatorname{sp}_{d}(P) \subset \operatorname{sp}_{p}(P)$ and $\mathrm{sp}_{\text {ess }}(P) \cap \operatorname{sp}_{d}(P)=\emptyset$.

Theorem 1.1 Under the above assumptions on $\mathbf{M}$, the essential spectrum of the Laplace-Beltrami operator on $\mathbf{M},-\Delta=-\Delta_{0}$ is given by

\begin{cases}\operatorname{sp}_{\text {ess }}(-\Delta)=[0,+\infty[, & \text { if } 1 / n<\delta<1  \tag{1.6}\\ \operatorname{sp}_{\text {ess }}(-\Delta)=\left[\frac{(n-1)^{2}}{4},+\infty[,\right. & \text { if } \delta=1\end{cases}
$$

When (1.3) and (1.4) are satisfied, the magnetic Laplacian $-\Delta_{A}$ has a compact resolvent. The spectrum $\operatorname{sp}\left(-\Delta_{A}\right)=\operatorname{sp}_{d}\left(-\Delta_{A}\right)$ is a sequence of nondecreasing eigenvalues $\left(\lambda_{j}\right)_{j \in \mathbb{N}^{\star}}, \lambda_{j} \leq \lambda_{j+1}, \lim _{j \rightarrow+\infty} \lambda_{j}=+\infty$, such that the sequence of normalized eigenfunctions $\left(\varphi_{j}\right)_{j \in \mathbb{N}^{\star}}$ is a Hilbert basis of $L^{2}(\mathbf{M})$. Moreover $\lambda_{0}>0$.

For any self-adjoint operator $P$ with compact resolvent, and for any real $\lambda, N(\lambda, P)$ will denote the number of eigenvalues, (repeated according to their multiplicity), of $P$ less then $\lambda$,

N(\lambda, P)=\operatorname{trace}\left(\chi_{]-\infty, \lambda[ }(P)\right), \tag{1.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

(for any $I \subset \mathbb{R}, \chi_{I}(x)=1$ if $x \in I$ and $\chi_{I}(x)=0$ if $x \in \mathbb{R} \backslash I$ ).
The asymptotic behavior of $N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}\right)$ satisfies the Weyl formula with the following sharp remainder.

Theorem 1.2 Under the above assumptions on $\mathbf{M}$ and on $A$, we have the Weyl formula with remainder as $\lambda \rightarrow+\infty$,

N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}\right)=|\mathbf{M}| \frac{\omega_{n}}{(2 \pi)^{n}} \lambda^{n / 2}+\mathbf{O}(\mathbf{r}(\lambda)) \tag{1.8}
\end{equation*}
$$

with

r(\lambda)= \begin{cases}\lambda^{(n-1) / 2} \ln (\lambda), & \text { if } 1 /(n-1) \leq \delta  \tag{1.9}\\ \lambda^{1 /(2 \delta)}, & \text { if } 1 / n<\delta<1 /(n-1)\end{cases}
$$

$\delta=\min _{1 \leq j \leq J} \delta_{j},|\mathbf{M}|$ is the Riemannian measure of $\mathbf{M}$ and $\omega_{d}$ is the euclidian volume of the unit ball of $\mathbb{R}^{d}, \omega_{d}=\frac{\pi^{d / 2}}{\Gamma\left(1+\frac{d}{2}\right)}$.

The asymptotic formula (1.8) without remainder is given in [Go-Mo], and with remainder but only for $n=2$ (and $\delta_{j}=1$ for any $1 \leq j \leq J$ ) in [Mo-Tr].

The Laplace-Beltrami operator $-\Delta=-\Delta_{0}$ may have embedded eigenvalues in its essential spectrum $\operatorname{sp}_{\text {ess }}(-\Delta)$. Let $N_{\text {ess }}(\lambda,-\Delta)$ denote the number of eigenvalues of $-\Delta$, (counted according to their multiplicity), less then $\lambda$.

Theorem 1.3 There exists a constant $C_{\mathrm{M}}$ such that, for any $\lambda \gg 1$,

\begin{equation*}
N_{\mathrm{ess}}(\lambda,-\Delta) \leq|\mathbf{M}| \frac{\omega_{n}}{(2 \pi)^{n}} \lambda^{n / 2}+C_{\mathbf{M}} r_{0}(\lambda) \tag{1.10}
\end{equation*}
$$

with $r_{0}(\lambda)$ defined by

r_{0}(\lambda)=\left\{\begin{array}{lll}
\lambda^{\frac{n-1}{2} \ln (\lambda),} & \text { if } \quad 2 / n \leq \delta \leq 1  \tag{1.11}\\
\lambda^{\frac{n-(n \delta-1)}{2}}, & \text { if } \quad 1 / n<\delta<2 / n
\end{array} ;\right.
$$

$\delta$ is the one defined in Theorem 1.2.
The above upper bound proves that any eigenvalue of $-\Delta$ has finite multiplicity.

The estimate (1.10) is sharp when $n=2$. There exist hyperbolic surfaces $\mathbf{M}$ of finite area so that

N_{\mathrm{ess}}(\lambda,-\Delta)=|\mathbf{M}| \frac{\omega_{2}}{(2 \pi)^{2}} \lambda+\Gamma_{\mathbf{M}} \lambda^{1 / 2} \ln (\lambda)+\mathbf{O}\left(\lambda^{1 / 2}\right),
$$

for some constant $\Gamma_{\mathbf{M}}$. See $[\mathrm{Mul}]$ for such examples.
Still in the case of surfaces, a compact perturbation of the metric of non compact hyperbolic surface $\mathbf{M}$ of finite area can destroy all embedded eigenvalues, see [Col1].

## 2 Proof

### 2.1 Proof of Theorem 1.1

Since the essential spectrum of an elliptic operator on a manifold is invariant by compact perturbation of the manifold, (see for example [Do-Li], Proposition 2.1 ), we can write

\operatorname{sp}_{\mathrm{ess}}\left(-\Delta_{A}\right)=\bigcup_{j=1}^{J} \operatorname{sp}_{\mathrm{ess}}\left(-\Delta_{A}^{\mathrm{M}_{j}, D}\right) \tag{2.1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $-\Delta_{A}^{\mathbf{M}_{j}, D}$ denotes the self-adjoint operator on $L^{2}\left(\mathbf{M}_{j}\right)$ associated to $-\Delta_{A}$ with Dirichlet boundary conditions on the boundary $\partial \mathbf{M}_{j}$ of $\mathbf{M}_{j}$.

Let us consider a cusp $\left.\mathbf{M}_{j}=\mathbf{X}_{j} \times\right] a_{j}^{2},+\infty[$ equipped with the metric (1.2). Then for any $u \in C^{2}\left(\mathbf{M}_{j}\right)$,

-\Delta_{A} u=-y^{2 \delta_{j}} \Delta_{A_{j}}^{\mathbf{X}_{j}} u-y^{n \delta_{j}} \partial_{y}\left(y^{(2-n) \delta_{j}} \partial_{y} u\right), \tag{2.2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $\Delta_{A_{j}}^{\mathbf{X}_{j}}$ is the magnetic Laplacian on $\mathbf{X}_{j}$ : if for local coordinates $\mathbf{h}_{j}=$ $\sum_{k, \ell} G_{k \ell} d x_{k} d x_{\ell}$ and $A_{j}=\sum_{k=1}^{n-1} a_{j, k} d x_{k}$, then

-\Delta_{A_{j}}^{\mathbf{x}_{j}}=\frac{1}{\sqrt{\operatorname{det}(G)}} \sum_{k, \ell}\left(i \partial_{x_{k}}+a_{j, k}\right)\left(\sqrt{\operatorname{det}(G)} G^{k \ell}\left(i \partial_{x_{\ell}}+a_{j, \ell}\right)\right)
$$

We perform the change of variables $y=e^{t}$, and define the unitary operator $U: L^{2}\left(\mathbf{X}_{j} \times\right] 2 \ln \left(a_{j}\right),+\infty[) \rightarrow L^{2}\left(\mathbf{M}_{j}\right)$, where $] 2 \ln \left(a_{j}\right),+\infty[$ is equipped with the standard euclidian metric $d t^{2}$, by $U(f)=y^{\left(n \delta_{j}-1\right) / 2} f$. Thus $L^{2}\left(\mathbf{M}_{j}\right)$ is unitary equivalent to $L^{2}\left(\mathbf{X}_{j} \times\right] 2 \ln \left(a_{j}\right),+\infty[)$, and
$-U^{\star} \Delta_{A} U f=-e^{2 \delta_{j} t} \Delta_{A_{j}}^{\mathbf{x}_{j}} f+\frac{\left(n \delta_{j}-1\right)\left[3+\delta_{j}(n-4)\right]}{4} e^{2 t\left(\delta_{j}-1\right)} f-\partial_{t}\left(e^{2 t\left(\delta_{j}-1\right)} \partial_{t} f\right)$.
Let us denote by $\left(\mu_{\ell}(j)\right)_{\ell \in \mathbb{N}}$ the increasing sequence of eigenvalues of $-\Delta_{A_{j}}^{\mathbf{X}_{j}}$, each eigenvalue repeated according to its multiplicity. Then $-\Delta_{A}^{\mathbf{M}_{j}, D}$ is unitary equivalent to $\bigoplus_{\ell=0}^{+\infty} L_{j, \ell}^{D}$,

\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{sp}\left(-\Delta_{A}^{\mathbf{M}_{j}, D}\right)=\operatorname{sp}\left(\bigoplus_{\ell=0}^{+\infty} L_{j, \ell}^{D}\right), \tag{2.4}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $L_{j, \ell}^{D}$ is the Dirichlet operator on $L^{2}(] 2 \ln \left(a_{j}\right),+\infty[)$ associated to

$$
\begin{equation*}
L_{j, \ell}=e^{2 \delta_{j} t} \mu_{\ell}(j)+\frac{\left(n \delta_{j}-1\right)}{4}\left[3+\delta_{j}(n-4)\right] e^{2 t\left(\delta_{j}-1\right)}-\partial_{t}\left(e^{2 t\left(\delta_{j}-1\right)} \partial_{t}\right) \tag{2.5}
\end{equation*}
$$

If $\mu_{\ell}(j)>0$ then $\operatorname{sp}\left(L_{j, \ell}^{D}\right)=\operatorname{sp}_{d}\left(L_{j, \ell}^{D}\right)=\left\{\mu_{\ell, k}(j) ; k \in \mathbb{N}\right\}$, where $\left(\mu_{\ell, k}(j)\right)_{k \in \mathbb{N}}$ is the increasing sequence of eigenvalues of $L_{j, \ell}^{D}, \lim _{k \rightarrow+\infty} \mu_{\ell, k}(j)=+\infty$.

If $\mu_{\ell}(j)=0$ then $\operatorname{sp}\left(L_{j, \ell}^{D}\right)=\operatorname{sp}_{\text {ess }}\left(L_{j, \ell}^{D}\right)=\left[\alpha_{n},+\infty\left[\right.\right.$, with $\alpha_{n}=0$ if $\delta_{j}<1$, and $\alpha_{n}=(n-1)^{2} / 4$ if $\delta_{j}=1$.

Since we have $\mu_{0}(j)=0$ when $A=0$, we get that $\mathrm{sp}_{\text {ess }}\left(-\Delta_{0}\right)=\left[\alpha_{n},+\infty[\right.$.
If $A$ satisfies assumptions (1.3) and (1.4), then $0<\mu_{0}(j) \leq \mu_{\ell}(j)$ for all $j$ and $\ell$, (see for example [Hel]), so $\operatorname{sp}\left(-\Delta_{A}^{\mathbf{M}_{j}, D}\right)=\left\{\mu_{\ell, k}(j) ;(\ell, k) \in\right.$ $\left.\mathbb{N}^{2}\right\}$. As $\lim _{\ell \rightarrow+\infty} \mu_{\ell, k}(j)=+\infty$, each $\mu_{\ell, k}(j)$ is an eigenvalue of $-\Delta_{A}^{\mathbf{M}_{j}, D}$ of finite multiplicity, so $\operatorname{sp}\left(-\Delta_{A}^{\mathrm{M}_{j}, D}\right)=\operatorname{sp}_{d}\left(-\Delta_{A}^{\mathrm{M}_{j}, D}\right)$. Therefore, we get that $\mathrm{sp}_{\text {ess }}\left(-\Delta_{A}\right)=\emptyset$

### 2.2 Proof of Theorem 1.2

We proceed as in [Mo-Tr].
We begin by establishing formula (1.8) for $\mathbf{M}_{j}$, with $-\Delta_{A}^{\mathbf{M}_{j}, D}$ defined in (2.1), instead of $-\Delta_{A}$. When $\delta_{j}=1$ we make the same change of variables and functions as in the proof of Theorem 1.1, but when $1 / n<\delta_{j}<1$, we set $y=\left[\left(1-\delta_{j}\right) t\right]^{1 /\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)}$, and define the unitary operator
$U: L^{2}\left(\mathbf{X}_{j} \times\right] \frac{a_{j}^{2\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)}}{1-\delta_{j}},+\infty[) \rightarrow L^{2}\left(\mathbf{M}_{j}\right)$, by $U(f)=y^{(n-1) \delta_{j} / 2} f$.
Then when $1 / n<\delta_{j}<1$,

\begin{equation*}
-U^{\star} \Delta_{A} U f=-\left[\left(1-\delta_{j}\right) t\right]^{\frac{2 \delta_{j}}{1-\delta_{j}}} \Delta_{A_{j}}^{\mathbf{x}_{j}} f+\frac{(n-1) \delta_{j}\left[(n-3) \delta_{j}+2\right]}{4\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)^{2} t^{2}} f-\partial_{t}^{2} f \tag{2.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

As a matter of fact,
$-U^{\star} y^{n \delta_{j}} \partial_{y}\left[y^{(2-n) \delta_{j}} \partial_{y} U(f)\right]=-y^{(n+1) \delta_{j} / 2} \partial_{y}\left[y^{(3-n) \delta_{j} / 2} \partial_{y} f\right]-\frac{(n-1) \delta_{j}}{2} y^{2 \delta_{j}-1} \partial_{y} f+$ $\frac{(n-1) \delta_{j}\left[(n-3) \delta_{j}+2\right]}{4} y^{-2\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)} f$,
then using that $y^{\delta_{j}} \partial_{y}=\partial_{t}$ and that $t^{\rho} \partial_{t}=\partial_{t}\left(t^{\rho}.\right)-\rho t^{\rho-1}$, we get easily (2.6).
Equality (2.4) still holds when $L_{j, \ell}^{D}$ is the Dirichlet operator on $L^{2}(] \frac{a^{2\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)}}{1-\delta_{j}},+\infty[)$ associated to

L_{j, \ell}=\mu_{\ell}(j)\left[\left(1-\delta_{j}\right) t\right]^{\frac{2 \delta_{j}}{1-\delta_{j}}}+\frac{(n-1) \delta_{j}\left[(n-3) \delta_{j}+2\right]}{4\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)^{2} t^{2}}-\partial_{t}^{2} . \tag{2.7}
\end{equation*}
$$

From now on, any constant depending only on $\delta_{j}$ and on $\min _{j} \mu_{0}(j)$ will be invariably denoted by $C$.

As in [Mo-Tr], we will follow Titchmarsh's method. Using Theorem 7.4 in [Tit] page 146, we prove the following Lemma.

Lemma 2.1 There exists $C>1$ so that for any $\lambda \gg 1$ and any $\ell \in K_{\lambda}=\left\{l \in \mathbb{N} ; \mu_{\ell}(j) \in\left[0, \lambda / \min _{j} a_{j}^{2}[ \}\right.\right.$,

\begin{equation*}
\left|N\left(\lambda, L_{j, \ell}^{D}\right)-\frac{1}{\pi} w_{j, \ell}(\lambda)\right| \leq C \ln (\lambda) \tag{2.8}
\end{equation*}
$$

with $w_{j, \ell}(\mu)=\int_{\alpha_{j}}^{+\infty}\left[\mu-V_{j, \ell}(t)\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d t=\int_{\alpha_{j}}^{T_{j}(\mu)}\left[\mu-V_{j, \ell}(t)\right]_{+}^{1 / 2} d t$.

The potential $V_{j, \ell}$ is defined as following:

\begin{cases}\text { if } \delta_{j}=1 & V_{j, \ell}(t)=\mu_{\ell}(j) e^{2 t}+\frac{(n-1)^{2}}{4}  \tag{2.9}\\ \text { if } 1 / n<\delta_{j}<1 & V_{j, \ell}(t)=\mu_{\ell}(j)\left[\left(1-\delta_{j}\right) t\right]^{\frac{2 \delta_{j}}{1-\delta_{j}}}+\frac{(n-1) \delta_{j}\left[(n-3) \delta_{j}+2\right]}{4\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)^{2}} t^{-2}\end{cases}
$$

and

$$
\left\{\begin{array}{lll}
\text { if } \delta_{j}=1 & \alpha_{j}=2 \ln \left(a_{j}\right), & T_{j}(\mu)=\frac{1}{2} \ln \left(\mu / \mu_{0}(j)\right)  \tag{2.10}\\
\text { if } 1 / n<\delta_{j}<1 & \alpha_{j}=\frac{a_{j}^{2\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)}}{1-\delta_{j}}, & T_{j}(\mu)=\frac{1}{1-\delta_{j}}\left(\frac{\mu}{\mu_{0}(j)}\right)^{\frac{1-\delta_{j}}{2 \delta_{j}}}
\end{array}\right.
$$

## Proof of Lemma 2.1

When $1 / n<\delta_{j}<1$, by enlarging $\mathbf{M}_{0}$ and reducing $\mathbf{M}_{j}$, we can take $\alpha_{j}$ large enough so that $V_{j, \ell}(t)$ is an increasing function on $\left[\alpha_{j},+\infty[\right.$ and $\lambda / \mu_{\ell}(j) \gg 1$ when $\ell \in K_{\lambda}$. Then, if $\alpha_{j} \leq Y<X(\lambda)=V_{j, \ell}^{-1}(\lambda)$, following the proof of Theorem 7.4 in [Tit] pages 146-147, we get that

\left|N\left(\lambda, L_{j, \ell}^{D}\right)-\frac{1}{\pi} w_{j, \ell}(\lambda)\right| \leq  \tag{2.11}\\
C\left[\ln \left(\lambda-V_{j, \ell}\left(\alpha_{j}\right)\right)-\ln \left(\lambda-V_{j, \ell}(Y)\right)+(X(\lambda)-Y)\left(\lambda-V_{j, \ell}(Y)\right)+1\right] .
\end{gather*}
$$

When $\delta_{j}=1$, we choose $Y=X(\lambda)-\frac{\sqrt{\ln \lambda}}{\sqrt{\lambda}}$.
When $1 / n<\delta_{j}<1$, we choose $Y=X(\lambda)-\frac{\sqrt{\ln \lambda}}{\sqrt{\lambda}}\left(\frac{\lambda}{\mu_{\ell}(j)}\right)^{\frac{1-\delta_{j}}{4 \delta_{j}}}$;

$$
\left(X(\lambda) \sim \frac{1}{1-\delta_{j}}\left(\frac{\lambda}{\mu_{\ell}(j)}\right)^{\frac{1-\delta_{j}}{2 \delta_{j}}}\right)
$$

Let us recall the sharp asymptotic Weyl formula of L. Hörmander [Hor1] (see also [Hor2]).

C \int_{\alpha_{j}}^{T_{j}(\lambda)} \frac{\left(\lambda-W_{j}(t)\right)^{(n-1) / 2}}{V_{j}^{(n-2) / 2}(t)} d t .

The minimax principle and (2.22) imply that

The Weyl formula with remainder, (see [Hor2] for Dirichlet boundary condition and [Sa-Va] p. 9 for Neumann-like boundary condition), gives that $N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}^{\mathbf{M}_{0}^{0}, Z}\right)=\frac{\omega_{n}}{(2 \pi)^{n}}\left|\mathbf{M}_{0}^{0}\right| \lambda^{n / 2}+\mathbf{O}\left(\lambda^{(n-1) / 2}\right) ; \quad($ for $Z=D$ and for $Z=N)$.

For $1 \leq j \leq J$, the asymptotic formula for $N\left(\lambda,-\Delta_{A}^{\mathbf{M}_{j}, N}\right)$,

(The Neumann-like boundary condition is of the form $\partial_{t} u\left(\alpha_{j}\right)+$ $\beta_{j} u\left(\alpha_{j}\right)=0$ because of the change of functions performed by $\left.U^{\star}\right)$.

We get (1.8) from (2.13) and (2.23) - (2.25)

When $n \geq 3$, we have $e(0, j)=0, \partial_{\tau} e(0, j)=0$ and

To the non-negative quadratic form $A_{j} \rightarrow \partial_{\tau}^{2} e(0, j)$, we associate a selfadjoint operator $P$ on $T^{\star}\left(\mathbf{X}_{j}\right)$, which is a pseudodifferential operator of order 0 with principal symbol, the square matrix $p_{0}(x, \xi)=\left(p_{0}^{i k}(x, \xi)\right)_{1 \leq i, k \leq n-1}$ defined as follows. In local coordinates, if $\mathbf{h}_{j}=G_{i k}(x) d x_{i} d x_{k}$, then

Lemma 2.5 For a one-form A satisfying (1.4), there exists a constant $C_{A}>$ 0 such that, if $u$ is a function in $L^{2}(\mathbf{M})$ such that $d u \in L^{2}(\mathbf{M})$ and

When $2 / n \leq \delta<1$, as $2 / n \leq \delta \leq \delta_{j}$, then

When $1 / n<\delta<2 / n$, as $\delta \leq \delta_{j}$, then
$\lambda^{\left(1+2 \rho\left(1-\delta_{j}\right)\right) /\left(2 \delta_{j}\right)} \leq \lambda^{(1+2 \rho(1-\delta)) /(2 \delta)}=\lambda^{(n-(n \delta-1)) / 2}=\mathbf{O}\left(r_{0}(\lambda)\right)$
To achieve the proof of Theorem 1.3, we take a one-form $A$ satisfying the assumptions of Lemma 2.6.

We remark that any eigenfunction $u$ of the Laplace-Beltrami operator $-\Delta$ on $\mathbf{M}$ associated to an eigenvalue in $] \inf \operatorname{sp}_{\text {ess }}(-\Delta),+\infty[$, satisfies (2.27).
