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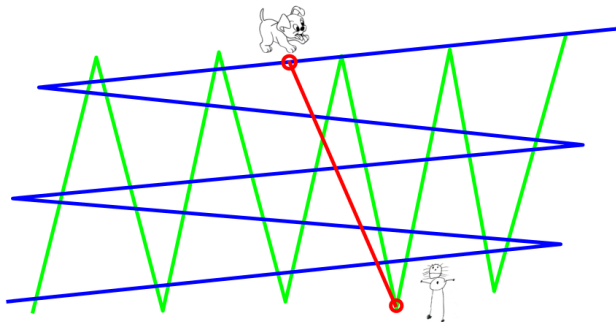
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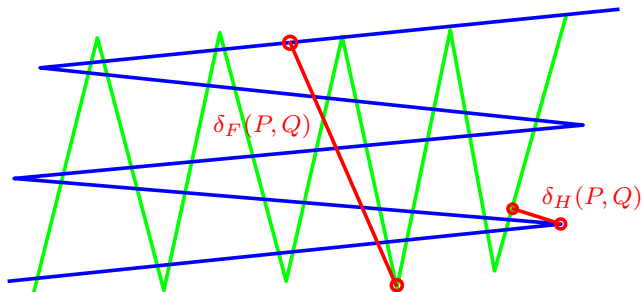
Fréchet Distance



- > no backtracking
- > length of the smallest leash necessary for any man and dog speeds



Fréchet Distance



- > Hausdorff or $L_{\{1,2,\infty\}}$ distances are not good measures of the similarity of curves.
- > Fréchet distance takes into account the course of the curves.

Curve simplification problem

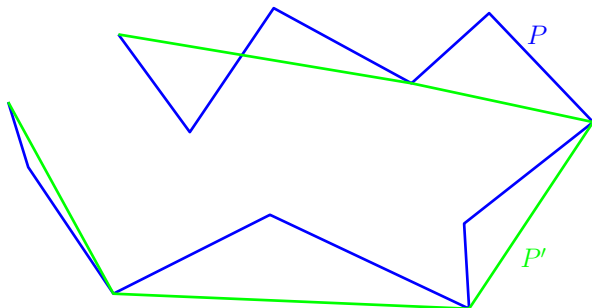
Find P' an ε -simplification of P

=

Find shortcuts $p_i p_j$ such that $error(i, j) = \delta_F(p_i p_j, P) \leq \varepsilon$

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minimize the number of vertices of P'



Optimal algorithm in $\mathcal{O}(n^3)$

What are we looking for ?

Reasonable complexity

Previous work by Agarwal et al. :
 $\mathcal{O}(n \log n)$ for any polygonal curve

Guarantee

Provable solution quality with respect to the optimal.



Linear time algorithm with a guarantee for digital curves ?

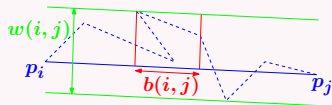

How do we achieve it ?

Approximated distance



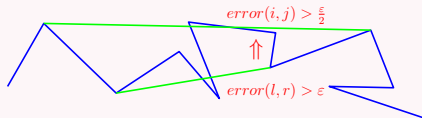
$$f(w, b) \leq \text{error} \leq g(w, b)$$

Greedy algorithm

```
i = 1, j = 2
while i < n do
  while j < n and max(w(i, j), b(i, j)) ≤  $\frac{\epsilon}{\sqrt{2}}$  do
    j = j + 1
  create a new shortcut p_i p_{j-1}
  i = j - 1, j = i + 1
```

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Nice local property

Guarantee !

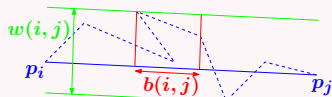

Approximated distance



$$f(w, b) \leq \text{error} \leq g(w, b)$$

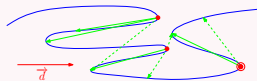
Greedy algorithm

```
i = 1, j = 2
while i < n do
  while j < n and max(w(i, j), b(i, j)) ≤ ε/√2 do
    j = j + 1
  create a new shortcut p_i p_{j-1}
  i = j - 1, j = i + 1
```

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Digital curve specificities

Definition of occuters



In an octant, the
occuters are the same.

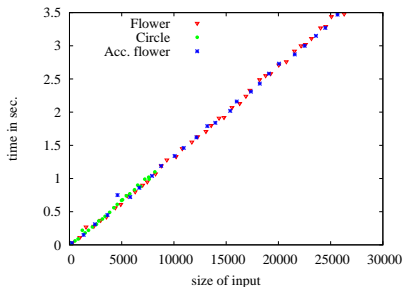


The number of active
occuters is
bounded by ϵ .

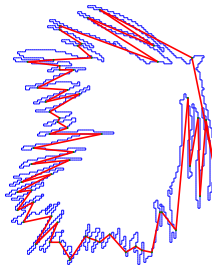


Near-linear time complexity !

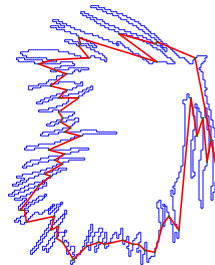
Results



Runtime results for noisy synthetic shapes.

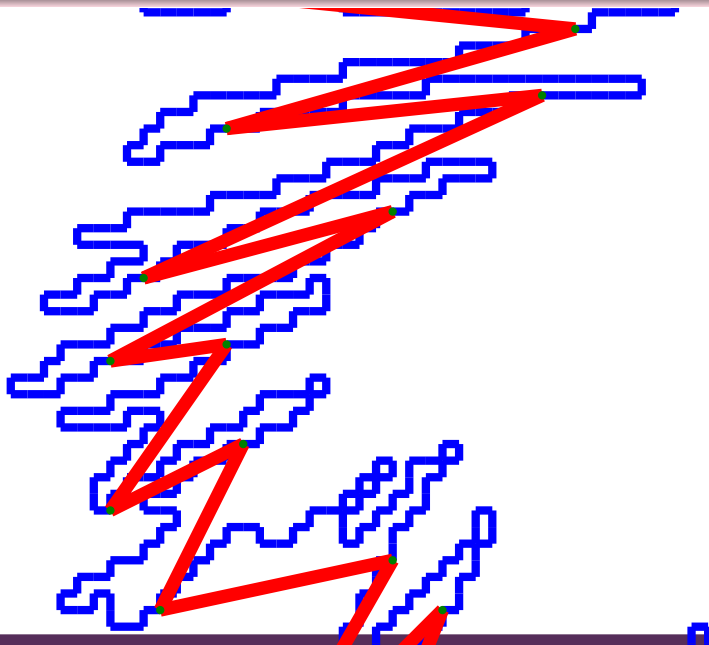


Fréchet distance
