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# Maximal hypercubes in Fibonacci and Lucas cubes 

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#### Abstract

The Fibonacci cube $\Gamma_{n}$ is the subgraph of the hypercube induced by the binary strings that contain no two consecutive 1's. The Lucas cube $\Lambda_{n}$ is obtained from $\Gamma_{n}$ by removing vertices that start and end with 1 . We characterize maximal induced hypercubes in $\Gamma_{n}$ and $\Lambda_{n}$ and deduce for any $p \leq n$ the number of maximal $p$-dimensional hypercubes in these graphs.

## 1 Introduction

An interconnection topology can be represented by a graph $G=(V, E)$, where $V$ denotes the processors and $E$ the communication links. The distance $d_{G}(u, v)$ between two vertices $u, v$ of a graph $G$ is the length of a shortest path connecting $u$ and $v$. An isometric subgraph $H$ of a graph $G$ is an induced subgraph such that for any vertices $u, v$ of $H$ we have $d_{H}(u, v)=d_{G}(u, v)$.

The hypercube of dimension $n$ is the graph $Q_{n}$ whose vertices are the binary strings of length $n$ where two vertices are adjacent if they differ in exactly one coordinate. The weight of a vertex, $w(u)$, is the number of 1 in the string $u$. Notice that the graph distance between two vertices of $Q_{n}$ is equal to the Hamming distance of the strings, the number of coordinates they differ. The hypercube is a popular interconnection network because of its structural properties.

Fibonacci cubes and Lucas cubes were introduced in [4] and [11] as new interconnection networks. They are isometric subgraphs of $Q_{n}$ and have also recurrent structure.

A Fibonacci string of length $n$ is a binary string $b_{1} b_{2} \ldots b_{n}$ with $b_{i} b_{i+1}=0$ for $1 \leq i<n$. The Fibonacci cube $\Gamma_{n}(n \geq 1)$ is the subgraph of $Q_{n}$ induced by the

Fibonacci strings of length $n$. For convenience we also consider the empty string and set $\Gamma_{0}=K_{1}$. Call a Fibonacci string $b_{1} b_{2} \ldots b_{n}$ a Lucas string if $b_{1} b_{n} \neq 1$. Then respectively $\Lambda_{n}$, and $C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n}, x\right)=\sum_{p=0}^{\infty} f_{n, p} x^{p}$, respectively $C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n}, x\right) \sum_{p=0}^{\infty} g_{n, p} x^{p}$, their counting polynomials.

By direct inspection, see figures 1 to 3 , we obtain the first of them:

The intersection graph of maximal hypercubes (also called cube graph) in a graph have been studied by various authors, for example in the context of median graphs[2]. Hypercubes playing a role similar to cliques in clique graph. Nice result have been obtained on cube graph of median graphs, and it is thus of interest, from the graph theory point of view, to characterize maximal hypercubes in families of graphs and thus obtain non trivial examples of such graphs. We will first characterize maximal induced hypercubes in $\Gamma_{n}$ and $\Lambda_{n}$ and then deduce the number of maximal $p$-dimensional hypercubes in these graphs.

## 2 Main results

For any vertex $x=x_{1} \ldots x_{n}$ of $Q_{n}$ and any $i \in\{1, \ldots, n\}$ let $x+\epsilon_{i}$ be the vertex of $Q_{n}$ defined by $\left(x+\epsilon_{i}\right)_{i}=1-x_{i}$ and $\left(x+\epsilon_{i}\right)_{j}=x_{j}$ for $j \neq i$.

Let $H$ be an induced subgraph of $Q_{n}$ isomorphic to some $Q_{k}$. The support of $H$ is the subset set of $\{1 \ldots n\}$ defined by $\operatorname{Sup}(H)=\{i / \exists x, y \in V(H)$ with $\left.x_{i} \neq y_{i}\right\}$. Let $i \notin \operatorname{Sup}(H)$, we will denote by $H \widetilde{+} \epsilon_{i}$ the subgraph induced by $V(H) \cup\left\{x+\epsilon_{i} / x \in V(H)\right\}$. Note that $H \widetilde{+} \epsilon_{i}$ is isomorphic to $Q_{k+1}$.

The following result is well known[6].
Proposition 2.1 In every induced subgraph $H$ of $Q_{n}$ isomorphic to $Q_{k}$ there exists a unique vertex of minimal weight, the bottom vertex $b(H)$. There exists also a unique vertex of maximal weight, the top vertex $t(H)$. Furthermore $b(H)$ and $t(H)$ are at distance $k$ and characterize $H$ among the subgraphs of $Q_{n}$ isomorphic to $Q_{k}$.

We can precise this result. A basic property of hypercubes is that if $x, x+\epsilon_{i}, x+\epsilon_{j}$ are vertices of $H$ then $x+\epsilon_{i}+\epsilon_{j}$ must be a vertex of $H$. By connectivity we deduce that if $x, x+\epsilon_{i}$ and $y$ are vertices of $H$ then $y+\epsilon_{i}$ must be also a vertex of $H$. We have thus by induction on $k$ :

Proposition 2.2 if $H$ is an induced subgraph of $Q_{n}$ isomorphic to $Q_{k}$ then
(i) $|S u p(H)|=k$
(ii) If $i \notin \operatorname{Sup}(H)$ then $\forall x \in V(H) \quad x_{i}=b(H)_{i}=t(H)_{i}$
(iii) If $i \in \operatorname{Sup}(H)$ then $b(H)_{i}=0$ and $t(H)_{i}=1$
(iv) $V(H)=\left\{x=x_{1} \ldots x_{n} / \forall i \notin \operatorname{Sup}(H) x_{i}=b(H)_{i}\right\}$.

If $H$ is an induced subgraph of $\Gamma_{n}$, or $\Lambda_{n}$, then, as a set of strings of length $n$, it defines also an induced subgraph of $Q_{n}$; thus Propositions 2.1 and 2.2 are still true for induced subgraphs of Fibonacci or Lucas cubes.

A Fibonacci string can be view as blocks of 0's separated by isolated 1's, or as isolated 0 's possibly separated by isolated 1's. These two points of view give the two following decompositions of the vertices of $\Gamma_{n}$.

Proposition 2.3 Any vertex of weight $w$ from $\Gamma_{n}$ can be uniquely decomposed as $0^{l_{0}} 10^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$ where $p=w ; \sum_{i=0}^{p} l_{i}=n-w ; l_{0}, l_{p} \geq 0$ and $l_{1}, \ldots, l_{p-1} \geq 1$.

Proposition 2.4 Any vertex of weight $w$ from $\Gamma_{n}$ can be uniquely decomposed as $1^{k_{0}} 01^{k_{1}} \ldots 01^{k_{i}} \ldots 01^{k_{q}}$ where $q=n-w ; \sum_{i=0}^{q} k_{i}=w$ and $k_{0}, \ldots, k_{q} \leq 1$.

Proof. A vertex from $\Gamma_{n}, n \geq 2$ being the concatenation of a string of $V\left(\Gamma_{n-1}\right)$ with 0 or a string of $V\left(\Gamma_{n-2}\right)$ with 01 , both properties are easily proved by induction on $n$.

Using the the second decomposition, the vertices of weight $w$ from $\Gamma_{n}$ are thus obtained by choosing, in $\{0,1, \ldots, q\}$, the $w$ values of $i$ such that $k_{i}=1$ in. We have then the classical result:

Proposition 2.5 For any $w \leq n$ the number of vertices of weight $w$ in $\Gamma_{n}$ is $\binom{n-w+1}{w}$.

Considering the constraint on the extremities of a Lucas string we obtain the two following decompositions of the vertices of $\Lambda_{n}$.

Proposition 2.6 Any vertex of weight $w$ in $\Lambda_{n}$ can be uniquely decomposed as $0^{l_{0}} 10^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$ where $p=w, \sum_{i=0}^{p} l_{i}=n-w, l_{0}, l_{p} \geq 0, l_{0}+l_{p} \geq 1$ and $l_{1}, \ldots, l_{p-1} \geq 1$.

Proposition 2.7 Any vertex of weight $w$ in $\Lambda_{n}$ can be uniquely decomposed as $1^{k_{0}} 01^{k_{1}} \ldots 01^{k_{i}} \ldots 01^{k_{q}}$ where $q=n-w ; \sum_{i=0}^{q} k_{i}=w ; k_{0}+k_{q} \leq 1$ and $k_{0}, \ldots, k_{q} \leq 1$.

From Propositions 2.2 and 2.3 it is possible to characterize the bottom and top vertices of maximal hypercubes in $\Gamma_{n}$.

Lemma 2.8 If $H$ is a maximal hypercube of dimension $p$ in $\Gamma_{n}$ then $b(H)=0^{n}$ and $t(H)=0^{l_{0}} 10^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$ where $\sum_{i=0}^{p} l_{i}=n-p ; 0 \leq l_{0} \leq 1 ; 0 \leq l_{p} \leq 1$ and $1 \leq l_{i} \leq 2$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$. Furthermore any such vertex is the top vertex of $a$ unique maximal hypercube.

Proof. Let $H$ be a maximal hypercube in $\Gamma_{n}$. Assume there exists an integer $i$ such that $b(H)_{i}=1$. Then $i \notin \sup (H)$ by Proposition 2.2. Therefore, for any $x \in V(H)$, $x_{i}=b(H)_{i}=1$ thus $x+\epsilon_{i} \in V\left(\Gamma_{n}\right)$. Then $H \widetilde{+} \epsilon_{i}$ must be an induced subgraph of $\Gamma_{n}$, a contradiction with $H$ maximal.

Consider now $t(H)=0^{l_{0}} 10^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$.
If $l_{0} \geq 2$ then for any vertex $x$ of $H$ we have $x_{0}=x_{1}=0$, thus $x+\epsilon_{0} \in V\left(\Gamma_{n}\right)$. Therefore $H \widetilde{+} \epsilon_{i}$ is an induced subgraph of $\Gamma_{n}$, a contradiction with $H$ maximal. The case $l_{p} \geq 2$ is similar by symmetry.

Assume now $l_{i} \geq 3$, for some $i \in\{1, \ldots, p-1\}$. Let $j=i+\sum_{k=0}^{i-1} l_{k}$. We have thus $t(H)_{j}=1$ and $t(H)_{j+1}=t(H)_{j+2}=t(H)_{j+3}=0$. Then for any vertex $x$ of $H$ we have $x_{j+1}=x_{j+2}=x_{j+3}=0$, thus $x+\epsilon_{j+2} \in V\left(\Gamma_{n}\right)$ and $H$ is not maximal, a contradiction.

Conversely consider a vertex $z=0^{l_{0}} 10^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$ where $\sum_{i=0}^{p} l_{i}=n-p ;$ $0 \leq l_{0} \leq 1 ; 0 \leq l_{p} \leq 1$ and $1 \leq l_{i} \leq 2$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$. Then, by Propositions 2.1 and 2.2, $t(H)=z$ and $b(H)=0^{n}$ define a unique hypercube $H$ in $Q_{n}$ isomorphic to $Q_{p}$ and clearly all vertices of $H$ are Fibonacci strings. Notice that for any $i \notin S u p(H)$ $z+\epsilon_{i}$ is not a Fibonacci string thus $H$ is maximal.

With the same arguments we obtain for Lucas cube:
Proposition 2.9 If $H$ is a maximal hypercube of dimension $p \geq 1$ in $\Lambda_{n}$ then $b(H)=0^{n}$ and $t(H)=0^{l_{0}} 10^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$ where $\sum_{i=0}^{p} l_{i}=n-p ; 0 \leq l_{0} \leq 2$; $0 \leq l_{p} \leq 2 ; 1 \leq l_{0}+l_{p} \leq 2$ and $1 \leq l_{i} \leq 2$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$. Furthermore any such vertex is the top vertex of a maximal hypercube.

Theorem 2.10 Let $0 \leq p \leq n$ and $f_{n, p}$ be the number of maximal hypercubes of dimension $p$ in $\Gamma_{n}$ then: the expression of $f_{n, p}$ by Proposition 2.5.

Corollary 2.11 The counting polynomial $C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n}, x\right)=\sum_{p=0}^{\infty} f_{n, p} x^{p}$ of the number of maximal hypercubes of dimension $p$ in $\Gamma_{n}$ satisfies:

& C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n}, x\right)=x\left(C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n-2}, x\right)+C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n-3}, x\right)\right) \quad(n \geq 3) \\
& C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{0}, x\right)=1, C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{1}, x\right)=x, C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{2}, x\right)=2 x
\end{aligned}
$$

The generating function of the sequence $\left\{C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n}, x\right)\right\}$ is:

$$
\sum_{n \geq 0} C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n}, x\right) y^{n}=\frac{1+x y(1+y)}{1-x y^{2}(1+y)}
$$

Proof. By theorem 2.10 and Pascal identity we obtain $f_{n, p}=f_{n-2, p-1}+f_{n-3, p-1}$ for $n \geq 3$ and $p \geq 1$. Notice that $f_{n, 0}=0$ for $n \neq 0$. The recurrence relation for $C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n}, x\right)$ follows. Setting $f(x, y)=\sum_{n \geq 0} C^{\prime}\left(\Gamma_{n}, x\right) y^{n}$ we deduce from the recurrence relation $f(x, y)-1-x y-2 x y^{2}=x\left(y^{2}(f(x, y)-1)+y^{3} f(x, y)\right)$ thus the value of $f(x, y)$.

Theorem 2.12 Let $1 \leq p \leq n$ and $g_{n, p}$ be the number of maximal hypercubes of

f_{n, p}=\binom{p+1}{n-2 p+1}
$$

Proof. This is clearly true for $p=0$ so assume $p \geq 1$. Since maximal hypercubes of $\Gamma_{n}$ are characterized by their top vertex, let us consider the set $T$ of strings which can be write $0^{l_{0}} 10^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$ where $\sum_{i=0}^{p} l_{i}=n-p ; 0 \leq l_{0} \leq 1 ; 0 \leq l_{p} \leq 1$ and $1 \leq l_{i} \leq 2$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$. Let $l_{i}^{\prime}=l_{i}-1$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1 ; l_{0}^{\prime}=l_{0}$; $l_{p}^{\prime}=l_{p}$. We have thus a 1 to 1 mapping between $T$ and the set of strings $D=$ $\left\{0^{\prime}{ }_{0} 10^{l_{1}^{\prime}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}^{\prime}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}^{\prime}}\right\}$ where $\sum_{i=0}^{p} l_{i}^{\prime}=n-2 p+1$ any $l_{i}^{\prime} \leq 1$ for $i=0, \ldots, p$. This set is in bijection with the set $E=\left\{1^{l_{0}^{\prime}} 01^{l_{1}^{\prime}} \ldots 01^{l_{i}^{\prime}} \ldots 01_{p}^{\prime_{p}^{\prime}}\right\}$. By Proposition 2.4, $E$ is the set of Fibonacci strings of length $n-p+1$ and weight $n-2 p+1$ and we obtain dimension $p$ in $\Lambda_{n}$ then:

$$
g_{n, p}=\frac{n}{p}\binom{p}{n-2 p} .
$$

Proof. The proof is similar to the previous result with three cases according to the value of $l_{0}$ :

By Proposition 2.9 the set $T$ of top vertices that begin with 1 is the set of strings which can be write $10^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$ where $\sum_{i=1}^{p} l_{i}=n-p$ and $1 \leq l_{i} \leq 2$ for $i=1, \ldots, p$. Let $l_{i}^{\prime}=l_{i}-1$ for $i=1, \ldots, p$. We have thus a 1 to 1 mapping between $T$ and the set of strings $D=\left\{10^{l_{1}^{\prime}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}^{\prime}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}^{\prime}}\right\}$ where $\sum_{i=1}^{p} l_{i}^{\prime}=n-2 p, 0 \leq l_{i}^{\prime} \leq 1$ for $i=1, \ldots, p$. Removing the first 1, and by complement, this set is in bijection with the set $E=\left\{1^{l_{1}^{\prime}} \ldots 01^{l_{i}^{\prime}} \ldots 01^{l_{p}^{\prime}}\right\}$. By Proposition $2.4, E$ is the set of Fibonacci strings of length $n-p-1$ and weight $n-2 p$. Thus $|T|=\binom{p}{n-2 p}$.

The set $U$ of top vertices that begin with 01 is the set of strings which can be write $010^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}}$ where $\sum_{i=1}^{p} l_{i}=n-p-1 ; 1 \leq l_{i} \leq 2$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$ and $l_{p} \leq 1$. Let $l_{i}^{\prime}=l_{i}-1$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$ and $l_{p}^{\prime}=l_{p}$. We have thus a 1 to 1 mapping between $U$ and the set of strings $F=\left\{010^{l_{1}^{\prime}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}^{\prime}} \ldots 10^{l_{p}^{\prime}}\right\}$ where $\sum_{i=1}^{p} l_{i}^{\prime}=n-2 p$ and $l_{i}^{\prime} \leq 1$ for $i=1, \ldots, p$. Removing the first 01 , and by complement, this set is in bijection with the set $G=\left\{1^{l_{1}^{\prime}} \ldots 01^{l_{i}^{\prime}} \ldots 01^{l_{p}^{\prime}}\right\}$. By Proposition $2.4, G$ is the set of Fibonacci strings of length $n-p-1$ and weight $n-2 p$. Thus $|U|=\binom{p}{n-2 p}$.

The last set, $V$, of top vertices that begin with 001 , is the set of strings which can be write $0010^{l_{1}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}} \ldots 0^{l_{p-1}} 1$ where $\sum_{i=1}^{p-1} l_{i}=n-p-2$ and $1 \leq l_{i} \leq 2$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$. Let $l_{i}^{\prime}=l_{i}-1$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$. We have thus a 1 to 1 mapping between $V$ and the set of strings $H=\left\{0010^{l_{1}^{\prime}} \ldots 10^{l_{i}^{\prime}} \ldots 0^{l_{p-1}^{\prime}} 1\right\}$ where $\sum_{i=1}^{p-1} l_{i}^{\prime}=$ $n-2 p-1$ and $l_{i}^{\prime} \leq 1$ for $i=1, \ldots, p-1$. Removing the first 001 and the last 1 , this set, again by complement, is in bijection with the set $K=\left\{1^{l_{1}^{\prime}} \ldots 01^{l_{i}^{\prime}} \ldots 01^{l_{p-1}^{\prime}}\right\}$. The set $K$ is the set of Fibonacci strings of length $n-p-3$ and weight $n-2 p-1$. Thus $|V|=\binom{p-1}{n-2 p-1}$ and $g_{n, p}=2\binom{p}{n-2 p}+\binom{p-1}{n-2 p-1}=\frac{n}{p}\binom{p}{n-2 p}$.

Corollary 2.13 The counting polynomial $C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n}, x\right)=\sum_{p=0}^{\infty} g_{n, p} x^{p}$ of the number of maximal hypercubes of dimension $p$ in $\Lambda_{n}$ satisfies:

\begin{aligned}
C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n}, x\right) & =x\left(C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n-2}, x\right)+C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n-3}, x\right)\right) \quad(n \geq 5) \\
C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{0}, x\right) & =1, C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{1}, x\right)=1, C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{2}, x\right)=2 x, C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{3}, x\right)=3 x, C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{4}, x\right)=2 x^{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

The generating function of the sequence $\left\{C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n}, x\right)\right\}$ is:

$$
\sum_{n \geq 0} C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n}, x\right) y^{n}=\frac{1+y+x y^{2}+x y^{3}-x y^{4}}{1-x y^{2}(1+y)}
$$

Proof. Assume $n \geq 5$. Here also by theorem 2.12 and Pascal identity we get $g_{n, p}=g_{n-2, p-1}+g_{n-3, p-1}$ for $n \geq 5$ and $p \geq 2$. Notice that when $n \geq 5$ this equality occurs also for $p=1$ and $g_{n, 0}=0$. The recurrence relation for $C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n}, x\right)$ follows and $g(x, y)=\sum_{n \geq 0} C^{\prime}\left(\Lambda_{n}, x\right) y^{n}$ satisfies $g(x, y)-1-y-2 x y^{2}-3 x y^{3}-2 x^{2} y 4=$ $x\left(y^{2}\left(g(x, y)-1-y-2 x y^{2}\right)+y^{3}(g(x, y)-1-y)\right)$.

Notice that $f_{n, p} \neq 0$ if and only if $\left\lceil\frac{n}{3}\right\rceil \leq p \leq\left\lfloor\frac{n+1}{2}\right\rfloor$ and $g_{n, p} \neq 0$ if and only if $\left\lceil\frac{n}{3}\right\rceil \leq p \leq\left\lfloor\frac{n}{2}\right\rfloor($ for $n \neq 1)$. Maximal induced hypercubes of maximum dimension are maximum induced hypercubes and we obtain again that cube polynomials of $\Gamma_{n}$, respectively $\Lambda_{n}$, are of degree $\left\lfloor\frac{n+1}{2}\right\rfloor$, respectively $\leq\left\lfloor\frac{n}{2}\right\rfloor[9]$.

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
