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# CONVERGENCE OF LAGRANGE INTERPOLATION SERIES IN THE FOCK SPACES 

ANDRÉ DUMONT AND KARIM KELLAY


#### Abstract

We study the uniqueness sets, the weak interpolation sets, and convergence of the Lagrange interpolation series in radial weighted Fock spaces.


## 1. Introduction and main results.

In this paper we study the weighted Fock spaces $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$

$$
\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})=\left\{f \in \operatorname{Hol}(\mathbb{C}):\|f\|_{\varphi}^{2}=\int_{\mathbb{C}}|f(z)|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi(|z|)} d m(z)<\infty\right\}
$$

here $d m$ is area measure and $\varphi$ is an increasing function defined on $[0,+\infty), \lim _{x \rightarrow \infty} \varphi(x)=\infty$. We assume that $\varphi(z)=\varphi(|z|)$ is $C^{2}$ smooth and subharmonic on $\mathbb{C}$, and set

$$
\rho(z)=(\Delta \varphi(z))^{-1 / 2} .
$$

One more condition on $\varphi$ is that for every fixed $C$,

$$
\rho(x+C \rho(x)) \asymp \rho(x), \quad 0<x<\infty .
$$

(In particular, this holds if $\rho^{\prime}(x)=o(1), x \rightarrow \infty$.)
Typical $\varphi$ are power functions

$$
\varphi(r)=r^{a}, \quad a>0 .
$$

Then

$$
\rho(x) \asymp x^{1-a / 2}, \quad x>1 .
$$

Furthermore, if

$$
\varphi(r)=(\log r)^{2},
$$

then

$$
\rho(x) \asymp x, \quad x>1 .
$$

[^0]Given $z, w \in \mathbb{C}$, we define

$$
d_{\rho}(z, w)=\frac{|z-w|}{\min (\rho(z), \rho(w))} .
$$

We say that a subset $\Lambda$ of $\mathbb{C}$ of is $d_{\rho}$-separated if

$$
\inf _{\lambda \neq \lambda^{*}}\left\{d_{\rho}\left(\lambda, \lambda^{*}\right), \lambda, \lambda^{*} \in \Lambda\right\}>0
$$

Definition 1. Given $\gamma \in \mathbb{R}$, we say that an entire function $S$ belongs to the class $\mathcal{S}_{\gamma}$ if
(1) the zero set $\Lambda$ of $S$ is $d_{\rho}$-separated, and

$$
\begin{equation*}
|S(z)| \asymp e^{\varphi(z)} \frac{d(z, \Lambda)}{\rho(z)} \frac{1}{(1+|z|)^{\gamma}}, \quad z \in \mathbb{C} . \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

For constructions of such functions in radial weighted Fock spaces see, for example, [1] and [2].

In the standard Fock spaces $\left(\varphi(r)=r^{2}\right)$ the classes $\mathcal{S}_{\gamma}$ were introduced by Lyubarskii in [4]. They are analogs of the sine type functions for the Paley-Wiener space, and their zero sets include rectangular lattices and their perturbations.
Definition 2. $A$ set $\Lambda \subset \mathbb{C}$ is called a weak interpolation set for $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ if for every $\lambda \in \Lambda$ there exists $f_{\lambda} \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ such that $f_{\lambda}(\lambda)=1$ and $f_{\lambda} \mid \Lambda \backslash\{\lambda\}=0$.
$A$ set $\Lambda \subset \mathbb{C}$ is called a uniqueness set for $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ if $f \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ and $f \mid \Lambda=0$ imply together that $f=0$.

Theorem 3. Let $S \in \mathcal{S}_{\gamma}$, and denote by $\Lambda$ the zero set of $S$. Then
(a) $\Lambda$ is a uniqueness set if and only if $\gamma \leq 1$,
(b) $\Lambda$ is a weak interpolation set if and only if $\gamma>0$.

Denote by $\mathbb{k}_{z}$ the reproducing kernel in the space $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ :

$$
\left\langle f, \mathbb{k}_{z},\right\rangle_{\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})}=f(z), \quad f \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C}), \quad z \in \mathbb{C} .
$$

It is known $[6,3,2]$ that the space $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ does not admit Riesz bases of the (normalized) reproducing kernels for regular $\varphi, \varphi(x) \gg(\log x)^{2}$. On the other hand, by Theorem 3, for $0<\gamma \leq 1$, the family $\left\{\mathbb{k}_{\lambda}\right\}_{\lambda \in \Lambda}$ is a complete minimal family in $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$. Then the family $\left\{S /\left[S^{\prime}(\lambda)(\cdot-\right.\right.$ $\lambda)]\}_{\lambda \in \Lambda}$ is the biorthogonal system and we associate to any $f \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ the formal (Lagrange interpolation) series

$$
f \sim \sum_{\lambda \in \Lambda} f(\lambda) \frac{S}{S^{\prime}(\lambda)(\cdot-\lambda)}
$$

It is natural to ask whether this formal series converges if we modify the norm of the space.

Denote by $\Lambda=\left\{\lambda_{k}\right\}$ the zero sequence of $S$ ordered in such a way that $\left|\lambda_{k}\right| \leq\left|\lambda_{k+1}\right|, k \geq 1$. Following Lyubarskii [4] and Lyubarskii-Seip [5] we obtain the following result:
Theorem 4. Let $0 \leq \beta \leq 1, \gamma+\beta \in(1 / 2,1)$, and let $S \in \mathcal{S}_{\gamma}$. Suppose that

$$
\begin{equation*}
r^{1-2 \beta}=O(\rho(r)), \quad r \rightarrow+\infty . \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

Then for every $f \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ we have

$$
\lim _{N \rightarrow \infty}\left\|f-S \sum_{k=1}^{N} \frac{f\left(\lambda_{k}\right)}{S^{\prime}\left(\lambda_{k}\right)\left(\cdot-\lambda_{k}\right)}\right\|_{\varphi_{\beta}}=0
$$

where $\varphi_{\beta}(r)=\varphi(r)+\beta \log (1+r)$.
The result corresponding to $\beta=1 / 2, \varphi(r)=r^{2}, \rho(r) \asymp 1$ is contained in [5, Theorem 10]. On the other hand, in the case $\varphi(r)=$ $(\log r)^{a}, 1<a \leq 2, r>2, \rho(r) \asymp r$, the space $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ contains Riesz bases of (normalized) reproducing kernels [2]. Our theorem shows that in the case $\rho(r) \asymp r$, when $S \in \mathcal{S}_{\gamma}, \gamma \in(1 / 2,1)$, the interpolation series converges already in $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$. Now, it is interesting to find out how sharp is condition (1) in Theorem 4.

Theorem 5. Let $0<a \leq 2, \varphi(r)=r^{a}, r>1, \rho(x) \asymp x^{1-a / 2}, x>1$. If $0 \leq \beta<a / 4, \gamma \in \mathbb{R}$, and $S \in \mathcal{S}_{\gamma}$, then there exists $f \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ such that

$$
\left\|f-S \sum_{k=1}^{N} \frac{f\left(\lambda_{k}\right)}{S^{\prime}\left(\lambda_{k}\right)\left(\cdot-\lambda_{k}\right)}\right\|_{\varphi_{\beta}} \nrightarrow 0, \quad N \rightarrow \infty
$$

Thus, for the power weights $\varphi(r)=r^{a}, 0<a \leq 2$, we need to modify the norm to get the convergence, and the critical value of $\beta$ is $a / 4$.

The notation $A \lesssim B$ means that there is a constant $C$ independent of the relevant variables such that $A \leq C B$. We write $A \asymp B$ if both $A \lesssim B$ and $B \lesssim A$.

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## 2. Proofs.

2.1. Proof of Theorem 3. (a) If $\gamma>1$, then $\mathcal{S}_{\gamma} \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ and $S \mid \Lambda=$ 0 . Hence, $\Lambda$ is not a uniqueness set.

If $\gamma \leq 1$, then $\mathcal{S}_{\gamma} \cap \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})=\emptyset$. Suppose that there exists $g \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ such that $g \mid \Lambda=0$. Then $g=F S$ for an entire function $F$, and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\int_{\mathbb{C}}|F(w)|^{2}|S(w)|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi(w)} d m(w)<\infty \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

Given $\Omega \subset \mathbb{C}$, denote

$$
\mathcal{I}[\Omega]=\int_{\Omega}|F(w)|^{2} \frac{d^{2}(w, \Lambda)}{(1+|w|)^{2 \gamma} \rho^{2}(w)} d m(w)
$$

By (2),

$$
\mathcal{I}[\mathbb{C}]<\infty
$$

Denote by $D(z, r)$ the disc of radius $r$ centered at $z$. Let

$$
\Omega_{\varepsilon}=\bigcup_{\lambda \in \Lambda} D(\lambda, \varepsilon \rho(\lambda))
$$

where $\varepsilon$ is such that the discs $D(\lambda, 2 \varepsilon \rho(\lambda))$ are pairwise disjoint. We have

$$
\mathcal{I}[\mathbb{C}]=\mathcal{I}\left[\mathbb{C} \backslash \Omega_{2 \varepsilon}\right]+\sum_{\lambda \in \Lambda} \mathcal{I}[D(\lambda, 2 \varepsilon \rho(\lambda)) \backslash D(\lambda, \varepsilon \rho(\lambda))]+\mathcal{I}[D(\lambda, \varepsilon \rho(\lambda))]
$$

It is clear that

$$
\mathcal{I}\left[\mathbb{C} \backslash \Omega_{2 \varepsilon}\right] \geq c_{1} \int_{\mathbb{C} \backslash \Omega_{2 \varepsilon}} \frac{|F(w)|^{2}}{(1+|w|)^{2 \gamma}} d m(w)
$$

On the other hand,

$$
\int_{D(\lambda, \varepsilon \rho(\lambda))}|F(w)|^{2} d m(w) \leq c_{2} \int_{D(\lambda, 2 \varepsilon \rho(\lambda)) \backslash D(\lambda, \varepsilon \rho(\lambda))}|F(w)|^{2} d m(w)
$$

and, hence,

$$
\mathcal{I}[D(\lambda, 2 \varepsilon \rho(\lambda)) \backslash D(\lambda, \varepsilon \rho(\lambda))] \geq c_{3} \mathcal{I}[D(\lambda, \varepsilon \rho(\lambda))]
$$

Therefore

$$
\int_{\mathbb{C}} \frac{|F(w)|^{2}}{(1+|w|)^{2 \gamma}} d m(w)<\infty
$$

the function $F$ is constant, and $g=c S$. Since $\mathcal{S}_{\gamma} \cap \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})=\emptyset$, we get a contradiction. Statement (a) is proved.
(b) Let $\gamma>0$. Set

$$
f_{\lambda}(z)=\frac{S(z)}{S^{\prime}(\lambda)(z-\lambda)}, \quad \lambda \in \Lambda .
$$

It is obvious that $f_{\lambda} \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C}), f_{\lambda} \mid \Lambda \backslash\{\lambda\}=0$ and $f_{\lambda}(\lambda)=1$. Hence $\Lambda$ is a weak interpolation set. If $\gamma \leq 0, \lambda \in \Lambda$, then by (a), $\Lambda \backslash\{\lambda\}$ is a uniqueness set for $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$. Therefore, $\Lambda$ is not a weak interpolation set for $\mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$.
2.2. Proof of Theorem 4. We follow the scheme of proof proposed in $[4,5]$ and concentrate mainly on the places where the proofs differ. We need some auxiliary notions and lemmas. The proof of the first lemma is the same as in [1, Lemma 4.1].

Lemma 6. For every $\delta>0$, there exists $C>0$ such that for functions $f$ holomorphic in $D(z, \delta \rho(z))$ we have

$$
|f(z)|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi(z)} \leq \frac{C}{\rho(z)^{2}} \int_{D(z, \delta \rho(z))}|f(w)|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi(w)} d m(w) .
$$

Definition 7. A simple closed curve $\gamma=\left\{r(\theta) e^{-i \theta}, \theta \in[0,2 \pi]\right\}$ is called $K$-bounded if $r$ is $C^{1}$-smooth and $2 \pi$-periodic on the real line and $\left|r^{\prime}(\theta)\right| \leq K, \theta \in \mathbb{R}$.

Let $\gamma \in \mathbb{R}$, let $S \in \mathcal{S}_{\gamma}$, and let $\Lambda=\left\{\lambda_{k}\right\}$ be the zero set of $S$ ordered in such a way that $\left|\lambda_{k}\right| \leq\left|\lambda_{k+1}\right|, k \geq 1$. We can construct a sequence of numbers $R_{N} \rightarrow \infty$ and a sequence of contours $\Gamma_{N}$ such that
(1) $\Gamma_{N}=R_{N} \gamma_{N}$, where $\gamma_{N}$ are $K$-bounded, with $K>0$ independent of $N$.
(2) $d_{\rho}\left(\Lambda, \Gamma_{N}\right) \geq \varepsilon$ for some $\varepsilon>0$ independent of $N$.
(3) $\left\{\lambda_{k}\right\}_{1}^{N}$ lie inside $\Gamma_{N}$ and $\left\{\lambda_{k}\right\}_{N+1}^{\infty}$ lie outside $\Gamma_{N}$.
(4) $\Gamma_{N} \subset\left\{z: R_{N}-\rho\left(R_{N}\right)<|z|<R_{N}+\rho\left(R_{N}\right)\right\}$.

Indeed, for some $0<\varepsilon<1$ the discs $D_{k}=D\left(\lambda_{k}, \varepsilon \rho\left(\lambda_{k}\right)\right)$ are disjoint. For some $\delta=\delta(\varepsilon)>0$ we have

$$
\varepsilon \rho\left(\lambda_{k}\right)>4 \delta \rho\left(\lambda_{N}\right), \quad| | \lambda_{k}\left|-\left|\lambda_{N}\right|\right|<\delta \rho\left(\lambda_{N}\right) .
$$

Fix $\psi \in C_{0}^{\infty}[-1,1], 0<\psi<1$, such that $\psi>1 / 2$ on $[-1 / 2,1 / 2]$.
Put $\Xi=\left\{k:\left|\left|\lambda_{k}\right|-\left|\lambda_{N}\right|\right|<\frac{1}{4} \delta \rho\left(\lambda_{N}\right)\right\}$, denote $\lambda_{k}=r_{k} e^{i \theta_{k}}, k \in \Xi$, and set

$$
r(\theta)=1+\sum_{k \in \Xi} s_{k} \frac{\delta \rho\left(\lambda_{N}\right)}{\left|\lambda_{N}\right|} \psi\left(\frac{\left|\lambda_{N}\right|}{\delta \rho\left(\lambda_{N}\right)}\left(\theta-\theta_{k}\right)\right),
$$

where $s_{k}=1, k \leq N, s_{k}=-1, k>N$.
Finally, set

$$
\gamma_{N}=\left\{r(\theta) e^{i \theta}, \theta \in[0,2 \pi]\right\} .
$$

## Lemma 8.

$$
R_{N} \rho\left(R_{N}\right) \int_{\gamma_{N}}\left|f\left(R_{N} \zeta\right)\right|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi\left(R_{N} \zeta\right)}|d \zeta| \rightarrow 0, \quad N \rightarrow \infty
$$

Proof. Set $C_{N}=\cup_{\zeta \in \gamma_{N}} D\left(R_{N} \zeta, \rho\left(R_{N} \zeta\right)\right)$. Since $\rho\left(R_{N} \zeta\right) \asymp \rho\left(R_{N}\right), \zeta \in$ $\gamma_{N}$, by Lemma 6 we have

$$
\begin{aligned}
& R_{N} \rho\left(R_{N}\right) \int_{\gamma_{N}}\left|f\left(R_{N} \zeta\right)\right|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi\left(R_{N} \zeta\right)}|d \zeta| \\
& \lesssim R_{N} \rho\left(R_{N}\right) \int_{\gamma_{N}}\left[\frac{1}{\rho\left(R_{N} \zeta\right)^{2}} \int_{D\left(R_{N} \zeta, \rho\left(R_{N} \zeta\right)\right)}|f(w)|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi(w)} d m(w)\right]|d \zeta| \\
& \asymp \frac{R_{N}}{\rho\left(R_{N}\right)} \int_{C_{N}}|f(w)|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi(w)}\left(\int_{\gamma_{N}} \chi_{D\left(R_{N} \zeta, \rho\left(R_{N} \zeta\right)\right)}(w)|d \zeta|\right) d m(w) \\
& \quad \lesssim \int_{C_{N}}|f(w)|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi(w)} d m(w) \rightarrow 0, \quad N \rightarrow \infty
\end{aligned}
$$

Proof of Theorem 4. Let $\chi_{N}(z)=1$, if $z$ lies inside $\Gamma_{N}$ and 0 otherwise. Put

$$
\Sigma_{N}(z, f)=S(z) \sum_{k=1}^{N} \frac{f\left(\lambda_{k}\right)}{S^{\prime}\left(\lambda_{k}\right)\left(z-\lambda_{k}\right)}
$$

and set

$$
I_{N}(z, f)=\frac{1}{2 \pi i} \int_{\Gamma_{N}} \frac{f(\zeta)}{S(\zeta)(z-\zeta)} d \zeta
$$

The Cauchy formula gives us that

$$
I_{N}(z, f)=\sum_{k=1}^{N} \frac{f\left(\lambda_{k}\right)}{S^{\prime}\left(\lambda_{k}\right)\left(z-\lambda_{k}\right)}-\chi_{N}(z) \frac{f(z)}{S(z)}, \quad z \notin \Gamma_{N} .
$$

Hence,

$$
\Sigma_{N}(z, f)-f(z)=S(z) I_{N}(z, f)+\left(\chi_{N}(z)-1\right) f(z)
$$

and it remains only to prove that

$$
\left\|S I_{N}(\cdot, f)\right\|_{\varphi_{\beta}} \rightarrow 0, \quad N \rightarrow \infty
$$

Let $\omega$ be a Lebesgue measurable function such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\int_{0}^{\infty} \int_{0}^{2 \pi}\left|\omega\left(r e^{i t}\right)\right|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi(r)}(1+r)^{-2 \beta} r d r d t \leq 1 \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

and let

$$
J_{N}(f, \omega)=\int_{0}^{\infty} \int_{0}^{2 \pi} \omega\left(r e^{i t}\right) S\left(r e^{i t}\right) I_{N}\left(r e^{i t}, f\right) e^{-2 \varphi(r)}(1+r)^{-2 \beta} r d r d t
$$

It remains to show that

$$
\sup \left|J_{N}(f, \omega)\right| \rightarrow 0, \quad N \rightarrow \infty
$$

where the supremum is taken over all $\omega$ satisfying (3).

We have

$$
\begin{gathered}
2 \pi i J_{N}(f, \omega)=\int_{\Gamma_{N}} \frac{f(\zeta)}{S(\zeta)} \int_{\mathbb{C}} \frac{\omega(z) S(z)}{z-\zeta} e^{-2 \varphi(z)}(1+|z|)^{-2 \beta} d m(z) d \zeta \\
=\int_{\Gamma_{N}} \frac{f(\zeta)}{S(\zeta)} \int_{\mathbb{C}} \frac{\phi(z)}{z-\zeta}(1+|z|)^{-\beta-\gamma} d m(z) d \zeta
\end{gathered}
$$

where

$$
\phi(z)=\left[\omega(z) e^{-\varphi(z)}(1+|z|)^{-\beta}\right]\left[S(z) e^{-\varphi(z)}(1+|z|)^{\gamma}\right] .
$$

Note that

$$
\int_{\mathbb{C}}|\phi(z)|^{2} d m(z) \leq C
$$

Set $\psi(z)=R_{N} \phi\left(R_{N} z\right)$. We have

$$
\int_{\mathbb{C}}|\psi(z)|^{2} d m(z) \leq C
$$

Changing the variables $z=R_{N} w$ and $\zeta=R_{N} \eta$, we get

$$
2 \pi i J_{N}(f, \omega)=R_{N} \int_{\gamma_{N}} \frac{f\left(R_{N} \eta\right)}{S\left(R_{N} \eta\right)} \int_{\mathbb{C}} \frac{\psi(w)}{w-\eta}\left(1+R_{N}|w|\right)^{-\beta-\gamma} d m(w) d \eta
$$

Consider the operators

$$
T_{N}(\psi)(\eta)=\int_{\mathbb{C}} \frac{\psi(w)}{w-\eta}|w|^{-\beta-\gamma} d m(w), \quad \psi \in L^{2}(\mathbb{C}, d m(w))
$$

Since $\gamma+\beta \in(1 / 2,1)$, by [5, Lemma 13], the operators $T_{N}$ are bounded from $L^{2}(\mathbb{C}, d m(w))$ into $L^{2}\left(\gamma_{N}\right)$ and

$$
\sup _{N}\left\|T_{N}\right\|<\infty .
$$

Hence, by Lemma 8 and by the property $r^{1-2 \beta}=O(\rho(r)), r \rightarrow \infty$, we get

$$
\begin{aligned}
J_{N}(f, \omega) \lesssim & R_{N}^{1-\beta-\gamma}\left|\int_{\gamma_{N}} \frac{f\left(R_{N} \eta\right)}{S\left(R_{N} \eta\right)} T_{N}(\psi)(\eta) d \eta\right| \\
& \lesssim R_{N}^{1-\beta} \int_{\gamma_{N}}\left|f\left(R_{N} \eta\right)\right| e^{-\varphi\left(R_{N} \eta\right)}\left|T_{N}(\psi)(\eta)\right||d \eta| \\
& \lesssim\left(R_{N} \rho\left(R_{N}\right) \int_{\gamma_{N}}\left|f\left(R_{N} \eta\right)\right|^{2} e^{-2 \varphi\left(R_{N} \eta\right)}|d \eta|\right)^{1 / 2} \\
& \quad \times\left\|T_{N}(\psi)\right\|_{L^{2}(\mathbb{C}, d m(w))} \rightarrow 0, \quad N \rightarrow \infty
\end{aligned}
$$

This completes the proof.
2.3. Proof of Theorem 5. It suffices to find $f \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$ and a sequence $N_{k}$ such that (in the notations of the proof of Theorem 4)

$$
\begin{equation*}
A_{k}=\left\|S \chi_{N_{k}} \int_{\Gamma_{N_{k}}} \frac{f(\zeta)}{S(\zeta)(\cdot-\zeta)} d \zeta\right\|_{\varphi_{\beta}} \nrightarrow 0, \quad k \rightarrow \infty \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

We follow the method of the proof of [5, Theorem 11]. Let us write down the Taylor series of $S$ :

$$
S(z)=\sum_{n \geq 0} s_{n} z^{n} .
$$

Since $S \in \mathcal{S}_{\gamma}$, we have

$$
\left|s_{n}\right| \leq c \exp \left(-\frac{n}{a} \ln \frac{n}{a e}-\frac{\gamma}{a} \ln n\right), \quad n>0
$$

Choose $0<\varepsilon<\frac{a}{2}-2 \beta$. Given $R>0$ consider

$$
S_{R}=\sum_{\left|n-a R^{a}\right|<R^{\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon}} s_{n} z^{n}
$$

Then for every $n$ we have

$$
\left|S(z)-S_{R}(z)\right| e^{-|z|^{a}}=O\left(|z|^{-n}\right), \quad| | z|-R|<\rho(R), \quad R \rightarrow \infty
$$

Next we use that for some $c>0$ independent of $n$,

$$
\int_{0}^{\infty} r^{2 n+1} e^{-2 r^{a}} d r \leq c \int_{\left|r-\left(\frac{n}{a}\right)^{1 / a}\right|<n^{(1 / a)-(1 / 2)}} r^{2 n+1} e^{-2 r^{a}} d r
$$

Therefore,

$$
\begin{gathered}
\left\|S_{R}\right\|_{\varphi}^{2}=\sum_{\left|n-a R^{a}\right|<R^{\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon}} \pi\left|s_{n}\right|^{2} \int_{0}^{\infty} r^{2 n+1} e^{-2 r^{a}} d r \\
\leq \sum_{\left|n-a R^{a}\right|<R^{\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon}} c\left|s_{n}\right|^{2} \int_{\left|r-\left(\frac{n}{a}\right)^{1 / a}\right|<n^{(1 / a)-(1 / 2)}} r^{2 n+1} e^{-2 r^{a}} d r \\
\leq \sum_{\left|n-a R^{a}\right|<R^{\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon}} c\left|s_{n}\right|^{2} \int_{|r-R|<c_{1} R^{1-\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon}} r^{2 n+1} e^{-2 r^{a}} d r \\
\quad \leq \sum_{n \geq 0} c\left|s_{n}\right|^{2} \int_{|r-R|<c_{1} R^{1-\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon}} r^{2 n+1} e^{-2 r^{a}} d r \\
=c \int_{|r-R|<c_{1} R^{1-\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon}} \sum_{n \geq 0}\left|s_{n}\right|^{2} r^{2 n+1} e^{-2 r^{a}} d r \\
=c \int_{||z|-R|<c_{1} R^{1-\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon}}|S(z)|^{2} e^{-2|z|^{a}} d m(z) \leq c_{2} R^{2-\frac{a}{2}+\varepsilon-2 \gamma} .
\end{gathered}
$$

Fix $\varkappa$ such that

$$
1-\frac{a}{4}+\frac{\varepsilon}{2}-\gamma<\varkappa<1-\beta-\gamma .
$$

Choose a sequence $N_{k}, k \geq 1$, such that for $R_{k}=\left|\lambda_{N_{k}}\right|$ we have $R_{k+1}>2 R_{k}, k \geq 1$, and

$$
\left|e^{-|z|^{a}} \sum_{m \neq k} S_{R_{m}}(z) R_{m}^{-\varkappa \mid}\right| \leq \frac{1}{|z|^{\gamma+1}}, \quad| | z\left|-R_{k}\right|<\rho\left(R_{k}\right), \quad k \geq 1 .
$$

Set

$$
f=\sum_{k \geq 1} S_{R_{k}} R_{m}^{-\varkappa}
$$

Then $f \in \mathcal{F}_{\varphi}^{2}(\mathbb{C})$, and

$$
\frac{f}{S}=R_{k}^{-\varkappa}+O\left(R_{k}^{-1-\varkappa}\right) \quad \text { on } \quad \Gamma_{N_{k}}, \quad k \rightarrow \infty
$$

Hence,

$$
\left|S(z) \int_{\Gamma_{N_{k}}} \frac{f(\zeta)}{S(\zeta)(z-\zeta)} d \zeta\right| \geq c R_{k}^{-\varkappa} \frac{e^{|z|^{a}}}{(1+|z|)^{\gamma}}, \quad|z|<\frac{R_{k}}{2}
$$

and finally

$$
A_{k} \geq c R_{k}^{-\varkappa}\left(\int_{0}^{R_{k} / 2} \frac{r^{1-2 \beta} d r}{(1+r)^{2 \gamma}}\right)^{1 / 2} \rightarrow \infty, \quad k \rightarrow \infty
$$

This proves (4) and thus completes the proof of the theorem.

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
