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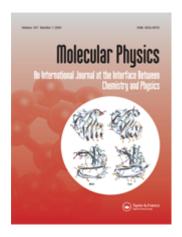

# A Multireference Perturbation Theory Study on the Fe<sub>2</sub> molecule: in quest of the ground state

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The  ${}^9\Sigma_q^-$  and  ${}^7\Delta_u$  states of the iron dimer, which according to a long-standing debate are the most probable candidates for the assignment of the ground state, have been investigated within the frame of multireference perturbation theory (PC-NEVPT2 and SC-NEVPT3) up to the third order in the energy. At short internuclear distances the  $^7\Delta_u$  state originates from the interaction of a ground–state  $^5D$  Fe atom with an excited–state  $^5F$ , whereas at large distances it results from the Van der Waals interaction of two  $^5D$  atoms. At all levels of calculation the  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  term appears to have lower energy than the short–range  ${}^7\Delta_u$  state and can thus be assigned as the ground state of the iron dimer. The spectroscopic constants of the  $^{9}\Sigma_{g}^{-}$  state (R<sub>e</sub>=2.164 Å,  $\omega_{e}$ =302.6 cm<sup>-1</sup> at the SC-NEVPT3 level of approximation) are in good accordance with the other high level ab initio calculation published thus far. The  ${}^9\Sigma_q^$ and  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  states of the iron dimer, which according to a long-standing debate are the most probable candidates for the assignment of the ground state, have been investigated within the frame of multireference perturbation theory (PC-NEVPT2 and SC-NEVPT3) up to the third order in the energy. At short internuclear distances the  $^7\Delta_u$  state originates from the interaction of a ground–state  $^5D$  Fe atom with an excited–state  $^5F$ , whereas at large distances it results from the Van der Waals interaction of two  $^5D$  atoms. At all levels of calculation the  $^9\Sigma_g^-$  term appears to have lower energy than the short–range  $^7\Delta_u$  state and can thus be assigned as the ground state of the iron dimer. The spectroscopic constants of the  ${}^9\Sigma_q^$ state (R<sub>e</sub>=2.164 Å,  $\omega_e$ =302.6 cm<sup>-1</sup> at the SC-NEVPT3 level of approximation) are in good accordance with the other high level ab initio calculations published thus far.

#### Introduction

The accurate description of the electronic structure of the dimers of the transition metals constitutes one of the most difficult tasks for nowadays' quantum chemical methods. The reasons for this situation are essentially due to the concomitance of various factors: a) a zero order description of the electronic states is often essentially multireference; b) the outermost s and d electrons in the atoms necessitate different requirements of dynamical correlation energy, with the size of the outer s orbital significantly larger, especially in the first-row transition metals, than that of the dorbitals; c) many molecular electronic states of different total spin and of different  $L_z$  angular momentum often lie in a tiny energy interval; d) in many cases the ground state of the atom has an electronic configuration with two electrons in the highest occupied s orbital, so that the molecular states correlating to the ground states of the atoms are essentially dissociative (with only at most a shallow van der Waals minimum); e) the molecular states correlating to the atomic states with

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only one electron in the highest occupied s orbital are usually bound; f) the  $s \to d$  excitation energy in the atom is often sufficiently low to justify the formation of the dimer bond as due to either atom (or even both) in an excited state; g) relativistic effects, especially for the transition metal rows other than the first, are significant.

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In the iron dimer all the factors above mentioned, with the only possible exception of the relativistic effects, are relevant and come into play, making Fe<sub>2</sub> one of the most difficult transition dimers to deal with from the theoretical viewpoint. Experimentally, the information on the iron dimer is not abundant; in particular, the determination of the dissociation energy  $(D_0)$  is subjected to uncertainties. Lin and Kant[1] with a second-law method estimate  $D_0 = 0.82 \pm 0.30$  eV, a value which is confirmed by Shim and Gingerich[2] who, on the basis of a third-law method, give  $D_0 = 0.78 \pm 0.17$  eV. Arguably, these values for  $D_0$  refer to the dissociation to the atoms in their ground state  $(^5D)$ . Moskovits and DiLella[3, 4], analysing resonance Raman spectra of Fe<sub>2</sub> in noble gas matrices, obtained a value of  $\omega_e = 300.26$ cm<sup>-1</sup> and  $\omega_e x_e = 1.45$  cm<sup>-1</sup> from which, fitting with a Morse oscillator, a value of  $D_e = 1.9 \text{ eV}$  could be obtained; however, using a LeRoy-Bernstein analysis[5], the same authors[4] obtain a value of  $D_e = 1.20$  eV. In a later work Haslett et al.[6] yield values in the range 1.25–1.75 eV for  $D_e$  and, more recently, Lian et al.[7] give a value of  $D_e = 1.14$  eV using collision-induced dissociation. The determination of the equilibrium distance and of the frequency for Fe<sub>2</sub> is subjected to much less uncertainty. Montano[8] and Purdum et al.[9] in EXAFS (Extended X-rays Absorption Fine Structure) and XANES (X-ray Absorption Near Edge Structure) experiments found  $R_e=1.87\pm0.13$  Å in argon matrix and  $R_e=2.02\pm0.02$  Å in neon matrix. Concerning the determination of the equilibrium vibration frequency, besides the values already quoted from Moskovits and DiLella[3, 4], the photoelectron spectra experiments carried out on Fe<sub>2</sub> by Leopold and Lineberger[10] yield a value of  $\omega_e$ =300±15 cm<sup>-1</sup>. In a later work, Leopold et al.[11] provided a simple and convincing explanation of the features of the experimental photoelectron spectra, advocating a nonet ground state  $({}^{9}\Sigma_{q}^{-})$  originating from the interaction of an atom in the  ${}^5D$  (3d<sup>6</sup>4s<sup>2</sup>) ground state with another in the excited  ${}^5F$  (3d<sup>7</sup>4s<sup>1</sup>)

The computational work on the iron dimer has been largely committed to DFT (Density Functional Theory) studies, most of which [12–21] agree in designating  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  as the ground state with more or less reasonable values for the equilibrium distance but with too large values for  $\omega_{e}$ . A noticeable exception in the DFT studies is provided by Irigoras et al.[22] and by Kulik et al.[23], where the  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{g}^{-}$  term turns out to be the ground state, with reasonable values of  $R_{e}$  and  $\omega_{e}$ . Irigoras et al.[22] use one of the most commonly adopted functionals (B3LYP) whereas Kulik et al. make use of the GGA (Generalised–Gradient Approximation) augmented by a Hubbard "U" term[24].

Ab initio work dedicated to Fe<sub>2</sub> is not abundant: Shim and Gingerich[2] performed a limited CI (Configuration Interaction) study based on HF (Hartree–Fock) orbitals on the interaction of two  ${}^5F$  atoms and found a  ${}^7\Delta_u$  ground state with  $R_e$  and  $\omega_e$  in large deviation from experiment. Tomonari and Tatewaki[25] and Noro et al.[26] introduced a certain amount of dynamical correlation in their multireference CI calculations and also found a  ${}^7\Delta_u$  ground state. A breakthrough in the Fe<sub>2</sub> ab initio work is provided by Hübner and Sauer[27] who perform internally contracted multireference CI calculations (IC–MRCI) starting from a CASSCF wavefunction. They find  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  as the ground state (with  $R_e$ =2.19 Å and  $\omega_e$ =303 cm<sup>-1</sup>) and establish that  ${}^7\Delta_u$  is higher in energy by 0.69–0.70 eV, with  $R_e$  and  $\omega_e$  varying considerably if a size consistency correction is brought to the IC–MRCI calculation. Almost at the same time, Bauschlicher and Ricca[28] published a work, again

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 based on IC–MRCI calculations, where the results of Ref.[27] are confirmed, yielding a  $^9\Sigma_g^-$  ground state ( $R_e$ =2.19 Å,  $\omega_e$ =301 cm<sup>-1</sup>) with the  $^7\Delta_u$  state being higher in energy by 0.72–0.75 eV. Yet, Bauschlicher and Ricca advocate the opinion that, in order to reconcile theory and experiment, the  $^7\Delta_u$  state should be expected to be the true ground state, thus explaining the absence of ESR spectra[29], while  $^9\Sigma_g^-$  would be the only possible state accessible in the photodetachment experiment[10]. This supposition is seemingly confirmed by Casula *et al.*[30] who perform quantum Montecarlo (QMC) calculations based on the resonant valence bond (RVB) wavefunction. Actually the QMC calculations of Ref.[30] yield a  $^9\Sigma_g^-$  ground state with  $^7\Delta_u$  higher by 0.64 eV but the authors envisage to bring a correction, based on the asymptotic values of the energies, which upsets the energy ordering of the molecular terms.

As can be noticed from the cursory exposition reported above, the question of the attribution of the ground state for the iron dimer is not yet fully solved. Also, apart from the early works[2, 25, 26] and from Hübner and Sauer's results[27], most theoretical works are confined to the determination of the equilibrium distance and of the harmonic frequency but are reluctant to produce the potential energy curve (PEC) for a wide range of internuclear distances. In the present work we shall investigate the lowest  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  and  ${}^7\Delta_u$  states of Fe<sub>2</sub> making use of the n-electron valence state perturbation theory[31–33] up to the second (NEVPT2) and third order (NEVPT3)[34] in the energy. So far, only Ref.[28] has made use of multireference perturbation theory (MRPT), yielding rather disappointing results. In the following sections we shall present the computational details of our approach (section 2), the results for the atomic calculations (section 3), those for the molecular calculations (section 4) and some conclusive remarks (section 5).

#### 2. Computational details

The calculations reported in this paper make use of the NEVPT2 form of MRPT developed in our laboratory[31–34]. The results for the iron dimer have been obtained with the "partially contracted" variant of the second order perturbation theory (PC–NEVPT2) and with the "strongly contracted" third order approach (SC–NEVPT3). We recall that the partially contracted approach makes use of the full dimensionality of the internally contracted first-order interacting space (IC–FOIS) whereas the strongly contracted variant only uses a subspace thereof. In a recent paper dedicated to the study of the scandium dimer[35], it has been shown that the third order strongly contracted approach yields results that are hardly distinguishable from the computationally heavier third order partially contracted one. It is worth remembering that the NEVPT theory is endowed with two properties that make it particularly appealing for the study of the transition metal dimers: It is exempt from the intruder state problem, which afflicts most multireference PT's and it is fully size—consistent, provided the underlying CASSCF wavefunction is itself size—consistent.

The atomic basis adopted in this work is the ANO–RCC (Atomic natural Orbitals Relativistic Correlation Consistent) set developed by Roos and coworkers[36] and consists of 21s15p10d6f4g2h primitive gaussians contracted to 10s9p8d6f4g2h. Scalar relativistic effects have been accounted for by use of the Douglas–Kroll–Hess Hamiltonian[37]. The calculations have been carried out with the 2009.1 release of the MOLPRO[38] program, which contains an implementation of the NEVPT2 code. The NEVPT3 calculations have been performed with a stand-alone program interfaced with the MOLPRO package. The zero order wavefuctions to be next

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submitted to the perturbation treatment have been built with a CASSCF procedure with the active space consisting of the molecular orbitals stemming from the 4s and 3d atomic orbitals (CASSCF 16/12 with 16 active electrons distributed over 12 molecular orbitals). For the degenerate states studied in this paper ( $^7\Delta_u$ ) the CASSCF calculations have been performed by averaging over the two degenerate components. To make sure that the calculated states have the desired value of  $L_z$  (the component of the total electronic angular momentum on the internuclear axis), a feature of the MOLPRO program has been exploited (the LQUANT parameter) and the mean value of the bielectronic  $\hat{L}_z^2$  operator has been evaluated after the CASSCF. The perturbation calculations have been done by leaving the 1s, 2s and 2p electrons uncorrelated. In this work we have drawn on the experience gained in our previous studies on the transition metal dimers for the group VI elements[34, 39] (Cr<sub>2</sub>, Mo<sub>2</sub>, W<sub>2</sub> and CrMo), for Mn<sub>2</sub>[40] and for Sc<sub>2</sub>[35].

#### 3. Atomic calculations

Experimentally [41] the energy separation between the  $^5D$  (3 $d^64s^2$ ) ground state of the Fe atom and the first excited state  ${}^{5}F$  ( $3d^{7}4s^{1}$ ) is rather small, amounting to 0.87 eV (difference between J-averaged values). The next excited states of Fe are located at 1.49 eV ( ${}^3F$  ( $3d^74s^1$ )) and 2.14 eV ( ${}^5P$  ( $3d^74s^1$ )). In this section we report the results of the calculations done on the  ${}^5D$  and  ${}^5F$  states. Starting from a CASSCF wavefunction obtained by utilising the 4s and the five 3d orbitals as active space, NEVPT calculations have been carried out at the second (PC-NEVPT2) and at the third order (SC-NEVPT3). In all cases, the CASSCF calculations have been performed by averaging over all the  $L_z$  components. Firstly, calculations have been conducted using orbitals optimised for the <sup>5</sup>D and <sup>5</sup>F states separately. Secondly, another set of computations has been performed with orbitals obtained with an averaged CASSCF over the  $^5D$  and  $^5F$  states altogether. This latter choice was dictated by the consideration that for the molecular states of Fe<sub>2</sub> dissociating to the  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  limit, the CASSCF calculation actually involves an average over a subset of the  ${}^5D$  and  ${}^5F$  atomic components. The results are summarised in Table 1 where it can be remarked that, for the <sup>5</sup>D term with single-state orbitals, the third order contribution to the energy is small, indicating that the zero order CASSCF description is adequate for this state and that the perturbation series appears to be converging. On the other hand, the  ${}^5F$  state, with one electron promoted from 4s to 3d, exhibits a second order correction much larger than the corresponding one for <sup>5</sup>D, followed by a large positive third order contribution. The CASSCF description of  ${}^{5}F$  appears to be poor, with too large an amount of correlation energy at the second order and with a vast oscillation at the third order. The poor description of the <sup>5</sup>F state at the CASSCF level lies at the root of the difficulties encountered in the Fe<sub>2</sub> calculations. Table 1 also shows the results obtained with a common set of orbitals originating from the averaged CASSCF calculation. As can be seen from Table 1, the perturbation results suffer from a large oscillation for both atomic states when going from second to third order. We can therefore anticipate that: a) the molecular states of Fe<sub>2</sub> dissociating to the  ${}^5D + {}^5D$  limit will benefit, at the CASSCF level, by a much better description than those tending to the  ${}^5D + {}^5F$ limit, b) at the second order of NEVPT the dissociation limits will be even upset, with  ${}^5D$  +  ${}^5D$  lying above  ${}^5D$  +  ${}^5F$  (-2543.948554 hartrees for  ${}^5D$  +  ${}^5D$ , twice the NEVPT2 energy with state specific orbitals; -2543.976573 hartrees for  $^5D$  + <sup>5</sup>F, the sum of the two NEVPT2 energies with averaged CASSCF orbitals), c) at the third order of NEVPT the correct ordering will be restored but the energy

 difference between the two limits will be numerically incorrect by roughly 1 eV.

All these difficulties would be much alleviated by the introduction of a second set of d orbitals in the Fe atom. Actually, calculations carried out with 11 active orbitals (4s, 3d and 4d) considerably improve on the CASSCF wavefunction and yield very small third order contributions to both atomic states; the resulting excitation energy from  $^5D$  to  $^5F$  amounts to 0.80 eV (CASSCF), 0.63 eV (PC–NEVPT2) and 0.82 eV (SC–NEVPT3). Unfortunately, molecular calculations at the CASSCF level with an active space of 22 orbitals are still unfeasible nowadays.

# 4. The ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$ and ${}^7\Delta_u$ states of the Fe<sub>2</sub> molecule

In this section we report our calculations on the electronic states of the iron dimer, focusing our attention on the  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  and  ${}^7\Delta_u$  terms only, since it appears to be ascertained from all the works published to date that the ground state of Fe<sub>2</sub> has to be attributed to either of such states. From Wigner and Witmer's rules[42], the  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  terms may not dissociate to the  ${}^5D + {}^5D$  limit (nor to the  ${}^5F + {}^5F$  one); there are three  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  states dissociating to the  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  limit. On the other hand, for the  ${}^7\Delta_u$  terms, the situation is as follows: There are two, four and three states dissociating to  ${}^5D + {}^5D$ ,  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  and  ${}^5F + {}^5F$ , respectively. In order for the  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  state (or the  ${}^7\Delta_u$  state with  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  character) to be the ground state, a necessary condition is that the dissociation energy with respect to the  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  limit must be higher than the atomic excitation energy from  ${}^5D$  to  ${}^5F$ .

The results of our calculations are collected in Figure 1. The left side of the figure reports the PEC's of the  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{g}^{-}$  and  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  states without any further correction, whereas in the right side the curves of the  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  state dissociating to the  ${}^5D$  +  ${}^5D$  atomic limit are shifted by a constant amount such as to guarantee the experimental energy difference of 0.87 eV between the asymptotic limits. The upper (a, a'), middle (b, b') and lower part (c, c') of the figure relate to the CASSCF, PC-NEVPT2 and SC-NEVPT3 calculations, respectively. The CASSCF results for the  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  state are continuous all over the range of internuclear distances and show a well defined physical character originating from the interaction of a <sup>5</sup>D with a <sup>5</sup>F iron atom. At the distance of 4.10 a.u., close to the minimum, the occupation pattern for the active orbitals is given by  $\sigma^{2.97}(4s)\sigma^{3.00}(d_{z^2})\delta^{2.03}(d_{x^2-y^2})\delta^{2.03}(d_{xy})\pi^{2.99}(d_{zx})\pi^{2.99}(d_{zy}),$ where we have summed over the g and u components of the various symmetries. The  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  state, on the contrary, suffers from a marked discontinuity in the vicinity of R=4.20 a.u., where the character of the state suddenly passes from  ${}^5D$  +  ${}^5F$  to  ${}^5D$  +  ${}^5D$ . At R=4.20 a.u. the occupation pattern is  $\sigma^{2.97}(4s)\sigma^{2.06}(d_{z^2})\delta^{2.02}(d_{x^2-y^2})\delta^{3.00}(d_{xy})\pi^{2.98}(d_{zx})\pi^{2.98}(d_{zy})$  whereas at R=4.30 a.u. we obtain  $\sigma^{3.90}(4s)\sigma^{2.10}(d_{z^2})\delta^{2.00}(d_{x^2-y^2})\delta^{2.00}(d_{xy})\pi^{3.00}(d_{zy})\pi^{3.00}(d_{zy})$ . Usually, when an abrupt change of physical character takes place in the CASSCF description of the PEC of a molecule, it is sufficient to carry out an appropriate average over a few electronic states to resolve the discontinuity. In the case of the  $^{7}\Delta_{u}$  state of Fe<sub>2</sub>, however, the difference in physical nature between the shortrange (s.r.)  ${}^5D$  +  ${}^5F$  and the long-range (l.r.)  ${}^5D$  +  ${}^5D$  states, is so pronounced that no average of states could be revealed to be effective in attenuating the discontinuity. In the light of the considerations exposed in the description of the  $^5D$ and  ${}^5F$  states of the iron atom, it is apparent that the l.r. branch of the  ${}^7\Delta_u$  state is described much better, at the CASSCF level, than the s.r. branch. In order to make the curves comparable, we have empirically raised all the points of the l.r.  $^{7}\Delta_{u}$  PEC by a constant value so as to obtain the correct asymptotic difference

of 0.87 eV between the  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  and  ${}^7\Delta_u$  states. Passing now to examine the second order results for the PEC's, we observe that PC–NEVPT2 brings a vast negative correction to the states with  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  character ( ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  and s.r.  ${}^7\Delta_u$ ), leading to a wrong location of the asymptotic states. By empirically lowering the l.r.  ${}^7\Delta_u$  PEC, we obtain the situation depicted in the right side of Figure 1. Finally, the third order results, with a positive third order contribution to the energy of both  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  and s.r.  ${}^7\Delta_u$ , restore the correct ordering of the asymptotic atomic limits but yield too large a value for the asymptotic energy difference.

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The s.r. branch of  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  symmetry describes a state which shares the same physical nature as  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{g}^{-}$ , namely the interaction of a  ${}^{5}D$  (3 $d^{6}4s^{2}$ ) with a  ${}^{5}F$  (3 $d^{7}4s^{1}$ ) atom; arguably, it can be considered as a quasi-diabatic state tending asymptotically to the  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  atomic limit. The correlation requirements of such a state are similar to those of  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{q}^{-}$  and Figure 1 shows that its energy is higher than  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{q}^{-}$  in the zone of the minimum. The energy difference between the minima of the s.r.  $^{7}\Delta_{u}$  and  $^9\Sigma_q^-$  states (assuming R=4.20 a.u. as the minimum for the s.r.  $^7\Delta_u$ ) amounts to 0.62 for CASSCF, 0.66 eV for PC-NEVPT2 and 0.57 eV for SC-NEVPT3, suggesting that states with the same physical nature are dealt with in a balanced way. On the other hand, the l.r. branch of  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  symmetry describes a state originating from the van der Waals interaction of two <sup>5</sup>D atoms, yielding a shallow minimum at large distance (PC-NEVPT2 predicts  $R_e$ =3.66 Å,  $D_e$ =0.076 eV,  $\omega_e$ =37.8 cm<sup>-1</sup> whereas SC-NEVPT3 gives  $R_e=3.81$  Å,  $D_e=0.052$  eV,  $\omega_e=33.4$  cm<sup>-1</sup>). The spectroscopic constants for the  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{q}^{-}$  state are reported in Table 2 where a good accordance can be noted with the values obtained by the other ab initio calculations. The dissociation energy for the  ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  state, calculated with respect to the  ${}^5D+{}^5F$  limit, is probably overestimated by PC-NEVPT2 (2.35 eV) and underestimated by SC-NEVPT3 (1.26 eV), a situation which we have met also in our preceding studies on the transition metal dimers.

#### 5. Conclusive remarks

In this article the  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{q}^{-}$  and  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  states of the iron dimer have been analysed within the formalism of the NEVPT theory up to the third order in energy. In all of our calculations, namely CASSCF, PC-NEVPT2 and SC-NEVPT3, the  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  state, albeit showing a discontinuity the origin of which has been discussed in section 4, exhibits a  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  character in the zone of the minimum where it has higher energy than the  ${}^9\Sigma_q^-$  state. Our results are in accordance with the accurate MR-CI calculations of Hübner and Sauer[27] and of Bauschlicher and Ricca[28]. Among the high level ab initio calculation published so far, it is only the work of Casula et al.[30] which assigns the ground state to  $^{7}\Delta_{u}$ . Anyway such an assignment is obtained thanks to a correction which is brought to the QMC calculations of Ref[30]. The correction is based on the atomic limit of the  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{q}^{-}$  and  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  states which Casula et al. [30] assume to be  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  and  ${}^5D + {}^5D$ , respectively. However the  ${}^7\Delta_u$  state in the zone of the minimum has  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  character and the pertinent correction to be brought should be related to the  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  limit. Therefore, in our opinion, also the work of Ref[30] bears out that  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{g}^{-}$  is the ground state for the iron dimer. Actually, the energy difference between the  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  and  ${}^{9}\Sigma_{q}^{-}$  states reported in Ref[30] without correction (0.64 eV) is very similar to the one reported in the present work (0.57 eV in the SC-NEVPT3 calculation).

In conclusion, the accurate description of the electronic states of the Fe<sub>2</sub> molecule stands out as a most difficult task and the present work can be considered as only partially satisfactory. The origin of the difficulties lies in the defective description

of the  ${}^5F$  atomic state of Fe, for which the usage of an active space restricted to the valence shell orbitals 4s and 3d reveals itself as not entirely adequate. The use of a larger active space, possibly doubling the d orbitals in each centre, is likely to resolve both the discontinuity of the  ${}^{7}\Delta_{u}$  PEC and the unbalanced description of the states dissociating to the  ${}^5D + {}^5D$  and  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  atomic limits; unfortunately such a strategy is not yet viable nowadays. On the one hand the comparison of the absolute energies of the molecular states with  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  character with those of  ${}^5D$ +  $^{5}D$  is defective because of the too different requirements of correlation energy of those states. On the other hand, the two states with  ${}^5D + {}^5F$  character ( ${}^9\Sigma_g^-$  and short–range  ${}^7\Delta_u$ ) are well comparable with one another and the present study has shown that  ${}^9\Sigma_q^-$ , at all levels of approximation, always shows a lower energy than The perplexities raised by Bauschlicher and Ricca[28] about the reconcilement

of the theoretical results with experiment still remain unanswered.
