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# Non-parametric adaptive estimation of the drift for a jump diffusion process 

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5th June 2012


#### Abstract

In this article, we consider a jump diffusion process $\left(X_{t}\right)_{t \geq 0}$ observed at discrete times $t=0, \Delta, \ldots, n \Delta$. The sampling interval $\Delta$ tends to 0 and $n \Delta$ tends to infinity. We assume that $\left(X_{t}\right)_{t \geq 0}$ is ergodic, strictly stationary and exponentially $\beta$-mixing. We use a penalized least-square approach to compute two adaptive estimators of the drift function $b$. We provide bounds for the risks of the two estimators.


## 1 Introduction

We consider a general diffusion with jumps:

$$
\begin{equation*}
d X_{t}=b\left(X_{t}\right) d t+\sigma\left(X_{t}\right) d W_{t}+\xi\left(X_{t^{-}}\right) d L_{t} \quad \text { and } \quad X_{0}=\eta \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $L_{t}$ is a centred pure jump Levy process:

$$
d L_{t}=\int_{z \in \mathbb{R}} z(\mu(d t, d z)-d t \nu(d z))
$$

with $\mu$ a random Poisson measure with intensity measure $\nu(d z) d t$ such that $\int_{z \in \mathbb{R}} z^{2} \nu(d z)<\infty$. The compensated Poisson measure $\tilde{\mu}$ is defined by $\tilde{\mu}(d t, d z)=$ $\mu(d t, d z)-\nu(d z) d t$. The random variable $\eta$ is independant of $\left(W_{t}, L_{t}\right)_{t \geq 0}$. Moreover, $\left(W_{t}\right)_{t \geq 0}$ and $\left(L_{t}\right)_{t \geq 0}$ are independant.

This process is observed with high frequency (at times $t=0, \Delta, \ldots, n \Delta$ where $\Delta \rightarrow 0$ and $n \Delta \rightarrow \infty$ ). It is assumed to be ergodic, stationary and exponentially $\beta$-mixing (see Masuda (2007) for sufficient conditions). Our aim is to construct a non-parametric estimator of $b$ on a compact set $A$.

The non-parametric estimation of $b$ and $\sigma$ for a diffusion process observed with high-frequency is well-known (see for instance Hoffmann (1999) and Comte et al. (2007)). Diffusion processes with jumps are used in various fields, for instance in finance, for modelling the growth of a population, in hydrology, in
medical science, ..., but there exist few results for the non-parametric estimation of $b$ and $\sigma$. Shimizu and Yoshida (2006) construct maximum-likelihood estimators of parameters of $b$ and $\sigma$. Their estimators reach the standard rates of convergence: $\sqrt{n \Delta}$ for the estimator of $b$, and $\sqrt{n}$ for the estimator of $\sigma$. Shimizu (2008) and Mancini and Renò (2011) use a kernel estimator to obtain non parametric threshold estimators of $\sigma$. Mancini and Renò (2011) also construct a non-parametric thruncated estimator of $b$, but only when $L_{t}$ is a compound Poisson process. To our knowledge, minimax rates of convergences for non-parametric estimators of $b, \sigma$ or $\xi$ are not available in the literature.

In this paper, we use model selection to construct two non-parametric estimators of $b$ under the asymptotic framework $\Delta \rightarrow 0$ and $n \Delta \rightarrow \infty$. This method was introduced by Birgé and Massart (1998).

First, we introduce a sequence of linear subspaces $S_{m} \subseteq L^{2}(A)$ and, for each $m$, we construct an estimator $\hat{b}_{m}$ of $b$ by minimising on $S_{m}$ the contrast function:

$$
\gamma_{n}(t)=\frac{1}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Y_{k \Delta}-t\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)^{2} \quad \text { where } \quad Y_{k \Delta}=\frac{X_{(k+1) \Delta}-X_{k \Delta}}{\Delta} .
$$

We obtain a collection of estimators of the drift function $b$ and we bound their risks (Theorem 1). Then, we introduce a penalty function to select the "best" dimension $m$ and we deduce an adaptive estimator $\hat{b}_{\hat{m}}$. Under the assumption that $\nu$ is sub-exponential, that is if there exist two positive constants $C, \lambda$ such that, for $z$ large enough, $\nu\left([-z, z]^{c}\right) \leq C e^{-\lambda z}$, the risk bound of $\hat{b}_{\hat{m}}$ is exactly the same as for a diffusion without jumps (Theorem 2) (see Comte et al. (2007) or Hoffmann (1999)).

In a second part, we do not assume that $\nu$ is subexponential and we construct a truncated estimator $\tilde{b}_{m}$ of $b$. We minimise the contrast function

$$
\tilde{\gamma}_{n}(t)=\frac{1}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Y_{k \Delta} \mathbb{1}_{\left|Y_{k \Delta}\right| \leq C_{\Delta}}-t\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)^{2} \quad \text { where } \quad C_{\Delta} \propto \sqrt{\Delta} \ln (n)
$$

in order to obtain a new estimator $\tilde{b}_{m}$. As in the first part, we introduce a penalty function to obtain an adaptive estimator $\tilde{b}_{\tilde{m}}$. The risk bound of this adaptive estimator depends on the Blumenthal-Getoor index of $\nu$ (Theorems 3 and 4).

In Section 2, we present the model and its assumptions. In Sections 3 and 4, we construct the estimators and bound their risks. Some simulations are presented in Section 5. Proofs are gathered in Sections 6 and 7.

## 2 Assumptions

### 2.1 Assumptions on the model

We consider the following assumptions:
A 1. The functions $b, \sigma$ and $\xi$ are Lipschitz.

A 2. 1. The function $\sigma$ is bounded from below and above:

$$
\exists \sigma_{0}, \sigma_{1}, \forall x \in \mathbb{R}, \quad 0<\sigma_{1} \leq \sigma(x) \leq \sigma_{0}
$$

2. The function $\xi$ is bounded: $\exists \xi_{0}, \forall x \in \mathbb{R}, \quad 0 \leq \xi(x) \leq \xi_{0}$.
3. The drift function $b$ is elastic: there exists a constant $M$ such that, for any $x \in \mathbb{R},|x|>M: x b(x) \lesssim-|x|^{2}$.
4. The Lévy measure $\nu$ satisfies:

$$
\nu(\{0\})=0, \quad \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} z^{2} \nu(d z)=1 \quad \text { and } \quad \int_{-\infty}^{\infty} z^{4} \nu(d z)<\infty .
$$

Under Assumption A1, the stochastic differential equation (1) admits a unique strong solution. According to Masuda (2007), under Assumptions A1 and A2, the process $\left(X_{t}\right)$ admits a unique invariant probability $\varpi$ and satisfies the ergodic theorem: for any measurable function $g$ such that $\int|g(x)| \varpi(d x)<$ $\infty$, when $T \rightarrow \infty$,

$$
\frac{1}{T} \int_{0}^{T} g\left(X_{s}\right) d s \rightarrow \int g(x) \varpi(d x)
$$

This distribution has moments of order 4. Moreover, Masuda (2007) also ensures that under these assumptions, the process $\left(X_{t}\right)$ is exponentially $\beta$-mixing. Furtermore, if there exist two constants $c$ and $n_{0}$ such that, for any $x \in \mathbb{R}$, $\xi^{2}(x) \geq c(1+|x|)^{-n_{0}}$, then Ishikawa and Kunita (2006) ensure that a smooth transition density exists.

A 3. 1. The stationary measure $\varpi$ admits a density $\pi$ which is bounded from below and above on the compact interval $A$ :

$$
\exists \pi_{0}, \pi_{1}, \forall x \in A, \quad 0<\pi_{1} \leq \pi(x) \leq \pi_{0}
$$

2. The process $\left(X_{t}\right)_{t \geq 0}$ is stationary $(\eta \sim \varpi(d x)=\pi(x) d x)$.

The following proposition very useful for the proofs is proved later.

## Proposition 1.

Under Assumptions A1-A3, for any $p \geq 1$, there exists a constant $c(p)$ such that, if $\int_{\mathbb{R}} z^{2 p} \nu(d z)<\infty$ :

$$
\mathbb{E}\left(\sup _{s \in[t, t+h]}\left(X_{s}-X_{t}\right)^{2 p}\right) \leq c(p) h .
$$

### 2.2 Assumptions on the approximation spaces

In order to construct an adaptive estimator of $b$, we use model selection: we compute a collection of estimators $\hat{b}_{m}$ of $b$ by minimising a contrast function $\gamma_{n}(t)$ on a vectorial subspace $S_{m} \subset L^{2}(A)$, then we choose the best possible estimator using a penalty function $\operatorname{pen}(m)$. The collection of vectorial subspaces $\left(S_{m}\right)_{m \in \mathscr{M}_{n}}$ has to satisfy the following assumption:

A 4 .

1. The subspaces $S_{m}$ have finite dimension $D_{m}$.
2. The sequence of vectorial subpsaces $\left(S_{m}\right)_{m \geq 0}$ is increasing: for any $m$, $S_{m} \subseteq S_{m+1}$.
3. Norm connexion: there exists a constant $\phi_{1}$ such that, for any $m \geq 0$, any $t \in S_{m}$,

$$
\|t\|_{\infty}^{2} \leq \phi_{1} D_{m}\|t\|_{L^{2}}^{2}
$$

where $\|\cdot\|_{L^{2}}$ is the $L^{2}$-norm and $\|\cdot\|_{\infty}$ is the sup-norm on $A$.
4. For any $m \in \mathbb{N}$, there exists an orthonormal basis $\left(\psi_{\lambda}\right)_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m}}$ of $S_{m}$ such that

$$
\forall \lambda, \quad \operatorname{card}\left(\lambda^{\prime},\left\|\psi_{\lambda} \psi_{\lambda^{\prime}}\right\|_{\infty} \neq 0\right) \leq \phi_{0}
$$

where $\phi_{0}$ does not depend on $m$.
5. For any function $t$ belonging to the unit ball of the Besov space $\mathscr{B}_{2, \infty}^{\alpha}$,

$$
\exists C, \forall m \quad\left\|t-t_{m}\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2} \leq C 2^{-2 m \alpha}
$$

where $t_{m}$ is the $L^{2}$ orthogonal projection of $t$ on $S_{m}$.
The subspaces generated by piecewise polynomials, compactly supported wavelets or spline functions satisfy A4 (see DeVore and Lorentz (1993) and Meyer (1990) for instance).

## 3 Estimation of the drift

By analogy with Comte et al. (2007), we decompose $Y_{k \Delta}$ in the following way:

$$
\begin{equation*}
Y_{k \Delta}=\frac{X_{(k+1) \Delta}-X_{k \Delta}}{\Delta}=b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)+I_{k \Delta}+Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta} \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where

$$
\begin{gathered}
I_{k \Delta}=\frac{1}{\Delta} \int_{k \Delta}^{(k+1) \Delta}\left(b\left(X_{s}\right)-b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right) d s, \quad Z_{k \Delta}=\frac{1}{\Delta} \int_{k \Delta}^{(k+1) \Delta} \sigma\left(X_{s}\right) d W_{s} \\
T_{k \Delta}=\frac{1}{\Delta} \int_{k \Delta}^{(k+1) \Delta} \xi\left(X_{s^{-}}\right) d L_{s} .
\end{gathered}
$$

The terms $Z_{k \Delta}$ and $T_{k \Delta}$ are martingale increments. Let us introduce the mean square contrast function

$$
\begin{equation*}
\gamma_{n}(t)=\frac{1}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Y_{k \Delta}-t\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)^{2} \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

and the empirical risk

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathscr{R}_{n}(t)=\left\|t-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \quad \text { where } \quad\|t\|_{n}^{2}=\frac{1}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n} t^{2}\left(X_{k \Delta}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad t_{A}=t \mathbb{1}_{A} . \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

We consider the asymptotic framework:

$$
\Delta \rightarrow 0, \quad n \Delta \rightarrow \infty
$$

For any $m \in \mathscr{M}_{n}=\left\{m, D_{m} \leq \mathscr{D}_{n}\right\}$ where $\mathscr{D}_{n}^{2} \leq n \Delta / \ln ^{2}(n)$, we construct the regression-type estimator:

$$
\hat{b}_{m}=\arg \min _{t \in S_{m}} \gamma_{n}(t)
$$

## Theorem 1.

Under Assumptions A1-A4, the risk of the estimator with fixed $m$ satisfies:

$$
\mathscr{R}_{n}\left(\hat{b}_{m}\right) \leq 3 \pi_{1}\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+48\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right) \frac{D_{m}}{n \Delta}+c \Delta
$$

where $b_{m}$ is the orthogonal ( $L^{2}$ ) projection of $b_{A}$ over the vectorial subspace $S_{m}$. The constant $c$ is independent of $m, n$ and $\Delta$.

Except for the constant $\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right)$ in the variance term, this is exactly the bound of the risk that Comte et al. (2007) found for a diffusion process without jumps.

The bias term, $\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}$, decreases when the dimension $D_{m}$ increases whereas the variance term $\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right) D_{m} /(n \Delta)$ is proportional to the dimension. Under the classical assumption $n \Delta^{2}=O(1)$, the remainder term $\Delta$ is negligible. Thus we need to find a good compromise between the bias and the variance term.

Remark 1. If the regularity of the drift function is known, that is, if b belongs to a ball of a Besov space $\mathscr{B}_{2, \infty}^{\alpha}$, then the bias term $\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}$ is smaller than $D_{m}^{-2 \alpha}$. The best estimator is obtained for $D_{m_{\text {opt }}}=(n \Delta)^{1 /(1+2 \alpha)}$ and the estimator risk satisfies:

$$
\mathscr{R}_{n}\left(\hat{b}_{m_{o p t}}\right) \lesssim(n \Delta)^{-2 \alpha /(2 \alpha+1)}+\Delta .
$$

Let us introduce a penalty function pen such that:

$$
\operatorname{pen}(m) \geq \kappa\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right) \frac{D_{m}}{n \Delta}
$$

and set:

$$
\hat{m}=\arg \min _{m \in \mathscr{M}_{n}}\left\{\gamma_{n}\left(\hat{b}_{m}\right)+\operatorname{pen}(m)\right\} .
$$

We will chose $\kappa$ later. We denote by $\hat{b}_{\hat{m}}$ the resulting estimator. To bound the risk of the adaptive estimator, an additional assumption is needed:

A 5. 1. The Lévy measure $\nu$ is symmetric or the function $\xi$ is constant.
2. The Lévy measure $\nu$ is sub exponential: there exist $\lambda, C>0$ such that, for any $|z|>1, \nu(]-z, z\left[^{c}\right) \leq C e^{-\lambda|z|}$.

Theorem 2.
Under Assumptions A1-A5, there exists a constant $\kappa$ (depending only on $\nu$ ) such that, if $\mathscr{D}_{n}^{2} \leq n \Delta / \ln ^{2}(n)$ :

$$
\mathbb{E}\left(\left\|\hat{b}_{\hat{m}}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}\right) \lesssim \inf _{m \in \mathscr{M}_{n}}\left(\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+\operatorname{pen}(m)\right)+\left(\Delta+\frac{1}{n \Delta}\right) .
$$

We can bound $\kappa$ theoretically, however, this bound is in practice too large for the simulations. In Section 5, we calibrate $\kappa$ by simulations (see Comte et al. (2007) for instance). The adaptive estimator automatically realises the bias-variance compromise. Moreover, this is the same oracle inequality as for a diffusion process without jumps.

## 4 Truncated estimator of the drift

Truncated estimators are widely used for the estimation of the diffusion coefficient of a jump diffusion (see for instance Mancini and Renò (2011) and Shimizu (2008)). Our aim is to construct an adaptive estimator of $b$ even if Assumption A5 is not fulfilled. To this end, we cut off the big jumps. Let us introduce the set

$$
\Omega_{X, k}=\left\{\omega,\left|X_{(k+1) \Delta}-X_{k \Delta}\right| \leq C_{\Delta}\right\}
$$

where $C_{\Delta}=\left(b_{\max }+3\right) \Delta+\left(\sigma_{0}+4 \xi_{0}\right) \sqrt{\Delta} \ln (n)\left(\right.$ with $\left.b_{\max }=\sup _{x \in A}|b(x)|\right)$. Let us consider the random variables

$$
\tilde{Y}_{k \Delta}=\frac{X_{(k+1) \Delta}-X_{k \Delta}}{\Delta} \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{X, k}} \mathbb{1}_{X_{k \Delta} \in A} .
$$

We recall here the definition of the Blumenthal-Getoor index:

## Definition 1.

The Blumenthal-Getoor index of a Lévy measure is

$$
\beta=\inf \left\{\alpha \geq 0, \int_{|z| \leq 1}|z|^{\alpha} \nu(d z)<\infty\right\} .
$$

A compound Poisson process has $\beta=0$.
We assume that the following assumption is fulfilled.

A 6. 1. The Lévy measure $\nu$ is symmetric.
2. For $|x|$ small, $\nu(d x)$ is absolutely continuous with respect to the Lebesgue measure ( $\nu(x)=n(x) d x)$ and:

$$
\exists \beta \in\left[0,2\left[, \exists a_{0}, \forall x \in\left[-a_{0}, a_{0}\right], \quad n(x) \leq C x^{-\beta-1} .\right.\right.
$$

This implies that the Blumenthal-Getoor index is equal to $\beta$.
3. The function $\xi$ is bounded from below: there exists $\xi_{1}>0$ such that, for any $z \in \mathbb{R}, 0<\xi_{1} \leq \xi(z)$.
4. The functions $\sigma$ and $\xi$ are $\mathscr{C}^{2}$, and $\xi^{\prime}$ and $\sigma^{\prime}$ are Lipschitz.

We consider the following asymptotic framework:

$$
\frac{n \Delta}{\ln ^{2}(n)} \rightarrow 0, \quad \Delta^{1-\beta / 2} \ln ^{2}(n) \rightarrow 0
$$

The truncated estimator $\tilde{b}_{m}$ is obtained by minimising the contrast function:

$$
\tilde{b}_{m}=\arg \min _{t \in S_{m}} \tilde{\gamma}_{n}(t) \quad \text { where } \quad \tilde{\gamma}_{n}(t)=\frac{1}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(\tilde{Y}_{k \Delta}-t\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)^{2}
$$

Theorem 3: Risk of the non adaptive truncated estimator.
Under Assumptions A1-A4 and A6, for any $m$ such that $D_{m} \leq \mathscr{D}_{n}$ where $\mathscr{D}_{n}^{2} \leq$ $n \Delta / \ln ^{2}(n)$ :

$$
\mathbb{E}\left(\left\|\tilde{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}\right) \lesssim\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right) \frac{D_{m}}{n \Delta}+\Delta^{1-\beta / 2} \ln ^{2}(n)+\frac{1}{n \Delta}
$$

The terms of the rest depend on the Blumenthal-Getoor index and are larger than for the first estimator. Nevertheless, if $L_{t}$ is a compound Poisson process, then $\beta=0$ and we obtain (up to a logarithm factor) the same inequality as for the non-truncated estimator.

Remark 2. If $\nu$ is not absolutely continuous, we can prove the weaker inequality:

$$
\mathbb{E}\left(\left\|\tilde{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}\right) \lesssim\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right) \frac{D_{m}}{n \Delta}+\Delta^{1-\beta} \ln ^{2}(n)+\frac{1}{n \Delta} .
$$

In that case, $\tilde{b}_{m}$ converges towards $b_{A}$ only if $\beta<1$, which implies that $\nu$ has finite density $\left(\int_{\mathbb{R}}|z| \nu(d z)<\infty\right)$.

Remark 3. Assume that $b_{A}$ belongs to the Besov space $\mathscr{B}_{2, \infty}^{\alpha}$ and that $\left\|b_{A}\right\|_{\mathscr{B}_{2, \infty}^{\alpha}} \leq 1$.
The bias-variance compromise $\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{L^{2}}^{2}+D_{m} / n \Delta$ is minimum when $m=\log _{2}(n \Delta) /(1+2 \alpha)$, and the risk satisfies:

$$
\mathbb{E}\left(\left\|\tilde{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}\right) \lesssim(n \Delta)^{-2 \alpha /(1+2 \alpha)}+\Delta^{1-\beta / 2} \ln ^{2}(n)
$$

Let us set $\Delta \sim n^{-\gamma}$ with $\gamma>0$. We have the following convergence rates:

| $\gamma$ | first estimator | truncated estimator |
| :---: | :---: | :---: |
| $0<\gamma \leq \frac{2 \alpha}{4 \alpha+1} \leq \frac{1}{2}$ | $\Delta$ | $\Delta^{1-\beta / 2} \ln ^{2}(n)$ |
| $\frac{2 \alpha}{4 \alpha+1} \leq \gamma \leq \frac{2 \alpha}{4 \alpha+1-\beta \alpha-\beta / 2} \leq \frac{1}{2(1-\beta / 4)}$ | $(n \Delta)^{-2 \alpha /(2 \alpha+1)}$ | $\Delta^{1-\beta / 2} \ln ^{2}(n)$ |
| $\frac{2 \alpha+1}{4 \alpha+1-\beta \alpha-\beta / 2} \leq \gamma<1$ | $(n \Delta)^{-2 \alpha /(2 \alpha+1)}$ | $(n \Delta)^{-2 \alpha /(2 \alpha+1)}$ |

If we have sufficiently high frequency data $\left(n \Delta^{2(1-\beta / 4)}=O(1)\right)$, then the rate of convergence is the same for the two estimators.

To construct the adaptive estimator, we use the same penalty function as in the previous section:

$$
\operatorname{pen}(m) \geq \kappa\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right) \frac{D_{m}}{n \Delta}
$$

and define the adaptive estimator:

$$
\tilde{m}=\arg \min _{m \in \mathscr{M}_{n}}\left\{\tilde{\gamma}_{n}\left(\tilde{b}_{m}\right)+\operatorname{pen}(m)\right\} .
$$

Theorem 4 : Risk of the adaptive truncated estimator.
If Assumptions A1-A4 and A6 are satisfied, then there exists $\kappa$ such that, if $\mathscr{D}_{n}^{2} \leq n \Delta / \ln ^{2}(n):$

$$
\mathbb{E}\left(\left\|\tilde{b}_{\tilde{m}}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}\right) \lesssim \min _{m \in \mathscr{M}_{n}}\left(\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}+\operatorname{pen}(m)\right)+\Delta^{1-\beta / 2} \ln ^{2}(n)+\frac{1}{n \Delta} .
$$

The adaptive estimator $\tilde{b}_{\tilde{m}}$ automatically realises the bias/variance compromise if the frequency of data is sufficiently high.

## 5 Numerical simulations and examples

### 5.1 Compound Poisson models

We consider the stochastic differential equation:

$$
d X_{t}=b\left(X_{t}\right) d t+\sigma\left(X_{t}\right) d W_{t}+\xi\left(X_{t^{-}}\right) d L_{t}
$$

where $L_{t}$ is a compound Poisson process of intensity 1: $L_{t}=\sum_{j=1}^{N_{t}} \zeta_{i}$, with $N_{t}$ a Poisson process of intensity 1 and $\left(\zeta_{1}, \ldots, \zeta_{n}\right)$ are independent and identically distributed random variables independent of $\left(N_{t}\right)$. We denote by $f$ the probability law of $\zeta_{i}$.

## Model 1:

$$
b(x)=-2 x, \quad \sigma(x)=\xi(x)=1 \quad \text { and } \quad f(d z)=\nu(d z)=\frac{1}{2} \delta_{1}+\frac{1}{2} \delta_{-1} .
$$

## Model 2:

$b(x)=-(x-1 / 4)^{3}-(x+1 / 4)^{3}, \quad \sigma(x)=\xi(x)=1 \quad$ and $\quad f(d z)=\nu(d z)=\frac{e^{-\lambda|z|} d z}{2}$.
We can remark that the function $b$ is not Lipschitz and therefore does not satisfy Assumption A1.

## Model 3:

We consider the stochastic process of parameters

$$
b(x)=-2 x+\sin (3 x), \quad \sigma(x)=\xi(x)=\sqrt{\frac{3+x^{2}}{1+x^{2}}}
$$

and

$$
f(d z)=\nu(d z)=\frac{1}{4} \sqrt{\frac{\sqrt{24}}{|z|}} e^{-\sqrt{\sqrt{24}|z|}} d z
$$

Let us remark that $\nu=f$ is not sub-exponential and does not satisfy A5.

### 5.2 Simulation algorithm (Compound Poisson case)

We estimate $b$ on the compact interval $A=[-1,1]$.

1. Simulate random variables $\left(X_{0}, X_{\Delta}, \ldots, X_{n \Delta}\right)$ thanks to a Euler scheme with sampling interval $\delta=\Delta / 5$. To this end, we use the same simulation scheme as Rubenthaler (2010). We simulate the times of the jumps $\left(\tau_{1}, \ldots, \tau_{N}, \tau_{N+1}\right)$ with $\tau_{N}<n \Delta \leq \tau_{N+1}$ and we fix $X_{0}=0$. If $\delta<\tau_{1}$, we compute

$$
X_{\delta}=\delta b\left(X_{0}\right)+\sqrt{\delta} \sigma\left(X_{0}\right) N \quad \text { with } \quad N \sim \mathscr{N}(0,1) . .
$$

If $\tau_{1}<\delta$, we first compute

$$
X_{\tau_{1}}=\tau_{1} b\left(X_{0}\right)+\sqrt{\tau_{1}} \sigma\left(X_{0}\right) N+\xi\left(X_{0}\right) \zeta_{1}
$$

with $N \sim \mathscr{N}(0,1)$ and $\zeta_{1} \sim f$ is independant of $N$. If $\delta<\tau_{2}$, we compute

$$
X_{\delta}=\left(\delta-\tau_{1}\right) b\left(X_{\tau_{1}}\right)+\sqrt{\delta-\tau_{1}} \sigma\left(X_{\tau_{1}}\right) N^{\prime}
$$

else we compute

$$
X_{\tau_{2}}=\left(\tau_{2}-\tau_{1}\right) b\left(X_{\tau_{1}}\right)+\sqrt{\tau_{2}-\tau_{1}} \sigma\left(X_{\tau_{1}}\right) N^{\prime}+\xi\left(X_{\tau_{1}}\right) \zeta_{2}
$$

where $N^{\prime} \sim \mathscr{N}(0,1)$ and $\zeta_{2}$ has distribution $f . N, N^{\prime}, \zeta_{1}$ and $\zeta_{2}$ are independent.
2. Construct the random variables

$$
Y_{k \Delta}=\frac{X_{(k+1) \Delta}-X_{k \Delta}}{\Delta} \quad \text { and } \quad \tilde{Y}_{k \Delta}=\frac{X_{(k+1) \Delta}-X_{k \Delta}}{\Delta} \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{X, k}} \mathbb{1}_{X_{k \Delta} \in A} .
$$

3. We consider the vectorial subspaces $S_{m, r}$ generated by the spline functions of degree $r$ (see for instance Schmisser (2009a)). In that case $D_{m, r}=$ $\operatorname{dim}\left(S_{m, r}\right)=2^{m}+r$. For $r \in\{1,2,3\}$ and $m \in \mathscr{M}_{n}(r)=\left\{m, D_{m, r} \leq\right.$ $\left.\mathscr{D}_{n}\right\}$, we compute the estimators $\hat{b}_{m, r}$ and $\tilde{b}_{m, r}$ by minimising the contrast functions $\gamma_{n}$ and $\tilde{\gamma}_{n}$ on the vectorial subspaces $S_{m, r}$.
4. For the estimation algorithm, we make a selection of $m$ and $r$ as follows. Using the penalty function $\operatorname{pen}(m, r):=\operatorname{pen}(m)=\kappa\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right)\left(2^{m}+r\right) / n \Delta$, we select the adaptive estimators $\hat{b}_{\hat{m}, r}$ and $\tilde{b}_{\tilde{m}, r}$, and then choose the best $r$ by minimizing $\gamma_{n}\left(\hat{b}_{\hat{m}, r}\right)+\operatorname{pen}(\hat{m}, r)$ and $\tilde{\gamma}_{n}\left(\tilde{b}_{\tilde{m}, r}\right)+\operatorname{pen}(\tilde{m}, r)$.

### 5.3 Results

In Figures 1-3, we simulate 5 times the process $\left(X_{0}, \ldots, X_{n \Delta}\right)$ for $\Delta=10^{-1}$ and $n=10^{4}$ and draw the obtained estimators. The two adaptive estimators are nearly superposed, moreover, they are close to the true function.

In Tables 1-3, for each value of $(n, \Delta)$, we simulate 50 trajectories of $\left(X_{0}, X_{\Delta}, \ldots, X_{n \Delta}\right)$. For each path, we construct the two adaptive estimators $\hat{b}_{\hat{m}, \hat{r}}$ and $\tilde{b}_{\tilde{m}, \tilde{r}}$ and we compute the empirical errors:

$$
e r r_{1}=\left\|\hat{b}_{\hat{m}, \hat{r}}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \quad \text { and } \quad e r r_{2}=\left\|\tilde{b}_{\tilde{m}, \tilde{r}}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}
$$

In order to check that our algorithm is adaptive, we also compute the minimal errors

$$
e \min _{1}=\min _{m, r}\left\|\hat{b}_{m, r}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \quad \text { and } \quad e \min _{2}=\min _{m, r}\left\|\tilde{b}_{m, r}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}
$$

and the oracles oracle $_{i}=\operatorname{err} r_{i} /$ emin $_{i}$. We give the means $\hat{m}_{a}, \hat{r}_{a}, \tilde{m}_{a}$ and $\tilde{r}_{a}$ of the selected values $\hat{m}, \hat{r}, \tilde{m}$ and $\tilde{r}$. The value risk $_{i}$ is the mean of $\operatorname{err}_{i}$ over the 50 simulations and $o r_{i}$ is the mean of oracle ${ }_{i}$.

The empirical risk is decreasing when the product $n \Delta$ is increasing, which is coherent with the theoretical model. For Model 1, the two estimators are equivalent. When the tails of $\nu$ become larger (Models 2 and 3 ), the truncated estimator is better. The improvement is also more significant when the discretisation path is smaller. As on the three models, the processes $L_{t}$ are compound Poisson processes, these results were expected. The truncated estimator seems also more robust: we don't observe aberrant values (like for the first estimator in Table 2). This aberrant value may be due to the fact that $b$ is not Lipschitz and then $b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)$ may be quite large.

## 6 Proofs

Let us introduce the filtration

$$
\mathscr{F}_{t}=\sigma\left(\eta,\left(W_{s}\right)_{0 \leq s \leq t},\left(L_{s}\right)_{0 \leq s \leq t}\right) .
$$

The following result is very useful. It comes from Dellacherie and Meyer (1980) (Theorem 92 Chapter VII) and Applebaum (2004), Theorem 4.4.23 p265 (Kunita's first inequality).
Result 1 (Burkholder-Davis-Gundy inequality). We have that, for any $p \geq 2$,

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{s \in[t, t+h]}\left|\int_{t}^{s} \sigma\left(X_{u}\right) d W_{u}\right|^{p} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right] \leq C_{p}\left(\mathbb{E}\left[\left|\int_{t}^{t+h} \sigma^{2}\left(X_{u}\right) d u\right|^{p / 2} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right]\right)
$$

and, if $\int_{\mathbb{R}}|z|^{p} \nu(d z)<\infty$, as $\int_{\mathbb{R}} z^{2} \nu(d z)=1$ :

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{s \in[t, t+h]}\left|\int_{t}^{s} \xi\left(X_{u^{-}}\right) d L_{u}\right|^{p} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right] & \leq C_{p} \mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_{t}^{t+h} \xi^{2}\left(X_{u}\right) d u\right)^{p / 2} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right] \\
& +C_{p} \mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_{t}^{t+h}\left|\xi\left(X_{u}\right)\right|^{p} d u\right) \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right] \int_{\mathbb{R}}|z|^{p} \nu(d z)
\end{aligned}
$$

### 6.1 Proof of Proposition 1

By Result 1, there exists a constant $c_{p}$ such that:

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{s \in[t, t+h]}\left(X_{s}-X_{t}\right)^{2 p} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right] & \leq c(p)\left(\left[\left(\int_{t}^{t+h}\left|b\left(X_{s}\right)\right| d s\right)^{2 p} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right]\right) \\
& +c(p) \mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_{t}^{t+h} \sigma^{2}\left(X_{s}\right) d s\right)^{p} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right] \\
& +c(p)\left(\mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_{t}^{t+h} \xi^{2}\left(X_{s}\right) d s\right)^{p}+\int_{t}^{t+h} \xi^{2 p}\left(X_{s}\right) d s \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right]\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

Then, as $\xi$ and $\sigma$ are bounded and $b$ Lipschitz (and thus sub-linear), there exists a constant $C_{b}$ such that:

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{s \in[t, t+h]}\left(X_{s}-X_{t}\right)^{2 p} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right] \leq c(p)\left(\sigma_{0}^{2 p} h^{p}+\xi_{0}^{2 p}\left(h+h^{p}\right)\right)+c(p) h^{2 p-1} C_{b} \int_{t}^{t+h} \mathbb{E}\left[X_{s}^{2 p} \mid \mathscr{F}_{t}\right] d s
$$

As $\left(X_{t}\right)$ is stationary, we obtain the expected result.

### 6.2 Proof of Theorem 1

By (3) and (4), we get:

$$
\begin{aligned}
\gamma_{n}(t)=\frac{1}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Y_{k \Delta}-t\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)^{2} & =\frac{1}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Y_{k \Delta}-b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)^{2}+\|b-t\|_{n}^{2} \\
& +\frac{2}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Y_{k \Delta}-b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)\left(b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)-t\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

As, by definition, $\gamma_{n}\left(\hat{b}_{m}\right) \leq \gamma_{n}\left(b_{m}\right)$, we obtain:

$$
\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq\left\|b_{m}-b\right\|_{n}^{2}+\frac{2}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Y_{k \Delta}-b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)\left(\hat{b}_{m}\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)-b_{m}\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right) .
$$

By (2), and as $\hat{b}_{m}$ and $b_{m}$ are supported by $A$,

$$
\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}+\frac{2}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(I_{k \Delta}+Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}\right)\left(\hat{b}_{m}\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)-b_{m}\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right) .
$$

Let us set introduce the unit ball

$$
\mathscr{B}_{m}=\left\{t \in S_{m},\|t\|_{\varpi} \leq 1\right\} \quad \text { where } \quad\|t\|_{\varpi}^{2}=\int_{A} t^{2}(x) \varpi(d x)
$$

and the englobing space $\mathscr{S}_{n}=\bigcup_{m \in \mathscr{M}_{n}} S_{m}$. Let us consider the set

$$
\Omega_{n}=\left\{\omega, \forall t \in \mathscr{S}_{n},\left|\frac{\|t\|_{n}^{2}}{\|t\|_{\infty}^{2}}-1\right| \leq \frac{1}{2}\right\}
$$

where the norms $\|\cdot\|_{\varpi}$ and $\|\cdot\|_{n}$ are equivalent.
Step 1: bound of the risk on $\Omega_{n}$ Thanks to the Cauchy-Schwartz inequality, we obtain that, on $\Omega_{n}$ :
$\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}+\frac{1}{12}\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{m}\right\|_{n}^{2}+12 \sum_{k=1}^{n} I_{k \Delta}^{2}+\frac{1}{12}\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{m}\right\|_{\varpi}^{2}+12 \sup _{t \in \mathscr{B}_{m}} \nu_{n}^{2}(t)$
where

$$
\begin{equation*}
\nu_{n}(t)=\frac{1}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}\right) t\left(X_{k \Delta}\right) . \tag{5}
\end{equation*}
$$

On $\Omega_{n}$, by definition, we have:

$$
\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{m}\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq 2\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}+2\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \quad \text { and } \quad\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{m}\right\|_{\varpi}^{2} \leq 2\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{m}\right\|_{n}^{2} .
$$

Thus we obtain:

$$
\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq 3\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}+24 \sum_{k=1}^{n} I_{k \Delta}^{2}+24 \sup _{t \in \mathscr{B}_{m}} \nu_{n}^{2}(t) .
$$

The following lemma is very useful. It is proved later.
Lemma 1. 1. $\mathbb{E}\left(I_{k \Delta}^{2}\right) \leq c \Delta$ and $\mathbb{E}\left(I_{k \Delta}^{4}\right) \leq c \Delta$.
2. $\mathbb{E}\left(Z_{k \Delta} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right)=0, \mathbb{E}\left(Z_{k \Delta}^{2} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right) \leq \sigma_{0}^{2} / \Delta$ and $\mathbb{E}\left(Z_{k \Delta}^{4} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right) \leq c / \Delta^{2}$.

$$
\text { 3. } \mathbb{E}\left(T_{k \Delta} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right)=0, \mathbb{E}\left(T_{k \Delta}^{2} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right) \leq \xi_{0}^{2} / \Delta \text { and } \mathbb{E}\left(T_{k \Delta}^{4} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right) \leq c / \Delta^{3} .
$$

By Lemma $1, \mathbb{E}\left[I_{k \Delta}^{2}\right] \leq \Delta$. It remains to bound $\mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{t \in \mathscr{B}_{m}} \nu_{n}^{2}(t)\right]$. We consider an orthonormal basis $\left(\varphi_{\lambda}\right)_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m}}$ of $S_{m}$ for the $L_{\varpi}^{2}$-norm with $\left|\Lambda_{m}\right|=D_{m}$. Any function $t \in S_{m}$ can be written $t=\sum_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m}} a_{\lambda} \varphi_{\lambda}$ and $\|t\|_{\varpi}^{2}=\sum_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m}} a_{\lambda}^{2}$. Then:

$$
\begin{aligned}
\sup _{t \in \mathscr{B}_{m}} \nu_{n}^{2}(t) & =\sup _{\sum_{\lambda} a_{\lambda}^{2} \leq 1}\left(\sum_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m}} a_{\lambda} \nu_{n}\left(\varphi_{\lambda}\right)\right)^{2} \\
& \leq \sup _{\sum_{\lambda} a_{\lambda}^{2} \leq 1}\left(\sum_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m}} a_{\lambda}^{2}\right)\left(\sum_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m}} \nu_{n}^{2}\left(\varphi_{\lambda}\right)\right) \\
& =\sum_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m}} \nu_{n}^{2}\left(\varphi_{\lambda}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

It remains to bound $\mathbb{E}\left(\nu_{n}^{2}\left(\varphi_{\lambda}\right)\right)$. By (5),

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathbb{E}\left[\nu_{n}^{2}\left(\varphi_{\lambda}\right)\right] & =\frac{1}{n^{2}} \sum_{k=1}^{n} \mathbb{E}\left[\varphi_{\lambda}^{2}\left(X_{k \Delta}\right) \mathbb{E}\left[\left(Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}\right)^{2} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right]\right] \\
& +\frac{2}{n^{2}} \sum_{k<l}^{n} \mathbb{E}\left[\left(Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}\right) \varphi_{\lambda}\left(X_{k \Delta}\right) \varphi_{\lambda}\left(X_{l \Delta}\right) \mathbb{E}\left[Z_{l \Delta}+T_{l \Delta} \mid \mathscr{F}_{l \Delta}\right]\right]
\end{aligned}
$$

Thanks to Lemma 1, the second term of this inequality is null and we obtain, as $\int_{\mathbb{R}} \varphi_{\lambda}^{2}(x) \varpi(d x)=1$ :

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\nu_{n}^{2}\left(\varphi_{\lambda}\right)\right] \leq \frac{2\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right)}{n^{2} \Delta} \sum_{k=1}^{n} \mathbb{E}\left[\varphi_{\lambda}^{2}\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right]=\frac{2\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right)}{n \Delta} .
$$

Therefore:

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{n}}\right] \leq 3\left\|b_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}+48\left(\sigma_{0}^{2}+\xi_{0}^{2}\right) \frac{D_{m}}{n \Delta}+C \Delta .
$$

Step 2: bound of the risk on $\Omega_{n}^{c}$. The process $\left(X_{t}\right)_{t>0}$ is exponentially $\beta$-mixing, $\pi$ is bounded from below and above and $n \Delta \rightarrow \infty$. The following result is proved for $\xi=0$ for instance in Comte et al. (2007), but as it relies only on the $\beta$-mixing property, we can apply it.

Result 2.

$$
\mathbb{P}\left[\Omega_{n}^{c}\right] \leq \frac{1}{n^{3}}
$$

Let us set $e=\left(e_{\Delta}, \ldots, e_{n \Delta}\right)^{*}$ where $e_{k \Delta}:=Y_{k \Delta}-b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)=I_{k \Delta}+Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}$ and $\Pi_{m} Y=\Pi_{m}\left(Y_{\Delta}, \ldots, Y_{n \Delta}\right)^{*}=\left(\hat{b}_{m}\left(X_{0}\right), \ldots, \hat{b}_{m}\left(X_{n \Delta}\right)\right)^{*}$ where $\Pi_{m}$ is the

Euclidian orthogonal projection over $S_{m}$. Then

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} & =\left\|\Pi_{m} Y-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}=\left\|\Pi_{m} b_{A}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}+\left\|\Pi_{m} Y-\Pi_{m} b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \\
& \leq\left\|b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2}+\|e\|_{n}^{2}
\end{aligned}
$$

According to Lemma 1, Result 2 and the Cauchy-Schwarz inequality,

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\|e\|_{n}^{2} \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{n}^{c}}\right] \leq\left(\mathbb{E}\left[\|e\|_{n}^{4}\right]\right)^{1 / 2}\left(\mathbb{P}\left(\Omega_{n}^{c}\right)\right)^{1 / 2} \leq \frac{C}{\left(\Delta^{3} n^{3}\right)^{1 / 2}} \leq \frac{C}{n \Delta}
$$

and, as $b$ is bounded on the compact set $A$,

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\left\|b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{n}^{c}}\right] \leq\left(\mathbb{E}\left[\left\|b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{4}\right] \mathbb{P}\left(\Omega_{n}^{c}\right)\right)^{1 / 2} \lesssim \frac{1}{n^{3 / 2}}
$$

Collecting the results, we get:

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\left\|\hat{b}_{m}-b_{A}\right\|_{n}^{2} \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{n}^{c}}\right] \lesssim \frac{1}{n \Delta}
$$

which ends the proof of Theorem 1.

### 6.2.1 Proof of Lemma 1

By Proposition 1, as $b$ is Lipschitz,

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathbb{E}\left[I_{k \Delta}^{2}\right] & =\frac{1}{\Delta^{2}} \mathbb{E}\left[\left(\int_{k \Delta}^{(k+1) \Delta}\left(b\left(X_{s}\right)-b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right) d s\right)^{2}\right] \\
& \leq \frac{1}{\Delta} \mathbb{E}\left[\int_{k \Delta}^{(k+1) \Delta}\left(b\left(X_{s}\right)-b\left(X_{k \Delta}\right)\right)^{2} d s\right] \\
& \leq \frac{c}{\Delta} \int_{k \Delta}^{(k+1) \Delta} \mathbb{E}\left[\left(X_{s}-X_{k \Delta}\right)^{2} d s\right] \\
& \leq c \Delta .
\end{aligned}

In the same way, we prove that $\mathbb{E}\left[I_{k \Delta}^{4}\right] \leq c \Delta$. We have that

& \lesssim \frac{1}{\Delta^{3}}
\end{aligned}

The bound of the risk on $\Omega_{n}^{c}$ is done exactly in the same way as for the non adaptive estimator. It remains thus to bound the risk on $\Omega_{n}$. As in the previous proof, we get:

Let us introduce a function $p\left(m, m^{\prime}\right)$ such that $12 p\left(m, m^{\prime}\right)=\operatorname{pen}(m)+\operatorname{pen}\left(m^{\prime}\right)$. & +\frac{224}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(Z_{k \Delta}^{2}+T_{k \Delta}^{2}\right) \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{X, k} \cap \Omega_{N, k}^{c} \cap\left(X_{k \Delta} \in A\right)} \\
& +\frac{224}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(\mathbb{E}\left[\left(Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}\right) \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{X, k} \cap \Omega_{N, k} \cap\left(X_{k \Delta A} \in A\right)} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right]\right)^{2} .

Then $J \leq \mathbb{P}\left(\Delta\left|T_{k \Delta}^{(2)}\right| \geq \xi_{1} \Delta^{1 / 4}-2 C_{\Delta}\right)$.
Let us set $n_{0}=\left\lceil\frac{1}{1-\beta / 2}\right\rceil$ and $a=\left(\xi_{0} n_{0}\right)^{-1}\left(\xi_{1} \Delta^{1 / 4}-2 C_{\Delta}\right)$. We have:

& \lesssim \Delta^{1-\beta / 4}+\Delta .
\end{aligned}

Bound of $\left(\mathbb{E}\left[\left(Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}\right) \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{X, k} \cap \Omega_{N, k} \cap\left(X_{k \Delta} \in A\right)} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right]\right)^{2}$.
If $\sigma$ and $\xi$ are constants. Let us set $E:=\left(\mathbb{E}\left[\left(Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}\right) \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{X, k} \cap \Omega_{N, k} \cap\left(X_{k \Delta} \in A\right)} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right]\right)^{2}$ and
$\Omega_{I, k}=\left\{\omega,\left|I_{k \Delta}\right| \leq 1, \cap\left|\Delta Z_{k \Delta}\right| \leq \sigma_{0} \sqrt{\Delta} \ln (n), \cap\left|\Delta T_{k \Delta}^{(1)}\right| \leq 2 \xi_{0} \sqrt{\Delta} \ln (n)\right\}$.

\bar{\Omega}_{I, k} & =\left\{\omega,\left|I_{k \Delta}\right|+\left|Z_{k \Delta}-\bar{Z}_{k \Delta}\right|+\left|T_{k \Delta}-\bar{T}_{k \Delta}\right| \leq 3\right\} \\
& \cap\left\{\left|\Delta \bar{Z}_{k \Delta}\right| \leq \sigma_{0} \sqrt{\Delta} \ln (n)+\Delta,\left|\Delta \bar{T}_{k \Delta}^{(1)}\right| \leq 2 \xi_{0} \sqrt{\Delta} \ln (n)+\Delta\right\} \\
& \cap\left\{\left|\Delta\left(\bar{T}_{k \Delta}^{(2)}-U_{k \Delta}\right)\right| \leq \xi_{0} \sqrt{\Delta}\right\} .
\end{aligned}
$$

By (7), (8), (9), (12), (13), (14) and Markov inequalities, we obtain:

We have that $H^{2} \lesssim \Delta^{-1} \ln ^{2}(n) \mathbb{P}^{2}\left(\Omega_{I, k}^{c}\right) \lesssim \Delta^{1-\beta / 2} \ln ^{2}(n)$. The end of the proof is the same as in the case of $\sigma$ and $\xi$ constants. We obtain that

& +\frac{224}{n} \sum_{k=1}^{n}\left(\mathbb{E}\left[\left(Z_{k \Delta}+T_{k \Delta}\right) \mathbb{1}_{\Omega_{X, k} \cap \Omega_{z, k}} \mid \mathscr{F}_{k \Delta}\right]\right)^{2} \\
& +24 \sup _{t \in \mathscr{B}_{m, \tilde{m}}}\left(\tilde{v}_{n}^{2}(t)-p(m, \tilde{m})\right)+4 \operatorname{pen}(m) .
\end{aligned}
$$

It remains only to bound $\mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{t \in \mathscr{B}_{m, \tilde{m}}}\left(\tilde{\nu}_{n}^{2}(t)-p(m, \tilde{m})\right)\right] \leq \sum_{m^{\prime}} \mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{t \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}}\left(\tilde{\nu}_{n}^{2}(t)-p(m, \tilde{m})\right)\right]$. If there exist some constants $c_{1}, c_{2}$ and $K$ independent of $D, n, \Delta, b$ and $\sigma$ and two constants $\alpha$ and $\beta$ independent of $n$ and $D$ such that, for any function $t \in S_{m}+S_{m}^{\prime}:$
$\forall \eta, \zeta>0, \forall t \in S_{m}+S_{m^{\prime}}\|t\|_{\infty} \leq C \zeta, \mathbb{P}\left(f_{n}(t) \geq \eta,\|t\|_{n}^{2} \leq \zeta^{2}\right) \leq K \exp \left(-\frac{\eta^{2} n \beta}{\left(c_{1} \alpha^{2} \zeta^{2}+2 C c_{2} \alpha \eta \zeta\right)}\right)$,
then there exist some constants $C$ and $\kappa$ depending only of $\nu$ such that, if $D \leq$ $n \beta$ :

$$
\mathbb{E}\left[\sup _{t \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}} f_{n}^{2}(t)-\frac{\kappa \alpha^{2} D}{n \beta}\right]_{+} \leq C K \frac{\kappa \alpha^{2} D^{3 / 2} e^{-\sqrt{D}}}{n \beta} .
$$

Let us consider an orthonormal (for the $L_{\varpi}^{2}$-norm) basis $\left(\psi_{\lambda}\right)_{\lambda \in \Lambda_{m, m^{\prime}}}$ of $S_{m, m^{\prime}}=S_{m}+S_{m^{\prime}}$ such that

$$
\forall \lambda, \quad \operatorname{card}\left(\left\{\lambda^{\prime},\left\|\psi_{\lambda} \psi_{\lambda^{\prime}}\right\| \neq 0\right\}\right) \leq \phi_{2} .
$$

Let us set

$$
\bar{r}_{m, m^{\prime}}=\frac{1}{\sqrt{D}} \sup _{\beta \neq 0} \frac{\left\|\sum_{\lambda} \beta_{\lambda} \psi_{\lambda}\right\|_{\infty}}{|\beta|_{\infty}}
$$

We obtain that

$$
\left\|\sum_{\lambda} \beta_{\lambda} \psi_{\lambda}\right\|_{\infty} \leq \phi_{2}|\beta|_{\infty} \sup _{\lambda}\left\|\psi_{\lambda}\right\|_{\infty} \quad \text { et } \quad\left\|\psi_{\lambda}\right\|_{\infty} \leq \sqrt{D}\left\|\psi_{\lambda}\right\|_{L^{2}} \leq \pi_{1} \sqrt{D}\left\|\psi_{\lambda}\right\|_{\varpi}
$$

then

$$
\bar{r}_{m, m^{\prime}} \leq \bar{r}:=\phi_{2} \pi_{1}
$$

We need a lattice of which the infinite norm is bounded. We use Lemma 9 of Barron et al. (1999):

Result 4. There exists a $\delta_{k}$-lattice $T_{k}$ of $L_{\varpi}^{2} \cap\left(S_{m}+S_{m^{\prime}}\right)$ such that

$$
\left|T_{k} \cap \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}\right| \leq\left(5 / \delta^{k}\right)^{D}
$$

where $\delta_{k}=2^{-k} / 5$. Let us denote by $p_{k}(u)$ the orthogonal projection of $u$ on $T_{k}$. For any $u \in S_{m, m^{\prime}},\left\|u-p_{k}(u)\right\|_{\pi} \leq \delta_{k}$ and

$$
\sup _{u \in p_{k}^{-1}(t)}\|u-t\|_{\infty} \leq \bar{r}_{m, m^{\prime}} \delta_{k} \leq \bar{r} \delta_{k} .
$$

Let us set $H_{k}=\ln \left(\left|T_{k} \cap \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}\right|\right)$. We have that:

$$
H_{k} \leq D \ln \left(5 / \delta_{k}\right)=D\left(k \ln (2)+\ln \left(5 / \delta_{0}\right)\right) \leq C(k+1) D .
$$

The decomposition of $u_{k}$ on the $\delta_{k}$-lattice must be done very carefully: the norms $\left\|u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right\|_{\varpi}$ and $\left\|u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right\|_{\infty}$ must be controlled. Let us set

$$
\mathscr{E}_{k}=\left\{u_{k} \in T_{k} \cap \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}, \quad\left\|u-u_{k}\right\|_{\varpi} \leq \delta_{k} \quad \text { et } \quad\left\|u-u_{k}\right\|_{\infty} \leq \bar{r} \delta_{k}\right\} .
$$

We have that $\ln \left(\left|\mathscr{E}_{k}\right|\right) \leq H_{k}$. For any function $u \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}$, there exist a series $\left(u_{k}\right)_{k \geq 0} \in \prod_{k} \mathscr{E}_{k}$ such that

$$
u=u_{0}+\sum_{k=1}^{\infty}\left(u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right) .
$$

Let us consider $\left(\eta_{k}\right)_{k \geq 0}$ and $\eta \in \mathbb{R}$ such that $\eta_{0}+\sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \eta_{k} \leq \eta$. We obtain:

$$
\begin{align*}
\mathbb{P}\left(\sup _{u \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}}\left|f_{n}(u)\right|>\eta\right) & \leq \mathbb{P}\left(\exists\left(u_{k}\right) \in \prod \mathscr{E}_{k},\left|f_{n}\left(u_{0}\right)+\sum_{k=1}^{\infty} f_{n}\left(u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right)\right|>\eta_{0}+\sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \eta_{k}\right) \\
& \leq P_{1}+\sum_{k=1}^{\infty} P_{2, k} \tag{17}
\end{align*}
$$

where

$$
P_{1}=\sum_{u_{0} \in \mathscr{E}_{0}} \mathbb{P}\left(\left|f_{n}\left(u_{0}\right)\right|>\eta_{0}\right) \quad \text { and } \quad P_{2, k}=\sum_{u_{k} \in \mathscr{E}_{k}} \mathbb{P}\left(\left|f_{n}\left(u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right)\right|>\eta_{k}\right)
$$

As $u_{0} \in T_{0},\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{\varpi} \leq 1$ and $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{\infty} \leq \bar{r} \sqrt{D}$. Moreover, $\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq 3 / 2\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{\varpi}^{2} \leq$ $3 \delta_{0} / 2$. Then

$$
\mathbb{P}\left(\left|f_{n}\left(u_{0}\right)\right|>\eta_{0}\right)=\mathbb{P}\left(\left|f_{n}\left(u_{0}\right)\right|>\eta_{0},\left\|u_{0}\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq 3 \delta_{0} / 2\right)
$$

There exist two constants $c_{1}^{\prime}$ and $c_{2}^{\prime}$ depending only on $\delta_{0}$ and $\bar{r}$ such that

$$
\mathbb{P}\left(\left|f_{n}\left(u_{0}\right)\right|>\eta_{0}\right) \leq K \exp \left(-\frac{n \beta \eta_{0}^{2}}{c_{1}^{\prime} \alpha^{2}+2 c_{2}^{\prime} \sqrt{D} \alpha \eta_{0}}\right)
$$

Let us set $x_{0}$ such that $\eta_{0}=\alpha\left(\sqrt{c_{1}^{\prime}\left(x_{0} / \beta\right)}+c_{2}^{\prime} \sqrt{D}\left(x_{0} / \beta\right)\right)$. Then:

$$
x_{0} \leq \frac{\beta \eta_{0}^{2}}{c_{1}^{\prime} \alpha^{2}+2 c_{2}^{\prime} \sqrt{D} \alpha \eta_{0}}
$$

and

$$
\mathbb{P}\left(f_{n}\left(u_{0}\right)>\eta_{0}\right) \leq K \exp \left(-n x_{0}\right)
$$

Then

$$
\begin{equation*}
P_{1} \leq K \sum_{u_{0} \in \mathscr{E}_{0}} \exp \left(-n x_{0}\right) \leq K \exp \left(H_{0}-n x_{0}\right) \tag{18}
\end{equation*}
$$

We have that

$$
\left\|u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right\|_{\pi}^{2} \leq 2\left(\left\|u-u_{k-1}\right\|_{\pi}^{2}+\left\|u-u_{k}\right\|_{\pi}^{2}\right) \leq 5 \delta_{k-1}^{2} / 2
$$

then $\left\|u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq 15 \delta_{k-1}^{2} / 4$. As $u_{k-1}, u_{k} \in \mathscr{E}_{k-1} \times \mathscr{E}_{k}$, it follows that $\left\|u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right\|_{\infty}^{2} \leq 5 \delta_{k-1}^{2} \bar{r}^{2} / 2$. There exists two constants $c_{3}$ and $c_{4}$ such that:

$$
\begin{aligned}
\mathbb{P}_{n}\left(\left|f_{n}\left(u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right)\right|>\eta_{k}\right) & =\mathbb{P}_{n}\left(\left|f_{n}\left(u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right)\right|>\eta_{k},\left\|u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right\|_{n}^{2} \leq 15 \delta_{k-1}^{2} / 4\right) \\
& \leq K \exp \left(-\frac{n \beta \eta_{k}^{2}}{c_{3} \alpha^{2} \delta_{k-1}^{2}+2 c_{4} \alpha \delta_{k-1}}\right) .
\end{aligned}
$$

Let us fix $x_{k}$ such that $\eta_{k}=\delta_{k-1} a\left(\sqrt{c_{3}\left(x_{k} / \beta\right)}+c_{4}\left(x_{k} / \beta\right)\right)$. We obtain:

$$
x_{k} \leq \frac{\beta \eta_{k}^{2}}{c_{3} \alpha^{2} \delta_{k-1}^{2}+2 c_{4} \alpha \delta_{k-1}}
$$

and

$$
\mathbb{P}\left(\left|f_{n}\left(u_{k}-u_{k-1}\right)\right|>\eta_{k}\right) \leq K \exp \left(-n x_{k}\right)
$$

Then, $P_{2, k} \leq K \exp \left(H_{k-1}+H_{k}-n x_{k}\right)$ and

$$
\begin{equation*}
P_{2}=\sum_{k=1}^{\infty} P_{2, k} \leq K \sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \exp \left(H_{k-1}+H_{k}-n x_{k}\right) \tag{19}
\end{equation*}
$$

Let us set $\tau>0$ and choose $\left(x_{k}\right)$ (and then $\left.\left(\eta_{k}\right)\right)$ such that

$$
\left\{\begin{array}{l}
\sqrt{D} n x_{0}=H_{0}+D+\tau \\
n x_{k}=H_{k-1}+H_{k}+(k+1) D+\tau
\end{array}\right.
$$

Collecting the results, we obtain, by (17), (18) and (19):

$$
\begin{equation*}
\mathbb{P}\left(\sup _{u \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}}\left|f_{n}(u)\right|>\eta\right) \leq C\left(e^{-D} e^{-\tau}+e^{-\sqrt{D}} e^{-\tau / \sqrt{D}}\right) \tag{20}
\end{equation*}
$$

It remains to compute $\eta^{2}$. We denote by $C$ a constant depending only on $\delta_{0}$ and $\bar{r}$. This constant may vary from one line to another. We have that:

$$
\eta=\sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \eta_{k} \leq C \alpha\left(\sum_{k=1}^{\infty} \delta_{k-1}\left(\sqrt{\frac{x_{k}}{\beta}}+\frac{x_{k}}{\beta}\right)\right)+\alpha\left(\sqrt{\frac{x_{0}}{\beta}}+\sqrt{D} \frac{x_{0}}{\beta}\right) .
$$

Let us recall that $H_{k}=C(k+1) D$. Then, $n x_{k}=C(3 k+2) D+\tau, \sqrt{D} n x_{0}=$ $C D+\tau$ and

$$
\sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \frac{\delta_{k-1} x_{k}}{\beta} \leq \frac{1}{n \beta} \sum_{k=0}^{\infty} 2^{-(k-1)}(C(3 k+2) D+\tau) \leq C \frac{D+\tau}{n \beta} .
$$

Moreover,

$$
\sum_{k=0}^{\infty} \delta_{k-1} \sqrt{\frac{x_{k}}{\beta}} \leq C \frac{\sqrt{D}+\sqrt{\tau}}{\sqrt{n \beta}}
$$

As $D / n \beta \leq 1$, there exists a constant $\kappa$ such that

$$
\eta^{2} \leq \kappa \alpha^{2}\left(\frac{D}{n \beta}+2 \frac{\tau}{n \beta}+\frac{\tau^{2}}{n^{2} \beta^{2}}\right)
$$

Then, according to (20):
$\mathbb{P}\left(\sup _{u \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}} f_{n}^{2}(u)>\kappa \alpha^{2}\left(\frac{D}{n \beta}+2 \frac{\tau}{n \beta}+\frac{\tau^{2}}{n^{2} \beta^{2}}\right)\right) \leq C\left(e^{-D-\tau}+e^{-\sqrt{D}-\tau / \sqrt{D}}\right)$.
Furthermore

$$
\begin{aligned}
E & :=\mathbb{E}\left(\left[\sup _{u \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}} f_{n}^{2}(u)-\kappa a^{2} \frac{D}{n \beta}\right]_{+}\right) \\
& =\int_{0}^{\infty} \mathbb{P}\left(\sup _{u \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}} f_{n}^{2}(u)>\kappa a^{2} \frac{D}{n \beta}+\tau\right) d \tau
\end{aligned}
$$

Setting $\tau=\kappa \alpha^{2}\left(2 y / n \beta+y^{2} / n^{2} \beta^{2}\right)$, it follows:
$E=C \gamma^{2} \int_{0}^{\infty} \mathbb{P}\left(\sup _{u \in \mathscr{B}_{m, m^{\prime}}} f_{n}^{2}(u)>\kappa \alpha^{2}\left(\frac{D}{n \beta}+2 \frac{y}{n \beta}+\frac{y^{2}}{n^{2} \beta^{2}}\right)\right)\left(\frac{2}{n \beta}+\frac{2 y}{n^{2} \beta^{2}}\right) d y$.
By (21),

$$
\begin{aligned}
E & =C \kappa \alpha^{2}\left(e^{-D}+e^{-\sqrt{D}}\right)\left(\frac{1}{n \beta} \int_{0}^{\infty} y e^{-y / \sqrt{D}} d y\right) \\
& \leq C \frac{\kappa \alpha^{2}}{n \beta} D^{3 / 2} e^{-\sqrt{D}}
\end{aligned}
$$
