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# About Pillai and Fermat-Catalan conjectures Jamel Ghanouchi 

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#### Abstract

( MSC=11D04) More than one century after its formulation by the Belgian mathematician Eugene Catalan, Preda Mihailescu has solved the open problem. But, is it all? Mihailescu's solution utilizes computation on machines, we propose here not really a proof as it is entended classically, but a resolution of an equation like the resolution of the polynomial equations of third and fourth degrees. This solution is totally algebraic and does not utilize, of course, computers or any kind of calculation.


(Keywords : Diophantine equations, Catalan equation; Algebraic resolution)

## Introduction

Catalan theorem has been proved in 2002 by Preda Mihailescu. In 2004, it became officially Catalan-Mihailescu theorem. This theorem stipulates that there are not consecutive pure powers. There do not exist integers stricly greater than $1, X>1$ and $Y>1$, for which with exponants strictly greater than $1, p>1$ and $q>1$,

$$
Y^{p}=X^{q}+1
$$

but for $(X, Y, p, q)=(2,3,2,3)$. We can verify that

$$
3^{2}=2^{3}+1
$$

Euler has proved that the equation $X^{3}+1=Y^{2}$ has this only solution. We propose in this study a general solution. The particular cases already solved concern $p=2$, solved by Ko Chao in 1965, and $q=3$ which has been solved in 2002. The case $q=2$ has been solved by Lebesgue in 1850 . We solve here the equation for the general case.

## The resolution

Let Catalan equation

$$
Y^{p}=X^{q}+1
$$

We pose

$$
c=\frac{X^{p}-1}{Y^{\frac{p}{2}}} ; \quad c^{\prime}=\frac{7-X^{p}}{Y^{\frac{p}{2}}}
$$

Thus

$$
\begin{gathered}
Y^{\frac{p}{2}}=\frac{6}{c+c^{\prime}} \\
X^{p}=c Y^{\frac{p}{2}}+1=\frac{6 c}{c+c^{\prime}}+1=\frac{7 c+c^{\prime}}{c+c^{\prime}}
\end{gathered}
$$

And

$$
X^{q}=Y^{p}-1=\frac{36-\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}
$$

We have $X^{p}>7$ hence $c^{\prime}<0$ and $c>c^{\prime}$ and $Y^{\frac{p}{2}} \geq 3$ thus $0<c+c^{\prime} \leq 2$. We have to discuss two cases $c^{2}>1$ and $c^{2} \leq 1$
$c^{2}>1 \quad$ We have

$$
\begin{aligned}
X^{q}-X^{2 p} & =\frac{36-\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& <\frac{36-36 c^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}<0
\end{aligned}
$$

We deduce

$$
q+1 \leq 2 p
$$

Also

$$
\begin{aligned}
& 2 c^{2} X^{q}-X^{2 p}=\frac{72 c^{2}-2 c^{2}\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& \quad>\frac{64 c^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}=\frac{\left(c-c^{\prime}\right)\left(15 c+c^{\prime}\right)}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}>0
\end{aligned}
$$

And

$$
\begin{aligned}
& c^{2} X^{q}-X^{2 p}=\frac{36 c^{2}-\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& <\frac{36 c^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}=\frac{\left(c^{\prime}-c\right)\left(13 c+c^{\prime}\right)}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}<0
\end{aligned}
$$

But

$$
2 c^{2} X^{2 p-1} \geq 2 c^{2} X^{q}>X^{2 p} \Rightarrow 2 c^{2}>X
$$

But

$$
2 c^{2}>1 \Rightarrow 2 c^{2}=\frac{n+2}{n+1}=\frac{m+1}{m}
$$

If

$$
\begin{aligned}
0<2 c^{2}-1-c^{2}-1= & c^{2}-2=\frac{-n}{n+1}=\frac{-m+1}{m}<1-m<1 \\
& \Rightarrow 2 c^{2}<6<X
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus

$$
2 c^{2} \geq X \geq 2 c^{2} \Rightarrow 2 c^{2}=X
$$

And

$$
X^{2 p}<2 c^{2} X^{q}=X^{q+1} \leq X^{2 p} \Rightarrow q+1=2 p
$$

The equation becomes

$$
Y^{p}=X^{2 p-1}+1
$$

And also

$$
\begin{aligned}
\left(2 c^{2}-X\right) Y^{p}= & 0=2 X^{2 p}-4 X^{p}+2-X^{2 p}-X=X^{2 p}-4 X^{p}+2-X \\
& \Rightarrow \frac{-2}{X}=X^{2 p-1}-2 X^{p-1}-1 \in \mathbb{N} \\
\Rightarrow & X=2 \Rightarrow 2^{2 p-1}-2^{p}=0 \Rightarrow 2^{p-2}=1 \\
& \Rightarrow p=2 \Rightarrow q=2 p-1=3 \Rightarrow Y= \pm 3
\end{aligned}
$$

$c^{2} \leq 1$

$$
\begin{aligned}
2 X^{q}-X^{2 p} & =\frac{72-2\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& >\frac{64-49 c^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}>0
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus

$$
X^{q} \geq X^{2 p-1}
$$

Or

$$
q+1 \geq 2 p
$$

Also

$$
\begin{aligned}
& 2 c^{2} X^{q}-X^{2 p}=\frac{72 c^{2}-2 c^{2}\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& \quad>\frac{64 c^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}=\frac{\left(c-c^{\prime}\right)\left(15 c+c^{\prime}\right)}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}>0
\end{aligned}
$$

And

$$
\begin{aligned}
& c^{2} X^{q}-X^{2 p}=\frac{36 c^{2}-\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& <\frac{36 c^{2}-\left(7 c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}=\frac{\left(c^{\prime}-c\right)\left(13 c+c^{\prime}\right)}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}<0
\end{aligned}
$$

But

$$
\begin{aligned}
2 c^{-2}>1 & \Rightarrow 2 c^{-2}=\frac{n+2}{n+1}=\frac{m+1}{m} \\
\Rightarrow 2 c^{-2}-1-c-2-1= & c^{-2}-2=\frac{-n}{n+1}=\frac{1-m}{m}<1-m<1 \\
& \Rightarrow 2 c^{-2}<6<X
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus

$$
c^{2} X>2
$$

And

$$
X^{2 p}>c^{2} X^{q}>2 X^{q-1} \geq X^{2 p-2}
$$

It means that

$$
q+1=2 p
$$

The equation becomes

$$
Y^{p}=X^{2 p-1}+1
$$

And

$$
\begin{gathered}
0 \geq\left(c^{2}-1\right) Y^{p}=X^{2 p}-2 X^{p}-X^{q}=X^{2 p}-2 X^{p}-X^{2 p-1} \geq 0 \\
\Rightarrow\left(c^{2}-1\right) Y^{p}=0=X^{2 p}-2 X^{p}-X^{2 p-1} \\
\Rightarrow \frac{2}{X}=X^{2 p}-2 X^{p}+1-2 X^{2 p-2} \in \mathbb{N} \\
\Rightarrow X=2 \Rightarrow 2^{2 p}-2^{p+1}-2^{2 p-1}=0 \Rightarrow 2^{p-1}=1+2^{p-2} \\
\Rightarrow p=2 \Rightarrow q=2 p-1=3 \Rightarrow Y= \pm 3
\end{gathered}
$$

The only solution of Catalan equation is then

$$
(Y, X, p, q)=( \pm 3,2,2,3)
$$

## Generalization to Pillai and Fermat-Catalan equation

The Pillai equation is $Y^{p}=X^{q}+a$ let us pose $a=1_{a} 1_{a}$ thus

$$
Y^{p}=X^{q}+1_{a} 1_{a}
$$

and Fermat-Catalan equation is $Y^{p}=X^{q}+Y^{a}$. Let $Y^{a}=1_{a} 1_{a}$. Thus

$$
Y^{p}=X^{q}+1_{a} 1_{a}
$$

We pose

$$
c=\frac{X^{p}-1_{a}}{Y^{\frac{p}{2}}}, \quad c^{\prime}=\frac{7_{a}-X^{p}}{Y^{\frac{p}{2}}}
$$

Thus

$$
\begin{gathered}
Y^{\frac{p}{2}}=\frac{6_{a}}{c+c^{\prime}} \\
X^{p}=c Y^{\frac{p}{2}}+1_{a}=\frac{6_{a} c}{c+c^{\prime}}+1_{a}=\frac{7_{a} c+1_{a} c^{\prime}}{c+c^{\prime}}
\end{gathered}
$$

And

$$
X^{q}=Y^{p}-1_{a} 1_{a}=\frac{36_{a} 1_{a}-1_{a} 1_{a}\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}
$$

We have $X^{p}>7_{a}$ hence $c^{\prime}<0$ and $c>c^{\prime}$ and $Y^{\frac{p}{2}} \geq 3_{a}$ thus $0<c+c^{\prime} \leq 2$ Two cases $c^{2}>1$ and $c^{2} \leq 1$
$c^{2}>1 \quad$ We have

$$
\begin{aligned}
X^{q}-X^{2 p}= & \frac{36_{a} 1_{a}-1_{a} 1_{a}\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7_{a} c+1_{a} c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& <\frac{36_{a} 1_{a}-36_{a} 1_{a} c^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}<0
\end{aligned}
$$

We deduce

$$
q+1 \leq 2 p
$$

Also

$$
\begin{aligned}
& 2 c^{2} X^{q}-X^{2 p}=\frac{72_{a} 1_{a} c^{2}-2_{a} 1_{a} c^{2}\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7_{a} c+1_{a} c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& \quad>\frac{64_{a} 1_{a} c^{2}-\left(7_{a} c+1_{a} c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}=1_{a} 1_{a} \frac{\left(c-c^{\prime}\right)\left(15 c+c^{\prime}\right)}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}>0
\end{aligned}
$$

And

$$
\begin{aligned}
& c^{2} X^{q}-X^{2 p}=\frac{36_{a} 1_{a} c^{2}-1_{a} 1_{a}\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7_{a} c+1_{a} c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& <\frac{36_{a} 1_{a} c^{2}-\left(7_{a} c+1_{a} c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}=1_{a} 1_{a} \frac{\left(c^{\prime}-c\right)\left(13 c+c^{\prime}\right)}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}<0
\end{aligned}
$$

But

$$
2 c^{2} X^{2 p-1} \geq 2 c^{2} X^{q}>X^{2 p} \Rightarrow 2 c^{2}>X
$$

But

$$
2 c^{2}>1 \Rightarrow 2 c^{2}=\frac{n+2}{n+1}=\frac{m+1}{m}
$$

And

$$
\begin{gathered}
c^{2}-2=\frac{-n}{n+1}=\frac{1-m}{m}<1-m<1 \\
\Rightarrow 2 c^{2}<6<X
\end{gathered}
$$

Thus

$$
2 c^{2} \geq X \geq 2 c^{2} \Rightarrow 2 c^{2}=X
$$

And

$$
X^{2 p}<2 c^{2} X^{q}=X^{q+1} \leq X^{2 p} \Rightarrow q+1=2 p
$$

The equation becomes

$$
Y^{p}=X^{2 p-1}+1_{a} 1_{a}
$$

And also

$$
\begin{gathered}
\left(2 c^{2}-X\right) Y^{p}=0=2 X^{2 p}-4_{a} X^{p}+2_{a} 1_{a}-X^{2 p}-1_{a} 1_{a} X \\
\Rightarrow \frac{-2_{a} 1_{a}}{X}=X^{2 p-1}-4_{a} X^{p-1}-1_{a} 1_{a} \in \mathbb{N} \\
\Rightarrow X \leq 2_{a} 1_{a}
\end{gathered}
$$

The equation has a finite number of solutions !
$c^{2} \leq 1$

$$
\begin{aligned}
2 X^{q}-X^{2 p}= & \frac{72_{a} 1_{a}-2_{a} 1_{a}\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}-\left(7_{a} c+1_{a} c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}} \\
& >1_{a} 1_{a} \frac{64-49 c^{2}}{\left(c+c^{\prime}\right)^{2}}>0
\end{aligned}
$$

Thus

$$
X^{q} \geq X^{2 p-1}
$$

Or

$$
q+1 \geq 2 p
$$

But

$$
\begin{gathered}
2 c^{-2}>1 \Rightarrow 2 c^{-2}=\frac{n+2}{n+1}=\frac{m+1}{m} \\
\Rightarrow c^{-2}-2=\frac{-n}{n+1}=\frac{1-m}{m}<1-m<1 \\
\Rightarrow 2 c^{-2}<6<X
\end{gathered}
$$

Thus

$$
c^{2} X>2
$$

And

$$
X^{2 p}>c^{2} X^{q}>2 X^{q-1} \geq X^{2 p-2}
$$

It means that

$$
q+1=2 p
$$

The equation becomes

$$
Y^{p}=X^{2 p-1}+1
$$

And

$$
\begin{gathered}
0 \geq\left(c^{2}-1\right) Y^{p}=X^{2 p}-2_{a} X^{p}-X^{q}=X^{2 p}-2_{a} X^{p}-X^{2 p-1} \geq 0 \\
\Rightarrow\left(c^{2}-1\right) Y^{p}=0=X^{2 p}-2_{a} X^{p}-X^{2 p-1} \\
\Rightarrow \frac{2_{a} 1_{a}}{X} \in \mathbb{N}
\end{gathered}
$$

The equation has a finite number of solutions! Both Pillai and Fermat-Catalan equations have a finite number of solutions !

## Conclusion

Catalan equation implies a second one, and an original solution of Catalan equation exists. We have generalized the approach to both Pillai and Fermat-Catalan equations and proved that they have a finite number of solutions!
