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# 3D-2D ASYMPTOTIC OBSERVATION FOR MINIMIZATION PROBLEMS ASSOCIATED WITH DEGENERATIVE ENERGY-COEFFICIENTS

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ABSTRACT. In this paper, a class of minimization problems, labeled by an index 0 < h < 1, is considered. Each minimization problem is for a free-energy, motivated by the magnetics in 3D-ferromagnetic thin film, and in the context, the index h denotes the thickness of the observing film. The Main Theorem consists of two themes, which are concerned with the study of the solvability (existence of minimizers) and the 3D-2D asymptotic analysis for our minimization problems. These themes will be discussed under degenerative setting of the material coefficients, and such degenerative situation makes the energy-domain be variable with respect to h. In conclusion, assuming some restrictive conditions for the domain-variation, a definite association between our 3D-minimization problems, for very thin h, and a 2D-limiting problem, as  $h \searrow 0$ , will be demonstrated with helps from the theory of  $\Gamma$ -convergence.

1. **Introduction.** Let  $S \subset \mathbb{R}^2$  be a two-dimensional bounded domain with a smooth boundary, and let  $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^3$  be a three-dimensional cylindrical domain, given by  $\Omega := S \times (0,1)$ . Let  $\alpha : \overline{\Omega} \longrightarrow [0,\infty)$  be a given nonnegative and continuous function.

In this paper, let us imagine the situation that a ferromagnetic thin film is applied on a thin region  $\Omega^{(h)} := S \times (0,h)$  with a (small) thickness 0 < h < 1. As a possible free-energy for the magnetic study in such situation, the following functional, denoted by  $\mathcal{E}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$ :

$$\mathcal{E}_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m) := \Psi_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m) + \int_{\Omega^{(h)}} \left( \varphi(m) + \frac{1}{2} \nabla \zeta \cdot m \right) d\mathcal{L}^{3},$$
for any  $m = (m_{1}, m_{2}, m_{3}) \in L^{2}(\Omega^{(h)}; \mathbb{R}^{3});$

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subject to:

was proposed by Brown [7] (1963), where  $\Psi_{\alpha}$  is the lower semi-continuous envelopment of a functional:

$$\psi \in W^{1,2}(\Omega^{(h)}; \mathbb{R}^3) \cap L^2(\Omega^{(h)}; \mathbb{S}^2) \mapsto \int_{\Omega^{(h)}} \alpha |\nabla \psi|^2 d\mathcal{L}^3;$$

onto the space  $L^2(\Omega^{(h)}; \mathbb{R}^3)$ .

In (1), the value of  $\mathcal{E}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  denotes an energy quantity, per unit volume in  $\Omega^{(h)}$ , and the variable  $m=(m_1,m_2,m_3)$  denotes the magnetization in the region  $\Omega^{(h)}$  of magnetic thin film. In this light, the minimizers of  $\mathcal{E}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  are supposed to represent the most probable profile of the magnetization distribution applied on  $\Omega^{(h)}$ . Here, the given function  $\alpha$  is the so-called material coefficient, and this coefficient is supposed to be degenerative somewhere in  $\Omega$ .  $\varphi: \mathbb{R}^3 \longrightarrow [0,\infty)$  is a given continuous function, which is involved in the magnetization anisotropy.

The function  $\zeta: \mathbb{R}^3 \longrightarrow \mathbb{R}$  as in (1)-(2) denotes the magnetic field potential, and hence, it is prescribed as the solution of the simplified Maxwell equation (2). Here, the notation " $\overline{0}$ " denotes the zero-extension of functions. In addition to the above, let us note that the free-energy  $\mathcal{E}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  is considered under the constrained condition (3), by a positive constant  $m_s$  of the magnetization saturation.

In this paper, we set:

$$\mathcal{L}^2(S) = 1$$
 (and hence  $\mathcal{L}^3(\Omega) = 1$ ), and  $m_s = 1$ ;

for simplicity. On that basis, let us denote by  $T^{(h)}$  the scale transform, defined as:

to consider a rescaled minimization problem, denoted by  $(MP)^{(h)}$ .

(MP)<sup>(h)</sup> Find a vectorial function  $m^{(h)}=(m_1^{(h)},m_2^{(h)},m_3^{(h)})\in L^2(\Omega;\mathbb{R}^3)$  of three variables, which minimizes the following functional on  $L^2(\Omega;\mathbb{R}^3)$ :

$$\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m) := \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m) + \int_{\Omega} \varphi(m) d\mathcal{L}^{3} + \frac{1}{2} \int_{\Omega} \left( \nabla_{\mathbf{P}} \zeta \cdot m_{\mathbf{P}} + \frac{1}{h} \partial_{3} \zeta \, m_{3} \right) d\mathcal{L}^{3},$$
for any  $m = (m_{1}, m_{2}, m_{3}) \in L^{2}(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^{3});$

where the subscript " $_{\rm P}$ " denotes the restriction of the situation onto the two-dimensional plane  $\mathbb{R}^2$ , e.g.:

$$y_{\rm P} := (y_1, y_2), \text{ for } y = (y_1, y_2, y_3) \in \mathbb{R}^3,$$

 $\mu_{\mathbf{P}} := (\mu_1, \mu_2) \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^2), \text{ for } \mu = (\mu_1, \mu_2, \mu_3) \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3),$ 

and the distributional gradient

$$\nabla_{\mathbf{P}}\mu := \begin{pmatrix} \partial_1\mu_1 & \partial_2\mu_1 \\ \partial_1\mu_2 & \partial_2\mu_2 \\ \partial_1\mu_3 & \partial_2\mu_3 \end{pmatrix}, \text{ for } \mu = (\mu_1, \mu_2, \mu_3) \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3);$$

and  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  is the rescaled version of the lower semi-continuous envelopment  $\Psi_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  by  $T^{(h)}$ , and it is rigorously defined as:

by using a composition:

$$\alpha^{(h)}(x) := (\alpha \circ T^{(h)})(x) = \alpha(x_1, x_2, hx_3), \text{ for all } x = (x_1, x_2, x_3) \in \overline{\Omega};$$

and a class of approximating functions:

for any  $m \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{S}^2)$ .

As is easily seen, the inverse transform  $(T^{(h)})^{-1}$  provides a bijective correspondence between the minimizers  $m^{(h)}$  of  $(MP)^{(h)}$  and the minimizers  $m^{(h)}_{\text{org}} := m^{(h)} \circ (T^{(h)})^{-1}$  of the original free-energy  $\mathcal{E}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$ . Besides, let us note that the domains  $\text{Dom}(\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)})$  of free-energies are not uniform, but variable with respect to 0 < h < 1, and the variation is directly governed by the degenerating part of the coefficient:

$$A_0^{(h)} := (\alpha^{(h)})^{-1}(0) \subset \overline{\Omega}, \text{ for } 0 < h < 1.$$

Under very thin situation of the thickness h, it is naturally expected that the minimization problem  $(MP)^{(h)}$  can be reduced to a simpler problem, considered in two-dimensional domain S. Such reduction will be realized through the limiting observation for  $(MP)^{(h)}$  as  $h \searrow 0$ , and then, the binary function:

$$\alpha^{\circ}(x_1, x_2) := \alpha(x_1, x_2, 0)$$
 for any  $(x_1, x_2) \in \overline{S}$ , with the degenerating part  $A_0^{\circ} := (\alpha^{\circ})^{-1}(0)$ ;

will be the material coefficient in the limiting problem. Actually, in the h-independent case of  $A_0^{(h)}$ , a number of like-minded study results, such as [1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18], were reported, from various viewpoints, and some of them concluded a definite association between the limiting profile of  $(MP)^{(h)}$ , as  $h \searrow 0$ , and the following minimization problem, denoted by  $(MP)^{\circ}$ .

(MP)° Find a vectorial function  $m^{\circ} = (m_1^{\circ}, m_2^{\circ}, m_3^{\circ}) \in L^2(S; \mathbb{R}^3)$  of two variables, which minimizes the following functional:

$$\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}(m) := \Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}(m) + \int_{S} \varphi(m) \, d\mathcal{L}^{2} + \frac{1}{2} \int_{S} |m_{3}|^{2} \, d\mathcal{L}^{2},$$
for any  $m = (m_{1}, m_{2}, m_{3}) \in L^{2}(S; \mathbb{R}^{3});$

where  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}$  is a convex function on  $L^{2}(S;\mathbb{R}^{3})$ , defined as:

$$\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}(m) := \begin{cases}
\inf_{\{\psi^{(i)}\} \in \mathcal{Q}_{S}(m) & i \to \infty \\ \text{if } |m| = 1, \ \mathcal{L}^{2}\text{-a.e. in } S, \\
\infty, \text{ otherwise, for any } m \in L^{2}(S; \mathbb{R}^{3});
\end{cases} (9)$$

by using a class of approximating sequences

$$\mathcal{Q}_S(m) := \left\{ \begin{array}{l} \{\psi^{(i)}\} \; \left| \begin{array}{l} \psi^{(i)} \in W^{1,2}(S;\mathbb{R}^3) \cap L^2(S;\mathbb{S}^2), \; i=1,2,3,\cdots, \\ \text{and} \; \; \psi^{(i)} \rightarrow m \; \text{in} \; L^2(S;\mathbb{R}^3) \; \text{as} \; i \rightarrow \infty \end{array} \right. \end{array} \right\}.$$

Now, the main theme of this paper is to verify whether analogous observation is available even under h-variable situation of  $A_0^{(h)}$  (or energy domains), or not. To this end, we here impose the following two conditions for the material coefficient  $\alpha$ :

- (a1)  $\mathcal{L}^{3}(A_{0}^{(h)}) = 0$ , for 0 < h < 1; (a2)  $\mathcal{L}^{2}(A_{0}^{\circ}) = 0$ , and  $\alpha^{\circ}(x_{P}) \leq \alpha(x)$ , for all  $x = (x_{1}, x_{2}, x_{3}) \in \overline{\Omega}$ .

Consequently, a certain positive answer for our theme will be demonstrated in the main theorem, stated as follows.

(I) Let us assume the condition (a1). Then, for any 0 < h < 1, Main Theorem. the problem  $(MP)^{(h)}$  admits at least one solution (minimizer)  $m^{(h)}$ .

- (II) Under the conditions (a1)-(a2), there exist a sequence  $\{h_i \mid i=1,2,3,\cdots\}$ (0,1) and a function  $m^{\circ} \in L^2(S;\mathbb{R}^3)$  of two variables, such that:
  - (i)  $h_i \searrow 0$ ,  $m^{(h_i)} \to m^{\circ}$  in  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ ,  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h_i)}(m^{(h_i)}) \to \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}(m^{\circ})$ , as  $i \to \infty$ ; (ii) the limit  $m^{\circ}$  solves the problem  $(MP)^{\circ}$ ;

where  $\{m^{(h)} | 0 < h < 1\}$  is the sequence of minimizers  $m^{(h)}$ , 0 < h < 1, obtained in (I).

The content of this paper is as follows. In the next Section 2, some key-properties for the minimization problems  $(MP)^{(h)}$ , 0 < h < 1, and  $(MP)^{\circ}$  are briefly mentioned as preliminaries. In subsequent Section 3, the continuous dependence between the energy sequence  $\{\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)} \mid 0 < h < 1\}$  and the energy  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}$ , as  $h \searrow 0$ , will be shown by means of the notion of  $\Gamma$ -convergence (cf. [9]). On that basis, the final Section 4 will be devoted to the proof of Main Theorem.

**Notation.** Throughout this paper, the Lebesgue measure is denoted by  $\mathcal{L}^n$ , for any observing dimension  $n \in \mathbb{N}$ .

For any abstract Banach space, the norm of X is denoted by  $|\cdot|_X$ . However, when X is an Euclidean space, the norm is simply denoted by  $|\cdot|$ . Besides, for any functional  $F: X \longrightarrow (-\infty, \infty]$ , we denote by Dom(F) the domain of F, and for any r > 0, we denote by L(r; F) the sublevel set of F, more precisely:

$$Dom(F) := \left\{ \xi \in X \mid F(\xi) < \infty \right\} \text{ and } L(r; F) := \left\{ \xi \in X \mid F(\xi) \le r \right\}.$$

For any abstract Hilbert space H, the inner product of H is denoted by  $(\cdot,\cdot)_H$ . However, when H is an Euclidean space, the inner product between two vectors  $\xi, \eta \in H$  is simply denoted by  $\xi \cdot \eta$ .

- 2. Preliminaries. Let us start with summarizing the known-facts, concerned with the coupled Maxwell equation (5).
- (Fact 1) (Summary of [18, Lemma 3.1]) Let us fix any 0 < h < 1. Then, for any function  $m = (m_1, m_2, m_3) \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , the solution  $\zeta^{(h)}$  of the Maxwell equation (5) is prescribed in the scope of a Hilbert space:

$$V^{(h)} := \left\{ v \in H^1_{\mathrm{loc}}(\mathbb{R}^3) \mid \nabla v \in L^2(\mathbb{R}^3; \mathbb{R}^3) \text{ and } \int_{B_{\Omega}} v \, d\mathcal{L}^3 = 0 \right\};$$

endowed with a h-dependent inner product:

$$(u,v)_{V^{(h)}} := (\nabla_{\mathbf{P}} u, \nabla_{\mathbf{P}} v)_{L^2(\mathbb{R}^3;\mathbb{R}^{3\times 2})} + \frac{1}{h^2} (\partial_3 u, \partial_3 v)_{L^2(\mathbb{R}^3;\mathbb{R}^3)}, \text{ for } u,v \in V^{(h)};$$

where  $B_{\Omega}$  is an (fixed) open ball containing  $\Omega$ . Then, the solution  $\zeta^{(h)} \in V^{(h)}$  is supposed to fulfill a weak formulation by the following variational identity:

$$\int_{\Omega} \left( (\nabla_{\mathbf{P}} \zeta^{(h)} - m_{\mathbf{P}}) \cdot \nabla_{\mathbf{P}} v + \frac{1}{h} \left( \frac{1}{h} \partial_3 \zeta^{(h)} - m_3 \right) \partial_3 v \right) d\mathcal{L}^3 = 0,$$
for any  $v \in V^{(h)}$ ;

Moreover, taking more one function  $\tilde{m} \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , arbitrarily, and taking another solution  $\tilde{\zeta}^{(h)}$  of (10) when  $m = \tilde{m}$ , it follows that:

$$|\zeta^{(h)} - \tilde{\zeta}^{(h)}|_{V^{(h)}} \le |m - \tilde{m}|_{L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)}.$$

Hence, the variational problem (10) is well-posed. (Fact 2) (Summary of [15, Proposition 4.1]) Let us set:

by using the solution  $\zeta^{(h)}$  of the variational identity (10). On that basis, let us assume that  $\{\bar{m}^{(h)} \mid 0 < h < 1\} \subset L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , and  $\bar{m}^{(h)} \to \bar{m}$  in  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$  as  $h \searrow 0$ , for some  $\bar{m} = (\bar{m}_1, \bar{m}_2, \bar{m}_3) \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ . Then:

Next, let us look toward the key-properties of the lower semi-continuous envelopments  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}$ , 0 < h < 1, and  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}$ .

**Lemma 2.1.** (I) For any 0 < h < 1, the functional  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  is a maximal functional in the class of l.s.c. functionals on  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , supporting the functional:

$$\psi \in W^{1,2}(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3) \cap L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{S}^2) \mapsto \int_{\Omega} \alpha^{(h)} \left( |\nabla_{\mathcal{P}} \psi|^2 + \frac{1}{h^2} |\partial_3 \psi|^2 \right) d\mathcal{L}^3.$$

*Proof.* This lemma follows, directly, from the definition formulas (6) and (9).

Remark 1. (Key-properties for free-energies) By virtue of (4), (8) and Lemma 2.1, the functional  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  (resp.  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}$ ) turns out to be l.s.c. in  $L^{2}(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^{3})$  (resp. in  $L^{2}(S; \mathbb{R}^{3})$ ), and  $\mathrm{Dom}(\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}) = \mathrm{Dom}(\Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)})$ , for 0 < h < 1 (resp.  $\mathrm{Dom}(\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}) = \mathrm{Dom}(\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ})$ ). Furthermore, under the conditions (a1)-(a2), as in introduction, the variation of energy-domains  $\mathrm{Dom}(\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)})$ , with respect to h, will be restrictive in the sense that  $\mathrm{Dom}(\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)})$  will be included in  $W_{\mathrm{loc}}^{1,2}(\Omega \setminus (A_{0}^{\circ} \times (0,1)); \mathbb{R}^{3})$ , uniformly, for all 0 < h < 1.

Taking into account of Lemma 2.1, Remark 1 and [16, Corollary 2], we can derive the following corollary.

Corollary 1. (Compactness) Let us assume the condition (a1), as in introduction. Then, for any 0 < h < 1 and any r > 0, the sublevel sets  $L(r; \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)})$  and  $L(r; \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)})$  are compact in  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ . Additionally, if we assume the conditions (a1)-(a2), as in introduction, then for any r > 0, the sublevel sets  $L(r; \Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ})$  and  $L(r; \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ})$  are compact in  $L^2(S; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , and the unions

$$\mathcal{U}_{\Phi}(r) := \bigcup_{0 < h < 1} L(r; \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}) \quad and \quad \mathcal{U}_{\mathcal{F}}(r) := \bigcup_{0 < h < 1} L(r; \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)});$$

are relatively compact in  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ .

*Proof.* Let us assume (a1), and let us fix any 0 < h < 1 and any r > 0. Here, taking the solution  $\zeta^{(h)}$  as the test function of (10), we have:

$$F_{\text{mag}}^{(h)}(m) = \frac{1}{2} |\zeta^{(h)}|_{V^{(h)}}^2 \ge 0, \text{ for any } m \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3).$$
 (13)

Subsequently, we see from (4), (13) and (i-1) of Lemma 2.1 that:

$$L(r; \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}) \subset L(r; \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}) \subset L(r; \Phi_{0,\alpha}^{(h)}).$$

Since the compactness of  $L(r; \Phi_{0,\alpha}^{(h)})$  in  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$  is already concluded in [16, Corollary 2], we can say that its closed subsets  $L(r; \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)})$  and  $L(r; \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)})$  are also so.

Just as in the above, the assertion for the sublevel sets  $L(r; \Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ})$  and  $L(r; \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ})$  (resp. for the unions  $\mathcal{U}_{\Phi}(r)$  and  $\mathcal{U}_{\mathcal{F}}(r)$ ) can be concluded, with the helps from the condition (a2) and [16, Corollary 2] (resp. [16, Theorem 3.4]).

3. Continuous dependence of energies. The objective in this section is summarized in the following theorem, concerned with continuous dependence ( $\Gamma$ -convergence) of lower semi-continuous envelopments, as  $h \searrow 0$ .

**Theorem 3.1.** ( $\Gamma$ -convergence from  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  to  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}$  as  $h \searrow 0$ ) Let us assume the conditions (a1)-(a2), as in introduction. Then, the sequence  $\{\Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)} \mid 0 < h < 1\}$  of the lower semi-continuous envelopments converges to  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}$ , in the sense of  $\Gamma$ -convergence, as  $h \searrow 0$ . More precisely, referring to [9] (or [1, Lemma 2.3]), the above assertion is equivalent to:

- $(\gamma 1) \liminf_{h \searrow 0} \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}(\check{m}^{(h)}) \geq \Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}(\check{m}^{\circ}), \ if \ \{\check{m}^{(h)} | 0 < h < 1\} \subset L^{2}(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^{3}), \ \check{m}^{\circ} \in L^{2}(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^{3}), \ and \ \check{m}^{(h)} \to \check{m}^{\circ} \ in \ L^{2}(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^{3}) \ as \ h \searrow 0$ :
- $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , and  $\check{m}^{(h)} \to \check{m}^\circ$  in  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$  as  $h \searrow 0$ ;  $(\gamma 2)$  for any  $\hat{m}^\circ \in \mathrm{Dom}(\Phi_\alpha^\circ)$ , there exists a sequence  $\{\hat{m}^{(h)} \mid 0 < h < 1\} \subset L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , such that  $\hat{m}^{(h)} \to \hat{m}^\circ$  in  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$  and  $\Phi_\alpha^{(h)}(\hat{m}^{(h)}) \to \Phi_\alpha^\circ(\hat{m}^\circ)$ , as  $h \searrow 0$ .

This theorem is proved by relying on some classes of open sets, mentioned in the following lemma.

**Lemma 3.2.** (Open coverings for non-degenerate parts) There exists a sequence  $\{\bar{\alpha}_{\ell}^{\circ} | \ell = 1, 2, 3, \cdots\} \subset (0, 1)$  and a covering  $\{S_{\ell} | \ell = 1, 2, 3, \cdots\} \subset S \setminus A_0^{\circ} \text{ of } S \setminus A_0^{\circ} \text{ with smooth boundaries } \partial S_{\ell} \ (\ell = 1, 2, 3, \cdots), \text{ such that:}$ 

$$\begin{cases} \emptyset \neq S_1 \subset \cdots \subset S_\ell \subset \cdots \subset S \setminus A_0^\circ = \bigcup_{\ell=0}^\infty S_\ell, \\ \bar{\alpha}_1^\circ > \cdots > \bar{\alpha}_\ell^\circ > \cdots > 0 = \lim_{\ell \to \infty} \bar{\alpha}_\ell^\circ, \quad and \quad \alpha^\circ \geq \bar{\alpha}_\ell^\circ \quad on \ S_\ell, \ for \ \ell = 1, 2, 3, \cdots. \end{cases}$$

Hence, if we assume the conditions (a1)-(a2) as in introduction, then a sequence  $\{\Omega_{\ell}^{\dagger}\}:=\{S_{\ell}\times(0,1)\,|\,\ell=1,2,3,\cdots\}$  turns out to be a covering of an open set  $\Omega^{\dagger}:=\Omega\setminus(A_{0}^{\circ}\times(0,1))$ , with Lipschitz boundaries  $\partial\Omega_{\ell}^{\dagger}$  ( $\ell=1,2,3,\cdots$ ), such that:

$$\begin{cases}
\emptyset \neq \Omega_1^{\dagger} \subset \cdots \subset \Omega_{\ell}^{\dagger} \subset \cdots \subset \Omega^{\dagger} = \bigcup_{\ell=0}^{\infty} \Omega_{\ell}^{\dagger} \subset \Omega \setminus A_0^{(h)}, \quad \mathcal{L}^3(\Omega \setminus \Omega^{\dagger}) = 0, \\
\alpha^{(h)} \geq \alpha^{\circ} \geq \bar{\alpha}_{\ell}^{\circ} > 0 \text{ on } \Omega_{\ell}^{\dagger}, \text{ for } \ell = 1, 2, 3, \cdots \text{ and } 0 < h < 1.
\end{cases}$$
(14)

*Proof of Lemma 3.2.* This lemma is a direct consequence of the line of arguments, discussed in [16, Lemma 4.1, Remark 4-5].  $\Box$ 

Proof of Theorem 3.1. First, we verify the assertion  $(\gamma 1)$ . Then, it is enough to consider only the case when  $\liminf_{h\searrow 0} \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}(\check{m}^{(h)}) < \infty$ , since another case is trivial.

On account of (i-3) in Lemma 2.1, we find a sequence  $\{\check{h}_i \mid i=1,2,3,\cdots\} \subset (0,1)$  and a sequence  $\{\check{\mu}^{(i)} \mid i=1,2,3,\cdots\} \subset W^{1,2}(\Omega;\mathbb{R}^3) \cap L^2(\Omega;\mathbb{S}^2)$ , such that:

$$\begin{cases} \check{h}_i \searrow 0 \text{ and } \check{\mu}^{(i)} \to \check{m}^{\circ} \text{ in } L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3), \text{ as } i \to \infty, \\ \lim_{i \to \infty} \Phi_{0,\alpha}^{(\check{h}_i)}(\check{\mu}^{(i)}) = \liminf_{h \searrow 0} \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}(\check{m}^{(h)}). \end{cases}$$

Here, in the light of (14) and (i-1) in Lemma 2.1,

$$\begin{aligned} |\partial_{3}\check{m}^{\circ}|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\ell}^{\dagger};\mathbb{R}^{3})}^{2} & \leq & \liminf_{i \to \infty} |\partial_{3}\check{\mu}^{(i)}|_{L^{2}(\Omega_{\ell}^{\dagger};\mathbb{R}^{3})}^{2} \\ & \leq & \frac{1}{\bar{\alpha}_{\ell}^{\circ}} \sup_{i > 1} \Phi_{0,\alpha}^{(\check{h}_{i})} (\check{\mu}^{(i)}) \lim_{i \to \infty} \check{h}_{i}^{2} = 0, \ \ell = 1, 2, 3, \cdots, \end{aligned}$$
(15)

which implies  $\partial_3 \check{m}^\circ = 0$ ,  $\mathcal{L}^3$ -a.e. in  $\Omega^{\dagger}$ . Hence, the limit  $\check{m}^\circ$  can be regarded to belong to the class  $L^2(S \setminus A_0^\circ; \mathbb{R}^3)$  (=  $L^2(S; \mathbb{R}^3)$ ) of binary functions. Subsequently, let us set:

$$\check{\mu}^{(i)}(x_1, x_2) := \check{\mu}^{(i)}(x_1, x_2, c_i), \text{ for } \mathcal{L}^2\text{-a.e. } (x_1, x_2) \in S \text{ and } i = 1, 2, 3, \cdots;$$

by using a collection  $\{c_i | i = 1, 2, 3, \dots\} \subset (0, 1)$  of constants, such that:

$$\int_{S} \alpha^{(\check{h}_{i})}(x_{1}, x_{2}, c_{i}) |\nabla_{P} \check{\mu}^{(i)}(x_{1}, x_{2}, c_{i})|^{2} d\mathcal{L}^{2} \leq \int_{\Omega} \alpha^{(\check{h}_{i})} |\nabla_{P} \check{\mu}^{(i)}|^{2} d\mathcal{L}^{3}, \quad i = 1, 2, 3, \cdots.$$

Then, with the helps from (15) and Fubini's theorem, it is computed that:

$$\begin{split} &\lim_{i\to\infty}|\check{\psi}^{(i)}-\check{\mu}^{(i)}|_{L^2(\Omega;\mathbb{R}^3)}^2\\ &=\lim_{i\to\infty}\left(|\check{\psi}^{(i)}-\check{\mu}^{(i)}|_{L^2(\Omega_\ell^\dagger;\mathbb{R}^3)}^2+|\check{\psi}^{(i)}-\check{\mu}^{(i)}|_{L^2(\Omega\setminus\Omega_\ell^\dagger;\mathbb{R}^3)}^2\right)\\ &\leq\lim_{i\to\infty}\int_{\Omega_\ell^\dagger}\int_0^1|\partial_3\check{\mu}^{(i)}|^2d\mathcal{L}^1d\mathcal{L}^3+4\mathcal{L}^3(\Omega\setminus\Omega_\ell^\dagger)\\ &\leq\lim_{i\to\infty}|\partial_3\check{\mu}^{(i)}|_{L^2(\Omega_\ell^\dagger)}^2+4\mathcal{L}^3(\Omega\setminus\Omega_\ell^\dagger)=4\mathcal{L}^3(\Omega\setminus\Omega_\ell^\dagger), \ \ \text{for } \ell=1,2,3,\cdots. \end{split}$$

It implies that:

$$\check{\psi}^{(i)} \to \check{m}^{\circ} \text{ in } L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3), \text{ as } i \to \infty;$$
 (16)

since  $\mathcal{L}^3(\Omega \setminus \Omega_\ell^{\dagger}) \to 0$  as  $\ell \to \infty$ . Taking into account of (a2), (16), (ii-2) in Lemma 2.1 and the lower semi-continuity of  $\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}$ , we deduce that:

$$\begin{aligned} & \liminf_{h\searrow 0} \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}(\check{m}^{(h)}) = \lim_{i\to\infty} \Phi_{\alpha}^{(\check{h}_i)}(\check{\mu}^{(i)}) \geq \liminf_{i\to\infty} \int_{\Omega} \alpha^{(\check{h}_i)} |\nabla_{\mathbf{P}}\check{\mu}^{(i)}|^2 d\mathcal{L}^3 \\ & \geq & \liminf_{i\to\infty} \int_{S} \alpha^{(\check{h}_i)}(x_1, x_2, c_i) |\nabla \check{\psi}^{(i)}(x_1, x_2)|^2 d\mathcal{L}^2 \geq \liminf_{i\to\infty} \Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}(\check{\psi}^{(i)}) \geq \Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ}(\check{m}^{\circ}). \end{aligned}$$

Thus, the assertion  $(\gamma 1)$  is concluded.

Next, we verify the assertion  $(\gamma 2)$ . Let us take any  $\hat{m}^{\circ} \in \text{Dom}(\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ})$ . Then, construction of the required sequence  $\{\hat{m}^{(h)} \mid 0 < h < 1\}$  will be on the basis of a sequence  $\{\hat{\mu}^{(i)} \mid i = 1, 2, 3, \cdots\} \subset W^{1,2}(S; \mathbb{R}^3) \cap L^2(S; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , which will be obtained as the approximating sequence, as in (ii-3) of Lemma 2.1, when  $m = \hat{m}^{\circ}$ . Here, noting that  $\alpha^{(h)} \to \alpha^{\circ}$  in  $C(\overline{\Omega})$  as  $h \searrow 0$ , there exists a sequence  $\{\hat{h}_i \mid i = 1, 2, 3, \cdots\} \subset (0, 1)$ , such that:

$$\begin{cases} \bullet \ \hat{h}_1 > \dots > \hat{h}_i > \dots > 0 = \lim_{i \to \infty} \hat{h}_i, \\ \bullet \ 0 \le \Phi_{0,\alpha}^{(h)}(\hat{\mu}^{(i)}) - \Phi_{0,\alpha}^{\circ}(\hat{\mu}^{(i)}) = \int_{\Omega} (\alpha^{(h)} - \alpha^{\circ}) |\nabla_{\mathbf{P}} \hat{\mu}^{(i)}|^2 d\mathcal{L}^3 < \frac{1}{2^i}, \\ \text{for any } 0 < h < \hat{h}_i, \ i = 1, 2, 3, \dots. \end{cases}$$

On that basis, the finding sequence  $\{\hat{m}^{(h)}\}\$  will be constructed by putting:

$$\hat{m}^{(h)} := \hat{\mu}^{(i)} \text{ in } L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3), \text{ if } \hat{h}_{i+1} \le h < \hat{h}_i, i = 1, 2, 3, \cdots;$$

with an optional setting 
$$\hat{m}^{(h)} := \hat{\mu}^{(1)}$$
 in  $L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , for  $\hat{h}_1 \leq h < 1$ .

The above Theorem 3.1 actually implies the  $\Gamma$ -convergence of free-energies, stated as follows.

Corollary 2. ( $\Gamma$ -convergence from  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  to  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}$  as  $h \searrow 0$ ) Let us assume the conditions (a1)-(a2). Then, the sequence  $\{\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)} \mid 0 < h < 1\}$  of free-energies converges to the limiting one  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}$ , in the sense of  $\Gamma$ -convergence, as  $h \searrow 0$ .

*Proof of Corollary 2.* This corollary is immediately concluded, by taking into account of Theorem 3.1 and (Fact 2) in Section 2.

**Remark 2.** On account of (13) and (Fact 2), we will see that the sequence  $\{\hat{m}^{(h)} \mid 0 < h < 1\}$  as in  $(\gamma 2)$  of Theorem 3.1 will realize the convergence:

$$\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}(\hat{m}^{(h)}) \to \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}(\hat{m}^{\circ}) \text{ as } h \searrow 0.$$

- 4. **Proof of Main Theorem.** We divide this section into two subsections, for the respective assertions (I) and (II) of Main Theorem.
- 4.1. **Proof of (I) of Main Theorem.** The proof of this assertion will be a slight modification of the argument, discussed in [16, Section 5.1]. In fact, under (a1), and under the fixed setting of 0 < h < 1, we can take the so-called *minimizing sequence*  $\{m_*^{(i)} \mid i=1,2,3,\cdots\} \subset \mathrm{Dom}(\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)})$  that is supposed to satisfy:

$$\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m_*^{(i)}) \searrow F_*^{(h)} := \inf_{m \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)} \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m) \text{ as } i \to \infty.$$

Here, on account of (13), (Fact 1) and Corollary 1, a convergence subsequence  $\{m_*^{(i_k)} | k = 1, 2, 3, \cdots\} \subset \{m_*^{(i)}\}$  will be found with the limit  $m_* \in L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3)$ , and it will be seen that:

$$\begin{cases} m_*^{(i_k)} \to m_* \text{ in } L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3), & \varphi(m_*^{(i_k)}) \to \varphi(m_*) \text{ in } L^1(\Omega), \\ F_{\text{mag}}^{(h)}(m_*^{(i_k)}) \to F_{\text{mag}}^{(h)}(m_*), & \text{as } k \to \infty. \end{cases}$$

In response to the above, we infer from the lower semi-continuity of  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$  that the limit  $m_*$  is one of minimizers of  $(MP)^{(h)}$ .

4.2. **Proof of (II) of Main Theorem.** Let us assume the conditions (a1)-(a2), and let us take a sequence  $\{m^{(h)} | 0 < h < 1\}$  of minimizers of  $\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}$ , 0 < h < 1.

Let us set  $\nu^* := [1, 0, 0] \in \mathbb{S}^2$ . Then, for the variational identity (10) when  $m \equiv \nu^*$ , taking the solution itself as the test function v in (10) yields that  $F_{\text{mag}}^{(h)}(\nu^*) \leq 1$ , for any 0 < h < 1 (see [16, Section 5.2], for details). In view of this,

$$\Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m^{(h)}) \leq \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m^{(h)}) \leq \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}(\nu^{*}) = \Phi_{\alpha}^{(h)}(\nu^{*}) + |\varphi(\nu^{*})|_{L^{1}(\Omega)} + \mathcal{F}_{\text{mag}}^{(h)}(\nu^{*}) 
\leq \varphi(\nu^{*}) + 1, \text{ for all } 0 < h < 1.$$
(17)

Since, the above (17) implies that  $\{m^{(h)}\}\subset \mathcal{U}_{\mathcal{F}}(\varphi(\nu^*)+1)$ , we can apply Corollary 1, to find a sequence  $\{h_i\,|\,i=1,2,3,\cdots\}\subset (0,1)$  and a limiting function  $m^{\circ}\in L^2(\Omega;\mathbb{R}^3)$ , such that:

$$\begin{cases} h_i \searrow 0, \ m^{(h_i)} \to m^{\circ} \ \text{in } L^2(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^3), \\ \varphi(m^{(h_i)}) \to \varphi(m^{\circ}) \ \text{in } L^1(\Omega), \end{cases} \text{ as } i \to \infty.$$

Here, taking into account of Theorem 3.1, Corollary 2 and (17),

$$\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}(m^{\circ}) \leq \liminf_{i \to \infty} \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h_i)}(m^{(h_i)}) \leq \varphi(\nu^*) + 1;$$

and hence  $m^{\circ} \in \text{Dom}(\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}) \subset L^{2}(S; \mathbb{R}^{3})$ .

Next, taking any  $\hat{m}^{\circ} \in \text{Dom}(\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ})$  (=  $\text{Dom}(\Phi_{\alpha}^{\circ})$ ), and taking the sequence  $\{\hat{m}^{(h)} \mid 0 < h < 1\} \subset L^{2}(\Omega; \mathbb{R}^{3})$ , obtained in  $(\gamma 2)$  of Theorem 3.1, it will be seen from Theorem 3.1 Corollary 2 and Remark 2 that:

$$\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}(m^{\circ}) \leq \liminf_{i \to \infty} \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h_{i})}(m^{(h_{i})}) \leq \limsup_{i \to \infty} \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h_{i})}(m^{(h_{i})})$$
  
$$\leq \lim_{i \to \infty} \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h_{i})}(\hat{m}^{(h_{i})}) = \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}(\hat{m}^{\circ}).$$
 (18)

It implies that  $m^{\circ}$  solves the limiting problem (MP)°. Furthermore, putting  $\hat{m}^{\circ} = m^{\circ}$  in (18), it is deduced that:

$$\mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{(h)}(m^{(h)}) \to \mathcal{F}_{\alpha}^{\circ}(m^{\circ}) \text{ as } h \searrow 0.$$

Thus, we conclude the assertion (II).

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
