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# **Determination and Rietveld refinement of the crystal structure of Li0.50Ni0.25TiO**"**PO<sup>4</sup>** … **from powder X-ray and neutron diffraction**

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The structure of the oxyphosphate  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO_4)$  has been determined from conventional X-ray and neutron powder diffraction data. The parameters of the monoclinic cell (space group *P2*<sub>1</sub>/*c*, *Z*=4), obtained from X-ray results, are: *a*=6.3954(6) Å, *b*=7.2599(6) Å, *c*  $=7.3700(5)$  Å, and  $\beta=90.266(6)$ °; those resulting from neutron study are:  $a=6.3906(7)$  Å, *b* =7.2568(7) Å,  $c=7.3673(9)$  Å, and  $\beta=90.234(7)$ °. Refinement by the Rietveld method using whole profile, leads to satisfactory reliability factors:  $cR_{wp}=0.128$ ,  $cR_p=0.100$ , and  $R_B=0.038$  for X-ray and  $cR_{wp}=0.110$ ,  $cR_p=0.120$ , and  $R_p=0.060$  for neutrons. The structure of  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO_4)$  can be described as a TiOPO<sub>4</sub> framework constituted by chains of tilted corner-sharing TiO<sub>6</sub> octahedra running parallel to the  $c$  axis and cross linked by phosphate tetrahedra. In this framework, there are octahedral cavities occupied by Li and Ni atoms: Li occupies the totality of the 2a sites and Ni occupies statistically half of the 2b sites. Ti atoms are displaced from the center of octahedra units in alternating long  $(2.242 \text{ Å})$  and short  $(1.711 \text{ Å})$  Ti–O bonds along chains. © 2002 *International Centre for Diffraction Data.* [DOI: 10.1154/1.1515299]

### **I. INTRODUCTION**

Interest in titanium phosphates, both in glass and crystalline forms, for their properties as ionic conductors or nonlinear optical materials, has led to a large number of studies. The structure of  $LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  has been determined from single crystal (Nagornyi *et al.*, 1991) and from powder (Robertson *et al.*, 1994) X-ray diffraction data. Recently we determined the structure of  $\text{Ni}_{0.50}\text{TiO}(\text{PO}_4)$  (Gravereau *et al.*, 1999). The existence of a solid state solution between these two compounds was envisaged in the way to create cation deficiency in LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>):  $Li_{(1-2x)}Ni_{x}TiO(PO_{4})$ . We have shown that the compounds with  $0 \le x \le 0.10$  crystallize in the orthorhombic system with *Pnma* space group  $(LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$ type), whereas the compounds with  $0.10 < x \le 0.25$  crystallize in the monoclinic system with  $P2<sub>1</sub>/c$  space group. For  $0.25 \leq x \leq 0.5$  the two phases  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO_4)$  and  $Ni<sub>0.50</sub>TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  are obtained simultaneously.

The present paper reports on the determination of  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO_4)$  crystal structure from X-ray and neutron diffraction powder patterns.

## **II. EXPERIMENTAL**

The oxyphosphate  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  was synthesized from aqueous solutions of NiCl<sub>2</sub>.6H<sub>2</sub>O (I) and  $(NH_4)_2HPO_4$   $(II)$ , Li<sub>2</sub>CO<sub>3</sub> dissolved in dilute nitric acid solution  $(III)$ , and solution of  $TiCl<sub>4</sub>$  diluted in ethanol (IV) as starting materials. The mixture (precipate  $+$  solution) obtained by slow addition of  $(IV)$  in  $(I+II+III)$  at room temperature was dried at about  $100^{\circ}$ C to remove the volatile compounds. The reaction is completely achieved after several thermal treatments of 24 h at 200, 500, 800, and 880 °C, respectively. The powder is ground before being submitted to each thermal treatment. The final product is green.

Efforts to grow single crystals have been performed by adding  $Li_3PO_4$  or  $LiPO_3$  as a flux to the prepared phase  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$ . The mixture was heated at high temperatures up to 1300 °C. After cooling down the melting powder, at the rate of  $5^{\circ}$ C/h, only single crystals of  $Li<sub>3</sub>PO<sub>4</sub>$ and  $LiPO<sub>3</sub>$  were obtained. The X-ray pattern does not show the existence of  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$ .

Consequently the structural determination was undertaken from the powder data. Both X-ray and neutron diffraction were used, in order to obtain advantages of the differences of scattering amplitudes for the two techniques.

X-ray diffraction data have been collected at room temperature on a Philips PW 3040  $(\theta - \theta)$  diffractometer, with subsequent experimental conditions: Bragg–Brentano geometry; diffracted-beam graphite monochromator; *Cu K*<sup>a</sup> radiation  $(40 \text{ kV}, 40 \text{ mA})$ ; Soller slits of 0.02 rad on incident and diffracted beams; divergence slit of 1°; antiscatter slit of 1°; receiving slit of 0.05 mm; holder surface corrected with a razor blade; sample spinner used; steps of  $0.02^{\circ}(2\theta)$  over the

angular range  $12^{\circ} - 120^{\circ}$  (2 $\theta$ ) with a fixed counting time of 30 s.

Neutron diffraction data have been collected at room temperature on the high resolution powder diffractometer 3T2 in Saclay (LLB, Orphée Reactor), with:  $\alpha_1 = 10$ '; focusing (335) Ge monochromator;  $\lambda = 1.2251$  Å; 6°–125.70° angular range of measurement  $(2\theta)$ , 0.05° step; 20 He<sup>3</sup> detectors,  $\alpha_3=10'$ .

### **III. STRUCTURE DETERMINATION**

#### **A. Powder diffraction pattern analysis**

Figure 1 shows that the X-ray spectra of  $LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$ and  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO_4)$  are close. The crystal structure of LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>) has been found (Nagornyi *et al.*, 1991) orthorhombic with *Pnma* space group and  $a=7.394(2)$  Å, *b*  $=6.371(2)$  Å,  $c=7.228(1)$  Å cell parameters at *T* = 300 K. In a first step, for  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO_4)$ , searches were done in an orthorhombic symmetry starting from  $LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  as a structural model. The peak observed in the X-ray pattern around  $2\theta \approx 13.86^\circ$  is not compatible with *Pnma* space group and it was then attributed to  $Ni<sub>0.50</sub>TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  as an impurity. Refinement of 35 parameters in this case (orthorhombic structural model of  $LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$ ) and  $Ni<sub>0.50</sub>TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  for impurity) led to nonsatisfactory indicator values ( $R_p$ =0.161,  $R_{wp}$ =0.213,  $cR_p$ =0.224,  $cR_{wp}$  $=0.272$ ,  $R_{B(\text{Li}_{0.50}\text{Ni}_{0.25}\text{TiO}(\text{PO}_4))}=0.103$ , and  $R_{B(\text{Ni}_{0.50}\text{TiO}(\text{PO}_4))}$ = 0.235). The presence of  $\text{Ni}_{0.50}\text{TiO}(\text{PO}_4)$  is found to about 4 percentage molar. In addition, a very deep analysis of the observed and calculated patterns of  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$ shows some shift between calculated and observed peaks (e.g., around  $2\theta \approx 22.14^{\circ}$ ). These problems led us to reconsider the starting hypothesis for this new compound.

#### **B. Indexing and cell refinement**

The indexing of the X-ray powder diffraction pattern of  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  was performed by means of the computer program DICVOL (Boultif and Louer, 1991). The first 19 peak positions used were obtained after  $\alpha$ 2-stripping by means of the profile program of the Diffrac-AT package (Socabim–Siemens), with a maximal absolute error of  $0.03^{\circ}(2\theta)$ . There were no solutions in the orthorhombic system but a good monoclinic cell was found:  $a=7.360 \text{ Å}$ , *b*  $=$  7.247 Å,  $c = 6.386$  Å, and  $\beta = 90.31^{\circ}$ :  $M(19) = 34.2$  and  $F(19) = 46.3$  (0.0093; 44).

All observed reflections in neutron pattern (in particular peak at  $2\theta \approx 13.86^{\circ}$  are compatible with this monoclinic solution, so a single phase has to be considered.

So further attempts were done in the monoclinic Laue class 2/m. After a global profile refinement using ''Profile matching" option of FULLPROF program (Rodriguez-Carvajal, 1993), the examination of hkl reflections (reflection conditions: (h01)  $h = 2n$ ; (0*k*0)  $k = 2n$ ) leads to  $P2_1/a$ space group. To work in the standard  $P2<sub>1</sub>/c$  space group we reverse *a* and *c* parameters. The final unit cell parameters of  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO_4)$  are  $a_m=6.3954(6)$  Å,  $b_m$  $=7.2599(6)$  Å,  $c_m=7.3700(5)$  Å, and  $\beta_m=90.266(6)^\circ$ . These parameters are very close to LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>) ones  $(a<sub>o</sub>)$  $=7.402$  Å,  $b_o=6.376$  Å,  $c_o=7.235$  Å, and  $\gamma_o=90^\circ$ ) with

 $a_m \approx b_o$ ,  $b_m \approx c_o$ ,  $c_m \approx a_o$ ,  $\beta_m = 90.266 \approx 90^\circ$ . The difference is that some peaks in the orthorhombic system split into more peaks in the monoclinic system, e.g., the reflection  $(121)$ *-Pnma* split into  $(211)$  and  $(21-1)$ *-P2<sub>1</sub>/c*.

Because of this approach of all parameters, the starting atomic positions were those of  $LiTiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  with the following circular permutation:



Let us note that the  $Pnma-(4a)$  sites  $(0,0,0)$  are split into  $P2<sub>1</sub>/c-(2a)$  (0,0,0) and (2b) (1/2,0,0) sites, while *Pnma*-(8d) sites  $[x_0, y_0, z_0]$  are split into two  $P2_1/c-(4e)$  sites:  $[x_m, y_m, z_m]$  and  $[1/2 - x_m, y_m, z_m]$ .

## **C. Rietveld refinement**

The above-described structural  $P2<sub>1</sub>/c$  model was refined, using X-ray data, with the full profile Rietveld method using the FULLPROF program and the whole angular range  $12^{\circ}-120^{\circ}$  (2 $\theta$ ). The following parameters were refined: scale factor; coefficients for the polynomial function describing the angular variation of the background  $(6$  parameters); parameters *U*, *V*, *W* describing the full width of half maximum (FWHM) angular dependence (Caglioti *et al.*, 1958); parameter  $(\eta)$  for pseudo-Voigt shape function (the contribution of the  $2\theta_k$  Bragg peak was considered inside the range  $2\theta_k$  $± 16$  FWHM); 1 asymmetry parameter; unit-cell parameters  $a, b, c, \beta$ ; zero point shift parameter; fractional atomic coordinates (21 parameters), and isotropic temperature factors ~9 parameters, a constrained model has been used for the refinement of  $B_{\text{iso}}$  of oxygen ions). The fit with these 44 refined parameters led to satisfactory profile  $(R_p=0.074;$  $R_{wp}$ =0.100,  $cR_p$ =0.102;  $cR_{wp}$ =0.128) and crystal structure model indicators ( $R_B$ =0.036;  $R_F$ =0.021).

Refinements of the structure using neutron diffraction were done to confirm the distribution of Li and Ni in  $(2a)$ and (2b)  $P2_1/c$  sites  $(b_{Li}=-0.19\times10^{-12}$  cm, while  $b_{Ni}$  $=1.03\times10^{-12}$  cm). The results are quite similar to those obtained using X-ray diffraction inside 2 e.s.d. for *x*, *y*, *z* parameters.

The X-ray powder diffraction data are presented in Table I. Main crystallographic details of the Rietveld refinement are summarized in Table II for the two powder diffraction techniques. Figure 2 displays the agreement obtained between observed and calculated profiles. The final atomic parameters are given in Table III and selected bond distances and angles in Table IV. Standard deviations have been multiplied by the Berar factor to correct local correlations (Be $'$ rar and Lelann,  $1991$ .

#### **IV. DISCUSSION OF THE STRUCTURE**

The dominant structural units in the oxyphosphate  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO_{4})$  are chains of tilted corner sharing TiO<sub>6</sub> octahedra running parallel to the  $c$  axis (Figure 3). Titanium

atoms are displaced from the geometrical center of the octahedra resulting in alternating long  $(2.242 \text{ Å})$  and short  $(1.711$  $\check{A}$ ) Ti–O1 bonds. The four remaining Ti–O bond distances have intermediate values ranging between 1.914 and 2.050 Å. In one chain the off-center displacement of Ti atoms induces creation of electric moments. As the space group  $P2<sub>1</sub>/c$  is centrosymmetric, there is compensation of antiparallel moments of adjacent chains, so  $Li_{0.50}Ni_{0.25}TiO(PO<sub>4</sub>)$  is antiferroelectric.

Titanium octahedra chains are linked by phosphate tetrahedra to constitute sheets parallel to  $(100)$ . In this framework, there are octahedral cavities occupied by Li and Ni atoms: Li occupies the totality of the 2a sites and Ni occupies statistically half of the 2b sites.  $LiO<sub>6</sub>$  and  $NiO<sub>6</sub>$  octahedra share edges and form chains running parallel to  $a$  axis (Figure 4). Each  $PO_4$  tetrahedron shares 2 oxygen atoms with two  $TiO<sub>6</sub>$  consecutive octahedra of one chain and one oxygen atom with a neighboring parallel chain of the sheet. Links of sheets by the remaining oxygen atom of phosphate tetrahedron lead to  $[TiOPO<sub>4</sub>]<sup>n</sup>$  three-dimensional framework (Figure 5). The  $LiO<sub>6</sub>$  octahedra are distorted: four Li–O distances  $(Li-O(42): 2\times2.120$  Å and  $Li-O(1):$  $2\times2.146$  Å) are close to the calculated ones  $(2.14 \text{ Å})$  (Shannon and Prewitt, 1969); the two other distances  $(Li-O(2))$ :  $2\times2.277$  Å) are longer than the sum of ionic radii. NiO<sub>6</sub> octahedra are distorted; the Ni–O distances vary from 2.030 to 2.154 Å. The Ni–O(1) distances  $(2\times2.090 \text{ Å})$  are very close to the calculated ones  $(2.10 \text{ Å})$ ; the Ni–O(41) and Ni–  $O(2)$  distances are, respectively,  $2\times2.030$  Å and  $2\times2.154$  Å.

Valence bond sums,  $S_i = \sum_{i=1}^n \exp[(R_{ii} - d_{ii})/b]$  with *b*  $=0.37$  Å, based on bond-strength analysis (Brown and Altermatt, 1985; Brese and O'Keeffe, 1991) are in good agreement with the expected formal oxidation states of  $Li<sup>+</sup>$  (0.88),  $Ni^{2+}$  (1.86),  $Ti^{4+}$  (4.21),  $P^{5+}$  (4.87), and  $O^{2-}$  (2.09) ions.
