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# On the resurgent approach to Écalle-Voronin's invariants, II

#### Abstract

Given a holomorphic germ at the origin of $\mathbb{C}$ with a simple parabolic fixed point, the Fatou coordinates have a common asymptotic expansion whose formal Borel transform is resurgent. We show how to use Écalle's alien operators to study the singularities in the Borel plane and relate them to the horn maps, providing each of Ecalle-Voronin's invariants in the form of a convergent numerical series. The proofs are original and self-contained, with ordinary Borel summability as the only prerequisite.


Keywords: Complex dynamics, Ecalle-Voronin invariants, Resurgent functions.

This article is the continuation of [DS13]. We first present an extension of the classical Borel-Laplace summation theory and then show how it applies to the formal Fatou coordinates of a simple parabolic germ.

## 1 Alien operators for simple $2 \pi i \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent series

We denote by $\mathbb{C}_{\log }$ the Riemann surface of the logarithm viewed as the universal cover of $\mathbb{C}^{*}$ with base-point at 1 . For $\beta_{1}, \beta_{2} \in \mathbb{C}$ with $\operatorname{Re} \beta_{1}, \operatorname{Re} \beta_{2}>-1$ and $\hat{\phi}_{1} \in \zeta^{\beta_{1}} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}, \hat{\phi}_{2} \in \zeta^{\beta_{2}} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$, we extend the usual convolution and define $\hat{\phi}_{1} * \hat{\phi}_{2} \in \zeta^{\beta_{1}+\beta_{2}+1} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$ by

$$
\hat{\phi}_{1} * \hat{\phi}_{2}(\zeta):=\int_{0}^{1} \hat{\phi}_{1}((1-t) \zeta) \hat{\phi}_{2}(t \zeta) \zeta \mathrm{d} t \quad \text { for } \zeta \in \mathbb{C}_{\log } \text { with }|\zeta| \text { small enough. }
$$

For $\beta \in \mathbb{C}$ with $\operatorname{Re} \beta>-1$, we extend the classical formal Borel transform by defining

$$
\mathscr{B}: \tilde{\phi}=\sum_{n \geq 0} c_{n} z^{-n-\beta-1} \in z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right] \mapsto \hat{\phi}:=\sum_{n \geq 0} c_{n} \frac{\zeta^{n+\beta}}{\Gamma(n+\beta+1)} \in \zeta^{\beta} \mathbb{C}[[\zeta]] .
$$

Observe that if $\mathscr{B} \tilde{\phi}_{1}=\hat{\phi}_{1} \in \zeta^{\beta_{1}} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$ and $\mathscr{B} \tilde{\phi}_{2}=\hat{\phi}_{2} \in \zeta^{\beta_{2}} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$ then $\mathscr{B}\left(\tilde{\phi}_{1} \tilde{\phi}_{2}\right)=\hat{\phi}_{1} * \hat{\phi}_{2}$.

## Definition 1.

- Given $\beta \in \mathbb{C}$ with $\operatorname{Re} \beta>-1$, if $\hat{\phi} \in \zeta^{\beta} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$ converges for any $\zeta$ on $\mathbb{C}_{\log }$ with $|\zeta|<2 \pi$ and extends analytically along any path of $\mathbb{C} \backslash 2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$ issuing from 1 , then $\hat{\phi}$ and $\tilde{\phi}=\mathscr{B}^{-1} \hat{\phi}$ are said to be $2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent.
- Given $\omega \in 2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$ and a path $\Gamma$ in $\mathbb{C} \backslash 2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$ going from 1 to $\omega+1$, if $\hat{\phi}$ is $2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent and if its analytic continuation along $\Gamma$, which is a holomorphic germ $\operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \hat{\phi}$ at $\omega+1$, takes the form

$$
\begin{equation*}
\operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \hat{\phi}(\omega+\zeta)=\frac{c}{2 \pi \mathrm{i} \zeta}+\hat{\chi}(\zeta) \frac{\log \zeta}{2 \pi \mathrm{i}}+\hat{R}(\zeta) \quad \text { for } \zeta>0 \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $c \in \mathbb{C}$ and $\hat{\chi}, \hat{R} \in \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$, then $\hat{\phi}$ and $\tilde{\phi}=\mathscr{B}^{-1} \hat{\phi}$ are said to be ( $\left.\omega, \Gamma\right)$-simple.

- In the above situation, we set $\dot{\mathscr{A}}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\phi}:=\hat{\chi}$, which is the monodromy of $\zeta \mapsto \operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \hat{\phi}(\omega+\zeta)$ around 0 , and $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\phi}:=c+\mathscr{B}^{-1} \hat{\chi} \in \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$. The operator $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma}$ thus defined on the space of all $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple formal series is called the alien operator associated with $(\omega, \Gamma)$.
(Observe that $\hat{\mathscr{A}}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\phi}$ is itself $2 \pi$ i榌-resurgent because $\operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \hat{\phi}(\omega+\zeta)$ extends analytically along any path of $\mathbb{C} \backslash 2 \pi i \mathbb{Z}$.)
Definition 2. Let $\hat{\phi}$ be $2 \pi i \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent. We say that $\hat{\phi}$ is of finite exponential type in nonvertical directions if, for any path $\gamma$ of $\mathbb{C} \backslash 2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$ going from 1 to $\zeta_{*} \in \mathrm{i} \mathbb{R}$ and any $\delta_{0} \in(0, \pi / 2)$, there exist $C_{0}, R_{0}>0$ such that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\left|\operatorname{cont}_{\gamma} \hat{\phi}\left(\zeta_{*}+t \mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i} \theta}\right)\right| \leq C_{0} \mathrm{e}^{R_{0} t} \quad \text { for all } t \geq 0 \text { and } \theta \in\left[-\delta_{0}, \delta_{0}\right] \cup\left[\pi-\delta_{0}, \pi+\delta_{0}\right] \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

We omit the proof of the following technical statement.
Lemma 1. Let $\tilde{\phi}_{0} \in z^{-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ be $2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent with $\hat{\phi}_{0}:=\mathscr{B} \tilde{\phi}_{0}$ of finite exponential type in non-vertical directions. Let $\tilde{\phi}:=z^{-\alpha} \tilde{\phi}_{0} \in z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$, where $\alpha, \beta \in \mathbb{C}$ and $\operatorname{Re} \beta>-1$. Then $\hat{\phi}:=\mathscr{B} \tilde{\phi} \in \zeta^{\beta} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$. Moreover, for any simple curve $\gamma:(0,+\infty) \rightarrow \mathbb{C} \backslash 2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$ of the form $\gamma(t)=t u_{0}$ for $t<t_{0}$ and $\gamma(t)=c+t u_{1}$ for $t>t_{1}$, with $\left|u_{0}\right|=\left|u_{1}\right|=1, u_{1} \neq \pm \mathrm{i}, c \in \mathbb{C}$ and $0<t_{0}<t_{1}$, and for any lift $\tilde{\gamma}$ of $\gamma$ in $\mathbb{C}_{\log }$, the germ $\hat{\phi}$ admits analytic continuation along $\tilde{\gamma}$ and

$$
\begin{equation*}
\int_{\tilde{\gamma}} \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \hat{\phi}(\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta=z^{-\alpha} \int_{\gamma} e^{-z \zeta} \hat{\phi}_{0}(\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $z \in \mathbb{C}_{\log }$ with $\arg z \in\left(-\theta-\frac{\pi}{2},-\theta+\frac{\pi}{2}\right)$ and $\operatorname{Re}\left(z e^{\mathrm{i} \theta}\right)$ large enough, where $\theta \in \mathbb{R}$ is the argument of $u_{1}$ which determines the asymptotic direction of $\tilde{\gamma}$.

In particular, $\mathcal{L}^{\theta} \hat{\phi}(z):=\int_{0}^{\mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i} \theta} \infty} \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \hat{\phi}(\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta$ is well defined and coincides with $z^{-\alpha} \mathcal{L}^{\theta} \hat{\phi}_{0}(z)$ for $z \in \mathbb{C}_{\log }$ as above.
Lemma 2. Let $\theta \in\left(-\frac{\pi}{2}, \frac{\pi}{2}\right) \cup\left(\frac{\pi}{2}, \frac{3 \pi}{2}\right)$ and denote by $\mathcal{H}_{\theta}$ a $\theta$-rotated Hankel contour, i.e. $a$ contour in $\mathbb{C}_{l o g}$ which goes along a ray from $\mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i}(\theta-2 \pi)} \infty$ to $\mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i}(\theta-2 \pi)} \varepsilon$ (with $0<\varepsilon<\pi$ ), circles counterclockwise 0 and then follows the ray from $\mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i} \theta} \varepsilon$ to $\mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i} \theta} \infty$. Suppose that $\hat{\phi}$ is $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple and $\zeta \mapsto \operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \hat{\phi}(\omega+\zeta)$ has at most exponential growth along $\mathcal{H}_{\theta}$, then

$$
\int_{\mathcal{H}_{\theta}} \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \hat{\phi}(\omega+\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta=c+\mathcal{L}^{\theta} \hat{\chi}(z)
$$

where $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \mathscr{B}^{-1} \hat{\phi}=c+\mathscr{B}^{-1} \hat{\chi}, \arg z \in\left(-\theta-\frac{\pi}{2},-\theta+\frac{\pi}{2}\right)$ and $\operatorname{Re}\left(z e^{\mathrm{i} \theta}\right) \gg 0$.
Proof. The term $\frac{c}{2 \pi \mathrm{i} \zeta}$ contributes $c$, the remainder contributes $\int_{\mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i} \theta} \varepsilon}^{\mathrm{e} \theta} \infty \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \hat{\chi}(\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta+O(\varepsilon|\ln \varepsilon|)$.
Lemma 3. If $b_{0} \in \mathbb{C}\left\{z^{-1}\right\}$ and $\tilde{\phi}$ is $2 \pi i \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent, then the formal series $b_{0} \tilde{\phi}$ and $C_{\mathrm{id}+b_{0}} \tilde{\phi}:=$ $\tilde{\phi} \circ\left(\mathrm{id}+b_{0}\right)$ are $2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent. If moreover $\tilde{\phi}$ is $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple, then they are also $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple, with

$$
\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma}\left(b_{0} \tilde{\phi}\right)=b_{0} \mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\phi}, \quad \mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} C_{\mathrm{id}+b_{0}} \tilde{\phi}=\mathrm{e}^{-\omega b_{0}} C_{\mathrm{id}+b_{0}} \mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\phi} .
$$

Idea of the proof. Start with $b_{0} \in z^{-1} \mathbb{C}\left\{z^{-1}\right\}$, hence $\hat{b}_{0}(\zeta)$ is entire; $\tilde{\psi}_{1}:=b_{0} \tilde{\phi}$ and $\tilde{\psi}_{2}:=$ $C_{\mathrm{id}+b_{0}} \tilde{\phi}-\tilde{\phi}$ have Borel images

$$
\begin{equation*}
\hat{\psi}_{j}(\zeta)=\int_{0}^{\zeta} K_{j}(\xi, \zeta) \hat{\phi}(\xi) \mathrm{d} \xi \quad \text { for } \zeta \in \mathbb{C}_{\log } \text { with }|\zeta|<2 \pi, \quad j=1,2 \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $K_{1}(\xi, \zeta)=\hat{b}_{0}(\zeta-\xi)$ and $K_{2}(\xi, \zeta)=\sum_{k \geq 1} \frac{(-\xi)^{k}}{k!} \hat{b}_{0}^{* k}(\zeta-\xi)$ are holomorphic in $\mathbb{C} \times \mathbb{C}$ (cf. the proof of Lemma 2 in [DS13]). The analytic continuation of $\hat{\psi}_{1}$ or $\hat{\psi}_{2}$ along a path $\gamma:[0,1] \rightarrow \mathbb{C} \backslash 2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$ is thus given by the same integral as (4), but integrating on the concatenation $[0, \gamma(0)]+\gamma+[\gamma(1), \zeta]$. It is then possible to analyze the singularities of $\hat{\psi}_{1}$ and $\hat{\psi}_{2}$ at $\omega$. We omit the details.

The above is inspired by Écalle's resurgence theory. In fact, $2 \pi$ i $\mathbb{Z}$-resurgent series are stable under multiplication, and so are the $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple ones, but we shall not require these facts in this article, nor the far-reaching extension of the framework which allows to define alien operators or alien derivations in much more general situations.

## 2 The singular structure of the formal Borel transform of the formal Fatou coordinate

We keep the same notations as in [DS13]: $f=(\mathrm{id}+b) \circ(\mathrm{id}+1)=z+1-\rho z^{-1}+O\left(z^{-2}\right)$ is a simple parabolic germ at $\infty$ and the equation

$$
\begin{equation*}
C_{\mathrm{id}-1} \tilde{\varphi}=C_{\mathrm{id}+b} \tilde{\varphi}+b_{*}, \quad b_{*}(z):=b(z)+\rho \log \frac{1+z^{-1} b(z)}{1-z^{-1}} \in z^{-2} \mathbb{C}\left\{z^{-1}\right\} \tag{5}
\end{equation*}
$$

has a unique solution $\tilde{\varphi} \in z^{-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$, which was shown to be $2 \pi$ i仁-resurgent and Borel summable, giving rise to two normalized Fatou coordinates $v_{*}^{ \pm}=\mathrm{id}+\rho \log ^{ \pm}+\mathcal{L}^{ \pm} \hat{\varphi}$, where $\hat{\varphi}:=\mathscr{B} \tilde{\varphi}$, and a pair of normalized lifted horn maps

$$
h_{*}^{\mathrm{up}}(Z)=Z+\sum_{m \geq 1} A_{m} \mathrm{e}^{2 \pi \mathrm{i} m Z}, \quad h_{*}^{\mathrm{low}}(Z)=Z-2 \pi \mathrm{i} \rho+\sum_{m \geq 1} A_{-m} \mathrm{e}^{-2 \pi \mathrm{i} m Z}
$$

(see $[\mathrm{DS} 13])$. We are interested in the Écalle-Voronin invariants $A_{m}, m \in \mathbb{Z}^{*}$.
Let $\omega \in 2 \pi i \mathbb{Z}$ and $\Gamma$ be as above. In general $\tilde{\varphi}$ is not $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple, but we shall directly prove that, up to a linear combination of monomials, $z^{\rho \omega} \tilde{\varphi}$ is $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple. More precisely, we shall prove the $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simplicity of $\tilde{\Phi}:=z^{\rho \omega}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}$, with the notation

$$
\tilde{\varphi}=[\tilde{\varphi}]_{N}+\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}, \quad[\tilde{\varphi}]_{N} \in \operatorname{Span}\left(z^{-1}, z^{-2}, \ldots, z^{-N}\right), \quad\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N} \in z^{-N-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]
$$

where $N \geq \max \{0,-2 \operatorname{Re} \alpha\}$ is integer and $\alpha:=-\rho \omega$. Observe that $\tilde{\Phi} \in z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ with $\beta:=\alpha+\bar{N}$ and $\operatorname{Re} \beta \geq 0$. We shall also compute $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\Phi}$ and relate it to the lifted horn maps of $f$.

We first introduce an auxiliary sequence of formal series, using the same operator $E$ as in [DS13], but replacing $B$ with $B^{\omega}: \tilde{\psi} \mapsto \mathrm{e}^{-\omega b_{*}} C_{\mathrm{id}+b} \tilde{\psi}-\tilde{\psi}=\mathrm{e}^{-\omega b_{*}} B \tilde{\psi}+\left(\mathrm{e}^{-\omega b_{*}}-1\right) \tilde{\psi}$.

Proposition. The formal series $\tilde{\Psi}_{k}=\left(E B^{\omega}\right)^{k} 1 \in z^{-k} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ yield a formally convergent series $\sum_{k \geq 0} \tilde{\Psi}_{k}=\mathrm{e}^{-\omega \tilde{\varphi}}$. For each $k \geq 1, \tilde{\Psi}_{k}$ is $2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent and, for any $\varepsilon, L>0$, there exist $C_{0}, M>0$ such that

$$
\left|\operatorname{cont}_{\gamma} \mathscr{B} \tilde{\Psi}_{k}\right| \leq C_{0} \frac{M^{k}}{k!}, \quad \text { for all } k \geq 1 \text { and } \gamma \in \mathscr{R}_{\varepsilon, L}
$$

where $\mathscr{R}_{\varepsilon, L}$ is the set of all paths of length $<L$ issuing from 1 and staying at distance $>\varepsilon$ from $2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$.

Proof. Let $c^{\omega}:=\mathrm{e}^{-\omega b_{*}}-1$. The estimates are obtained by adapting the proof of Lemma 2 of [DS13], with a new kernel function $K^{\omega}(\xi, \zeta)=\hat{c}^{\omega}(\zeta-\xi)+\sum_{k \geq 1} \frac{(-\xi)^{k}}{k!} \hat{b}^{* k}(\zeta-\xi)+\sum_{k \geq 1} \frac{(-\xi)^{k}}{k!}\left(\hat{c}^{\omega} *\right.$ $\left.\hat{b}^{* k}\right)(\zeta-\xi)$. The formal series $\tilde{\Psi}:=\sum_{k \geq 0} \tilde{\Psi}_{k}$ is the unique solution with constant term 1 of $C_{\mathrm{id}-1} \tilde{\Psi}=\mathrm{e}^{-\omega b_{*}} C_{\mathrm{id}+b} \tilde{\Psi}$-so is $\mathrm{e}^{-\omega \tilde{\varphi}}$, as can be seen by exponentiating (5).

Since $\operatorname{Re} \beta \geq 0$, the operator $C_{\mathrm{id}-1}-\mathrm{Id}$ maps $z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ to $z^{-\beta-2} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ bijectively; we denote by $E_{\beta}$ the inverse, whose Borel counterpart is the multiplication operator $\hat{E}_{\beta}: \hat{\phi}(\zeta) \in$ $\zeta^{\beta+1} \mathbb{C}[[\zeta]] \mapsto \frac{1}{e^{\varsigma}-1} \hat{\phi}(\zeta) \in \zeta^{\beta} \mathbb{C}[[\zeta]]$. We introduce an operator

$$
B_{\alpha}: \tilde{\phi} \in z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right] \mapsto c_{\alpha} C_{\mathrm{id}+b} \tilde{\phi}-\tilde{\phi} \in z^{-\beta-2} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right],
$$

with $c_{\alpha}:=\left(\frac{1+z^{-1} b}{1-z^{-1}}\right)^{\alpha} \in 1+z^{-1} \mathbb{C}\left\{z^{-1}\right\}$.
Theorem 1. Let $b_{\alpha}:=z^{-\alpha}\left(1-z^{-1}\right)^{-\alpha} b_{N}$, with $b_{N}:=b_{*}-C_{\mathrm{id}-1}[\tilde{\varphi}]_{N}+C_{\mathrm{id}+b}[\tilde{\varphi}]_{N}$.

- The formal series $\tilde{\Phi}_{k}(z):=\left(E_{\beta} B_{\alpha}\right)^{k} E_{\beta} b_{\alpha} \in z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right], k \geq 0$, are $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple, and so is $z^{-\alpha}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}$.
- For any $\varepsilon, L>0$, there exist $C_{0}, \Lambda>0$ with $\Lambda<1$ such that, for each $\gamma \in \mathscr{R}_{\varepsilon, L}$, $\mid$ cont $\mathscr{F}^{\mathscr{B}} \tilde{\Phi}_{k} \mid \leq C_{0} \Lambda^{k}$. Moreover $\hat{\Phi}:=\sum_{k \geq 0} \mathscr{B} \tilde{\Phi}_{k}$ coincides with the formal Borel transform of $z^{-\alpha}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}$.
- There exist complex numbers $S_{\omega, k}^{\Gamma}, k \geq 0$, which are $O\left(\Lambda^{k}\right)$ for some $\Lambda<1$ and satisfy

$$
\begin{array}{r}
\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\Phi}_{k}=\sum_{k_{1}+k_{2}=k} S_{\omega, k_{1}}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\Psi}_{k_{2}} \quad \text { for each } k \geq 0, \\
\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma}\left(z^{-\alpha}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}\right)=S_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \mathrm{e}^{-\omega \tilde{\varphi}} \quad \text { where } S_{\omega}^{\Gamma}=\sum_{k \geq 0} S_{\omega, k}^{\Gamma} . \tag{7}
\end{array}
$$

Theorem 2. For $m \in \mathbb{Z}^{*}$, let $\Gamma_{m}$ denote the line segment going from 1 to $2 \pi \mathrm{i} m+1$. Then the Écalle-Voronin invariants of $f$ are given by

$$
A_{-m}=S_{2 \pi \mathrm{i} m}^{\Gamma_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{-4 \pi^{2} m \rho} \text { if } m>0, \quad A_{-m}=-S_{2 \pi \mathrm{i} m}^{\Gamma_{m}} \text { if } m<0 .
$$

Remark 1. When $\alpha \neq 0$, the series of formal series $\sum \tilde{\Phi}_{k}$ is not convergent for the topology of the formal convergence (but it converges for the product topology $z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right] \simeq \mathbb{C}^{\mathbb{N}}$ ) and, unless $-\alpha \in \mathbb{N}$ or $S_{\omega}^{\Gamma}=0$, the singularity at $\omega$ of $\operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \mathscr{B} \tilde{\varphi}$ is not "simple": it is rather of the form $\operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \mathscr{B} \tilde{\varphi}(\omega+\zeta)=\frac{1}{\Gamma(-\alpha)} S_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \zeta^{-\alpha-1}(1+O(|\zeta|))+O(1)$ if $\alpha \notin \mathbb{Z}$ or $\frac{(-1)^{\alpha} \alpha!}{2 \pi \mathrm{i}} S_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \zeta^{-\alpha-1}(1+O(|\zeta|))$ if $\alpha \in \mathbb{N}$.

Remark 2. Theorem 2 can be extracted from [Eca81], which gives detailed proofs only for the case $\rho=0$, and also the case $\Gamma=\Gamma_{m}$ of (7) with the equivalent formulation $\Delta_{\omega_{m}}^{+} \tilde{\varphi}=$ $A_{m} z^{-\rho \omega_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{-\omega_{m} \tilde{\varphi}}$ ("Bridge equation"), where $\omega_{m}=2 \pi \mathrm{i} m$. The name "resurgence" evokes the fact that the singular behaviour near $\omega_{m}$ of the analytic continuation of a germ at 0 like $\hat{\Phi}$ can be explicitly expressed in terms of $\hat{\Phi}$ itself.
Remark 3. The representation of $\hat{\Phi}=\mathscr{B}\left(z^{-\alpha}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}\right)$ as the explicit convergent series $\sum \hat{\Phi}_{k}=$ $\sum \mathscr{B}\left(\left(E_{\beta} B_{\alpha}\right)^{k} E_{\beta} b_{\alpha}\right)$ and the computation of the action of the alien operator $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma}$ in (6)-(7) are new. The point is that $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\Phi}_{k}=S_{\omega, k}^{\Gamma}+O\left(z^{-1}\right)$, so Equation (6) says that $\operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \hat{\Phi}_{k}(\omega+\zeta)=\frac{S_{\omega, k}^{\Gamma}}{2 \pi \mathrm{i} \zeta}+\hat{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\Phi}_{k}(\zeta) \frac{\log \zeta}{2 \pi \mathrm{i}}+$ regular germ, $\quad \hat{\mathscr{A}}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\Phi}_{k}=\sum_{k_{1}+k_{2}=k, k_{2} \geq 1} S_{\omega, k_{1}}^{\Gamma} \hat{\Psi}_{k_{2}}$,
and according to (7), each coefficient $S_{\omega}^{\Gamma}$, and in particular each Écalle-Voronin invariant, can be obtained as the convergent series of the "residua" $S_{\omega, k}^{\Gamma}$.


Figure 1: Deformation of the contour.

Theorem 1 implies Theorem 2. For all $m \geq 1$ we set $\omega_{m}:=2 \pi \mathrm{i} m$ and $\tilde{\Phi}^{(m)}:=z^{-\alpha_{m}}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N_{m}}$ with $\alpha_{m}:=-\rho \omega_{m}$ and $N_{m}:=\max \left\{0,-2 \operatorname{Re} \alpha_{m}\right\}$. By [DS13] we know that $\hat{\varphi}$ is of finite exponential type in non-vertical directions; we fix $\theta^{+} \in\left(0, \frac{\pi}{2}\right), \theta^{-} \in\left(\frac{\pi}{2}, \pi\right)$ and $Q_{R}^{\text {low }}:=\left\{z \in \mathbb{C}_{\log } \mid \arg z \in\right.$ $\left.\left(-\theta^{+}-\frac{\pi}{2},-\theta^{-}+\frac{\pi}{2}\right), \operatorname{Re}\left(z \mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i} \theta^{+}}\right)>R, \operatorname{Re}\left(z \mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i} \theta^{-}}\right)>R\right\}$, with $R$ large enough. Identifying $z \in Q_{R}^{\text {low }}$ with its projection in $\mathbb{C}$, we have $\operatorname{Im} z<0$ and $\log ^{+} z=\log z=\log ^{-} z-2 \pi \mathrm{i}$; for $m_{0} \geq 1$, deforming the contour of integration (see Figure 1), we get

$$
\begin{aligned}
v_{*}^{+}(z)- & v_{*}^{-}(z)=-2 \pi \mathrm{i} \rho+\left(\mathcal{L}^{+}-\mathcal{L}^{-}\right) \hat{\varphi}(z) \\
& =-2 \pi \mathrm{i} \rho+\left(\sum_{m=1}^{m_{0}} \int_{\gamma_{m}}+\int_{\tilde{\gamma}_{m_{0}}}\right) \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \hat{\varphi}(\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta=-2 \pi \mathrm{i} \rho+\sum_{m=1}^{m_{0}} I_{m}+O\left(\mathrm{e}^{\left(2 \pi m_{0}+\pi\right) \operatorname{Im} z}\right),
\end{aligned}
$$

with $I_{m}=\int_{\gamma_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma_{m}} \hat{\varphi}(\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta=\int_{\gamma_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma_{m}}\{\hat{\varphi}(\zeta)\}_{N_{m}} \mathrm{~d} \zeta$. Since each $\gamma_{m}$ can be expressed as the difference of two paths to which Lemma 1 applies, we have

$$
I_{m}=z^{\alpha_{m}} \int_{\gamma_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma_{m}} \hat{\Phi}^{(m)}(\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta
$$

Denoting by $\mathcal{H}^{-}$a $\theta^{-}$-rotated Hankel contour, we get $I_{m}=z^{\alpha_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{-\omega_{m} z} \int_{\mathcal{H}^{-}} \mathrm{e}^{-z \zeta} \operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma_{m}} \hat{\Phi}^{(m)}\left(\omega_{m}+\right.$ $\zeta) \mathrm{d} \zeta=S_{\omega_{m}}^{\Gamma_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{\alpha_{m} \log z-\omega_{m} z-\omega_{m} \mathcal{L}^{-} \hat{\varphi}}$ by Lemma 2 and (7) (Borel-Laplace summation commutes with exponentiation). Thus

$$
\left(h_{*}^{\text {low }}-\mathrm{id}\right) \circ v_{*}^{-}=v_{*}^{+}-v_{*}^{-}=-2 \pi \mathrm{i} \rho+\sum_{m=1}^{m_{0}} S_{\omega_{m}}^{\Gamma_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{-\omega_{m}\left(-2 \pi \mathrm{i} \rho+v_{*}^{-}\right)}+O\left(\mathrm{e}^{\left(2 \pi m_{0}+\pi\right) \operatorname{Im} z}\right) \quad \text { on } Q_{R}^{\text {low }},
$$

whence $A_{-m}=S_{\omega_{m}}^{\Gamma_{m}} \mathrm{e}^{2 \pi \mathrm{i} \rho \omega_{m}}$ for $m>0$. The case $m<0$ is similar, but $\log ^{+}=\log ^{-}=\log$ on the domain $Q_{R}^{\text {up }}$ defined analogously with $-\pi<\theta^{-}<-\frac{\pi}{2}<\theta^{+}<0$ and the orientation of the paths differs.

Proof of Theorem 1. First observe that $b_{\alpha} \in z^{-\beta-2} \mathbb{C}\left\{z^{-1}\right\}$ because

$$
b_{N}=C_{\mathrm{id}-1}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}-C_{\mathrm{id}+b}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}=b_{*}-C_{\mathrm{id}-1}[\tilde{\varphi}]_{N}+C_{\mathrm{id}+b}[\tilde{\varphi}]_{N} \in z^{-N-2} \mathbb{C}\left\{z^{-1}\right\} .
$$

Thus the formal series $\tilde{\Phi}_{k}$ are well defined in $z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$, and they are $2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}$-resurgent because this property is preserved by $E_{\beta}$ and $B_{\alpha}$ (Lemma 3) and we start with $\mathscr{B} \tilde{\Phi}_{0}=\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{b}_{\alpha}=\frac{\hat{b}_{\alpha}(\zeta)}{e^{\zeta}-1}$
meromorphic on $\mathbb{C}_{\text {log }}$. Their $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simplicity and the existence of contants $S_{\omega, k}^{\Gamma}$ such that (6) holds result by induction on $k$ (using the fact that $B^{\omega} \tilde{\Psi}_{k} \in z^{-2} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ for all $k$ ) from
Lemma 4. If $\tilde{\phi}$ is $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple, then so is $B_{\alpha} \tilde{\phi}$, with $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} B_{\alpha} \tilde{\phi}=B^{\omega} \mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\phi}$. If moreover $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\phi} \in$ $z^{-2} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ (i.e. $c=\hat{\chi}(0)=0$ in (1)), then also $E_{\beta} \tilde{\phi}$ is $(\omega, \Gamma)$-simple and $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} E_{\beta} \tilde{\phi}-E \mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\phi}$ is a constant.

Proof of Lemma 4. The first identity results from Lemma 3 and $\mathrm{e}^{-\omega b} c_{\alpha}=\mathrm{e}^{-\omega b_{*}}$. For the second one, in view of (1), the analytic continuation of $\mathscr{B} E_{\beta} \tilde{\phi}$ is $\operatorname{cont}_{\Gamma} \hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{\phi}(\omega+\zeta)=\frac{\hat{\chi}(\zeta)}{\mathrm{e}^{\zeta}-1} \frac{\log \zeta}{2 \pi \mathrm{i}}+\frac{\hat{R}(\zeta)}{\mathrm{e}^{\zeta}-1}$, hence $\mathscr{A}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} E_{\beta} \tilde{\phi}=E \mathscr{B}^{-1} \hat{\chi}+2 \pi \mathrm{i} \hat{R}(0)$.

We finish the proof of Theorem 1 by estimating $\hat{\Phi}_{k}:=\mathscr{B} \tilde{\Phi}_{k}$ by means of the recursive formula $\hat{\Phi}_{k}=\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\Phi}_{k-1}$, where $\hat{B}_{\alpha}$ is the Borel counterpart of $B_{\alpha}$.

Lemma 5. For $0<\varepsilon<1, L>1$, let $\tilde{\mathscr{R}}_{\varepsilon, L}$ denote the set of all naturally parametrised paths $\gamma:(0, \ell(\gamma)] \rightarrow \mathbb{C}_{\log }$, where $\ell(\gamma)<L$ is the length of $\gamma$, for which there exists $\theta \in[-\pi, 3 \pi]$ such that $\gamma(s)=s \mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{i} \theta}$ for $s \leq \varepsilon$ and dist $(\gamma(s), 2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z})>\varepsilon$ for $s \geq \varepsilon$. For any integer $\ell \geq 0$, let $V_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell}$ denote the space of all $\hat{\phi} \in \zeta^{\beta+\ell} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$ admitting analytic continuation along the paths of $\tilde{\mathscr{R}}_{\varepsilon, L}$, with the norm $\|\hat{\phi}\|_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell}:=\sup \left\{s^{-\operatorname{Re} \beta-\ell}\left|\operatorname{cont}_{\gamma} \hat{\phi}(\gamma(s))\right|\right.$, for $\gamma \in \tilde{\mathscr{R}}_{\varepsilon, L}$ and $\left.s \in(0, \ell(\gamma)]\right\}$. Then the operator $\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha}$ leaves invariant the spaces $V_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell}$ and, for each $\varepsilon$ and $L$, there exists $M(\varepsilon, L)>$ 0 such that

$$
\left\|\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\phi}\right\|_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell} \leq \frac{M(\varepsilon, L)}{\operatorname{Re} \beta+\ell+1}\|\hat{\phi}\|_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell}, \quad \text { for all } \hat{\phi} \in V_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell} \text { and } \ell \geq 0
$$

Proof of Lemma 5. One can find $\kappa=\kappa(\varepsilon, L), C=C(\varepsilon, L)>0$ such that, for each $\gamma \in \tilde{\mathscr{R}}_{\varepsilon, L}$,

$$
|\gamma(s)| \geq \kappa s, \quad\left|\gamma(s)^{\beta}\right| \leq C|\gamma(s)|^{\operatorname{Re} \beta}, \quad\left|\gamma(s)^{-\beta}\right| \leq C|\gamma(s)|^{-\operatorname{Re} \beta} \quad \text { for all } s \in[0, \ell(\gamma)]
$$

(because $\arg \gamma(s)$ is uniformly bounded). Let

$$
M_{0}=M_{0}(\varepsilon, L):=\sup \left\{\left|\frac{\zeta}{\mathrm{e}^{\zeta}-1}\right|, \text { for }|\zeta|<L, \operatorname{dist}\left(\zeta, 2 \pi \mathrm{i} \mathbb{Z}^{*}\right)>\varepsilon\right\}
$$

The formal Borel transform $\hat{c}_{*}:=\mathscr{B}\left(c_{\alpha}-1\right)$ extends to an entire function and $\hat{B}_{\alpha}$ is the integral transform with kernel function

$$
K_{\alpha}(\xi, \zeta)=\hat{c}_{*}(\zeta-\xi)+\sum_{k \geq 1} \frac{(-\xi)^{k}}{k!} \hat{b}^{* k}(\zeta-\xi)+\sum_{k \geq 1} \frac{(-\xi)^{k}}{k!}\left(\hat{c}_{*} * \hat{b}^{* k}\right)(\zeta-\xi)
$$

holomorphic in $\mathbb{C} \times \mathbb{C}$, therefore

$$
\operatorname{cont}_{\gamma} \hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\phi}(\gamma(s))=\int_{0}^{s} K_{\alpha}(\gamma(\sigma), \gamma(s)) \operatorname{cont}_{\gamma} \hat{\phi}(\gamma(\sigma)) \gamma^{\prime}(\sigma) \mathrm{d} \sigma
$$

whence $\left\|\hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\phi}\right\|_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell+1} \leq \frac{N_{L}}{\operatorname{Re} \beta+\ell+1}\|\hat{\phi}\|_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell}$ with $N_{L}:=\sup _{|\xi|,|\zeta|<L}\{|K(\xi, \zeta)|\}$, and $\left\|\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\phi}\right\|_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell} \leq$ $\frac{N_{L} M_{0}}{\kappa(\operatorname{Re} \beta+\ell+1)}\|\hat{\phi}\|_{\varepsilon, L ; \ell}$.

We have $\left|\frac{\alpha}{\alpha+N+1}\right|<1$ because $\operatorname{Re} \alpha>-\frac{N+1}{2}$. Let us choose an integer $d \geq 0$ so that $\frac{M(\varepsilon, L)}{\operatorname{Re} \beta+d+1} \leq \Lambda:=\max \left\{\left|\frac{\alpha}{\alpha+N+1}\right|, \frac{1}{2}\right\}$. For any $\hat{\phi} \in \zeta^{\beta} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$, we use the notation

$$
\hat{\phi}=[\hat{\phi}]_{d}+\{\hat{\phi}\}_{d}, \quad[\hat{\phi}]_{d} \in \mathscr{E}_{d}:=\operatorname{Span}\left(\zeta^{\beta}, \zeta^{\beta+1}, \ldots, \zeta^{\beta+d-1}\right), \quad\{\hat{\phi}\}_{d} \in \zeta^{\beta+d} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}
$$

Now $\hat{\phi} \in \zeta^{\beta+d} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\} \Rightarrow \hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\phi}=\alpha 1 * \hat{\phi}+O\left(\zeta^{\beta+d+2}\right) \Rightarrow \hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\phi}=\frac{\alpha}{\zeta} 1 * \hat{\phi}+O\left(\zeta^{\beta+d+1}\right) \in \zeta^{\beta+d} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$, thus

$$
\left[\hat{\Phi}_{k}\right]_{d}=A\left[\hat{\Phi}_{k-1}\right]_{d}, \quad\left\{\hat{\Phi}_{k}\right\}_{d}=\left\{\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha}\left[\hat{\Phi}_{k-1}\right]_{d}\right\}_{d}+\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha}\left\{\hat{\Phi}_{k-1}\right\}_{d}
$$

where $A \in$ End $\mathscr{E}_{d}$ is defined by $A \hat{\phi}:=\left[\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\phi}\right]_{d}$ and has a triangular matrix in the basis $\left(\zeta^{\beta}, \zeta^{\beta+1}, \ldots, \zeta^{\beta+d-1}\right)$, with $A \zeta^{\beta+\ell}=\lambda \zeta^{\beta+\ell}(1+O(\zeta)), \lambda_{\ell}:=\frac{\alpha}{\beta+\ell+1}, \ell=0, \ldots, d-1$. By the choice of $\beta$, the eigenvalues have modulus $\left|\lambda_{\ell}\right| \leq \Lambda$, hence $\left\|\left[\hat{\Phi}_{k}\right]_{d}\right\|=O\left(\Lambda^{k}\right)$ for any norm on $\mathscr{E}_{d}$. Since $\hat{\phi} \in \mathscr{E}_{d} \mapsto\left\{\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha} \hat{\phi}\right\}_{d} \in V_{\varepsilon, L ; d}$ is linear, we can find $C_{0}^{\prime}$ such that $\left\|\left\{\hat{E}_{\beta} \hat{B}_{\alpha}\left[\hat{\Phi}_{k-1}\right]_{d}\right\}_{d}\right\|_{\varepsilon, L ; d} \leq$ $C_{0}^{\prime} \Lambda^{k}$ for all $k \geq 1$, hence $\left\|\left\{\hat{\Phi}_{k}\right\}_{d}\right\|_{\varepsilon, L ; d} \leq C_{0}^{\prime} \Lambda^{k}+\Lambda\left\|\left\{\hat{\Phi}_{k-1}\right\}_{d}\right\|_{\varepsilon, L ; d}$. We thus get $\left\|\left\{\hat{\Phi}_{k}\right\}_{d}\right\|_{\varepsilon, L ; d} \leq$ $\left(\left\|\left\{\hat{\Phi}_{0}\right\}_{d}\right\|_{\varepsilon, L ; d}+C_{0}^{\prime} k\right) \Lambda^{k}$ for all $k \geq 0$ and, increasing slightly $\Lambda$, the desired bounds for $\left|\operatorname{cont}_{\gamma} \hat{\Phi}_{k}\right|$.

By uniform convergence, we can now define a function $\hat{\Phi}=\sum_{k \geq 0} \hat{\Phi}_{k} \in \zeta^{\beta} \mathbb{C}\{\zeta\}$, whose inverse formal Borel transform $\tilde{\Phi} \in z^{-\beta-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ satisfies $\tilde{\Phi}=E_{\beta} b_{\alpha}+E_{\beta} B_{\alpha} \tilde{\Phi}$, whence

$$
C_{\mathrm{id}-1} \tilde{\Phi}=c_{\alpha} C_{\mathrm{id}+b} \tilde{\Phi}+b_{\alpha}
$$

Multiplying both sides by $z^{\alpha}\left(1-z^{-1}\right)^{\alpha}$, we find that $\tilde{\psi}:=z^{\alpha} \tilde{\Phi} \in z^{-N-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$ satisfies $C_{\tilde{i d}-1} \tilde{\psi}=C_{\mathrm{id}+b} \tilde{\psi}+b_{N}$, an equation of which $\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}$ is the unique solution in $z^{-1} \mathbb{C}\left[\left[z^{-1}\right]\right]$, hence $\tilde{\Phi}=z^{-\alpha}\{\tilde{\varphi}\}_{N}$.

The estimates for the $\hat{\Phi}_{k}$ 's imply similar estimates for the monodromies $\hat{\chi}_{k}:=\hat{\mathscr{A}}_{\omega}^{\Gamma} \tilde{\Phi}_{k}$, and hence for the residues $S_{\omega, k}^{\Gamma}$ of the functions cont $\hat{\Phi}_{k}(\omega+\zeta)-\hat{\chi}(\zeta) \frac{\log \zeta}{2 \pi \mathrm{i}}$. Equation (7) follows by uniform convergence.
