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
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# Abstract


In the bay of Aigues-Mortes, the managers of the coastal cities try to preserve the socioeconomic and patrimonial stakes against the coastal hazards, such as contamination, storm surge and erosion. In this context, a massive beach nourishment of sand (1 million of m3 for 10km of coastline) was made at the beginning of year 2008 to reduce erosion. The REPBAM project (REchargements et Panaches sédimentaires dans la Baie d'Aigues-Mortes) aims to qualify and quantify by in-situ measurements and numerical modelling: 1. the geomorphological evolution of this modified coast and 2. the impact of the sediment's resuspension on the coastal ecosystems, in particular the one of the Posidonia oceanica seagrass. A numerical modelling "wave/current/sediment" is first implemented for December 2008. Nested and curvilinear grids allow a very high resolution for the beach area but also include the inner shelf where the seagrasses are located. Hydrodynamic and topo-bathymetric measurements were acquired from January to May 2012. Model and measurements results show the same trends during storms: strong currents, seaward migration of the inner bar, sediment resuspension and turbid on the inner shelf.




# 2. Numerical simulation

The wave/current/sediment multi-scale numerical modelling (Michaud et al, 2012; Ulses et al, 2008) is based on the coastal circulation model Symphonie (Marsaleix et al, 2008) and the wave model WaveWatch3 v4 (Tolman, 2008; Ardhuin et al, 2010). The Symphonie model validity in the coastal domain (e.g. Leredde et al, 2007) is extended to the surf zone (Michaud et al, 2012) following Ardhuin et al (2008) and Bennis et al (2011) formulations. The Symphonie model is coupled with a sediment transport model through an advection-diffusion equation and a module of bottom boundary layer that calculates the average and maximum bottom stresses over a wave period. The sediment transport model is described in Ulses et al (2008). We focused on the period of late December 2008. During this period, a storm characterized by a southeast long swell of 12s period and with a 3m significant wave height occurred on December 25th.

## Snapshots at the apex of the storm (December 26<sup>th</sup> 2008 at 7pm)






The concern of coastal managers is to maintain all these practices by fighting against the hazards to which they are submitted, including the hazards of contamination, erosion and flooding. To address the problem of erosion, a massive sand nourishment was carried out in early 2008. The injected volume of sand within the sediment cell was more than one million m<sup>3</sup> on a 10km-long coastline.

# 4. Bathymetric data of the Travers beach




wave versus time measured at buoys Datawell Sète (black), Espiguette (blue) and at the ADCP (red) for the period of April 2012.

# **5.** Conclusion

For both periods, simulated for December 2008 or observed at the beginning of 2012, we note the same storm impacts on sediment transport of the nourished beach. This beach, nourished during 2008, has then largely evolved with the successive storms. The sand at the beach top tended to move seaward. Even if the total sediment stock does not seem to decrease, it is now located on sedimentary bars on the shoreface. These bars tend to be reconstructed near the coast during fine weather and to migrate seaward at each storm. Simulated and observed data clearly show this trend. The results are less conclusive for the sediment plumes. It is still difficult to separate the local resuspension in the seagrass zone and the transport from the resuspension zone in the wave breaking zone. The 2008 and 2012 storms were dry, which means without river plumes. In case of flood, these plumes can bring much more turbidity than the one from the resuspended sediment, leading to a more complex situation, with several sources of turbidity. Whatever the source is, the Posidonia seagrasses are however affected by these sedimentary plumes, which diminish the light intensity.

# **6.** Perspectives

In the REPBAM project, biological measurements on the Posidonia seagrasses concerning their health and photosynthetic activity allowed to evaluate the adaptation of these organisms to these stresses. This subject will be developed in a future communication. Quadrat The next work is to implement a numerical modelling for January to May 2012, using the same method than the one developed here: nested grids with a high resolution

at beach scale, forcings by atmospheric fluxes, waves, general circulation, sedimentary transport model, including size classes, etc. The model results will be quantitatively validated and will in turn allow to better understand the observed data.

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
