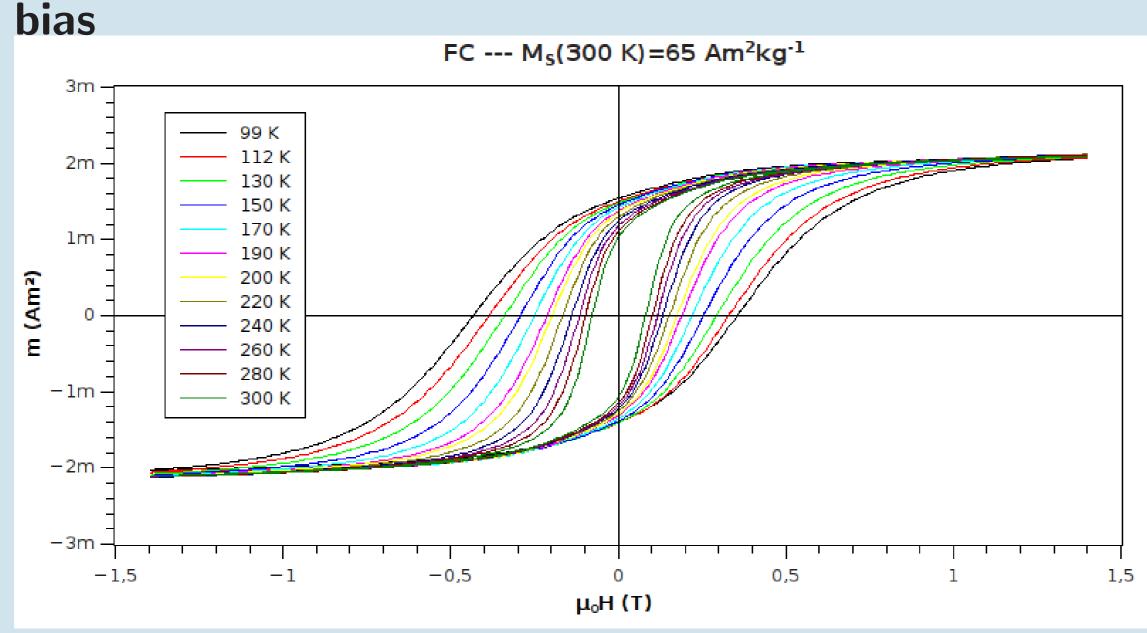

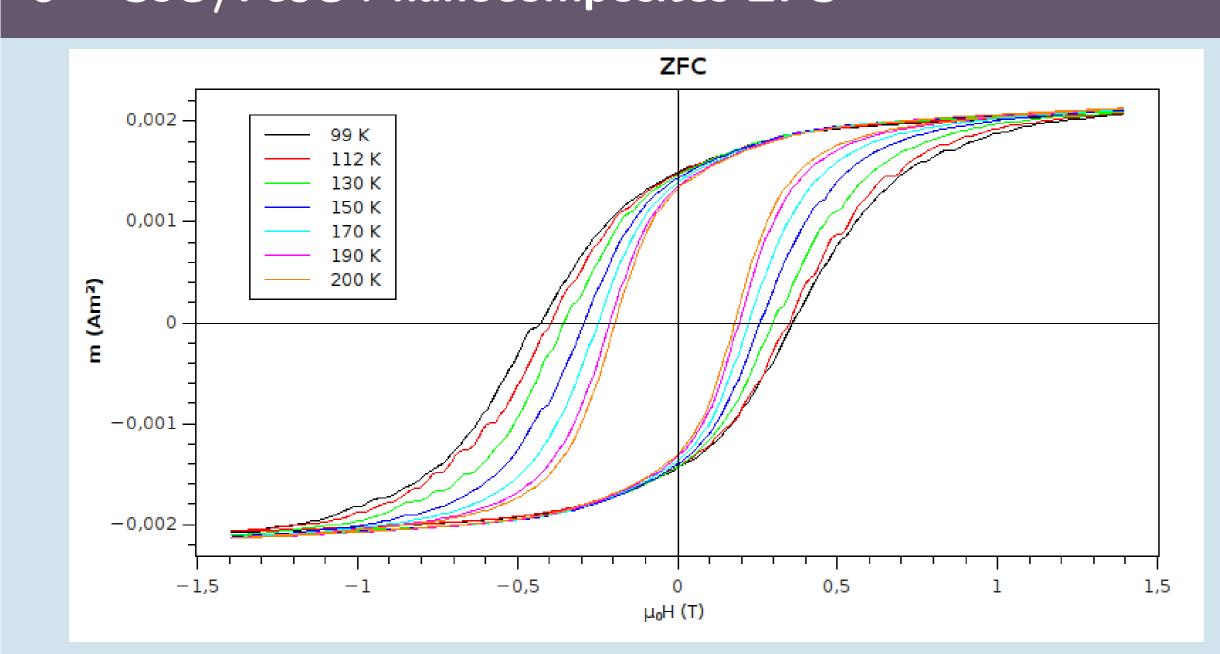
3 -CoO/Fe3O4 nanocomposites FC

Evidence of Antiferromagnetic/ferrimagnetic exchange



- ► The hysteresis loops are shifted
- ► The nanocomposite is much harder than magnetite

CONCLUSION

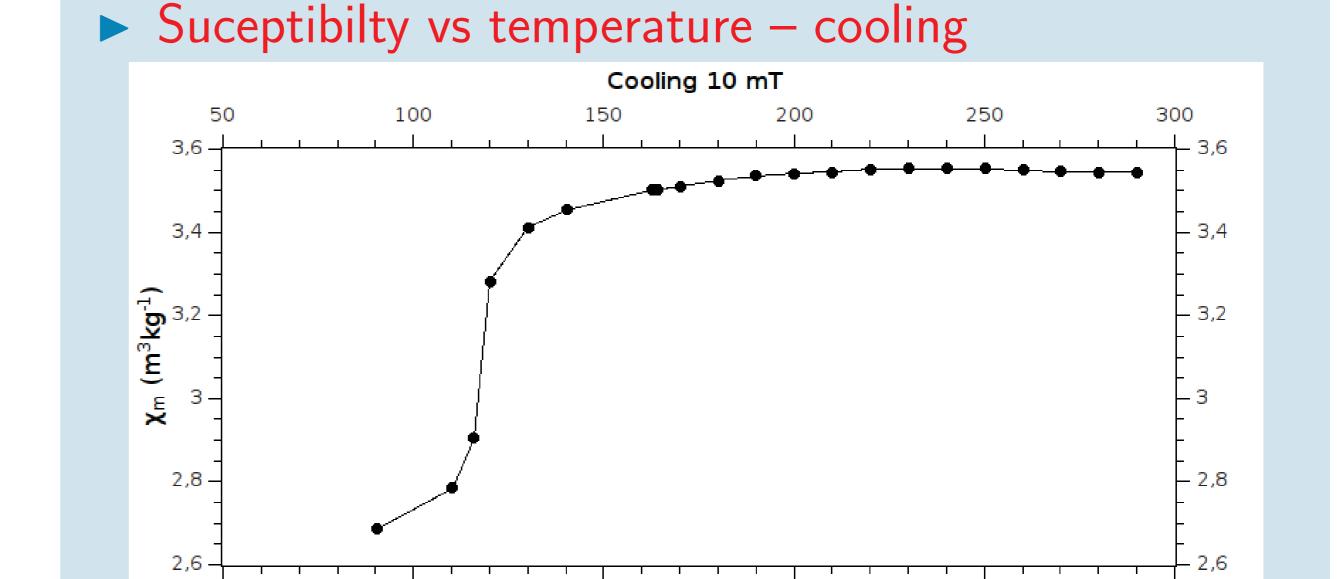
AFM/FiM exchange in CoO/Fe₃O₄ produces:

- 1. a drastic hardening compable to Ba-hexaferrite
- 2. hardening remain above T_N
- 3. shifted loops when field-cooled
- 4. giant Barkhausen jumps when zero-field-cooled
- 5. jumps do not appear if the field is switch of below 260 K when cooling

On the origin of anomalous magnetization jumps

- jumps appear mainly close to Verwey temperature
- magnetization can be blocked over 80 mT wide steps
- is the phenomenon field-rate dependent?
- are the jumps random?

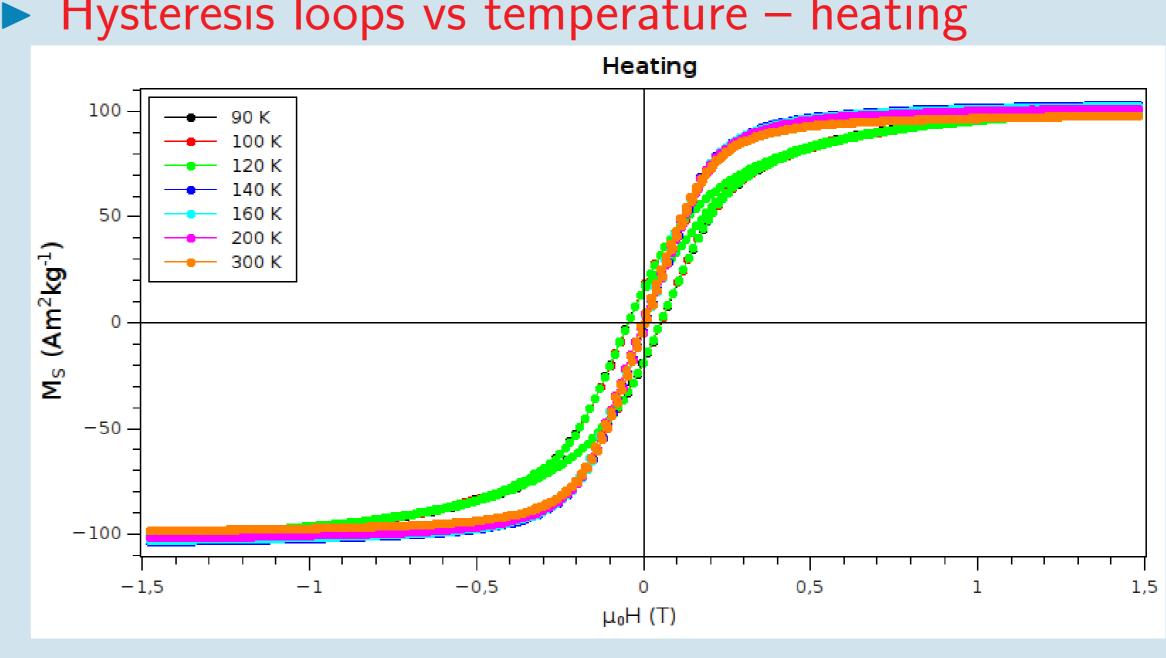
2-Spark plasma sintered magnetite

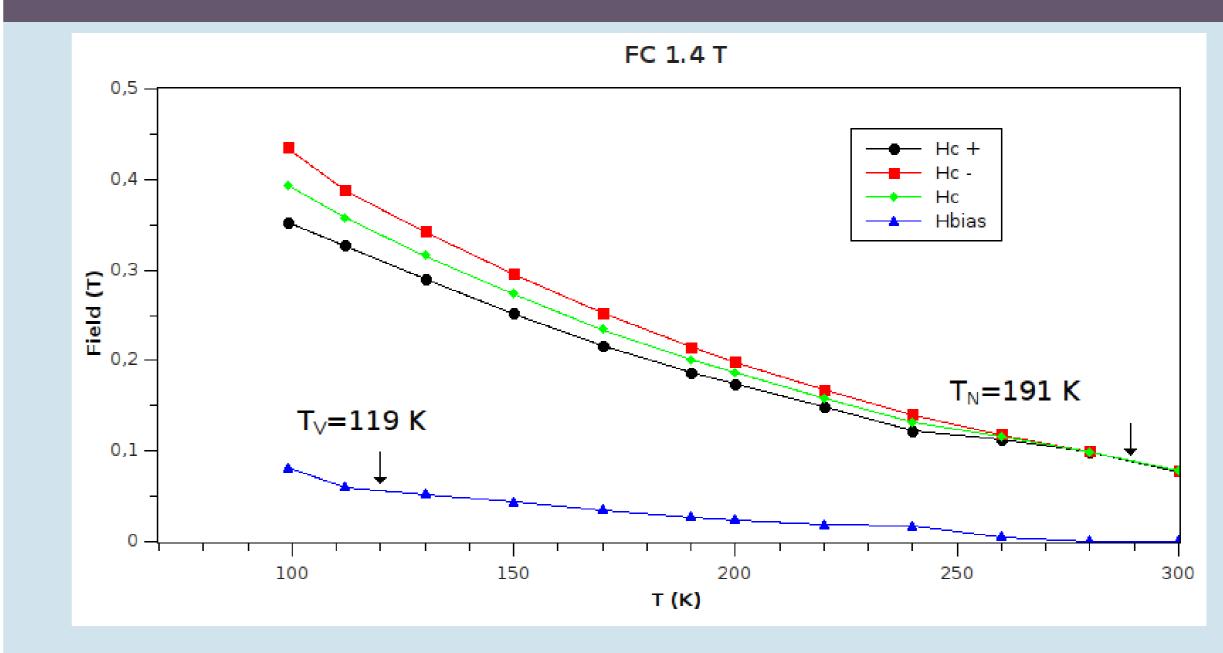
SPS magnetite clearly shows Verwey transition
