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# A variational analysis of a class of dynamic problems with slip dependent friction

#### Abstract

This work is concerned with the extension of some recent existence results proved for a class of nonsmooth dynamic frictional contact problem, to the case of a coefficient of friction depending on the slip velocity. Based on existence and approximation results for some general implicit variational inequalities, which are established by using Ky Fan's fixed point theorem, several estimates and compactness arguments, relaxed unilateral conditions with slip dependent friction between two viscoelastic bodies of Kelvin-Voigt type are analyzed.

## 1 Introduction

This paper deals with the analysis of a dynamic contact problem with some relaxed unilateral contact conditions, adhesion, and slip dependent pointwise friction, between two Kelvin-Voigt viscoelastic bodies.

The quasistatic unilateral contact problems with local Coulomb friction have been studied in $[1,29,30]$ and adhesion laws based on the evolution of intensity of adhesion were investigated in [28, 10]. Also, the normal compliance model, which can be seen as a particular regularization of the Signorini's conditions, has been considered by several authors, see e.g. [18, $16,31]$ and references therein.

A recent unified approach including unilateral and bilateral contact with nonlocal friction, or normal compliance conditions, in the quasistatic case and for a nonlinear elastic behavior, has been proposed in [2].

In the dynamic case, viscoelastic contact problems with nonlocal friction laws were considered in $[17,20,21,14,6,11]$ and the corresponding problems with normal compliance laws have been analyzed in [23, 18, 19, 5, 24].

Dynamic frictionless problems with adhesion have been studied by several authors, see, e.g [33] and references therein, and dynamic viscoelastic problems coupling unilateral contact, recoverable adhesion and nonlocal friction have been investigated in $[12,8]$. Using the Clarke subdifferential, various variational contact problems can be analyzed by using the theory of hemivariational inequalities, which represent a broad generalization of the variational inequalities to locally Lipschitz functions, see [24, 25, 26] and references therein.

Based on new abstract formulations and on Ky Fan's fixed point theorem, a static contact problem with relaxed unilateral conditions and pointwise Coulomb friction was studied in [27]. The extension of this interesting approach to an elastic quasistatic contact problem was considered in [7] and to a dynamic viscoelastic contact problem with slip independent coefficient of friction was investigated in [9].

This paper extends the results presented in [9] to the case of a coefficient of friction depending on the slip velocity, which enables to treat more realistic situations.

The paper is organized as follows. In Section 2 the classical formulation of the dynamic contact problem is presented. In Section 3 two variational formulations are given as a two-field problem. In Section 4 a more general evolution implicit variational inequality is considered and some auxiliary results are proved. Section 5 is devoted to the study of a fixed point problem, which is equivalent to the previous variational inequality. Using the Ky Fan's theorem, the existence of a fixed point is proved. In Section 6 this abstract result is used to prove the existence of a variational solution of the dynamic contact problem with slip dependent friction.

The applications presented in this paper concern the contact between two linear viscoelastic bodies but these results can be extended to more general constitutive laws, as, for example, the ones characterizing some elastoviscoplastic materials investigated in [13].

## 2 Classical formulation

Let $\Omega^{\alpha}$ be the reference domains of $\mathbb{R}^{d}, d=2$ or 3 , occupied by two viscoelastic bodies, characterized by a Kelvin-Voigt constitutive law. Suppose that the bodies have Lipschitz boundaries $\Gamma^{\alpha}=\partial \Omega^{\alpha}, \alpha=1,2$.

Let $\Gamma_{U}^{\alpha}, \Gamma_{F}^{\alpha}$ and $\Gamma_{C}^{\alpha}$ be three open disjoint sufficiently smooth parts of $\Gamma^{\alpha}$ such that $\Gamma^{\alpha}=\bar{\Gamma}_{U}^{\alpha} \cup \bar{\Gamma}_{F}^{\alpha} \cup \bar{\Gamma}_{C}^{\alpha}$ and, to simplify the estimates, meas $\left(\Gamma_{U}^{\alpha}\right)>$ $0, \alpha=1,2$. We shall assume the small deformation hypothesis and we shall use Cartesian coordinate representations.

Let $\boldsymbol{y}^{\alpha}\left(\boldsymbol{x}^{\alpha}, t\right)$ denote the position at time $t \in[0, T]$, where $0<T<+\infty$, of the material point represented by $\boldsymbol{x}^{\alpha}$ in the reference configuration, and $\boldsymbol{u}^{\alpha}\left(\boldsymbol{x}^{\alpha}, t\right):=\boldsymbol{y}^{\alpha}\left(\boldsymbol{x}^{\alpha}, t\right)-\boldsymbol{x}^{\alpha}$ denote the displacement vector of $\boldsymbol{x}^{\alpha}$ at time
$t$, with the Cartesian coordinates $u^{\alpha}=\left(u_{1}^{\alpha}, \ldots, u_{d}^{\alpha}\right)=\left(\bar{u}^{\alpha}, u_{d}^{\alpha}\right)$. Let $\varepsilon^{\alpha}$, with the Cartesian coordinates $\varepsilon^{\alpha}=\left(\varepsilon_{i j}\left(u^{\alpha}\right)\right)$, and $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\alpha}$, with the Cartesian coordinates $\sigma^{\alpha}=\left(\sigma_{i j}^{\alpha}\right)$, be the infinitesimal strain tensor and the stress tensor, respectively, corresponding to $\Omega^{\alpha}, \alpha=1,2$. The usual summation convention will be used for $i, j, k, l=1, \ldots, d$.

Assume that the displacement $\boldsymbol{U}^{\alpha}=\mathbf{0}$ on $\Gamma_{U}^{\alpha} \times(0, T), \alpha=1,2$, and that the densities of both bodies are equal to 1 . Let $\boldsymbol{f}_{1}=\left(\boldsymbol{f}_{1}^{1}, \boldsymbol{f}_{1}^{2}\right)$ denote the given body forces in $\Omega^{1} \cup \Omega^{2}$ and $\boldsymbol{f}_{2}=\left(\boldsymbol{f}_{2}^{1}, \boldsymbol{f}_{2}^{2}\right)$ denote the tractions on $\Gamma_{F}^{1} \cup \Gamma_{F}^{2}$. The initial displacements and velocities of the bodies are denoted by $\boldsymbol{u}_{0}=\left(\boldsymbol{u}_{0}^{1}, \boldsymbol{u}_{0}^{2}\right), \boldsymbol{u}_{1}=\left(\boldsymbol{u}_{1}^{1}, \boldsymbol{u}_{1}^{2}\right)$.

Suppose that the solids can be in contact between the potential contact surfaces $\Gamma_{C}^{1}$ and $\Gamma_{C}^{2}$ which are parametrized by two $C^{1}$ functions, $\varphi^{1}, \varphi^{2}$, defined on an open and bounded subset $\Xi$ of $\mathbb{R}^{d-1}$, such that $\varphi^{1}(\xi)-\varphi^{2}(\xi) \geq$ $0 \forall \xi \in \Xi$ and each $\Gamma_{C}^{\alpha}$ is the graph of $\varphi^{\alpha}$ on $\Xi$ that is $\Gamma_{C}^{\alpha}=\left\{\left(\xi, \varphi^{\alpha}(\xi)\right) \in\right.$ $\left.\mathbb{R}^{d} ; \xi \in \Xi\right\}, \alpha=1,2$. Define the initial normalized gap between the two contact surfaces by

and suppose that this initial gap is sufficiently small. Let $\boldsymbol{n}^{\alpha}$ denote the unit outward normal vector to $\Gamma^{\alpha}, \alpha=1,2$. We shall use the following notations for the normal and tangential components of a displacement field $\boldsymbol{v}^{\alpha}, \alpha=1,2$, of the relative displacement corresponding to $\boldsymbol{v}:=\left(\boldsymbol{v}^{1}, \boldsymbol{v}^{2}\right)$ and of the stress vector $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\alpha} \boldsymbol{n}^{\alpha}$ on $\Gamma_{C}^{\alpha}$ :

for all $\xi \in \Xi$ and for all $t \in[0, T]$. Let $g:=-\left[u_{N}\right]=g_{0}-u_{N}^{1}-u_{N}^{2}$ be the gap corresponding to the solution $\boldsymbol{u}:=\left(\boldsymbol{u}^{1}, \boldsymbol{u}^{2}\right)$. Using a similar method as the one presented in [3] (see also [11], [8]) we obtain the following unilateral contact condition at time $t$ in the set $\Xi:\left[u_{N}\right](\xi, t)=-g(\xi, t) \leq 0 \quad \forall \xi \in \Xi$. Let $\mathcal{A}^{\alpha}, \mathcal{B}^{\alpha}$ denote two fourth-order tensors, the elasticity tensor and the viscosity tensor corresponding to $\Omega^{\alpha}$, with the components $\mathcal{A}^{\alpha}=\left(\mathcal{A}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}\right)$ and $\mathcal{B}^{\alpha}=\left(\mathcal{B}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}\right)$, respectively. Assume that these components satisfy the following classical symmetry and ellipticity conditions: $\mathcal{C}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}=\mathcal{C}_{j i k l}^{\alpha}=\mathcal{C}_{k l i j}^{\alpha} \in$ $L^{\infty}\left(\Omega^{\alpha}\right), \forall i, j, k, l=1, \ldots, d, \exists \alpha_{\mathcal{C}^{\alpha}}>0$ such that $\mathcal{C}_{i j k l}^{\alpha} \tau_{i j} \tau_{k l} \geq \alpha_{\mathcal{C}^{\alpha}} \tau_{i j} \tau_{i j}$ $\forall \tau=\left(\tau_{i j}\right)$ verifying $\tau_{i j}=\tau_{j i}, \forall i, j=1, \ldots, d$, where $\mathcal{C}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}=\mathcal{A}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}, \mathcal{C}^{\alpha}=$ $\mathcal{A}^{\alpha}$ or $\mathcal{C}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}=\mathcal{B}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}, \mathcal{C}^{\alpha}=\mathcal{B}^{\alpha} \forall i, j, k, l=1, \ldots, d, \alpha=1,2$.

Let $\mu=\mu\left(\xi, \dot{\boldsymbol{u}}_{T}\right)$ be the slip rate dependent coefficient of friction and assume that $\mu: \Xi \times \mathbb{R}^{d} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}_{+}$is a bounded function such that for a.e. $\xi \in \Xi \mu(\xi, \cdot)$ is Lipschitz continuous with the Lipschitz constant, denoted by $C_{\mu}$, independent of $\xi$, and for every $v \in \mathbb{R}^{d} \mu(\cdot, v)$ is measurable.

Let $\underline{\kappa}, \bar{\kappa}: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be two mappings with $\underline{\kappa}$ lower semicontinuous and $\bar{\kappa}$ upper semicontinuous, satisfying the following conditions:

We consider the following dynamic viscoelastic contact problem.
Problem $\boldsymbol{P}_{\boldsymbol{c}}:$ Find $\boldsymbol{u}=\left(\boldsymbol{u}^{1}, \boldsymbol{u}^{2}\right)$ such that $\boldsymbol{u}(0)=\boldsymbol{u}_{0}, \dot{\boldsymbol{u}}(0)=\boldsymbol{u}_{1}$ and, for all $t \in(0, T)$,

where $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\alpha}=\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\alpha}\left(\boldsymbol{u}^{\alpha}, \dot{\boldsymbol{u}}^{\alpha}\right), \alpha=1,2, \sigma_{N}:=\sigma_{N}^{1}$ and $\boldsymbol{\sigma}_{T}:=\boldsymbol{\sigma}_{T}^{1}$.
Some contact and friction conditions, corresponding to particular $\underline{\kappa}$ and $\bar{\kappa}$, with a general coefficient of friction, are presented in the following examples.
Example 1. (Adhesion and friction conditions) Let $s_{0} \geq 0, M \geq 0$ be constants, $k: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ be a continuous function such that $k \geq 0$ with $k(0)=0$ and define

Example 2. (Friction condition)
In Example 1 we set $k=s_{0}=0$ and define

The classical Signorini's conditions correspond formally to $M=+\infty$.
Example 3. (General normal compliance conditions)

Various normal compliance conditions, friction and adhesion laws can be obtained from the previous general formulation if one considers $\underline{\kappa}=\bar{\kappa}=\kappa$, where $\kappa: \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R}$ is some bounded Lipschitz continuous function with $\kappa(0)=0$, so that $\sigma_{N}$ is given by the relation $\sigma_{N}=\kappa\left(\left[u_{N}\right]\right)$, see e.g. [8], where the intensity of adhesion was also considered.

## 3 Variational formulations

We shall consider two different variational formulations of problem $P_{c}$. We adopt the following notations:

For the convenience of the reader, an existence and uniqueness result proved in [11] will be restated here under an adapted and more general form that will enable to study problem $Q_{2}$.

The proof, which will be presented in a forthcoming paper, is based on a similar method to that used to prove the Theorem 3.2 established in [11] and on a useful estimate, see [22] or [32], which, when applied to the spaces $V_{0} \subset U \subseteq H_{0}$, implies the following result: for every $\epsilon>0$ there exists $C_{\epsilon}>0$ such that

## 5 An equivalent fixed point problem

Since $\mathcal{D}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)$ is dense in $L^{2}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)$, which is classically proved by using the convolution product with suitable mollifiers, it follows that for every $\gamma \in L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right) \cap B_{r_{0}}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)$, there exist $r>0$ and a sequence $\left(\gamma^{n}\right)_{n}$ in $W^{1, \infty}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right) \cap L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right) \cap B_{r}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)$ such that $\gamma^{n}(0)=0$, for all $n \in \mathbb{N}$, and $\gamma^{n} \rightarrow \gamma$ in $L^{2}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)$.

Theorem 5.1 Assume that (4.1), (4.2), (4.4)-(4.9) and (4.13) hold. For each $\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right) \in\left(L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right) \cap B_{r_{0}}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2}$, let $\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right)_{n}$ be a sequence included in $\left(W^{1, \infty}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)\right)^{2} \cap\left(L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2} \cap\left(B_{r}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2}$, for some $r>0$, such that $\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right) \rightharpoonup\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right)$ in $\left(L^{2}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)\right)^{2}, \gamma_{1}^{n}(0)=\gamma_{2}^{n}(0)=0$, and let $u_{\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right)}$ be the solution of (4.23) corresponding to $\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right)$, for every $n \in \mathbb{N}$. Then $\left(u_{\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right)}\right)_{n}$ is strongly convergent in $W_{0}$, its limit, denoted by $u=u_{\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right)}$, is independent of the chosen sequence converging to $\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right)$ with the same properties as $\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right)_{n}$ and is a solution of the following evolution variational
inequality: $u(0)=u^{0}, \dot{u}(0)=u^{1}$,

The proof, based on Lemmas 4.2, 4.3 and on some compactness results established in [32], is similar to the proof of Theorem 3.2 in [9], so that will be not presented here.

Now, let $\Phi:\left(L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right) \cap B_{r_{0}}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2} \rightarrow 2^{\left(L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right) \cap B_{r_{0}}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2}} \backslash\{\emptyset\}$ be the set-valued mapping defined by

where $u_{\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right)}$ is the solution of the variational inequality (5.1) which corresponds to $\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right)$ by the procedure described in Theorem 5.1.

It is clear that if $\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)$ is a fixed point of $\Phi$, i.e. $\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right) \in \Phi\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)$, then $\left(u_{\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)}, \lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)$ is a solution of the problem $Q_{2}$.

Consider a new problem, which consists in finding a fixed point of the set-valued mapping $\Phi$, called also multivalued function or multifunction, which will provide a solution of problem $Q_{1}$.

The existence of a fixed point of the multifunction $\Phi$ will be obtained by using a corollary of the Ky Fan's fixed point theorem [15], proved in [27] in the particular case of a reflexive Banach space.

Definition 5.1 Let $Y$ be a reflexive Banach space, $D$ a weakly closed set in $Y$, and $F: D \rightarrow 2^{Y} \backslash\{\emptyset\}$ be a multivalued function. $F$ is called sequentially weakly upper semicontinuous if $z_{n} \rightharpoonup z, y_{n} \in F\left(z_{n}\right)$ and $y_{n} \rightharpoonup y$ imply $y \in F(z)$.

Proposition 5.1 ([27]) Let $Y$ be a reflexive Banach space, $D$ a convex, closed and bounded set in $Y$, and $F: D \rightarrow 2^{D} \backslash\{\emptyset\}$ a sequentially weakly upper semicontinuous multivalued function such that $F(z)$ is convex for every $z \in D$. Then $F$ has a fixed point.

Note that since $Y$ is a reflexive Banach space and $D$ is convex, closed and bounded, we don't need to assume that $Y$ is separable, see [4, 27].

Theorem 5.2 Assume that (2.1), (2.2), (4.1)-(4.9) and (4.13) hold. Then there exists $\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right) \in\left(L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right) \cap B_{r_{0}}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2}$ such that $\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right) \in \Phi\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)$. For each fixed point $\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)$ of the multifunction $\Phi,\left(u_{\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)}, \lambda\right)$ with $\lambda=$ $\lambda_{1}-\lambda_{2}$ is a solution of the problem $Q_{1}$.

Proof. The proof is similar to the proof of Theorem 3.3 in [9] but, for the convenience of the reader, we shall present it. By Lemma 4.1, if $\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right) \in$ $\Phi\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)$, then $\left(u_{\left(\lambda_{1}, \lambda_{2}\right)}, \lambda\right)$ is clearly a solution to the problem $Q_{1}$.

We apply Proposition 5.1 to $Y=\left(L^{2}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)\right)^{2}, D=\left(L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right) \cap\right.$ $\left.B_{r_{0}}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2}$ and $F=\Phi$.

The set $D \subset\left(L^{2}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)\right)^{2}$ is clearly convex, closed and bounded. Since for each $\zeta \in L^{2}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)$ the sets $\Lambda_{+}(\zeta)$ and $\Lambda_{-}(\zeta)$ are nonempty, convex, closed, and bounded by $r_{0}$, it follows that $\Phi\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right)$ is a nonempty, convex and closed subset of $D$ for every $\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right) \in D$.

In order to prove that the multifunction $\Phi$ is sequentially weakly upper semicontinuous, let $\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right) \rightharpoonup\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right),\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right) \in D,\left(\eta_{1}^{n}, \eta_{2}^{n}\right) \in \Phi\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right)$ $\forall n \in \mathbb{N},\left(\eta_{1}^{n}, \eta_{2}^{n}\right) \rightharpoonup\left(\eta_{1}, \eta_{2}\right)$ and let us verify that $\left(\eta_{1}, \eta_{2}\right) \in \Phi\left(\gamma_{1}, \gamma_{2}\right)$. By Theorem 5.1, there exists a sequence $\left(\hat{\gamma}_{1}^{n}, \hat{\gamma}_{2}^{n}\right)_{n}$ in $\left(W^{1, \infty}\left(0, T ; L^{2}(\Xi)\right)\right)^{2} \cap$ $\left(L_{+}^{2}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2} \cap\left(B_{r}\left(\Xi_{T}\right)\right)^{2}$, for some $r>0$, such that $\left(\gamma_{1}^{n}, \gamma_{2}^{n}\right)-\left(\hat{\gamma}_{1}^{n}, \hat{\gamma}_{2}^{n}\right) \rightharpoonup 0$, $\hat{\gamma}_{1}^{n}(0)=\hat{\gamma}_{2}^{n}(0)=0$ and

## 6 Existence of a solution to the contact problem

Theorem 6.1 Under the assumptions of Section 3 there exists a solution of the problem $P_{v}^{1}$.

Proof. We shall prove that there exists at least a solution ( $\boldsymbol{u}, \lambda_{+}, \lambda_{-}$) of the problem $P_{v}^{2}$ which will provide a solution $(\boldsymbol{u}, \lambda)$ of the problem $P_{v}^{1}$ with $\lambda=\lambda_{+}-\lambda_{-}$.

We apply Theorem 5.2 to $U_{0}=\boldsymbol{H}_{0}^{1}=H_{0}^{1}\left(\Omega^{1} ; \mathbb{R}^{d}\right) \times H_{0}^{1}\left(\Omega^{2} ; \mathbb{R}^{d}\right), V_{0}=\boldsymbol{V}$, $U=\boldsymbol{H}^{\iota}, H_{0}=\boldsymbol{H}, a_{0}=a, b_{0}=b, u^{0}=\boldsymbol{u}_{0}, u^{1}=\boldsymbol{u}_{1}, \phi_{0}=\phi, f_{0}=\boldsymbol{f}$ and to the mapping $l: \boldsymbol{V} \rightarrow L^{2}(\Xi)$ defined by $l(\boldsymbol{v})=\left[v_{N}\right] \quad \forall \boldsymbol{v} \in \boldsymbol{V}$.

Since $\mathcal{A}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}, \mathcal{B}_{i j k l}^{\alpha} \in L^{\infty}\left(\Omega^{\alpha}\right) \forall i, j, k, l=1, \ldots, d, \alpha=1,2$, we obtain (4.1).

The condition meas $\left(\Gamma_{U}^{\alpha}\right)>0$, the ellipticity properties of the coefficients $\mathcal{A}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}, \mathcal{B}_{i j k l}^{\alpha}$ and the Korn's inequality imply that there exist $m_{a}^{\alpha}, m_{b}^{\alpha}>0$ such that

Note that the same method can provide a unified approach to study more complex dynamic surface interactions, for which the evolution of the intensity of adhesion is governed by a variational inequality or a differential equation, see e.g. [33], [31], [12], [8].

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
