#### Table S1: internal isomerizations of free radicals.

Pre-exponential factor (A) is mainly based on the changes in the number of internal rotations as the reactant moves to the cyclic transition state. Activation energies have been set equal to the sum of the activation energy for H-abstraction from the substrate by analogous radicals ( $E_{H-abstr-}$ , see Table S1a) and the strain energy of the cyclic transition state ( $E_{ring}$ , see Table S1b).

# II/ RULES OF GENERATION OF THE SECONDARY MECHANISM OF THE OXIDATION OF ALKYLBENZENES

Below are presented the generic reaction rules for species formed in the primary mechanism. The generic reaction rules are given for each class of species along with particular cases and an example to illustrate the rule. Note that these rules have been deduced from the rules that already exist for alkanes as the alkyl-benzene molecules can be seen as an alkyl chain linked to a non reactive phenyl ring. The specificities due to the presence of a phenyl ring have been taken in account (presence of benzylic H-atoms as an example).

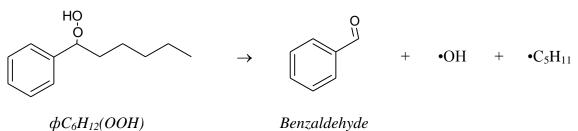
The kinetic data are also provided in the following paragraphs (highlighted in green at the end of the different rules).

#### a. Generic decomposition rules of degenerate branching agents

Branching agents are species with hydroperoxy groups (R-OOH). Due to the weakness of the O-O bond in the hydroperoxy group, this type of species decomposes by a breaking of this bond. The decomposition leads to the formation of an •OH and a RO• radicals. To simplify, very reactive RO• radicals are not written and it is considered that they decompose directly to smaller species that are already in the primary mechanism or in the aromatic reaction base. The kinetic parameters are those of the reaction of decomposition through the breaking of the O-O bond.

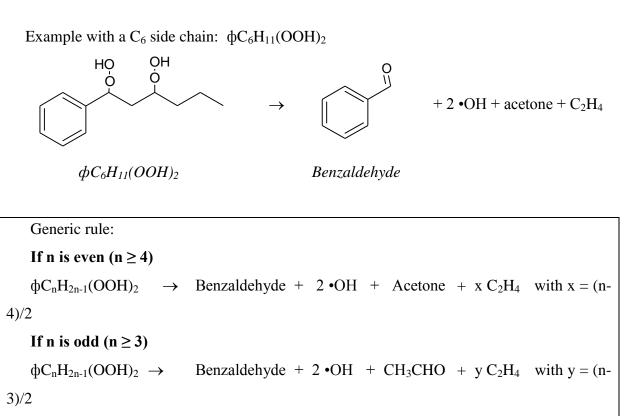

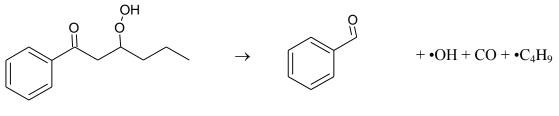

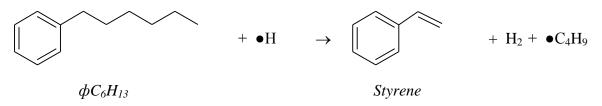

#### b. Generic consuming rules of alkyl- and alkenyl-benzenes by H-atom abstraction

In the case of H-atom abstractions, kinetic data are dependent of the number and the nature of abstractable H-atoms. These two parameters are indicated along with the reaction rules. Note that correlations enabling the determination of kinetic constants of H-atom abstractions are already implemented in the software EXGAS as they are the same as those used in the case of alkanes and alkenes.

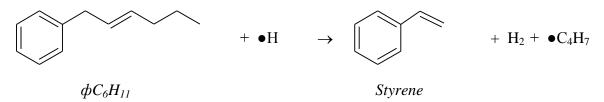

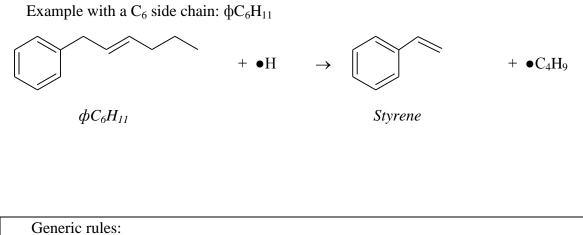

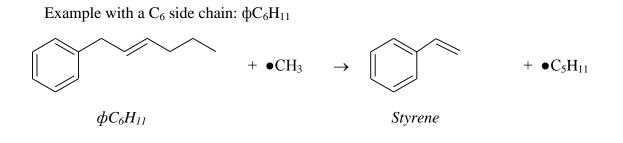
When adding a radical to a double bond there is two possible reactions as there are two addition sites. The new radical which is considered to decompose directly into species already considered in the primary mechanism or in the toluene reaction base. To simplify, the two reactions are the same (duplicate reactions) with two sets of kinetic parameters which can differ if the two addition sites are not the same (the addition can occur on a secondary or on a tertiary radical carbon atom).

It is considered that cyclic ethers react with radicals via H-atom abstraction reactions. The new radical is not written and its decomposition into small species (already in the primary mechanism or in the toluene reaction base) is directly written. Three membered ring cyclic ethers are considered separately from the others with a larger ring (four, five and six membered ring cyclic ethers) as they behave slightly differently.

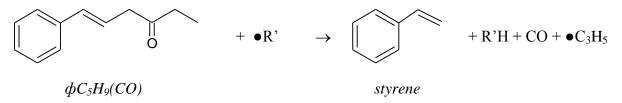

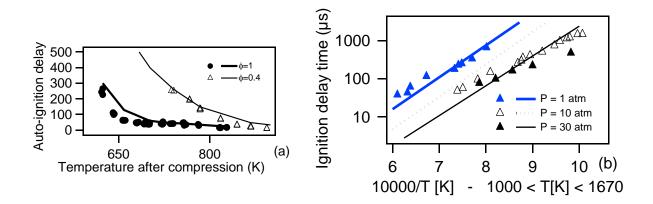

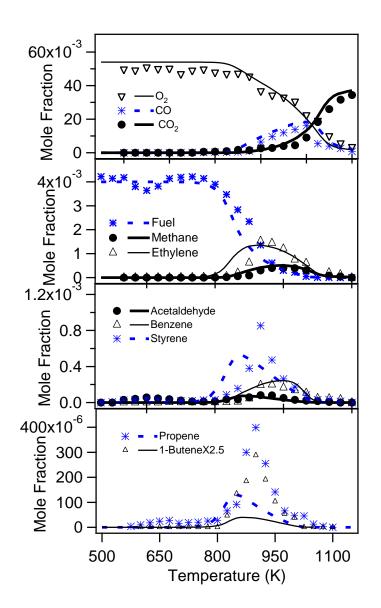
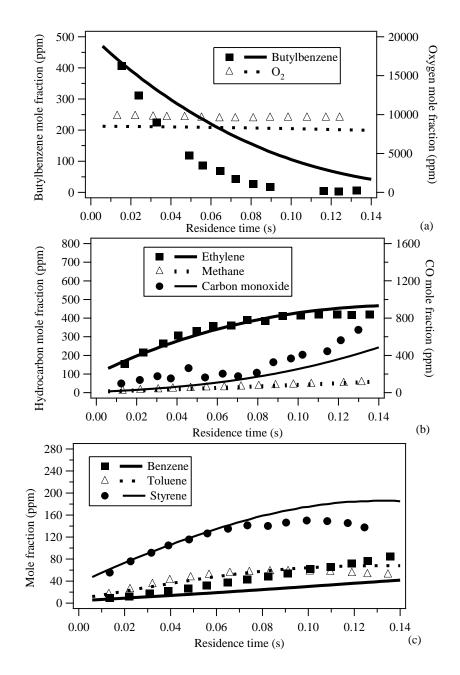

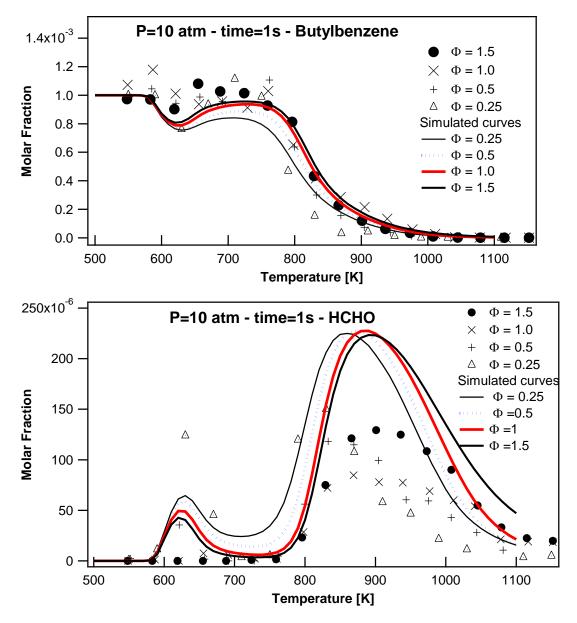

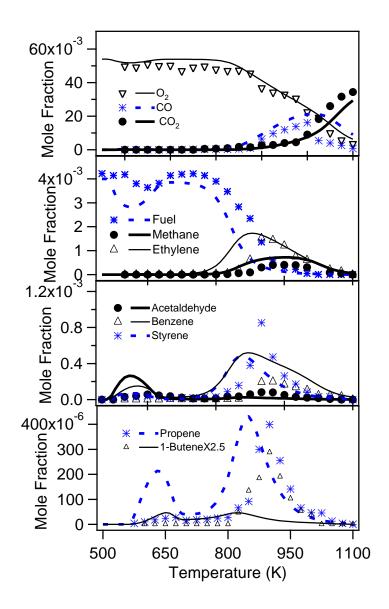


Figure S5: Major products of the oxidation of *n*-butylbenzene in a jet-stirred reactor (points are experiments [6] and lines simulations with the model of [10]).
