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## APPROXIMATE CONTROLLABILITY OF SECOND GRADE FLUIDS

VAN-SANG NGO

Abstract. This paper deals with the controllability of the second grade fluids, a class of non-Newtonian of differentiel type, on a two-dimensional torus. Using the method of Agrachev-Sarychev [1], [2] and of Sirikyan [25], we prove that the system of second grade fluids is approximately controllable by a finite-dimensional control force.

### 1. INTRODUCTION

The goal of this paper is to study the approximate controllability of the system of fluids of second grade, using low-mode (finite-dimensional) control forces. More precisely, we consider the following system

on the domain  $\mathbb{T}^2$ , which is the two-dimensional torus  $]0, 2\pi q_1[\times]0, 2\pi q_2[$ , with  $q_1 > 0$  and  $q_2 > 0$ . Here  $u = (u_1(t, x), u_2(t, x))$  and  $p = p(t, x)$  are unknown and represent the velocity vector field and the pressure function;  $f = f(t, x)$  is the extenal force field; and the control force  $\eta = \eta(t, x)$ is supposed to belong to a finite-dimensional space which will be precised later.

Fluids of second grade belong to a particular class of non-Newtonian Rivlin-Ericksen fluids of differential type [24], which usually arise in petroleum industry, in polymer technology or in liquid crystal suspension problems. For these fluids, the Cauchy stress tensor  $\sigma$  is not linearly proportional to the local strain rate but given by

\sigma = -pI + 2\nu A_1 + \alpha_1 A_2 + \alpha_2 A_1^2,
$$

where  $\nu$  stands for the kinematic viscosity, p is the pressure and  $A_1$ ,  $A_2$  represent the first two Rivlin-Ericksen tensors, which are

$$
A_1(u) = \frac{1}{2} (\nabla u + \nabla u^T),
$$

corresponding to the local strain tensor and

$$
A_2(u) = \frac{DA_1}{Dt} + (\nabla u)^T A_1 + A_1 (\nabla u),
$$

where

$$
\frac{D}{Dt} = \partial_t + u \cdot \nabla
$$

is the material derivative. In [7], Dunn and Fosdick used the compatibility of (1.2) with thermodynamics to prove that

$$
\alpha_1 + \alpha_2 = 0; \quad \alpha_1 \ge 0.
$$

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Setting  $\alpha = \alpha_1$  and writing the equation

$$
\frac{Du}{Dt} = \partial_t u + u \cdot \nabla u = \text{div}\,\sigma + f,
$$

one obtain the equations of second grade fluids of the following form

$$
\begin{cases} \partial_t (u - \alpha \Delta u) - \nu \Delta u + \text{rot} (u - \alpha \Delta u) \times u + \nabla p = f & \text{in } \mathbb{R}_+ \times \mathbb{T}^2 \\ \text{div } u = 0 & \text{in } \mathbb{R}_+ \times \mathbb{T}^2 \\ u(0) = u_0 & \text{in } \mathbb{T}^2. \end{cases}
$$

The local existence in time and uniqueness of a strong solution to (1.3) have been proven by Cioranescu and Ouazar in [6] in the case of two-dimensional or three-dimensional domains with non-slip boundary conditions. Moreover, the solution is global in time in the two-dimensional case. Second grade fluids in these domains was also studied by Moise, Rosa and Wang in [20], where the authors proved the existence of a compact global attractor in the two-dimensional case. The existence, the uniqueness of a strong solution and the dynamics of second grade fluids in the torus  $\mathbb{T}^2$  was studied in [23] by Paicu, Raugel and Rekalo, and in [22] by the first two authors, using the Lagrangian approach. For further results concerning the system (1.3), we refer the readers to [3], [4], [5], [13], [14], [15], [16], [17], [18], [19], ...

In this paper, in order to study the approximate controllability of the second grade fluid system  $(1.1)$  by a low-mode control  $\eta$ , we use the method introduced by Agrachev and Sarychev in [1] and [2] for Navier-Stokes and Euler systems in the two-dimensional torus  $\mathbb{T}^2$ . This method was extended later for the three-dimensional Navier-Stokes system by Shirikyan in [25] and [26] and for the three-dimensional Euler system by Nersisyan in [21]. The main idea consists in proving that, if the (finite-dimensional) space of controls  $E$  contains sufficiently many Fourier modes then, for any  $T > 0$ , the system (1.1) is approximately controllable in time T by an E-valued control  $\eta$ .

Before stating the main results and the main ideas of this paper, we will introduce the needed notations and function spaces. Let  $H^m(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$  be the classical Sobolev space of two-dimensional vector fields, whose components belong to  $H^m(\mathbb{T}^2)$ . For  $m = 0$ , we simply have  $H^0(\mathbb{T}^2)^2 =$  $L^2(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ . As in [23], for any  $m \in \mathbb{N}$ , we denote  $V^m(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$  the closure of the space

\left\{ u \in C^{\infty}(\mathbb{T}^2)^2 \mid u \text{ is periodic }, \text{div } u = 0, \int_{\mathbb{T}^2} u dx = 0 \right\}
$$

in  $H^m(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ . Then  $V^m(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$  is a Banach space, endowed with the classical norm of  $H^m(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ . We also use  $H_{per}^m(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$  to denote the space of vector fields  $u \in H^m(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ , which are periodic and whose mean value is zero.

In what follows, we recall the definition of a strong solution of the system (1.3).

 $\text{d}$  **Example 1.1.** Let  $T > 0$ . For any  $f \in L^{\infty}(0,T,H_{per}^1(\mathbb{T}^2)^2)$  and  $u_0 \in V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ , the vector field  $u(t, x)$  is said to be a strong solution of the system (1.3), with data  $(f, u_0)$ , on the time  $interval [0, T]$  if  $u \in C(0, T, V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2), \ \partial_t u \in L^{\infty}(0, T, V^2(\mathbb{T}^2)^2), \ u(0) = u_0, \ and \ for \ any$  $t \in ]0,T]$ , for any  $\phi \in V^0(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ , the following equation holds

In [23], the authors prove that

**Theorem 1.2.** Let  $\alpha > 0$  and  $T > 0$ .

(1) For any  $f \in L^{\infty}(0,T,H_{per}^1(\mathbb{T}^2))$  and any  $u_0 \in V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ , there exists a unique strong solution

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of the system (1.3). Moreover, for any  $t \in [0, T]$ , the map

is continuous.

(2) Let  $m \geq 2$ . Assume that  $f \in L^{\infty}(0,T,H_{per}^m(\mathbb{T}^2)^2)$  and  $u_0 \in V^{m+3}(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ . Then, the solution u of the system (1.3) belongs to  $C(0,T,V^{m+3}(\mathbb{T}^2)^2)$ .

For the system (1.1), we want to define the approximate controllability using low-mode controls. We will adapt the definition of approximate controllability given in [25] to the case of fluids of second grade.

: ApproxCont **Definition 1.3.** Let  $T > 0$  and let E be a finite-dimensional subspace of  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ . The second grade fluid system  $(1.1)$  is approximately controllable in time T by E-valued controls if, for any  $\varepsilon > 0$ , for any  $u_0, u_T \in V^4(\mathbb{T}^2)$ , there exist a control  $\eta \in L^{\infty}(0,T,E)^2$  and a strong solution  $u \in C(0,T,V^4(\mathbb{T}^2)^2)$  of the system  $(1.1)$  such that

$$
||u(T) - u_T||_{V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2} \le \varepsilon.
$$

For any  $m \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \setminus \{0\}$ , let

Then, it is classical that  $c_m$ ,  $s_m$ , with  $m \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \setminus \{0\}$ , are eigenvectors of the Stokes operator  $-\mathbb{P}\Delta$ , where  $\mathbb P$  is the Leray projection, and that the family  $\{c_m, s_m \mid m \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \setminus \{0\}\}\)$  forms and orthonormal basis of  $V^k(\mathbb{T}_q^2)^2$ ,  $k \in \mathbb{N}$ . For any  $N \in \mathbb{N}^*$ , we set

$$

The main result of this paper is the following theorem.

 $\text{theorem 1.4. Let } T > 0 \text{ and } f \in L^{\infty}(0,T,H_{per}^2(\mathbb{T}^2)^2)$ . Then the system (1.1) is approximately controllable in time T by  $\mathcal{H}^3_q$ -valued controls.

> We note that, unlike the case of Navier-Stokes equations, the system of second grade fluids is an exemple of asymptotically smooth system, which only possesses a smoothing effect in infinite time. The systems (1.1) or (1.3) also differ from the  $\alpha$ -type models, such as the so-called  $\alpha$ -Navier-Stokes system (see [8], [9] and the references therein). Indeed, the  $\alpha$ -Navier-Stokes system contains the very regularizing term  $-\nu\Delta(u-\alpha\Delta u)$  instead of  $-\nu\Delta u$ , and thus is a semilinear problem, which is easier to solve. It is different in the case of second grade fluids where the dissipation is much weaker. This weak smoothing effect explains why in our result (Definition 1.3 and Theorem 1.4) we can not obtain an approximate control in the  $V^4(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ -norm (norm of the same space as the initial data) but only a control in  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ -norm. Another problem when we want to apply the method of Shirikyan [25] lies in the complexity of the nonlinear term and the appearance of the term  $\partial_t(-\alpha \Delta u)$ . To avoid this difficulty, let

$$

Following the ideas of [1] and [25], we give the following definition

exification **Definition 1.5.** For any finite-dimensional subspace E of  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ , we define  $\mathcal{F}(E)$  as the largest vector subspace of  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$  such that for any  $\overline{\eta} \in \mathcal{F}(E)$ , there exist

$$
k \in \mathbb{N}, \ \alpha_1, \dots, \alpha_k > 0, \ \eta, \rho^1, \dots, \rho^k \in E
$$

It is easy to verify that  $\mathcal{F}(E)$  is well defined and  $E \subset \mathcal{F}(E)$ . Then, we can define a sequence of subspace

The goal of this paper is to prove that Theorem 1.4 is only a consequence of the following results.

Glextension Theorem 1.6 (Extension). Let  $T > 0$  and E a finite-dimensional subspace of  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ . Then, the system (1.6) is approximately controllable in time T by an E-valued control  $\eta$  if and only if so is the system (1.8) with E-valued controls  $\eta$  and  $\zeta$ .

The paper will be organized as follows. In Section 2, we study a pertubation of the system (1.6), which is necessary to prove our main theorem. Theorem 1.6 will be proved in Section 3. Section 4 is devoted to the demonstration of Theorem 1.7. In Section 5, we put in evidence the saturation property given in Theorem 1.8. Finally, in the last section, we wil prove the main theorem 1.4.

## 2. Preliminary results on the system of fluids of second grade

In this section, we consider the following perturbed system of fluids of second grade

2.1. Propagation of the  $V^3$ -norm. In this paragraph, we give a priori estimates of a solution of the system  $(2.3)$  in  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)$ -norm. Applying the rot operator to the first equation of  $(2.3)$ , we obtain

# 3. Study of the extended controlled system

In this section, we want to show that, the approximate controllability of the system (1.6) is equivalent to the approximate controllability of the system (1.8) by low-mode controls. For any finite-dimensional subspace E of  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ , we remark that the approximate controllability of the system  $(1.6)$  by E-valued controls implies immediately the approximate controllability of the system (1.8) in the same space of controls. Indeed, we only need to choose  $\zeta = 0$  in the system (1.8). Then, in order to prove Theorem 1.6, we only need to prove that

The proof of Theorem 4.1 is rather long and complex. In order to introduce this proof in a legible way, we will divide it into several steps.

**Step 1.** Limit the proof of Theorem 4.1 to the case of  $\mathcal{F}(E)$ -valued piecewise constant controls (with respect to the time variable).

We suppose that Theorem 4.1 is true for  $\mathcal{F}(E)$ -valued piecewise constant controls. We want to prove that Theorem 4.1 is also true in the general case. Let  $\overline{\eta} \in L^{\infty}(0,T,\mathcal{F}(E))$  and let

\overline{\mathcal{U}} \in L^{\infty}\left(0, T, V^2(\mathbb{T}^2)^2\right) \cap C\left(0, T, V^2(\mathbb{T}^2)^2\right)

for any m larger than a certain  $m_0 \in \mathbb{N}^*$ .

Now, Theorem 4.1 being true for  $\mathcal{F}(E)$ -valued piecewise constant controls, we deduce the existence of  $\eta$  and  $\zeta$  in  $L^{\infty}(0,T,E)^2$ , and a solution

\mathcal{U} \in L^{\infty}\left(0, T, V^2(\mathbb{T}^2)^2\right) \cap C\left(0, T, V^2(\mathbb{T}^2)^2\right)
$$

of the system (1.8) such that

$$
\mathcal{U}(0) = \mathcal{U}^{m_0}(0) = \overline{\mathcal{U}}(0),

**Remark** We can even reduce the study to the case where the control  $\overline{\eta}$  accepts only one interval of constancy, with respect to the time variable. For that, we suppose that the intervals of constancy of  $\overline{\eta}$  is  $[0, t_1[, [t_1, t_2], \ldots, [t_n, T]$  and then we perform an argument par iteration (as in [25]). So from now on, we will consider  $\overline{\eta} \in \mathcal{F}(E)$  independent of the time variable.

### Step 2. Construction of solutions of the extended controlled system (1.8).

The construction of controls  $\eta_k$ ,  $\zeta_k$  and a solution  $\mathcal{U}_k$  of the controlled system (1.8), with  $(\eta, \zeta)$  replaced by  $(\eta_k, \zeta_k)$ , follows the lines of the construction in [25] (see also [1] and [2]). The main difficulty consists in the treatment of the relaxation norm and the convergence to zero of the solution of the system (4.14) described later.

\lim_{k \to +\infty} \int_0^t g_k(s) ds = 0.
$$

The same argument gives

and thus, we have

\mathcal{B}(a) = \frac{1}{2} \cos \langle m - n, x \rangle_q P_{m-n} \left\{ \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| n \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{f}_m^{\perp}, m \right\rangle_q \tilde{g}_n^{\perp} - \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| m \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{g}_n^{\perp}, n \right\rangle_q \tilde{f}_m^{\perp} \right\} - \frac{1}{2} \cos \langle m + n, x \rangle_q P_{m+n} \left\{ \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| n \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{f}_m^{\perp}, m \right\rangle_q \tilde{g}_n^{\perp} + \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| m \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{g}_n^{\perp}, n \right\rangle_q \tilde{f}_m^{\perp} \right\}.
$$

We remark that

$$
\cos \left\langle m-n, x \right\rangle_q P_{m-n} \left\{ \left(1+\alpha \left\|n\right\|_q^2\right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{f}_m^\perp, m \right\rangle_q \tilde{g}_n^\perp - \left(1+\alpha \left\|m\right\|_q^2\right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{g}_n^\perp, n \right\rangle_q \tilde{f}_m^\perp \right\}
$$

belongs to  $Span\{\mathcal{C}_{m-n}, \mathcal{S}_{m-n}\}.$  So, we only need to prove that, for any  $f \in \mathcal{C}_{m+n}$ , there are  $f_m \in \mathcal{C}_m$  and  $g_n \in \mathcal{S}_n$  such that

$$
\boxed{\text{eq:ProjF}} \quad (5.12)
$$

$$
f = \frac{1}{2}\cos\left\langle m+n, x\right\rangle_q P_{m+n} \left\{ \left(1+\alpha\left\|n\right\|_q^2\right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{f}_m^\perp, m\right\rangle_q \tilde{g}_n^\perp + \left(1+\alpha\left\|m\right\|_q^2\right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{g}_n^\perp, n\right\rangle_q \tilde{f}_m^\perp \right\}.
$$

Let

$$
F = \left(1+\alpha\left\|n\right\|_{q}^{2}\right)^{-1}\left\langle\tilde{f}_{m}^{\perp},m\right\rangle_{q}\tilde{g}_{n}^{\perp} + \left(1+\alpha\left\|m\right\|_{q}^{2}\right)^{-1}\left\langle\tilde{g}_{n}^{\perp},n\right\rangle_{q}\tilde{f}_{m}^{\perp}.
$$

Then, we will prove (5.12) if we can find  $f_m \in \mathcal{C}_m$  and  $g_n \in \mathcal{S}_n$  such that  $P_{m+n}F \neq 0$ , or equivalently,  $\langle F, G \rangle \neq 0$ , for some vector  $G \neq 0$  and  $G \in Span\{(m+n)^{\perp}\}\$ . For the sake of simplicity, we choose

$$
G = ((m_2 + n_2)q_1, -(m_1 + n_1)q_2).
$$

For any  $f_m \in \mathcal{C}_m$  and  $g_n \in \mathcal{S}_n$ , recall that  $\left\langle \tilde{f}_m, m \right\rangle_q = \left\langle \tilde{g}_n, n \right\rangle_q = 0$ . Thus, there exist  $C_f, C_g \in \mathbb{R}$ such that

$$
\tilde{f}_m = C_f (m_2 q_1, -m_1 q_2)
$$
 and  $\tilde{g}_n = C_g (n_2 q_1, -n_1 q_2)$ 

We get

$$
\tilde{f}_m^{\perp} = C_f(m_1q_2, m_2q_1) \quad \text{and} \quad \tilde{g}_n^{\perp} = C_g(n_1q_2, n_2q_1),
$$

and

$$
\left\langle \tilde{f}_m^\perp,m\right\rangle_q = \frac{q_2}{q_1}m_1^2 + \frac{q_1}{q_2}m_2^2 = q_1q_2\left\|m\right\|_q^2
$$
  

$$
\left\langle \tilde{g}_n^\perp,n\right\rangle_q = \frac{q_2}{q_1}n_1^2 + \frac{q_1}{q_2}n_2^2 = q_1q_2\left\|n\right\|_q^2.
$$

Let

$$
C = \left(1 + \alpha \left\|m\right\|_{q}^{2}\right) \left(1 + \alpha \left\|n\right\|_{q}^{2}\right).
$$

Then,

$$
F = CC_f C_g q_1 q_2 \left[ \left( 1 + \alpha ||m||_q^2 \right) ||m||_q^2 (n_1 q_2, n_2 q_1) + \left( 1 + \alpha ||n||_q^2 \right) ||n||_q^2 (m_1 q_2, m_2 q_1) \right],
$$

Let

$$
M_q = \left(1 + \alpha \left\|m\right\|_q^2\right) \left\|m\right\|_q^2 \quad \text{and} \quad N_q = \left(1 + \alpha \left\|n\right\|_q^2\right) \left\|n\right\|_q^2.
$$

Since  $\|m\|_q \neq \|n\|_q$  and m, n are not parallel in  $\mathbb{R}^2$ , we finally obtain

$$
\langle F, G \rangle = CC_f C_g q_1 q_2 [(M_q n_1 q_2 + N_q m_1 q_2) (m_2 q_1 + n_2 q_1) - (M_q n_2 q_1 + N_q m_2 q_1) (m_1 q_2 + n_1 q_2)]
$$
  
=  $CC_f C_g q_1^2 q_2^2 (M_q - N_q) (n_1 m_2 - n_2 m_1) \neq 0$ ,

if  $f_m$  and  $g_n$  are not zero.

To prove the second part of the lemma, for any  $g \in S_{m+n}$ , we can look for b under the form

$$
b = f_m + f_n \qquad \text{or} \qquad b = g_m + g_n,
$$

where  $f_m \in \mathcal{C}_m$ ,  $f_n \in \mathcal{C}_n$ ,  $g_m \in \mathcal{S}_m$  and  $g_n \in \mathcal{S}_n$ . Indeed, taking into account (5.5), (5.6) and (5.10), we have

$$
\mathcal{B}(f_m + f_n)
$$
\n
$$
= \frac{1}{2} \sin \langle m - n, x \rangle_q P_{m-n} \left\{ \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| n \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{f}_m^{\perp}, m \right\rangle_q \tilde{f}_n^{\perp} - \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| m \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{f}_n^{\perp}, n \right\rangle_q \tilde{f}_m^{\perp} \right\}
$$
\n
$$
+ \frac{1}{2} \sin \langle m + n, x \rangle_q P_{m+n} \left\{ \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| n \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{f}_m^{\perp}, m \right\rangle_q \tilde{f}_n^{\perp} + \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| m \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{f}_n^{\perp}, n \right\rangle_q \tilde{f}_m^{\perp} \right\},
$$

and

$$
\mathcal{B}(g_m + g_n)
$$
\n
$$
= \frac{1}{2} \sin \langle m - n, x \rangle_q P_{m-n} \left\{ \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| n \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{g}_m^{\perp}, m \right\rangle_q \tilde{g}_n^{\perp} - \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| m \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{g}_n^{\perp}, n \right\rangle_q \tilde{g}_m^{\perp} \right\}
$$
\n
$$
- \frac{1}{2} \sin \langle m + n, x \rangle_q P_{m+n} \left\{ \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| n \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{g}_m^{\perp}, m \right\rangle_q \tilde{g}_n^{\perp} + \left( 1 + \alpha \left\| m \right\|_q^2 \right)^{-1} \left\langle \tilde{g}_n^{\perp}, n \right\rangle_q \tilde{g}_m^{\perp} \right\}.
$$

Then, we can repeat the above argument for  $a$  to find  $b$ . Lemma 5.3 is proved.

In what follows, we recall that, for any finite-dimensional subspace E of  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ , we have defined  $\mathcal{F}(E)$  as the largest vector subspace of  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$  such that, for any  $\overline{\eta} \in \mathcal{F}(E)$ , there exist

$$
k \in \mathbb{N}^*, \ \alpha_1, \dots, \alpha_k > 0; \ \eta, \rho^1, \dots, \rho^k \in E
$$

satisfying

$$
\overline{\eta} = \eta - \sum_{j=1}^{k} \alpha_j \mathcal{B}(\rho^j).
$$

We have also defined a sequence of subspace

$$
E = E_0 \subset E_1 \subset \ldots \subset E_n \subset \ldots
$$

such that, for any  $n \in \mathbb{N}$  we have  $E_{n+1} = \mathcal{F}(E_n)$  and we set

$$
E_{\infty} = \bigcup_{n=0}^{\infty} E_n.
$$

The saturation property in Theorem 1.8 can be precised as follows

Saturation Theorem 5.4 (Saturation Property). Let  $q = (q_1, q_2), q_1, q_2 > 0$ , let E be a finite-dimensional subspace of  $V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$  and for any  $N \in \mathbb{N}^*$ , let  $\mathcal{H}_q^N$  be defined as in (1.5). If  $E \supset \mathcal{H}_q^3$ , then  $E_{\infty} \supset \mathcal{H}_q^N$ , for any  $N \in \mathbb{N}$ ,  $N \geq 3$ .

> **Proof.** Inspired by the argument of [[25], Theorem 2.5], we will prove Theorem 5.4 by recurrence that, if  $E = E_0 \supset \mathcal{H}_q^3$  then, for any  $k \geq 0$ , we have

eq: E2k (5.13) 
$$
E_{2k} \supset \mathcal{H}_q^{k+3}.
$$

It is evident that for  $k = 0$ , (5.13) is true. Let  $k \ge 1$ . We suppose that, for any  $k' \in \mathbb{N}$ ,  $0 \leq k' < k$ , we have  $E_{2k'} \supset \mathcal{H}_q^{k'+3}$ . In order to prove that (5.13) is true for k, we only need to prove that, for any  $l \in \mathbb{Z}^2 \setminus \{0\}$ ,  $|l| = k + 3$ , we have  $c_l, s_l \in E_{2k}$ .

1. First case: If  $l = (l_1, l_2)$  with  $l_1 \neq 0$  and  $l_2 \neq 0$ . In this case, since  $|l_1| + |l_2| > 3$ , without loss of generality, we can suppose that  $l_1 \geq 2$ . We choose  $m = (l_1 - 1, l_2)$  and  $n = (1, 0)$ . Then, we have

$$
m + n = l
$$
,  $||m||_q > ||n||_q$ ,  $|m| = k + 2$ ,  $|n| = 1$ ,  $|m - n| = k + 1$ 

and  $m, n$  are not parallel in  $\mathbb{R}^2$ . Applying Lemma 5.3, we obtain the existence of

$$
a, b \in Span\{\mathcal{C}_m, \mathcal{C}_n, \mathcal{S}_m, \mathcal{S}_n\} \subset \mathcal{H}_q^{k+2} \subset E_{2k-2}
$$

such that

$$
\mathcal{B}(a)+c_l,\ \mathcal{B}(b)+s_l\in Span\left\{\mathcal{C}_{m-n},\mathcal{S}_{m-n}\right\}.
$$

Thus, there exist

$$
f, g \in Span\{C_{m-n}, S_{m-n}\} \subset \mathcal{H}_q^{k+1} \subset E_{2k-2}
$$

such that

$$
c_l = f - \mathcal{B}(a), \quad s_l = g - \mathcal{B}(b).
$$

Then, using the definition of  $E_{2k-1} = \mathcal{F}(E_{2k-2})$ , we deduce that

$$
c_l, s_l \in E_{2k-1} \subset E_{2k}.
$$

2. Second case: If  $l = (l_1, l_2)$  with  $l_1 = |l| = 3$  and  $l_2 = 0$ . In this case, we choose  $m = (l_1 - 1, 1)$ and  $n = (1, -1)$ . Then, we have

$$
m + n = l, \quad ||m||_q > ||n||_q, \quad |m| = k + 3, \quad |n| = 2, \quad |m - n| = k + 3
$$

and m, n are not parallel in  $\mathbb{R}^2$ . Since all the components of the vectors m, n, m – n are not zero, we can apply the result of the first case and we deduce that

$$
Span\left\{ \mathcal{C}_m, \mathcal{C}_n, \mathcal{S}_m, \mathcal{S}_n \right\} \subset E_{2k-1}
$$

and

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 $Span\{\mathcal{C}_{m-n}, \mathcal{S}_{m-n}\}\subset E_{2k-1}.$ 

Now, applying Lemma 5.3, we obtain the existence of

$$
a, b \in Span\{C_m, C_n, S_m, S_n\} \subset E_{2k-1}
$$

such that

$$
\mathcal{B}(a) + c_l, \ \mathcal{B}(b) + s_l \in Span\left\{C_{m-n}, S_{m-n}\right\} \subset E_{2k-1}.
$$

As in the first case, we can deduce that

$$
c_l, s_l \in \mathcal{F}(E_{2k-1}) = E_{2k}.
$$

Theorem 5.4 is proved.

# 6. Approximate controllability by high-mode controls reduced to approximate controllability by low-mode controls

The goal of this section is to prove the main theorem 1.4 by proving that we can reduce the control of the system (1.1) by high-mode controls to controls in  $\mathcal{H}_q^3$ . Let  $T > 0$ ,  $\varepsilon > 0$  and  $u_0, u_T \in V^4(\mathbb{T}^2)^2$ . We set

$$
\mathcal{U}_0 = u_0 - \alpha \Delta u_0 \quad \text{and} \quad \mathcal{U}_T = u_T - \alpha \Delta u_T.
$$

For any  $t \in [0, T]$ , let

$$
\overline{\mathcal{U}}(t) = \frac{1}{T} \left( I - \alpha \Delta \right) \left( (T - t) u_0 + t u_T \right).
$$

Then,  $\overline{\mathcal{U}}$  is solution of the system (1.6) with

$$
\overline{\mathcal{U}}(0) = \mathcal{U}_0 \text{ and } \eta = \partial_t \overline{\mathcal{U}} + \mathcal{L}\overline{\mathcal{U}} + \mathcal{B}(\overline{\mathcal{U}}) - \mathbb{P}f.
$$

It is clear that

$$
\overline{\mathcal{U}} \in C(0, T, V^2(\mathbb{T}^2)^2)
$$
 and  $\eta \in L^{\infty}(0, T, V^1(\mathbb{T}^2)^2)$ .

Let  $k \in \mathbb{N}^*, k \geq 3$  and let

$$
\eta_k = P_k \left( \partial_t \overline{\mathcal{U}} + \mathcal{L} \overline{\mathcal{U}} + \mathcal{B}(\overline{\mathcal{U}}) - \mathbb{P} f \right),
$$

where  $P_k$  is the projection onto  $\mathcal{H}_q^k$ . Let  $\overline{\mathcal{U}}_k$  be the solution of the system (1.6) with

$$
\overline{\mathcal{U}}_k(0) = \mathcal{U}_0 \quad \text{and} \quad \eta = \eta_k.
$$

Applying Theorem 2.1, we can choose  $k$  so large that

$$
\left\|\overline{\mathcal{U}}_k(T)-\overline{\mathcal{U}}(T)\right\|_{V^1(\mathbb{T}^2)^2}\leq C\left\|\eta_k-\left(\partial_t\overline{\mathcal{U}}+\mathcal{L}\overline{\mathcal{U}}+\mathcal{B}(\overline{\mathcal{U}})-\mathbb{P}f\right)\right\|_{L^2(0,T,V^1(\mathbb{T}^2)^2)}\leq \varepsilon.
$$

Now, Theorem 5.4 implies that  $\mathcal{H}_q^k \subset E_N$ , where  $N = 2(k-3)$ . Now, we set  $\mathcal{U}^N = \overline{\mathcal{U}}_k$ . Applying Theorems 4.1 and 3.1, we can contruct a sequence of controls  $\eta_i \in E_i$ ,  $j \in \{0, ..., N\}$ , and a sequence of solutions  $\mathcal{U}^j$  of the system (1.6) with

$$
\mathcal{U}^j(0) = \mathcal{U}_0 \quad \text{and} \quad \eta = \eta_j,
$$

such that

$$
\left\|\mathcal{U}^{j-1}(T)-\mathcal{U}^{j}(T)\right\|_{V^{1}(\mathbb{T}^{2})^{2}}\leq\frac{\varepsilon}{2^{N-j}},
$$

for any  $j \in \{1, \ldots, N\}$ . Thus,  $\mathcal{U}^0$  is the solution of the system  $(1.6)$  with

$$
\mathcal{U}^0(0) = \mathcal{U}_0 \quad \text{and} \quad \eta = \eta_0 \in E_0 = \mathcal{H}_q^3,
$$

and moreover, we have

$$
\left\| \mathcal{U}^0(T) - \mathcal{U}_T \right\|_{V^1(\mathbb{T}^2)^2} \le \varepsilon + \sum_{j=1}^N \frac{\varepsilon}{2^{N-j}} < 3\varepsilon.
$$

Finally, we set  $u = (I - \alpha \Delta)^{-1} \mathcal{U}^0$ . Then u is the solution of the system (1.1), with

$$
u(0) = u_0
$$
 and  $\eta = \eta_0 \in \mathcal{H}_q^3$ .

Moreover, we have

$$
||u(T) - u_T||_{V^3(\mathbb{T}^2)^2} \le \frac{1}{\min\{1,\alpha\}} ||\mathcal{U}^0(T) - \mathcal{U}_T||_{V^1(\mathbb{T}^2)^2} \le \frac{3\varepsilon}{\min\{1,\alpha\}}.
$$

Theorem 1.4 is proved.

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
