

Parametric study of working conditions of an Organic Rankine Cycle applied to Ocean Thermal Energy Conversion

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Introduction

Ocean Thermal Energy Conversion (OTEC) is an elegant way to provide renewable and non-fluctuating energy. The temperature difference between the cold deepwater and the hot shallow water in tropical areas allows to drive a thermodynamic cycle. However, the range of temperature is very small compared to that of conventional cycles. The Organic Rankine Cycle (ORC) is employed in order to take full advantage of the low temperature difference, because of its simplicity and reliability. The purpose of this study is to show how to achieve the best performance of the ORC considering various objective parameters.

Model of the ORC

The ORC contains four components : a pump, an evaporator, a turbine and a condenser, as shown below :



Simulation results

The inputs are taken from experimental results of the OTEC onshore prototype situated at the IUT of Saint-Pierre, Reunion Island.

External Conditions

- Hot sea water temperature : 27°C
- Cold sea water temperature : 4,9°C
 - Evaporator
 - Overheating: 0,08°C
 - Hot pinch : 5,6°C
 - Condensei
 - Subcooling : 0,17°C
 - Cold pinch : 5,2°C

Pump and Turbine caracteristics

- Pump isentropic efficiency : 0,7
- Turbine isentropic efficency: 0,85

Working fluid Choice of the working fluid-Production needs



3. OTEC onshore prototype

Outputs :

State variables at each point (Temperature, Pressure, Specific enthalpy, Specific entropy)
Mass flow rate
Heat transfer rate inside the exchangers
Work in the pump and the turbine
Overall thermal efficiency

* For some kinds of fluids, the state at the leaving of the turbine is biphasic, so the cooling phase doesn't happen, and we have (5)= (6).





Conclusion and perspectives

The results show that, considering the needed mass flow rate to reach the net output work, ammonia is clearly the most performing working fluid. However, when considering the thermal efficiency, the differences between the working fluids aren't significant. In order to compare this working fluids, we can also take account of the working pressures or the environmental impacts of each fluids. So, a study have to be completed to show witch objective or multiobjective parameter best fits to the characterization of the performance of ORC applied to OTEC.
