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A farm level tool coupling farm, cropland and grassland models to assess the effect of farming practices on reactive nitrogen emissions and greenhouse gas balance and to define mitigation strategies

Context

Agricultural systems, especially livestock systems, are a large source of emissions of greenhouse gas (nitrous oxide N_2O , methane CH_4 , carbon dioxide CO_2) and reactive nitrogen (ammonia NH_3 , nitrogen oxides NO_x , nitrates NO_3^-) in Europe. A lot of mitigation options have been suggested in the literature, but they have mainly focused on a single gas and have generally dealt with isolated processes. An approach at the whole farm system is needed to account for several options at the same time.

Objectives

- To develop an integrated modelling tool to assess the effect of farm practices on reactive nitrogen emissions, the greenhouse gas (GHG) balance and carbon sequestration at the whole farm level
- To assess the contribution of a mechanistic crop model instead of crop emission factors to simulate nitrogen emissions and the GHG balance
- To use this modelling tool to assess the impact of mitigation options on the farm GHG balance

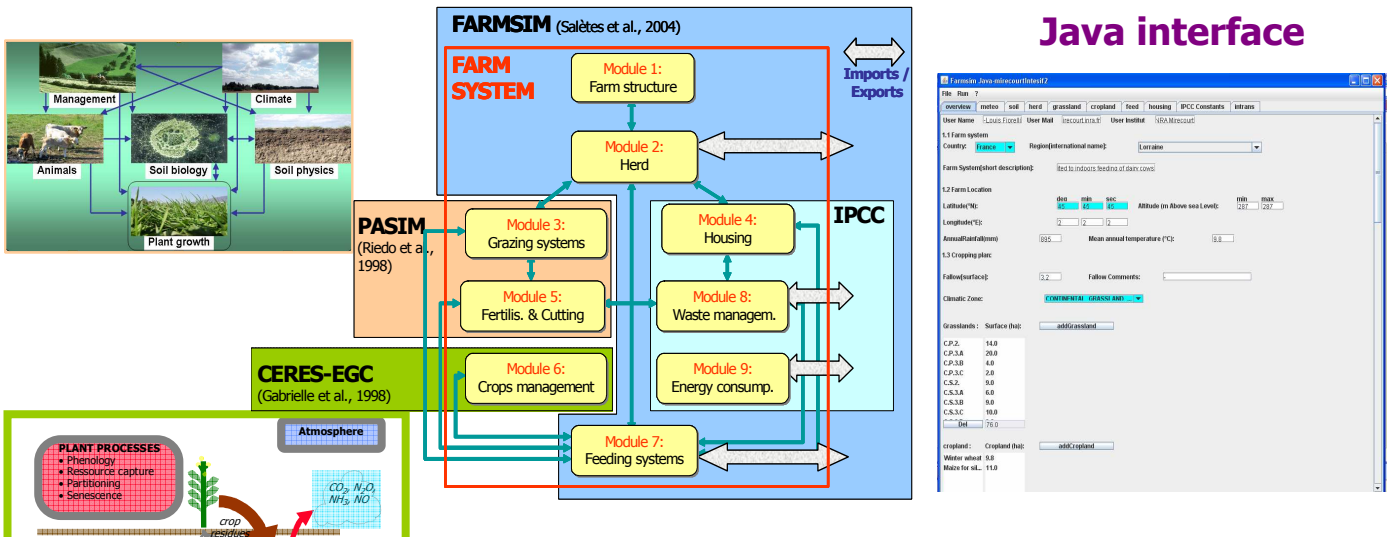
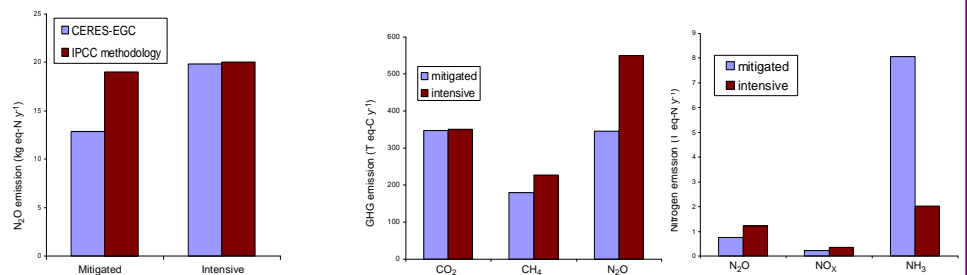


Illustration of the coupled model behaviour

Comparing intensive and mitigated farming systems



The Mirecourt farm

(north-east France, GREENGRASS network)

- Re-building of a crop livestock system from description of farming practices within an intensive dairy farm
- Conception of a mitigated farming system:
 - reducing fertiliser supply
 - changing pasture composition
 - changing the cropping system for self-sufficiency
 - reducing stocking rate
 - reducing steer production

Conclusions - Perspectives

- Further assess the capability of the FARMSIM/PASIM/CERES-EGC model to predict nitrogen and carbon fluxes at the farm level
- To analyse the sensitivity of model outputs (e.g., the farm greenhouse gas balance) to model parameters
- To assess the impact of mitigation options (e.g., various scenarios of N management) on farm GHG balance
- To compare different farm operating systems using scenarios on several years
