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# Abelianization of Subgroups of Reflection Groups and their Braid Groups; an Application to Cohomology

#### Abstract

The final result of this article gives the order of the extension  as an element of the cohomology group $H^{2}(W, P /[P, P])$ (where $B$ and $P$ stands for the braid group and the pure braid group associated to the complex reflection group $W$ ). To obtain this result, we first refine Stanley-Springer's theorem on the abelianization of a reflection group to describe the abelianization of the stabilizer $N_{H}$ of a hyperplane $H$. The second step is to describe the abelianization of big subgroups of the braid group $B$ of $W$. More precisely, we just need a group homomorphism from the inverse image of $N_{H}$ by $p$ (where $p: B \rightarrow W$ is the canonical morphism) but a slight enhancement gives a complete description of the abelianization of $p^{-1}\left(W^{\prime}\right)$ where $W^{\prime}$ is a reflection subgroup of $W$ or the stabilizer of a hyperplane. We also suggest a lifting construction for every element of the centralizer of a reflection in $W$.


## 1 Introduction

Let us start with setting the framework. Let $V$ be a finite dimensional complex vector space; a reflection is a non trivial finite order element $s$ of $\mathrm{GL}(V)$ which pointwise fixes a hyperplane of $V$, called the hyperplane of $s$. The line of $s$ is the one dimensional eigenspace of $s$ associated to the non trivial eigenvalue of $s$. Let $W \subset \mathrm{GL}(V)$ be a (complex) reflection group that is to say a finite group generated by reflections. We denote by $\mathscr{S}$ the set of reflections of $W$ and $\mathscr{H}$ the set of hyperplanes of $W$ :

$$
\mathscr{S}=\{s \in W, \quad \text { codimKer }(s-\mathrm{id})=1\} \quad \text { and } \quad \mathscr{H}=\{\operatorname{Ker}(s-\mathrm{id}), \quad s \in \mathscr{S}\} .
$$

For a reflection group, we denote by $V^{\mathrm{reg}}=V \backslash \cup_{H \in \mathscr{H}} H$ the set of regular vectors. According to a classical result of Steinberg [12, Corollary 1.6], $V^{\text {reg }}$ is precisely the set of vectors that no non trivial element of $W$ fixes. Thus, the canonical map $\pi: V^{\text {reg }} \rightarrow V^{\text {reg }} / W$ is a Galois covering. So let us fix a base point $x_{0} \in V^{\text {reg }}$ and denote by $P=\pi_{1}\left(V^{\mathrm{reg}}, x_{0}\right)$ and $B=\pi_{1}\left(V^{\mathrm{reg}} / W, \pi\left(x_{0}\right)\right)$ the fundamental groups of $V^{\text {reg }}$ and its quotient $V^{\text {reg }} / W$, we obtain the short exact sequence

$$
\begin{equation*}
1 \longrightarrow P \longrightarrow B \xrightarrow{p} W \longrightarrow 1 \tag{1}
\end{equation*}
$$

The groups $B$ and $P$ are respectively called the braid group and the pure braid group of $W$.
The final result of this article (Corollary 27) gives the order of the extension

$$
1 \longrightarrow P /[P, P] \xrightarrow{j} B /[P, P] \xrightarrow{p} W \longrightarrow 1
$$

as an element of the cohomology group $H^{2}(W, P /[P, P])$. This order turns out to be the integer $\kappa(W)$ defined by Marin in [9]. As explained in [9], this integer is linked to the periodicity of the monodromy representation of $B$ associated to the action of $W$ on its set of hyperplanes.

To obtain this result, we first describe in section 2 the abelianization of some subgroups of complex reflection groups. Specifically, we study the stabilizer of a hyperplane $H$ which is the same as the centralizer of a reflection of hyperplane $H$. Contrary to the case of Coxeter groups, this is not a reflection subgroup of the complex reflection group $W$ in general. The first step is to refine Stanley-Springer's theorem [13] [14] on the abelianization of a reflection group (see Proposition 6 in Section 2).

The rationale also relies on a good description (Section 3) of abelianization of various types of big subgroups of the braid group $B$ of $W$ (here "big" stands for "containing the pure braid group $P$ "). Though we just need to construct a group homomorphism from the inverse image of the stabilizer of $H$ by $p$ with values in $\mathbb{Q}$ (see Definition 19 and Proposition 23), we give in fact a complete description of the abelianization of $p^{-1}\left(W^{\prime}\right)$ with $W^{\prime}$ a reflection subgroup of $W$ or the stabilizer of a hyperplane (Proposition 15 and Proposition 24). We also suggest a lifting construction for every element of the centralizer of a reflection in $W$ generalizing the construction of the generator of monodromy of [4, p.14] (see Remark 21).

Orbits of hyperplanes and ramification index are gathered in tables in the last section.

We finish the introduction with some notations. We fix a $W$-invariant hermitian product on $V$ denoted by $\langle\cdot, \cdot\rangle$ : orthogonality will always be relative to this particular hermitian product. We denote by $S\left(V^{*}\right)$ the symmetric algebra of the dual of $V$ which is also the polynomial functions on $V$.
Notation 1 - Around a Hyperplane of $W$. For $H \in \mathscr{H}$,

- one chooses $\alpha_{H} \in V^{*}$ a linear form with kernel $H$;
- one sets $W_{H}=\operatorname{Fix}_{W}(H)=\{g \in W, \quad \forall x \in H, \quad g x=x\}$. This is a cyclic subgroup of $W$. We denote by $e_{H}$ its order and by $s_{H}$ its generator with determinant $\zeta_{H}=\exp \left(2 i \pi / e_{H}\right)$. Except for identity, the elements of $W_{H}$ are precisely the reflections of $W$ whose hyperplane is $H$. The reflection $s_{H}$ is called the distinguished reflection for $H$ in $W$.

For $n$ a positive integer, we denote by $\mathbb{U}_{n}$ the group of the $n^{\text {th }}$ root of unity in $\mathbb{C}$ and by $\mathbb{U}$ the group of unit complex numbers. For a group $G$, we denote by $[G, G]$ the commutator subgroup of $G$ and by $G^{\text {ab }}=G /[G, G]$ the abelianization of $G$.

## 2 Abelianization of Subgroups of Reflection Groups

Stanley-Springer's Theorem (see [13, Theorem 4.3.4][14, Theorem 3.1]) gives an explicit description of the group of linear characters of a reflection group using the conjugacy classes of hyperplanes. Naturally, it applies to all reflection subgroups of a reflection group and in particular to parabolic subgroups thanks to Steinberg's theorem [12, Theorem 1.5]. But since $P /[P, P]$ is the $\mathbb{Z} W$ permutation module defined by the hyperplanes of $W$, we are interested in the stabilizer of a hyperplane which is not in general a reflection subgroup of $W$. So we have to go deeper in the study of the stabilizer of a hyperplane.

Before starting our study of the stabilizer of a hyperplane, we write down Stanley-Springer's Theorem because we will use it many times.
Theorem 2 - Stanley-Springer's Theorem. For every map $n: \mathscr{H} \rightarrow \mathbb{N}$ constant on the $W$-orbits of $\mathscr{H}$, there exists a linear character $\chi: W \rightarrow \mathbb{C}^{\times}$such that $\chi\left(s_{H}\right)=\operatorname{det}\left(s_{H}\right)^{-n_{H}}$.

Moreover, the $\chi$-isotypic component of $S\left(V^{*}\right)$ is a free $S\left(V^{*}\right)^{W}$-module of rank 1 generated by

$$
Q_{\chi}=\prod_{H \in \mathscr{H}} \alpha_{H}^{n_{H}}
$$

where the $n_{H}$ are related to $\chi$ by the formula above and satisfy the relations $0 \leqslant n_{H} \leqslant e_{H}-1$.
For $H \in \mathscr{H}$, we set

$$
N_{H}=\{w \in W, \quad w H=H\}=\left\{w \in W, \quad w s_{H}=s_{H} w\right\}
$$

the stabilizer of $H$ which is also the centralizer of $s_{H}$. We denote by $D=H^{\perp}$ the line of $s_{H}$ (or of every reflection of $W$ with hyperplane $H$ ) it is the unique $N_{H}$-stable line of $V$ such that $H \oplus D=V$ and $N_{H}$ is also the stabilizer of $D$ (see [3, Proposition 1.19]). We denote the parabolic subgroup associated to $D$ by $C_{H}=\{w \in W, \quad \forall x \in D, w x=x\}$.

Since $D$ is a line stable by every element of $N_{H}$ and $W_{H} \subset N_{H}$, there exists an integer $f_{H}$ such that $e_{H} \mid f_{H}$ and the following sequence is exact

$$
\begin{equation*}
1 \longrightarrow C_{H} \xrightarrow{i} N_{H} \xrightarrow{r} \mathbb{U}_{f_{H}} \longrightarrow 1 \tag{2}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $i$ is the natural inclusion and $r$ denote the restriction to $D$. We define $r$ to be the natural linear character of $N_{H}$.

Before stating our main result on the abelianization of the stabilizer of a hyperplane, let us start with a straightforward lemma.
Lemma 3 - Abelianization of an exact sequence. Let us consider the following exact sequence of groups where $M$ is an abelian group.

$$
1 \longrightarrow C \xrightarrow{i} N \xrightarrow{r} M \longrightarrow 1
$$

Then the following sequence is exact

$$
C^{\mathrm{ab}} \xrightarrow{i^{\mathrm{ab}}} N^{\mathrm{ab}} \xrightarrow{r^{\mathrm{ab}}} M \longrightarrow 1
$$

Moreover the map $i^{\text {ab }}$ is injective if and only if $[N, N]=[C, C]$. When $C^{\text {ab }}$ and $M$ are finite, the injectivity of $i^{\mathrm{ab}}$ is equivalent to $\left|C^{\mathrm{ab}}\right||M|=\left|N^{\mathrm{ab}}\right|$.

We also have the following criterion : the map $i^{\mathrm{ab}}$ is injective if and only if the canonical restriction map $\operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{gr} .}\left(N, \mathbb{C}^{\times}\right) \rightarrow \operatorname{Hom}_{\mathrm{gr} .}\left(C, \mathbb{C}^{\times}\right)$is surjective.

Proof. The first injectivity criterion is an easy diagram chasing computation. The second one is trivial. Let us focus on the third one. Since $\mathbb{C}^{\times}$is a commutative group, we have the following commutative square whose vertical arrows are isomorphisms


Moreover, since $\mathbb{C}^{\times}$is a divisible abelian group, $i^{\text {ab }}$ is injective if and only if $o i^{\text {ab }}$ is surjective.
Before applying the preceding lemma to the stabilizer of a hyperplane, let us introduce a definition and a classical linear algebra lemma.
Definition 4 - Commuting hyperplanes. Let $H, H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H}$. We say that $H$ and $H^{\prime}$ commute if $s_{H}$ and $s_{H^{\prime}}$ commute.

We denote by $\mathscr{H}_{H}$ the set of hyperplanes which commute with $H$ and $\mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime}=\mathscr{H}_{H} \backslash\{H\}$.
The next lemma on commuting hyperplanes is stated in [3, Lemma 1.7].
Lemma 5 We have the following equivalent characterizations:
(i) the hyperplanes $H$ and $H^{\prime}$ commute
(ii) $H=H^{\prime}$ or $D=H^{\perp} \subset H^{\prime}$
(iii) every reflection of $W$ with hyperplane $H$ commutes with every reflection of $W$ with hyperplane $H^{\prime}$
(iv) there exists a reflection of $W$ with hyperplane $H$ which commutes with a reflection of $W$ with hyperplane $H^{\prime}$

As a consequence of Lemma 3, we are now able to formulate the following proposition.
Proposition 6 - Abelianization of the stabilizer of a hyperplane. For a hyperplane $H \in \mathscr{H}$, the following sequence is exact

$$
C_{H}^{\mathrm{ab}} \xrightarrow{i^{\mathrm{ab}}} N_{H}^{\mathrm{ab}} \xrightarrow{r^{\mathrm{ab}}} \mathbb{U}_{f_{H}} \longrightarrow 1
$$

Moreover, we have the following geometric characterization of the injectivity of $i^{\mathrm{ab}}$ : the map $i^{\mathrm{ab}}$ is injective if and only if the orbits of the hyperplanes commuting with $H$ under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are the same.

Proof. Steinberg's theorem and Lemma 5 (ii) ensure us that $C_{H}$ is the reflection subgroup of $W$ generated by the $s_{H^{\prime}}$ for $H^{\prime} \neq H$ commuting with $H$. Thanks to Theorem 2 we are able to describe the linear characters of $C_{H}$. For every linear character $\delta$ of $C_{H}$, there exists integers $e_{\mathcal{O}}$ for $\mathcal{O} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime} / C_{H}$ such that the polynomial

$$
Q_{\delta}=\prod_{\mathcal{O} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime} / C_{H}} \prod_{H^{\prime} \in \mathcal{O}} \alpha_{H^{\prime}}^{e_{O}} \in S\left(V^{*}\right)
$$

verifies $g Q_{\delta}=\delta(g) Q_{\delta}$ for every $g \in C_{H}$.
Let us assume that the orbits of the hyperplanes commuting with $H$ under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are the same. For every $g \in N_{H}$ and every $\mathcal{O} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime} / C_{H}$, there exists $\lambda_{g} \in \mathbb{C}^{\times}$such that

$$
g \prod_{H^{\prime} \in \mathcal{O}} \alpha_{H^{\prime}}=\lambda_{g} \prod_{H^{\prime} \in \mathcal{O}} \alpha_{H^{\prime}}
$$

So we obtain that, for every $g \in N_{H}$, there exists $\mu_{g} \in \mathbb{C}^{\times}$such that $g Q_{\delta}=\mu_{g} Q_{\delta}$. Thus every linear character of $C_{H}$ extends to $N_{H}$ and Lemma 3 tells us that the map $i^{\text {ab }}$ is injective.

Let us assume now that every linear character of $C_{H}$ extends to $N_{H}$. The orbit of $H$ under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ is $\{H\}$. So let us consider an orbit $\mathcal{O} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime} / C_{H}$. We define

$$
Q=\prod_{H^{\prime} \in \mathcal{O}} \alpha_{H^{\prime}} \in S\left(V^{*}\right)
$$

Thanks to Theorem 2 $Q$ define a linear character $\chi$ of $C_{H}$ : for every $c \in C_{H}$, there exists $\chi(c) \in \mathbb{C}^{\times}$such that $c Q=\chi(c) Q$ for every $c \in C_{H}$. We then consider the $N_{H}$-submodule $M$ of $S\left(V^{*}\right)$ generated by $Q$. As a vector space, $M$ is generated by the family $(n Q)_{n \in N_{H}}$. But, since $C_{H}$ is normal in $N_{H}$, we obtain for $c \in C_{H}$,

$$
c n Q=n n^{-1} c n Q=n \chi\left(n^{-1} c n\right) Q .
$$

Since $\chi$ extends to $N_{H}$, we have $\chi\left(n^{-1} c n\right)=\chi(c)$ and then $c n Q=\chi(c) n Q$. Theorem 2 allows us to conclude that $n Q=\lambda_{n} Q$ for some $\lambda_{n} \in \mathbb{C}^{\times}$. Since $S\left(V^{*}\right)$ is a UFD, we obtain that $\mathcal{O}$ is still an orbit under $N_{H}$.

Remark 7 - Commuting Orbits. The orbits of the hyperplanes commuting with $H$ under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are the same for every hyperplane $H$ of every complex reflection group except the hyperplanes of the exceptional group $G_{25}$ and the hyperplanes $H_{i}(1 \leqslant i \leqslant r)$ of the group $G(d e, e, r)$ when $r=3$ and $e$ is even (see section 5 for the notations).

In Section 5 , we give tables for the various orbits of hyperplanes for the infinite series $G(d e, e, r)$. For the exceptional complex reflection groups, we check the injectivity or non-injectivity of $i^{\text {ab }}$ using the package CHEVIE of GAP [6] 8].

For a hyperplane $H \in \mathscr{H}$, the comparison of $e_{H}$ and $f_{H}$ leads to the following definition.
Definition 8 - Ramification at a hyperplane. We define $d_{H}=f_{H} / e_{H}$ to be the index of ramification of $W$ at the hyperplane $H$. We say that $W$ is unramified at $H$ if $d_{H}=1$.

We say that an element $w \in N_{H}$ such that $r(w)=\exp \left(2 i \pi / f_{H}\right)$ realizes the ramification.
Remark 9 - The Coxeter Case. When $H$ is an unramified hyperplane, we have $N_{H}=C_{H} \times W_{H}$ which is generated by reflections thanks to Steinberg's theorem [12, Theorem 1.5] and $s_{H}$ realizes the ramification. Moreover $i^{\mathrm{ab}}$ is trivially injective.

In a Coxeter group, every hyperplane is unramified. Indeed, the eigenvalue on the line $D$ of an element of $N_{H}$ is a finite order element of the field of the real numbers.

Remark 10 - The 2-dimensional Case. When $W$ is a 2-dimensional reflection group, $N_{H}$ is an abelian group and $i=i^{\mathrm{ab}}$ is injective.

In section 5, we give tables for the values of $e_{H}, f_{H}$ and $d_{H}$ for every hyperplane of every complex reflection groups. From these tables, we obtain the following remarks.
Remark 11 - Unramified $G(d e, e, r)$. All the hyperplanes of $G(d e, e, r)$ are unramified only when $r=1$ or when $G(d e, e, r)$ is a Coxeter group (that is to say if $d=2$ and $e=1$ and $r \geqslant 2$ (Coxeter group of type $B_{r}$ ) or if $d=1$ and $e=2$ and $r \geqslant 3$ (Coxeter group of type $D_{r}$ ) or if $d=1$ and $e=1$ and $r \geqslant 3$ (Coxeter group of type $\left.A_{r-1}\right)$ of if $d=1$ and $r=2$ (Coxeter group of type $\left.I_{2}(e)\right)$.

Remark 12 - Unramified exceptional groups. The only non Coxeter groups for which every hyperplane is unramified are $G_{8}, G_{12}$ and $G_{24}$.

Remark 13 - Generating Set. Since $C_{H}$ is the parabolic subgroup associated to $D$, it is generated by the reflections it contains (this is Steinberg's theorem). Moreover, if $w_{H} \in N_{H}$ realizes the ramification. Then, the exact sequence (2) tells us that $N_{H}$ is generated by $w_{H}$ and the family of $s_{H^{\prime}}$ such that $H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime}$.

## 3 Abelianization of Subgroups of Braid Groups

In this section, we describe abelianizations of subgroups of $B$ containing $P$ that is to say of inverse images of subgroups $W^{\prime}$ of $W$. Explicitly, we are able to give a complete description of $p^{-1}\left(W^{\prime}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ if $W^{\prime}$ is a reflection subgroup (Proposition 15) or if $W^{\prime}$ is the stabilizer of a hyperplane under geometrical assumptions on the hyperplane (Proposition 24 . We also construct a particular linear character of $p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)$ lifting the natural linear character $r$ of $N_{H}$ which is of importance for the next section (Definition 19).

Our method is similar to the method of [4] for the description of $B^{\text {ab }}$ : we integrate along paths invariants polynomial functions. So, we have first to construct invariant polynomial functions and then verify that we have constructed enough of them.

### 3.1 Subgroup Generated by Reflections

In this subsection, we fix $C$ a subgroup of $W$ generated by reflections. We denote by $\mathscr{H}_{C} \subset \mathscr{H}$ the set of hyperplanes of $C$. For $H \in \mathscr{H}_{C}$, then $C_{H}=\{c \in C, \quad \forall x \in H, c x=x\}$ is a subgroup of $W_{H}$ and so generated by $s_{H}{ }^{a_{H}}$ with $a_{H} \mid e_{H}$. For $H \in \mathscr{H} \backslash \mathscr{H}_{C}$, we set $a_{H}=e_{H}$. We then obtain $C=\left\langle s_{H}{ }^{a_{H}}, H \in \mathscr{H}\right\rangle$. For $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / C$ a $C$-class of hyperplanes of $W$, we denote by $a_{\mathcal{C}}$ the common value of $a_{H}$ for $H \in \mathcal{C}$.

The aim of this subsection is to give a description of the abelianization of $p^{-1}(C) \subset B$. For this, we follow the method of [4] and we start to exhibit invariants which will be useful to show the freeness of our generating set of $p^{-1}(C)^{\mathrm{ab}}$.
Lemma 14 - An invariant. We define, for $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / C$,

$$
\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}=\prod_{H \in \mathcal{C}} \alpha_{H}{ }^{e_{H} / a_{H}} \in S\left(V^{*}\right)
$$

Then $\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}$ is invariant under the action of $C$.
Proof. If $\mathcal{C}$ is a class of hyperplanes of $\mathscr{H}_{C}$ then this is an easy consequence of Theorem 2 .

Assume that $\mathcal{C}$ is not a class of hyperplanes of $\mathscr{H}_{C}$. Let us choose a reflection $s$ of $C$ and let $n_{s}$ be the order of $s$. Since $\mathcal{C}$ is not a class in $\mathscr{H}_{C}$, the hyperplane of $s$ does not belong to $\mathcal{C}$. We then deduce that the orbits of $\mathcal{C}$ under the action of $\langle s\rangle$ are of two types.

First type : the orbits of $H \in \mathcal{C}$ such that $s_{H}$ and $s$ commute. Since $s s_{H} s^{-1}=s_{s(H)}$, we then deduce that $s(H)=H$. And so the orbit of $H$ under $\langle s\rangle$ is reduced to $H$. We denote by $H_{s}$ the hyperplane of $s$. Since $H \neq H_{s}$, Lemma 5 tells us that $D=H^{\perp} \subset H_{s}$ and so $s$ acts trivially on $D$ which is identified to the line spanned by $\alpha_{H}$ through the inner product.

Second type : the orbits of $H \in \mathcal{C}$ such that $s_{H} s \neq s s_{H}$. If $s^{i} H=H$ then $s^{i}$ and $s_{H}$ commute and thus, Lemma 5 ensures us that $s^{i}$ is trivial. We then obtain that the orbit of $H$ under $\langle s\rangle$ has cardinality $n_{s}$. So if we denote by $Q$ the following product $\alpha_{H} \alpha_{s H} \cdots \alpha_{s^{n_{s}-1} H}=\lambda \alpha_{H} s \alpha_{H} \cdots s^{n_{s}-1} \alpha_{H}$ with $\lambda \in \mathbb{C}^{\times}$, we have $s Q=Q$.

We then easily obtain $s \alpha_{\mathcal{C}}=\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}$ for every $s \in C$ and so $\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}$ is invariant under the action of $C$.
Before stating the main result of the subsection, we recall the notion of "generator of the monodromy around a hyperplane" as defined in [4, p.14]. For $H \in \mathscr{H}$, we define a generator of the monodromy around $H$ to be a path $s_{H, \gamma}$ in $V^{\text {reg }}$ which is the composition of three paths. The first path is a path $\gamma$ going from $x_{0}$ to a point $x_{H}$ which is near $H$ and far from other hyperplanes. To describe the second path, we write $x_{H}=h+d$ with $h \in H$ and $d \in D=H^{\perp}$, and the second path is $t \in[0,1] \mapsto h+\exp \left(2 i \pi t / e_{H}\right) d$ going from $x_{H}$ to $s_{H}\left(x_{H}\right)$. The third path is $s_{H}\left(\gamma^{-1}\right)$ going from $s_{H}\left(x_{H}\right)$ to $s_{H}\left(x_{0}\right)$. We can now state our abelianization result.
Proposition 15 - Abelianization of subgroups of the braid group. Let $C$ be a subgroup of $W$ generated by reflections. Then $p^{-1}(C)^{\mathrm{ab}}$ is the free abelian group over $\mathscr{H} / C$ the $C$-classes of hyperplanes of $W$.

Explicitly, we have $p^{-1}(C)=\left\langle s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{a_{H}},(H, \gamma)\right\rangle$ (see [4, Theorem 2.18]). For $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / C$, we denote by $\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}^{a_{\mathcal{C}}}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ the common value in $p^{-1}(C)^{\mathrm{ab}}$ of the $s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{a_{H}}$ for $H \in \mathcal{C}$. Then $p^{-1}(C)^{\mathrm{ab}}=\left\langle\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}{ }^{a_{\mathcal{C}}}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}}, \quad \mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / C\right\rangle$. Moreover, for $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / C$, there exists a group homomorphism $\varphi_{\mathcal{C}}: p^{-1}(C) \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}$ such that $\varphi_{\mathcal{C}}\left(\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}^{a_{\mathcal{C}}}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}}\right)=1$ and $\varphi_{\mathcal{C}}\left(\left(s_{\mathcal{C}^{\prime}}^{a_{\mathcal{C}^{\prime}}}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}}\right)=0$ for $\mathcal{C}^{\prime} \neq \mathcal{C}$.

Proof. First of all, Lemma 2.14.(2) of [4] shows that $s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{a_{H}}=s_{H, \gamma^{\prime}}{ }^{a_{H}}$ in $p^{-1}(C)^{\mathrm{ab}}$. Now, for $c \in C$, we choose $x \in p^{-1}(C)$ such that $p(x)=c$. We have $x s_{H, \gamma} x^{-1}=s_{c H, x(c \gamma)}$. So $s_{c H, x(c \gamma)}{ }^{a_{c H}}$ and $s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{a_{H}}$ are conjugate by an element of $p^{-1}(C)$. So, we have

$$
s_{c H, x(c \gamma)}{ }^{a_{c H}}=s_{H, \gamma}^{a_{H}} \in p^{-1}(C)^{\mathrm{ab}}
$$

And then $p^{-1}(C)^{\mathrm{ab}}=\left\langle\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}^{a_{\mathcal{C}}}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}}, \quad \mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / C\right\rangle$.
Let us now show that the family $\left(\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}^{a_{\mathcal{C}}}\right)^{\text {ab }}\right)_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / C}$ is free over $\mathbb{Z}$. We identify $p^{-1}(C)$ with

$$
p^{-1}(C)=\left(\bigsqcup_{c, c^{\prime} \in C} \pi_{1}\left(V^{\mathrm{reg}}, c x_{0}, c^{\prime} x_{0}\right)\right) / C
$$

where $\pi_{1}\left(V^{\mathrm{reg}}, c x_{0}, c^{\prime} x_{0}\right)$ denotes the homotopy classes of paths from $c\left(x_{0}\right)$ to $c^{\prime}\left(x_{0}\right)$ and the action of $C$ on paths is simply the composition.

Since $\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}: V^{\text {reg }} \rightarrow \mathbb{C}^{\times}$is $C$-invariant (Lemma 14 ), the functoriality of $\pi_{1}$ defines a group homomorphism $\pi_{1}\left(\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}\right)$ from $p^{-1}(C)$ to $\pi_{1}\left(\mathbb{C}^{\times}, \alpha_{\mathcal{C}}\left(x_{0}\right)\right)$. Moreover, the map

$$
I: \gamma \longmapsto \frac{1}{2 i \pi} \int_{\gamma} \frac{\mathrm{d} z}{z}
$$

realizes a group isomorphism between $\pi_{1}\left(\mathbb{C}^{\times}, \alpha_{\mathcal{C}}\left(x_{0}\right)\right)$ and $\mathbb{Z}$. The composition of these two maps defines a group homomorphism. We denote it by $\varphi_{\mathcal{C}}$ and we now want to show that $\varphi_{\mathcal{C}}$ verifies the condition stated in the Proposition.

For $H \in \mathcal{C}$ and $\mathcal{C}^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H} / C$, let us compute $\varphi_{\mathcal{C}^{\prime}}\left(s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{a_{H}}\right)$. The path $s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{a_{H}}$ is the composition of three paths. The first one is $\gamma$, the third one is $s_{H} a_{H}\left(\gamma^{-1}\right)$ and the second one is $\eta: t \in[0,1] \mapsto h+\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H} t / e_{H}\right) d$.

Since $\alpha_{\mathcal{C}^{\prime}}$ is $C$-invariant, when we apply $\pi_{1}\left(\alpha_{\mathcal{C}^{\prime}}\right)$, the first part of the path and the third one are inverse from each other. So when applying $I$, they do not appear. We thus obtain

$$
\varphi_{\mathcal{C}^{\prime}}\left(s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{a_{H}}\right)=\frac{1}{2 i \pi} \int_{\alpha_{\mathcal{C}^{\prime}} \circ \eta} \frac{\mathrm{d} z}{z} .
$$

Using the logarithmic derivative, we obtain

$$
\varphi_{\mathcal{C}^{\prime}}\left(s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{a_{H}}\right)=\frac{1}{2 i \pi} \sum_{H^{\prime} \in \mathcal{C}^{\prime}} \frac{e_{H^{\prime}}}{a_{H^{\prime}}} \int_{0}^{1} 2 i \pi \frac{a_{H}}{e_{H}} \frac{\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H} t / e_{H}\right) \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)}{\alpha_{H^{\prime}}\left(h+\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H} t / e_{H}\right) d\right)} \mathrm{d} t
$$

To compute this sum, we regroup the terms according to the orbit of $H^{\prime}$ under $\left\langle s_{H}{ }^{a_{H}}\right\rangle$.
Lemma 5 shows that there are three types of orbits : two types of orbits reduced to one single hyperplane and one other type of orbits corresponding to reflections that do not commute with $s_{H}$.

Let us first study the orbits reduced to one single hyperplane. The first type corresponds to the hyperplane $H$ whose term of the sum is 1 and this term appears if and only if $H \in \mathcal{C}^{\prime}$. The second type corresponds to hyperplanes $H^{\prime}$ such that $D=H^{\perp} \subset H^{\prime}$. The corresponding term of the sum is 0 since $\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)=0$

Let us now study the non trivial orbits. The orbits of $H^{\prime}$ under $s_{H}{ }^{a_{H}}$ is $\left\{H^{\prime}, \ldots, s_{H}{ }^{a_{H}\left(e_{H} / a_{H}-1\right)}\left(H^{\prime}\right)\right\}$. Moreover, since a quotient of the form $\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(x) / \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(y)$ does not depend of the linear form with kernel $H^{\prime}$, we can replace $\alpha_{s_{H}{ }^{k} H^{\prime}}$ by $s_{H}^{k} \alpha_{H^{\prime}}$ to obtain

$$
\begin{gathered}
\frac{\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H} t / e_{H}\right) \alpha_{s_{H}-k a_{H} H^{\prime}}(d)}{\alpha_{s_{H}-k a_{H} H^{\prime}}(h)+\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H} t / e_{H}\right) \alpha_{s_{H}-k a_{H} H^{\prime}}(d)} \\
=\frac{\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H} t / e_{H}\right) s_{H}-a_{H} k}{} \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d) \\
s_{H^{-a_{H}} \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(h)+\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H} t / e_{H}\right) s_{H}-a_{H} k \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)} \\
=\frac{\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H}(t+k) / e_{H}\right) \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)}{\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(h)+\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H}(t+k) / e_{H}\right) \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)} .
\end{gathered}
$$

Considering the sum over the orbit under $\left\langle s_{H}{ }^{a_{H}}\right\rangle$ of $H^{\prime}$, we obtain

$$
\begin{array}{r}
\sum_{k=0}^{e_{H} / a_{H}-1} \int_{0}^{1} \frac{\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H}(t+k) / e_{H}\right) \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)}{\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(h)+\exp \left(2 i \pi a_{H}(t+k) / e_{H}\right) \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)} \mathrm{d} t= \\
\frac{e_{H}}{a_{H}} \int_{0}^{1} \frac{\exp (2 i \pi t) \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)}{\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(h)+\exp (2 i \pi t) \alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)} \mathrm{d} t
\end{array}
$$

Since $x_{H}$ is chosen such that $\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(h) \neq 0$ for $H^{\prime} \neq H$ and $d$ is small, the last term is 0 as the index of the circle of center 0 and radius $\left|\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(d)\right|$ relatively to the point $-\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(h)$.

Remark 16 - Extreme cases. The two extreme cases where $C=1$ and $C=W$ may be found in [4, Prop. 2.2.(2)] and [4, Theorem 2.17.(2)]. In the first case, $p^{-1}(C)=P$ is the pure braid group whose abelianization is the free abelian group over $\mathscr{H}$. In the second case $p^{-1}(C)=B$ is the braid group whose abelianization is the free abelian group over $\mathscr{H} / W$.

Remark 17 The logarithmic derivative shows that for every $\gamma \in p^{-1}(C)$ and $n \in \mathbb{Z}$, we have

$$
\int_{\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}^{n} \circ \gamma} \frac{\mathrm{~d} z}{z}=n \varphi_{\mathcal{C}}(\gamma)
$$

### 3.2 Stabilizer of a hyperplane

Let us recall the notation of Section 2; we consider $H \in \mathscr{H}$ a hyperplane of the reflection group $W$. We denote by $N_{H}$ the stabilizer of $H$ in $W$ and $C_{H}$ the parabolic subgroup of $W$ associated to the line $D=H^{\perp}$. The set of hyperplanes commuting with $H$ is $\mathscr{H}_{H}$ (see Definition 4).

## A GROUP HOMOMORPHISM

The aim of this paragraph is to construct an "extension" of the natural character of $N_{H}$ to the group $p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)$ which will be useful for the third section. We still follow the method of 4] : we construct an invariant function with values in $\mathbb{C}^{\times}$(Lemma 18) and integrate it (Definition 19). To obtain the "extension" properties of the linear character of $p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)$ (Proposition 23), we construct a lifting in the braid group of the elements of $N_{H}$ (Remark 21). This lifting is inspired from the construction of the generator of the monodromy.
| Lemma 18 - An invariant function. The function $\alpha_{N_{H}}=\alpha_{H}^{f_{H}} \in S\left(V^{*}\right)$ is invariant under $N_{H}$.
Proof. This is clear since the line spanned by $\alpha_{H}$ is identified to $D$ through the inner product.
Definition 19 - The group homomorphism. As in the proof of Proposition 15, we write

$$
p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)=\left(\bigsqcup_{n, n^{\prime} \in N_{H}} \pi_{1}\left(V^{\mathrm{reg}}, n x_{0}, n^{\prime} x_{0}\right)\right) / N_{H}
$$

Since $\alpha_{N_{H}}: V^{\text {reg }} \rightarrow \mathbb{C}^{\times}$is $N_{H}$-invariant (Lemma 18), the functoriality of $\pi_{1}$ allows us to define a group homomorphism $\pi_{1}\left(\alpha_{N_{H}}\right)$ from $p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)$ to $\pi_{1}\left(\mathbb{C}^{\times}, \alpha_{N_{H}}\left(x_{0}\right)\right)$. Moreover, the map

$$
I: \gamma \longmapsto \frac{1}{2 i \pi} \int_{\gamma} \frac{\mathrm{d} z}{z}
$$

realizes a group isomorphism between $\pi_{1}\left(\mathbb{C}^{\times}, \alpha_{N_{H}}\left(x_{0}\right)\right)$ and $\mathbb{Z}$. The composition of this two maps defines a group homomorphism $\rho^{\prime}: p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right) \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}$. We also define $\rho=f_{H}^{-1} \rho^{\prime}: p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right) \rightarrow \mathbb{Q}$.

Remark 20 - Center of the braid group of $G_{31}$. In [4, Theorem 2.24], it is shown that the center of the braid group $B$ of an irreducible reflection group $W$ is an infinite cyclic group generated by $\beta: t \mapsto \exp (2 i \pi t /|Z(W)|) x_{0}$ (where $x_{0} \in V^{\text {reg }}$ is a base point) for all but six exceptional reflection groups. In his articles [1] [2], Bessis proves that the result holds for all reflection groups but the exceptional one $G_{31}$.

This remark is a first step toward the case of $G_{31}$ : we show that if $Z B$ is an infinite cyclic group, it is generated by $\beta$. For this, let us consider $H \in \mathscr{H}$ a hyperplane of $G_{31}$ and $\rho^{\prime}$ the group homomorphism defined above. Since $Z B \subset p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right), \rho^{\prime}$ restricts to a group homomorphism from $Z B$ to $\mathbb{Z}$ such that $\rho^{\prime}(\beta)=1$. So if $Z B$ is an infinite cyclic group, it is generated by $\beta$.

Remark 21 - The lifting construction. Let us consider $w \in N_{H}$. We now construct a path $\widetilde{w}$ in $V^{\text {reg }}$ starting from $x_{0}$ and ending at $w\left(x_{0}\right): p(\widetilde{w})=w$. We use the notations of the description of the generators of the monodromy around $H$ : we write $x_{H}=h+d$ with $h \in H$ and $\alpha_{H^{\prime}}(h) \neq 0$ for $H^{\prime} \neq H$ and $d \in D=H^{\perp}$. Since $w \in N_{H}$, we have $w\left(x_{H}\right)=h^{\prime}+\exp \left(2 i k \pi / f_{H}\right) d$ with $h^{\prime} \in H$ and $0 \leqslant k<f_{H}$.

The path $\widetilde{w}$ consists into four parts. As in the case of the generators of the monodromy, the first part is a path $\gamma$ from $x_{0}$ to $x_{H}$ and the fourth path is $w\left(\gamma^{-1}\right)$ from $w\left(x_{H}\right)$ to $w\left(x_{0}\right)$. Let us now describe the second part and the third part. The second part of $\widetilde{w}$ is the path

$$
t \in[0,1] \mapsto h+\exp \left(2 i k \pi t / f_{H}\right) d \in V^{\mathrm{reg}}
$$

The third part is of the form $t \in[0,1] \mapsto \theta(t)+\exp \left(2 i k \pi / f_{H}\right) d$ where $\theta(t)$ is a path in the complex affine line $\mathscr{D}$ generated by $h^{\prime}$ and $h$. It is easy to force the third part of $\widetilde{w}$ to stay in $V^{\text {reg }}$ since its image is contained in the affine line $\exp \left(2 i k \pi / f_{H}\right) d+\mathscr{D}$ which is parallel to the hyperplane $H$ and meets each of the other hyperplanes in a single point : so we just have to avoid a finite number of points in $\mathbb{C}$.

Remark 22 - Generating set. We have seen in Remark 13 that

$$
N_{H}=\left\langle w_{H}, s_{H^{\prime}}, H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}\right\rangle
$$

where $w_{H} \in N_{H}$ is a once and for all fixed element realizing the ramification. It is now an easy consequence of Theorem 2.18 of 4 that

$$
p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)=\left\langle\widetilde{w_{H}}, s_{H^{\prime}, \gamma}, s_{H^{\prime \prime}, \gamma^{\prime}}^{e_{H^{\prime \prime}}}, \quad H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}, H^{\prime \prime} \in \mathscr{H} \backslash \mathscr{H}_{H}, \gamma, \gamma^{\prime}\right\rangle .
$$

It remains to show that the constructed group homomorphism $\rho$ is an "extension" of the natural character of $N_{H}$. More precisely, we have the following proposition.

Proposition 23 - The "extension" property. We have the following commutative square

where $\pi^{\prime}: x \in \mathbb{Q} \mapsto \exp (2 i \pi x)$.
Proof. Using the generating set of $N_{H}$ given in Remark 22 , we only need to show that
(i) $\rho^{\prime}\left(\widetilde{w_{H}}\right)=1$
(ii) $\rho^{\prime}\left(s_{H, \gamma}\right)=f_{H} / e_{H}$
(iii) $\rho^{\prime}\left(s_{H^{\prime}, \gamma}\right)=0$ for $H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime}=\mathscr{H}_{H} \backslash\{H\}$
(iv) $\rho^{\prime}\left(s_{H^{\prime}, \gamma}{ }^{e_{H^{\prime}}}\right)=0$ for $H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H} \backslash \mathscr{H}_{H}$.

As in the proof of Proposition 15, the $\gamma$-part of $s_{H, \gamma}\left(\right.$ resp. $s_{H^{\prime}, \gamma}$ for $H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime}$ and $s_{H^{\prime}, \gamma}{ }^{e_{H^{\prime}}}$ for $\left.H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H} \backslash \mathscr{H}_{H}\right)$ does not appear in the computation of $\rho^{\prime}$. We thus obtain

$$
\rho^{\prime}\left(s_{H, \gamma}\right)=\frac{1}{2 i \pi} \int_{0}^{1} f_{H} \frac{2 i \pi}{e_{H}} \frac{\alpha_{H}\left(\exp \left(2 i \pi t / e_{H}\right) d\right)}{\alpha_{H}\left(h+d \exp \left(2 i \pi t / e_{H}\right)\right)} \mathrm{d} t=f_{H} / e_{H}
$$

For $H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime}$, we set $x_{H^{\prime}}=h^{\prime}+d^{\prime}$ with $h^{\prime} \in H^{\prime}$ and $d^{\prime} \in D^{\prime}=H^{\prime \perp}$. We then obtain

$$
\rho^{\prime}\left(s_{H^{\prime}, \gamma}\right)=\frac{1}{2 i \pi} \int_{0}^{1} f_{H} \frac{2 i \pi}{e_{H^{\prime}}} \frac{\alpha_{H}\left(\exp \left(2 i \pi t / e_{H^{\prime}}\right) d^{\prime}\right)}{\alpha_{H}\left(h^{\prime}+d^{\prime} \exp \left(2 i \pi t / e_{H^{\prime}}\right)\right)} \mathrm{d} t=0
$$

since $\alpha_{H}\left(d^{\prime}\right)=0$ for $H \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime}$. With the same arguments, we obtain for $H^{\prime} \in \mathscr{H} \backslash \mathscr{H}_{H}$

$$
\rho^{\prime}\left(s_{H^{\prime}, \gamma}{ }^{e_{H}}\right)=\frac{1}{2 i \pi} \int_{0}^{1} 2 i \pi f_{H} \frac{\exp (2 i \pi t) \alpha_{H}\left(d^{\prime}\right)}{\alpha_{H}\left(h^{\prime}\right)+\exp (2 i \pi t) \alpha_{H}\left(d^{\prime}\right)} \mathrm{d} t=0
$$

since $d^{\prime}$ is small and $\alpha_{H}\left(h^{\prime}\right) \neq 0$.
For $\widetilde{w_{H}}$, neither the first and fourth part are involved in the computation nor the third one. Moreover, as in the computation of $\rho^{\prime}\left(s_{H, \gamma}\right)$ the second part of $\widetilde{w_{H}}$ gives 1.

## The Stabilizer Case

In this paragraph, we extend the results of Section 2 to the braid group. Namely, since $p: B /[P, P] \rightarrow W$ is a surjective homomorphism, the classical isomorphism theorems give the following short exact sequence

$$
1 \longrightarrow p^{-1}\left(C_{H}\right) \xrightarrow{j} p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right) \xrightarrow{r p} \mathbb{U}_{f_{H}} \longrightarrow 1
$$

which gives rise to the following exact sequence (Lemma 3)

$$
p^{-1}\left(C_{H}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}} \xrightarrow{j^{\mathrm{ab}}} p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}} \xrightarrow{(r p)^{\mathrm{ab}}} \mathbb{U}_{f_{H}} \longrightarrow 1
$$

and Proposition 6 extends to the braid group in the following way.
Proposition 24 - Abelianization in the braid group. If the orbits of the hyperplanes of $\mathscr{H}$ under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are the same, the map $j^{\mathrm{ab}}$ is injective.

Moreover under this hypothesis, $p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ is the free abelian group with basis $\widetilde{w_{H}},\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ for $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime} / C_{H}$ and $\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}^{e}{ }^{e}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}}$ for $\mathcal{C} \in\left(\mathscr{H} \backslash \mathscr{H}_{H}\right) / C_{H}$.

Proof. From Lemma 3, it is enough to show that every linear character of $p^{-1}\left(C_{H}\right)$ with values in $\mathbb{C}^{\times}$extends to $p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)$. But the group of linear characters of $p^{-1}\left(C_{H}\right)$ is generated by the $\exp \left(z \varphi_{\mathcal{C}}\right)$ for $z \in \mathbb{C}$ and $\mathcal{C}$ an orbit of $\mathscr{H}$ under $C_{H}$. So it suffices to show that $\varphi_{\mathcal{C}}$ extends to $p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)$.

Since the orbits of $\mathscr{H}$ under $C_{H}$ and $N_{H}$ are the same, then for every $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / C_{H}$, there exists $n \in \mathbb{N}^{*}$ such that $\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}{ }^{n}$ is invariant under $N_{H}$ (see Lemma 14 for the definition of $\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}$ ). Then Remark 17 shows that

$$
\psi_{\mathcal{C}}: \gamma \in p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right) \longmapsto \frac{1}{n} \int_{\alpha_{\mathcal{C}}{ }^{n} \circ \gamma} \frac{\mathrm{~d} z}{z} \in \mathbb{Q}
$$

is a well defined linear character of $p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)$ extending $\varphi_{\mathcal{C}}$.
Proposition 15 applied to $C_{H}$ ensures us that $p^{-1}\left(C_{H}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ is the free abelian group generated by $\left(s_{\{H\}}^{e_{\{H\}}}\right)^{\text {ab }}$, $\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ for $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime} / C_{H}$ and $\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}^{e \mathcal{C}}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ for $\mathcal{C} \in\left(\mathscr{H} \backslash \mathscr{H}_{H}\right) / C_{H}$. Moreover, we have $\widetilde{w_{H}}{ }^{f_{H}} \in p^{-1}\left(C_{H}\right)$ and, thanks to Remark 17 .

$$
\varphi_{\{H\}}\left({\widetilde{w_{H}}}^{f_{H}}\right)=\frac{1}{f_{H}} \rho^{\prime}\left({\widetilde{w_{H}}}^{f_{H}}\right)=1
$$

We then deduce that the family ${\widetilde{w_{H}}}^{f_{H}},\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ for $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H}_{H}^{\prime} / C_{H}$ and $\left(s_{\mathcal{C}}^{e}\right)^{\text {ab }}$ for $\mathcal{C} \in\left(\mathscr{H} \backslash \mathscr{H}_{H}\right) / C_{H}$ is a basis for $p^{-1}\left(C_{H}\right)^{\text {ab }}$. The short exact sequence

$$
1 \longrightarrow p^{-1}\left(C_{H}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}} \xrightarrow{j^{\mathrm{ab}}} p^{-1}\left(N_{H}\right)^{\mathrm{ab}} \xrightarrow{(r p)^{\mathrm{ab}}} \mathbb{U}_{f_{H}} \longrightarrow 1
$$

gives the result.
Remark 25 - Comparison of orbits. In this remark, we give a list of the hyperplanes for which the orbits of hyperplanes under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are not the same. Of course, we find again in this list the hyperplanes of Remark 7 but we have to add some others.

Let us consider the infinite series (see Section 5 for notations). When $H=H_{i}$, the orbits under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are always the same except when $r=3$ and $e$ is even and when $r=2$ and $e \geqslant 3$. If $H=H_{i, j, \zeta}$, the orbits under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are the same when $d e$ is even and $r \neq 3$ or when $r=3$ and $e \in\{1,3\}$ or when $r=2$ and $d=e=1$.

For the exceptional types, $G_{25}$ is the only case where the commuting orbits under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are not the same. The only exceptional types where the non commuting orbits under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ are not the same are $G_{4}$, the second (named after GAP) class of hyperplanes of $G_{6}$, the first (named after GAP) class of hyperplanes of $G_{13}$ and the third (named after GAP) class of hyperplanes of $G_{15}$.

## 4 An Application to Cohomology

In this section, we apply the preceding constructions and results to obtain a group cohomology result. Specifically, the derived subgroup of $P$ is normal in $B$, so we obtain the following short exact sequence

$$
\begin{equation*}
1 \longrightarrow P /[P, P] \xrightarrow{j} B /[P, P] \xrightarrow{p} W \longrightarrow 1 \tag{3}
\end{equation*}
$$

which induces a structure of $W$-module on $P^{\mathrm{ab}}$. By a classical result on hyperplanes arrangements (see [10] for example), the $W$-module $P^{\text {ab }}$ is nothing else that the permutation module $\mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H}$ and this section describes the extension (3) as an element of $H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H})$ using methods of low-dimensional cohomology.

The rationale breaks down into three steps and each step consists of a translation of a standard isomorphism between cohomology groups in terms of group extensions.
(i) We decompose $\mathscr{H}$ into orbits under $W: \mathscr{H}=\sqcup \mathcal{C}$ and uses the isomorphism

$$
H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H})=\bigoplus_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W} H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathcal{C})
$$

(ii) In each orbit, we set a hyperplane $H_{\mathcal{C}}$ and then $\mathbb{Z C}=\operatorname{Ind}_{N_{\mathcal{C}}}^{W}(\mathbb{Z})$ where $N_{\mathcal{C}}$ is the stabilizer of $H_{\mathcal{C}}$. Shapiro's lemma (see [5, Proposition III.6.2]) then gives us

$$
H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H})=\bigoplus_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W} H^{2}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Z}\right)
$$

(iii) The short exact sequence $0 \rightarrow \mathbb{Z} \rightarrow \mathbb{Q} \rightarrow \mathbb{Q} / \mathbb{Z} \rightarrow 0$ of $N_{\mathcal{C}}$-modules gives a long exact sequence in cohomology. Since $\left|N_{\mathcal{C}}\right|$ is invertible in $\mathbb{Q}$, we have $H^{1}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Q}\right)=H^{2}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Q}\right)=0$ and so we obtain the isomorphism $H^{2}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Z}\right)=H^{1}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Q} / \mathbb{Z}\right)$ and

$$
H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H})=\bigoplus_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W} H^{1}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Q} / \mathbb{Z}\right)=\bigoplus_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W} \operatorname{Hom}_{\text {gr. }}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Q} / \mathbb{Z}\right)
$$

The results of this section are the following proposition and corollary.
Proposition 26 - Description. Under the isomorphism

$$
H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H})=\bigoplus_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W} \operatorname{Hom}_{\text {gr. }}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Q} / \mathbb{Z}\right)
$$

the extension (3) corresponds to the family $\left(r_{\mathcal{C}}: N_{\mathcal{C}} \rightarrow \mathbb{Q} / \mathbb{Z}\right)_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W}$ where $r_{\mathcal{C}}$ is the natural linear character of $N_{\mathcal{C}}$ (we identify $\mathbb{U}_{f_{H_{\mathcal{C}}}}$ with a subgroup of $\mathbb{Q} / \mathbb{Z}$ via the exponential map).

The next corollary is a trivial consequence of Proposition 26 and generalizes a result of Digne [7, 5.1] for the case of Coxeter groups.
Corollary 27 - Order in $H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H})$. Since the order of $r_{\mathcal{C}}$ is $f_{H_{\mathcal{C}}}$, we deduce that the order of the extension (3) is $\kappa(W)=\operatorname{lcm}\left(f_{H_{\mathcal{C}}}, \mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W\right)$ (this integer $\kappa(W)$ was first introduced in [9]).

The rest of the section is devoted to the proof of Proposition 26: one subsection for each of the three steps.

### 4.1 First step : splitting into orbits

The isomorphism

$$
H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H})=\bigoplus_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W} H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathcal{C})
$$

is simply given by applying the various projections $p_{\mathcal{C}}: \mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H} \rightarrow \mathbb{Z C}$ to a 2 -cocycle with values in $\mathbb{Z} \mathscr{H}$ where

$$
p_{\mathcal{C}}: \sum_{H \in \mathscr{H}} \lambda_{H} H \longmapsto \sum_{H \in \mathcal{C}} \lambda_{H} H .
$$

To give a nice expression of the corresponding extensions, we need the following lemma.
Lemma 28 - Extension and direct sum. Let $G$ be a group, $X=Y \oplus Z$ a direct sum of $G$-modules and

$$
0 \longrightarrow X \xrightarrow{u} E \xrightarrow{v} G \longrightarrow 1
$$

an extension of $G$ by $X$. We denote by $q: X \rightarrow Y$ the first projection and $\varphi$ the class of the extension $E$ in $H^{2}(G, X)$. The extension associated to $q(\varphi)$ is

$$
0 \longrightarrow Y \longrightarrow E / Z \longrightarrow G \longrightarrow 1
$$

Proof. Let us denote by $\theta: E \rightarrow E / Z$ the natural surjection and $i: Y \rightarrow Y \oplus Z$ the natural map. Let us first remark that $Z$ is normal in $E$ since $Z$ is stable by the action of $G$. Since $v$ is trivial on $Z$, then it induces a group homomorphism $\widetilde{v}: E / Z \rightarrow G$ whose kernel is $X / Z=Y$. Thus the sequence

$$
\begin{equation*}
0 \longrightarrow Y \xrightarrow{\theta u i} E / Z \xrightarrow{\tilde{v}} G \longrightarrow 1 \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

is an exact one.
If $s: G \rightarrow E$ is a set-theoretic section of $v$, then $\theta s$ is a set-theoretic section of $\widetilde{v}$. The expression of a 2-cocycle associated to an extension in terms of a set-theoretic section gives the result.

For $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W$, we denote by $B_{\mathcal{C}}$ the quotient group

$$
B_{\mathcal{C}}=B /\left\langle[P, P], s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{e_{H}}, \quad H \notin \mathcal{C}\right\rangle
$$

Lemma 28 tells us that the extension (3) is equivalent to the family of extensions

$$
\begin{equation*}
0 \longrightarrow \mathbb{Z} \mathcal{C} \xrightarrow{j_{\mathcal{C}}} B_{\mathcal{C}} \xrightarrow{p_{\mathcal{C}}} W \longrightarrow 1 \tag{5}
\end{equation*}
$$

for $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W$.

### 4.2 Second step : the induction argument

In each orbit $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W$, we choose a hyperplane $H_{\mathcal{C}} \in \mathcal{C}$ and write $\mathbb{Z C}=\operatorname{Ind}_{N_{\mathcal{C}}}^{W}(\mathbb{Z})$ where $N_{\mathcal{C}} \subset W$ is the stabilizer of $H_{\mathcal{C}}$. Shapiro's isomorphism lemma [5, Proposition III.6.2] shows that $H^{2}(W, \mathbb{Z} \mathcal{C})=H^{2}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}, \mathbb{Z}\right)$. Exercise III.8.2 of [5] tells us that in term of 2-cocycles Shapiro's isomorphism is described as follow

$$
S:\left(\varphi: G^{2} \rightarrow \mathbb{Z C}\right) \longmapsto\left(f_{\mathcal{C}} \circ \varphi: N_{\mathcal{C}}^{2} \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}\right)
$$

where $f_{\mathcal{C}}: \mathbb{Z} \mathcal{C} \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}$ is the projection onto the $H_{\mathcal{C}}$-component.
Decomposing Shapiro's isomorphism into the following two steps

$$
\left(\varphi: G^{2} \rightarrow \mathbb{Z C}\right) \longmapsto\left(\varphi: N_{\mathcal{C}}{ }^{2} \rightarrow \mathbb{Z} \mathcal{C}\right) \longmapsto\left(f_{\mathcal{C}} \circ \varphi: N_{\mathcal{C}}{ }^{2} \rightarrow \mathbb{Z}\right)
$$

allows us to interpret it in terms of group extensions. Exercice IV.3.1.(a) of [5] gives a description of the first step : the corresponding extension is given by

$$
0 \longrightarrow \mathbb{Z} \mathcal{C} \longrightarrow p_{\mathcal{C}}^{-1}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}\right) \longrightarrow N_{\mathcal{C}} \longrightarrow 1
$$

since $p_{\mathcal{C}}{ }^{-1}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}\right)$ is the fiber product of $B_{\mathcal{C}}$ and $N_{\mathcal{C}}$ over $W$. Moreover, since $f_{\mathcal{C}}$ is a split surjection as a $N_{\mathcal{C}}$-module map, Lemma 28 gives us the following extension

$$
0 \longrightarrow \mathbb{Z} \longrightarrow p_{\mathcal{C}}{ }^{-1}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}\right) /\left\langle s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{e_{H}}, H \in \mathcal{C} \backslash\left\{H_{\mathcal{C}}\right\}\right\rangle \longrightarrow N_{\mathcal{C}} \longrightarrow 1
$$

Finally, the extension (3) is equivalent to the family of extensions

$$
\begin{equation*}
0 \longrightarrow \mathbb{Z} \longrightarrow B_{\mathcal{C}}^{\prime} \xrightarrow{p_{\mathcal{C}}} N_{\mathcal{C}} \longrightarrow 1 \tag{6}
\end{equation*}
$$

where $B_{\mathcal{C}}^{\prime}=p^{-1}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}\right) /\left\langle[P, P], s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{e_{H}}, H \neq H_{\mathcal{C}}\right\rangle$ and $\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W$.

### 4.3 Third step : linear character

For the third step, we use results and notations of Section 2 and Section 3. Let us consider the group homomorphism $\rho_{\mathcal{C}}: p^{-1}\left(N_{\mathcal{C}}\right) \rightarrow \mathbb{Q}$ of Definition 19. Since it is trivial on $\left\langle[P, P], s_{H, \gamma}{ }^{e_{H}}, H \neq H_{\mathcal{C}}\right\rangle$, it induces a group homomorphism from $B_{\mathcal{C}}^{\prime}$ to $\mathbb{Q}$ still denoted by $\rho_{\mathcal{C}}$. Moreover, since $\rho_{\mathcal{C}}\left(s_{H_{\mathcal{C}}, \gamma}{ }^{e_{H_{\mathcal{C}}}}\right)=1$, Proposition 23 gives the following commutative diagram


Exercises IV.3.2 and IV.3.3 of [5] tell us precisely that the group homomorphism corresponding to (6) is $r_{\mathcal{C}}$. So the extension (3) is equivalent to the family $\left(r_{\mathcal{C}}\right)_{\mathcal{C} \in \mathscr{H} / W}$. This concludes the proof of Proposition 26

## 5 Tables

### 5.1 The infinite series

In this subsection, we bring together tables for the orbits of the hyperplanes of $G(d e, e, r)$ under the centralizer of a reflection and under the parabolic subgroup associated to the line of the reflection and tables for the values of $f_{H}$ and the index of ramification. So let us consider the complex reflection group $G(d e, e, r)$ acting on $\mathbb{C}^{r}$ with canonical basis $\left(e_{1}, \ldots, e_{r}\right)$. The standard point of $\mathbb{C}^{r}$ is denoted by $\left(z_{1}, \ldots, z_{r}\right)$.

The hyperplanes of $G(d e, e, r)$ are $H_{i}=\left\{z_{i}=0\right\}$ for $i \in\{1, \ldots, r\}$ (when $d>1$ ) and $H_{i, j, \zeta}=\left\{z_{i}=\zeta z_{j}\right\}$ for $i<j$ and $\zeta \in \mathbb{U}_{d e}$ (when $r \geqslant 2$ ). They split in general into two conjugacy classes under $G(d e, e, r)$ whose representant may be chosen as follow $H_{1}$ and $H_{1,2,1}$.

Let us continue with more notations. For every triple of integers $d, e, r$, we denote by $\pi: G(d e, e, r) \rightarrow \mathbb{U}$ the following group morphism : for $g \in G(d e, e, r), \pi(g)$ is the product of the nonzero coefficients of the monomial matrix $g$. When $e$ is even, we denote by $e^{\prime}=e / 2$. We denote by $e^{\prime \prime}=e / \operatorname{gcd}(e, 3)$ and by $P$ the set of elements of $\mathbb{U}_{d e}$ with strictly positive imaginary part.

The Case of The hyperplane $H_{1}=\left\{z_{1}=0\right\}$
We then have $d>1$. The stabilizer $N$ of $H_{1}$ is described by

$$
N=\left\{(\alpha, g), \quad g \in G(d e, 1, r-1), \alpha \in \mathbb{U}_{d e},(\pi(g) \alpha)^{d}=1\right\}
$$

and the pointwise stabilizer $C$ of $D_{1}=H_{1}{ }^{\perp}=\mathbb{C} e_{1}$ is $C=G(d e, e, r-1)$. Table 1 gives the orbits of the hyperplanes under $N$ and $C$. In Table 1, C.O. stands commuting orbits and N.C.O. stand for non commuting orbits.

The hyperplane $H_{1,2, \exp (2 i \pi / d e)}$ With $r=2$
We set $\zeta=\exp (2 i \pi / d e)$. The reflection of $G(d e, e, 2)$ with hyperplane $H_{1,2, \zeta}$ is

$$
s=\left[\zeta^{-1}{ }^{\zeta}\right]
$$

The line of $s$ is $D=\mathbb{C}\left(e_{2}-\zeta e_{1}\right)$. The centralizer of $s$ is given by

$$
N=\left\{d_{\lambda}=\left[\begin{array}{c}
\lambda \\
\lambda
\end{array}\right], t_{\lambda}=\left[\begin{array}{c}
\lambda \zeta \\
\lambda \zeta^{-1}
\end{array}\right], \lambda^{2 d}=1\right\} .
$$

The eigenvalue of $t_{\lambda}$ on $D$ is $\lambda$ whereas the eigenvalue of $d_{\lambda}$ on $D$ is $-\lambda$. So the parabolic subgroup $C$ associated to $D$ is $C=\{\mathrm{id},-s\}$. The orbits of hyperplane under $C$ and $N$ are the same. The commuting ones are $\left\{H_{1,2, \zeta}\right\}$ and $\left\{H_{1,2,-\zeta}\right\}$. The non commuting ones are $\left\{H_{1}, H_{2}\right\}$ and $\left\{H_{1,2, \mu}, H_{1,2, \zeta^{2} \mu^{-1}}\right\}$ for $\mu \in \mathbb{U}_{d e} \backslash\{ \pm \zeta\}$.

The hyperplane $H_{1,2,1}=\left\{z_{1}=z_{2}\right\}$
We then have $r \geqslant 2$. The reflection of $G(d e, e, r)$ with hyperplane $H_{1,2,1}$ is the transposition $\tau_{12}$ swapping 1 and 2. Since the elements of $G(d e, e, r)$ are monomial matrices, an element of $G(d e, e, r)$ commuting with $\tau_{12}$ stabilizes the subspace spanned by $e_{1}$ and $e_{2}$. Thus the stabilizer $N$ of $H_{1,2,1}$ is given by

$$
\begin{aligned}
N=\left\{d_{\lambda, g}=\left[\begin{array}{ll}
\lambda & \\
\left.\begin{array}{ll}
\lambda & \\
\hline
\end{array}\right], & t_{\lambda, g}=\left[\begin{array}{ll}
\lambda^{\lambda} & \\
&
\end{array}\right] \\
& \lambda \in \mathbb{U}_{d e}, g \in G(d e, 1, r-2),\left(\pi(g) \lambda^{2}\right)^{d}=1
\end{array}\right\}\right.
\end{aligned}
$$

The line of $\tau_{12}$ is $\mathbb{C}\left(e_{1}-e_{2}\right)$. So the eigenvalue of $d_{\lambda, g}$ on $\mathbb{C}\left(e_{1}-e_{2}\right)$ is $\lambda$ whereas the eigenvalue of $t_{\lambda, g}$ on $\mathbb{C}\left(e_{1}-e_{2}\right)$ is $-\lambda$. Thus, when $d e$ is odd, the parabolic subgroup associated to the line $\mathbb{C}\left(e_{1}-e_{2}\right)$ is given by

$$
C=\left\{\left[\begin{array}{lll}
1 & \mid \\
& 1 & \\
& & g
\end{array}\right], \quad g \in G(d e, e, r-2)\right\}
$$

and when $d e$ is even, the parabolic subgroup associated to the line $\mathbb{C}\left(e_{1}-e_{2}\right)$ is given by

$$
C=\left\{\left[\begin{array}{lll}
1 & 1 \\
\hline & & g
\end{array}\right],\left[\begin{array}{ll}
-1 & -1 \\
\hline & g
\end{array}\right], \quad g \in G(d e, e, r-2)\right\}
$$

Table 2 gives the orbits the hyperplanes of $G(d e, e, r)$ under $N$ and $C$. In Table 2, C.O. stands commuting orbits and N.C.O. stand for non commuting orbits.

## Value for $f_{H}$ and the index of ramification

The computations of the preceding paragraphs also lead to Table 3 which brings together the values of $e_{H}, f_{H}$ and $d_{H}$ for every class of hyperplanes. In Table 3, we set $\zeta=\exp (2 i \pi / d e)$.

We obtain the following errata for the proposition 6.1 of 9 . Let us consider $r \geqslant 2$. For $W=G(d e, e, r)$, we have $\kappa(W)=2 d e$ if $d e$ is odd and $r \geqslant 3$. We have $\kappa(W)=d e$ if ( $d \neq 1$ and $r=2$ and $d e$ even) or ( $r \geqslant 3$ and $d e$ even). We have $\kappa(W)=2 d e$ if ( $d \neq 1$ and $r=2$ and $d e$ odd). We have $\kappa(W)=2$ if $d=1$ and $r=2$ 》

### 5.2 Exceptional types

With the package CHEVIE of GAP [8] [6] , we obtain Table 4 for the values of $e_{H}, f_{H}$ and $f_{H} / e_{H}$ for the hyperplanes of the exceptional reflection groups. In particular, the only non Coxeter groups with only unramified hyperplanes are $G_{8}, G_{12}$ and $G_{24}$. Table 4 can also easily be obtained from the table of 9 for the value of $\kappa(W)$. The first and fifth columns stand for the number of the group in the Shephard and Todd classification. We also write instructions which determines, for a given hyperplane $H$, the orbits of commuting and non commuting hyperplanes under $N_{H}$ and $C_{H}$ which is used to obtain the results of Remark 7 and Remark 25
