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# Environmental assessment of trout production in France: influence of practices and production goals

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- Context an increasing demand for aquatic products and rainbow trouts,
  - a production decreasing, about -2 % per year for the last decade in France,
  - a necessity: developing sustainable trout production systems in a protected environment.

# Materiel and methods: an LCA associated to statistical methods

a survey in 20 fish farming divided in two groups according to the commercial size of fish production is conducted: Pan-size trout farms (11 farms) – large-size trout farms (9 farms)

### An attributional LCA method

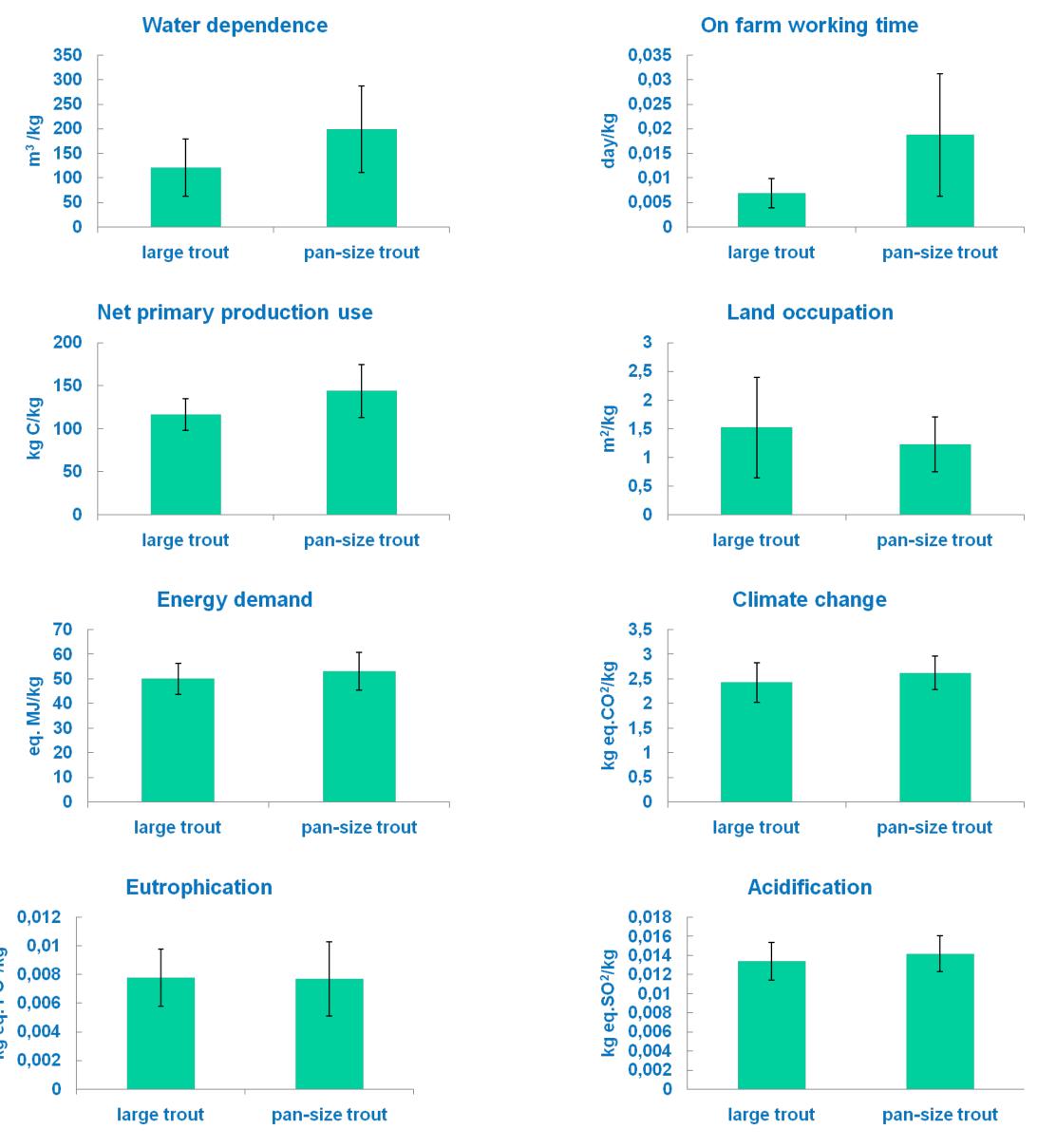
- CML 2 (2001) method,
- eutrophication, acidification, climate change, net primary production use, land occupation, water dependence, total cumulative energy demand + on farm working time recorded.
- functional unit: 1kg of trout at farm gate

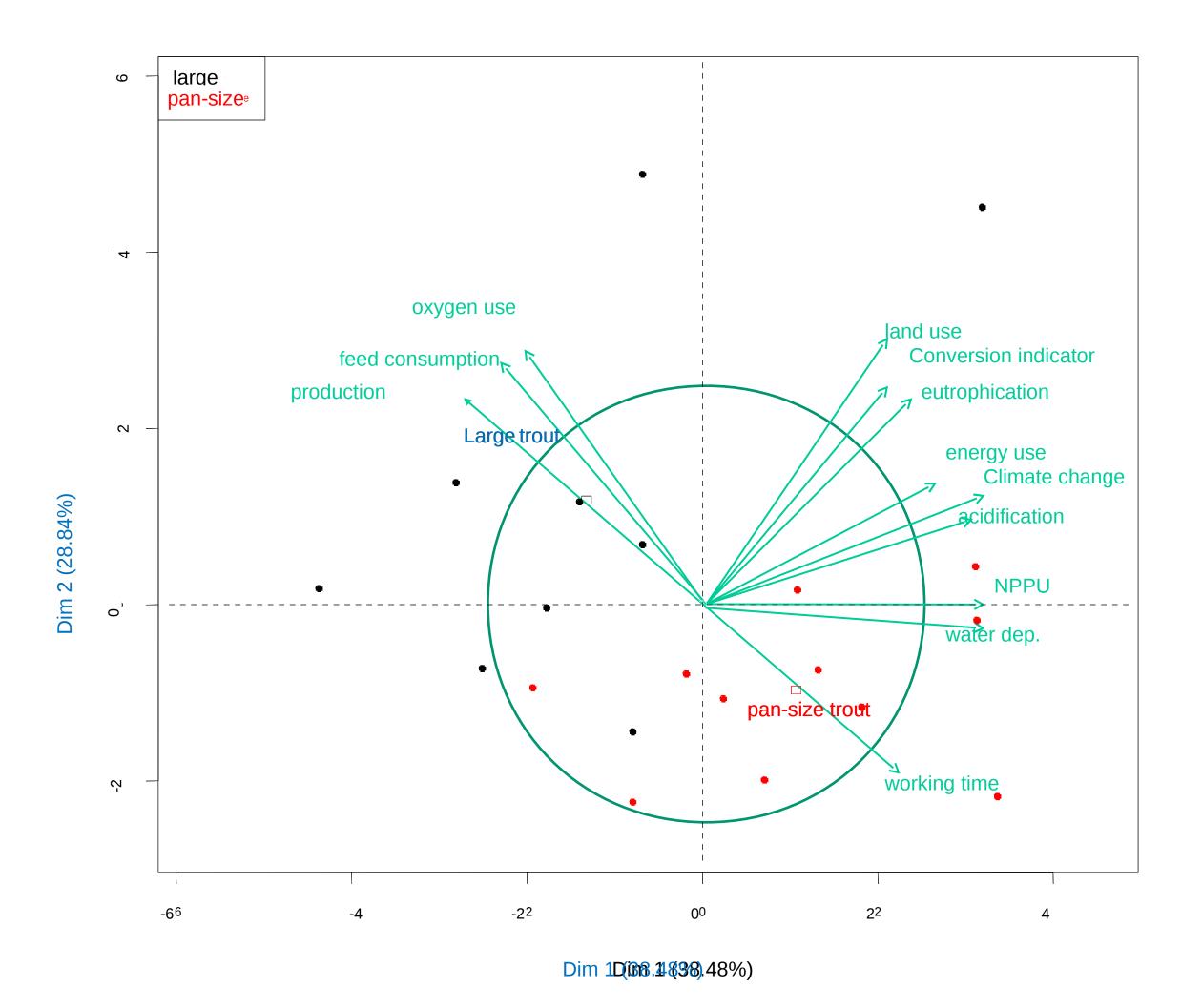
## Statistical analysis

- variance analysis and equality tests,
- Principal Components Analysis (PCA),
- including both economical performances (production) level, feed consumption, oxygen use) and environmental indicators (LCA indicators).

# **Preliminary results:**

## Comparison of impacts between the two groups of fish farms and their position according to PCA





#### Variance analysis and equality tests show

- significant higher levels in the pan-size trout farms for: water dependence, on farm working time and net primary production use,
- but a great variability for: on farm working time, land occupation and water dependence,
- few differences between the two groups for energy demand, climate change, acidification and eutrophication.

#### **PCA** shows

- that production and working time have the greatest influence on the position of each fish farm,
- consequently, large size trout farms have a better position regarding production level and working time,
- however, most of environmental impacts are at the same distance of the two groups except water dependence and net primary production use.

# **Conclusions**

**Association of LCA and statistical analysis:** 

- is adapted to investigate joint economical and environmental performances,
- the study reveals significant few differences between the two groups:
  - large size trout farms seam slightly more efficient than pan-size trout farms
  - higher impact variability in pan size trout farms.

Production objectives (i.e. restocking, recreational angling, consumption) can influence the environmental impacts variability of the production activity. This variability indicates a high potential of system improvement.
