Livestock emissions in France

74% of CH₄ emissions come from agriculture

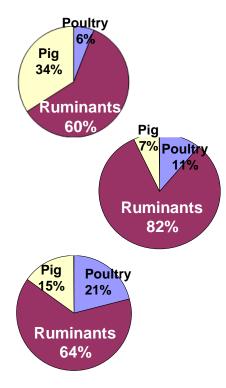
LIVESTOCK: enteric fermentation 48% manure management 24%

78% of N_2O emissions come from agriculture

LIVESTOCK: manure management 9%

97% of NH₃ emissions come from agriculture

LIVESTOCK: manure management 78%



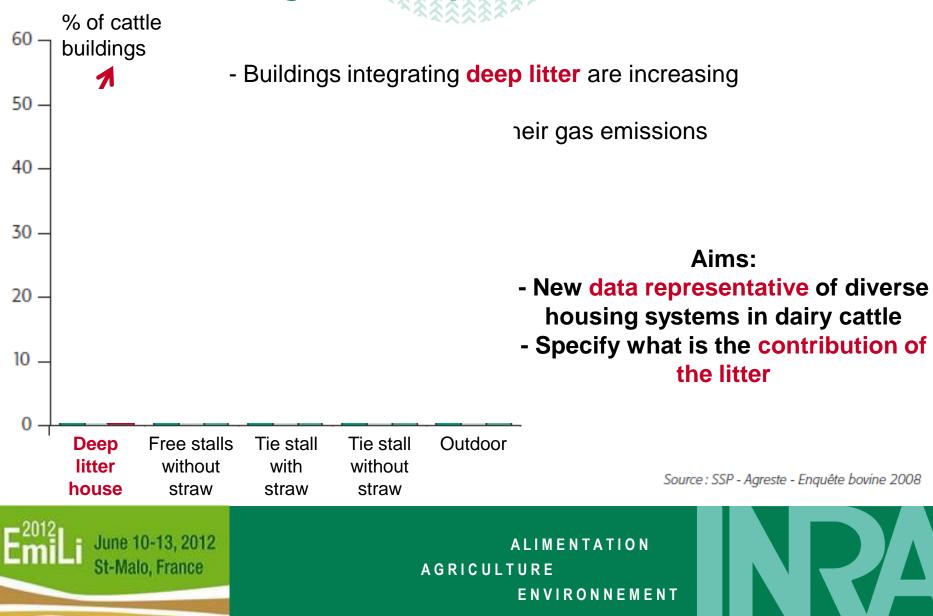

A large diversity of buildings and manure management systems in France

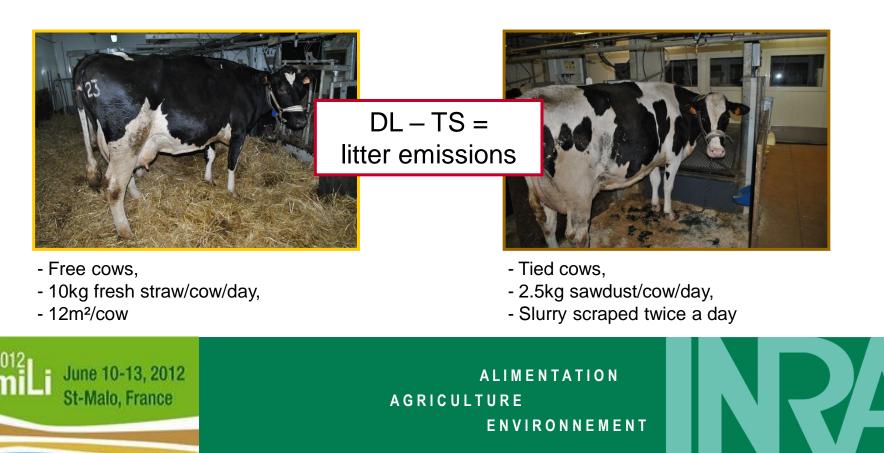




- 2 groups of 3 dairy cattle in late lactation
- > 2 contrasted **housing systems** compared in mechanically ventilated rooms:

Deep Litter => farm-yard manure

Tying Stall => slurry





- 2 groups of 3 dairy cattle in late lactation
- > 2 contrasted **housing systems** compared in mechanically ventilated rooms:

S	Sept	Dec
Periods	Deep litter DL	Tying stall TS
1st period (6 weeks)	group A (n = 3 dairy cattle)	group B (n = 3 dairy cattle)
2nd period (6 weeks)	group B (n = 3 dairy cattle)	group A (n = 3 dairy cattle)

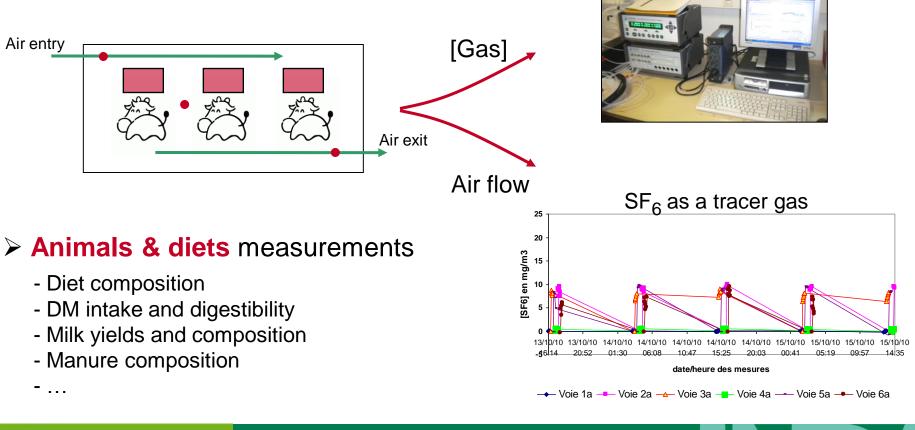




➢ NH₃, CH₄, N₂O, H₂O, CO₂ emission measurements

Continuously 24h/24 for the 2 systems

infra-red photoacoustic analyser INNOVA



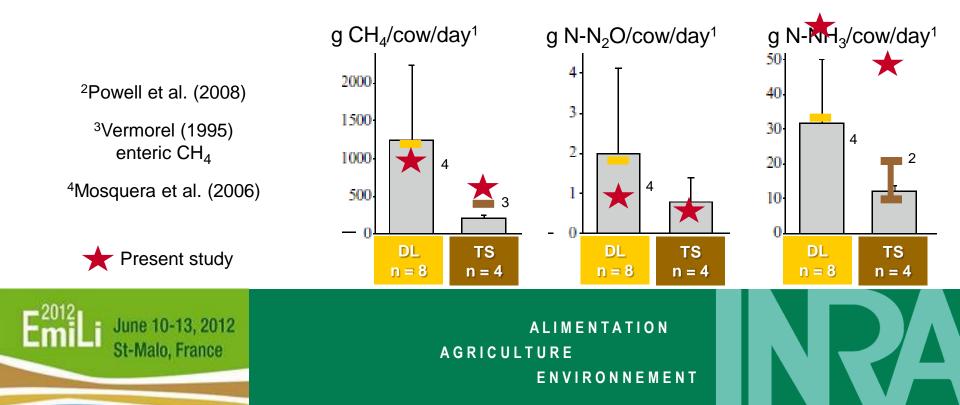


Emissions from contrasted housing systems

System emissions (LU = 500kg)

g/day/LU	DL		TS
C-CH ₄	495 ±12	>	373 _6
N-N ₂ O	0.67 ±0.07	>	0.36 ±0.02
N-NH ₃	46.2 ±1.7	>	37.4 ±1.2

In accordance with Webb et al. (2012)¹



Emissions from contrasted housing systems

- > System emissions => quite high compared to the literature (C-CH₄ and N-NH₃)
 - Over-estimation of ventilation rates?

m³/h/cow		m ³ /h/cow	
	Measured	950 10	1000 m³/h/cow in naturally ventilated buildings, France, Dollé and Robin (2006)
			=> Anemometer?

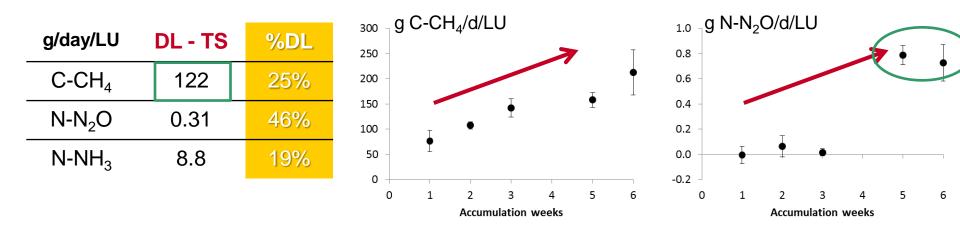
• Over-estimation of gas concentration inside the rooms due to polluted air coming from gutters (especially for tying stall)?

g/day/LU	Before experiment
C-CH ₄	34
N-NH ₃	9

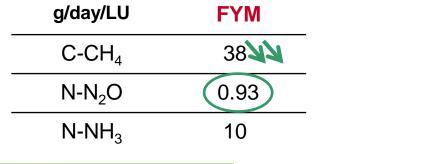


Emissions from contrasted housing systems

Litter direct emissions (with animals)



Farm yard manure emissions after 6 weeks of accumulation (animals out)





=> reduced fermentation and bacterial activity





Conclusions and perspectives

> New emission data representative of French livestock production systems

Deep Litter > Tying Stall

Good for wellfare I Bad for GHG building emissions

Storage and land application?

Better understanding of emitting processes to propose mitigation options

Perspectives: study crossed effects of nutrition and manure management

- Low N diet

Х

Free stall with cubicles => slurry

- High N diet

- Deep litter => farm yard manure

≠ N content/partition in manure

 $\chi \neq$ C/N ratio and manure management = **Gas emissions?**
