





Development of a generator of virtual pigs based on a generic covariance pattern for modelling growth performance to account for variability among individual pigs in deterministic growth models L. BROSSARD^{1,2}, B. VAUTIER^{1,2,3}, J. VAN MILGEN^{1,2} and N. QUINIOU³

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Introduction

Most pig growth models are deterministic and consider only the mean pig and not the group of pigs. Inclusion of variability among individuals in modelling approaches is required to better understand the effects of feeding strategies on mean growth, economic and environmental performance, but also the variability of these traits.



- To analyze growth and intake data of individual pigs from different terminal crossbreeds reared in France

- To obtain, describe and use covariance structure of model parameters, such as those used in InraPorc model
- To propose a generator to create virtual pig populations with realistic variability

Material and methods

Data collection

> Animals:

- 10 batches x 144 gilts and barrows (70 d of age \rightarrow 110 kg)
- 10 sire lines (2 per batch)
- **Feeding level:** *ad libitum* (9.7 net energy (NE)/kg) Measurements • Individual daily feed intake (DFI)
 - Body weight (BW) : every 3 weeks

Data analyses

- Characterization of DFI and BW kinetics for each individual pig by 5 parameters used in InraPorc model:
- BW₇₀: BW at 70 d of age (kg) • PDm: mean protein deposition | BW = f(age) $(70 \text{ d} \rightarrow 110 \text{ kg BW}) (g/d)$ B_{Gompertz}: precocity (/d)



Statistics

> Means of parameters

- **Vector of means**
- Analyses of the effects of crossbreed, sex, batch, and their interactions (proc Mixed, SAS)

> Comparison of covariance matrices

- Method of Flury hierarchy (1988) based on comparison of principal components (PC). Matrices described as unrelated, or with a common PC, or two common PC, etc. If with all common PC, matrices can be proportional or equal
- Comparison depending on crossbreed, sex, batch and combination \rightarrow comparison of 2 to 40 matrices
- Comparison of 40 matrices from groups defined by crossbreed, sex, batch combinations

- DFI = f(BW)• DFI₅₀: NE intake at 50 kg BW
- DFI₁₀₀: NE intake at 100 kg BW Gamma of maintenance

Database: 1288 pigs

Gompertz function



- with a "raw" matrix computed from the 1288 individuals
- with a "median" matrix

= weighted median

of the 40 matrices

Median covariance matrix

Means of parameters

> The mean values of parameters depended on crossbreed, sex and batch > A specific vector of parameter means per group

Covariance matrices

 \geq The covariance structure of parameters differed from one group to another \rightarrow No common structure to generate sets of parameters

Results

- > The median matrix is a better estimator of the observed covariance than the raw covariance matrix for 72% of the 40 group matrices
 - Selected as generic model of covariance matrix

Proposition of a generator of virtual pig populations

➢ Observed distributions of parameters ≠ known laws

Proposal of an adapted multivariate generator

- Observed laws of distribution



- Vector of parameter means

- Median covariance matrix

Transformation to obtain uncorrelated independent laws of distribution

Multivariate generation of X sets of individual parameters

Iterations to avoid unrealistic values and to obtain a population of chosen size
