It is important to characterize the influence of geological structures (lithologies and limestone : packstone to wackstone, tight, porosity only in fractures faults) on karst groundwater flow at regionale scale. Here we describe a multidisciplinary approach that couples **balanced** cross-sections, sedimentological approach, springs monitoring (electric conductivity, temperature, water head), hyclay-rich limestone : nodule, charophyt drochemical analysis, and geophysical properties of rocks. high porosity, low permeability Situated at the boundary between the crystalline Basalt Miocen and the carbonate Provence, the **Toulon** area is Oligocene Late Cretaceo characterized by a geological complexity typically Early Cretaceous influenced by several evolutions. These In these two locations, we observe deep structures that would affect groundwater flow. Fault zones (FZ) represent barrier or transsprings and the Rodheillac wells are the main fer zone, here FZ1 and FZ3 are barriers to groundwater flow with a lift up of the basement = storage zone output of the hydrogeological system. FZ2 is a very transmissive zone with karst features, connected to St Antoine spring (shown by artificial tracer test). In downstream, the water is warmer and more mineralized due to **deep circulation** and **trias signature** (high  $SO_4^{2-}$ ). The difference between temperature and electric conductivity of these two springs is the same in low-water and high-water period.
