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Mean-field Games for Distributed Caching in Ultra-Dense Small Cell Networks

Motivation	Challenges and Contribution
 Exponential growth of mobile video traffic. Limited capacity of wireless networks. Dense deployment of small base stations (SBSs). Capacity-limited and heterogeneous backhaul links. Solution: Distributed caching Predict the popularity of the files. Cache the content at the SBSs ahead of time. 	 Consider the high density of small cell networks. Consider the time-varying dynamics of the storage spaces and channel. Mean-field games Define the download rate n_{k,t} = (n⁽¹⁾_{k,t},, n^(N)_{k,t}) of all the SBSs for each file k. Proof the existence of a mean-field Nash equilibrium.

System Model

- Consider a small cell network (SCN):
 - N SBSs serving users from a set V of V files.
 - Limited allocated backhaul capacity: $B_{k,t}^{(i)}$.
 - Limited storage capacity: o_i .
 - The cost function:

 $\begin{aligned} J_{k,t}^{(i)}(n_{k,t}^{(i)}, \boldsymbol{n}_{k,t}^{(-i)}) = & c_{k,t}^{(i)}(\boldsymbol{n}_{k,t}) + g_t^{(i)}(n_{k,t}^{(i)}) + \nu_i \left[s_{k,t}^{(i)} - q_k \right] \\ &+ \omega_i \left[\sum_{k=1}^V s_{k,t}^{(i)} - o_i \right] \end{aligned}$

Accounting for:

- The inter-SBSs redundancy.
- The in-SBS redundancy.
- The backhaul cost.
- The storage cost.

Stochastic Game Formulation

- The stochastic differential caching game (SDG) is defined by $(\mathcal{N}, (\mathcal{Y}_i)_{i \in \mathcal{N}}, \mathcal{A}_{i \in \mathcal{N}}, (\mathcal{J}_i)_{i \in \mathcal{N}})$ where:
 - \mathcal{N} is the set of players.
 - \mathcal{Y}_i is the set space of SBS *i*'s state $y_{k,t}^{(i)} = (h_t^{(i)}, s_{k,t}^{(i)})$:

 $\begin{cases} dh_t^{(i)} = \frac{\alpha}{2} (\mu - h_t^{(i)}) dt + \sigma_h d\mathcal{B}_t, \\ ds_{k,t}^{(i)} = [n_{k,t}^{(i)} q_k - \beta (1 - p_{k,t}^{(i)}) \bar{\zeta}_t] dt + \sigma_s d\mathcal{B}_t. \end{cases}$

\$\mathcal{A}_i\$ is the set of admissible caching control.
 \$\mathcal{J}_k^{(i)}\$ is the cost function:



Mean-Field Game Formulation

- Substitute all the individual interactions by the mean-field: $m_{k,t} = \frac{1}{N} \sum_{i=1}^{N} \delta_{\pmb{y}_{k,t}^{(i)}}$
- The state $y_{k,t} = (h_t, s_{k,t})$ of a generic SBS can then be given by: $\begin{cases} dh_t = \frac{\alpha}{2}(\mu - h_t)dt + \sigma_h d\mathcal{B}_t, \\ ds_{k,t} = [n_{k,t}q_k - \beta(1 - p_{k,t})\bar{\zeta_t}] dt + \sigma_s d\mathcal{B}_t. \end{cases}$
- Finding the optimal control amounts to solving the coupled system of HJB and Fokker-Planck-Kolmogorov (FPK)

$$\mathcal{J}_{k}^{(i)} = \mathbb{E}\left[\int_{0}^{T} J_{k,t}^{(i)}(n_{k,t}^{(i)}, \boldsymbol{n}_{k,t}^{(-i)}) \,\mathrm{d}t + \psi^{(i)}(\lambda_{T})\right]$$

• Solving the SDG amounts to solving the Hamiltonian Jacobi-Bellman (HJB) equation for all the SBSs $\partial_t v_{k,t}^{(i)}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) + \left[n_{k,t}^{(i)}q_k - \beta(1-p_{k,t}^{(i)})\bar{\zeta}_t\right]\partial_s v_{k,t}^{(i)}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) \\
+ \frac{\alpha}{2}(\mu_h - h_t^{(i)})\partial_h v_{k,t}^{(i)}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) + \frac{\sigma_s^2}{2}\partial_{ss}^2 v_{k,t}^{(i)}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) + \frac{\sigma_h^2}{2}\partial_{hh}^2 v_{k,t}^{(i)}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) \\
+ J_{k,t}^{(i)}(n_{k,t}^{(i)}, \boldsymbol{n}_{k,t}^{(-i)}) = 0,$ equations:

$$\begin{aligned} \partial_t v_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) + \left[n_{k,t} q_k - \beta (1 - p_{k,t}) \zeta_t \right] \partial_s v_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) \\ + \frac{\alpha}{2} (\mu_h - h_t) \partial_h v_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) + \frac{\sigma_s^2}{2} \partial_{ss}^2 v_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) + \frac{\sigma_h^2}{2} \partial_{hh}^2 v_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) \\ + J_{k,t}(n_{k,t}, m_{k,t}) = 0, \end{aligned}$$

$$\begin{split} m_{k,0}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) &= \rho_0(\boldsymbol{y}_k), \forall \boldsymbol{y}_k, \\ \partial_t m_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) &+ \left[n_{k,t} q_k - \beta (1 - p_{k,t}) \bar{\zeta}_t \right] \partial_s m_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) \\ &+ \frac{\alpha}{2} (\mu - h_t) \partial_h m_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) - \frac{\sigma_s^2}{2} \partial_{ss}^2 m_t(\boldsymbol{y}) - \frac{\sigma_h^2}{2} \partial_{hh}^2 m_{k,t}(\boldsymbol{y}_k) = 0. \end{split}$$

Results

• **Proposition**:

Solving the system of HJB and FPK equations results in a unique mean-field equilibrium.

- Simulation parameters:
 - An increasing popularity of one file over time
 - The storage capacity of the SBS is o = 2/5
 - The initial distribution of the considered file follows a normal distribution $\mathcal{N}(0.2, 0.1)$.
